DECLARATION OF INTEREST

Councillor Campbell declared an interest in item 6 of the agenda – Erskine, Inchinnan, Bishopton & Langbank Local Partnership Budget Monitoring Report - as she was the Chair of the Board of Erskine Arts. Councillor Campbell indicated that as she had declared an interest, she would leave the meeting and take no part in any discussion or voting thereon.

TRANSPARANCY STATEMENT

Councillor Nicolson indicated that he had a connection to item 6 of the agenda - Erskine, Inchinnan, Bishopton & Langbank Local Partnership Budget Monitoring Report — as he was a member of the Inchinnan Development Trust. However, he indicated that he had applied the objective test and did not consider he had an interest to declare and intimated that it was his intention to remain in the meeting and to take part in any discussion or voting thereon.

ORDER OF BUSINESS

The Chair intimated that in order to facilitate the business of the meeting she intended to take item 7, Date of Next Meeting of the agenda prior to item 6. Erskine, Inchinnan, Bishopton & Langbank Local Partnership Budget Monitoring Report of the agenda.

1 MINUTE OF PREVIOUS MEETING

There was submitted the Minute of the meeting of Erskine, Inchinnan, Bishopton and Langbank Local Partnership held on 10 November 2022.

DECIDED: That the Minute be approved.

2 INCHINNAN DEVELOPMENT TRUST UPDATE

The Convener proposed that in light of the number of members not in attendance, that this item be continued to a future meeting of the Local Partnership. This was agreed unanimously.

DECIDED: That this item be continued to a future meeting of the Local Partnership.

3 **RENFREWSHIRE PLAN FOR NET ZERO**

The Convener proposed that in light of the number of members not in attendance, that this item be continued to a future meeting of the Local Partnership. This was agreed unanimously.

DECIDED: That this item be continued to a future meeting of the Local Partnership.

4a WINTER CONNECTIONS

A Armstrong-Walter, Chief Executive's Service, gave a verbal update on the Winter Connections Programme and provided information on the network of local places who had received funding to connect people to others in their community the winter. She advised that hosts were asked to sign up to Winter Connections principles, and support was provided to all host organisations and a range of activities had been undertaken including seniors' bingo, exercise classes, croche classes and film nights. She further indicated that 33 projects in the Erskine, Inchinnan, Bishopton & Langbank Local Partnership area had received funding, and most of the funding provided by the Council's Leadership Board had been allocated.

In addition, a programme of activities across the Library Network had been run by OneRen, and targeted advice had been provided in a number of the Winter Connections Library locations, in recognition of the increased level of need n terms of the cost-of-living crisis.

An update was provided on the activities undertaken in Erskine and Bishopton Libraries and activities being undertaken by Erskine Arts at the Erskine Sports Centre.

DECIDED: That the update be noted.

4b YOUDECIDE

G Heaney, Environment and Infrastructure, provided a verbal update relative to You Decide Results on the participatory budgeting exercise across Renfrewshire and detailed the successful projects for the Erskine, Inchinnan, Bishopton & Langbank Local Partnership area.

The initiative gave communities a key role in deciding their priorities for environmental and physical infrastructure improvements to be undertaken throughout Renfrewshire over the next three years via a Community Investment Fund of £1.2million. The fund was split across 16 local areas and as many projects as possible had been funded until all the money had been allocated. As a result of the engagement initiatives, over 2800 proposals/ideals were submitted.

The successful projects for YouDecide had been announced and information for those in the Erskine, Inchinnan, Bishopton & Langbank Local Partnership area was provided.

Initiatives funded were: -

Erskine - Creation of ramps at either side of the existing steps at Holms Crescent to aid pedestrians with mobility issues; the upgrade of the Clyde Walkway Path from Newshot Drive around the river and create additional seating at the waterfront; and the installation of lighting on the link path between Bellfield View and Linburn Road;

Bishopton – Engagement with the local community to carry out roundabout improvements in the village; installation of a tarmac path and seating area along one side of the grass area on Ferry Road in front of West Porton Farm, and install outdoor exercise equipment on Churchill Drive Park;

Inchinnan – Installation of additional lighting columns around Inchinnan Park to provide lighting around the play area, installation of lighting columns on the path between Braemar Road and Old Greenock Road bus stop, installation of a gate from Inch path as required, alterations to Inchinnan Playing Fields carpark to allow direct access from the park and upgrade the path as required, resurface the footpath leading from Broompark Drive to Inchinnan Primary School, design and install interpretation boards at points of local interest around Inchinnan following engagement with the local community, and install seating and pedestrian cycle route at the A8 Greenock Road; and

Langbank - Contribution towards installing new items of play equipment at Station Road park; and upgrade the path along Langbank Playing fields to the train station.

DECIDED: That the update be noted.

4c COMMUNITY MENTAL HEALTH AND WELLBEING

A McBride, Engage Renfrewshire, provided a verbal update on Community Healthy and Wellbeing.

The Local Partnership was advised that the Mental Health and Wellbeing Fund second year of funding was now underway, and that the majority of funding had been distributed.

It was indicated that Engage Renfrewshire had received more applications for funding in the second year, 90 applications had been received and 59 groups had received awards. For Erskine, Inchinnan, Bishopton and Langbank Local Partnership, this equated to five awards totalling £32,000.

Information was provided on the network which had been set up last year as part of the Community Mental Health and Wellbeing project and which was being further developed this year to ensure further promotion of the activities being undertaken. The network was made up of funded groups funded from both Engage Renfrewshire and the Renfrewshire Health & Social Care Partnership, and encouragement was being given to social proscribers from across Renfrewshire to join the network. Members were invited to submit the names of any groups they were aware of to join the network. She advised that this was the last year of funding, and she encouraged groups to potentially work together in future to hare resources to enable the work currently being undertaken to continue when the funding comes to an end.

DECIDED: That the report be noted.

5 UPDATE FROM COMMUNITY LEARNING & DEVELOPMENT TEAM

There was submitted a verbal update by J Kennedy, Senior Community Development Officer, Communities & Housing relative to the activities of the Community Learning & Development Team. Information was provided information on Alice.org, a local information system for Scotland which was also used by Engage Renfrewshire and provided information on local organisations and events, green spaces funding, parks and plat areas and villages investment fund. He outlined the projects in the Local Partnership area which had benefited from funding.

The Senior Community Development Officer also indicated that the Celebrating Renfrewshire Team was looking for young people aged 12 to 25 to form a steering group to look at activities for young people in the area. Street Stuff would also be involved in event in the coming months.

DECIDED: That the update be noted.

6 **DATE OF NEXT MEETING**

The Chair advised that the next meeting of the Partnership was scheduled for 11 May 2023.

In response to a request by Councillor MacLaren to hold the meeting in person, the Chair indicated that she would email all members to ascertain their preference and would abide by the wishes of the majority. This was agreed.

(a) That it be noted that the next meeting of the Partnership would be held on 11 May 2023; and

(b) That it be agreed that members of the Partnership be contacted by email to establish their preference for either a remote (Teams) or in-person meeting.

7 ERSKINE, INCHINNAN, BISHOPTON & LANGBANK LOCAL PARTNERSHIP BUDGET MONITORING REPORT

There was submitted a report by the Chief Executive relative to funding to community groups to undertake projects. The funding was allocated from the General Grant Fund and, through a Participating Budgeting exercise known as Celebrating Renfrewshire.

A table setting out the funds allocated by Erskine, Inchinnan, Bishopton and Langbank Local Partnership in 2022/23 and current budget position was attached as an appendix to the report.

The report advised that the June 2022 meeting, three projects (FR1075 Inchinnan Development Trust, FR1126 Right2Dance and FR1083 Erskine Arts) were awarded funding that was ringfenced subject to additional information. Following submission of this additional information, the meeting held on 10 November 2022 agreed to release the ringfenced funding to these three projects.

Additional feedback on projects funded in 2021/22 was received since the November 2022 meeting from Inchinnan Development Trust and Paisley and District Boys Brigade and was included at Appendix 2.

The report intimated that applications to the 2023/24 round of Local Partnership awards would be open for 6 weeks from Friday 24 February to Sunday 9 April 2023. Updated guidance would be issued to applicants, with opportunities to attend support sessions to advise applicants and answer any queries about the process. Applications would be submitted to the May 2023 round of Local Partnership meetings for decisions on awards.

3.2	How did your project benefit people in the community? (What outcomes did you achieve? Please describe the impact your project had on its participants)
	Thousands of parents and carers were able to gift their children with without the children knowing where the presents had come from. This dignified response helps not only financially but mentally, taking off pressure for local families. The same approach applies to Halloween and Easter, again ensuring we can reach as many areas as possible. Our gift card appeal allows young people to have a choice, something we believe strongly in and want to always include teenagers who can often be a challenging age to buy for. Organising the appeals also takes a huge pressure off of many third sector organisations that can refer to the Toy Bank such as Pals of the Privies, Glenburn Stronger Communities, EBI Unites, The STAR Project, Homestart, Who Cares? Scotland, The SPACE Project, Family Nurse Partnership etc. With children learning through play, the toy bank helps to provide educational gifts supporting with learning and creativity.

When the first lights went up everyone was talking so positively about it.

Please describe the impact your project had on its participants) By turning on the Christmas lights event was absolutely full with families and all generations within the village, where they enjoyed carol singing and mince pies and hot drinks, a tremendous turn out of support and gratitude from the villagers. It marked the start of the Christmas festivities. They brought young and old together enjoying the brightness of our lights and hopefully reducing social isolation. Finally, our village achieved equity in line with all the Renfrewshire residents. A tremendous sense of ownership, pride and well-being became evident across the village. Bonnie Bishopton Facebook page was completely inundated by thanks and gratitude on the first day the lights were lit. It was an incredible response. People stopped us in the street to say thank you to Bonnie Bishopton members. Local traders were absolutely delighted and grateful to see the village lit up. Resident felt empowered at being involved in local funding issues and achieving their wishes. Community council feedback was tremendously positive from our residents.

What priorities did you tell us your project would meet?

- Employability and life skills
- Culture

What did you want the money to do?

We planned to provide free industry-standard media training to young people across Erskine, Inchinnan, Bishopton & Langbank as well as have improved drop-in services for young people who'd like to come along and make new friends in a safe, supportive and inclusive environment. We wanted to train young people to be able to utilise video editing skills either in their personal lives or to pursue further education or a career utilising these skills. Providing a games console for our users created another branch of social inclusion we would have not been able to have provided if not for this fun. Gaming much like music is a great way for young people to come together and has proved a major draw for young people who would regularly spend their Friday evenings alone at home. A purchase of a standard recording interface was planned to allow our membership to record audio and music that they are written as well as learn skills within the recording field.

What did you spend it on?

We purchased an Apple Mac Mini capable of large-scale video editing as well as accessories such as a keyboard/monitor/mouse. We also purchased a Nintendo Switch with controllers and a selection of

games requested by the young people. We purchased a recording interface with appropriate software for music and audio recording and mixing.

How many young people benefited from/accessed your project?

Although our attendance at our Friday Drop-In is a shared mixture of young people there to play music as well as video games, we have reached a combined number of 407 instances of young people since receiving the fund. Our 'Crew' group that utilises our media equipment on a regular basis has seen 179 individual instances of young people attending since our fund. We also have a core group of users who specifically use our media equipment for their own projects or to gain more skills with our staff helping them. We have between 5-10 young people regularly learning skills and hands-on experience with the equipment purchased with this fund.

How did your project benefit young people in the community?

Young people in our community and wider locality do not have access to the same level of equipment for free access as we go now due to this project and grant offer. Anyone can now use our media facilities to learn skills in visual and audio editing for no charge. These sorts of skills development are often only something made available in further education, or a paid course. These skills are vital in life, video editing, for example, can be used in any industry for any manner of things, all businesses advertise and with the always increasing rise and prominence of social

media both in our personal and professional lives being able to edit media clips together is going to be an essential skill for most young people growing up. Our drop-in sessions have been more popular than we could have anticipated. This is in part of us receiving funding for a games console which has brought youths together from different backgrounds to have fun and socialise whilst playing games.

How can you evidence the impact of your project?

Our strong numbers since receiving funding have been a great indication of the success and impact of the project - with the recent drop in numbers exceeding 50 young people during one session we know there is a great need for this facility in our local community. We are currently recording a short video where you will hear from the young people themselves on why this fund and subsequent grant offer has been a great success and impact for members of our local community.

What did you want the money to do?

Provide a musical experience for young people who may come from disadvantaged background or have mental health and well being issued. Our objective is to take them through a 4 week programme which encourages participation collaboration and teamwork. They are taught how music is constructed with a professional musician and eventually they produce a song which belongs to them. They have decided the theme, rhythm, lyrics beats etc. More importantly they have learned a number of skills along the way that we hope will lead to further support or employment, further education or apprenticeships

What did you spend it on?

The money has not yet been fully spent as the project will not complete to mid April. The funding assisted with Administration, production costs equipment supply, Staff costs for delivery and associated expenses. We have been contracted to provide 3 Projects in the region. One is complete, the other starts next week and the final one starts at the end of March

How many young people benefited from/accessed your project?

Already approximately 20 people with a further 8 to 10 due to take part in the final session

How did your project benefit young people in the community?

It allows them to understand they can achieve something they never thought possible. They come out of their shell through the love of music. They interact with others and contribute in a team environment. Their confidence and self worth is improved all of this helps Well being and mental health

What priorities did you tell us your project would meet?

• Mental and physical wellbeing

What did you want the money to do?

We wanted to establish and provide all equipment for a Junior Development section within the Paisley Pirates umbrella for youths under 19 and beyond.

What did you spend it on?

We fully kitted out 20 under 19 youths to take part in both training sessions and fully fledged games. This consisted of skates, pads, gloves, shorts and shirts for training and games and new helmets and sticks. We also provided all required accessories e.g. water bottles, stick tape, leg tape, face visors and cages. There can be high turnover of equipment due to sticks breaking and the players are still growing so replacements are often required. We also provided tracksuits for the players to give them a sense of identity. Due to the funding, we were able to play within our home rink and pay associated fees and licenses for both training and games and entry fees to competitions.

How many young people benefited from/accessed your project?

Originally 20 under 19-year-olds but they are also feeding into the under 16 age group. One young person has been chosen to represent Team GB in Riga, Yugoslavia this summer. We are now preparing for a further under 16 age group to feed into the under 19s.

How did your project benefit young people in the community?

We have been able to fully train and support a full team of 20 under 19 youths and are now looking to support further teams at under 16, under14s and all the way down to learn to play sessions which would encompass basic skating skills and safety. This has helped to improve the young's people mental health especially after lockdown. There has also been a social bonus as new friendships and relationships are built with players and coaches. The young people are also taught how to care for their equipment, cleaning it and storing it properly.

How can you evidence the impact of your project?

There is photographic proof of all the youths in action at both under 19 leave and with the senior team. I can also provide anecdotal evidence from the coaches and the team behind the team!!!

As we are at the start of our sailing season, we are in the process of allocating the grant and anticipate the following spend: 6 young leaders trained to level 3 RYS sailing standard. in anticipation of completing their instructor certificates. Leaders being trained in Sea kayaking, allowing sessions on the Clyde Investment in paddle boards, pending the necessary scout qualifications to be awarded Water training sessions at the Glynhill hotel pool, to train the kids in capsize drills Obtaining minibus and trailer licences for our young leaders. Contribution to our new safety boat, cost c£20k

How many young people benefited from/accessed your project?

Our scout and explorer sections all benefit, this accounts for c50 kids and young adults.

How did your project benefit young people in the community?

Our water sessions will continue over the summer and will be able to be expanded with the necessary investment. we grow from strength to strength, but in order to maintain standards and to keep up with current legislation, we need to continually look at our resources. As long as we "tick the boxes" and have the correct equipment and trainers, we will continue to offer water sports to all kids in our sections.

What priorities did you tell us your project would meet?

- Employability and life skills
- Culture

What did you want the money to do?

The purpose of the project was to help young emerging musicians in Renfrewshire develop their music from a basic song idea and turn a good idea into a great one through a series of Concept Sessions. These Concept Sessions were geared towards equipping young composers and musicians with a good awareness of: • Musical content, style, and genre • Song structure and how it can be improved • Harmony and melody • The creative process from song idea to stage and recording studio • The lyric writing process • Their individual play

What did you spend it on?

We ran a series of weekend workshops and recording sessions finishing with a live performance. Our producers worked with participants on a one to one basis in the studio, assisting the development of their lyrics and music to bring their ideas for words and melodies alive as a performance piece. The aim was to teach young bands and artists how to take a good idea for a song and develop it into a great one. As the course progressed the tutors gave young creators the skills to bring out the best in their song ideas and improve their skills as a songwriter.

How many young people benefited from/accessed your project?

A total of 15 workshops took place from 7 November 2022 to 6 March 2023 and 30 young artists took part. 12 young people volunteered to help with the tech crew and gained experience in sound recording and music production on each session.

How did your project benefit young people in the community?

Participants gained a better understanding of the composition, the flow and timbre of the songs that they have written before and composed during the course. The experience gave them an insight to what is required before the time it gets to the recording studio or is performed live on stage. During the sessions young artists were coached, mentored, and given guidance to support the development of both their careers and their audiences. Other benefits included: An increase in opportunities to develop their creative ambition. It gave the participants a better understanding of ways to increase awareness of their music to their fans and attract new ones.

How can you evidence the impact of your project?

We asked for feedback after each session and the main comments were: Participants gained a better understanding of what makes a good song and how to collaborate with others. All the participants felt that their song writing skills had improved The project increased their understanding of different instruments other than their own and therefore widened the type, style and even genre of their original idea. Being together as a 'Renfrewshire Collective' strengthened their network and created a new set of connections to other music organisations and individuals. The tutors comments were: The young people were very enthusiastic and came up with lots of rough ideas and finished with a more structured way of writing songs. The overall feeling was that more projects of this type would produce better artists and bands as content is key to a musician's success. The feedback will help us to design courses in the future We will send images and video

Applications for Local Partnership Funding to Erskine, Inchinnan, Bishopton & Langbank (EIBL) Local Partnership 2023/24

1. Summary

- 1.1 Applications for grant funding from the seven Local Partnership areas were invited to be submitted during March and April 2023, to be considered at the Local Partnership meetings due to be held in May 2023.
- 1.2 The available allocation for Erskine, Inchinnan, Bishopton & Langbank Local Partnership Local Partnership for 2023/24 is £43,989
- 1.3 From this total budget, a sum of £50 per community representative requires to be ringfenced for potential claim of expenses. These expenses are deducted from the available allocation for the Local Partnership. EIBL Local Partnership has space for seven community members, so the total ringfenced for expenses is £350. The total budget available for allocation by EIBL Local Partnership is therefore £43,639
- 1.4 The total value of applications for funding received is £94,206.58
- 1.5 The Youth Challenge Fund component of EIBL Local Partnership Funding for 2023/24 is £21,988.00 which includes a carry forward of £1,700.00 from 2022/23, This funding will be allocated by young people through a Participatory Budgeting exercise that will take place during May 2023 with decisions announced in June.

2. **Recommendations**

2.1 It is recommended that members of EIBL Local Partnership consider the applications for Local Partnership grant funding, as set out below in Appendix 1 and 2.

3. Background

- 3.1 Applicants for funding in 2023/24 have been provided with guidance, as well as a description of the Local Priorities identified by EIBL Local Partnership.
- 3.2 Local Partnership members are asked to consider the applications for funding summarised at Appendix 1 and 2 of this report, and to assess these against the Local Priorities agreed by EIBL.
- 3.3 An initial assessment has been carried out by officers to support Local Partnership members in their decision-making. Where applications have made clear reference to the Local Priorities identified by the Local Partnership, this is identified in the first table at Appendix 1. Applications that make a partial or no reference to EIBL Local Priorities are summarised in the second table for example, the project may tackle social isolation (and therefore meet the Local Priority around social isolation) but not deliver this directly in the Local Partnership area or make reference to how many people from the area would be engaged in the project.
- 3.4 The priorities of EIBL Local Partnership are:

Key theme: Intergenerational work

The Local Partnership are particularly interested in building relationships between younger and older communities across the area and exploring how intergenerational work might support their Local Priorities.

Health and wellbeing

The Local Partnership want to make sure people are aware of and can access health services, to support both physical and mental health. This includes community-led health services too. The Partnership also think tackling social isolation is key to improving health across the area.

Connectivity

The Local Partnership want to see places across Erskine, Inchinnan, Bishopton and Langbank better connected to each other, and to the wider area. They want to see provision of good quality public transport, but also safe, clean and green routes for walking and cycling.

Community identity

The Local Partnership want to support the individual identity and history of each town and village. A key part of this should be local events which celebrate this identity, and better communication of what's on across the area to support this.

Planning and environment

The Local Partnership want to be involved in, and influence, planning decisions, and are particularly interested in land ownership and use. The Partnership see this as key to

supporting a clean and green area, which includes street cleanliness issues at a local level, but also wider green issues such as low carbon.

Community empowerment

The Local Partnership want communities to be involved in, and influencing, decision making about the area. This includes making sure communities are well informed about local issues and looking at ways to get people involved such as participatory budgeting.

Purpose of the project

Develop a campaign of awareness about the risk's dogs off-lead and dog fouling poses in our community, Teucheen Wood, and adjacent farmland/grassland habitat. The project will encourage dog-owners to help avoid potential harm to residents, woodland users, and disturbance to wildlife/livestock. By encouraging dog-owners to keep their dog on a lead and properly dispose of waste will increase safety for all.

IDT staff, landowners and members of the public have witnessed numerous dangerous incidents involving unleashed dogs and a recent increase in their frequency.

Unleashed dogs present a major risk to nesting bird species over the breeding season. Dog fouling has also become an issue - posing a risk to residents, wildlife, livestock, and all woodland users (in particular children taking part in woodland education activities) due to the diseases it can carry.

What will the project do?

The campaign will include physical signage in high footfall and high-risk areas (i.e. areas of wildlife delicate to disturbance) which will both educate and encourage dog-owners to be responsible by keeping dogs on leads, picking up dog foul and ensuring they are sticking to established paths. These signs will be supported by an online campaign and print campaign (through our newsletters and leaflets).

Since starting our adult engagement, it has become clear that the positive impact on mental health, social isolation & loneliness is significant, and we are aware that there are many more people who could benefit from participation here. A community has grown significantly in Erskine Arts, and we know that a more diverse programme will empower even more people.

What will the project do?

Many of our adult members have spoken of Erskine Arts being a place of respite and, for many, the only place where they find the opportunity to socialise. By increasing our offering beyond a musical one, from participating in arts & crafts to simply coming for lunch and a chat, we will encourage even more older adults in the community to take part in our programme - as seen in our music lessons, even greater community cohesion will develop as a result. Many adults now volunteer at Erskine Arts, with one even joining our Board of Trustees.
