1. Summary

This report provides a progress update on activities the Safer & Stronger Renfrewshire and Community Safety Partnership have carried out in the Paisley North area in quarter 4 (1 January – 31 March 2016). A number of partners have provided statistical information, including: Police Scotland and Renfrewshire Community Safety Partnership. The report includes information on:

- Johnstone and Villages community safety statistics;
- Environmental enforcement and improvement activities;
- Protecting vulnerable residents;
- A spotlight on the work of the Alcohol and Drug Partnership.

2. Recommendations

- 2.1 It is recommended that the Local Area Committee note the content of this progress update report.
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3. Focus on Johnstone and Villages

- 3.1 The table below details the number of incidents reported in the Johnstone and Villages Local Area during Quarter 4, 2015/16 (January to March 2016). The Renfrewshire Community Safety Partnership continues to target resources into hotspot areas. The table highlights the continued positive trends in numbers of incidents reported, which have steadily decreased since 2009. Although there are some areas where the number of reported incidents has increased, this can be largely attributed to the success of an increase in communications and publicity in the area to promote the services delivered by the Renfrewshire Community Safety Partnership and increase reporting of particular problems. In order to respond to reports of incidents diversionary programmes, such as Street Stuff, are now well established in the LAC area and a separate annual report on Street Stuff, including an up to date timetable has been submitted to this meeting.

- 3.2 In relation to Environmental Enforcement issues, dog fouling continues to be a concern for residents in the Johnstone and Villages area. During January to March 2016, 24% of all complaints to Renfrewshire Community Safety Partnership (Community Resources) were related to Dog Fouling. 1,033 community safety patrols were undertaken in the Johnstone and Villages LAC area with a number of targeted interventions, however it continues to be the case that catching irresponsible owners at the point that dog fouling occurs remains very challenging

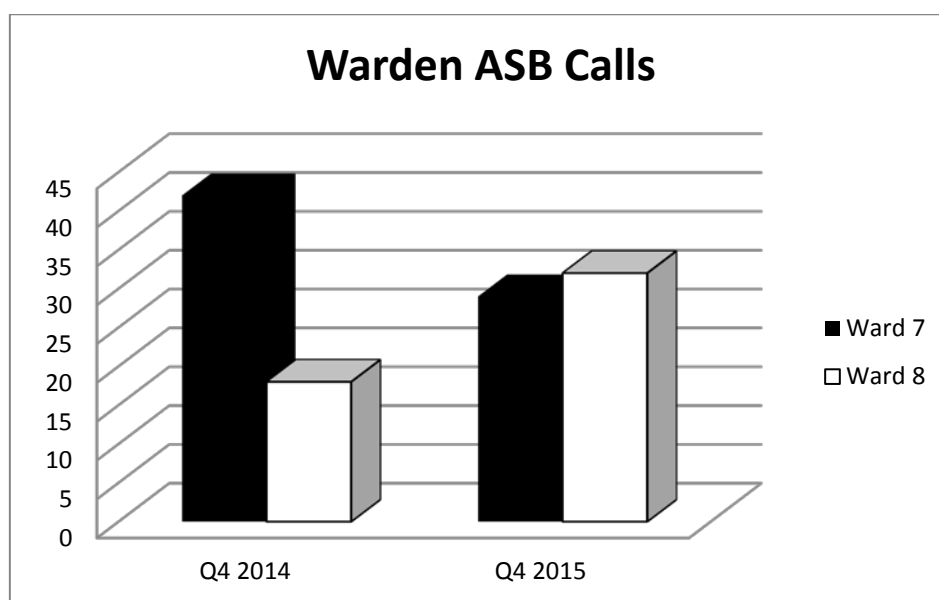
Renfrewshire Council is in the process of developing a draft Strategy on Promoting Responsible Dog Ownership to help address this issue.

The Strategy on Promoting Responsible Dog Ownership was developed in consultation with key partners and has identified 5 key priority areas:

- Enhanced partnership working ;
- Promoting responsible dog ownership in Renfrewshire;
- Tackling persistent offenders;
- Improving Enforcement procedures;
- Tackling Dogs Dangerously Out of Control.

3.3 Renfrewshire Wardens' Anti-Social Behaviour Calls

The table below provides details of the number of anti-social behaviour calls received by the Renfrewshire Wardens' service for the Johnstone and Villages LAC area during January to March 2016. It shows the the comparison to the same period last year and indicates the success of a number of initiatives including leaflet drops and other communications targeted at increasing reports of Anti Social Behaviour issues in key communities. The calls made to the Wardens help the Community Safety Partnership to respond to and direct resources across Renfrewshire. 1,033 patrols took place within the Johnstone and Villages LAC area, many in response to these calls.



- 3.4 An update from Scottish Fire & Rescue Service will be provided in the report to the next meeting of the Local Area Committee.

4 Environmental Enforcement and Improvements

4.1 Vehicle Emissions Testing

This bi-annual event took place on 16-17 March 2016, the previous one having taken place in October 2015). The Renfrewshire Community Safety Wardens, working in partnership with the Council's Licensing Officers and Police Scotland, carried out emissions testing on light vehicles entering the Air Quality Management Area in Paisley town centre. 356 vehicles were tested (including 52 taxis and private-hire vehicles), with 6 fails resulting in the issuing of Fixed Penalty Notices to the drivers. There were also 5 warnings issued due to minor defects.

5 Protecting the Vulnerable

5.1 Safe Kids

Safe Kids is an annual programme coordinated by Community Resources, delivering educational messages relating to a range of safety issues to every Primary 6 pupil in Renfrewshire. In March 2016, the annual Safe Kids event was at St Mirren's Paisley 2021 Stadium. The aim being to reduce the number of accidents involving young people, promote positive behaviour and eliminate risks. Workshops included: antisocial behaviour; Street Stuff; CCTV; First Aid; alcohol and drug awareness; internet safety; fire safety; litter and dog fouling.

5.2 Choices for Life

Choices for Life is a similar innovative diversionary and educational initiative aimed at raising awareness amongst young people aged 11-18 about the dangers of substance use and misuse in relation to smoking, alcohol and drugs. It also offers online safety and advice on how to deal with negative peer pressure and provides useful resources for young people and parents, carers, teachers and youth workers at www.choicesforlifeonline.org.

5.3 The latest Choices for Life, Paisley Event took place on Wednesday 23 March, 2016 at St Mirren's Paisley 2021 Stadium. It was attended by 200 second year pupils from four secondary schools; Gleniffer High School, Paisley Grammar School, St Andrew's Academy and Castlehead High School. There was also participation by a small number of pupils from Kibble School and Mirren Park School. This event focused on New Psychoactive Substances (NPS) with inputs from Police Scotland, Fire and Rescue, Renfrewshire Council, NHS, Renfrewshire Alcohol & Drug Partnership and St Andrews Ambulance.

5.4 **I Am Me/Keep Safe**

I Am Me is a community project which works in partnership with Police Scotland to raise awareness of Disability Hate Crime. In 2015/26, I Am Me launched a new training pack and DVD film which are available as a free resource to schools and groups. At the official launch at the Showcase Cinema, Paisley, the film was premiered with over 300 guests attending including the Provost, Lord Advocate and Deputy Chief Constable as the main speakers.

- 5.5 Keep Safe works in partnership with Police Scotland and a network of local businesses to create 'Keep Safe' places for disabled, vulnerable, and elderly people when out and about in the community. The Lord Advocate Frank Mulholland QC pledged support to the Keep Safe initiative by making all Procurator Fiscal offices in Scotland Keep Safe places in 2016.

6 **Public Protection Spotlight – Renfrewshire Alcohol and Drug Partnership**

- 6.1 The Renfrewshire Alcohol and Drug Partnership (ADP) is a multi-agency group, which has strategic responsibility to review, develop and deliver local services related to the challenges associated with alcohol and drug misuse. It was established in 2009 and comprises representatives from Renfrewshire Health & Social Care Partnership, Engage Renfrewshire, Police Scotland, Scottish Fire & Rescue Services, Scottish Prison Service and Job Centre Plus.
- 6.2 The Renfrewshire Alcohol and Drug Partnership's vision is to ensure that individuals will achieve and sustain recovery from their alcohol and drug use and become contributing members of society.
- 6.3 The Renfrewshire Alcohol and Drug Partnership is responsible for reporting outcomes in their Annual Report (latest 2014/15). The annual report also includes core and local indicators, many of which demonstrate an improving trend.

- 6.4 As seen in the table above the numbers of alcohol and drug related deaths in Renfrewshire have decreased from the 2009 baseline figures in line with the national average. Although we have seen improvements, current rates of alcohol and drug related hospital discharges in Renfrewshire remain above the Scottish average.
- 6.5 In the last year, over 96% of individuals in Renfrewshire waited no more than 3 weeks for treatment, which is better than the Scotland wide figure of 95.6% for alcohol and 95% for Drugs. Renfrewshire has consistently exceeded the target during 2014/15. Improvements seen in waiting times for drug and alcohol services have made services more accessible and increased the numbers attending.
- 6.6 Renfrewshire's Alcohol and Drug Partnership's 2015/16 developments include:
- Implementation of the Scottish Government's Quality Principles which include a detailed self assessment, and an evidence informed programme of work to support and improve service performance;
 - Recruitment of a Licensing Intern who will work with communities to enhance their involvement in the Licensing process;
 - Recruitment of a Recovery Development worker to enhance the work related to recovery from drug and alcohol problems in Renfrewshire;
 - Funding of the Safe Bus, which seeks to support people who are at risk during the Festive period (Fridays & Saturdays nights in December). The Safe Bus provides a safe environment for anyone who may be vulnerable as a result of being intoxicated, injured or separated from their fellow revellers;
 - The continuation of the National Naloxone Programme which aims to prevent drug related deaths. Naloxone is a potentially lifesaving drug

which can temporarily reverse the symptoms of overdose. Training is offered on how to administer Naloxone and basic lifesaving skills including Cardio-pulmonary Resuscitation (CPR);

- A Training Needs Analysis is being conducted which seeks to identify training needs amongst staff working in addiction services and other key practitioners. This will inform future workforce development priorities for the partnership.

1. Summary

- 1.1 Street Stuff has been delivering activities in Renfrewshire since 2009, during which they have contributed to a sustained reduction in reported youth disorder and anti-social behaviour. Across Renfrewshire there has been a 75% reduction in youth disorder and anti-social behaviour since the programme began and an 84% increase in participation levels over the past 2 years. Over 37,269 participants took part during 2015/16, an increase of approximately 12000 (almost 50%) from the previous year. The programme now offers a wide range of activities such as football, dance, computer games and clubbercise.
- 1.2 The success of the programme is its responsiveness. Being evidence led, and by responding early to information and data received through the Renfrewshire Community Safety Partnership daily tasking process, the service has built its reputation on being able to divert young people effectively from anti-social behaviour into more meaningful activities.
- 1.3 Over the past year the programme has also received funding from the Council to respond to issues identified by the Renfrewshire Tackling Poverty Commission. This has supported the significant expansion of the programme to allow delivery of new activities and resources delivering increased flexibility in operation. This has shown significant increase in the numbers of sessions being held and the overall numbers of participants taking part. St Mirren Football Club has continued to support the delivery of the programme, including

at The Paisley 2021 Stadium with some of the events being held there. One such event was the festive programme generating record numbers of attendances from across Renfrewshire.

- 1.4 Over the last few years, Local Area Committees have been keen to consider funding additional activities within their LAC area which would allow additional sessions to be programmed within communities, that are not identified at a Renfrewshire level as areas that have a particular problem with either anti social behaviour or children living in poverty. The success of the programme means that local communities feel they would benefit from being able to access these services locally - particularly at local gala days and fetes. Given the scale of the core programme, it is asked that a contribution of £5,000 per LAC area should be considered. This being similar to previous years. This funding would contribute to the costs of delivery of up to 2 activity sessions per week within the LAC area, through the peak summer, autumn and spring months, as well as attendance at local gala days and fetes.
 - 1.5 Participants and trainees on the programme from each LAC area will attend the LAC meetings to be available to discuss the benefits they have gained personally from participation in the programme.
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2. Recommendation

- 2.1 It is recommended that the Local Area Committee agrees funding of £5,000 to the Street Stuff Programme to contribute towards the costs of additional activity sessions within the LAC area as well as attendance at local gala days and fetes.
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3. Background and Further Information on the Programme

- 3.1 The core Street Stuff programme provides a range of activities, primarily in the evenings and at weekends across Renfrewshire, targeted in communities that statistics show would benefit from diversionary activities being available. Effective targeting and identification of the locations for the core programme is provided by our Partnership Analyst using information available to the Renfrewshire Community Safety Partnership, including Police data that highlights the days and times of youth disorder and anti social behaviour.
- 3.2 The table below summarises the number of sessions delivered and the recorded attendance figures within each local area committee area during the 2015/16 financial year. The programme has grown significantly over the past

year as it has increased provision in response to issues identified by the Renfrewshire Poverty Commission. As part of this wider programme funding has been provided for additional afternoon sessions and camps with food provision that are being rolled out to locations that meet the specific funding criteria. This will continue during 2016/17 with a significant programme taking place during the Spring and Summer Holiday periods.

- 3.3 Due to the recent evaluation carried out by the University of West of Scotland and the high volume of girls attending Street Stuff venues, dance classes have now been added as a key popular activity within the programme. Since starting in November 2014 with just one class in Glenburn, dance has been expanded to a number of areas in Renfrewshire including: Gallowhill, Shortroods, Johnstone and Renfrew. Participants have learned dance routines and have had the opportunity to display them at different events such as the Stronger Communities event in Glenburn, a Fairtrade Festival in Paisley Town Centre and the St Mirren v Queen of the South football match. Due to its popularity and the enhancement of fitness levels with the young people participating, dance classes are now delivered within school hours as part of physical education in a number of schools, as well as supporting school health events.
- 3.4 Last year, boys from Street Stuff went on a visit to London to view a similar project operating there - Football Beyond Borders. The boys participated in football matches in Croydon, Brixton and St Albans, winning the tournament outright. Not only were they involved in football - visiting iconic venues such as Wembley, this was also for some, their first experience away from Paisley, including taking part in educational sightseeing trips. It was a huge success and was repeated when Football Beyond Borders made a return visit to Scotland during the summer holidays. On this occasion Street Stuff were the hosts of a local football tournament as well as organising sightseeing trips to Loch

Lomond and outdoor adventure team building at Lapwing Lodge. The Boys from London stayed at the Lodge throughout their stay. Due to the success of these trips over the last 2 years we are now planning for another group to have the same beneficial experience.

- 3.5 The Street Stuff Annual Football Festival held in May 2015 at St Mirren 2021 Stadium hosted around 300 young people from across Renfrewshire and the West Region in a competitive tournament sponsored and delivered in partnership with SFAs Midnight League. The teams had the opportunity to play on the pitch in the stadium. Street Stuff girls and boys teams both performed on the night with 2 teams winning their age categories and an East Renfrewshire Team also sharing the prizes.
- 3.6 In June 2015, Street Stuff was awarded £250,000 Tackling Poverty funding to expand the delivery of activities after school, weekends and school holiday periods and to include the provision of a healthy meal.

The objectives of the additional funding are:

- Improved social inclusion and access to facilities to those children who otherwise would not be able to experience the services provided by the programme;
 - Provision of and education around healthy eating and healthy lifestyles; and,
 - To increase positive destinations for young people.
- 3.7 The expanded programme commenced during the October School Holidays in the Gallowhill and Glenburn areas with football and dance delivered each day with lunch provided. Similar programmes were delivered throughout the festive and Easter Spring Break periods with plans currently underway for the summer holidays.
- 3.8 An extended weekly after school programme commenced in November 2015 in Shortroods and Gallowhill Community Centres with Football, Dance and Box activities and the provision of a hot meal. Activities and other suitable locations in Linwood, Johnstone, Foxbar and Glenburn are now being considered.
- 3.9 An additional two youth buses have been introduced to support the expanded programme and increase flexibility in the areas that can be reached. A further two buses will be purchased during 2016/17. Buses are now being used to provide a more flexible and accessible alternative to the boxes that were previously located in some communities – allowing services to be more responsive to the needs of communities as they evolve throughout the year.

- 3.10 The ongoing development of the Street Stuff programme has provided volunteering and employment opportunities. During the past year a number of young people took part in an eight-week employability course with 8 progressing to traineeships, gaining work experience through the delivery of activities and working with key Community Safety Partners. Extensive training has been provided as part of their journey including: Fire safety; Manual handling; First Aid; Child Protection/Sexual exploitation; bus driver training and SFA Football Early touches. Through the training provided young people have obtained the opportunity to build up information which can be included in their Curriculum Vitae's (CVs) with a view to securing sessional work within the programme at the end of the training period. A key positive outcome for the programme is that more than 50% of staff delivering Street Stuff activities are former participants and volunteers. A number of staff have also progressed to positive destinations, some with Police Scotland and others taking up Teacher training.
- 3.11 Street Stuff has been popular this year for work experience placements with young people from local schools and colleges. Over the past year, Street Stuff has been working with 2nd and 3rd year West College Scotland dance students providing practical experience to support their studies. Three students are working as sessional staff within the programme with the Street Stuff Dance Instructor forming part of the performance panel for the College. In addition we are working with University of West of Scotland providing placements for 1st and 2nd year students within the Street Stuff programme.
- 3.12 Street Stuff participants also get involved in initiatives such as “kick and collect” and “Do Your Bit” where they take part in activities designed to improve their communities including litter picks; graffiti removal and educational awareness programmes. Each time they participate, they collect points towards rewards ranging from paintballing and go karting trips to tickets for St Mirren and Scotland football matches or Braehead Clan tickets that they would not otherwise be able to afford. Local businesses donate prizes in recognition of the contribution that young people are making, helping them to promote positive community participation and pride in local communities. Through activities of this nature Street Stuff are currently supporting 18 young volunteers as they work towards their Saltire Awards.
- 3.13 Street Stuff continued their support at the annual Safe Kids event delivered over 2 weeks in March at the St Mirren Paisley 2021 Stadium. Several workshops ranging from online safety to drugs and alcohol awareness formed part of the programme with Street Stuff staff assisting in the delivery of workshops as well as coordinating the transition of children moving between workshops. Almost 2000 P6 pupils from across Renfrewshire attended the

event and were given the opportunity to attend a St Mirren match with a parent free of charge. Around 800 people attended the match against Queen of the South in March. The programme also supported the Choices for Life event aimed at S2 pupils across Renfrewshire raising awareness of the dangers and impact of alcohol and drugs as part of the Building Safer Communities agenda.
