Applications for Local Partnership Funding To Renfrew Local Partnership 2022/23

1. Summary

- 1.1 Applications for grant funding from the seven Local Partnership areas were invited to be submitted during March and April 2022, to be considered at the Local Partnership meetings due to be held in June 2022.
- 1.2 The available allocation for Renfrew Local Partnership for 2022/23 is £112,193, made up of £40,453 from the General Fund and £71,740 from Renfrew Common Good Fund.
- 1.3 From this total budget, a sum of £50 per community representative requires to be ringfenced for potential claim of expenses. These expenses are deducted from the available allocation for the Local Partnership. Renfrew has space for seven community members, so the total ringfenced for expenses is £350. The total budget available for allocation by Renfrew Local Partnership is therefore £111,843.
- 1.4 The total value of applications made to Renfrew Local Partnership for funding is £89,891.65.
- 1.5 The Youth Challenge Fund component of Renfrew Local Partnership Funding is £18,657. This funding will be allocated by young people through a Participatory Budgeting exercise that will take place during autumn 2022.

2. Recommendations

2.1 It is recommended that members of Renfrew Local Partnership consider the applications for Local Partnership grant funding, as set out below in Appendix 1 and 2.

3. **Background**

- 3.1 Applicants for funding in 2022/23 have been provided with guidance, as well as a description of the Local Priorities identified by the Renfrew Local Partnership.
- 3.2 Local Partnership members are asked to consider the applications for funding summarised at Appendix 1 and 2 of this report, and to assess these against the Local Priorities agreed by the Renfrew local priorities.
- 3.3 An initial assessment has been carried out by officers to support Local Partnership members in their decision-making. Where applications have made clear reference to the Local Priorities identified by the Local Partnership, this is identified in the first table at Appendix 1. Applications that make a partial or no reference to Renfrew Local Priorities are summarised in the second table for example, the project may work with young people (and therefore meet the Local Priority around young people) but not deliver this directly in the Local Partnership area or make reference to how many young people from the area would be engaged in the project.
- 3.4 The priorities of the Renfrew Local Partnership are:

Bringing Renfrew Town Centre to life

The Local Partnership want to see more things to do in the town centre, particularly encouraging local events and seeing more happening in the evenings. They want to do this by making best use of community assets and spaces, including working with the town centre business community.

Moving around and connectivity

The Local Partnership want the economic investment in Renfrew to benefit the local community, particularly making it easier for people to get around the town, and to travel to and from Renfrew.

Making the most of public assets

The Local Partnership want to see the maximum use of public resources, such as parks and outdoor spaces, as well as maximising the use of buildings in the community.

Strengthening social connections

Improving social connections and tackling social isolation is a key these for the Local Partnership, and the Partnership recognise this affects all ages, including younger and older people. Community events and activities are important, as will be a focus on improving health and well-being locally.

Key Theme: Maximising economic impact

The Local partnership want to see a focus on boosting the economic outcomes for people in Renfrew and how this can support their Local Priorities.

Purpose of the project

Like everyone the last 2 years have not been the best, however due to the isolation we have noticed that a good number of our members have deteriorated due to loneliness. Buddy Food we felt would be a great way of getting people back together and sharing a nutritious meal this would be in the form of a lunch. This project will tackle food poverty, reduce loneliness and isolation, strengthen partnership working with the wider community, increase health and wellbeing.

This was identified as we slowly started to meet back up we noticed that a good number of our members had lost weight. We as a group have many contacts with other older groups and have been told to look out for Malnutrition 1 in 10 older adults aged 65+ are malnourished and this is where we would like to do something about this.

What will the project do?

Our project is to create weekly lunch clubs within our 10 complexes that will provide a nutritious lunch that will combat malnutrition. We plan to have valuable information available and also want to create a recipe book with simple nutritional meals on a budget that we can share with the wider community including schools. Introducing them back to basic with information on healthy eating and why it's so important to have plenty of fruit and veg in our diet as we age. Even if it is a good plate of soup and fruit salad it all helps.

Purpose of the project

Dates-n-Mates Renfrewshire aims to transform the lives of people who are often socially isolated and lonely and aims to improve their mental health and general well-being. Our calendar of social events in Paisley East encourages members to meet new people and build meaningful relationships. We provide opportunities for people to practice local journeys and boost their confidence to travel independently. And by supporting people to build relationships, we help improve their general mental health and provide ways to be involved in the community

What will the project do?

There are currently 26,786 adults living with a learning disability in Scotland, including 692 in Renfrewshire.

According to SCLDs Learning Disability Scotland's statistics 2019, Renfrewshire currently has 5.6 per 1,000 population of adults with a learning disability, which is above Scotland's national average of 5.2 per 1,00 population.

The Scottish Government strategy 'A Connected Scotland', recognises that 'people with learning disabilities – and their families – are at risk of experiencing social isolation throughout their lives.

We will target adults with learning disabilities living in Renfrew to build awareness for the project and its potential benefits. To achieve this, we will partner with local GPs, pharmacies, Colleges, Carers' Centres and local advocacy services.

Our social activities will be in Renfrew venues, from local community spaces to accessible pubs/restaurants. We will use parks and outdoor spaces for our regular walks, as well as offering member events in the town centre, including meals out, pub nights, and activities in Soar Intu Braehead

Purpose of the project

To help take away financial strain from vulnerable local families by providing new and safe toys/gifts for 0 to 18-year-olds at birthdays and Christmas. Allowing children to play, learn and express themselves which is vital for wellbeing. Distribute Easter eggs to local children living in poverty as well as Halloween costumes. Creating equality within our community by removing any stigma due to the quality of gifts and costumes distributed.

What will the project do?

Previously we only ran at Christmas. It was clear to us from the level of need at the festive period that the toy bank could becoming a vital service for the Renfrewshire community all year round. We had various meetings with organisations that refer to us and the feeling was mutual. Now that we have ran for a full year we continue to grow to help as many local children as possible as we have seen a significant rise in poverty especially in working families. Continuing to identify ways to further develop the toy bank for the community's needs.

Working with referring organisations such as social work, health visitors, all local schools and nurseries, the foodbank, The STAR project, EBI Unites, Pals of the Privies, who Cares? Scotland, Home Start, The SPACE project we are trying to reach as many children in need as possible. Continuing to network with local businesses we set up drop off points for gifts with volunteers collecting and making up gift packages. Spreading information about the Toy Bank via social and traditional media outlets.

Purpose of the project	

Having been given access to the land at the side of the Scout Hall, we used last year's grant to clear and secure the area. An overgrown health hazard is now an area that is of benefit to the community.

To gain the full potential form the land, we propose to have the derelict garages deep cleaned and re-fit, and the tarmac areas repaired.

Should funds allow, we would look upgrade the lighting in this area.

This will allow us to move boat and equipment storage from our hall and increase the capacity of our upper hall for community use

What will the project do?

Utilising the outside space beside our hall, has enabled us to re-launch our programmes for all sections (6-year-olds through to 18-year-olds).

Having access to the garages, would enable us to consolidate our equipment storage and create additional indoor facilities in our upper hall. Our vision will allow for unused buildings that are an eyesore community use.

The additional hall capacity will allow us to fully address the demand for Scouting in Renfrewshire, as at present we are very close to capacity in our upper sections.

The renovated large garage will allow us to store our minibus and fleet of boats on site (including two motor safety boats, 12 Kayaks and trailer and 6 dinghy's). This allows for easy maintenance and access to our equipment in a secure compound

The smaller garages would be used to store our camping equipment and marquees.

By utilising the garage resources, we would free up our upper hall for dedicated use upon transfer of equipment. Upgrades to the upper hall can be applied in a controlled manner over the next few years.

To replace the association boundary fence, which is unsightly and defective and faces Kings Inch, Rd, Renfrew. The fence is approximately 150 metres in length with a 3-metre-high weldmesh type security fence. The association has no electricity supply and depends on solar powered equipment. This equipment has been in service for a number of years and requires replacement. The association requires to replace the defective batteries, the solar panels and cables, security lights and solar powered cameras around the entrance and members cabin area.

What will the project do?

During the winter storms extensive damage was caused to the boundary fence necessitating extensive repairs which initially cost £371. However, another part of the fence also fell down costing an additional £260.00 to repair. These repairs are temporary and due to the age and style of the fence repairs of this nature will be required annually. The lights and cameras are required due to a members wife falling and injuring herself during darkness and the cameras are required to prevent theft and damage.

The fence will be replaced by the members who will remove the old fence and replace with the weldmesh style fencing ensuring that the fence is properly erected. The solar equipment will also be installed by the members who have experience in this area. The removal of the old fence and the replacement with a modern security fence will enhance the local area and make it more visually attractive to the residents whose properties face Kings Inch Rd. Whilst the solar equipment will enhance the safety and security of visitors to the site.

Purpose of the project

The club building has suffered from significant dampness due to loose and broken rendering allowing water saturation. New windows installed last year have helped, but problems of cold and damp cannot be cured until the render is replaced, as it is almost entirely blown across the whole building. This will make the building watertight to prevent further damage to the structure and contents and improve thermal efficiency thereby helping to cut heating costs and energy usage.

What will the project do?

Dampness has been an issue for several years, but resources had been focussed on piecemeal roof repairs. A damaging woodworm outbreak in 2019 highlighted the need to eliminate other sources of dampness. After several pieces of render fell off, we obtained quotations for its repair, which brought to light the fact that the condition of the render was a major source of the dampness and the whole building required re-rendering. Renewal of the windows was also urgently needed and was done last year, resulting in further damage to the loose render.

The entire building (or as much as can be afforded if grant is partial) would be rerendered.

We would like to develop a drop in aimed at capacity building hard to reach minority ethnic (in particular African) communities in and around Renfrewshire which encounter multiple barriers, such as communication and those of a cultural nature, which prevent them from becoming resilient communities.

The project will provide weekly 40 weekly drop-in sessions for 8-10 individuals around volunteering job search and application support, volunteering opportunities, general and mental health support and information on entitlements, The project will also aim to improve awareness via providing access to literature and media through the development of information packs on hot topic subjects to share with 600 - 800 people. The proposed information packs would also be written using simple English and translated into several common languages that are prevalent within the community, making them accessible to a wide range of audiences. The project would also deliver 6 workshops targeting 5 participants per workshop around areas that our client base feel they need more help within order to become more resilient and independent. These areas could include budgeting, recycling, how to buy online (using comparison websites and freebies) cooking (how to make healthy meals utilising leftovers), confidence building, CV writing and developing interview skills. The project will also organise one massive cultural celebration event bringing the whole community together to allow community integration.

What will the project do?

The project has been developed as a result of a combination of factors such as an increasing number of diverse groups in and around the Renfrewshire area; gaps in service provision for hard-to-reach communities; consultations held with target communities in order to assess their needs; anecdotal evidence; evidence from research; and government and local council community development priorities. This information as it relates to our experience of service delivery at a local level in Renfrewshire indicates that regular activities and intervention.
