# Applications for Local Partnership funding in Erskine, Inchinnan, Bishopton and Langbank - 2020/21

# 1. Summary

- 1.1 Applications for grant funding from the seven Local Partnership areas were invited in February 2020, to be considered at the Local Partnership meetings due to be held in March/April.
- 1.2 The Erskine, Inchinnan, Bishopton and Langbank Local Partnership meeting in April was cancelled due to the Coronavirus pandemic, to reflect both the 'lockdown' restrictions and the emergency planning arrangements in place put in place by Renfrewshire Council.
- 1.3 Renfrewshire Council resumed its policy board arrangements in August, and it was agreed by Renfrewshire Council's Emergencies Board that Local Partnerships would be resumed in September to allow for the allocation of Local Partnership funding for 2020/21.
- 1.4 The available allocation for Erskine, Inchinnan, Bishopton and Langbank Local Partnership is £43,989.
- 1.5 In addition, a sum of £50 per community representative requires to be ringfenced for potential claim of expenses. These expenses are deducted from the available allocation for the Local Partnership. As the Local Partnership has seven community members, this means £350 requires to be ringfenced. The sum available for allocation by the Local Partnership is therefore £43,639.

1.6 The Youth Challenge Fund component of Erskine, Inchinnan, Bishopton and Langbank Local Partnership Funding is £20,288. This funding will be allocated by young people through a Participatory Budgeting process currently underway.

#### 2. Recommendations

2.1 It is recommended that members of Erskine, Inchinnan, Bishopton and Langbank Local Partnership consider the applications for Local Partnership grant funding, as set out below in Appendix 1 and 2.

# 3. **Background**

- 3.1 Applications for grant funding from the seven Local Partnership areas were invited in February 2020, to be considered at the Local Partnership meetings due to be held in June.
- 3.2 Applicants were also provided with refreshed guidance, as well as a description of the Local Priorities identified by the Erskine, Inchinnan, Bishopton and Langbank Local Partnership. A copy of this guidance has been provided at Appendix 3.
- 3.3 Following agreement by Renfrewshire Council's Emergencies Board that Local Partnerships would resume in September 2020, all applicants were contacted and provided the opportunity to amend their application or reflect any changes in circumstances that may have occurred since original applications were submitted.
- 3.4 Local Partnership members are asked to consider the applications for funding summarised at Appendix 1 and 2 of this report, and to assess these against the Local Priorities agreed by the Erskine, Inchinnan, Bishopton and Langbank local priorities.
- 3.5 Following feedback received by Local Partnership members in previous funding rounds, an initial assessment has been carried out by officers to support Local Partnership members in their decision-making. Where applications have made clear reference to the Local Priorities identified by the Local Partnership, this is identified in the first table at Appendix 1. Applications that make a partial or no reference to Erskine, Inchinnan, Bishopton and Langbank Local Priorities are summarised in the second table for example, the project may involve intergenerational working (and therefore meet the Local Priority around intergenerational working) but not deliver this directly in the Local Partnership area or make reference to how many people from the area would be engaged in the project.

3.6 The priorities of the Erskine, Inchinnan, Bishopton and Langbank Local Partnership are:

# **Health and Wellbeing**

The Local Partnership want to make sure people are aware of and can access health services, to support both physical and mental health. This includes community-led health services too. The Partnership also think tackling social isolation is key to improving health across the area.

# Connectivity

The Local Partnership want to see places across Erskine, Inchinnan, Bishopton and Langbank better connected to each other and to the wider area. They want to see provision of good quality public transport, but also safe, clean and green routes for walking and cycling.

# **Community Identity**

The Local Partnership want to support the individual identity and history of each town and village. A key part of this should be local events which celebrate this identity and better communication of what's on across the area to support this.

# **Planning and Environment**

The Local Partnership want to be involved in, and influence, planning decisions, and are particularly interested in land ownership and use. The Partnership see this as key to supporting a clean and green area, which also includes street cleanliness issues at a local level, but also wider green issues such as low carbon.

# **Community Empowerment**

The Local Partnership want communities to be involved in, and influencing, decision making about the area. This includes making sure communities are well informed about local issues and looking at ways to get people involved such as participatory budgeting.

# **Key Theme – Intergenerational Work**

The Local Partnership is particularly interested in building relationships between younger and older communities across the area and exploring how intergenerational work might support their Local Priorities.

#### 5. Description Of Project

6.

The purpose of the project is to raise awareness of recycling and create a sustainable environment. The project entails a group of service users working a tutor to repurpose and recreate new items from old so that items do not end up in landfill. The tutor has been briefed in regard to the ethos of the service and that the end products must be usable.

The project will raise awareness of waste and what can be done to re-use discarded items.

The group will be for a maximum of 8 people who have an interest in sustainability, working alongside an art tutor. The project will run from 3 February 2020 to 30 March 2021.

The project will produce items of art work that can be displayed at an art event in May 2020 with approximately 150 people in attendance. The work completed will educate people regarding material that can be saved and repurposed rather than wasted, to make the environment better.

# 7. Who Benefits From The Project?

Greensyde Carers benefits vulnerable adults. The group undertaking the project will be a maximum of 8 people.

#### 8. Fit With Local Partnership Priorities

The projects helps support the theme of Planning and environment of Our Towns. The project was identified through previous community clean ups.

The idea of the project came from service users in Milldale Day Opportunities who take great pride in their surroundings. Local people have taken note of the work undertaken and this project is a natural development of what the group is trying to do. To change attitudes and make a positive impact on the local environment.

# 10. About The Organisation

Greensyde Carers is a charity that was established in 1996. There are 10 volunteers and 200 members.

The aims of the Group are to advance the education of and promote the welfare of people with learning difficulties and of their carers in Renfrewshire. The group provides and assists in the provision of facilities in the interests of social welfare, for recreation and other leisure time occupation to improve the quality of life of people with learning difficulties and their carers.

#### 11. Grant Funding Award History

Grant funding from Renfrewshire Council has been received in the last three years for the following:

2019/20 - £500 Education and Leisure Grant for arts and crafts material and tuition. Also £500 Section 10 Social Work grant for music and dance therapy.

2018/19 - £200 Education and Leisure Grant for arts and crafts material and tuition. Local Area Committee grant of £287.99 for an underwater camera.

2017/18 - £200 Education and Leisure Grant for arts and crafts material and tuition. £499 Section 10 grant for music and dance therapy. £1000 Local Area Committee grant for garden furniture.

#### 5. Description Of Project

To provide part funding of ice hire, permitting on ice activities for young persons to take place at Braehead Arena, the only facility available within a 30mile radius of Paisley. Seek assistance to meet approximately 8% of that total cost within a ring fence for ice costs. All other expenditure will be met from within its own resources.

NB Renfrewshire Council approved a motion to assist the club in developing an ice facility within the Paisley area, allowing all ice user clubs to thrive, which would preclude the need to apply for grant assistance (Braehead Arena - the most expensive facility in Scotland)

Encourage more people to watch/play ice hockey to promote healthier lifestyles

#### **Update**

Following the postponement of the Spring round of Partnership meetings to allocate funds, the club took advice from agencies such as Engage Renfrewshire and Renfrewshire Council to apply to alternative sources for stop gap funding during the COVID 19 pandemic. However, the club was advised by agencies such as Resilience Funding, following completion of the subsequent application, that the club did not meet the criteria for support, while others such as the Glasgow Airport Flightpath Fund that they had similarly postponed consideration of applications, such as that which we had submitted, until a later date, meaning that the club had effectively been cut off from means of temporary support during the pandemic.

Similarly, our participation in fund raising ventures such as local Gala Days were cut off as these were cancelled.

The sport's governing body has temporarily put back the season's opening until October but while this is helpful in reducing outgoings for e.g. training facilities for the moment we have as yet been unable to purchase essential items such as new strips until we are able to forecast how much money we will have.

Therefore, while the club, in appreciation of the similar circumstances facing other organisations, is not increasing the sum requested from the local Partnership(s), the sum requested has taken on an acute nature as any monies allocated will have to stretch somewhat further.

# 7. Fit With Local Partnership Priorities Health & Wellbeing

The club made front page headlines locally in recent times by being the first to discontinue the award of a case of beer to the Man of the Match in favour of giving a case of healthy drinks to replace lost body fluids.

The club paid a visit to local primary school, Bishopton, to promote ice hockey through fitness, healthy diet and a need to look after oneself to play sport and be successful. Timbers (Pirates mascot) also attended to entertain the kids. We are currently looking at how we can further increase these visits within this Local Partnership.

The club also has a long running relationship with Pro Life Fitness Centre and through their business relations, have been able to offer discounted membership rates to fans of the club, promoting a healthier lifestyle to many.

#### **Connectivity/Community Empowerment**

Bus links to and from the locale to Braehead are adequate and supporters for links with fans from other localities.

The Paisley Pirates registered office address is in Erskine, where the administration of the club takes place. The club's Head Coach and team captain live within the local partnership area, as do the management committee and other volunteers. The club is run entirely by a voluntary management committee, assisted by volunteers.

As well as weekly features in the Paisley Express during the season, we have our own website, Facebook with 2436 Followers and 2415 Likes, Twitter 2303 Followers, Instagram 618 Followers and various other digital outlets within Renfrewshire such as What's On Renfrewshire etc

### **Community Identity**

The club regularly seeks opportunities to be involved in working with other local groups, and in 2013, Head Coach Ian Turley, and many of the players were invited along to help reopen Lamont City Farm, following a period of refurbishment and repair. This relationship has previously been extended with bucket collections taking place at home fixtures to support the local group.

The Pirates have supported Erskine Hospital with collections during games on Poppy Day.

The Head coach of the Pirates, who also resides in Erskine & has done all his life, has been selected as Great Britain's U16 assistant coach, after having shown particular excellence as a Scotland U17 Coach for 2 years.

This season has seen new supporters come from the new Dargavel Village, which we hope to build on. It is intended to organise a leaflet drop within the Partnership area, with particular emphasis on the new Dargavel community, before the start of the season, introducing residents to a diverse sport.

# 5. Description Of Project

The Cornerstone in Bishopton is now widely used for community purposes both secular and non-secular. As a result of this, storage space for equipment used by community groups — in particular, The Bishopton Out of School Care (BOSC) has become a particular issue with regard to fire safety, with flammable materials sometimes encroaching onto a fire escape route. This project will provide additional fire safe storage within the premises which will allow the groups to continue to operate within the premises while meeting fire safety requirements.

#### 6. Who Benefits From The Project?

Community groups from Bishopton and surrounding areas and the people who access the groups – local people broadly.

#### 7. Fit With Local Partnership Priorities

Connectivity – Through cornerstone a range of groups and organisations from Bishopton, Erskine, Inchinnan and Langbank come together to use and share a facility thus increasing knowledge of what people are doing in other areas and builds relations between members of each community.

# 5. Description Of Project

The project will be delivered between June 2020 and March 2021 and will promote group activities to a wider community, encouraging people of all abilities to partake in physical activity by using walking as the main medium.

The project is to help promote the Walking Network through the printing of promotional brochures which can easily be identified by Walkers. These brochures will be placed in facilities such as libraries, Community Centres, Doctor's surgeries and health professionals to pass to clients throughout Renfrewshire.

# 6. Who Benefits From The Project?

Although mainly an elderly group, the services are now being sought out by numerous social work services who refer clients who are isolated in the local community.

The group also caters for higher risk groups referred on from the local exercise referral agencies including the cardiac rehab trainers, mental health, dietician and diabetic clinics. The main focus for repeat referral of clients is not always walking, rather it is the social aspect of being part of the Group.

The project fits with the Health and Wellbeing theme by using community spaces for events that are safe and affordable.

#### 5. Description Of Project

The project will start in September 2020 and end on 31 August 2021.

Events will encourage participation in physical activities and inform on local and world events such as foodbanks and Fair Trade. Events and activities will attract new members, retain existing members and act as a diversion from antisocial behaviour.

The activities promote being active, healthier, safer and stronger and are based around developing young people to be the best they can be in teamwork, mentally, physically and encouraging their concern for others.

23 events held throughout the age range (Primary 1 to 18 years) involving sports, physical activities, arts and crafts, swimming and fun days. Around 800 Boys Brigade members are expected to participate.

### 6. Who Benefits From The Project?

The battalion has members across Renfrewshire, including 99 in Johnstone and Linwood. The age range of the battalion is from Primary 1 to 18 years.

It is hoped that the events will be a positive influence and will prepare our young people for, and sustain them through, life.

The group is free and has been running every month since June 2018. This project increase the capacity of the group to accommodate more parents and their twins, as there is currently a waiting list for the group.

Double The Fun! was an initiative proposed by one of the mums supported who spoke of the stigma, isolation and lack of support being felt by parents of twins in Renfrewshire. This was after the loss of a Lochwinnoch Twins Group, which meant the closes group was now in East Kilbride. Other groups are usually created with 1:1 child parent ratios in mind. With the unusually large number of twins in Renfrewshire we opened up the group to the public and it has been hugely popular since.

The current project has been hugely popular with an average of 5-7 parents and 10-14 children attending the groups from across Renfrewshire.

Renfrewshire Connected Champions Project will take place between 21th May 2020 and 27th March 2021.

The Connectedness Champions Project will raise awareness of social isolation and how to build connections in the community. Because loneliness is so personal, it's often seen as a private feeling, but we have learned that it is something that can be addressed.

Between October 2017 and March 2018 ACUMEN and RAMH carried out research on social connectedness within Renfrewshire. The highest loneliness scores came from those who identified mental health problems as being a barrier to social connectedness.

The research identified the importance of providing information on local services, including formal and informal peer support to build people's confidence in accessing services. The report went on to note that one of the key aspirations for individuals was to form relationships which were epitomised by 'greater intimacy' (more meaningful). This led to the creation of Renfrewshire Connectedness Champions Project.

It's clear that loneliness affects children, young people and families in Scotland. In the past loneliness was sometimes seen as a problem for older people

Within the identified Local Partnerships, we will deliver Generations Working Together Workshops

with pupils, this allows them to discuss issues affecting them and take part in specialist-run workshops it is extremely important for young people to feel they have a voice and are included and empowered to look at social isolation the perceived stigma around loneliness and promote

the concept of a supportive, non-judgemental community.

RCCP will deliver the same themed workshops working with teachers.

If we are to begin to tackle the issue of loneliness in children, young people and families in the community, then there is a role for each and every one of us.

We want pupils to speak about their feelings, to feel they have a voice and are included and empowered to look at social isolation the perceived stigma around loneliness and promote the concept of a supportive, non-judgemental community.

#### 5. Description Of Project

The project will take place between August 2020 and December 2020.

The project seeks to find artefacts and evidence of our early occupation of this area, and how it developed over a wider part of Renfrewshire. It will do this lead by a professional archaeologist, assisted by unpaid community volunteers of all ages, and schoolchildren, all working together. Thus intergenerational. Some of these schoolchildren will come from Cross-reach Erskine Campus, as well as Kibble in Paisley, and Help the Heroes, thus aiding mental health in the wider community.

The project will dig a number of trenches. Two within the All Hallows church "footprint" but going much deeper than previously. The 2017 dig found artefacts back to the mid 1500's, but the site has a history going back to 600AD. It is artefacts and evidence form this period which are being sought. Other trenches will be dug over known foundations of demolished buildings like the manse, Ferrycroft, and Ladyacre looking for dating evidence to tie them to Roy's map of circa 1758. All trenches will be dug by the community volunteers and other participants, overseen by the professional archaeologist.

Schoolchildren will have the opportunity to participate in Archaeology Scotland's Hero award programme. On the 2017 project 388 awards were made, and it is hoped this participation level will be repeated.

The Project anticipates the following outcomes:

- A potential life enhancing experience for everyone participating. For some of the older school children (main stream and non-main stream) it could be life changing, with regards to career choice.
- A digital record of this project will be produced, and added to that already available of earlier projects on the IHIG website: www.myinchinnan.org.uk
- Booklets will be produced describing what was done, and what the artefacts found, tell us about the site, and the wider community.
- Schoolchildren will have participated in the Heritage Heroes and the Archaeology Skills

Passport scheme operated by Archaeology Scotland.

• The site is adjacent to the new cycleway from Inchinnan bridge to the business park, which lends itself to potentially being a catalyst to expanding tourism into the area.

# 6. Who Benefits From The Project?

Local community, residents and schoolchildren will benefit from this project as it will provide an opportunity for community members and schoolchildren (main stream and non-main stream) to gain experience in working with professional archaeologist and participate in a live archaeological dig. Community will also benefit from knowledge gained about their local area from the dig as the additions of new information will be available on the website, containing formal reports and booklet of the project.

We would also like to ensure that the members of the local partnership are able to read and interpret plans for future meetings so that the best possible changes are made to any renovation or new build in the community ensuring all the current buildings and venues are used to their full potential.

The need for the project has been established by the concerns of the Local Area Partnership and we will assist in any way we can to ensure safe travel for everyone. We will assist with sourcing accessible play equipment for all children and auditing the parks, pavements and roads for any repairs. We also provide work experience for children from mainstream and additional needs schools as well as adults returning to work by providing volunteering opportunities for them. We have also identified that a lot of the disabled community have little or no access to technology which we can provide training for and we will provide this training for any member of the community.

We will provide access audits/surveys to ensure spaces are safe and meet the requirements for accessibility ensuring they are safe to walk/wheel on by working with Renfrewshire Council to ensure roads and pavements are repaired. We will also provide advice on the best accessible play equipment for unused green spaces to ensure disabled children can play safely and interact with other children. We will provide training and work experience for both children and adults on technology along other training courses we provide and offer volunteering opportunities for anyone in the community. We will continue to work with transport providers to ensure the best possible service can be obtained.

We would also like to offer training to the Local Area Partnership on reading and interpreting plans to ensure everyone is fully aware of the process and implications.

We were the first City Farm in Scotland and the farm is very popular with families, nurseries and disabled groups as well as local schools. Around 10,000 people visit Lamont Farm annually. We aim to educate people from all walks of life in animal care, welfare and husbandry.

The project educates and provides hands on animal care and welfare facilities to the local community and surrounding areas. Lamont Farm offers a wide variety of services to various groups and organisations within the local area and further afield, work experience placements are provided to jobcentres, high schools, community service, kibble project and many more.

The farm provides hands on experience for over 40 children who wish to pursue a career in animal care and veterinary practice, educational workshops are ran throughout the year for primary schools, nurseries and visitors.

The farm has many social connections to help promote mental health, wellbeing and to help lessen isolation. Animals are a great source of therapy and have a great ability to bring many different people together some people prefer being round the animals as a gentle way of reintroducing them into the community. Some of the connections we have are RAMH, spark of genius, community service, West college Scotland's adults with addition needs and kibble we believe everyone should have the chance to be involved in their community. These connections help provide placements for anyone suffering mental health issues, physical disabilities, someone who has been out of the community, anyone who is looking to get back into work or anyone who just wants to volunteer, it's a placement where everyone is included in every aspect of the farm with no judgement. We offer work experience placements to many different high schools throughout Renfrewshire and beyond including Gleniffer high school, the placements are invaluable to pupils wishing to pursue a career in the animal sector as not many places allow

under 16's to work so closely with such a variety of animals, in recent years our volunteers

have went on to become fully qualified veterinary nurses. We have a working partnership with Glenburn based group - helping those in need we collect and distribute many items for the group helping out with people who are in need in the community. We are on an active bus route with buses coming from many different areas which helps make it easy to visit from many parts of Renfrewshire and the surrounding areas.

The farm runs regular education and fun workshops to bring the community together to learn different aspects of animal care, our parent and toddler workshops are hugely popular bringing parent and toddlers from many areas Foxbar included. These workshops offer great fun for all participants as there are no other parent and toddler events which involve animals. We have great connections with the local and beyond nurseries and childminding groups providing them with workshops and tour and handling session where the children have great fun with the animals.

We have a small secure play area based within the farm which is decorated by colourful cartoon animals which is hugely popular, and many happy hours are spent by children and parents. We also now have the only animal facility in the local area, with the recent closure of both Barshaw Park Pet's Corner and Robertson Park Pet's corner (fortunately we were able to offer a new home to several animals from both facilities), therefore are finding that we have even more young visitors from the local partnerships attending the farm in the hope of seeing some familiar furry friends.

The farm has supplied manure to many of the local and surrounding community allotments courtesy of the community service team, we share regular information to anyone looking to have a small plot and happy to pass the details on for the area they live in.

The grant will help towards running costs to ensure the project can continue to provide a variety of services and continue to work with a number of local educational establishments within the community.

To ensure the survival of the Sea Cadets and the hall. This pilot scheme established that Issues behind initial referrals have been due to, social isolation, bullying, social anxiety, bereavement, anger-management and social anxiety specifically due to a diagnosis of Autism. The pilot was funded by "Go for It" which established the need for this type of counselling.

The Wynd centre has been running a nationally recognised Counselling service since The Centre was established in 1984 and there is already bespoke premises for this purpose. Additional funding is required to modify the premises and purchase equipment for this specific age group and engage part time staff responsible to the Counselling Manager. This area of activity will complete the total range of counselling services provided by nationally qualified Counsellors.

Anticipated outcomes are to improve the Strength and Difficulties Scores (SDQs) and to increase the available spaces in order to reduce the current waiting list.

#### 5. Description Of Project

The project will take place between 4<sup>th</sup> May 2020 and 19<sup>th</sup> March 2021 (46 weeks).

The purpose of this project is to open up our Makerspace to adult community groups across Renfrewshire. We are the only Digital Makerspace in the West of Scotland and we believe that everyone should be able to access digital technology and have an opportunity to learn new skills.

We have previously hosted digital activity sessions with Roar (Men's Shed) and their feedback was very positive.

We also gained positive feedback from when we hosted our 'Tea & Tablets' group - this was an intergenerational project where older adults came along to a group to receive advice and tutoring on how to use their smart phones and tablets in ways that would enhance their lives e.g. YouTube videos, skype, facetime, online shopping.

Due to this positive feedback and many requests were receive asking if adults can use the Makerspace, we developed this project.

We will host adult community groups from across Renfrewshire one afternoon per week.

We will connect with Community Groups and let them know about what activities we can offer and what types of workshops we can facilitate with their members. We will do this by promoting the project on social media and via our third sector interface (Engage Renfrewshire) and we can also go along to speak to the groups.

We can offer the following activities 3D Printing Workshop, Laser Design and Cutting, Digital Animation, Coding, Music Technology, T-shirt Design and Printing, Digital Media.

We will also be happy to work with groups to create tailor made workshops to suit their requirements/interests.

# 6. Who Benefits From The Project?

Local community groups across Renfrewshire and its members will benefit from the project because it is anticipated that adults and older adults within the community will Learn new skills, Create something using digital technology, Make new connections/friendships, Have improved mental health and wellbeing, Increase confidence, Find a new hobby/passion/interest, feel included and listened to ( person centred workshops) through this project.

#### 7. Fit With Local Partnership Priorities

The project does not have a direct fit with the Erskine, Inchinnan, Bishopton and Langbank local priorities.

#### 8. Breakdown of Costs

The total cost of the project is £30,980. The group is applying for £5,980 from Local Partnership General Grant Fund. Paisley Y.M.C.A applied to Paisley East, The Villages, Johnstone & Linwood and Erskine, Inchinnan, Bishopton & Langbank Local Partnerships.

**4. Amount Applied For** £570 from Riverside Local Partnership.

The group has applied for funding to all 7 Local Partnerships. They are applying for £3,985 in total across 7 Local Partnerships with £570 from each.

# 5. Description Of Project

We are the only agility club within Renfrewshire that has permit to host kennel club shows and thus represent the West of Scotland within the greater dog agility community. The Kennel Club have introduced new standards for agility equipment to benefit canine health and safety. It is essential that we have equipment that meets these standards to host kennel club shows, maintain a safe training environment and provide affordable training to current and prospective members.

Last year, the Kennel club announced a new standard for several pieces of equipment to be introduced this year and next year, including jumps and the dog walk. For the health and wellbeing of the dogs, heights for the jumps and dog walk have been lowered. We require new equipment to meet these standards while keeping our fees affordable.

New equipment will allow us to host Kennel Club shows and train more safely. We will obtain quotes from agility suppliers for equipment that meets the new Kennel Club regulations. In addition, we will recruit local trade people to adjust our current equipment, thereby helping to keep our fees affordable and supporting local business.

An anticipated outcome for the project is that we can hold Kennel Club shows in September, thereby representing Renfrewshire within the greater dog agility community.

# 6. Who Benefits From The Project?

The project will benefit dog agility community in Renfrewshire & Greater Glasgow.

# 7. Fit With Local Partnership Priorities

The project does not fit with the local priorities of the Erskine, Inchinnan, Bishopton and Langbank Local Partnership.

# Local Partnership Grant Funding

A guide to the grant funding available from Local Partnerships and how to apply



Local Partnerships are a way for communities, elected members and public organisations to work together at a local level.

There are seven Local Partnerships in Renfrewshire, and they replaced Local Area Committees in 2018.

Each Local Partnership has agreed a set of Local Priorities, and each Partnership has grant funding they can allocate to support these priorities.

The aims of Local Partnerships are to:

- Make connections and networks between community groups and the wider community
- Identify, set and share local community priorities
- Listen to, consult and represent local communities
- Distribute grants to support local priorities

# Grants available from Local Partnerships

The Local Partnerships consider applications and award grant funding that reflects their local priorities. The Local Partnerships look after grant funding streams that were previously overseen by Local Area Committees:

- the General Grant Fund;
- two Common Good Funds (Paisley Common Good and Renfrew Common Good); and
- the Youth Challenge Fund

It is strongly advised that organisations read this guidance before writing and submitting their applications.

You will find further information about each of these three funding streams and how to apply for them over the next few pages.

The most important thing to remember when applying for grant funding is to make sure you can contribute to at least one of the local priorities for the area you are applying to. It will be important to take time to find out about these priorities before applying. They are available <a href="here">here</a>.

# **The Application Process**

Read the Local Partnership Grant Funding Guidance and the Priorities for the Local Partnership area you are applying to.

Attend a drop in session if you would like to discuss the priorities, application process or alternative funding opportunities.

Fill in application, ensuring you address the relevant local priorities and submit to rcgrantapplications@renfrewshire.gov.uk, together with the relevant bank statement, accounts and constitution. The deadline for applications is 9th March 2020

Your application will be considered by the Local Partnership in April or May. Local Partnership meetings are public, so you are welcome to come along to the April or May meetings. You will not be required to attend, or expected to speak at the meeting.

Following the meeting, you will be informed whether your application was successful or not. If you are successful, you will be asked to agree the conditions of grant and payment arrangements will be made.

# The Application Form

The standard Voluntary and Community Organisations Grant Application Form is used to apply for Local Partnership funding. The form is available <a href="here">here</a> (under related documents) or please contact the Community Planning team on 0141 6184168 if you would like a paper copy sent to you.

The form has guidance notes in the right-hand column to help you with what information to put in each box. The notes below provide further information about how to make the best use of the application.

#### Section 1

This section is for you to tell us about your organisation and what you do. In section 1.13 you are asked about which Local Partnership area you are applying to and where your project will be operating. In section 1.13a you should tick the Local Partnership area you are applying for funding in. In 1.13b you should write which Local Partnership area(s) the project you are applying for will operate in. All applications will be treated as an individual application by each Local Partnership. In this way, your activity needs to be viable as a project in each Local Partnership area it is applying to. If you are applying for funding from more than one Local Partnership area, you will either need to make sure your one application covers at least one priority from each of the Local Partnership areas applied to, or submit separate applications tailored to the priorities of each Local Partnership area applied to. If you are submitting one application to cover more than one Local Partnership area, you will need to make it clear how much funding is being asked for from each Local Partnership. This is covered in section 2.

#### Section 2

This section is an opportunity to tell us about the project you would like funding for. It is very important that you use this section to explain how you will address the priorities identified by your Local Partnership. These sections will be made public through the summary reports at the Local Partnership meetings. You should provide a good description of your project in this section highlighting clearly which priorities it will address. This is information that the Local Partnership Meeting will use to decide on your application. If you are using one application to apply to more than one Local Partnership, you need to write the name of the Local Partnership applied to next to the amount requested from that Local Partnership in section 2.10.

#### Section 3

This section is to make sure that you have included all the necessary supporting paperwork. Your application cannot be considered until you submit all of the correct paperwork.

#### Section 4

If you are filling in a paper copy of the form to post, you can sign this section of the form. If you are doing the form online, a signature can be taken at a later date.

# **General Grant Fund**

The General Grant Fund provides grants of up to £10,000. The grants are open to constituted local community, voluntary organisations and Community Planning Partners. The fund is intended to develop local activities and projects within Local Partnership areas. The total amount of General Grant funding available is slightly different in each of the seven Local Partnership areas, because funding is allocated to Local Partnerships based on their population. Activities are expected to reflect the different priorities and needs in each of the seven areas.

# **Eligibility Criteria**

# Who can and cannot apply?

- Any community or voluntary organisation with a constitution and a bank account can apply. Any organisation applying should be accountable to its members.
- Community Planning Partners can submit applications for funding, but Council services cannot. Community Planning partners should not submit applications for projects that are regarded as core functions.
- If your application is for an individual, it will not be considered.
- Your application should contribute towards at least one of the Local Partnership's
  key priorities. These were established by Partnerships at their March 2019 meetings
  and have been developed further since. Projects should be able to demonstrate real
  benefit to the local area by improving or complementing existing service provision.
- Organisations that work across Renfrewshire, or in a number of Local Partnership areas, can apply, but only for projects or activities which support an area's priorities, and are delivered in that area specifically.
- You cannot apply for costs of activities that have already happened.
- You cannot apply for your total running costs. You can apply to part fund running costs though.
- The General Grant Fund will very occasionally support applications to fund activities such as day trips and lunches, but only when they provide an additional community benefit (for example tackling loneliness and isolation).
- The General Grant Fund will not support projects that exist mainly to further religious or political beliefs.

- Your application must encourage equality of opportunity.
- You cannot apply to fund either a trip abroad or hospitality to other organisations.
- If you receive a grant from the General Grant Fund, it must usually be spent within this financial year.
- General Grant Fund awards are one-off and are not intended to provide ongoing funding for the same or similar activities on an annual basis.
- If you are successful in your application, you must accept and comply with the grant conditions. It is also expected that you report back on the impact the project has had once the funds are spent.
- You should plan how you will sustain your organisation, once funding from the General Grant Fund has been used.
- You cannot use the funding for events to raise funds for other charities
- You cannot use the funding to cover your Community Councils' running costs above those funded by its administration grant from the Council.
- You should provide evidence of partnership working, where applicable.

#### What types of activities or projects can and cannot be funded?

Activities or projects must contribute to at least one of the key priorities identified by the Local Partnership. The fund can support a variety of projects and activities. This can include supporting people back into employment; supporting young people; supporting community safety activity; supporting healthier lifestyles; tackling poverty in disadvantaged areas; and promoting equality within local areas.

These types of activities can cover an array of different projects. Examples include:

- Refurbishment of community facilities such as decorating or improving the layout of a room for community use.
- Enhancing or creating community gardens for recreational areas.
- Community events such as gala days.
- Projects that raise awareness of healthy eating and help people change eating habits.
- Projects that promote positive mental health issues.
- After school clubs that encourage development e.g. homework clubs,
- Leadership and team working skills for group members.

# **Common Good Funds**

Common Good is funding generated from an investment portfolio where the annual income is used to support local projects. There are Common Good funds in both Renfrew and Paisley, which are distributed through the Local Partnership. In Paisley, the fund is split across the three Local Partnerships, based on the population of each area.

The general eligibility criteria for the common good funds are the same as for the General Grant Fund, although there is no specific maximum award. The main difference is that the Common Good Funds are charities and so any projects funded through the common good funds must meet their charitable objectives (the advancement of civic responsibility or community development) to benefit people in Renfrew or Paisley.

# Former Youth Challenge Fund

The Youth Challenge Fund was allocated using participatory budgeting for the first time in 2019/20 and became known as "Celebrating Renfrewshire – By Young People, For Young People." This was the first year that young people decided directly which youth projects should be funded. It is expected that this fund will be allocated in the same way this year. This funding round will be launched separately.

# **Further Information**

Drop in sessions will be held across the Local Partnership areas. These are not specifically to address any funding concerns, but may be useful if you would like to find out more about local priorities and give your input on Local Partnerships more generally.

# **Frequently Asked Questions**

# How will funding award decisions be made?

The members of the Local Partnership in each area will make a decision on each funding application, guided by an assessment of whether the application has met the local priorities. Remember to base your application on the local priorities of the Partnership area you are applying to. Priorities are linked <a href="here">here</a>

# How do I apply?

Fill in a standard grant application form on the Renfrewshire Council web site. You can do this electronically and email it in or send in a completed paper copy. You should make sure you have understood what the local priorities are for the area you are applying to before completing your application.

# When is the deadline for applications?

The deadline will be 9<sup>th</sup> March 2020 for consideration at the April/ May meetings.

# What happens to my application after it is submitted?

Your application and documents will be checked and then stored on the Council system. A summary of your application will be prepared to include in the papers for the relevant Local Partnership meeting. If there are any queries or clarifications needed about your application, you will be contacted before the Local Partnership papers are prepared.

#### When will I hear back?

You will hear back after the meeting of the Local Partnership has made a decision. The decisions will be made during the April/ May 2020 cycle of meetings. Local Partnership meetings are public, so you are welcome to come along to the meetings. You will not be required to attend or expected to speak at the meeting.

#### How much money can I apply for?

You can apply for a maximum of £10,000 from the General Grant Fund. If you are applying for Common Good funding, there is not specific maximum limit – but remember Common Good funding is only available in Paisley and Renfrew.

#### Who can apply?

Any community or voluntary organisation with a constitution and a bank account can apply. Any organisation applying should be accountable to its members. Council services will not be able to apply for funding. The wider community planning partners will be able to apply, if their project aligns with local priorities.

# Can I apply to fund Christmas lights?

Unfortunately, Renfrewshire Council has very limited capacity for any further installation, storage and maintenance of Christmas lighting. If you wish to submit an application which

would require additional Council resources, you should discuss this with Council officers prior to submitting your application.

# We work across Renfrewshire, can we apply?

You can apply to one or more Local Partnership. The project you are applying for, must be for the benefit of people who live in that area and the project must align with the local priorities for that area. You should focus on the areas where your project aligns most with the local priorities. You could also think about where your project is based or where most of the people using or otherwise involved in the project will be based. It might align with more than one Local Partnership area. If you do want to apply to more than one Local Partnership area, you will need to either submit separate applications or make it very clear which information applies to which Local Partnership.

# What is happening to 'multi LAC' applications?

All applications will be treated as an individual application by each Local Partnership. In this way, your activity needs to be viable as a project in each Local Partnership area it is applying to. If you are applying for funding from more than one Local Partnership area, you will either need to make sure your one application covers at least one priority from each of the Local Partnership areas applied to, or submit separate applications tailored to the priorities of each Local Partnership area applied to. If you are submitting one application to cover more than one Local Partnership area, you will need to make it clear:

- How your project will specifically benefit people in each Local Partnership area applied to, and
- how much funding is being asked for from each Local Partnership.

#### Is it the same process as the old LAC funding applications?

There are some differences. Local Partnership grant applications must be based on the priorities for that Local Partnership area. The Youth Challenge fund decisions will be made by local young people and so follow a different process to take place later in the year.

# Is the total amount of funding the same as the old LAC funding?

Yes, the total amount of funding is the same. It is still based on the population of each area, but now split between the seven Local Partnerships, rather than the five former LACs.

# What happens if money is not allocated by the end of the financial year?

Where all available grant funding within a financial year is not fully committed, the balance can be carried forward only where a specific project for the forthcoming financial year has been identified and approved by the Local Partnership. This gives the Local Partnership the flexibility to set aside a proportion of its current year grant for use on a specific project the following year.

It is not intended that this year-end flexibility would be applied to carry forward a general underspend of available grant for which no specific purpose has been identified or approved.

# What happens if organisations that are members of Local Partnerships apply for funding?

Organisations that are members of a Local Partnership can still apply to that Local Partnership, but they will not be allowed to speak to the application at the decision meeting and will not be allowed to vote on their own application.

# If I am unsuccessful, where can I find other sources of funding?
