RECORDING OF MEETING

Prior to the commencement of the meeting, the Chair intimated that this meeting of the Local Partnership would be recorded and that the recording would be available to watch on the Council's website.

DECLARATIONS OF INTEREST

There were no declarations of interest intimated prior to the commencement of the meeting.

1 MINUTE OF PREVIOUS MEETING

There was submitted the Minute of the meeting of Erskine, Inchinnan, Bishopton and Langbank Local Partnership held on 17 June 2021.

<u>DECIDED</u>: That the Minute be approved.

2 MATTERS ARISING

DECIDED: It was noted that there were no matters arising from the previous meeting.

3 COVID-19 IMPACTS AND COMMUNITY RESPONSE

There was submitted a presentation by the Partnership Manager relative to Covid-19 and the impacts and the community response.

The questions posed in the presentation were: -

- How did the Covid-19 pandemic affect local communities specifically;
- How did the community respond;
- What worked well; and
- What can we learn for the future.

In response to the first question, the main areas highlighted were the importance of local resources was vital and lack of a resilience plan; lack of guidance and leadership from the Council to various bodies within the community on how to assist their communities, where a set criteria and set of guidelines which communities could work through to organise themselves.

In terms of how the community responded, the manner in which communities came together and formed partnerships was highlighted. Groups formed to set up various activities and look after the more vulnerable members of their communities.

In relation to the question of what worked well, the establishment by the Council of the Community Food Partnership enabled the Council to work with community groups, and in the case of groups which had not previously been involved in food distribution, allowed a form of "buddy" system to facilitate the delivery and distribution of food parcels throughout the communities. It also allowed the groups to identify quickly what worked well.

Finally, in terms of learning for the future, it was felt that processes and procedures should have been in place and funding could have been controlled centrally by Renfrewshire Council. The requirement for a structured recovery plan was highlighted as was the role of Engage Renfrewshire in providing practical support to the various communities.

It was also considered that the resilience of the local communities was considered as a learning point.

DECIDED: That the presentation and discussion be noted.

4 YOUDECIDE

G Heaney delivered a presentation relative to #YouDecide, a participatory budgeting exercise that gave communities a key role in deciding their priorities for environmental and physical infrastructure improvements to be undertaken throughout Renfrewshire over the next three years via a Community Investment Fund of £1.2m.

The presentation explained the #YouDecide concept and highlighted the marketing and promotional work already undertaken as a first phase to encourage communities, groups and individuals to submit their ideas for environmental improvements. A video was shown, featuring local groups and individuals, explained how to get involved and inspired the submission of ideas. As a result of engagement initiatives, over 2700 proposals/ideals had been submitted, with 104 ideas/proposals for improvements for the Erskine, Inchinnan, Bishopton & Langbank area.

The second phase of #YouDecide was underway and would conclude at the end of January 2022 with a shortlist of projects that were suitable and feasible having undergone technical assessment against set criteria. During the third and final phase of #YouDecide communities would be invited to vote on which shortlisted project they wished to see proceed. It was anticipated that the winning projects would be announced in early March 2022.

DECIDED: That the presentation be noted.

5 COMMUNITIES MENTAL HEALTH AND WELLBEING FUND

Prior to his presentation, S Miller, Engage Renfrewshire. referred to the activities of a number of community groups were assisting their local communities through the distribution of food parcels, emergency deliveries of medication etc. Funding had been put in place by a number of organisations and Engage Renfrewshire had been involved in promoting and co-distributing some of those funds. He undertook to provide to the Local Partnership information which Engage Renfrewshire had retained relating to the number of groups which had applied for emergency funding and the amount of money dispersed to these groups. The Chair requested that this information be circulated by email to the members of the Partnership. This was agreed.

Thereafter there was submitted a presentation by S Miller, Engage Renfrewshire, relative to the national Communities Mental Health & Wellbeing Fund (the Fund). The Fund aimed to promote and develop good mental health and wellbeing and to protect against the impact of distress and mental ill health in adults.

Engage Renfrewshire announced that Renfrewshire had secured an award of £509,542 from the Fund and small "grass roots" community groups and organisations with a strong community focus could now apply for funding towards projects that tackled issues such as: suicide prevention; social isolation; loneliness prevention and early intervention; and/or addressed any mental health inequalities exacerbated by the pandemic and the needs of a range of "at risk" groups locally.

S Miller advised that the fund would open on 15 November 2021, and organisations could apply more than once if they were running a variety of different projects, and partnership applications would be encouraged. The deadline for applications was 7 January 2022. It was noted that the funds required to be allocated by end of March 2022.

DECIDED:

(a) That information held by Engage Renfrewshire relating to the number of groups which had applied for emergency funding and the amount of money dispersed to these be circulated by email to the members of the Partnership;

(b) That the presentation be noted;

(c) That as Engage Renfrewshire was the contact point for enquiries, applications, delivery of funds and monitoring compliance, members should contact s.miller@engagerenfrewshire.com to suggest suitable projects; and

(d) That the presentation be circulated to all members off the Local Partnership.

6 ERSKINE, INCHINNAN, BISHOPTON AND LANGBANK LOCAL PARTNERSHIP BUDGET MONITORING REPORT AND 20/21 FUNDING APPLICATION FEEDBACK

There was submitted a report by the Chief Executive relative to the status of the budget allocated to this Partnership for disbursement to local voluntary groups and organisations from the General Fund and Celebrating Renfrewshire.

The report highlighted that £193.86 was available to be disbursed from the General Fund and that Celebrating Renfrewshire, the participatory budgeting exercise to deliver funding to youth groups in the area, was still underway.

TITLE: Applications for Local Partnership Funding to Erskine, Inchinnan, Bishopton and Langbank Local Partnership 2022/23

1. Summary

- 1.1 Applications for grant funding from the seven Local Partnership areas were invited to be submitted during March and April 2022, to be considered at the Local Partnership meetings due to be held in June 2022.
- 1.2 The available allocation for Erskine, Inchinnan, Bishopton and Langbank Local Partnership for 2022/23 is £43,939.
- 1.3 From this total budget, a sum of £50 per community representative requires to be ringfenced for potential claim of expenses. These expenses are deducted from the available allocation for the Local Partnership. Erskine, Inchinnan, Bishopton and Langbank Local Partnership has space for seven community members, so the total ringfenced for expenses is £350. The total budget available for allocation by Erskine, Inchinnan, Bishopton and Langbank Local Partnership has Local Partnership is therefore £43,639.
- 1.4 The Youth Challenge Fund component of Erskine, Inchinnan, Bishopton and Langbank Local Partnership Funding for 2022/23 is £20,288. This funding will be allocated by young people through a Participatory Budgeting exercise that will take place during autumn 2022.

2. **Recommendations**

2.1 It is recommended that members of Erskine, Inchinnan, Bishopton and Langbank Local Partnership consider the applications for Local Partnership grant funding, as set out below in Appendix 1 and 2.

3. Background

- 3.1 Applicants for funding in 2022/23 have been provided with guidance, as well as a description of the Local Priorities identified by Erskine, Inchinnan, Bishopton and Langbank Local Partnership.
- 3.2 Local Partnership members are asked to consider the applications for funding summarised at Appendix 1 and 2 of this report, and to assess these against the Local Priorities agreed by the Erskine, Inchinnan, Bishopton and Langbank Local Partnership.
- 3.3 An initial assessment has been carried out by officers to support Local Partnership members in their decision-making. Where applications have made clear reference to the Local Priorities identified by the Local Partnership, this is identified in the first table at Appendix 1. Applications that make a partial or no reference to Erskine, Inchinnan, Bishopton and Langbank Local Priorities are summarised in the second table for example, the project supports health and wellbeing (and therefore meets the Local Priority around health and wellbeing) but does not deliver this directly in the Local Partnership area or make reference to how many people from the area would be engaged in the project.
- 3.4 The priorities of Erskine, Inchinnan, Bishopton and Langbank Local Partnership are:

Key theme: Intergenerational work

The Local Partnership are particularly interested in building relationships between younger and older communities across the area and exploring how intergenerational work might support their Local Priorities.

Health and wellbeing

The Local Partnership want to make sure people are aware of and can access health services, to support both physical and mental health. This includes community-led health services too. The Partnership also think tackling social isolation is key to improving health across the area.

Connectivity

The Local Partnership want to see places across Erskine, Inchinnan, Bishopton and Langbank better connected to each other, and to the wider area. They want to see provision of good quality public transport, but also safe, clean and green routes for walking and cycling.

Community identity

The Local Partnership want to support the individual identity and history of each town and village. A key part of this should be local events which celebrate this identity, and better communication of what's on across the area to support this.

Planning and environment

The Local Partnership want to be involved in, and influence, planning decisions, and are particularly interested in land ownership and use. The Partnership see this as key to supporting a clean and green area, which includes street cleanliness issues at a local level, but also wider green issues such as low carbon.

Community empowerment

The Local Partnership want communities to be involved in, and influencing, decision making about the area. This includes making sure communities are well informed about local issues and looking at ways to get people involved such as participatory budgeting.

Purpose of the project

Dates-n-Mates Renfrewshire aims to transform the lives of people who are often socially isolated and lonely and aims to improve their mental health and general well-being. Our social events in Erskine Inchinnan Bishopton and Langbank will encourage members to meet new people and build meaningful relationships. And by supporting people to build new relationship, we are helping them to feel valued and part of the wider community. This in turn reduces their feelings of loneliness and gives them a purpose, which helps boost their mental health.

What will the project do?

There are currently 26,786 adults living with a learning disability in Scotland, including 692 in Renfrewshire.

According to SCLDs Learning Disability Scotland's statistics 2019, Renfrewshire currently has 5.6 per 1,000 population of adults with a learning disability, which is above Scotland's national average of 5.2 per 1,00 population.

The Scottish Government strategy 'A Connected Scotland', recognises that 'people with learning disabilities – and their families – are at risk of experiencing social isolation throughout their lives.

We will target adults with learning disabilities living in Erskine Inchinnan Bishopton and Langbank to build awareness for the project and its potential benefits. To achieve this, we will partner with local GPs, pharmacies, Colleges, Carers' Centres and local advocacy services.

Our social activities will be in local venues from community halls to accessible pubs/restaurants. We will work with local groups to share resources and encourage our members to take part in local events to give them a stronger sense of community.

Purpose of the project

To help take away financial strain from vulnerable local families by providing new and safe toys/gifts for 0 to 18-year-olds at birthdays and Christmas. Allowing children to play, learn and express themselves which is vital for wellbeing. Distribute Easter eggs to local children living in poverty as well as Halloween costumes. Creating equality within our community by removing any stigma due to the quality of gifts and costumes distributed.

What will the project do?

Previously we only ran at Christmas. It was clear to us from the level of need at the festive period that the toy bank could becoming a vital service for the Renfrewshire community all year round. We had various meetings with organisations that refer to us and the feeling was mutual. Now that we have ran for a full year we continue to grow to help as many local children as possible as we have seen a significant rise in poverty especially in working families. Continuing to identify ways to further develop the toy bank for the community's needs.

Working with referring organisations such as social work, health visitors, all local schools and nurseries, the foodbank, The STAR project, EBI Unites, Pals of the Privies, who Cares? Scotland, Home Start, The SPACE project we are trying to reach as many children in need as possible. Continuing to network with local businesses we set up drop off points for gifts with volunteers collecting and making up gift packages. Spreading information about the Toy Bank via social and traditional media outlets.

Purpose of the project

The purpose of this project is to cover a variety of general costs for the project. Our members currently donate £4.50 per month with many exceptions for those who cannot afford. With living costs on the rise, we want to support our members by providing free access to the service ensuring that there are no barriers to inclusion, ensuring continued support and a safe, fun environment for those most vulnerable in our community.

What will the project do?

We have a strong membership base and have consulted with our young people and parents. On a weekly basis we engage with around 15 young people with additional support needs. Not only do we support these young people, but we are a vital lifeline for around 20 parents who struggle to find activities which meet their specific needs. Post Covid recovery we are now having to pay a rental fee for the space. This is something we have not planned for and is our users' main concern for the future.

The fund will pay for a variety of general costs to support SNACK and its activities as well as removing subscription fees for all. Not only will it cover general rent, transport and activity cost but we also hope to purchase some VR headsets to give our young members an opportunity to enjoy unique experiences in a comfortable, safe environment.

The club building has suffered from significant dampness due to loose and broken rendering allowing water saturation. New windows installed last year have helped, but problems of cold and damp cannot be cured until the render is replaced, as it is almost entirely blown across the whole building. This will make the building watertight to prevent further damage to the structure and contents and improve thermal efficiency thereby helping to cut heating costs and energy usage.

What will the project do?

Dampness has been an issue for several years, but resources had been focussed on piecemeal roof repairs. A damaging woodworm outbreak in 2019 highlighted the need to eliminate other sources of dampness. After several pieces of render fell off, we obtained quotations for its repair, which brought to light the fact that the condition of the render was a major source of the dampness and the whole building required re-rendering. Renewal of the windows was also urgently needed and was done last year, resulting in further damage to the loose render.

The entire building (or as much as can be afforded if grant is partial) would be rerendered.

This is especially important in rural and isolated communities and promotes inclusion, tackles loneliness and isolation, improves maternal health and wellbeing, address health inequalities. This then improves the confidence of young mums, enabling them to go on and do further training. We want to maintain the excellent service we already provide by supporting our existing volunteers in the area.

What will the project do?

Across Renfrewshire breastfeeding rates remain low, with only around 18% of babies being exclusively breastfed at 6-8 weeks in the most deprived areas. Evidence shows that trained peer support helps mums to meet their own breastfeeding goals, enabling them to breastfeed for longer. This positive impact on their own mental health improves bonding and attachment helping to alleviate postnatal depression and feelings of isolation. By having the opportunity to access skilled support and evidence-based information they feel part of a supportive comm

During the pandemic we have been running virtual breastfeeding groups weekly on Zoom and have now started a new face to face breastfeeding support group in Bishopton, when restrictions eased. We will continue with supervision and ongoing learning for our volunteer peer supporters. This is in line with the Local Partnership's priority of families accessing local health services, supporting both mums' physical and mental health and reduces social isolation, increasing social capital. We plan to hold 2 Pop Up events in other areas of the LP.

We would like to develop a drop in aimed at capacity building hard to reach minority ethnic (in particular African) communities in and around Renfrewshire which encounter multiple barriers, such as communication and those of a cultural nature, which prevent them from becoming resilient communities.

The project will provide weekly 40 weekly drop-in sessions for 8-10 individuals around volunteering job search and application support, volunteering opportunities, general and mental health support and information on entitlements, The project will also aim to improve awareness via providing access to literature and media through the development of information packs on hot topic subjects to share with 600 - 800 people. The proposed information packs would also be written using simple English and translated into several common languages that are prevalent within the community, making them accessible to a wide range of audiences. The project would also deliver 6 workshops targeting 5 participants per workshop around areas that our client base feel they need more help within order to become more resilient and independent. These areas could include budgeting, recycling, how to buy online (using comparison websites and freebies) cooking (how to make healthy meals utilising leftovers), confidence building, CV writing and developing interview skills.
