1 MINUTE OF PREVIOUS MEETING

There was submitted the Minute of the meeting of this Local Partnership held on 18 November 2021.

PAISLEY EAST LOCAL PARTNERSHIP BUDGET MONITORING REPORT AND 21/22 FUNDING APPLICATION FEEDBACK

There was submitted a report by the Chief Executive relative to the 2021/22 budget allocated to this Local Partnership. An appendix to the report detailed the distribution of funds.

The report advised that the 2021/22 budget allocated from the General Fund and the Paisley Common Good Fund of £68,142.95 for this Local Partnership had been awarded to local groups. In addition, £21,595 had been awarded to local youth groups from the Celebrating Renfrewshire Fund.

It was highlighted that an underspend of £2,500 from the Celebrating Renfrewshire Fund had been carried forward to 2022/23.

DECIDED: That the report be noted.

3 APPLICATIONS FOR LOCAL PARTNERSHIP FUNDING TO PAISLEY EAST LOCAL PARTNERSHIP 2022/23

There was submitted a report by the Chief Executive relative to the applications for Local Partnership grant funding.

The report intimated that at previous meetings of the Local Partnership priorities for the Local Partnership had been agreed, applications had been assessed into categories of (i) those with direct reference to the local priorities where the project was located in or specific to the area; (ii) those with direct reference to the local priorities where the project was not located in or specific to the area; and (iii) those with partial or no reference to the local priorities.

The available allocation for Paisley East Local Partnership was £64,527, comprising £52,247 from the General Fund, £11,820 from Paisley Common Good Fund and a carry forward of £460 from the General Fund budget. From this allocation £550 had been ringfenced for community representative's expenses. The total amount available for allocation was £63,977. The total value of applications received was £119,074.73 which meant that the available allocation was oversubscribed.

The report advised that the Celebrating Renfrewshire Fund component for this Local Partnership was £24,095 together with a £2,500 carry forward form 2021/22. and would be allocated by young people through a participatory budgeting exercise to take place in Autumn 2022.

The Chair had arranged for circulation of a proposal, prior to the meeting, for discussion by Local Partnership members to structure consideration of grant applications which proposed that (i) applications for £1,000 or less be allocated 100% of the amount requested; (ii) applications for more than £1,000 with direct reference to the local priorities where the project was located in or specific to the area be allocated 70% of the amount requested; (iii) applications with direct reference to the local priorities where the project was not located in or specific to the area be awarded 40%;of the amount requested; (v) applications for more than £1,000 partially meeting local priorities be allocated 22.5% of the amount requested; and those with partial or no reference to the local priorities not be awarded funding.

During discussion regarding the allocation of grant funding it was highlighted that previously the Local Partnership had proposed and agreed that a process be agreed, prior to the meeting, of allocating the Local Partnership budget. In this connection, it had been agreed that a pre-meeting workshop be convened to enable members of the Local Partnership to explore options for taking budget decisions, have a clear agreement on a structured process for discussion, agree the criteria to be applied and identify options for dealing with any excess in the value of applications in excess of the available funds. The reasons why this meeting had not been held in respect of the 2022/23 applications were outlined. It was agreed that a pre-meeting workshop should be held in respect of applications to be considered for 2023/24 funding. In addition, members highlighted the desirability of ensuring that feedback in respect of previously funded projects from organisations seeking funding was available when considering

applications and that application forms to be considered detailed the number of members in each organisation. Notwithstanding the above, it was agreed that the Convener's proposal be accepted and that the applications be considered individually and determined as follows:

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
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What is Participatory Budgeting?

 PB is designed with people in mind and is a democratic process where the funding granted is subject to a public vote. PB gives people an opportunity to decide how public money should be spent.

- The fund was open for applications between the 16th of September to 9th of October 2022.



Engage Renfrewshire 2022

Background

As part of the Recovery and Renewal Fund, the Minister for Mental Wellbeing and Social Care announced a new Communities Mental Health and Wellbeing Fund for adults on 15 October 2021, with £15 million being made available in 2021- 22.

Third Sector Interfaces (TSIs) were selected as the means for distributing funds locally and Engage Renfrewshire initially received £509,542.91 to allocate to third sector organisations and community groups in Renfrewshire.

TSIs were selected to distribute funds partly in response to their efforts during the pandemic; the Scottish Government's Third Sector Unit recognised the swift response of the TSIs in coordinating community efforts during lockdowns.



The intended outcome of the Fund is to "develop a culture of mental wellbeing and prevention within local communities and across Scotland with improved awareness of how we can all stay well and help ourselves and others".

The overarching aim of the Fund is to support community based initiatives that promote and develop good mental health and wellbeing and/or mitigate and protect against the impact of distress and mental ill health within the adult population.

The numbers

our process and how many groups we were able to support

Our application period was open from 15th November 2021 to January 7th 2022. We received 72 applications in total which corresponded to over £1.2 million in requested funding. Our application was consciously light-touch and accessible, as we recognised that several groups applying would likely not be used to long application processes.

Our decision-making panel was made up by cross-sector partners from Renfrewshire Council, the HSCP Health Improvement Team and Engage Renfrewshire.

The panel met five times and used their expertise, as well as information gathered during November's information sessions, to allocate all monies across 47 projects.

In late February 2022 we were given an additional £49,950.00 to distribute as a result of consultation regarding high quality bids that had missed out due to funding restrictions. With these additional funds we were able to support an additional five organisations, taking our total to 52 projects

ReMode

Paisley

ReMode were given £2,740 to support the Volunteer Mental Health & Wellbeing programme which was devised to help ease people back into face-to-face contact after long periods of isolation.

The programme included the implementation of a Wellness Action Plan which took the form of a questionnaire for all volunteers. The confidential questionnaire encouraged volunteers to identify any supports ReMode could put in place to ensure healthy participation for all.

Volunteers have reported that they feel a greater sense of confidence in volunteering with Remode, that they feel looked after knowing that they have these procedures in place to safeguard those who need it.



Pachedu

Based in Ferguslie Park, connecting ethnically diverse people across Renfrewshire

Pachedu were given £20,000 for a variety of activities based around improving their community members' mental health

Activities ranged from advocacy work, cooking, gardening, focus groups exploring the development of a Mental Health Toolkit, community wellbeing map, and social events for men and women. One participant from such an event shared the below:

"This is such an amazing experience to participate. As people from the minority group, we always need opportunities to socialise and eventually be in the position to support each other through our daily hassles. Please keep the ball rolling".



Renfrew YMCA

Renfrew

Renfrew YMCA were given £22,620 to employ support workers to develop programmes of support for Renfrew parents. Programmes so far include fitness and social activities for new parents.

Both of these activities seek to create a safe space for parents, encouraging them to find time for themselves while also bonding with other parents and sharing their experiences. One participant shared the impact the work is having for them:

"This groups is the best thing that has happened to me since I've had my baby. I am new to the area and the country, so this group has helped me meet so many mums and I am very grateful."

Challenges and next year's fund

Some common challenges faced by our groups are noted below. We note these so we may learn and understand groups' needs going in to second year.

- Hesitancy to re-engage in person this was particularly true for those who were deemed most at risk during the pandemic.
- Staff and volunteer recruitment and retention post lockdown.
- Cost of living crisis both for organisations' costs and the impact this is having on individuals' mental health.



We were allocated £504,837.13 to distribute in our second year and opened our application process in September 2022.

Activities will take place throughout 2023, with monies to be distributed to groups in January 2023 and all activity finished up by the end of December. New and previously funded groups are eligible to apply and we look forward to being able to develop work already undertaken this year.

Guidance from Scottish Goverment regarding the second year did not change dramatically from the first year, and the fund priorities and outcomes remain the same. There were however some additions made, partly in response to what we at TSI level had noted and fed back. The second year of funding will, for example, be able to support projects and activity supporting emerging crises such as the cost of living crisis.






Coats Observatory average local temperature, 1885 to March 2020



How many people benefitted from/access your project?

Many people (young/old) have benefited from ALL Local Partnerships in the Renfrewshire area, even although some of these partnerships turned down our application.

The community-wide benefited through our live events (Games at Braehead) &/or via social media outlets such us YouTube, Facebook, Twitter, Instagram & TikTok. The local press, namely Paisley Daily Express also featured (& continue to do so) the Pirates on a weekly basis.

The COVID pandemic caused many, if not a large majority of people within the community to feel isolated, lonely & depressed. However, our varied social media streams & the gradual increase of our live events, gave people a focus & way of interacting with others, whilst enjoying the sport they love.

How did your project benefit people in the community?

The biggest impact to our community, was that Paisley Pirates have come through a major pandemic - COVID 19, which saw our team 'frozen out' for 21 months. However, through sheer determination & financial support from Renfrewshire Council, we have managed to survive & continue our legacy, which has been in existence since 1946.

Many of our players have been suffering from mental health issues stemming from COVID, as restrictions prevented participation of our sport. Our gradual return to play was of huge benefit, not only to our players, but management, volunteers & indeed our Renfrewshire wide supporters. The commencement of competitive games, which was our ultimate goal, as games made a huge difference everyones mental wellbeing.

All of our social media streams have seen a steady increase in numbers this season (avg 21.6%). Follower numbers are as follows; Facebook 2806, Twitter 2499, Instagram 844. We have also introduced TikTok to our growing media streams this season.

What did you want the money to do?

The Club wanted the funding to recruit an experienced Club Coach to plan, lead and manage the delivery of our senior and junior coaching. These sessions were to provide to the local community free of charge. The coach was also to lead a weeklong summer camp and conduct 1:1 specialised coaching free of charge.

What did you spend it on?

The payment of the club coach.

How many people benefitted from/access your project?

The club would estimate around 120 people benefitted from the funding throughout the year. We attracted 6 new senior members from the Paisley East and wider Renfrewshire area, who attended the free coaching. Three were new to the area and two were returning to the sport after some years away. The summer camp was a key success where 40 kids attended the weeklong camp.

How did your project benefit people in the community?

The community benefited from free to access cricket coaching and the summer camp was a particular success as 40 local kids attended the camp. The major benefit in offering the coaching free of charge was that it broke down price as a barrier to participation in sport The coaching has helped with isolation as new people to the area have a place to meet and socialise, it has helped kids get active in a post pandemic atmosphere it has given families a chance to come together as part of a community organisation

Our previous Education officer resigned last year and we appointed a new Officer during 21/22. She has been learning the role and has been very active. This was done in the face of the pandemic and this has temporarily altered the nature of the role

The role of the Education Officer used to involve a lot of work with schools across Renfrewshire and that has been severely limited in 21/22 due to Covid. However despite the restrictions, many connections gave been made and many reestablished.

During COP26 we ran a well-attended meeting about Fair Trade and the Climate Crisis. We had 3 speakers including a coffee grower from Uganda. Over 50 people attended.

Almost 2,700 children received Christmas gifts, over 750 Halloween costumes were given out, 3,800 easter eggs and over 1000 birthday gifts – a total of 8,250 gifts out in a year to children in Renfrewshire.

Providing parents and guardians with new toys and gifts helps to reduce stigma as there are no links to the toy bank as all gifts are of a high quality and quantity, the same as children's peers. This also helps reduce to risk of families getting into debt at Christmas, knowing that their children will get to enjoy the magic of Christmas.

With the rising cost of living providing Halloween costumes has been a vital service this year and feedback from groups and parents highlights this. With school Halloween discos, the toy bank can help reduce financial pressure from families while tackling stigma by providing new high-quality costumes in a range of accessible locations throughout Renfrewshire. The same applies to Easter. Birthday gifts are always given out, as much as I have said above that 1000 children have had gifts we know this number is higher. Organisations that work with have "birthday boxes" with toys and gifts suitable for children that they work with. This model came about due to covid. This means gifts are already with

organisations and we provide top ups when needed. When a top up is needed, have more accurate figures.

Hundreds of people have benefitted. The outcome is that we are now able to pick up and deliver mobility equipment locally as well as enhancing our repairs and maintenance service following on and off-site repairs. This can save an individual trying to deal with mentally getting out of their house to navigate public transportation to Shopmobility as we can now deliver to them if that's what they need. We also pick up food from RAMH pantry and deliver to our members and we pay the £1 for a lifetime membership with RAMH – all they do is pay the £2.50 for their shopping. We also deliver and pick up shopping to those in the RAH, pick up prescriptions. We know 73% of our ordinary members are still suffering from social isolation and loneliness (post pandemic), and, live in poverty – they tell us this. Following surveys, the impact is very positive indeed and we deliver a service which our membership tell us they need and receive great benefit from.

2.4 What did you spend the money on and was it fully spent? (was this different to what you originally intended? If so, please explain).

We wanted to support as many mums as possible within Renfrewshire with breastfeeding during a very difficult period when there were still restrictions in place due to the pandemic. We trained new peer supporters to help sustain our project. Peer supporters are mums who have breastfed and completed our free accredited training in order to support breastfeeding families achieve their breastfeeding goals. Our volunteers provide independent evidence based information which can be shared with their health care provider in a relaxed non judgemental environment. We ran weekly face to face groups, walks and zoom groups.

We spent the money on the training and the ongoing supervision in order that they can remain registered and insured. We provided travel expenses to the volunteers when they attend our groups and events, resources required for the groups such as tea and coffee, room hire costs, books, a BfN tshirt as a uniform, equipment for the walks eg first aid kits

We attended local community activities at Lilias Day in Kilbarchan and Barshaw Gala Day, Scottish and World Breastfeeding Week and local UWS Midwifery conferences to inform midwives about our services and refer them to good breastfeeding resources. We also hope to be able to return to the postnatal wards in the RAH Maternity Unit to support new mums who have given birth and antenatal sessions in collaboration with local midwives too.

Everyone is welcome at any of our events whether pregnant and wanting to find out more, exclusively breastfeeding, mixed feeding or expressing. Mums come along for many reasons, social support, difficulties with getting breastfeeding off to a good start, returning to work and breastfeeding, needing help with weaning and a multitude of other subjects.

Please describe the impact your project had on its participants If you have received funding from more than one Local Partnership, please tell us how many your reached in each Local Partnership area)

As you will see from the separate feedback comments, mums were extremely appreciative of the breastfeeding and social support provided by our volunteers. Getting out and about is good for everyone's mental health so having the opportunity to meet up with other new mums at our weekly walk is ideal. A walk in the park helps with some exercise, fresh air and a chat with other mums alleviates loneliness and isolation and can help to boost low mood. Breastfeeding support is vital for new mums who need to connect with another mum who has experienced the highs and lows of having a baby. Our volunteers are all highly trained in evidence based information and to support all mums with feeding their infant.

Having the chance to talk to families at events like Gala days is a great way to inform and give support to the wider community eg partners, grandparents and the the mums' closest support network. We provide a quiet space to sit and rest, feed and change baby or toddler and have a chat with our lovely volunteers about how it's all going, shelter from the elements and of course a nice cuppa and cake!

Walks - 90 mums attended on 42 occasions between 1/6/21 and 31/3/22 (figures available at the moment data collector colleague is on holiday)

Bishopton group -26 attendances on 12 occasions between 28/8/22 and 27/10/22 (figures available at the moment)

Station 7 Johnstone group - 46 attendances on 8 occasions between 5/9/22 and (figures available at the moment)

Our volunteers have all benefitted from ongoing supervision, ongoing learning and training and the social support they have received from each other. This has helped raise their self-esteem, they have made new friends, it has reduced their own isolation and boosted their mental health by being involved with different activities and families. Being involved in a project by helping others is very motivating boosting both mental and physical wellbeing.

3.1 How many people in your community benefited from your project and how? (What outcomes did you achieve? Please describe the impact your project had on its participants If you have received funding from more than one Local Partnership, please tell us how many your reached in each Local Partnership area) We have had eight children attend the therapy in the last 18 months since we reopened after lockdown. All of these children have had one-to-one sessions over a period of 4-5 months and if they need to be extended then we do so. We are striving for the number to be higher but there is a long process which we have to go through before the child can begin their therapy and that includes liaising with their schools. The children have come from all over Paisley and the surrounding areas including central Paisley, Glenburn, Foxbar, Seedhill and Shortroods. The progress that has been made with the children has been very encouraging and we are looking to grow the service along with introducing an Adolescent counseling service for those aged 13-18 which would also be free of charge.

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
