1 Minute of Previous Meeting

There was submitted the Minute of the meeting of Paisley East Local Partnership held on 29 September 2020.

DECIDED: That the Minute be approved.

2 Membership

The Clerk advised since the previous meeting of the local partnership there had been amendments to the representation of various partner and community groups at meetings. In this connection the Clerk indicated that Police Scotland would be represented by L Hamill, Renfrewshire Health & Social Care by F Burns, Ralston Community Council by F McCauley and ROAR Connections For Life by C Forbes.

<u>**DECIDED**</u>: That the changes to representation be noted and that the new representatives be welcomed.

3 Budget Monitoring Report

There was submitted a report by the Chief Executive relative to the Paisley East Local Partnership Budget Monitoring Report.

The report advised that local community groups had been invited to submit applications for funding to undertake projects which reflected the Local Partnership's priorities of Exploring the impact of new housing developments, supporting social connections and Community pride and safety. This funding was allocated from the General Grant Fund and, through the Participating Budgeting exercise, Celebrating Renfrewshire, the Youth Challenge Fund.

A table setting out the funds allocated by the Local Partnership at its meeting on 29 September 2020 was attached as an appendix to the report. The outcome of the Celebrating Renfrewshire exercise for the Paisley East Local Partnership area was also attached.

The report indicated that the Celebrating Renfrewshire exercise had been carried out in a virtual format in 2020, as a result of the Covid-19 pandemic. The project was coproduced by young people, supported by Renfrewshire Youth Voice, Renfrewshire Council, Active Schools and Young Scot with voting taking place between 12 October

and 6 November 2020. The award announcement had been made at an online event. A total of 246 young people from the Paisley East area had voted, casting three votes each for different projects, resulting in 738 votes in total. 13 projects were funded to a value of £24, 095.

<u>**DECIDED**</u>: That the budget monitoring report and allocation of Celebrating Renfrewshire funding be noted.

4 Covid-19: Impact on Communities

There was submitted a presentation by the Partnership Manager on the impact of COVID-19 on local communities.

The presentation updated members on the Community Impact Assessment work done to date; shared data from the Public Services Panel relevant to the Paisley East Local Partnership; and outlined the Social Renewal Plan.

The presentation highlighted the key points arising from data and research undertaken in relation to Covid-19 cases; employment and support for business; neighbourhood hubs; the distribution of digital devices/connectivity which had been distributed in Renfrewshire through the Connected Scotland programme; health and wellbeing; and the results on a Public Service Panel consultation on the effects of the pandemic, and highlighted the major concerns recorded. The presentation also detailed responses on how households were managing financially now compared to pre-pandemic; and compared the responses from the Paisley East local partnership area to others within Renfrewshire. Details were provided in respect of a programme of listening events held during winter 2020/21 which had been facilitated by Engage Renfrewshire. The Convener welcomed T McTernan to the meeting and indicated that it would be appropriate for the local partnership to view a video entitled "Darkwood Crew Covid Response", which highlighted the ethos and activities of the group.

A full discussion followed in connection with the impacts of Covid-19 in the local community. The Local Partnership was of the opinion that these impacts had influenced the local priorities previously identified by the Partnership and agreed that the local priorities previously identified by the local partnership be revised by the addition of a priority in relation to tackling food poverty with associated reduction in food waste and sustainable use of resources as key elements.

DECIDED:

- (a) That the presentation be noted;
- (b) That the local priorities previously identified by the local partnership be revised by the addition of a priority in relation to tackling food poverty with associated reduction in food waste and sustainable use of resources as key elements; and

Paisley East Local Partnership Budget Monitoring Report and 20/21 Funding Application Feedback

1. Summary

- 1.1 Paisley East Local Partnership provides funding to community groups to undertake projects. This funding is allocated from the General Grant Fund and, through a Participating Budgeting exercise known as Celebrating Renfrewshire, the Youth Challenge Fund.
- 1.2 A table setting out the funds allocated by Paisley East Local Partnership in 2020/21 and current budget position is attached as an appendix to this report.
- 1.3 Feedback from projects receiving funding in 20/21 on the outcome of projects is also attached. Due to the impact of Covid 19 on the ability of groups to successfully deliver projects, some groups have returned funding to the Local Partnership. In recognition of this situation it has been agreed that Local Partnership underspends in 2020/21 will be carried forward and added to the budget for 2021/22. For 2021/22, the normal arrangements will apply, requiring all funding to be spent by the end of the financial year with no provision for carry over to the following year.

2. Recommendation

2.1 It is recommended that the budget monitoring report and feedback from recipients of funding in 2020/21 be noted.

3. Feedback From 2020/21 Grant Recipients

3.1 Feedback on the use of Paisley East Local Partnership funding allocated in 2020/21 was received from eighteen organisations as follows:

1. I Am Me Scotland

We requested funding to create Easy Read resources for Keep Safe to help make the initiative more accessible for people with learning disabilities and developed a Keep Safe Easy Read Animation. 504 participants benefited. These online workshops boosted creative learning, transferrable skills, problem solving and creativity. They also offered information on how to access other advanced learning opportunities and further training. The workshops helped with social connections at a time of lockdown and also boosted young learners' art portfolio development at time when formal learning and examinations were disrupted.

2. Paisley and District Boys Brigade Battalion Administration.

The Boys Brigade received funding from Paisley East and other Local Partnerships to run events and for Battalion Headquarters running costs. Funding enabled staff to maintain the Headquarters building and prepare it to be ready to open and function fully once lockdown restrictions eased.

3. Meikleriggs Cricket Foundation

Our project sought funding to enable cricket coaching to be available to the community. The funding enabled us to provide a qualified cricket coach, when COVID restrictions allowed. Sessions encouraged people of all ages and abilities to take part outdoors in an activity which enhanced their physical and mental health and wellbeing.

We reached a total of 100 people - mainly for the Paisley partnerships. The community were able to attend structured and covid friendly sessions to take part in physical activity. This was vital at a time when gyms etc were closed.

4.Lamont Farm

Funding from Paisley East and other Local Partnerships enabled Lamont Farm to provide a service when able to open to the public during 2020 and to enable the public to visit animals safely in the fields when other services were unavailable. Projects were also carried out via the internet, for example Zoom sessions with local children. Animal handling for children under-12 was also delivered safely.

Lamont Farm was opened July-November 2020. Over 1,000 people attended in a single day in during July.

Even during periods when the farm could not fully open, access to the Farm's fields for the public has provided a way of reducing stress and depression.

5. Ferguslie Cricket Club

We sought funding to enable us to purchase a new cricket roller, which was purchased. All our junior and senior players will benefit circa 75 members. In addition, all visiting teams will also benefit. Better cricket pitches prepared for all our teams and visiting opposition. In addition better pitches will enhance our ability to host representative games thus attracting visitors to Paisley.

6.Active Communities

Funding was requested to organise the Jingle Bell Fun Run at Barshaw Park in Paisley. A great family day out a Barshaw Park with Fun Run, train rides and Christmas Fun.

We couldn't host the event at Barshaw Park due to Covid restrictions. We were able to hold a virtual Christmas Run with 104 competitors taking part in a virtual 5k. We also organised the Paisley Elf Trail with 120 participants. Families were given a treasure map of 12 local Paisley Businesses and organisations and had to find the Elf in shop windows.

All participants received a Christmas medal, the same as they would have if they had taken part in the event at Jingle Bell Run. 224 participants took part, 20 volunteers were involved in organising and 12 local business benefited from the event.

7. Royal British Legion Pipe Band

The award was requested to help fund the re-generation of Paisley and District pipe band by purchasing musical instruments, practice equipment and facilitating the inclusion of those in the community who may not otherwise be able to afford to get involved in a band or learn a traditional musical instrument.

The money was spent as intended, but some changes to our original ideas came about due to the Covid pandemic. The biggest change was that because we couldn't practice or give lessons in our hall in the usual way we had to set up an online Zoom lesson format which proved very successful and will hopefully soon seamlessly blend into our usual form of tuition. Musical instruments were sterilised before being delivered to anyone.

8. Friends of Barshaw Park

The award was requested to improve the amenities of the park, bring people in the community of all ages and backgrounds together to work together, learn new skills and welcome new residents to the area.

We bought bird houses, nesting boxes, bird feeders and and kits to build birdhouses and feeders. We printed information leaflets and charts.

We created a welcome pack which was delivered to new housing in the area. The pack contained a "Welcome to Barshaw Park" letter, and a wooden token, which we

invited recipients to decorate or write a message on, and hang from one of the laurel trees in the Walled Peace Garden in Barshaw Park.

We bought craft materials and created Easter Craft packs which were distributed to local children and community groups, and schools and invited them to create decorations to display in the Walled Peace Garden.

We had originally intended to deliver workshops in the Walled Peace Garden for local people and families to build birdboxes and learn about wild birds, and to deliver other craft workshops.

The pandemic meant that we could not deliver the sessions in person and in the park as we had intended, so we a system to deliver the projects at virtually.

Our work with the Mirin Group, an organisation for young adults who have learning difficulties, had to be put on hold as the group could not meet during the pandemic.

Paisley East: We reached over 100 households in Hawkhead with our Welcome Packs.

Paisley Abbey Scouts, and over 20 households in Hawkhead, Greenlaw, and Town Centre took part in the Birdwatch project

Paisley East: 20 Households in Paisley East took part in the birdwatch project. The Birdwatch project was extremely popular and we distributed over 200 kits and birdhouses to households in Paisley and wider Renfrewshire. Some families were issued with both ready made birdhouses and children's kits.

Our Welcome Packs invited residents to visit Barshaw Park to enjoy it's amenities and also to join and volunteer with Friends of Barshaw Park.

We have recruited several new volunteers of different ages and backgrounds to work in the Walled Garden, and more people have joined our committee and made connections with others in the community.

People have learned new skills and developed and shared their knowledge of gardening, and have a sense in achievement in seeing the Walled Peace Garden looking beautiful with a peaceful and welcoming atmosphere. Visitors to the garden have benefited from having a lovely garden to visit and relax in.

Families and children have learned about the wild birds which visit their gardens and open areas in their local area. They are learning more as birds build nests in the Friends of Barshaw Bird boxes, and feed in the gardens and surrounding areas.

9. Renfrewshire Christmas Toy Bank

The funding had been applied for in order to support our Christmas campaign, then to expand to operate all year. The funding allowed us to do this by paying for a year of storage as well as other items listed below.

We now run at Easter, Halloween and Christmas as well as supporting all year round with birthday gifts.

Teens are always hard to buy for so often we purchase gift cards. They have all been distributed.

The money was spent on: Storage for a year £1,859 Gift cards £2,360 Toys and gifts £859 Easter £1,650

We had put in for Halloween as well however did not get from all partnerships meaning we could not make the funding go as far as to Halloween.

Christmas - 2,510 completed referrals Over 40 organisations referred to us

Easter - 3,594 big eggs, 1,465 small creme egg type as well as over 1,500 small toys and arts and crafts items.

45 schools

26 nurseries

14 charities and other organisation received eggs from us

Birthday boxes

All social work departments, health visitors, star project, ebi unites, the space project as well as some schools and nurseries have a stock of gifts that they can take from. This means items have already been quarantined at their end. They then fill out a record sheet and we top up their supply when needed.

Other organisation refer to us due to space or working from home.

We were able to provide safe, new toys and gifts of a high quality taking away and stigma. Our referral process also set up parents and carers with other services that we cannot offer - helping us all work together to keep services fair.

The toy bank also relives financial strain or helps stop families getting into debt.

Easter helped with food poverty as well as helping with an Easter egg hunt and another organisations Easter activities for the children that they support.

Businesses act as drop off points. This was a bit stop and start due to Covid however we try to use as many local small businesses as possible which also tends to bring them some new customers helping the local economy.

10.Buddies of Hunterhill

We wanted the money to create a special, fruitful garden that could be used by many people. Our original plans to include our usual partners into the garden space to help with the allotment and orchard have been put on hold although the trees, shrubs and plants have been put in place ready for Covid restrictions easing up. We hope that

our families, friends and the young people from local schools can enjoy the garden as much as we have over the last few months.

We have spent some of the money you granted the committee but not all of it because of Covid restrictions. We spent money on making the garden look and smell better than it was. Trees and new sensory plants have been introduced recently, and we've created a beach area for residents to enjoy. We still have money left because we couldn't spend the money on what we originally planed because we've not been able to link with our community as we usually do. However, we hope to host a coming out of Covid garden party to showcase the work that has been done when the time is right. The number of people who this has benefited relates only to the care home residents, their close relatives at times when they have been able to visit and the staff who work in the care home so far which equates to over one hundred people. We hope to double that figure once restrictions have been lifted.

Relatives and friends of the residents have benefited most from this project so far. We do plan to get more beneficiaries within our local community involved in due course although the timing isn't right at the moment unfortunately, as we hope you can appreciate. The residents have welcomed the work in the garden and have enjoyed the improved space on days were weather permits, although feedback has suggested that the new features in the garden is something new and nice to look at even when its raining which has helped to improve the health and wellbeing of all residents living in the care home.

11.Renfrewshire Walking Network

Promote the Walking Network through printed booklets and promotional material. These are placed in library's Community Facilities and Doctors surgeries. There was also money for training of new leaders and equipping them with Waterproofs and First Aid kits.

As we work with elderly and vulnerable groups all walks were cancelled due to Covid in March 2020. It is only in the last month that we are gradually restarting the Community Health Walks. This as delayed spending the grant on booklets and promotional material along with training and equipment. It is our intention to spend the grant as intended as things get back to normal.

12. Breastfeeding Network

To continue to help sustain our local breastfeeding support services. We wanted to continue supporting our existing volunteers by offering ongoing learning and developing their skills with supervision/study events and continue to support local families with breastfeeding by offering weekly support groups, attending local community events to increase public and community awareness of breastfeeding.

Over the past year due to the Covid-19 pandemic and lockdown restrictions we have continued to support our volunteers by offering frequent supervision and ongoing learning opportunities and have developed strategies online making this more accessible during the lockdown.

We have run 2 weekly online breastfeeding support groups open to parents requiring breastfeeding support and information via Zoom. We also started another weekly online antenatal breastfeeding information session for pregnant women and very new mums as all NHS antenatal classes were cancelled.

We set up other means of support by email, 1:1 phone and video call as face to face support was all cancelled.

We were unable to attend the postnatal wards to offer support to newly delivered mums or any community events which were cancelled due to the lockdown restrictions. However we are working towards setting up new Walk Talk and Feed groups locally as a way of helping mums to exercise and connect with each other, reduce isolation and get breastfeeding support, which we hope will be sustainable. We have not spent any funding on venue hire as the venues have been closed, however anticipate higher costs going forward when venues reopen.

183 attendances

56 new mums many who attended on more than one occasion. Our online Zoom groups are open to all across Renfrewshire.

New and existing breastfeeding families had access to online breastfeeding support via Zoom on 147 occasions (including during Christmas and New Year weeks) We gave email and social media support as well as 1:1 zoom call and video chat. New parents have been particularly isolated during the pandemic as face to face support from their health care providers was severely limited and in many cases, completely unavailable being restricted to video call from health visitors and GPs. We have been a lifeline for these mums who had very little practical support from family and friends at a very vulnerable time in their lives. We know that breastfeeding rates have been rising in Renfrewshire over the last few years and evidence shows that peer support makes a big impact on helping parents achieve their breastfeeding goals.

We aim to continue with our project which was originally in our application by restarting face to face breastfeeding groups, offering support in the postnatal setting, attending community events when guidelines allow.

13.Bungalow

Since taking over The Bungalow we looked at ways to reduce our carbon footprint. So, we set out to minimise our energy costs. We set out to replace the old boiler which we did with the grant. In addition we insulated the roof space, installed sensor taps and installed a sensor urinal flush system.

Our throughput weekly is between 500 and 700 attendees. The new heating system and insulation benefits them and our staff. The venue is a much more comfortable space to be in for customers and performers. Our carbon footprint will be reduced and energy bills smaller.

14.Rainbow Turtle

Through education we hoped to help develop informed and active global citizens. The money was mainly spent on salary of an education officer who liaised with schools and other groups to educate and promote Fair Trade.

We promoted Fair Trade Fortnight and started a podcast about Rainbow Turtle, Paisley and Fair Trade.

We promoted Fair Trade via the Rainbow Turtle shop in Gauze St.

Covid made it difficult to work in person with schools and organisation and the education officer was on furlough for some of the year, so more was done on line. This limited the impact in a difficult year. Previous years are more typical of our impact across Renfrewshire schools and organisations. In the coming year we intend to employ the education officer for more hours.

Rainbow Turtle works across all Renfrewshire and the main use of the funding is to pay part of the salary of a part-time Education Officer who works across all of Renfrewshire and makes all our resources to all schools and organisations across the county. As such it is not easy to break down how much each Local Partnership benefitted individually. All schools were offered online resources, especially during Fair Trade Fortnight.

The Education Officer is responsible for the online presence of Rainbow Turtle and that has been more important in the past year where physical contact was so drastically reduced.

She produced regular newsletters, maintained the website and posted regularly on Twitter and Instagram. Our followers on these platforms increases listed below in 3.2, over 1000 Twitter followers and almost 100 people follow us on Facebook. The charity works closely with the trading arm, Rainbow Turtle Trading and we have 26 active volunteers and more interested in joining.

Schools were closed for most of the year which meant normal business in terms of direct education work with pupils had to be postponed. However, contact with teachers continued, with a Teacher's Blog being set up, so mainly online. A number of events were planned over the year, but by necessity these have been rescheduled.

The Education Officer built up a wide variety of materials and resources, primarily online activities which can be rolled out when circumstances change. Hence, schools will be in a much better position to embed Fair Trade into the curriculum as normal services resume.

Home learning materials were developed for parents and guardians who were educating young people in the home. A wide variety of sessions, activities and digital learning opportunities were offered.

Updating the website and offering information and resources as well as drawing together links to relevant sites, was a key element of the work.

These resources were accessed by parents, teachers, partner organisations and interested members of the public who found them useful, engaging and informative. In previous, 'normal' years we were able to more by working with churches and other groups to have Fair Trade stalls, selling and education. We have previously worked with St Mirren's women's football team and using Fair Trade footballs. We have links with Scottish Fair Trade Forum and Just Trading Scotland (JTS) which is based in Paisley.

15. Shopmobility Paisley and District

Local Partnership funding was spent as intended on materials, equipment and volunteer expenses to ensure the provision of a mobility scooter and wheelchair service in Renfrewshire.

During lockdown open hours for the project were longer than normal. A new website was developed and support given to enable people to visit relatives in hospital, access scooters (including advice and maintenance), access counselling services, pick up prescriptions, get out of their home and access food.

16. Paisley Sea Cadets

We received £3,485. A new boiler was installed last month and the nest unit was installed.

We didn't spend anything on stationery. Due to covid restrictions the hall has been shut down since mid march 2020, and is still shut down, so strictly no one directly benefitted.

Our income for 2020/2021 is nil. In a normal year we would have received hall hire income, cadets subscriptions, bag packing income and gift aid. This was nil due to covid. All hall and cadet activities were completely suspended. The income received plugged the gap in our funding. The funding was used 100% as requested

17.Loud'n'Proud

The funding was requested to produce a week long festival celebrating Danny Kyle. The money is not spent yet due to Covid as we couldn't put on a live event. The event is now scheduled for Sma' Shot Day on the 3rd July

18.Wynd Centre

Child Play Therapy Report for first year

The first year of Project funding, supported by local Community Partnerships, has been positively used to purchase and refurbish a well ventilated play room within the

Wynd Centre; and also, to pay for a new staff member's professional training toward a qualification in Play Therapy. Training started in October at a training venue in Edinburgh, offered by the organisation PT UK. Since then, the training has been offered online due to lock-down, but it continues despite the current pandemic.

Staff have been working with one 5-year-old child and three other young people aged 12-15 years of age, The Counselling Manger supports the process of referral by doing play therapy assessments in partnership with the parents or kinship carers of any children referred to the service. There is a case load of 4 child clients over 2 days.

• From October to December 2020, 20 hours of child therapy had been offered and 5 sessions of counselling to a 15-year-old male client. Staff also worked with the adults who referred these 6 children.

Applications for Local Partnership Funding To Paisley East Local Partnership 2021/22

1. Summary

- 1.1 Applications for grant funding from the seven Local Partnership areas were invited to be submitted during March and April 2021, to be considered at the Local Partnership meetings due to be held in May and June 2021.
- 1.2 The available allocation for Paisley East Local Partnership for 2021/22 is £68,647 made up of £52,247 from the General Fund, £11,100 from Paisley Common Good Fund and £5,300 underspend carried forward from the 2020/21 General Fund budget. The carry forward of underspend was agreed due to the exceptional circumstances of the Covid pandemic during 2020/21, which impacted on the ability of community organisations to undertake activities due to restrictions in place over the period. The normal arrangement whereby underspends cannot be carried forward into the next financial year will be reinstated for 2021/22.
- 1.3 From this total budget, a sum of £50 per community representative requires to be ringfenced for potential claim of expenses. These expenses are deducted from the available allocation for the Local Partnership. Paisley East Local Partnership has space for eleven community members, so the total ringfenced for expenses is £550. The total budget available for allocation by Paisley East Local Partnership is therefore £68,097. The total value of applications received is £93,937.25, with this value being £25,840.25 more than the budget available for allocation.
- 1.4 The Youth Challenge Fund component of Paisley East Local Partnership Funding for 2021/22 is £24,095. This funding will be allocated by young people through a Participatory Budgeting exercise that will take place during autumn 2021.

2. Recommendations

2.1 It is recommended that members of Paisley East Local Partnership consider the applications for Local Partnership grant funding, as set out below in Appendix 1 and 2.

3. Background

- 3.1 Applicants for funding in 2021/22 have been provided with guidance, as well as a description of the Local Priorities identified by Paisley East Local Partnership.
- 3.2 Local Partnership members are asked to consider the applications for funding summarised at Appendix 1 and 2 of this report, and to assess these against the Local Priorities agreed by Paisley East.
- 3.3 An initial assessment has been carried out by officers to support Local Partnership members in their decision-making. Where applications have made clear reference to the Local Priorities identified by the Local Partnership, this is identified in the first table at Appendix 1. Applications that make a partial or no reference to Paisley East Local Priorities are summarised in the second table for example, the project may tackle social isolation (and therefore meet the Local Priority around social isolation) but not deliver this directly in the Local Partnership area or make reference to how many people from the area would be engaged in the project.
- 3.4 The priorities of Paisley East Local Partnership are:

Exploring the impact of new housing developments

The Local Partnership want to explore how they influence planning decisions around new developments, and make sure that the infrastructure is in place to support these developments, for example, roads, schools and nurseries. They want to explore how community benefits might be used to support this.

Supporting social connections

The Local Partnership want to support social connections to tackle isolation and promote mental health and wellbeing. They want to see groups in the local area working together, swapping skills and sharing resources.

Community pride and safety

The Local Partnership want to see the care and maintenance of their spaces across their area, so they are clean, safe and attractive spaces. They want to see these spaces used to promote good wellbeing across the area.

Tackling food poverty

The Local Partnership wants to tackle food poverty in the area to ensure that people are able to access supplies of food where they need it. As part of this, the Local Partnership wants to see a reduction in the amount of usable surplus food wasted and the sustainable use of resources to be key features of work to tackle food poverty.

Who benefits from the Project?

We want to empower communities to make their local area a safer and more inclusive place by joining the Keep Safe Initiative.

We want to support social connections by helping young people to better understand how to support vulnerable people and understand the importance of reporting incidents to help make communities safer for everyone.

We want to tackle social isolation by encouraging people to play an active role in community life free from a fear of abuse or harassment.

Keep Safe was developed in response to a need highlighted by the Renfrewshire community. Many people reported feeling vulnerable or on occasion unsafe, when out in the community.

Keep Safe was designed and developed with disabled people to ensure it was accessible. Although originally designed for disabled people, Keep Safe can actually be used by everyone as anyone can feel vulnerable, at any time.

The need for Keep Safe is increasingly important as the country moves out of lockdown. The impacts of shielding specifically mean that many people may feel nervous or anxious about re-entering the community.

Keep Safe can help people feel supported, knowing there are safe places they can go if they need support. That support may only be a seat or a few minutes to compose themselves.

This funding will enable the delivery of two Keep Safe Ambassador training sessions. This a full days training to young people aged 14-18 or adults with learning disabilities.

Keep Safe ambassador training is delivered in partnership with Police Scotland. As ambassadors, young people will work collaboratively and sharing their own experiences and knowledge, and also have the opportunity to get more involved with I Am Me and Police Scotland to make their community a safer place.

We will also provide Keep Safe cards for distribution to community groups within Paisley East and provide keep safe approach letters, encouraging local community buildings and businesses to sign up to become a keep safe place.

Description of Project:

Battalion administration and events programme and Battalion running costs.

In addition to running costs the Battalion will be planning several events throughout Renfrewshire. These events will encourage participation in many physical activities and will include local issues such as foodbanks and fair trade. We hope and expect that these events and activities will attract new members and retain present members to experience the values of the Boys Brigade and attend regular classes and events as a diversion to anti-social behaviour.

All of our events are arranged by our various activity's committees, which cater for the whole age range of the Battalion from Primary 1 through to 18 years of age. We have 23 events which cover the whole age range of the Battalion, involving sport, physical activities, arts and crafts, quizzes, swimming, and fun days for our younger members. Over the session we expect that 750 Boys Brigade members will participate in these events which we hope will attract new members through family and friend's support. All of these events require input commitment from our leaders to make them successful in addition to their weekly commitment to their individual companies.

All boy participants are registered at each event by the organising committee. All our leaders and helpers have PVG clearance from Disclosure Scotland.

The current bank balance of this group is £29,275.92. Part time administrator's salary and running costs of the battalion are set against this balance.

This is a multi-area application – all LP's are being asked for funding ranging from £250-£600.

Who benefits from the Project?

Over many years we have been organising events to encourage participation in values that we believe will be in line with Renfrewshire Council's community plan. The activities promote being active, healthier, safer and stronger.

From a young age our boys and young men will learn that are responsible for their actions and preparation for the various events.

The Battalion has 143 members from the PNWC Local Partnership area. Two-thirds of the boys in the Battalion are under 12 years of age.

All of our events are based on developing our young people to be the best that they can be in teamwork, mentally, physically and encourage their concern for others.

We hope that many of our members will participate in our various events which provide progressive training throughout the age range. We hope and expect to see improvement in the various disciplines that our events cover. We hope that together our events programme will be a positive influence and will prepare our young people for and sustain them in their future lives.

About the organisation:

The object of the boys brigade is the advancement of Christ's kingdom among boys and the promotion of the habits of obedience, reverence, self-underpinned by respect and all that tends towards true Christian manliness.

The group have 1 part time member of staff, 230 volunteers and 995 members.

The group have £29,275.92 in their bank account, with expenditure costs of part time administrators wages and battalion running costs set against this.

Grant funding award history:

In 20/21 the Battalion was awarded £2,386.31 to provide financial assistance in running events, Battalion headquarters and administration costs. Due to COVID-19 the funding

was used for Battalion administrator and headquarters expenses. The benefits to the community were very limited due to the Covid19 restrictions, as the Battalion members were unable to have any face to face contact. In a limited way some companies were able to keep in touch with their boys through social media. The Battalion were able to keep their headquarters building and staff who met on a very limited way, social way within social distance regulations, to be prepared for when the group is able to function fully again.

The 20/21 Local Partnership money was mainly spent on salary of an education officer who liaised with schools and other groups to educate and promote Fair Trade. We promoted Fair Trade Fortnight and started a podcast about Rainbow Turtle, Paisley and Fair Trade.

All schools were offered online resources, especially during Fair Trade Fortnight Schools were closed for most of the year which meant normal business in terms of direct education work with pupils had to be postponed. However, contact with teachers continued, with a Teacher's Blog being set up, so mainly online. A number of events were planned over the year, but by necessity these have been rescheduled.

The Education Officer built up a wide variety of materials and resources, primarily online activities which can be rolled out when circumstances change. Hence, schools will be in a much better position to embed Fair Trade into the curriculum as normal services resume. Home learning materials were developed for parents and guardians who were educating young people in the home. A wide variety of sessions, activities and digital learning opportunities were offered.

Updating the website and offering information and resources as well as drawing together links to relevant sites, was a key element of the work.

These resources were accessed by parents, teachers, partner organisations and interested members of the public who found them useful, engaging and informative.

Unfortunately, due to restrictions around Covid-19, the tour was unable to take place. Our amended application was approved to cover our recruitment costs. This included venue hire and panel fees for our audition process. Although the tour was unable to take place, the recruitment process was a success and we have 6 young musicians waiting to take their place on our next Ceilidh Trail project in late 2021. Whilst the project is currently waiting to take place later this year, the grant award ensured we were able to recruit 6 of the best young musicians from the area. When they do eventually perform their concerts together, we anticipate reaching at least 500 people within the community through traditional music and Gaelic.

The Jingle Bell Fun Run is a unique family fun event. The event caters for all ages and all abilities and aims to encourage people to take part in 3K walk/jog and 1k fun run.

Jogging Buddies will offer a training programme and beginner classes leading up to the event.

The event aims to get families active and having fun while doing so.

On the day we will provide information on opportunities for families and the local community to be active on a regular basis.

This is an annual event which has grown in numbers every year. We identified the demand for this type of event through talking to the local community and participants in our Jogging Groups. There were no family events like this in Renfrewshire. From feedback from race participants we reduced the distance from 5K to 3K to make it more attractive for families.

Local community groups have also contacted us to support and be involved with the event. Many local groups all have their members take part in the event to raise funds for their own groups.

We have also received feedback from families about the value for money of the event with many people saying how much they appreciate the event as a family day out. One participant said last year " this event marks the start of Christmas for my whole family".

Last year the event could not take place at the park and we have been asked by the local community if we will be able to run the event this year.

The volunteer group has begun collecting a bank of tools and equipment needed for the work, but we need more, and we currently have nowhere to store this equipment securely.

Continue with the work already undertaken, her are examples of work done so far:

Removal of 300+ binbags of rubbish from the reserve in the last 3 months. Removal of large quantities of fly-tipping.

Recovering over 2 kilometres of path network which had become largely un-usable.

It is felt that with the struggles of lockdown for both physical and mental health this is a great opportunity to get kids active post pandemic and promote the advantages of team sport. Furthermore it is hoped that by bringing kids, adults and families together, with the club acting as a community hub, it will help to tackle issues of isolation which exist in the community and promote mental health and wellbeing. As a large portion of our existing membership comes from the Paisley East area, we also feel it is important to re-engage with them post pandemic to ensure we can offer support through social interaction at the club and that, after a year without play, no members are lost to the sport. It is felt that high level coaching will aid us to do this.

The club has previously focused its community outreach program on delivering curriculum time PE coaching within local primary schools across Paisley East and this has not been possible for sometime (and potentially for the foreseeable future) due to the Covid 19 pandemic and issues around accessing schools. Whilst the club intends to resume and improve these sessions in the medium and long term (as soon as practical) we feel it is important towards our and the Paisley East communities COVID recovery to have an open access program in place for the summer of 2021. With the new housing developments around the Paisley East area, it is hoped that this will give families new to the areas a place to build social connections within the local community. The club has existing relationships with local primary schools within Paisley East through active schools and HUB membership, therefore are well placed to support the community coming together; children ,adults and families alike.

The club intends to recruit a highly experienced and qualified Club Coach to plan, lead and manage the delivery of training for both senior and junior members at the club. These sessions will be provided free of charge to the wider community to give an introduction to the sport. We will especially focus on children and young people, both boys and girls, to develop an interest in sport and healthy living post pandemic. The Club will run free senior coaching on Tuesday & Thursday evenings and free junior coaching on Wednesday & Friday evenings. This will be promoted through paid advertising on the clubs social media accounts & local leaflet drops, as well as through active school & hub links. The coach will lead a week long summer camp and will also conduct 1:1 specialised coaching with our existing members to allow them to develop their skills and remain engaged with the club.

Who benefits from the Project?

It is expected that increased engagement with the local community will result in an

increased membership for the club. As the project has a significant focus on children and young people, it is expected this group will become regular attendees at the club's junior training sessions and eventually filter into the main club as active members in the sport. Breakdown of costs

We bought bird houses, nesting boxes, bird feeders and kits to build birdhouses and feeders. We printed information leaflets and charts.

We created a welcome pack which was delivered to new housing in the area. The pack contained a "Welcome to Barshaw Park" letter, and a wooden token, which we invited recipients to decorate or write a message on, and hang from one of the laurel trees in the Walled Peace Garden in Barshaw Park.

We bought craft materials and created Easter Craft packs which were distributed to local children and community groups, and schools and invited them to create decorations to display in the Walled Peace Garden.

We had originally intended to deliver workshops in the Walled Peace Garden for local people and families to build birdboxes and learn about wild birds, and to deliver other craft workshops.

The pandemic meant that we could not deliver the sessions in person and in the park as we had intended, so we a system to deliver the projects at virtually.

Our work with the Mirin Group, an organisation for young adults who have learning difficulties, had to be put on hold as the group could not meet during the pandemic.

Paisley North West and Central: We reached over 100 households in Hawkhead with our Welcome Packs.

Paisley Abbey Scouts, and over 20 households in Hawkhead, Greenlaw, and Town Centre took part in the Birdwatch project

Paisley East: 20 Households in Paisley East took part in the birdwatch project.

The Birdwatch project was extremely popular and we distributed over 200 kits and birdhouses to households in Paisley and wider Renfrewshire. Some families were issued with both ready made birdhouses and children's kits.

Our Welcome Packs invited residents to visit Barshaw Park to enjoy it's amenities and also to join and volunteer with Friends of Barshaw Park.

We have recruited several new volunteers of different ages and backgrounds to work in the Walled Garden, and more people have joined our committee and made connections with others in the community.

People have learned new skills and developed and shared their knowledge of gardening, and have a sense in achievement in seeing the Walled Peace Garden looking beautiful with a peaceful and welcoming atmosphere. Visitors to the garden have benefited from having a lovely garden to visit and relax in.

Families and children have learned about the wild birds which visit their gardens and open areas in their local area. They are learning more as birds build nests in the Friends of Barshaw Bird boxes, and feed in the gardens and surrounding areas.

The purpose of this project is to deliver a structured coaching set-up through a local Primary School Hockey Development Programme in partnership with Active Schools. The programme will be delivered to all Schools in a mixture of indoor and outdoor settings, and will be planned in accordance with the Local Area sporting network requirements

- 1. Paisley Schools
- 2. Out-of-Central Renfrewshire area schools
- 3. Oher identified sporting communities

We train coaches at all ages levels within our Club to ensure we retain continuity at all levels over the years and develop more coaches able to train more players going forward. This year is our 50th half-centenary year over developing players and coaches in our all-inclusive coaching system.

The programme will be delivered through 4-week blocks of after-school/lunchtime extracurricular activities and local festivals as identified. We encourage general health & well-being across our Club as this is paramount to our Club Ethos, that all coaches & players of all ages and fitness levels receive every encouragement to succeed.

As part of the overall recovery from covid we have established a youth committee. Members of this group led a survey of junior members as well as focus groups. One of the key areas all identified was how much they had enjoyed and benefitted from previous club links from primary schools.

Previous programmes in partnership with Renfrewshire leisure have proved successful and have positively contributed to both a successful secondary schools programme as well as forming the basis of the Renfrewshire team which successfully won a national competition last year. 90% of the team were part of a previous schools programme.

The project will provide further opportunities for young people to take part in organised structured sport as we recover from COVID.

We will increase the number of experienced coaches who will look after these community clubs and deploy the many great hockey skills to positive benefit.

We will do this over a sustained period, working with all Renfrewshire Active Schools staff.

This will provide each of the young coaches with valuable skills for life learning and work which will develop confidence and self esteem for them as well as the skills required to plan and deliver sessions.

These young people will mature much faster through this Club training programme which will stand them in good stead when dealing with the rigours of the outside world when moving in to Secondary school and beyond.

Description of Project:

To provide breastfeeding peer support and evidence based information to new families in Paisley East. This is especially important in area of multiple deprivation which addresses health inequalities, promotes inclusion, tackles loneliness and isolation, improves maternal health and wellbeing. This then improves the confidence of young mums, enabling them to go on and do further training. We want to maintain the excellent service we already provide by supporting our existing volunteers in the area.

Across Renfrewshire breastfeeding rates remain low, with only around 20% of babies being exclusively breastfed at 6-8 weeks in the most deprived areas. Evidence shows that trained peer-support helps mums to meet their own breastfeeding goals, enabling them to breastfeed for longer. This positive impact on their own mental health improves bonding and attachment helping to alleviate postnatal depression and feelings of isolation. By having the opportunity to access skilled support and evidence based information they feel part of a supportive welcoming community. Babies not breastfed are more likely to suffer from chest, ear, urinary tract and gastrointestinal infections, and at higher risk of obesity, hypertension, heart disease, stroke, diabetes, and cancer in later life.

During lockdown we have been running 3 virtual breastfeeding groups weekly on Zoom and plan to start a new face to face breastfeeding support group in the area when the pandemic restrictions ease in line with Scottish Government guidelines. We will continue with supervision and ongoing learning for our volunteer peer supporters. This is in line with the Local Partnership's priority of families accessing local health services, supporting both mums' physical and mental health and reduces social isolation, increasing social capital. The area is already welcoming and accessible to breastfeeding families, which is also in line with the Scottish Government's Breastfeeding Friendly Scotland launched in 2019. We will work closely with other local community groups, Health Improvement and Health Visiting teams. We will attend local community events providing support to both pregnant women and new families.

Who benefits from the Project?

We will continue to support vulnerable local families within the community enabling them to continue breastfeeding for as long as they wish. They will have increased knowledge and confidence and be part of a supportive community. We anticipate supporting increasing numbers of breastfeeding families on the postnatal wards, at the groups and at local community events. We will continue to support existing volunteers by helping them increase their knowledge and skills, promote our service locally and increase knowledge in the community.

We will measure attendance at groups and events by families as well as support given via

social media. By recording volunteer activity and gathering their experiences we will be able to measure increases in social capital. We will evaluate our ongoing study/supervision sessions to measure these outcomes for our volunteers. We will seek feedback from families accessing support to measure increases in knowledge and awareness around breastfeeding, and if we are meeting their needs and expectations.

Description of Project:

Darkwood Crew would like to build on the success of their inclusive, effective and wide reaching Covid response/recovery program allowing them to tackle isolation and loneliness in an innovative and creative way whilst still observing necessary Covid related restrictions. Last spring/summer a total of 91 sessions of free social isolation bingo were hosted across every street in Ferguslie Park and also visiting Corseford on 2 occasions contributing to a real sense of community spirit and collective responsibility to emerge. This also allowed for organic support networks to form and grow as well as provide much needed relief for many residents experiencing feelings of isolation and loneliness. All children in attendance receive a small goody bag of sweets and a drink as well as everyone in attendance being offered a free 3 page triple chance session of prize social isolation bingo. A small bag of decorating materials will be made available to allow tenants and residents to decorate the street to add to the positive atmosphere and build up. It is hoped that this might encourage residents in the area to come together and think about how they might be able to organise similar activities in the area in the future. We propose to work in partnership with Williamsburgh Housing Association and others to identify where in the area this would be best hosted to maximise engagement and minimise any feelings of isolation.

This proposed project will allow us to extend our social isolation bingo provision to an area which currently lacks local engagement. Our 5 key focus areas existed prior to Covid however have been exacerbated hugely. The empowering nature of the effective solutions identified have helped create an unrivalled sense of community spirit and if allowed to continue will ensure a locally led & sustainable wellbeing recovery.

2 sessions of social isolation bingo will be hosted in partnership with Williamsburgh Housing Association.

About the organisation:

Paisley Pirates were formed in 1946 & from then until the 1960's played at East Lane. In 1992 they were resurrected at the Lagoon Leisure Centre until 2006, when Renfrewshire Leisure Ltd withdrew the ice facilities. While Pirates were successful in relocation to Braehead Arena, the cost is prohibitive - pre COVID cost was £213.55/hr with an increase pending for season 2021/22. Therefore, we anticipate an hourly rate in the region of £250/hr.

Due to paucity of ice facilities, Pirates have on occasions gone as far as Dundee & Dumfries for ice.

Due to rising demands for a skills based approach, the club have appointed a second volunteer coach for the senior team & intends to appoint commensurate numbers of volunteer coaches in respect of the planned re-introduction of junior ice hockey, for players under the age of 18.

Pre COVID, the club were actively involved with Renfrewshire Council to establish an ice facility within the Renfrewshire for all ice sports. We intend to resume this work as soon as it's safe to do so.

We previously operated as "The Renfrewshire Christmas Toy Bank" however now that we have dropped Christmas from our name, we run all year round. Providing new toy and gifts for children of all ages within Renfrewshire. Only giving out new gifts takes away any stigma as well as helping struggling families. This incorporates but not limited to, Christmas, birthdays, Halloween and Easter. We work in partnership with various charities, local authority organisations, NHS groups and other local projects to cover all of Renfrewshire helping as any children as possible while keeping the service fair and confidential.

We provide new toys and gifts for local children (aged 0-18, living in Renfrewshire) through a referral process. Within Paisley North and Central we work with Paisley social work, Heath Visitors, Families First, Home link workers, Home-start, The STAR Project, Pals of the Privies, The Darkwood Crew as well as Who Cares? Scotland and other legitimate organisations working with children and families. This keeps the service fair, as well as keeping vulnerable people's private information safe in line with data protection and GDPR. This also means that the above organisations work together to reduce duplication. Within the area we also have valuable volunteers that we could not operate without.

Toys and gifts that go out are always new and we work with trading standards to ensure a high level of checks are done to provide safe and age appropriate toys for local children. We believe the toy bank is a valuable resource to assist struggling parents and Carers to be able to gift the same as other local families.

The organisation has 15 volunteer and 20+ members

They have £8,177.34 in their bank account. Part of this money has been set against other items. Currently we have no gift cards left and these will need to be replenished - around £3,000 worth. As we are now running all year round for birthdays we also need to purchase more toys and teenage gifts when the shops reopen. Halloween then also needs to be accounted for.

The group have applied to all LP's for funding to enable the project to be delivered across the whole of Renfrewshire.

Sewing2gether All Nations is a project held within Mossvale Community Church (MCC). The project falls under the second and third aims of the MCC constitution; Community: building strong family relationships and Outreach: meeting physical, social and spiritual needs of others in our community and overseas

Mossvale Community Church has 1 full time and 2 part time members of staff. The have 70+ volunteers and over 300 members

The organisations current bank balance is £94,000.00 which is assigned to pay for structural repairs to the building.

Grant funding award history:

In response to the COVID-19 crisis the majority consensus was to maintain contact in a Whatsapp group. Members wished to continue with creative activities. Early funding provided sewing machines for many. A schedule of doorstep delivery of sewing projects was developed. Lockdown / shielding concerns led to a relationship with Glasgow

Gurwara, and food parcels are now included. Funding will allow us to continue to provide doorstep and digital (Whatsapp & Zoom) services and purchase resources for the packs. We received an influx of referrals from Scottish Refugee Council and other members and now have 55 households represented, with 70 children at home. School age children are encouraged to participate and earn to sew too. Members report the vital importance of the ongoing connections, reassurance we can still provide practical supports, and boost to their wellbeing.

55 households participated in the projects, mothers and grandmothers with 70 children also taking part in some sewing projects.

To fund running costs of the hall and provide funds to develop, maintain and improve the hall.

So far the hall has been managed exclusively by the Sea cadets. However, our funds are limited which has held back development of the hall. We are looking to get more input from other groups using the hall as well in reaching out to the local community for support and increase usage. More usage will generate more income

The hall is leased from Renfrewshire Council. We are talking to Engage Renfrewshire regards advice of how to start a community asset transfer.

We have costed 7/8 items that we need funding for so as to make repairs, and generally develop the hall;

- Running costs = Internet, hall insurance and heat/lighting
- Repairs = replace skylight in kitchen which is single glazed, ill-fitting and a security issue. We have brickwork issues that urgently need addressed. Brickwork in one corner of building is crumbling/porous
- Improvements- are to put in a permanent concrete disabled ramp, to put in a fire and burglar system & door entry system, to fit a proper steel fire escape door, and to replace carpeting

Receipt of the grant will allow us to devote more resources for hall development. The ramp will make the hall 100% accessible by wheelchair users. A new fire door will greatly improve security and safety. The fire and burglar alarm & door entry system will improve safety and hall security.

We have poor floor covering in several rooms and carpeting will make the rooms much more comfortable/inviting and reduce heating costs.

There are urgent repairs required to crumbling brickwork. A new kitchen skylight will improve security and reduce heating costs

All of the above will be out sourced to local businesses.

Who benefits from the Project?

Young people from across Renfrewshire will benefit from this project.

The Sea Cadets has 100+ members and 24+ volunteers.

Covid 19 has resulted in the complete closure hall for the last 12 months, Before this cadets /other youth groups used the hall every evening and was well used at the weekend for parties.

We are looking to further maximise hall usage especially during the day/weekends. We will be looking to encourage new groups such as playgroups/after school clubs etc. to use the hall. Our kitchen although needing upgraded is perfectly fine to use for lunch clubs as well. Increased hall usage = more income = funding running costs and maintenance.

The organisation has over 24 volunteers and over 100 members.

The organisation has £10,708, the details of which it is allocated towards are: Our running costs at the moment are about £400/ month. Our heating should decrease due to summer approaching/new boiler, but due to Covid restrictions our normal funding income = bag packing/hall hire/cadet subscriptions is £nil, and we are expecting a £3,000 deficit in the next 12 months - due to just paying hall running costs. The hall has a flat roof > 25 years old, and I am looking to hold funds in reserve as a precaution.

Grant funding award history:

We received £2,000 from Gleniffer and £495 each from Paisley north west and central/Renfrew/paisley east.

We had a new boiler installed last month and the nest unit was installed. We didn't spend anything on stationery. All of the other costs were spent as expected.

Due to covid restrictions the hall has been shut down since mid march 2020, and is still shut down, so strictly no one directly benefitted from the project as yet. Our income for 2020/2021 is nil. In a normal year we would have received hall hire income, cadets subscriptions, bag packing income and gift aid. This was nil due to covid. All hall and cadet activities were completely suspended. The income received plugged the gap in our funding. The funding was used 100% as requested.

The funding has protected the hall for the future. Our reserves have taken a significant hit due to covid. Before the covid shut down the hall was used by sea cadets/brownies/rainbows and the local community. Approximately 120 young people/adults use the hall directly plus the local community for parties etc.

Description of Project:

Our proposal is to provide young people from across Renfrewshire with the opportunity to engage in creative and performance activities with qualified and experienced creative practitioners. The project offers young people (13 - 19) their first experience of performing on a professional stage.

We will support these young people in gaining confidence in their creative abilities and encourage them to export their thoughts through music. Through this introduction to live performance the young people will have an opportunity to find out they are a musician, songwriter or a music producer.

The workshops will include: Solo Work, Band Sessions, Song Development, Light Design, Live Sound Engineering and learning to use stage equipment.

At present young people, have to travel to Glasgow Clutha/King Tuts and beyond. There is no opportunities similar in Renfrewshire

The sessions are intended for a family audience and will be free entry.

The development of this project is a response to the growing number of young people and parents asking if we could help local young musicians who don't get the opportunity to play on a professional level stage.

Our aim is to help young artists by providing them with an opportunity to not only grow as an artist but to take their talent to another level.

We are working towards providing young people with information and knowledge, such as how to start their own record label or music video production company. We work in partnership with professionals in the music industry who provide workshops and mentoring for young people.

The aim is to have a youth music club and offer workshops in instrumental music, recording music, writing music, music video and social media over a 36 week course of 3 x 1 hour sessions a total of 108 workshops. The delivery will be a mix of group, one to one, presentations and special guests from the music industry.

We will offer RSC Grade exams to those that wish to do so.

Who benefits from the Project?

Why This Project?

According to new research from the Royal College of Music social inequality in music

provision is denying children from the poorest areas of the country the chance to pursue musical careers, and blocking the music industry's future talent pipeline.

We are close to the problem.

The Bungalow sits in an area of multiple deprivation basically with disadvantaged young people on our doorstep. This gives us an opportunity to engage with local young people who can easily get access to our venue.

Why music?

The value children get from high quality music education extends far beyond simply learning about music. The cognitive benefits are proven, as is the development in important 'soft' skills such as collaboration and communication. Music offers opportunities for pupils from all backgrounds to succeed

To this end, The Bungalow will join forces with their partners to create a place that is welcoming and understanding of their needs and tackle the problem head on.

What will it do?

The delivery of the project will promote expression through music and will encourage the development of transferable skills for learning, life and work including confidence, self-discipline and team work. Many of the intended target group generally have chaotic lifestyles outside school, mental health issues and difficulty communicating. With this in mind, the project concentrates on building positive relationships with pupils through music and does not set a prescribed programme of activity.

We wish to add another dimension to what we already do. Presently we teach young people how to play, create music and perform on stage then finally record their music. The final part in this journey which is just as important as recording songs is to produce music a music video for the song. The grant will be used to is to buy the equipment which is required to facilitate a new Creative Technologies and Multimedia Department.

In today's music, video is the biggest promoter of new music. Without it, it is nearly impossible to get your music listened to. To give young musicians and bands (not just the big or adult bands) a chance to be a real part of the music scene Since Covid this has been even more important as online and livestream has become more popular. The visual part of music is key.

We have a new state of the art sound recording and editing studio. We have high end equipment to do all of what we intend to do apart from professional video equipment.

The development of the new project was in direct response to the growing number of musically talented young people who never have an opportunity to further their music through video and online platforms. The aim of the project is to help young gifted artists by providing them with an opportunity to not only grow as an artist but to take their talent to another level.

We have had a demand over the years from young people to learn more about the multimedia side of the music industry as it is a major part of the marketing and raising awareness of a band or artist's work. In response we wish to expand our services to include technical subject as well as music tuition. Our newly completed recording suite is an ideal area to deliver the new subjects.

We are working towards providing young people with information and knowledge, such as how to start their own record label or music video production company. We work in partnership with professionals in the music industry who provide workshops and mentoring for young people.

With the pandemic causing live concerts and album releases to be cancelled, audiences are finding new ways to consume music from their favourite artists. And chief among them is the music video, which accounts for 95 percent of the most popular YouTube videos.

Today, social media platforms like Facebook, Twitter, Instagram, Tik Tok and YouTube have made it possible for fans to directly interact with their favourite music videos by liking, commenting, and sharing—building entire communities of music fans in the process.

This new Department will offer RSL qualifications from Debut to Grade 8. These grades will enable students to gain a globally-recognised qualification which will reflect their skills and understanding in Creative Technologies and Media. This syllabus will give participants a complete range of skills essential to today's next generation of musicians and media professionals in order to reflect the jobs of the 21st Century.

The new Department will provide a comprehensive and concise step by step introduction covering all aspects of sound and video production – what it all is, and how to use it.

Participants will work together as a group and produce sound recordings and videos together so that by the end of the course you will collectively have completed a film for a band or a promotional video. This is a practical way of learning how all the equipment works together with the end result being a piece of work ready to go online. The workshops are informal and involve interacting with others and the course leader as well as practicing on the equipment available. Each session includes all necessary theory needed to give you a good understanding of the equipment. Students then cement this knowledge by using this equipment themselves during the practical part of the session. At the end of the course participants are able to analyse their production as well as understand how to use video equipment and have a basic knowledge in video production.

Who benefits from the Project?

This project will assist us to improve the services and provisions we currently offer. Overall it will increase access, opportunity and participation in music by young people across Renfrewshire. It puts in place a structure that will support up and coming musicians, technicians and volunteers, enabling them to recognise and hone their talents and for that to blossom and eventually to find their place working in the music industry.

More young people will have the skills to volunteer their services to help other voluntary organisations.

The aims of the project is that students will be more employable, better equipped to apply for jobs, be more confident and have more experience to apply for a college course.

Description of Project:

Dates-n-mates Renfrewshire is the local branch of Scotland's national dating and friendship agency run by and for adults with learning disabilities. We transform the lives of people who are often socially isolated and lonely. We provide opportunities for people to connect, make friends and build meaningful relationships. Our monthly calendar of social events around Renfrewshire offers a safe and inclusive environment for people to meet and have fun. Members practice local journeys and improve their social skills. Over time this increases their self-confidence and independence. By building people's own natural support networks we ultimately reduce the need for paid support.

Who benefits from the Project?

With 26,000 adults with learning disabilities in Scotland (including 692 in Renfrewshire), the Scottish Government's Learning Disability Strategy 'The Keys to Life' states that improving quality of life for people with learning disabilities is a priority. They are more prone to abuse and less likely to have opportunities to form relationships. The Scottish Government strategy 'A Connected Scotland', recognises 'people with learning disabilities – and their families – are at risk of experiencing social isolation throughout their lives.' Learning Disability Alliance Scotland's 2018 survey showed 80% of adults with learning disabilities feel lonely either sometimes (11%) or a lot (69%). The recent Coronavirus crisis and lockdown has also seen dates-n-mates members and other members of the learning disability community become increasingly anxious and lonely as their usual sources of social interaction and engagement (such as day centres and clubs) became unavailable to them. By providing opportunities and support to find love and friendship (whether in person or online) dates-n-mates can and does transform people's lives.

About the organisation:

C-Change Scotland is a Scottish charity which provides outcome-focused personalised support to people with learning disabilities, mental health issues and other additional support needs. C-Change Scotland's work is based in a human rights approach, empowering the people it works with to live their life to the fullest and become active citizens within their communities. The charity hosts a project, dates-n-mates, which is Scotland's national dating and friendship agency run by and for people with learning disabilities. dates-n-mates Renfrewshire is one of 4 branches which support love and friendship for local people with learning disabilities.

The organisation has 151 FT employees and 70 part time employees. The have 90 volunteers and 273 members.

The organisation has 11,602.98 in the bank and while there is no significant expenditure set against this balance. However, these organisational reserves are 3 months running costs of the organisation should it enter into administration at any point (not a current issue of concern)

Grant funding award history:

The 20/21 Local Partnership funds which were received from Renfrew, Gleniffer, Paisley North West & Central and the Villages was a contribution towards direct running costs and was used as a contribution towards the salary of our Community Engagement and Event's Worker. The money was spent on direct staffing costs as originally planned, but our service delivery was different due to Covid-19. We had to cease all in person events and move our events online.

We held 5 online events a week, hosting a wide range of opportunities such as Zumba,

Quiz Nights, Karakoe, Cooking classes and bingo. We also hosted 3 daily coffee and cake chats to get member feedback and for members to take the lead in planning future online events. We also provided online friendship matching and dating opportunities to members and some feedback from members has been:

Steven (36) joined dates-n-mates in November 2020. He said 'At first I struggled to speak to people on the big Zoom calls. People speak too loud and they don't hear me. But then I met Emma and Mark through friendship matching. Mark has introduced me to some of his other friends. Over the Christmas holidays I called a few people. Mark and I are planning to have an outdoor running club when lockdown is over. I feel better now about talking to new people. Without Mark and dates-n-mates, I would have no pals.'

Two of our members also got engaged and due to the restrictions on shop closures, the member approached us and asked for support to purchase the engagement ring online.

Overall 3 Members form the Erskine, Inchinnan, Bishopton & Langbank, 5 Members the Paisley North West & Central, 2 Members from Renfrew and 1 Member Gleniffer benefited from the project. Also over 50 people from Renfrewshire attended our online 5th Anniversary Party on 15th January to celebrate the projects 5th year. As it was an open event we didn't capture postcode data.

Description of Project:

We made a concentrated effort to link with our membership during lockdown. Feedback from our surveys in the past confirmed we are a lifeline to many members. It quickly became clear that whilst our members were unable to hire scooters and wheelchairs, they needed support in other ways.

For example; picking up prescriptions, shopping, as well as taking them to GP and hospital appointments, picking up and delivering packages to and from hospital to their loved ones etc.

In addition, some scooters (including those owned by members) were breaking down, batteries needed replaced and sometimes just a conversation made people feel better. We did not have any company transport, therefore used a volunteers' car. Whilst the car has business insurance, the needs of our members resulted in daily runs,

Whilst the car has business insurance, the needs of our members resulted in daily runs whether that be to the hospital, shopping, GP surgeries, home visits, breakdowns etc.

Purpose of project is to ensure that we have a suitable company van which is taxed and insured to enable us to cope with the demands.

This ultimately helps those with mobility issues, and socially isolated, giving them confidence they have a good service which they can rely on to continue to provide them with what they need. It also allows us to expand our social enterprise by offering a more comprehensive scooter repairs service plus organise training for others via schemes such as Kickstart to enable us to have a contingency plan to ensure continuity of service delivery.

Surveys via our membership particularly indicated a need for us to diversify. For example, a year ago, our members came into the office to pick up equipment and hires.

However, during COVID and lockdown, members were unable to get out of their house to complete the most basic of things such as shopping, exercising, picking up prescriptions, delivering packages to relatives and friends who had been admitted to hospital.

We developed this project by actually responding to the needs of our members by using one of our volunteers' vehicle.

We were 'run off our feet' with requests and we visited the hospital on 104 occasions delivering packages, and picking up packages for their loved ones.

This is not withstanding the fact that we picked up prescriptions and delivered these to members as well as doing their shopping and fixing scooters.

This has been very well received and will be a service we will include in our business model going forward.

Improvement in terms of speed of response times to requests as we cannot rely on a volunteer to provide their vehicle all of the time - we need our own vehicle

- Ability to offer a more professional looking service

- Will improve our marketing i.e. logo'd van
- In terms of breakdowns we will have a suitable van which will be able to accommodate the weight and height of the equipment

Therefore, many are going without that one hot meal, that they rely on in school. This also includes families who struggle to feed themselves without the added pressure of adding another meal during the holiday. We also have many working families who are struggling to put a meal on the table. Unfortunately, they are unable to access free school meals at any time.

What we would like to do is give each family a food pack and also an activity pack for the kids. We will make up the packs and deliver them to each family within the Renfrewshire area. Each pack will consist of enough food to cover lunch and breakfast for the morning.

Description of Project:

The club building suffers from significant dampness due to the loose and broken render on its walls allowing saturation of the brickwork, and leaks around old and damaged window frames. The windows are also thermally inefficient and allow heat to escape, so the building is both cold and damp. It is necessary to replace the render and windows in order to: (a) make the building watertight to prevent further deterioration in its structure; (b) eliminate sources of damp which have caused serious damage to the contents of the building; (c) improve thermal efficiency to save energy, reduce heating costs and allow the building to be maintained at a suitable temperature.

Dampness has been an issue for several years and the club has hitherto focussed our resources on repairing the roof. A woodworm outbreak in our layouts during 2019 highlighted the need to eliminate other sources of dampness. After several pieces of render fell off we obtained quotations for its repair, which brought to light the fact that the condition of the render was a major source of the dampness and the whole building required re-rendering. This also identified that replacement of the windows would best be done at the same time in order to prevent further damage.

The twelve large windows in the main hall will be replaced with modern energy-efficient double-glazed units. The existing damaged roughcast render will be removed and replaced with new render. The existing security grilles protecting the hall windows will then be reinstated.

All work will be carrier out by a building contractor who will be responsible for scaffolding etc. The work requires to be carried out during the drier months of summer.

Existing dampness within the hall caused by water seeping through the brickwork and leaks around windows will be eliminated.

Elimination of the damp conditions will make a recurrence of the recent woodworm problem less likely.

Increased thermal efficiency will allow the central heating to more adequately heat the structure, making it drier and more comfortable for older members. (As a separate project, the boiler has recently been replaced to further improve energy efficiency). These repairs will put the club in a position to regain lost membership and replace damaged layouts once the Covid-19 situation eases.

Description of Project:

To provide a suitable and covid safe area for handlers to shelter during inclement weather.

In past years, handlers could shelter together within the storage area (when equipment was being used). That is no longer possible and is unlikely to be possible again in the near future. If the club is to survive and keep members- which in turn benefits the community as well as individuals, a permanent structure is required. Estimates are being sought at present, but costs are likely to be over £3000. This would only be for a 3-sided, open fronted structure, with metal support and Perspex sides. It must be large enough to allow for 2mtrs distance between around 10 handlers at any one time. Groups of handlers are split to train at different times so the full membership is seldom there at the same time. There has been difficulty in obtaining estimates because of Covid. This will ease shortly as the Scottish Government relaxes the rules and workers are returning from furlough.

Our members are primarily educated in dog health, safety, basic obedience and hygiene, as well as being encouraged to support the wider dog community by setting an example in aspects such as noise, dog fouling and general dog behaviour. Description of Project:

This is a multi-application with requests for funding to all 7 Local Partnerships.

The aim of the project is to educate and provide hands on animal care and welfare facilities to the local community and surrounding areas. Lamont Farm offers a wide variety of services to various groups and organisations within the local area and further afield, work experience placements are provided to jobcentres, high schools, community service, kibble project and many more.

The farm provides hands on experience for over 40 children who wish to pursue a career in animal care and veterinary practice, educational workshops are ran throughout the year for primary schools, nurseries and visitors.

Lamont farm was founded by a group of individuals with a strong desire to establish a local education and community facility. We were the first City Farm in Scotland and the farm is very popular with families, nurseries and disabled groups as well as local schools. Around 10,000 people visit Lamont Farm annually. We aim to educate people from all walks of life in animal care, welfare and husbandry.

The farm is working with a local artist by providing a dis used area of the farm to build a free and legal graffiti wall, this was established to encourage more youths to use the wall rather than putting graffiti around their local areas. The hope is this wall will help to reduce the vandalism in many areas by providing something different for everyone to try. The local artist will hold regular demonstrations and the idea is proving to be popular amongst the local and surrounding communities being supported by local newspapers the paisley express and the gazette.

We regularly litter pick the pathways clearing the glass, dog mess and litter to ensure safety to the public using these paths and for any wildlife. We have had extra cctv installed after the farm itself was vandalised using graffiti which has helped reduce vandalism in the immediate area.

Who benefits from the Project?

The farm has many social connections to help promote mental health, wellbeing and to help lessen isolation. Animals are a great source of therapy and have a great ability to bring many different people together some people prefer being round the animals as a gentle way of reintroducing them into the community. Some of the connections we have are RAMH, spark of genius, community service, West college Scotland's adults with addition needs and kibble we believe everyone should have the chance to be involved in their community. These connections help provide placements for anyone suffering mental health issues, physical disabilities, someone who has been out of the community, anyone who is looking to get back into work or anyone who just wants to volunteer, its a

placement where everyone is included in every aspect of the farm with no judgement. We offer work experience placements to many different high schools throughout Renfrewshire and beyond including Gleniffer high school, the placements are invaluable to pupils wishing to pursue a career in the animal sector as not many places allow under 16's to work so closely with such a variety of animals, in recent years our volunteers have went on to become fully qualified veterinary nurses. We have a working partnership with Glenburn based group Renfrewshire helping those in need we collect and distribute many items for the group helping out with people who are in need in the community. We are on an active bus route with buses coming from many different areas which helps make it easy to visit from many parts of Renfrewshire and the surrounding areas.

They currently have £3200 in their bank account which has been set against expenditure of Vet Bill, Electricity, Gas, Insurance, Farrier, Hay and Feed

Grant funding award history:

In 20/21 Lamont farm was awarded £11,340.11 from Local Partnerships for our running costs, and with the impact of Covid (we were closed from March-July and closed again towards the end of November (we are still closed) this funding has been vital to us. We have tried to keep going with projects via the internet, eg zoom chats with local kids and a class visit remotely through google teams. It is hard to say how many people have benefited from the project, when we reopened in July we had up to 1000 visitors through the gate in 1 day from areas all over.

This year in particular we were a huge benefit to the community. Even when we have been closed we have encouraged the public to come and visit out animals in the fields where they could do so safely and within the regulations. The farm's fields have been a

way of getting both adults and children alike out of the house and helping to reduce stress and depression caused by covid. When we reopened we welcomed everyone back and quite literally had a queue of up to 50-60 people waiting at a time to get in with another 40 already in the farm. We were able to do animal handling with the under 12s giving them an activity that they could take part in without a fear of infection.
