# TITLE: Applications for Local Partnership funding in Gleniffer Local Partnership - 2020/21

# 1. Summary

- 1.1 Applications for grant funding from the seven Local Partnership areas were invited in February 2020, to be considered at the Local Partnership meetings due to be held in April.
- 1.2 The Gleniffer Local Partnership meeting which was scheduled to be held on 23<sup>rd</sup> of April was cancelled due to the Coronavirus pandemic, to reflect both the 'lockdown' restrictions and the emergency planning arrangements in place put in place by Renfrewshire Council.
- 1.3 Renfrewshire Council resumed its policy board arrangements in August, and it was agreed by Renfrewshire Council's Emergencies Board that Local Partnerships would be resumed in September to allow for the allocation of Local Partnership funding for 2020/21.
- 1.4 The total allocation for Gleniffer Local Partnership is £52,214 (£43,064 from the General Grant Fund and £9,150 from Paisley Common Good Fund).
- 1.5 In addition, a sum of £50 per community representative requires to be ringfenced for potential claim of expenses. These expenses are deducted from the available allocation for the Local Partnership. As Gleniffer Local Partnership has seven spaces for community members, £350 is ringfenced for expenses. This leaves a total budget available for allocation by Gleniffer Local Partnership of £51,864.

1.6 The Youth Challenge Fund component of Gleniffer Local Partnership Funding is £19,861. This funding will be allocated by young people through a Participatory Budgeting process currently underway.

# 2. **Recommendations**

2.1 It is recommended that members of Gleniffer Local Partnership consider the applications for Local Partnership grant funding, as set out below in Appendix 1 and 2.

# 3. Background

- 3.1 Applications for grant funding from the seven Local Partnership areas were invited in February 2020, to be considered at the Local Partnership meetings due to be held in April.
- 3.2 Applicants were also provided with refreshed guidance, as well as a description of the Local Priorities identified by the Gleniffer Local Partnership. A copy of this guidance has been provided at Appendix 3.
- 3.3 Following agreement by Renfrewshire Council's Emergencies Board that Local Partnerships would resume in September 2020, all applicants were contacted and provided the opportunity to amend their application or reflect any changes in circumstances that may have occurred since original applications were submitted.
- 3.4 Local Partnership members are asked to consider the applications for funding summarised at Appendix 1 and 2 of this report, and to assess these against the Local Priorities agreed by the Gleniffer Local Partnership.
- 3.5 Following feedback received by Local Partnership members in previous funding rounds, an initial assessment has been carried out by officers to support Local Partnership members in their decision-making. Where applications have made clear reference to the Local Priorities identified by the Local Partnership, this is identified in the first table at Appendix 1. Applications that make a partial or no reference to Gleniffer Local Partnership Priorities are summarised in the second table for example, the project may work with young people with additional needs (and therefore meet the Local Partnership area or make reference to how many young people from the area would be engaged in the project.

3.6 The priorities of the Gleniffer Local Partnership are:

# **Community assets**

The Local Partnership want to see busy local community centres, full of activities. They also want to boost community involvement, getting more people involved in local groups and volunteering.

# What's on in Foxbar, Brediland and Glenburn

The Local Partnership want to develop ways to share information about what is going on locally across the area, including developing community noticeboards and networks.

# Public safety and road safety

The Local Partnership want to promote public safety across the area. This includes road safety and managing the speed of traffic in the area.

# **Isolation and Ioneliness**

The Local Partnership want to tackle isolation and loneliness across the area. They think a key barrier for some people is transport and being able to access activities.

# **Play facilities**

The Local Partnership want to see development of parks and play areas for children and young people

wellbeing. It was recognised that there was insufficient numbers to make a pipe band available to service the local British Legion and veteran community event, e.g. Remembrance Sunday. Members decided to establish a local pipe band that would allow veterans, their families and the wider community members an opportunity to learn piping and drumming.

The project will provide musical tuition twice weekly in the local RBL club who have provided the venue for the practise for a nominal fee. The musical tutors are experienced pipe and drum majors and have the expertise and knowledge to teach beginners and develop intermediate musicians.

The project will provide regular music tuition, creating a community group which will in turn be beneficial to the members. Musical group work is known to help improve physical and mental health as well as promote and widen social bonding and networks. It is anticipated that a fully functioning marching pipe band will be formed and available to support the local branch from 2020 onwards.

# 6. Who Benefits From The Project?

The project benefits those involved in the band through, including young people and people who have experienced PTSD. It also benefits the wider community through the provision of music at community events.

# 7. Fit With Local Partnership Priorities

The project meets the priority of loneliness & isolation as it allows veterans, their families, including young people and people who have experienced PTSD and the wider community members an opportunity to learn piping and drumming.

# 8. Breakdown of Costs

The total cost of the project is £21,605. The group is applying for a total of £16,200 from 3 Paisley's and Renfrew Local Partnership areas. From Gleniffer Local Partnership the group is requesting £4,050.

The project aims:

- to meet increased demand to host schools' conferences during the year, enabling young people to engage actively with issues of social justice, the environment, Global Citizenship and Fair Trade;
- to host and facilitate at least 1 producer visit, combining with one of the above conferences as we have in 2020 and in previous years;
- to work directly with the young people on school Fair Trade and Eco committees to embed Fair Trade issues deeper into the curriculum.

Demand is high from schools to provide regular input on Fair trade and Global Citizenship more widely. This has included visits to individual schools, as well as conferences where several schools from Renfrewshire share in their learning.

# 6. Who Benefits From The Project?

Young people, schools & community groups across Renfrewshire will benefit from this project because it will:

- Increase community assets through school and volunteer engagement. Gleniffer High is greatly involved with Fair Trade
- Reduce social isolation via bringing children and adults together through Fair Trade and volunteering.
- Engage more with schools, young people, teachers and community groups with Fair Trade issues, both local and global.
- Increase collaboration with Renfrewshire Council and other local organisations, building on networks already developed;
- Produce further an Education programme which will increase understanding of global issues within a local context.

# 7. Fit With Local Partnership Priorities

This project meets 2 of the Gleniffer Local Partnership priorities. Firstly, the project will increase the use of community assets through school and volunteer engagement. Gleniffer High school is greatly involved with Fair Trade.

Isolation & loneliness priority will also be addressed as the project aims to reduce social isolation by bringing children and adults together through Fair Trade and volunteering.

# 8. Breakdown of Costs

The total cost of the project is £12,000. The group is applying to 7 Local Partnerships & requesting a total of £8,000 for this project with £3,000 from Gleniffer Local Partnership.

The group will balance the total outstanding project costs of £4,000 through their own funds (£3,000 for sessional costs for Education Officer & £1,000 for conference budget costs)

included installation of new practice nets, groundsman garage, installation of electric scoreboard, shower, toilet and changing room enhancements, purchase of mobile covers and sightscreens and the purchase of an outfield grasscutter. The purchase of a new roller would complement our existing ground equipment and would enable us to prepare better quality cricket pitches and indeed help retain our status as a Cricket Scotland Hub ground.

The project was identified as a result of our status as a Cricket Scotland Hub Ground. This status ensures that we host representative cricket fixtures throughout the cricket season, thus helping to bring people to Paisley. Recently we have hosted the Scottish Cup Final as well as district and international representative fixtures. Our roller has been identified as requiring urgent attention given its age and condition. Our roller remains unreliable and is continually subject to repair thus impacting on our ability to prepare high quality pitches not only for representative fixtures but also our own club fixtures and youth fixtures.

# 6. Who Benefits From The Project?

The project will benefit current and future cricket players as the purchase of a new roller will enable the club to prepare high quality cricket pitches for all to use.

# 7. Fit With Local Partnership Priorities

This project should support the use of facilities and make the ground of Ferguslie Cricket Club more attractive, thus contributing to Gleniffer priority of community assets and possibly contributing to tackling isolation & loneliness by attracting players and spectators across Renfrewshire.

# 8. Breakdown of Costs

The group is applying for £4,000 from Gleniffer Local Partnership

Braehead Arena, the only facility available within a 30mile radius of Paisley. Seek assistance to meet approximately 12% of that total cost within a ring fence for ice costs. All other expenditure will be met from within its own resources.

Renfrewshire Council approved a motion to assist the club in developing an ice facility within the Paisley area, allowing all ice user clubs to thrive, which would preclude the need to apply for grant assistance (Braehead Arena - the most expensive facility in Scotland). We are actively working in conjunction with Renfrewshire Council to establish this.

While Pirates were successful in relocating to Braehead Arena, the cost is prohibitive, currently standing at almost £213.55/hr with an increase pending. Because of rising demand for a skillsbased approach the club has appointed a second volunteer coach for the senior team & intends to appoint commensurate numbers of volunteer coaches in respect of the planned re-introduction of junior ice hockey for players under the age of 18. The club also continues to develop off-ice skills in volunteers & adults with learning difficulties, so they are able to carry out duties on match nights requiring numeracy/organisational/interpersonal skills.

# August 2020 update:

Following the postponement of the Spring round of Partnership meetings to allocate funds, the club took advice from agencies such as Engage Renfrewshire and Renfrewshire Council to apply to alternative sources for stop gap funding during the COVID 19 pandemic. However, the club was advised by agencies such as Resilience Funding, following completion of the subsequent application, that the club did not meet the criteria for support, while others such as the Glasgow Airport Flightpath Fund that they had similarly postponed consideration of applications, such as

that which we had submitted, until a later date, meaning that the club had effectively been cut off from means of temporary support during the pandemic.

Similarly, our participation in fund raising ventures such as local Gala Days were cut off as these were cancelled.

The sport's governing body has temporarily put back the season's opening until October but while this is helpful in reducing outgoings for eg training facilities for the moment we have as yet been unable to purchase essential items such as new strips until we are able to forecast how much money we will have.

Therefore, while the club, in appreciation of the similar circumstances facing other organisations, is not increasing the sum requested from the local Partnership(s), the sum requested has taken on an acute nature as any monies allocated will have to stretch somewhat further.

# **Community Assets**

Paisley Pirates prides itself on its community and 'family' reputation which extends beyond the players of the club, to its fans and volunteers. Every member of the organisation contributes on a voluntary basis, and each match night provides opportunities for volunteers to steward, goal judge, and many more activities to ensure a successful match night experience.

Indeed, the club itself may be regarded as a community asset, perhaps illustrated by its participation in local Gala Days, for example.

At the end of each season, every volunteer for the club receives recognition from the club in thanks for their service which further helps to promote the 'family' feel within the club.

# What's On in Foxbar, Brediland & Glenburn

The club actively promotes its activities, particularly match nights, in all local media outlets to encourage people to attend, particularly as matches are normally played on Sunday late afternoons, at which time, by comparison, it is quieter than at other times in the week. Further, it takes part in local events such as fetes on invitation and, similarly, makes visits to local establishments to encourage healthy lifestyles through appropriate eating habits and taking part in regular exercise. The club brought forward its Sunday start time to 4.30pm to encourage families to attend on a school night by allowing an earlier finish to get youngsters home.

# Public Safety and Road Safety

The club took part in the Paisley Daily Express Anti Knife Campaign, displaying a team photograph with players holding anti knife car stickers that they distributed to supporters and other members of the local community.

# **Isolation and loneliness**

The club engenders a strong sense of family within it to encourage members of the local community to attend Pirates' activities and become 'part of the family'. A number of fans and volunteers attend from the local area. Through means such as announcing that an individual or group is attending their first match new supporters are encouraged to feel part of the bigger group and soon make friends with other people attending games. A number of our volunteers take an active part in our activities and are valued members of our group.

As well as weekly features in the Paisley Express during the season, we have our own website,

Facebook with 2436 Followers and 2415 Likes, Twitter 2303 Followers, Instagram 618 Followers and various other digital outlets within Renfrewshire such as What's on Renfrewshire etc

We have a varied age range of supporters from all over Renfrewshire, including the elderly through to preschool age groups, emphasising the family element of the club.

# **Play Facilities**

As part of the ongoing development of the Paisley Pirates, we have currently extended our teams and creating a junior development programme which will eventually provide opportunities for younger generations to get involved in a unique sport such as Ice Hockey.

The club are actively working in conjunction with Renfrewshire Council to establish an ice facility within Renfrewshire for all ice sports.

#### 8. Breakdown of Costs

The total cost of the project is £29,075.10. The group has applied to 5 Partnerships for funding and in total is requesting £17,445.09 across all 5 Local Partnerships, including £3,489.02 from Gleniffer Local Partnership.

The organisation is looking to get more input from other groups using the hall as well in reaching out to the local community for support and increased usage.

#### 5. Description Of Project

REEM operates a Drop-In Centre, recognized within the community as an impartial access point. A place people feel comfortable approaching for advice and advocacy. We see a wide range of people from different cultures with their own unique barriers, situations and needs. The centre is already helping a lot of people and the demand of the project has been overwhelming. There is a need to keep the centre 5 days a week due to demand. Funding is needed to cover basic running costs.

When various ethnic minorities leave their home countries they are faced with new customs and ways of doing things. They struggle to cope with life changing events without the support of family and friends and with no one to speak to within their new community. They do not interact for several reasons, including trust issues, language difficulties or religious belief.

The project was initiated by a group of people who themselves went through a similar phase and are aware of the need.

There are scheduled information clinics, in addition to staying open 5 days a week for people who need to be listened to one-on one. The centre serves as a first point of contact for people from immigrant communities. It is used by a variety of people including families, students, workers, asylum seekers and refugees; some of whom have little grasp of English while others need a translator to communicate at all. We provide some much needed training; including ESOL, job matters, & awareness on other issues, helping with housing, tackling racism, giving advice with Brexit and tackling isolation.

We follow up with volunteers progression into training and work. Many users continue to feedback with updates when they go ahead to get jobs, get accommodation or increase their participation in the community in any other ways.

#### 6. Who Benefits From The Project?

The ethnic minority service users will have a chance to engage within the wider community in Paisley and Renfrew. The project will help local BME communities and volunteers feel less isolated and more able to participate in the wider society and want to be part of it. Volunteers will receive training to allow them to develop their skills which will enhance their employability skills.

#### 7. Fit With Local Partnership Priorities

This project will support local priority of tackling loneliness and isolation in local ethnic minority communities and in REEM's volunteers. It will also encourage skills swapping and resource sharing in communities.

PACE Community Outreach

To provide the significant benefits of the PACE youth theatre and holiday activity experiences to young people with a genuine interest in drama and the performing arts, but who find themselves in financially challenging circumstances which would prevent them from joining or taking part in activities, or who cannot travel to Paisley town centre to take part.

The proposal is to deliver 8 projects within 6 of the local partnership areas throughout the summer school holidays. There will be 8 separate performances created across Renfrewshire, all of which will be rehearsed and performed in local community centres. Our aim is to generate vibrant and creative activity in community halls and hubs and to improve access to participation in each area.

One experienced theatre director from PACE would lead on the project, supported by two trainee practitioners. The team would work within each area (suggested level ages 8-11) for 4 days (5-hour session per day) to devise a unique, community inspired performance. Rehearsals will take place in local community centres which will hopefully alleviate travel barriers for young people wishing to take part. We would also like to be able to offer every participant a packed lunch for each day of the project.

Young people aged 8-11 will benefit from the project. There will be an increase in the number of young people engaged in creative activity across Renfrewshire, inspiring people to see the benefit of arts participation.

Group's social activities run in venues across Renfrewshire, ranging from community venues like the Ferguslie Bowling Club to accessible pubs and restaurants such as Gabriel's, Canal Station and Burger & Keg. Staff and volunteers support members to interact with one another. An informal training is provided to members e.g. 'What to say after Hello' and 'Successful Dating' and staff can chaperone dates. Members also learn local journeys e.g. practice bus journeys and support one another to get to/from events. Over time members improve their social skills and increase their self-confidence and independence, thus start going out more outside dates-n-mates.

With 26,000 adults with learning disabilities in Scotland (including 692 in Renfrewshire), the Scottish Government's Learning Disability Strategy 'The Keys to Life' states that improving quality of life for people with learning disabilities is a priority. They are more prone to abuse and less likely to have opportunities to form relationships.

The Scottish Government strategy 'A Connected Scotland', recognises 'people with learning disabilities – and their families – are at risk of experiencing social isolation throughout their lives.' Learning Disability Alliance Scotland's 2018 survey showed 80% of adults with learning disabilities feel lonely either sometimes (11%) or a lot (69%).

The group will target adults with learning disabilities in Gleniffer Ward to make them aware of the project and its benefits, partnering with local GPs, pharmacies, West College, Carers' Centre and

local advocacy services. Their outreach workers provide opportunities and support to connect, make friends and form meaningful relationships.

#### August 2020 Update:

In normal circumstances our monthly programme of social activities usually run in venues across this ward, including community venues and accessible pubs and restaurants such as Canal Station and The Gleniffer Hotel. We issue a monthly programme of events and our staff and volunteers support members to interact with one another. We also provide informal training such as 'What to say after Hello' and 'Successful Dating' and can even chaperone couples on dates. Members learn local journeys and support one another to get to/from events. Regular 'Open' events create opportunities for non-members, ie those who may be ineligible for membership, and the wider community to join in.

We hope that as current restrictions ease, we will be able to resume these face-to-face activities. However, since the imposition of the lockdown, dates-n-mates has developed a regular programme of online social activities and events to help our members and other members of the wider community retain the social contacts which are vital to the maintenance of good mental health.

These online activities give members the chance to talk to others, have some fun and helps them to improve their digital skills.

Our members now desire to get back to 'normal' but there is an increasing anxiety regarding the 'new normal' and what it will be. dates-n-mates is now therefore planning for coming out of lockdown in a way that allows these vulnerable people to stay safe but have the social interaction they so desperately need and want.

We wish to adapt the previous funding application to include this new way of supporting members.

We have developed and piloted a 'friendship matching' process, matching people with others who have similar likes and interests to enable them to meet up in smaller groups very locally, rather than joining larger groups (our normal process).

This new matching process will include researching database packages for profiling that will allow us to identify members with similar interests. From there we will facilitate online introductions by video to allow people to get to know each other and minimise any initial awkwardness when meeting in person. And, should Stage 4 of the Scottish Government release from lockdown process be further delayed (ie. permitting events and larger groups), it will allow members to have safe, local social interaction sooner than would otherwise be the case.

With this in mind, we want to implement a friendship matching service for our members in Renfrewshire to be piloted in August with wider roll-out from September. Our aim is to ensure that adults with learning disabilities in this ward have the opportunity to develop a very local friendship circle to support them at least until the current pandemic is over – and hopefully longer.

We will seek to recruit and train 2-4 local volunteer chaperones to assist members with the initial 'getting to know you' phase of each small, local friendship circle and to help with safeguarding these vulnerable adults.

With this in mind, we would still ask for £1,500 as a contribution towards the costs of running

dates-n-mates Renfrewshire this year.

#### 6. Who Benefits From The Project?

Adults with learning disabilities in Gleniffer will benefit from the project as they will have opportunities and support to make and sustain natural friendships and close personal relationships; develop the skills and abilities to make decisions about, develop and sustain close personal relationships and friendships; will be able to participate in the social, economic and cultural life of Renfrewshire.

The project will take place between 1<sup>st</sup> April 2020 and 31<sup>st</sup> March 2021.

This project will enable all members of the community to access all the services they require and enjoy the benefits of facilities in the local partnership. Our main priority is the disabled community but ensuring that the area is suitable for them, we include other age groups such as the elderly, children learning to walk and even people with sports injuries and so many more. Renfrewshire Access Panel would like to ensure that everyone in the community is included to reduce isolation and loneliness. We would also like to ensure that the members of the local partnership are able to read and interpret plans for future meetings so that the best possible changes are made to any renovation or new build in the community ensuring all the current buildings and venues are used to their full potential. We would also like to offer training and assistance to the what's on guide for the area, whether its use of a computer or even a quiet space to work on it, we would be happy to assist.

The need for the project has been established by the concerns of the Local Area Partnership and we will assist in any way we can to ensure safe places for children to play in the current green spaces available by ensuring accessible equipment for all children. We also provide work experience for children from mainstream and additional needs schools as well as adults returning to work by providing volunteering opportunities for them. We have also identified that a lot of the disabled community have little or no access to technology which we can provide training for and we will provide this training for any member of the community.

We will provide access audits/surveys to ensure spaces are safe and meet the requirements for accessibility. We will also provide advice on the best accessible play equipment for unused green spaces to ensure disabled children can play safely and interact with other children. We will provide training and work experience for both children and adults on technology along other training courses we provide and offer volunteering opportunities for anyone in the community.

We would also like to offer training to the Local Area Partnership on reading and interpreting plans to ensure everyone is fully aware of the process and implications.

#### 6. Who Benefits From The Project?

Residents of the Gleniffer Local Partnership will benefit from this project. Disabled community, elderly, children learning to walk, people with sports injuries in particular will benefit from the apparent improvements of roads and pavements within the Local Area Partnership which this

Around 10,000 people visit Lamont Farm annually. We aim to educate people from all walks of life in animal care, welfare and husbandry.

The project educates and provides hands on animal care and welfare facilities to the local community and surrounding areas. Lamont Farm offers a wide variety of services to various groups and organisations within the local area and further afield, work experience placements are provided to jobcentres, high schools, community service, kibble project and many more. The farm provides hands on experience for over 40 children who wish to pursue a career in animal care and veterinary practice, educational workshops are ran throughout the year for primary schools, nurseries and visitors.

The farm has many social connections to help promote mental health, wellbeing and to help lessen isolation. Animals are a great source of therapy and have a great ability to bring many different people together some people prefer being round the animals as a gentle way of reintroducing them into the community. Some of the connections we have are RAMH, spark of genius, community service, West college Scotland's adults with addition needs and kibble we believe everyone should have the chance to be involved in their community. These connections help provide placements for anyone suffering mental health issues, physical disabilities, someone who has been out of the community, anyone who is looking to get back into work or anyone who just wants to volunteer, it's a placement where everyone is included in every aspect of the farm with no judgement. We offer work experience placements to many different high schools throughout Renfrewshire and beyond including Gleniffer high school, the placements are invaluable to pupils wishing to pursue a career in the animal sector as not many places allow under 16's to work so closely with such a variety of animals, in recent years our volunteers have went on to become fully qualified veterinary nurses. We have a working partnership with Glenburn based group - helping those in need we collect and distribute many items for the group helping out with people who are in need in the community. We are on an active bus route with buses coming from many different areas which helps make it easy to visit from many parts of Renfrewshire and the surrounding areas.

The farm runs regular education and fun workshops to bring the community together to learn different aspects of animal care, our parent and toddler workshops are hugely popular bringing parent and toddlers from many areas Foxbar included. These workshops offer great fun for all participants as there are no other parent and toddler events which involve animals. We have great connections with the local and beyond nurseries and childminding groups providing them

with workshops and tour and handling session where the children have great fun with the animals.

We have a small secure play area based within the farm which is decorated by colourful cartoon animals which is hugely popular, and many happy hours are spent by children and parents. We also now have the only animal facility in the local area, with the recent closure of both Barshaw Park Pet's Corner and Robertson Park Pet's corner (fortunately we were able to offer a new home to several animals from both facilities), therefore are finding that we have even more young visitors from the local partnerships attending the farm in the hope of seeing some familiar furry friends.

The farm has supplied manure to many of the local and surrounding community allotments courtesy of the community service team, we share regular information to anyone looking to have a small plot and happy to pass the details on for the area they live in.

The grant will help towards running costs to ensure the project can continue to provide a variety of services and continue to work with a number of local educational establishments within the community.

#### August 2020 update:

With the effects of Covid-19 it is more critical than ever that we receive funding from all possible sources.

Due to the nature of our project and the contact with the public we had to make the difficult decision to close mid-March, even before an official lockdown was announced, to minimise any risk to either the public or to our volunteers. We had to cease all activities with our Kids Clubs (junior volunteers) and reduce any volunteering from adults to a bare minimum of one volunteer plus a member of management each day, with these adults working at a social distance throughout the time.

We were closed for 15 weeks, losing an average donation of £150 per week or more, as the spring and summer months generally are our busiest months, especially at the weekends. Even now, although we have been able to reopen, we have had to keep two days closure to allow for a deep clean, to ensure the maximum safety of all volunteers and visitors. Normally the donations would have increased during these times due to school and nursery summer holidays, but we feel that safety is of the utmost importance.

Also there have been increased costs incurred, as disinfecting has been increased and PPE for volunteers has been purchased.

Now that we have reopened we are receiving very positive feedback in that we are providing a safe place and activity for people far and wide to assist them firstly venturing away from home and also to increasing the possibilities of children being able to have contact with animals and other children without having to fear contracting Covid-19. We are providing an affordable day out for families (no entry fee) to allow anyone who may be struggling through or after furlough or after redundancy due to Coronavirus.

The purpose of the project is to provide transport to and from the Friendly Hour for members. We provide an afternoon of friendship and fellowship that allows the members to meet and develop their friendships. Entertainment and social activities are provided on a weekly basis from October to May.

Entertainment includes children from a Nursery, 2 Primary and 1 Secondary Schools, as well as entertainment provided by Adults. We also have the Community Police and Musical Exercises Members also have a much-appreciated cup of tea or coffee and goodies. The programme includes a Christmas Lunch and an Annual Outing.

The Committee identified many members would be unable to attend our weekly meeting without provision of transport. Many of our members live alone and the Friendly Hour is the only time they may see other people. It gives them the opportunity of mixing socially, allowing them to chat and at the same time give them some entertainment avoiding an afternoon of loneliness and isolation. Our average age is over 85 and many are quite infirm. There is a greater need for these people to be transported to a happy and lively environment for a few hours on a weekly basis.

By providing transport we are reaching out to people in the communities who may not be able to get out – in some cases this is the only outing of the week. We are able to bring them into a group where they get friendship and fellowship. We must remember that many people experience loneliness and isolation, and many don't have the opportunity for conversation. They welcome the joy of sharing a story or a sing-along and hearing news from the communities.

#### 6. Who Benefits From The Project?

The project will benefit men and women over the age of 60 from Gleniffer, Renfrew, Paisley North West and Central and Paisley East local partnerships.

#### 7. Fit With Local Partnership Priorities

The project meets local priority of tackling isolation and loneliness as it will provide an opportunity for group member's to have transportation to and from the Friendly Hour meeting where they are able to mix socially, chat and at the same time experience some entertainment avoiding an afternoon of loneliness and isolation. The purpose of the project is to ensure the sustainability of the mobility scooter and wheelchair service in Renfrewshire. The service provides access to a range of mobility aids to around 200 individuals tackling social isolation due to short- and long-term health issues. This supports residents to access facilities, appointments, shops and services.

The project will focus on establishing an in-house servicing centre for the range of 14 scooters, 3 manual wheelchairs and one high function power chair (for advanced mobility disorder). This project will enable Shopmobility to ensure all equipment meets the legal safety standards, improve customer experience, enhance the long-term performance of the fleet and also create a cohort of skilled volunteer "Technician" opportunities.

Feedback from people who use the service has indicated that they have suffered from social isolation and many only manage to get out of their house, with confidence, knowing that they can hire the equipment provided by the organisation. Many members do not have the luxury of being in a position to purchase their own scooter or wheelchair, as they are living on benefits. This service is therefore a life line.

# Local Partnership Grant Funding

A guide to the grant funding available from Local Partnerships and how to apply



Local Partnerships are a way for communities, elected members and public organisations to work together at a local level.

There are seven Local Partnerships in Renfrewshire, and they replaced Local Area Committees in 2018.

Each Local Partnership has agreed a set of Local Priorities, and each Partnership has grant funding they can allocate to support these priorities.

The aims of Local Partnerships are to:

- Make connections and networks between community groups and the wider community
- Identify, set and share local community priorities
- Listen to, consult and represent local communities
- Distribute grants to support local priorities

# Grants available from Local Partnerships

The Local Partnerships consider applications and award grant funding that reflects their local priorities. The Local Partnerships look after grant funding streams that were previously overseen by Local Area Committees:

- the General Grant Fund;
- two Common Good Funds (Paisley Common Good and Renfrew Common Good); and
- the Youth Challenge Fund

It is strongly advised that organisations read this guidance before writing and submitting their applications.

You will find further information about each of these three funding streams and how to apply for them over the next few pages.

The most important thing to remember when applying for grant funding is to make sure you can contribute to at least one of the local priorities for the area you are applying to. It will be important to take time to find out about these priorities before applying. They are available <u>here</u>.

#### **The Application Process**

Read the Local Partnership Grant Funding Guidance and the Priorities for the Local Partnership area you are applying to.

> Attend a drop in session if you would like to discuss the priorities, application process or alternative funding opportunities.

Fill in application, ensuring you address the relevant local priorities and submit to rcgrantapplications@renfrewshire.gov.uk, together with the relevant bank statement, accounts and constitution. The deadline for applications is 9th March 2020

> Your application will be considered by the Local Partnership in April or May. Local Partnership meetings are public, so you are welcome to come along to the April or May meetings. You will not be required to attend, or expected to speak at the meeting.

> > Following the meeting, you will be informed whether your application was successful or not. If you are successful, you will be asked to agree the conditions of grant and payment arrangements will be made.

# The Application Form

The standard Voluntary and Community Organisations Grant Application Form is used to apply for Local Partnership funding. The form is available <u>here</u> (under related documents) or please contact the Community Planning team on 0141 6184168 if you would like a paper copy sent to you.

The form has guidance notes in the right-hand column to help you with what information to put in each box. The notes below provide further information about how to make the best use of the application.

## Section 1

This section is for you to tell us about your organisation and what you do. In section 1.13 you are asked about which Local Partnership area you are applying to and where your project will be operating. In section 1.13a you should tick the Local Partnership area you are applying for funding in. In 1.13b you should write which Local Partnership area(s) the project you are applying for will operate in. All applications will be treated as an individual application by each Local Partnership. In this way, your activity needs to be viable as a project in each Local Partnership area it is applying to. If you are applying for funding from more than one Local Partnership area, you will either need to make sure your one application covers at least one priority from each of the Local Partnership area applied to, or submit separate applications tailored to the priorities of each Local Partnership area applied to. If you are submitting one application to cover more than one Local Partnership area application to cover more than one Local Partnership area application to cover more than one Local Partnership area application to cover more than one Local Partnership area applied to. If you are submitting one application to cover more than one Local Partnership area, you will need to make it clear how much funding is being asked for from each Local Partnership. This is covered in section 2.

# Section 2

This section is an opportunity to tell us about the project you would like funding for. It is very important that you use this section to explain how you will address the priorities identified by your Local Partnership. These sections will be made public through the summary reports at the Local Partnership meetings. You should provide a good description of your project in this section highlighting clearly which priorities it will address. This is information that the Local Partnership Meeting will use to decide on your application. If you are using one application to apply to more than one Local Partnership, you need to write the name of the Local Partnership applied to next to the amount requested from that Local Partnership in section 2.10.

#### Section 3

This section is to make sure that you have included all the necessary supporting paperwork. Your application cannot be considered until you submit all of the correct paperwork.

#### Section 4

If you are filling in a paper copy of the form to post, you can sign this section of the form. If you are doing the form online, a signature can be taken at a later date.

# **General Grant Fund**

The General Grant Fund provides grants of up to £10,000. The grants are open to constituted local community, voluntary organisations and Community Planning Partners. The fund is intended to develop local activities and projects within Local Partnership areas. The total amount of General Grant funding available is slightly different in each of the seven Local Partnership areas, because funding is allocated to Local Partnerships based on their population. Activities are expected to reflect the different priorities and needs in each of the seven areas.

# **Eligibility Criteria**

# Who can and cannot apply?

- Any community or voluntary organisation with a constitution and a bank account can apply. Any organisation applying should be accountable to its members.
- Community Planning Partners can submit applications for funding, but Council services cannot. Community Planning partners should not submit applications for projects that are regarded as core functions.
- If your application is for an individual, it will not be considered.
- Your application should contribute towards at least one of the Local Partnership's key priorities. These were established by Partnerships at their March 2019 meetings and have been developed further since. Projects should be able to demonstrate real benefit to the local area by improving or complementing existing service provision.
- Organisations that work across Renfrewshire, or in a number of Local Partnership areas, can apply, but only for projects or activities which support an area's priorities, and are delivered in that area specifically.
- You cannot apply for costs of activities that have already happened.
- You cannot apply for your total running costs. You can apply to part fund running costs though.
- The General Grant Fund will very occasionally support applications to fund activities such as day trips and lunches, but only when they provide an additional community benefit (for example tackling loneliness and isolation).
- The General Grant Fund will not support projects that exist mainly to further religious or political beliefs.

- Your application must encourage equality of opportunity.
- You cannot apply to fund either a trip abroad or hospitality to other organisations.
- If you receive a grant from the General Grant Fund, it must usually be spent within this financial year.
- General Grant Fund awards are one-off and are not intended to provide ongoing funding for the same or similar activities on an annual basis.
- If you are successful in your application, you must accept and comply with the grant conditions. It is also expected that you report back on the impact the project has had once the funds are spent.
- You should plan how you will sustain your organisation, once funding from the General Grant Fund has been used.
- You cannot use the funding for events to raise funds for other charities
- You cannot use the funding to cover your Community Councils' running costs above those funded by its administration grant from the Council.
- You should provide evidence of partnership working, where applicable.

# What types of activities or projects can and cannot be funded?

Activities or projects must contribute to at least one of the key priorities identified by the Local Partnership. The fund can support a variety of projects and activities. This can include supporting people back into employment; supporting young people; supporting community safety activity; supporting healthier lifestyles; tackling poverty in disadvantaged areas; and promoting equality within local areas.

These types of activities can cover an array of different projects. Examples include:

- Refurbishment of community facilities such as decorating or improving the layout of a room for community use.
- Enhancing or creating community gardens for recreational areas.
- Community events such as gala days.
- Projects that raise awareness of healthy eating and help people change eating habits.
- Projects that promote positive mental health issues.
- After school clubs that encourage development e.g. homework clubs,
- Leadership and team working skills for group members.

# Common Good Funds

Common Good is funding generated from an investment portfolio where the annual income is used to support local projects. There are Common Good funds in both Renfrew and Paisley, which are distributed through the Local Partnership. In Paisley, the fund is split across the three Local Partnerships, based on the population of each area.

The general eligibility criteria for the common good funds are the same as for the General Grant Fund, although there is no specific maximum award. The main difference is that the Common Good Funds are charities and so any projects funded through the common good funds must meet their charitable objectives (the advancement of civic responsibility or community development) to benefit people in Renfrew or Paisley.

# Former Youth Challenge Fund

The Youth Challenge Fund was allocated using participatory budgeting for the first time in 2019/20 and became known as "Celebrating Renfrewshire – By Young People, For Young People." This was the first year that young people decided directly which youth projects should be funded. It is expected that this fund will be allocated in the same way this year. This funding round will be launched separately.

# **Further Information**

Drop in sessions will be held across the Local Partnership areas. These are not specifically to address any funding concerns, but may be useful if you would like to find out more about local priorities and give your input on Local Partnerships more generally.

# **Frequently Asked Questions**

# How will funding award decisions be made?

The members of the Local Partnership in each area will make a decision on each funding application, guided by an assessment of whether the application has met the local priorities. Remember to base your application on the local priorities of the Partnership area you are applying to. Priorities are linked <u>here</u>

## How do I apply?

Fill in a standard grant application form on the Renfrewshire Council web site. You can do this electronically and email it in or send in a completed paper copy. You should make sure you have understood what the local priorities are for the area you are applying to before completing your application.

#### When is the deadline for applications?

The deadline will be 9<sup>th</sup> March 2020 for consideration at the April/ May meetings.

## What happens to my application after it is submitted?

Your application and documents will be checked and then stored on the Council system. A summary of your application will be prepared to include in the papers for the relevant Local Partnership meeting. If there are any queries or clarifications needed about your application, you will be contacted before the Local Partnership papers are prepared.

#### When will I hear back?

You will hear back after the meeting of the Local Partnership has made a decision. The decisions will be made during the April/ May 2020 cycle of meetings. Local Partnership meetings are public, so you are welcome to come along to the meetings. You will not be required to attend or expected to speak at the meeting.

#### How much money can I apply for?

You can apply for a maximum of £10,000 from the General Grant Fund. If you are applying for Common Good funding, there is not specific maximum limit – but remember Common Good funding is only available in Paisley and Renfrew.

#### Who can apply?

Any community or voluntary organisation with a constitution and a bank account can apply. Any organisation applying should be accountable to its members. Council services will not be able to apply for funding. The wider community planning partners will be able to apply, if their project aligns with local priorities.

#### Can I apply to fund Christmas lights?

Unfortunately, Renfrewshire Council has very limited capacity for any further installation, storage and maintenance of Christmas lighting. If you wish to submit an application which

would require additional Council resources, you should discuss this with Council officers prior to submitting your application.

## We work across Renfrewshire, can we apply?

You can apply to one or more Local Partnership. The project you are applying for, must be for the benefit of people who live in that area and the project must align with the local priorities for that area. You should focus on the areas where your project aligns most with the local priorities. You could also think about where your project is based or where most of the people using or otherwise involved in the project will be based. It might align with more than one Local Partnership area. If you do want to apply to more than one Local Partnership area, you will need to either submit separate applications or make it very clear which information applies to which Local Partnership.

# What is happening to 'multi LAC' applications?

All applications will be treated as an individual application by each Local Partnership. In this way, your activity needs to be viable as a project in each Local Partnership area it is applying to. If you are applying for funding from more than one Local Partnership area, you will either need to make sure your one application covers at least one priority from each of the Local Partnership areas applied to, or submit separate applications tailored to the priorities of each Local Partnership area applied to. If you are submitting one application to cover more than one Local Partnership area, you will need to make it clear:

- How your project will specifically benefit people in each Local Partnership area applied to, and
- how much funding is being asked for from each Local Partnership.

# Is it the same process as the old LAC funding applications?

There are some differences. Local Partnership grant applications must be based on the priorities for that Local Partnership area. The Youth Challenge fund decisions will be made by local young people and so follow a different process to take place later in the year.

#### Is the total amount of funding the same as the old LAC funding?

Yes, the total amount of funding is the same. It is still based on the population of each area, but now split between the seven Local Partnerships, rather than the five former LACs.

# What happens if money is not allocated by the end of the financial year?

Where all available grant funding within a financial year is not fully committed, the balance can be carried forward only where a specific project for the forthcoming financial year has been identified and approved by the Local Partnership. This gives the Local Partnership the flexibility to set aside a proportion of its current year grant for use on a specific project the following year.

It is not intended that this year-end flexibility would be applied to carry forward a general underspend of available grant for which no specific purpose has been identified or approved.

## What happens if organisations that are members of Local Partnerships apply for funding?

Organisations that are members of a Local Partnership can still apply to that Local Partnership, but they will not be allowed to speak to the application at the decision meeting and will not be allowed to vote on their own application.

## If I am unsuccessful, where can I find other sources of funding?
