#### RECORDING OF MEETING

Prior to the commencement of the meeting, the Chair intimated that this meeting of the Local Partnership would be recorded and that the recording would be available to watch on the Council's YouTube channel.

#### TRANSPARENCY STATEMENTS

Councillor McDonald indicated that she had a connection to Item 5 of the agenda – Parks, Play and Green Spaces - by reason of her employment by Alliance Scotland, the owner of ALISS (a Local Information System for Scotland) the database which enabled community groups to find and share information online in terms of resources, services, groups and support available in local communities. However, she indicated that she had applied the objective test and did not consider that she had an interest to declare and intimated that it was her intention to remain in the meeting and to take part in any discussion and voting thereon.

Chris Johnstone (Rainbow Turtle) and Fergal McCauley (Ralston Community Council) indicated that they had a connection to Item 6 of the agenda – Workshop Meeting - by reason of their membership pf community groups who made application for funding from the Local Partnership. However, they indicated that they had applied the objective test and did not consider that they had an interest to declare and intimated that it was their intention to remain in the meeting and to take part in any discussion and voting thereon.

#### 1 MINUTE OF PREVIOUS MEETING

There was submitted the Minute of the meeting of this Local Partnership held on 9 November 2022.

**<u>DECIDED</u>**: That the Minute be approved.

#### 2 WHITEHAUGH BARRACKS

Gary Wallace (Western Desert Recce Group) made a presentation relative to the Western Desert Recce Group and its activities, making specific reference to the proposed project to re-develop the site of Whitehaugh Barracks into a living history museum for military history in the area from the 1820's, a locus for supporting armed forces veterans, military associations and a community hub.

A summary of the proposed repair and restoration works was provided together with the planned footprint of the re-developed barracks, details of community engagement undertaken, an outline of the vision, the anticipated timeline for specific aspects of the project and details of potential funding sources.

**DECIDED**: That the information provided be noted.

#### 3 YOU DECIDE RESULTS FOR PAISLEY EAST

G Hannah, Environment and Infrastructure, provided a verbal update relative to the results of the You Decide initiative, making specific reference to the successful projects in the Paisley East Local Partnership area.

The initiative, a participatory budgeting exercise which distributed £1.2 million of Community Investment Funding in Renfrewshire, enabled local communities to decide their priorities in terms of proposed environmental and physical infrastructure improvements to be undertaken in their local area. It was noted that following extensive

community engagement a shortlist of potential projects in each local partnership area had been drafted with a public vote then being held to ascertain the preferences of the local community.

The Partnership was advised that the three projects in the Paisley East Local Partnership area which had been successful in securing funding were (i) the installation of lighting in Barshaw Park between the Arkleston Road entrance and the car park; (ii) replacement of play equipment in Jenny's Well play park; and (iii) the creation of an enclosed dog exercise area in East End park. It was highlighted that where plans existed for the Council to undertake a similar project to that which had been successful in obtaining funding, such as the replacement of the play equipment in Jenny's Well play park it was proposed to supplement the community proposals.

A summary of the activities being undertaken to progress the successful projects was provided together with details of arrangements for publication of the programme of works and the anticipated timescale for commencement of the projects.

**<u>DECIDED</u>**: That the information provided be noted.

#### 4 WINTER CONNECTIONS

S Graham, Chief Executive's Service, gave a presentation on the Winter Connections Programme, providing an update relative to the Programme and the activities available at the network of local community venues participating in the programme. Reference was made to the Winter Connections Fund which provided financial assistance to local groups to help cover the additional costs in making venues, activities and sessions available as part of the Programme developed. Details of host venues within the Paisley East Local Partnership area were provided although it was highlighted that individuals from the Paisley East Local Partnership area were welcome to attend activities in neighbouring local partnership areas. Each venue host required to confirm their acceptance of the Winter Connections principles, namely that the activities should be free and open to all. It was noted that the Programme was also available in libraries. Reference was made to the funding and promotional activity undertaken and outlined support provided to host organisations. A flavour of the activities undertaken and advice available as part of the Winter Connection Programme was provided. It was noted that an evaluation of the Programme would be undertaken in due course.

**DECIDED**: That the presentation be noted.

#### 5 PARKS, PLAY AREAS AND GREEN SPACES

I Sinclair, Communities and Housing, made a presentation on Parks, Play Areas and Green Spaces in the Paisley East Local Partnership area.

The Local Partnership was advised that the Green Spaces Fund currently had £65,000 unallocated and that applications were invited from community groups, particularly in the Paisley East Local Partnership area, for projects such as Play parks, nature reserves, community gardens and growing grounds, as the area was underrepresented in the successful applications for such projects. Details of local projects that had been successful previously in securing funding were provided.

An update was provided in respect of activities currently being undertaken by the Community Learning & Development Service. Reference was made amongst other things to (i) work undertaken in conjunction with Engage Renfrewshire in connection with ALISS.org (a Local Information System for Scotland) a database which enabled community groups to find and share information online in terms of resources, services, groups and support available in local communities; and (ii) the youth outreach survey being undertaken of young people in Renfrewshire aged 8-25 seeking their views as to what they wanted in their area. A hyperlink to the survey was provided for members of the Local Partnership (https://arcg.is/1nzbS4) together with a request that it be shared as widely as possible.

**DECIDED**: That the information provided be noted.

#### 6 WORKSHOP MEETING

S Graham, Chief Executive's Service, advised that the Paisley East Local Partnership had in previous years received a greater value of applications for funding than it had available to award. As a result, Paisley East Local Partnership members had previously discussed the desirability of agreeing a methodology to apply in principle to applications received.

Paisley East Local Partnership had previously agreed a number of priorities for the area. The agreed priorities were outlined. These priorities were used as an initial assessment of the extent to which applications meet, partially meet or do not meet the needs of Paisley East.

Potential options that could be taken into account by Paisley East Local Partnership as principles to apply to funding decisions in the 2023/24 funding round were outlined with the aim of assisting the Local Partnership to reach a consensus on funding awards. These included fully funding projects that were most preferred, which would leaving limited funding for other applications; cap the value of awards given; award a pro rata/percentage of the application funding sought; geographical considerations; further analysis on project fit with local priorities; and exclusion of applications not supplying feedback from previous awards.

It was highlighted that the options were not exhaustive or mutually exclusive and members of the Partnership might wish to explore other options.

There followed discussion.

#### **DECIDED**:

- (a) That the options for criteria to assess Local Partnership funding applications received for decision in May 2023 be noted; and
- (b) That the following principles be agreed and applied when considering funding applications for Paisley East Local Partnership in May 2023
- (c) That no cap be placed on the value of awards made;
- (d) That applications from groups located within the Paisley East Local Partnership area and meeting local priorities be prioritised.

- (e) That previous recipients of grant funding not submitting feedback, having been issued with a reminder, be excluded from consideration of future funding and
- (f) That the options papers developed in due course, detailing proposals to help determine awards, which would act as a starting point for discussion be circulated to all members of the Local Partnership as soon as possible prior to the next meeting.

#### 7 GRANT AWARDS IN PAISLEY EAST AREA NOVEMBER 2022-JANUARY 2023

There was submitted a report by the Chief Executive relative to awards made in the Johnstone and Linwood Local Partnership area to local community and voluntary groups since the last meeting of this Local Partnership held in November 2022. Details of awards made from various sources which included: Winter Connections, Community Health and Wellbeing Fund (Engage Renfrewshire), Culture, Heritage and Events Fund and Alcohol and Drugs Recovery Change Fund was provided.

<u>**DECIDED**</u>: That the grant awards made to community and voluntary groups in the Paisley East Local Partnership area since November 2022 from funding sources other than the Local Partnership be noted.

## 8 PAISLEY EAST LOCAL PARTNERSHIP BUSINESS ARRANGEMENTS

There was submitted a report by the Chief Executive relative to the timeline and arrangements for the 2023/24 round of applications for Local Partnership funding.

The report advised that applications to the 2023/24 round of Local Partnership awards would be open for six weeks from Friday 24 February to Monday 10 April 2023. Updated guidance

would be issued to applicants, with opportunities for applicants to attend support sessions to obtain advice and receive answer to queries about the process. The applications would be processed and be submitted to the May 2023 cycle of Local Partnership meetings for consideration and determination.

**<u>DECIDED</u>**: That the timeline for the 2023 round of applications for Local Partnership funding be noted.

## 9 PAISLEY EAST LOCAL PARTNERSHIP BUDGET MONITORING 2022/23

There was submitted a report by the Chief Executive relative to the Paisley East Local Partnership budget for 2022/23.

The report advised that the Local Partnership provided funding to community groups to undertake projects through a range of grants in terms of the General Grant Fund, Paisley Common Good Fund and, following a participatory budgeting exercise, the Celebrating Renfrewshire Fund. Appendix 1 to the report detailed the funding allocated at the meeting of the Paisley East Local Partnership held on 14 June 2022 together

with the current budget position, while Appendix 2 detailed feedback received from community groups awarded funding during 2021/22.

**<u>DECIDED</u>**: That the budget monitoring and feedback report be noted.

We achieved all of the priorities and these are all part of our strategic intentions:

Isolation and Loneliness

This equipment has helped hundreds of people with disabilities and mobility issues hire free or low-cost equipment to get them out of their house or residential setting. Even post pandemic, we know many of our members are still hesitant to go out and lack confidence.

Our role has been to connect with our members and let them know we have existing and new equipment to enable them to be independent and make choices to improve their life and health options. We've had over 500 hires of this equipment over the course of the year and our membership has increased which is a positive as more people are utilising the service.

We surveyed members who hired equipment and the findings are noted below:

100% told us they would lose their independence if we were unable to provide our service

100% said they would require support to look after their care needs

64% wouldn't be able to care for their family

98% confirmed their condition would significantly worsen

97% would be less connected and lonely/isolated

It's clear from the above data that our members do benefit greatly from our service, which you have invested in and we and our members sincerely appreciate this. Enabling and connecting with people is essential and our role in this is to ensure that those with disabilities and mobilities are able to join other funded projects or just get out and do whatever they need by offering them choice. Our belief is that we should not forget about those who struggle with disabilities or mobility issues.

Publicise the existence of ice hockey in Renfrewshire through local media, maintaining a significant profile which promotes Paisley & Renfrewshire as an ice hockey landmark.

How many people benefitted from/accessed your project?

We have seen an increase in our fan base at our Paisley Pirates games & indeed our newly created junior team, from all over Renfrewshire. Our numbers have increased dramatically on the social media platforms too, again, from all over Renfrewshire & further afield, including many other countries outwith the UK.

Examples of our current social media numbers are;

How did your project benefit people in the community?

(What outcomes did you achieve? Please describe the impact your project had on its participants)

One of our Junior Development players has made the u16 Great Britain team, who will compete in competition in Riga, Latvia, later on this month (April) along with our Head Coach Ian Turley, who is also one of the GB u16 Coaches.

We also have several of our u19 team who have made the Scotland teams this season.

The Pirates have had played in what has been described as the most competitive league seasons ever in the Scottish National League. Right up until the last game of the season, the Pirates still had a chance of winning the league, however, they finished 4<sup>th</sup> due to losing their last league game – The difference from 1<sup>st</sup> place to 4<sup>th</sup> was only 6 points.

The Pirates also made it through to the Scottish Cup Semi Finals, losing a chance in the final by 1 goal.

The Play Off Finals weekend is one of the most prestigious events in the SNL (Scottish National League) to which the Pirates are one of the 4 Finalists – This event takes place over the 8<sup>th</sup> & 9th April in Edinburgh.

The Paisley Pirates had also chosen to support the ULTIMATE WARRIORS by having their logo on our team home & away tops. The Ultimate Warriors are a Paisley based registered Charity supporting children and parents affected by Autism.

Whilst the Paisley Pirates & Lightning Pirates have the Renfrewshire Council logo on both teams short covers.

During the Festive Season, we make contributions to Food & Toy Banks

During the summer months we engage with the community at various Gala Days – Renfrew, Barshaw & Ferguslie – with our team mascot Shivering Timbers, who is always delighted to pose for photographs with children, adults & 'dare I say it' recycled teenagers. ©

What priorities did you tell us your project would meet?

Our priority is to promote social engagement for adults with learning disabilities in and around the Renfrewshire area, to help reduce social isolation and loneliness and increase general health and wellbeing. We provide opportunities for people to meet new people, have fun and build strong friendship groups.

Our aim has always been to use main stream venues to host our events – local cafes, pubs, restaurants and parks etc, so that our members become more visible within their communities and therefore more accepted, as well as becoming more familiar with these environments and therefore more confident.

We want to build up people's support network so they have people they can rely on other than paid for carers or family members. We want our members to feel valued, included and active participants in their communities, rather than silent bystanders with no voice. Adults with learning disabilities have as much right as the next person to form meaningful relationships and feel a part of the communities in which they live.

What did you want to do with the money & what did you spend it on? (was this different to what you originally intended? If so, please explain).

We used the money to target adults with learning disabilities living in Paisley North West and Central, Paisley East, Gleniffer and Renfrew. Our Community Engagement worker engaged with local GPs, pharmacies, West College, Renfrewshire Carers Centre, community hubs, and local advocacy services.

We created new A5 flyers to send to these organisations, and invited them to contact us for more information. Our Engagement Worker then followed up with phone calls and face to face meetings, with the aim of boosting awareness for Dates-n-Mates within the local area.

New pop banners were designed and purchased, to be used not only at events, but also as a backdrop for our stand during information sessions and presentations to Service Users and Service Providers.

In addition, we purchased new point of sale materials to use on information stands, including plastic flyer holders, branded table cloth, branded pens etc.

We also used funds to pull together a full monthly programme of social activities in a number of venues across Renfrewshire, including pubs, restaurants, coffee shops, Crazy Golf, Cinema tips and lost more. This

involved the design and print of event flyers, as well as postage and follow up contact with members to confirm attendance. It also helped towards volunteer and staff travel expenses to get to and from events.

In addition, some funds went towards resources to use during the delivery of our workshops, and also towards the rental of Community Spaces to deliver these workshops. Our last workshop was on "Boundaries and Personal Space", and was held in January in the Tananhill Center.

We also used some of the funds to further develop and expand our Friendship Matching and Chaperoned Dating programme, where members of similar likes and interests could meet up on a one to one basis with a volunteer or staff member. This helps build the foundations from which to develop a stronger friendship. Our Community Engagement worker would either identify which members they thought might make a connection, or members themselves would ask us to arrange matches. Again, travel costs for the staff member or volunteer who was facilitating the friendship match, was covered by the money supplied by the Local Partnership.

Some funds were also used to pay for entertainment costs at our annual Halloween and Christmas parties, as well as decorations for each event and again, travel costs for staff and volunteers.

How many people benefitted from/accessed your project?

(If you have received funding from more than one Local Partnership, please tell us how many your project reached in each Local Partnership area)

We currently have 45 active members, and 3 pending members. In addition, we have 9 paused members. Some of these are due to renew and others come along to all our "open" events – eg Halloween and Xmas parties etc

Renfrew – 10% of our membership

Paisley North West and Central – 50% of our membership

Paisley East – 35% of our membership

Gleniffer - 5%

We provide a way for adults with learning disabilities to meet new people, make new friends and build lasting relationships, which in turn makes them feel more valued, more included and a more active member of their communities.

Our members became more familiar with how to use public transport and many are now able to navigate to our events in Renfrewshire without the need to be met off the bus or at the train station. And because we use the same venues, they become familiar to our members who consequently become more confident in using them not just when they are at a Dates-n-Mates event, but when they are out on their own. They also become more confident in being able to order from a menu without assistance, or order a drink from the bar. These may see like baby steps to many, but they can be huge leaps to our members.

Through our friendship matching programme, many of our members have made solid friendships with others, and now meet up independently of a Dates-n-Mates event to go to the pub, or a trip to the cinema.

The impact our service has on our members is tremendous. Through our monthly coffee and cake chats, we can see how some develop from socially awkward and quiet, to gradually building a confidence and an understanding that what they say will be listened to and is important. Others remain quiet and introverted, but they still come to all the events and love just feeling part of something, even if they don't take part.

Thousands of parents and carers were able to gift their children with without the children knowing where the presents had come from. This dignified response helps not only financially but mentally, taking off pressure for local families. The same approach applies to Halloween and Easter, again ensuring we can reach as many areas as possible. Our gift card appeal allows young people to have a choice, something we believe strongly in and want to always include teenagers who can often be a challenging age to buy for. Organising the appeals also takes a huge pressure off of many third sector organisations that can refer to the Toy Bank such as Pals of the Privies, Glenburn Stronger Communities, EBI Unites, The STAR Project, Homestart, Who Cares? Scotland, The SPACE Project, Family Nurse Partnership etc. With children learning through play, the toy bank helps to provide educational gifts supporting with learning and creativity.

We are looking to get more input from other groups using the hall as well in reaching out to the local community for support and increase usage. What did you want to do with the money & what did you spend it on? (was this different to what you originally intended? If so, please explain).

The funding was to be used for hall running costs and to fund hall improvements.

When I first did the submission, I hadn't taken into account how much electricity and gas costs would increase. This has been quite a shock to me. Gas costs are up by around 130 to 140%, from around £1,000 per annum to around £2,400. Electricity is up by 40%. The increase will be £1,800 more than I anticipated. The focus on using the funding has been on using the funding against these running costs. We will look to get the disabled ramp done in the next couple of months. Internet and hall insurance costs were on budget. The other improvements. We are presently costing getting the skylight work completed in the next 4 to 6 weeks.

We have spent money this year on improving lighting (changing to low power LED fittings) and major upgrades to toilets especially the disabled toilets.

Including all of the youth groups using the hall, parties etc, slimming world etc. – the number would be at least 300 – 400.

The hall is also used as a polling station for elections.

The hall continues to be used as a community asset. The grant has allowed us to focus on keeping the hall open, warm and welcoming and continue with hall improvements.

#### Walking Football

Deliver a weekly walking football session with the aim to reduce isolation and loneliness within men and positively affect the gents overall mental and physical health. The plan was to help increase usage in the Seedhill football complex within the heart of Seedhill and focus on delivering a community activity that males are more likely to participate in.

#### A Weekly Photo

Organising a weekly photo walk with a professional photographer for 16 weeks, with the vision of purchasing secondhand equipment. The group would return for lunch giving the group the opportunity to talk about their pictures snapped along the way. Many of the people who live close to each other don't know each other and the lunches were a real point of connection. The photo walks have the potential to engage with local residents about their ideas on the regeneration of the area.

What did you spend it on? (was this different to what you originally intended? If so, please explain).

#### **Walking Football**

Walking football commenced Aug 2022 at Power League Paisley, over the last 10 months the team has continued to grow. The gents opted to move indoors through the winter, this was moved to Paisley Lagoon. With the mild winter it returned to Power League at the beginning of March 23. The team started with 4 players in August and by the 4<sup>th</sup> week there were 10 players from there the group continues to grow. There is a core of 8 gents that regularly attend with the others dropping in and out. We have 25 registered attendees, and the group often moves to a 7 a side pitch to play. We have set up a WhatsApp walking football group to help with communication, this

has now become a place where the gents have a laugh with each other and confirm numbers for the week ahead. The gents now organise meetings out with the walking football session and take part in alternative activities. The group have created a strong, welcoming community team and they enjoy a cuppa with a catch up after the session. The money has covered the cost of the pitch/hall hire, coach and indoor goals, bibs, and balls.



Unfortunately, the plan to deliver the football at Seedhill playing field never aspired due to complications with school bookings.

#### **Walking Photo Walk**

Seedhill Walks Project // Mapping the Urban Environment Report

Starting on the last Saturday of October 2022 and ending on the last Saturday of January 2023, this series of walks had a core group of participants and a few others that came and went depending on the week. Overall, 10 individuals took part in the project. The outcome was to recognise aspects and areas they might not noticed in their environment before, paying special attention to their urban surroundings. We also hoped that participants would pick up some basic



photography skills and be able to evolve their confidence with a camera as the weeks went along.

The activities set out at the beginning of each walk were varied. Some days we'd explain a technical concept (like movement, light, framing, scale, colour) and ask participants to play with those elements as they took photos during our walk. Other days we'd introduce a more conceptual theme (like journeys, destinations, celebration) and ask participants to take photos that represented their own interpretation of those themes.

One particularly successful task was to use a random adjective generator and give everyone a different word which they had to represent in their photos and then present to the others. Along the way we supported participants to make the most of their camera phones and even

professional cameras - exploring new settings, etc.... One participant who joined for most weeks learned how to edit and post her photos online as part of the project.



The Wrap-Up At the end we made postcards of each participant's favorite photo they had taken & gave them several copies so they could send out the cards to friends and family. We also traced our paths on the map shown above and discussed the new discoveries and favorite adventures.

#### **Walking Football**

Across the UK, the gender split is roughly 49% male, 51% female. The local area around PA1 3PD is predominantly male (58%), where currently 75% of woman participate in organised group activity where only 25% of men attend. The walking football has brought a continually growing group of men all ages together to keep physically active, while reducing isolation. The gents have created a warm, welcoming, and supportive environment that has helped its success.

During the last 10 months there have been many health ailments between the group, from hip replacements, brain surgery and back surgery. During the gent's recovery they have all visited the sessions and stayed for a catch -up. Having such a low percentage statistic of men versus woman participation the outcome of the walking football has been a success.

#### **Photo Walks**

The community element of it was massively improved by our ongoing contact through the week via closed Facebook & WhatsApp groups. In them, participants would regularly share their photos (even ones taken elsewhere) and other inspiring content. The coffee & bacon roll & chat at the end of each walk became almost as important a ritual as everything else. Many in the group are keen to meet again, even outside doing photo walks.

Section 3 – Impact 3.1 How many people benefitted from/accessed your project? (If you have received funding from more than one Local Partnership, please tell us how many your project reached in each Local Partnership area)

Over the year 2022 – 2023 we provided face-to-face services for 250 individuals. Because of the nature of many of our activities (e.g. weekly drop-in language café launched Sep 2022) and sensitivities around service users identities, it is not possible to gather statistics on all participants addresses – e.g. displaced persons living in hotel accommodation.

How did your project benefit people in the community? (What outcomes did you achieve? Please describe the impact your project had on its participants) We were able to deliver all of our objectives outlines in previous sections.

This includes our women's sewing and creative skills workshops, with an average attendance of 30 participants. Two of our younger volunteers achieved Saltire Awards.

We obtained charitable status (SCIO) in April 2023. Our LAP funding was used to buy budget sewing machines to allow refugees to practise their sewing at home, a skill for life, and pass the skills and benefits on to their whole family. This was reinforced by our participation in the Climate Fringe Festival 2022, and thanks to our Renfrewshire Community Climate Funding we had in-house Make do & Mend sessions, bringing damaged or poorly fitting clothing to workshops for skills training.

A further grant from Stop Climate Chaos Scotland gave us the opportunity to buy equipment to film and edit several quick fix sewing tutorials, again encouraging the repair of clothing that may otherwise be discarded.

We provided free outreach workshops in Williamsburgh Primary school for the parents of their pupils from the refugee community, identified by teachers as being isolated and needing support in integration and learning English. We don't have data to accurately identify exactly how many people were impacted here. Post pandemic, we hope that we simply got people to hear about the Boys' Brigade whether on-line or by hearing about us at a school or church. In terms of numbers:

**Renfrew** – we had 63 boys, we now have 58. There is always natural attrition as older boys leave so this result was disappointing. Part of the reason here in uncertainty regarding the future of the church.

**Johnstone** – we had 57 boys, we now have 58, so a little success here.

Paisley East – we had 26 boys, we now have 28 boys, so again some success here.

**Paisley North, West and Central** – we had 104 boys, we now have 120, so this has been a great success.

As above, we hope that we simply got people to hear about the Boys' Brigade whether on-line or by hearing about us at a school or church. It's very difficult to attract boys to a church organization in today's world so anything to get our message out there is deemed a success.

# Applications for Local Partnership Funding To Paisley East Local Partnership 2023/24

### 1. Summary

- 1.1 Applications for grant funding from the seven Local Partnership areas were invited to be submitted during March and April 2023, to be considered at the Local Partnership meetings due to be held in May 2023.
- 1.2 The available allocation for Paisley East Local Partnership for 2023/24 is £64,647 made up of £52,247 from the General Fund and £12,400 from Paisley Common Good Fund.
- 1.3 From this total budget, a sum of £50 per community representative requires to be ringfenced for potential claim of expenses. These expenses are deducted from the available allocation for the Local Partnership. Paisley East Local Partnership has space for eleven community members, so the total ringfenced for expenses is £550. The total budget available for allocation by Paisley East Local Partnership is therefore £64,097.
- 1.4 The total value of applications for funding received is £119,746.76
- 1.5 The Youth Challenge Fund component of Paisley East Local Partnership Funding for 2032/24 is £24,095. This funding will be allocated by young people through a Participatory Budgeting exercise that will take place during May 2023 with decisions announced in June.

- 1.6 Following a discussion at the February meeting of Paisley East Local Partnership, the following approach was decided to consideration of grant applications for 2023/24:
  - no cap be placed on the value of awards made.
  - applications from groups located within the Paisley East Local Partnership area and meeting local priorities be prioritised.
  - previous recipients of grant funding not submitting feedback, having been issued with a reminder, be excluded from consideration of future funding.
  - the options papers developed in due course, detailing proposals to help determine awards, would act as a starting point for discussion and be circulated to all members of the Local Partnership as soon as possible prior to the next meeting. The option proposal is now included in this paper as an additional column with a proposal for funding.

### 2. Recommendations

2.1 It is recommended that members of Paisley East Local Partnership consider the applications for Local Partnership grant funding, as set out below in Appendix 1 and 2.

### 3. **Background**

- 3.1 Applicants for funding in 2032/24 have been provided with guidance, as well as a description of the Local Priorities identified by Paisley East Local Partnership.
- 3.2 Local Partnership members are asked to consider the applications for funding summarised at Appendix 1 and 2 of this report, and to assess these against the Local Priorities agreed by Paisley East.
- 3.3 An initial assessment has been carried out by officers to support Local Partnership members in their decision-making. Where applications have made clear reference to the Local Priorities identified by the Local Partnership, this is identified in the first table at Appendix 1. Applications that make a partial or no reference to Paisley East Local Priorities are summarised in the second table for example, the project may tackle social isolation (and therefore meet the Local Priority around social isolation) but not deliver this directly in the Local Partnership area or make reference to how many people from the area would be engaged in the project.

### 3.4 The priorities of Paisley East Local Partnership are:

### **Exploring the impact of new housing developments**

The Local Partnership want to explore how they influence planning decisions around new developments, and make sure that the infrastructure is in place to support these developments, for example, roads, schools, and nurseries. They want to explore how community benefits might be used to support this.

### Supporting social connections

The Local Partnership want to support social connections to tackle isolation and promote mental health and wellbeing. They want to see groups in the local area working together, swapping skills, and sharing resources.

### **Community pride and safety**

The Local Partnership want to see the care and maintenance of their spaces across their area, so they are clean, safe, and attractive spaces. They want to see these spaces used to promote good wellbeing across the area.

### **Tackling food poverty**

The Local Partnership wants to tackle food poverty in the area to ensure that people are able to access supplies of food where they need it. As part of this, the Local Partnership wants to see a reduction in the amount of usable surplus food wasted and the sustainable use of resources to be key features of work to tackle food poverty.

### **GRANT APPLICATIONS RECEIVED BY PRIORITY THEME**

Paisley East Local Partnership grant application forms – amount available £64,097 (£52,247 from the 2023/24 General Fund and £12,400 from Paisley Common Good Fund minus £550 expenses). The total value of applications received is £106,485.15.

Our purpose is to bring adults with learning disabilities together to build and strengthen social connections and to reduce social isolation to help improve the mental health and wellbeing of our members. We aim to get more people involved in their local communities, and to feel valued and active participants in these communities. We want to give our members the confidence to travel independently across Renfrewshire, and to become more visible in mainstream venues and therefore more confident and more accepted by the rest of society.

SCLD's report on relationships in 2020 noted that only 5% of adults with learning disabilities lived with a partner, as compared with 56% of the general population. And only 3% were married as against 47% of the general population. Traditionally adults with learning disabilities have been discouraged from forming friendships and relationships, and the subject of sex is totally taboo. Dates-n-Mates was developed to give our members the opportunity to have the same social experiences as the rest of the adult population.

We run a monthly programme of events in mainstream venues across Renfrewshire to give our members the opportunity to meet new people, make friends and build lasting meaningful relationships. We also provide workshops around confidence building, self-esteem, and sexual health, to equip our members with the knowledge they need to take control of their own lives and be responsible for their own actions. We offer a Friendship Matching Programme so members can meet on a more personal level to forge a stronger connection, based on similar interests.
