Declarations of Interest

There were no declarations of interest prior to the meeting.

Additional Item

The Convener intimated that there was an additional item which had not been included in the notice calling the meeting in relation to Grant Funding: Multi-area Applications and, being of the opinion that the item was urgent, authorised its consideration as item 5 below.

1. Minute of Previous Meeting

There was submitted the Minute of the meeting of the Local Partnership held on 30 September 2020.

DECIDED: That the Minute be approved.

2. Matters Arising

Active Schools

Under reference to paragraph 3 of the Minute of the previous meeting, Applications for Local Partnership Funding in Johnstone and Linwood – 2020/21, the Partnership Planning and Development Manager clarified the position in relation to applications from Active Schools, indicating that the guidance produced reflected the views of the Local Area Committees at the time that Council Departments should not apply for Local Partnership grants. He further advised that this guidance did not apply to Community Planning Partners, of which Renfrewshire Leisure Limited was one, and that Active Schools, which formed part of Renfrewshire Leisure Limited, was therefore eligible to apply for Local Partnership funding.

DECIDED: That the information be noted.

3. Johnstone and Linwood Local Partnership Budget Monitoring Report

There was submitted a report by the Chief Executive relative to the Johnstone and Linwood Local Partnership Budget Monitoring Report.

The report advised that Johnstone and Linwood Local Partnership provided funding to community groups to undertake projects. This funding was allocated from the General Grant Fund and, through the Participating Budgeting exercise, Celebrating Renfrewshire, the Youth Challenge Fund.

A table setting out the funds allocated by Johnstone and Linwood Local Partnership at its meeting on 30 September 2020 was attached as an appendix to this report. The Youth Challenge Fund component of Johnstone and Linwood Local Partnership Budget was allocated during autumn 2020 by a participatory budgeting exercise for young people aged 12-25.

Young people co-produced the process of voting and 251 young people voted in the Johnstone and Linwood area. Twelve projects for young people received a total of £21,697 funding from Johnstone and Linwood Local Partnership, which had fully allocated the budget. A full set of Celebrating Renfrewshire results was attached to the report.

The Partnership Planning and Development Manager was then heard in answer to questions from members on the report.

DECIDED: That the report be noted.

4. Covid-19: Impact on Communities

There was submitted a presentation by the Partnership Planning and Development Manager on the impact of COVID-19 on local communities.

The presentation updated members on the Community Impact Assessment work done to date; shared data from the Public Services Panel relevant to the Johnstone and Linwood Local Partnership; and outlined the Social Renewal Plan which it was anticipated would be published in Spring 2021.

The presentation highlighted the key points arising from data and research undertaken in relation to COVID-19 cases; employment and support for business; neighbourhood hubs; the distribution of 1,250 digital devices/connectivity which had been distributed in Renfrewshire through the Connectivity Scotland programme; health and wellbeing; and the results on a Public Service Panel consultation on the effects of the pandemic, and highlighted the major concerns recorded.

The presentation also detailed responses on how households were managing financially now compared to pre-pandemic; and compared the responses from the Johnstone and Linwood local partnership area to others within Renfrewshire. Approximately 869 (59%) of respondents had replied to the survey, around 90 of which were from the Johnstone and Linwood Local Partnership area.

Details were given on a programme of listening events held over winter 2020/21 facilitated by Engage Renfrewshire.

A full discussion followed in the course of which the Partnerships Planning and Development Manager was heard in answer to a number of issues raised by members of the Partnership on the presentation.

<u>DECIDED</u>: That the presentation be noted.

5. **Grant Funding: Multi-area Applications**

The Convener referred to an additional item circulated following the publication of the agenda with regard to multi-area applications and invited discussion on these.

A full discussion followed on concerns the LAP members had with regard to large organisations submitting applications to the LAPs where national funding bodies streams or their own fund-raising activities might be more appropriate; communicating to local groups in terms of availability of local grant funding; encouraging local groups to ensure they that grant requests were submitted in relation to one-off items and not general running costs; the sustainability of groups seeking funding, and the criteria in relation to fund purposes; whether the Partnership should be prescriptive in relation to the group which could apply for funding; professional fundraisers being involved in submitting applications; the perceived conflict of interest in Renfrewshire Leisure Limited applying for LAP grants; public perception in relation to the LAP granting applications submitted by faith-based groups; the degree of scrutiny undertaken in relation to grant applications; and restricting grant funding to projects in the local area and the potential resultant practical difficulties.

Johnstone and Linwood Local Partnership Budget Monitoring Report and 20/21 Funding Application Feedback

1. Summary

- 1.1 Johnstone and Linwood Local Partnership provides funding to community groups to undertake projects. This funding is allocated from the General Grant Fund and, through a Participating Budgeting exercise known as Celebrating Renfrewshire, the Youth Challenge Fund.
- 1.2 A table setting out the funds allocated by Johnstone and Linwood Local Partnership in 2020/21 and current budget position is attached as an appendix to this report.
- 1.3 Feedback from projects receiving funding in 20/21 on the outcome of projects is also attached. Due to the impact of Covid 19 on the capability of groups to successfully deliver projects, some groups have returned funding to the Local Partnership. In recognition of this situation it has been agreed that Local Partnership underspends in 2020/21 will be carried forward and added to the budget for 2021/22. For 2021/22, the normal arrangements will apply, requiring all funding to be spent by the end of the financial year with no provision for carry over to the following year.

2. Recommendation

2.1 It is recommended that the budget monitoring report and feedback from recipients of funding in 2020/21 be noted.

3. Feedback From 2020/21 Grant Recipients

3.1 Feedback on the use of Johnstone and Linwood Local Partnership funding allocated in 2020/21 was received from seven organisations.

1.Lamont Farm

Funding from Johnstone and Linwood and other Local Partnerships enabled Lamont Farm to provide a service when able to open to the public during 2020 and to enable the public to visit animals safely in the fields when other services were unavailable. Projects were also carried out via the internet, for example Zoom sessions with local children. Animal handling for children under-12 was also delivered safely.

Lamont Farm was opened July-November 2020. Over 1,000 people attended in a single day in during July.

Even during periods when the farm could not fully open, access to the Farm's fields for the public has provided a way of reducing stress and depression.

2. Paisley and District Boys Brigade Battalion Administration.

The Boys Brigade received funding from Renfrew and other Local Partnerships to run events and for Battalion Headquarters running costs. Funding enabled staff to maintain the Headquarters building and prepare it to be ready to open and function fully once lockdown restrictions eased.

3. Fordbank Scout Group

The project was to bridge the gap of availability and opportunities by helping us to provide safe weekly meetings, in a local school, for young people to learn/develop new life skills, make friends, experiences, opportunities and activities. By providing outdoor adventures, camps and activities affordably by reducing the costs passed onto parents/guardians by uniforms (at least 50%), accessories and hall/lock up let costs (at least 50%) which are the groups largest outgoings. Covid unfortunately saw a pause to Face to Scouting but fortunately our application covered a range of expenses to make Scouting more available and buy necessary equipment that was needed due to the previous expansion of the group.

We have used the money awarded to make Scouting available by buying badges, uniforms and neckies as proposed both in the current term and future term will mean we can reduce the cost to parents by offering these materials either free or greatly reduced and allow us to ensure that even those from the most disadvantaged backgrounds can have access to Scouting

We needed another mess tent just due to the growth of the group and the money has been used to purchase the second mess tent as proposed. It has yet to be used but as we start providing face to face Scouting this will provide suitable shelter that we can use if necessary for poor whether as current restrictions only allow outside meetings and in the future will support our ability to offer more young people nights away opportunities.

At the moment this project can only cover our existing members (56 young people) which has dipped as only offering an online offering until just there in April when we held our first face to face sessions. We have issued badges that the young people

have completed online throughout the lockdown. We have historically lent our mess tents out including at the Howwood Fete, offered to the various TARAs (though never actually utilised) and more recently as an outside learning space at Howwood Primary (after the summer) until the weather became too severe, but we are hoping to do so again as needed, lockdown lifts and the weather improves. We will still need to issue the uniforms which are currently in storage and will need to particularly for those who have moved between sections and grown up during lockdown and we anticipate a surge in membership however until face to face Scouting starts as we are meeting less frequently the decision was made to relax our uniform standards just until face to face meetings has settled a bit more and is more permanent.

We have issued badges that the young people have completed online throughout the lockdown at no cost to the parents keeping Scouting accessible. We have historically lent our mess tents out including at the Howwood Fete, offered to the various TARAs (though never actually utilised) and more recently as an outside learning space at Howwood Primary (after the summer) until the weather became too severe, but we are hoping to do so again as needed, lockdown lifts and the weather improves. We will still need to issue the uniforms which are currently in storage and will need to particularly for those who have moved between sections and grown up during lockdown and we anticipate a surge in membership however until face to face Scouting starts as we are meeting less frequently the decision was made to relax our uniform standards just until face to face meetings has settled a bit more and is more permanent and therefore not levying costs on our parents for whom now may be a finically harder time.

4. Johnstone Band

Johnstone Band had originally planned to present a concert, likely in the Bandstand in Houston Square, Johnstone, with a relaxed summer feel with temporary seating and information stands.

COVID-19 restrictions meant that the band has been unable to meet to rehearse or play face-to-face, and our much reduced activity has moved online. We had completed some successful collaboration videos, promoted on Facebook and Twitter, and had taken part in an online competition on YouTube.

We amended out application in the hope that we might be able to present a festive event, and supplement this with some online content. " "Yes, it was different to the original intention. Local restrictions meant that traditional full band activities did not resume for the remainder of 2020/21, and we weren't able to present an alternative outdoor concert at a later point in the year. Amateur groups were not permitted to perform in person, which meant that we couldn't perform, even in small groups outside. Instead expanded our use of video/audio recording, compiling individual "at home" recordings into a festive concert for on-line viewing.

We set up a You Tube channel and redirected funding into purchase of downloadable music, and video production. We were also able to commission a brand new piece of music, specifically for Johnstone Band. We used the new piece "Black Cart Water" as part of our programme for the Kapital Cory Online Brass Band Competition. An

international competition, where the band was delighted to achieve 3rd place in the 1st Section competition.

35 band members

Over 500 views on YouTube

Almost 4,500 views on Facebook

Over 13,000 views on YouTube as part of the Kapitol Cory Online Championships 1st Section competition first broadcast on 28th March 2021.

All band members were able to contribute to the performance virtually, and we were able to support them all throughout the year in terms of developing skills and using technology. The project helped maintain the health and well-being

We had publicity in the local press and, almost 4,500 views on Facebook and over 500 views on YouTube of the mini festive concert, plus releasing the carols individually throughout December on Facebook and Twitter mean that even more have been able to benefit from the project.

We shared the event with local organisations, schools, churches and even with the local supermarkets where we would normally be in person with carol groups.

The Scottish Brass Band Association (SBBA) presented an Advent Calendar of Carols, and used several individual videos of carols and Christmas songs recorded by the band, thus also helping sustain our wider brass band community.

Taking part in the Kapital Cory Online Championships raised the profile of Johnstone, Renfrewshire and Scotland. We are proud to represent our town and local community.

5.Johnstone Business Consortium

The award from Johnstone and Linwood Local Partnership was used to pay for Booklets to promote Johnstone, Letters to Santa for local children and a donation of cash to Every Family Deserves a Christmas Dinner Appeal Family First).

Use of the funding was as follows:

£1700 for 2000 booklets to be printed to promote Johnstone

£400 for these booklets to be delivered to 2000 houses around Johnstone and villages

£1000 donated to Every Family Deserves a Christmas Dinner Appeal

£83 for letters to Santa including letters printed, envelopes and small gift .

Beneficiaries of the project are all the people who received booklets, business in Johnstone to help promote the town centre and children who received letters from Santa.

Booklets are in conjunction with an STV advert so Johnstone Business Consortium is still analysing feedback

6.Breastfeeding Network

The award from Johnstone and Linwood Local Partnership to continue to help sustain our local breastfeeding support services. We wanted to continue supporting our existing volunteers by offering ongoing learning and developing their skills with supervision/study events and continue to support local families with breastfeeding by offering weekly support groups, attending local community events to increase public and community awareness of breastfeeding.

Over the past year due to the Covid-19 pandemic and lockdown restrictions we have continued to support our volunteers by offering frequent supervision and ongoing learning opportunities and have developed strategies online making this more accessible during the lockdown.

We have run 2 weekly online breastfeeding support groups open to parents requiring breastfeeding support and information via Zoom. We also started another weekly online antenatal breastfeeding information session for pregnant women and very new mums as all NHS antenatal classes were cancelled.

We set up other means of support by email, 1:1 phone and video call as face to face support was all cancelled. We were unable to attend the postnatal wards to offer support to newly delivered mums or any community events which were cancelled due to the lockdown restrictions. However we are working towards setting up new Walk Talk and Feed groups locally as a way of helping mums to exercise and connect with each other, reduce isolation and get breastfeeding support, which we hope will be sustainable.

We have not spent any funding on venue hire as the venues have been closed, however anticipate higher costs going forward when venues reopen.

The people who benefited from the project are the 183 attendances and 56 new mums, many who attended on more than one occasion

Our online Zoom groups are open to all across Renfrewshire and due to our own Information Governance we have been unable to store personal information and postcodes securely. New and existing breastfeeding families had access to online breastfeeding support via Zoom on 147 occasions (including during Christmas and New Year weeks)

We gave email and social media support as well as 1:1 zoom call and video chat. New parents have been particularly isolated during the pandemic as face to face support from their health care providers was severely limited and in many cases, completely unavailable being restricted to video call from health visitors and GPs. We have been a lifeline for these mums who had very little practical support from family and friends at a very vulnerable time in their lives. We know that breastfeeding rates have been rising in Renfrewshire over the last few years and evidence shows that peer support makes a big impact on helping parents achieve their breastfeeding goals.

We aim to continue with our project which was originally in our application by restarting face to face breastfeeding groups, offering support in the postnatal setting, attending community events when guidelines allow.

7.Linwood Community Council

The purpose of the project was to offer an alternative to the Christmas Light Up that is usually planned for the community.

Local schools, nurseries and services were provided with funding to enable them to plan Christmas activities under the restrictions imposed by Covid 19 to ensure safe and controlled social distanced events within their facilities.

This was different to the local activities that were carried out last year as they were open to all the local community in the same venue.

Those who benefited from the project included all the children within the education system and care home settings in the local area. It provided some Christmas cheer to people that might not have had any access to festive events due to restrictions enforced.

Feed back from some of the groups describe the fun and excitement the children had planning their own events.

TITLE:

Eligibility Of Applications For Local Partnership Funding And Options For Application Of Criteria To Assist Decision Making

1. Summary

- 1.1 Johnstone and Linwood Local Partnership members requested at the meeting held on 2 February 2021 that a report be presented regarding eligibility to apply for Local Partnership funding and the potential to apply criteria to assist in making decisions on funding applications. This request was in reference to a discussion regarding the appropriateness of large organisations applying to Johnstone and Linwood Local Partnership for funding and in particular for projects not based in the area.
- 1.2 A guidance document is available to applicants to Local Partnership regarding eligibility (see link below). The guidance seeks to ensure that applicants provide the information that Local Partnerships need to make funding decisions, including alignment with local priorities and how the local community benefits.

- 1.3 The key criteria for assessing funding applicants is fit with the agreed local priorities of each area. Local Partnerships also have flexibility to determine for themselves a methodology for determining grant allocations. Examples of this include a cap on the maximum funding awarded, the award of funding requests in full up to a specified amount and requiring feedback on any previous awards made.
- 1.4 The Johnstone and Linwood Local Partnership meeting papers for 22 June 2021 sets out applications in tables under the following categories:

- Applications with direct reference to Johnstone and Linwood local priorities located in or specific to Johnstone and Linwood.
- Applications with direct reference to Johnstone and Linwood local priorities not located in or specific to Johnstone and Linwood.
- Applications with partial or no reference to Johnstone and linwood local priorities.
- Ineligible applications.
- 1.5 This presentation is intended to provide information to the membership about fit with local priorities and link to the Johnstone and Linwood area. Prior to the meeting, members will also receive separately a proposal from the Chair outlining an indicative allocation of funding, as a starting point for discussion at the meeting.

2. Recommendation

- 2.1 It is recommended that members of Johnstone and Linwood Local Partnership:
 - (a) note the guidance provided to applicants, the presentation of applications in meeting papers and that an allocation proposal is to be circulated in advance of the meeting on 22 June.
 - (b) consider the need for further criteria to be developed in future.

3. **Background**

- 3.1 Johnstone and Linwood Local Partnership has a set of local priorities for action. Community and voluntary groups are invited to apply for Local Partnership funding for projects that align to the local priorities. At the Local Partnership meeting on 2 February 2021, members raised issues regarding the following aspects of funding allocation:
 - Large organisations submitting Local Partnership applications, when national funding or raising their own funds might be an option.
 - Groups applying for general running costs.
 - The sustainability of groups seeking funding.
 - Application of criteria in relation to the purposes of the fund.
 - Whether Local Partnerships could be prescriptive in relation to groups applying for funding.
 - Potential conflict of interest if community planning partners apply for funding.
 - Public perception in granting awards to faith-based groups.
 - Scrutiny undertaken in relation to grant applications
 - Flexibility for Local Partnerships to limit awards solely to projects in the local area and any potential practical difficulties.

- 3.2 The guidance to applicants provides a response to many of the issues raised above. Any community or voluntary group with a constitution and bank account is eligible to apply, with the merits of the application considered by the Local Partnership. All applications should be specific to the Local Partnership area and clearly state the benefit to the community. Information is provided to applicants on sources of advice to apply for other sources of funding, including national funding.
- 3.3 Groups may apply for a portion of their running costs, but not their full running costs. The guidance also states that groups should consider any award as a "one-off" and that Local Partnership funds are not intended to provide ongoing funding. Applicants are advised to consider the sustainability of their project beyond the one-year funding term.
- 3.4 Applicants are advised to make clear how their project aligns to the priorities of each Local Partnership. Information on these priorities is also made available to applicants. This provides Local Partnership members with criteria against which to assess applications.
- 3.5 As Renfrewshire Council grants, applications are open to groups meeting the eligibility criteria. All applications from eligible groups are presented for consideration by the relevant Local Partnership. While Local Partnerships do not have the authority to be prescriptive about who applies for funding, they can commission projects to be delivered by named groups. Any such proposals require to be agreed by the Local Partnership members.
- 3.6 Community planning partners, with the exception of Renfrewshire Council, are eligible to apply for Local Partnership funding, but not for core activities. As with any applicant, community planning partners present at the meeting would require to declare an interest in any application and take no part in the discussion.
- 3.7 The guidance states that applications must encourage equality of opportunities. Faith-based groups may apply for activities open to the wider community, but not for purposes related to the faith itself.
- 3.8 Applicants are required to submit documentation in relation to their bank account and constitution when making an application for Local Partnership funding. Information on applications is presented in summary form in Local Partnership papers. Successful applicants are requested to provide feedback on projects at the end of the financial year.
- 3.9 Local Partnerships have the flexibility to use additional criteria such as locality in determining awards of Local Partnership funding. However, Local Partnership funding is the main source of funding available to community groups in Renfrewshire and members may wish to consider the potential impact on Renfrewshire-wide projects if funding was to be restricted to those operating from the local area. The requirement for groups applying to more than one Local Partnership area to make separate applications setting out the benefit to

1. Summary

- 1.1 Applications for grant funding from the seven Local Partnership areas were invited to be submitted during March and April 2021, to be considered at the Local Partnership meetings due to be held in May and June 2021.
- 1.2 The available allocation for Johnstone and Linwood Local Partnership for 2021/22 is £48,203 made up of £47,044 from the General Fund and £1,159 underspend carried forward from the 2020/21 General Fund budget. The carry forward of underspend was agreed due to the exceptional circumstances of the Covid pandemic during 2020/21, which impacted on the ability of community organisations to undertake activities due to restrictions in place over the period. The normal arrangement whereby underspends cannot be carried forward into the next financial year will be reinstated for 2021/22.
- 1.3 From this total budget, a sum of £50 per community representative requires to be ringfenced for potential claim of expenses. These expenses are deducted from the available allocation for the Local Partnership. Johnstone and Linwood Local Partnership has space for fourteen community members, so the total ringfenced for expenses is £700. The total budget available for allocation by Johnstone and Linwood Local Partnership is therefore £47,503.
- 1.4 The Youth Challenge Fund component of Johnstone and Linwood Local Partnership Funding for 2021/22 is £21,697. This funding will be allocated by young people through a Participatory Budgeting exercise that will take place during autumn 2021.

2. Recommendations

2.1 It is recommended that members of Johnstone and Linwood Local Partnership consider the applications for Local Partnership grant funding, as set out below in Appendix 1 and 2.

3. **Background**

- 3.1 Applicants for funding in 2021/22 have been provided with guidance, as well as a description of the Local Priorities identified by Johnstone and Linwood Local Partnership.
- 3.2 Local Partnership members are asked to consider the applications for funding summarised at Appendix 1 and 2 of this report, and to assess these against the Local Priorities agreed by Johnstone and Linwood local priorities.
- 3.3 An initial assessment has been carried out by officers to support Local Partnership members in their decision-making. Where applications have made clear reference to the Local Priorities identified by the Local Partnership, this is identified in the first table at Appendix 1. Applications that make a partial or no reference to Johnstone and Linwood Local Priorities are summarised in the second table for example, the project may work with young people (and therefore meet the Local Priority around young people) but not deliver this directly in the Local Partnership area or make reference to how many young people from the area would be engaged in the project.
- 3.4 The priorities of Johnstone and Linwood Local Partnership are:

Key theme: Focus on young people

The Local Partnership are particularly keen to see a focus on how young people can be engaged and involved in work around the Local Priorities.

Taking pride in the look and feel of our towns

The Local Partnership want people in Johnstone and Linwood to take pride in the look and feel of their towns and their heritage, with vibrant and well-used town squares, fewer derelict buildings, and making sure the streets are clean.

What's on in Johnstone and Linwood

The Local Partnership want to explore how people know what's going on across Johnstone and Linwood. They also want to see community spaces and community events which are safe and affordable, particularly in community halls and hubs.

Roads and transport

The Local Partnership want to address a range of issues related to roads and transport, including congestion, speed, parking and public transport connections.

Community safety

The Local Partnership want to see safe spaces, both safe from crime but also safe physical environments. They also want to look at how they can, along with other community leaders, promote the reporting of crime and anti-social behaviour.

The Battalion has 143 members from the PNWC Local Partnership area. Two-thirds of the

Description of Project:

The request for funding is to support the main function of the group.

We previously operated as "The Renfrewshire Christmas Toy Bank" however now that we have dropped Christmas from our name, we run all year round. Providing new toy and gifts for children of all ages within Renfrewshire. Only giving out new gifts takes away any stigma as well as helping struggling families. This incorporates but not limited to, Christmas, birthdays, Halloween and Easter. We work in partnership with various charities, local authority organisations, NHS groups and other local projects to cover all of Renfrewshire helping as any children as possible while keeping the service fair and confidential.

We provide new toys and gifts for local children (aged 0-18, living in Renfrewshire) through a referral process. Within Paisley North and Central we work with Paisley social work, Heath Visitors, Families First, Home link workers, Home-start, The STAR Project, Pals of the Privies, The Darkwood Crew as well as Who Cares? Scotland and other legitimate organisations working with children and families. This keeps the service fair, as well as keeping vulnerable people's private information safe in line with data protection and GDPR. This also means that the above organisations work together to reduce duplication. Within the area we also have valuable volunteers that we could not operate without.

Toys and gifts that go out are always new and we work with trading standards to ensure a high level of checks are done to provide safe and age appropriate toys for local children. We believe the toy bank is a valuable resource to assist struggling parents and Carers to be able to gift the same as other local families.

The organisation has 15 volunteer and 20+ members

They have £8,177.34 in their bank account. Part of this money has been set against other items. Currently we have no gift cards left and these will need to be replenished - around £3,000 worth. As we are now running all year round for birthdays we also need to purchase more toys and teenage gifts when the shops reopen. Halloween then also needs to be accounted for.

The group have applied to all LP's for funding to enable the project to be delivered across the whole of Renfrewshire.

Who benefits from the Project?

Families and specifically children 0-18 across Renfrewshire Looked after children

It has been proven that children open up and learn through play, we make a point in ensuring that babies and toddlers have items that will grow with them and their development. Grant funding award history:

The original 20/21 Local Partnership grant application was to take a group of 6 young local musicians on our annual Ceilidh Trail tour and allow them to develop their experience of touring and performing. Unfortunately, due to restrictions around Covid-19, the tour was unable to take place. Our amended application was approved to cover our recruitment costs. This included venue hire and panel fees for our audition process. Although the tour was unable to take place, the recruitment process was a success and we have 6 young musicians waiting to take their place on our next Ceilidh Trail project in late 2021. Whilst the project is currently waiting to take place later this year, the grant award ensured we were able to recruit 6 of the best young musicians from the area. When they do eventually perform their concerts together, we anticipate reaching at least 500 people within the community through traditional music and Gaelic.

Avoiding social isolation should be at the top of everyone's list. especially after the isolation that has occurred in the past year. Getting people out of the house and when planning ahead to age in place. Being able to seek out opportunities will help prevent isolation.

Who benefits from the Project?

The ability to connect with others is crucial. When a person is aging in place, they remain in their home for as long as possible which, depending on various circumstances, could lead to social isolation and depression. There are ways seniors can avoid isolation and caregivers can encourage social interaction to prevent this from happening. This is also the case for many young and middle age adults as well.

Adults who actively participate in experiences, such as going out and making new friends. Also retaining old friendships are far less likely to experience depression, develop health problems and will most likely practice good mental and physical health habits because of the interaction with others. It doesn't matter if you retire, have health issues, experience the loss of a loved one or even have to live with less income having the ability to connect with others is crucial to avoiding any type of isolation. Here are some ideas for seniors to keep connected.

To fund running costs of the hall and provide funds to develop, maintain and improve the hall.

So far the hall has been managed exclusively by the Sea cadets. However, our funds are limited which has held back development of the hall. We are looking to get more input from other groups using the hall as well in reaching out to the local community for support and increase usage. More usage will generate more income

The hall is leased from Renfrewshire Council. We are talking to Engage Renfrewshire regards advice of how to start a community asset transfer.

We have costed 7/8 items that we need funding for so as to make repairs, and generally develop the hall;

- Running costs = Internet, hall insurance and heat/lighting
- Repairs = replace skylight in kitchen which is single glazed, ill-fitting and a security issue. We have brickwork issues that urgently need addressed. Brickwork in one corner of building is crumbling/porous
- Improvements- are to put in a permanent concrete disabled ramp, to put in a fire and burglar system & door entry system, to fit a proper steel fire escape door, and to replace carpeting

Receipt of the grant will allow us to devote more resources for hall development. The ramp will make the hall 100% accessible by wheelchair users. A new fire door will greatly improve security and safety. The fire and burglar alarm & door entry system will improve safety and hall security.

We have poor floor covering in several rooms and carpeting will make the rooms much more comfortable/inviting and reduce heating costs.

There are urgent repairs required to crumbling brickwork. A new kitchen skylight will improve security and reduce heating costs

All of the above will be outsourced to local businesses.

Who benefits from the Project?

Young people from across Renfrewshire will benefit from this project.

The Sea Cadets has 100+ members and 24+ volunteers.

Covid 19 has resulted in the complete closure hall for the last 12 months, Before this cadets /other youth groups used the hall every evening and was well used at the weekend for parties.

We are looking to further maximise hall usage especially during the day/weekends. We will be looking to encourage new groups such as playgroups/after school clubs etc. to use the hall. Our kitchen although needing upgraded is perfectly fine to use for lunch clubs as well. Increased hall usage = more income = funding running costs and maintenance.

We will be looking to obtain funds to employ a part time cleaner which is of particular importance in keeping the hall Covid secure, cleaning and to open/close the hall.

Our running costs at the moment are about £400/ month. Our heating should decrease due to summer approaching/new boiler, but due to Covid restrictions our normal funding income = bag packing/hall hire/cadet subscriptions is £nil, and we are expecting a £3,000 deficit in the next 12 months - due to just paying hall running costs. The hall has a flat roof > 25 years old, and I am looking to hold funds in reserve as a precaution.

Grant funding award history:

We received £2,000 from Gleniffer and £495 each from Paisley North West and Central/Renfrew/Paisley East.

We had a new boiler installed last month and the nest unit was installed. We didn't spend anything on stationery. All of the other costs were spent as expected.

Due to covid restrictions the hall has been shut down since mid march 2020, and is still shut down, so strictly no one directly benefitted from the project as yet. Our income for 2020/2021 is nil. In a normal year we would have received hall hire income, cadets subscriptions, bag packing income and gift aid. This was nil due to covid. All hall and cadet activities were completely suspended. The income received plugged the gap in our funding. The funding was used 100% as requested.

The funding has protected the hall for the future. Our reserves have taken a significant hit due to covid. Before the covid shut down the hall was used by sea cadets/brownies/rainbows and the local community. Approximately 120 young people/adults use the hall directly plus the local community for parties etc.

All these simple activities will be a huge step to getting these tenants back out of isolation and mixing safely with their friends again.

During these uncertain times we have had to change so many things to keep the tenants safe and with us now coming out of lockdown we will have to adapt our activities in the same way. One of the things we have added into this application is using Paisley FM our partners through this pandemic and giving something back to them by asking them to come into each complex (10) and do an outside radio roadshow that will be solely made up of their song choices. This would be a fabulous reward to them for coming through this pandemic!

What are in the process of installing all complexes with wifi once this is installed we are aiming to provide online activities. If we are able to purchase Smart TV's and Alexa's then we can get a variety of activities started that will means more people would be able to take part at different times each week and maintain social distancing.

Having internet enabled smart tvs in all of our complexes will allow us to deliver all of these activities and minimise staff movement, allowing more tenants to join in with social distancing. Tenants will be active and safe.

- 1/ Online exercise classes, that will run as often as tenants want them and tenants can challenge themselves with the strength and balance equipment.
- 2/ Online film days/nights,
- 3/ Play music to stimulate memories and reminisce the loved ones that we have lost.

Description of Project:

The club building suffers from significant dampness due to the loose and broken render on its walls allowing saturation of the brickwork, and leaks around old and damaged window frames. The windows are also thermally inefficient and allow heat to escape, so the building is both cold and damp. It is necessary to replace the render and windows in order to: (a) make the building watertight to prevent further deterioration in its structure; (b) eliminate sources of damp which have caused serious damage to the contents of the building; (c) improve thermal efficiency to save energy, reduce heating costs and allow the building to be maintained at a suitable temperature.

Dampness has been an issue for several years and the club has hitherto focussed our resources on repairing the roof. A woodworm outbreak in our layouts during 2019 highlighted the need to eliminate other sources of dampness. After several pieces of render fell off we obtained quotations for its repair, which brought to light the fact that the condition of the render was a major source of the dampness and the whole building required re-rendering. This also identified that replacement of the windows would best be done at the same time in order to prevent further damage.

The twelve large windows in the main hall will be replaced with modern energy-efficient double-glazed units. The existing damaged roughcast render will be removed and replaced with new render. The existing security grilles protecting the hall windows will then be reinstated.

All work will be carrier out by a building contractor who will be responsible for scaffolding etc. The work requires to be carried out during the drier months of summer.

Existing dampness within the hall caused by water seeping through the brickwork and leaks around windows will be eliminated.

Elimination of the damp conditions will make a recurrence of the recent woodworm problem less likely.

Increased thermal efficiency will allow the central heating to more adequately heat the structure, making it drier and more comfortable for older members. (As a separate project, the boiler has recently been replaced to further improve energy efficiency).

Description of Project:

The purpose of the project is:

(i) Secure a Festive community event for 2021.

Given all the extra challenges as a result of COVID-19, we expect it to cost more than usual to present events. Funding will help make sure that we have a safe and accessible festive event.

(ii) Creating a safe space for all - to help make the bandhall COVID-19 compliant and easy to clean. Replacing carpeting with hard flooring, and redesigning circulation space

The band was able to use Local Partnership grant funding for 2020-2021 to provide an online Christmas concert in December 2020. It was well received, but ideally, we would have a live "Christmas Brass and Voices" type event in 2021 and have alternative plans for an online event should this not be possible.

Opportunities for rehearsing and performing since March 2020 for non-professional groups have been curtailed as a result of COVID-19 restrictions. To allow the band to get back to rehearsing outdoors and indoors, and make future events a success, we will require to make substantial adjustments to the bandhall to reduce the risks of COVID-19 transmission, including aerosol transmission i.e. to support easier cleaning and to maintain social distancing in a restricted space. This is being refined in the light of current advice.

We will:

- (i) Engage appropriate band and choir workshop leaders to prepare and rehearse and enable hire of a suitable performance space and engagement of other local and voluntary musical groups for a live festive event, with regard to relevant guidance around managing events, OR alternatively prepare and publish a similar online event, OR a combination event including recording of live performance to create an online event.
- (ii) Replace carpeted flooring with easy-clean hard flooring throughout; install screening to support social distancing; install signage; canopy/gazebo to support limited safe

There are three pillars to the service Youth Interventions has created at our Hub in Linwood:

Young Persons Emotional Wellbeing service: where yp can access trained professionals (from the area) to help them manage their mental health

Young Persons recovery Service: where yp can access trained professionals to help them with drug/alcohol problems

Youth Project; where yp come to access a space to be with peers and engage with youth workers.

We remained fully operational throughout lockdown, adapting to be covid-safe.

What we discovered, was that yp have a NEED for purpose.

This project will:

give young people purpose support healthier mental/physical lifestyles increase their skillset

We remained fully operational throughout lockdown and engagement with local yp was high.

What we found:

increased instances of depression/anxiety, self harm and suicidal thoughts most yp suffering from negative impacts of COVID including gernalised anxiety caused by isolation

What we discovered was the yp's need for purpose, their gratitude for the space, and their desire to contribute.

They designed the outdoor space, and recruited the builders.

As part of the contract, it was agreed that this group of yp have health and safety training, and work alongside the builder to create the space (we are currently looking into certifications that they might be eligible for).

One of them suggested building bird boxes and wooden seats to give to the elderly community of Linwood, to raise spirits post lockdown, but also to make the place "nicer" and "prettier" and to show that yp care and can contribute.

They said that social media was "brutal to yp" during lockdown, and some of them had been harshly criticised for being outside with their friends.

The project will be delivered in the following way:

- 1. The young people will form a project committee
- 2. They will meet weekly throughout the summer months (thus ensuring engagement and purpose) to devise their action plan.
- 3. Young people will consult with the local community (how yet to be identified survey monkey etc an option)
- 4. Young people will meet with Local Community Planning Group to discuss their plan of action
- 3. The young people will interview and recruit a local tradesman/company to help them with their designs and creation of birdboxes and benches.
- 4. Young people and Youth workers will identify community partners and liaise with them around where benches could go and who will receive bird boxes (this is still undecided as they are still generating ideas).

Description of Project:

We wish to add another dimension to what we already do. Presently we teach young people how to play, create music and perform on stage then finally record their music. The final part in this journey which is just as important as recording songs is to produce music a music video for the song. The grant will be used to is to buy the equipment which is required to facilitate a new Creative Technologies and Multimedia Department.

In today's music, video is the biggest promoter of new music. Without it, it is nearly impossible to get your music listened to. To give young musicians and bands (not just the big or adult bands) a chance to be a real part of the music scene Since Covid this has been even more important as online and livestream has become more popular. The visual part of music is key.

We have a new state of the art sound recording and editing studio. We have high end equipment to do all of what we intend to do apart from professional video equipment.

The development of the new project was in direct response to the growing number of musically talented young people who never have an opportunity to further their music through video and online platforms. The aim of the project is to help young gifted artists by providing them with an opportunity to not only grow as an artist but to take their talent to another level.

We have had a demand over the years from young people to learn more about the multimedia side of the music industry as it is a major part of the marketing and raising awareness of a band or artist's work. In response we wish to expand our services to include technical subject as well as music tuition. Our newly completed recording suite is an ideal area to deliver the new subjects.

We are working towards providing young people with information and knowledge, such as how to start their own record label or music video production company. We work in partnership with professionals in the music industry who provide workshops and mentoring for young people.

With the pandemic causing live concerts and album releases to be cancelled, audiences are finding new ways to consume music from their favourite artists. And chief among

them is the music video, which accounts for 95 percent of the most popular YouTube videos.

Today, social media platforms like Facebook, Twitter, Instagram, Tik Tok and YouTube have made it possible for fans to directly interact with their favourite music videos by liking, commenting, and sharing—building entire communities of music fans in the process.

This new Department will offer RSL qualifications from Debut to Grade 8. These grades will enable students to gain a globally-recognised qualification which will reflect their skills and understanding in Creative Technologies and Media. This syllabus will give participants a complete range of skills essential to today's next generation of musicians and media professionals in order to reflect the jobs of the 21st Century.

The new Department will provide a comprehensive and concise step by step introduction covering all aspects of sound and video production – what it all is, and how to use it.

Participants will work together as a group and produce sound recordings and videos together so that by the end of the course you will collectively have completed a film for a band or a promotional video. This is a practical way of learning how all the equipment works together with the end result being a piece of work ready to go online. The workshops are informal and involve interacting with others and the course leader as well as practicing on the equipment available. Each session includes all necessary theory needed to give you a good understanding of the equipment. Students then cement this knowledge by using this equipment themselves during the practical part of the session. At the end of the course participants are able to analyse their production as well as understand how to use video equipment and have a basic knowledge in video production.

Who benefits from the Project?

This project will assist us to improve the services and provisions we currently offer.

Overall it will increase access, opportunity and participation in music by young people across Renfrewshire. It puts in place a structure that will support up and coming musicians, technicians and volunteers, enabling them to recognise and hone their talents and for that to blossom and eventually to find their place working in the music industry.

More young people will have the skills to volunteer their services to help other voluntary organisations.

The aims of the project is that students will be more employable, better equipped to apply for jobs, be more confident and have more experience to apply for a college course.

Now that we're spending more time at home, we're desperate to be entertained online. Music videos, Podcasting and Vlogging are the perfect form of entertainment for both our

eyes and ears—and they're just as good on our mobile screens as they are on our TVs. Not only do music videos ease our boredom and anxiety, they also provide us with a much-needed escape to these current crazy times.

Description of Project:

The groups aspiration for next year is to try and expand our offerings especially for older and younger members by opening a separate Explorer Section (aged 14-18) and have applied to be involved in a pilot where we will be able to offer Scouting to those aged 3-5

Although the requested funding would benefit the whole group it would primarily be used by our older Scout and the new Explorer Sections allowing us to provide more specific skills training which we cant currently offer, providing them easier access to badges and awards, giving them confidence, skills and a sense of achievement

Discussion between section leaders, the young people and the Group Executive helped us to identify that the group lacked certain specific equipment and due to the lack of 14-18 year olds currently attending the group what equipment we would need to provide a separate section for them rather than running amalgamated with the Scout Section (aged 10-14)

We have already had leaders complete training to deliver these challenging skills including Saw and Axe Training and Knife Skills training (eg for whitling) and have volunteers to run the Explorer section. The equipment will help young people aged 10+ towards their Zodiac awards (Highest Scottish camping awards). A discussion on what the group has to do to ensure that these materials are accounted for, stored and are only accessible to certain qualified individuals has already taken place.

Once we have managed to raise the funds we will purchase the equipment and will then look to deliver the training to the young people in a safe risk assessed manner.

Who benefits from the Project?

We will be able to help more young people to achieve their Zodiac, Chief Scout Awards and Explorer Awards moving forward. Reaching more young people over a wider age range particularly older young people, providing a more similar experience to groups in

Hiring a suitable accessible hall. Establish transport needs for those without their own transport. Book any entertainment or holistic therapy or activity volunteer. We are purchasing tables, chairs and catering equipment. Volunteers will assist. We hope to encourage local schools to assist as well giving pupils experience of community groups and dementia. We will start each session with light suitable physical exercise. Introducing people to existing members. Encouraging chat with one another. Making sure everyone is comfortable and at ease. We will also ask for a donation from the members to help with the costs i.e. prizes for quizzes and food.

Who benefits from the Project?

The project will create a better environment in Johnstone for those living with dementia and their carers and will increase socialisation and encourage support for carers.

A regular recognised social point of contact for those we aim to support. Increased interest and attention for our group which will add more support and encourage more people from local areas to join us. We had the opportunity to assist our carers in applying for a Lottery funded grant of up to £1000.00 to be used by the carer to solely enhance their own life. Description of Project:

Our executive committee have consulted with our coaches to hear the difficulties they are having in achieving a smooth return to activity. They have expressed concerns around the levels of disengagement in the children after being away from sport for so long.

Also the financial implications of trying to get back up and running again when fundraising opportunities have been limited for more than a year and at a time when many families are struggling with unemployment and reduced income.

We conducted a club engagement survey with 10 questions which received 230 responses. This helped us identify areas where we can help, particularly with the focus on supporting our young people.

The Back In The Game project will run from June to October 2021 and will support our children, young people and adults to transition back into sporting activity after a period of prolonged absence due to the Coronavirus pandemic.

Ensure we minimise the risk of dropout from participation sports and reduce the barriers to returning.

Give our participants the equipment to help them engage in their core activities as quickly as possible.

Help us to utilise our community space positively with the correct equipment and make the most of these.

Reduce the financial burden on participants at a time when no in person fundraising has been allowed.

We will provide all 16 of our age group teams (more than 350 participants) with resources to purchase footballs - the primary piece of equipment needed to allow our children and young people to re-engage in our core activities once again.

We will also purchase additional fun fours goals and 7s goals to allow us to increase our capacity to stage sessions and respond to the current needs.

We will use the experience and skills in programme delivery that we have built up within our executive committee and coaching teams to bring the 'Back in the Game' project to life.

Head coaches will record participation numbers from all sessions to ensure that player retention is high. Drop out figures will be highlighted.

The findings will be discussed at our regular executive committee meetings.

At the end of the 'Back in the Game' programme we will conduct an engagement survey to gauge the success of the delivery.

New classes/sessions added as a result of the programme will be retained and expanded if successful.

Who benefits from the Project?

Young people will be the primary beneficiaries of the project.

Participant groups will have the necessary equipment to get their young people back playing quickly and without the fear of having a lack of resources.

Risk of drop out will be eased as players can return immediately and without increased financial contributions. Young people will not be lost to sport and run the risk of becoming involved in other risk areas like anti-socal behaviour that could impact on community safety.

Usage of our community space will be maximised as we will have the levels of equipment required to stage and deliver sessions to participants.

We will be able to launch more programmes in the future like additional Tiny Kickers, walking football etc.

Description of Project:

To provide breastfeeding peer support and evidence based information to new families in Johnstone and Linwood. This is especially important in area of multiple deprivation which addresses health inequalities, promotes inclusion, tackles loneliness and isolation, improves maternal health and wellbeing. This then improves the confidence of young mums, enabling them to go on and do further training. We want to maintain the excellent service we already provide by supporting our existing volunteers in the area.

Across Renfrewshire breastfeeding rates remain low, with only around 20% of babies being exclusively breastfed at 6-8 weeks in the most deprived areas. Evidence shows that trained peer-support helps mums to meet their own breastfeeding goals, enabling them to breastfeed for longer. This positive impact on their own mental health improves bonding and attachment helping to alleviate postnatal depression and feelings of isolation. By having the opportunity to access skilled support and evidence based information they feel part of a supportive welcoming community. Babies not breastfed are more likely to suffer from chest, ear, urinary tract and gastrointestinal infections, and at higher risk of obesity, hypertension, heart disease, stroke, diabetes, and cancer in later life.

During lockdown we have been running 3 virtual breastfeeding groups weekly on Zoom and plan to start a new face to face breastfeeding support group in the area when the pandemic restrictions ease in line with Scottish Government guidelines. We will continue with supervision and ongoing learning for our volunteer peer supporters. This is in line with the Local Partnership's priority of families accessing local health services, supporting both mums' physical and mental health and reduces social isolation, increasing social capital. The area is already welcoming and accessible to breastfeeding families, which is also in line with the Scottish Government's Breastfeeding Friendly Scotland launched in 2019. We will work closely with other local community groups, Health Improvement and Health Visiting teams. We will attend local community events providing support to both pregnant women and new families.

Who benefits from the Project?

We will continue to support vulnerable local families within the community enabling them to continue breastfeeding for as long as they wish. They will have increased knowledge and confidence and be part of a supportive community. We anticipate supporting increasing numbers of breastfeeding families on the postnatal wards, at the groups and at local community events. We will continue to support existing volunteers by helping them increase their knowledge and skills, promote our service locally and increase knowledge in the community.

We will measure attendance at groups and events by families as well as support given via social media. By recording volunteer activity and gathering their experiences we will be able to measure increases in social capital. We will evaluate our ongoing study/supervision sessions to measure these outcomes for our volunteers. We will seek feedback from families accessing support to measure increases in knowledge and awareness around breastfeeding, and if we are meeting their needs and expectations.

Darkwood Crew would like to build on the success of their inclusive, effective and wide reaching Covid response/recovery program allowing them to tackle isolation and loneliness in an innovative and creative way whilst still observing necessary Covid related restrictions. Last spring/summer a total of 91 sessions of free social isolation bingo were hosted across every street in Ferguslie Park and also visiting Corseford on 2 occasions contributing to a real sense of community spirit and collective responsibility to emerge. This also allowed for organic support networks to form and grow as well as provide much needed relief for many residents experiencing feelings of isolation and loneliness. All children in attendance receive a small goody bag of sweets and a drink as well as everyone in attendance being offered a free 3 page triple chance session of prize social isolation bingo. A small bag of decorating materials will be made available to allow tenants and residents to decorate the street to add to the positive atmosphere and build up. It is hoped that this might encourage residents in the area to come together and think about how they might be able to organise similar activities in the area in the future. We propose to work in partnership and build on our existing relationship with Linstone Housing Association, Corseford TARA, Spateston TARA & Howood Road TARA to identify where in the areas this would be best hosted to maximise engagement and minimise any feelings of isolation.

Darkwood Crew was established prior to Covid however our activities have dramatically changed over the last year in direct response to identified community need. This proposed project will allow us to extend our social isolation bingo provision to an area which currently lacks local engagement. Our 5 key focus areas existed prior to Covid however have been exacerbated hugely. The empowering nature of the effective solutions identified have helped create an unrivalled sense of community spirit and if allowed to continue will ensure a locally led & sustainable wellbeing recovery

What we would like to do is give each family a food pack and also an activity pack for the kids. We will make up the packs and deliver them to each family within the Renfrewshire area. Each pack will consist of enough food to cover lunch and breakfast for the morning.

Activities will include outdoor play equipment and arts and crafts. This will get the children away from computers and phones if they have them. Get them back outside and get them active again. It will also bring the family together as a whole.

For a few years now we have been providing a service to families within Renfrewshire. Many of them accessed our food bank last year in which we spoke to them about their needs.

On speaking to families, it became apparent there wasn't much out there for working families. These families are forgot about. The families are struggling just as much as people on benefits.

This project will also ensure that active travel forms an integral part of our community's wellbeing recovery from the pandemic allowing local residents opportunities for safe exercise.

Own Yer Bike started off as a constituted community group in response to many bikes lying unwanted around the community. The organisation has grown and become incorporated into a SCIO. The project is entirely locally led by a board of local trustees and offers a weekly Cycle Club for local young people which has been adversely affected due to restrictions relating to covid. The need for the project developed from the recent Government cycle subsidy scheme and has resulted in us collating a waiting list of potential beneficiaries.

Allow for a pop bike repair service to be provided to visitors and customers of Tesco Linwood in their carpark every second week

Who benefits from the Project?

The project aims to provide a £50 voucher to be redeemed as part sale towards the purchase of or repair of a bike to 20 local residents across all age categories promoting healthier lifestyle choices and championing active travel as part of our recovery from the pandemic.

Providing real life work experience for 6 newly qualified bike repair specialists

Minimise landfill waste by continuing a formal arrangement with Renfrewshire Council to collect unwanted bikes from local Recycle Centres.

20 x £50 vouchers will be distributed to those on our waiting list for bike which can be redeemed either as part purchase of recycled bike or repair to an existing bike ensuring cycling is accessible to all at a financially difficult time for local families. Increase in uptake of cycling as a mode of active travel for local journeys.

Provide real life work experience at the newly established Cycle HUB in Ferguslie Park for 6 local & newly qualified bike repair specialist volunteers.

Minimise unnecessary landfill waste by continuing to collect and repair unwanted bikes from local recycling centres contributing to the creation & development of a local circular economy.
