2 Renfrew Local Partnership Budget Monitoring Report

There was submitted a report by the Chief Executive relative to the 2021/22 budget allocated to this Local Partnership. An appendix to the report detailed the distribution of funds.

The report advised that the 2021/22 budget allocated from the General Grant Fund of £112, 383.64 for this Local Partnership had been awarded to local groups. In addition, £18,657 had been awarded to local youth groups from the Celebrating Renfrewshire Fund.

<u>DECIDED</u>: That the report be noted.

3 Renfrew Pipe Band Competition

There was submitted a report by the Chief Executive relative to funding for the Renfrew Pipe Band competition to be held on 23 July 2022.

Renfrew Local Partnership was asked to consider allocating £10,000 from the Renfrew Common Good Fund to add to the existing funds already being invested by Renfrewshire Council, for the new Renfrew Pipe Band competition being held within Robertson Park on Saturday 23rd July 2022. The investment would be used to provide a wraparound free family programme of activities for local families and visitors to enjoy, increasing the dwell time in the park and complement the Pipe Band Competition activities.

<u>**DECIDED**</u>: That a funding allocation of £10,000 from Renfrew Common Good Fund in 2022/23 to enhance the programming activities as part of Renfrew Pipe Band competition be approved.

3 Applications for Local Partnership Funding To Renfrew Local Partnership 2022/23

There was submitted a report by the Chief Executive relative to the applications for Local Partnership grant funding.

The report intimated that the available allocation for Renfrew Local Partnership for 2022/23 was £111,843 once the sum ringfenced for expenses had been deducted, made up of £40,453 from the General Fund and £71,740 from Renfrew Common Good Fund.

The Youth Challenge Fund component of Renfrew Local Partnership Funding for 2022/23 was £18,657. This funding would be allocated by young people through a Participatory Budgeting exercise that would take place during autumn 2022.

An initial assessment of the applications had been carried out by officers to support Local Partnership members in their decision-making. Applications For Local Partnership Funding To Renfrew Local Partnership 2022/23

1. Summary

- 1.1 Applications for grant funding from the seven Local Partnership areas were considered at the Local Partnership meetings held in June 2022.
- 1.2 Renfrew Local Partnership awarded at the meeting on June 2022 £86,639 from its total budget available for distribution of £111,843, leaving a total amount available for allocation of £25,204 (£339 from the General Fund and £24,865 from Renfrew Common Good Fund).
- 1.3 Two applications for funding, to the total value of £25,010 have been submitted to Renfrew Local Partnership for decision at the 8 November 2022 meeting.
- 1.4 The Youth Challenge Fund component of Renfrew Local Partnership Funding is £18,657. This allocation of this funding by young people through a Participatory Budgeting exercise during autumn 2022 is reported separately at this meeting.

2. Recommendations

2.1 It is recommended that members of Renfrew Local Partnership:

Consider the applications for Local Partnership grant funding, as set out below in Appendix 1 and 2.

3. Background

- 3.1 Applicants for funding in 2022/23 have been provided with guidance, as well as a description of the Local Priorities identified by the Renfrew Local Partnership.
- 3.2 Local Partnership members are asked to consider the applications for funding summarised at Appendix 1 and 2 of this report, and to assess these against the Local Priorities agreed by Renfrew Local Partnership.
- 3.3 Successful applicants for Local Partnership funding are required to spend the award on the activities outlined in the application.
- 3.4 Where an applicant wishes to amend the activities that it wants to provide to a significant extent from that stated in the original application, the Local Partnership is required to agree this.
- 3. 5 The priorities of the Renfrew Local Partnership are:

Bringing Renfrew Town Centre to life

The Local Partnership want to see more things to do in the town centre, particularly encouraging local events and seeing more happening in the evenings. They want to do this by making best use of community assets and spaces, including working with the town centre business community.

Moving around and connectivity

The Local Partnership want the economic investment in Renfrew to benefit the local community, particularly making it easier for people to get around the town, and to travel to and from Renfrew.

Making the most of public assets

The Local Partnership want to see the maximum use of public resources, such as parks and outdoor spaces, as well as maximising the use of buildings in the community.

Strengthening social connections

Improving social connections and tackling social isolation is a key these for the Local Partnership, and the Partnership recognise this affects all ages, including younger and older people. Community events and activities are important, as will be a focus on improving health and well-being locally.

Key Theme: Maximising economic impact

The Local partnership want to see a focus on boosting the economic outcomes for people in Renfrew and how this can support their Local Priorities.

Purpose of the project

To improve social connections for people in Renfrew. To share experiences / knowledge. Getting together reduces isolation and improves health and wellbeing. We provide activities and entertainment to engage the members.

It was identified through community engagement - asking members what they would like from the group. The outcome from this showed that people wanted to get together to socialize with their peers, to share experiences, to learn and take part in activities. Being part of the group helps to reduce isolation and improves health & wellbeing and also improves social connections - friendships are made, recipes are shared.

What will the project do?

The group meets weekly on a Thursday from September through to the end of May. Each week we provide afternoon tea and an activity. This can range from talks from community police officers, fire brigade and other locals. We are planning a visit from an energy advocate to discuss ways to support people through the energy crisis. There is entertainment events (singers, comedians etc), weekly bingo, flower arranging etc. For health & wellbeing, the group engage with the Eat Better to Feel Better and have cooking demonstrations.

Anticipated Outcomes:				

The sensory garden is an ideal space for people to connect with nature, have sensory stimulation, participate locally and feel a sense of community. It reduces stress and allows a space to reflect, meditate and relax. A creative plan of planting will enable experiences of sight, smell, sound, touch and taste, the perimeter of the area will be enclosed by shrubs and bushes and an annual community flower display will feature. The adjoining area will have fixed picnic tables and benches, extra seating, outdoor games and

community growing spaces.

This project directly links to the local priority of making the use of public assets. Robertson Park is a large space that is often underused and sometimes even overlooked. It has huge potential and creating a sensory garden and community space gives people a reason to get back in to the park beyond the calendar of special events. It is a community space and this project will help create more opportunities for the community of Renfrew to enjoy the park, feel connected and be proud of their town.

Feedback On Renfrew Local Partnership Awards 2021/22

Community groups awarded funding from Renfrew Local Partnership in 20021/22 were asked to provide feedback regarding the progress of their project and benefit to the local community. Attached below is feedback received for awards made by Renfrew Local Partnership.

FR1055-58 - Paisley Pirates Ice Hockey Club

Project – Provision of Ice Awarded - £10,870.20

LP Area(s): Renfrew - £4844.64, Paisley East - £2437.95, PNWC - £2587.61,

What did you want the money to do?

Get the Paisley Pirates back up & running after 21 months away due to the COVID pandemic. The financial support from Renfrewshire Council was crucial to our survival & ongoing legacy, which has been in existence since 1946.

What did you spend it on?

Provision of Ice

How many people benefitted from/access your project?

Many people (young/old) have benefited from ALL Local Partnerships in the Renfrewshire area, even although some of these partnerships turned down our application.

The community-wide benefited through our live events (Games at Braehead) &/or via social media outlets such us YouTube, Facebook, Twitter, Instagram & TikTok. The local press, namely Paisley Daily Express also featured (& continue to do so) the Pirates on a weekly basis.

The COVID pandemic caused many, if not a large majority of people within the community to feel isolated, lonely & depressed. However, our varied social media streams & the gradual increase of our live events, gave people a focus & way of interacting with others, whilst enjoying the sport they love.

How did your project benefit people in the community?

The biggest impact to our community, was that Paisley Pirates have come through a major pandemic - COVID 19, which saw our team 'frozen out' for 21 months. However, through sheer determination & financial support from Renfrewshire Council, we have managed to survive & continue our legacy, which has been in existence since 1946.

Many of our players have been suffering from mental health issues stemming from COVID, as restrictions prevented participation of our sport. Our gradual return to play was of huge benefit, not only to our players, but management, volunteers & indeed our Renfrewshire wide supporters. The commencement of competitive games, which was our ultimate goal, as games made a huge difference everyones

mental wellbeing.

All of our social media streams have seen a steady increase in numbers this season (avg 21.6%). Follower numbers are as follows; Facebook 2806, Twitter 2499, Instagram 844. We have also introduced TikTok to our growing media streams this season.

How can you evidence the impact of your project?

We wanted to buy big televisions so that when socializing in the lounge area together the tenants could watch or interact with digital and technology. Have outside roadshows with our local radio station and online exercise classes.

We have 280 tenants living within Renfrewshire so with the multi money we received we were able to provide them with a new 50" TV with all the extras. They could access online facilities including exercise classes and interact with other complex through technology.

Through our poetry/creative writing classes online our tenants were able to create work that we shared with the community on billboards and on the NCN route 7 cycle path.

Paisley FM came along and did their gigs outside so this was a huge benefit to the community as they were able to be outside safely and listening to the music.

With our creativity we have got the message to others to get onto the cycle path and look for our poetry boards that stretch 4 miles from Paisley George Street to Johnstone Morrisons.

Forever Young have also been recognized in many areas and this year has been give the Provost Community Group of the Year Award, this has been an honour.

We can evidence by the way our tenants have engaged with technology, they loved being able to keep the exercise going and now even better as they are able to do it safely back in the lounge altogether. Paisley FM was a godsend during lockdown, they came along and provided music entertainment in all weathers so our tenants could have a bit of fun.

Due to the reduction in funding we just down scaled everything and finished the projects a bit quicker, but all still gave the same impact.

Almost 2,700 children received Christmas gifts, over 750 Halloween costumes were given out, 3,800 easter eggs and over 1000 birthday gifts – a total of 8,250 gifts out in a year to children in Renfrewshire.

Providing parents and guardians with new toys and gifts helps to reduce stigma as there are no links to the toy bank as all gifts are of a high quality and quantity, the same as children's peers. This also helps reduce to risk of families getting into debt at Christmas, knowing that their children will get to enjoy the magic of Christmas.

With the rising cost of living providing Halloween costumes has been a vital service this year and feedback from groups and parents highlights this. With school Halloween discos, the toy bank can help reduce financial pressure from families while tackling stigma by providing new high-quality costumes in a range of accessible locations throughout Renfrewshire. The same applies to Easter.

Birthday gifts are always given out, as much as I have said above that 1000 children have had gifts we know this number is higher. Organisations that work with have "birthday boxes" with toys and gifts suitable for children that they work with. This model came about due to covid. This means gifts are already with organisations and we provide top ups when needed. When a top up is needed, have more accurate figures.

We purchased a company van, logo'd the van with our company branding. We have spent almost £10k on the van to date. We had unexpected repair and maintenance costs, fitting out the back of the van breakdown and pick up costs as well as insurance increases. However; we are very grateful for this money which has enabled us to further develop our social enterprise and ultimately enhance service to members.

3.1 How many people in your community benefited from your project and how?

Hundreds of people have benefitted. The outcome is that we are now able to pick up and deliver mobility equipment locally as well as enhancing our repairs and maintenance service following on and off-site repairs. This can save an individual trying to deal with mentally getting out of their house to navigate public transportation to Shopmobility as we can now deliver to them if that's what they need. We also pick up food from RAMH pantry and deliver to our members and we pay the £1 for a lifetime membership with RAMH – all they do is pay the £2.50 for their shopping. We also deliver and pick up shopping to those in the RAH, pick up prescriptions. We know 73% of our ordinary members are still suffering from social isolation and loneliness (post pandemic), and, live in poverty – they tell us this. Following surveys, the impact is very positive indeed and we deliver a service which our membership tell us they need and receive great benefit from.

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
