1 MINUTE

There was submitted the Minute of the meeting of this Local Partnership held on 15 November 2022.

DECIDED: That the Minute be approved.

2 CULTURAL FACILITIES UPDATE

The Partnership recieved a presentation from J Lochans, Finance & Resources, and G Low and M Woods, OneRen, which provided an update on the regeneration of Paisley's cultural facilities.

The presentation provided an overview on the works being carried out to redevelop the Town Hall, Art Centre and Paisley Museum, as well as the establishment of a new Paisley Learning and Culture Hub on the town's High Street. A timeline for works and completion was set out with Town Hall expected to be ready to host The Royal National Mòd in October 2023 and the museum to open to the public in 2024.

A vision for the type of events which could be accommodated at the venues was presented together with details on the marketing strategy and branding for each.

DECIDED: That the content of the presentation be noted.

3 YOU DECIDE RESULTS FOR PAISLEY NORTH, WEST & CENTRAL

L McLean, Communities & Housing, provided a verbal update relative to You Decide results on the participatory budgeting exercise across Renfrewshire and detailed the successful projects for the Paisley North, West and Central Local Partnership area.

The initiative gave communities a key role in deciding their priorities for environmental and physical infrastructure improvements to be undertaken throughout Renfrewshire over the next three years via a Community Investment Fund of £1.2 million. This fund was split across 16 local areas and as many projects as possible had been funded until all the money had been allocated. As a result of the engagement initiatives, over 2,700 proposals/ideals were submitted.

The successful projects for You Decide had been announced and information for those in the local area was provided. Where plans were already in place for an idea, some projects had been taken on by council services outside of the campaign or council funding had topped up the project to ensure as many local ideas as possible could be brought to life.

<u>DECIDED</u>: That the information provided be noted.

4 PARKS, PLAY AREAS AND GREEN SPACES AND COMMUNITY LEARNING AND DEVELOPMENT UPDATE

L McLean, Communities and Housing, gave a presentation on Parks, Play Areas and Green Spaces in the Paisley North, West and Central Local Partnership area.

The Green Spaces Fund fed directly into the COP26 target of protecting communities and natural habitats, financial and practical support was provided to volunteers, to take the next steps in making physical improvements to their communities. Over £2m was awarded to 70 community projects in Renfrewshire over the course of the past three and a half years. The fund had also supported eight asset transfers where groups had purchased or secured long term leases of land for gardening, sport or growing ground activity.

In addition to the Parks, Play Areas and Green Space funding from Renfrewshire Council volunteers and groups was encouraged to secure external funding from local businesses and house builders.

The presentation advised that there was still a balance in the funding pot and that applications which met the criteria and were seeking between £5,000 and £10,000 would be favoured to allow as many groups as possible to benefit.

A summary of the work being undertaken to inform communities of various areas of support which may be available in the local area was provided. Information was also provided on ALISS – A Local Information System for Scotland which enabled people and professionals to find and share information on resources, services, groups and support in their local communities and online.

<u>DECIDED</u>: That the content of the presentation and information provided on support available, be noted.

5 WINTER CONNECTIONS

S Graham, Chief Executive's Service, gave a presentation on the Winter Connections Programme and provided information on the network of local places that had received funding to connect people to others in their community through the winter period. He also advised that hosts were asked to sign up to Winter Connections principles, and support was provided to all host organisations including a Winter Connections toolkit, printed materials, information sharing, access to other services such as advice and period products being provided for locations.

A number of facilities in the locality had been made available to connect people in the community, with advice also being offered at these venues around other sources of support which were available to members of the community.

<u>DECIDED</u>: That the content of the presentation be noted.

6 REFERENCE OF COMMUNITY VIEWS ON RENFREWSHIRE COUNCIL BOARD PAPERS

G Hunter, Lead Officer, provided a verbal update on the representation of local communities' views on reports presented to Policy Boards at Renfrewshire Council.

To provide background to the update, J Wilby, Paisley West & Central Community Council, advised that concerns had been raised previously around reports being presented to the Council's Policy Boards which made no reference to representations made by local community groups resulting in board members taking decisions without being fully furnished with all relevant information. Direct reference was made to papers which had been considered in relation to Kelvin House and the redevelopment of Causeyside Street.

During the discussion that followed, concerns were also raised around the views of community groups in more affluent areas being seen to carry more weight that those in deprived areas with the seemingly varying levels of scrutiny applied to Community Asset Transfer applications in Ralston and Ferguslie being given as an example.

It was noted that consultation around planning applications was set out in the planning legislation and the Community Councils were provided the opportunity submit comments on relevant applications. It was suggested that the timing of an application and Community Council meetings could, on occasion, have led to reports being presented to a Board before comments had been submitted.

In terms or non-planning board reports, it was noted that a report template was used which had a section for detailing implications on Community/Council Planning which could be used to highlight any relevant comments which had been submitted by local community groups. It was agreed that concerns around the omission of submitted comments would be fed back to senior Council Officers.

DECIDED:

- (a) That the content of the update and following discussion be noted; and
- (b) That the concerns raised around the representation of community views on Board papers would be fed back to senior Council Officers.

7 GRANT AWARDS IN PAISLEY NORTH, WEST AND CENTRAL AREA -NOVEMBER 2022 - JANUARY 2023

There was submitted a report by the Chief Executive relative to awards made in the Paisley North, West and Central Local Partnership area to local community and voluntary groups since the last meeting of this Local Partnership held on 15 November 2022.

Details of awards made from various sources which included: Winter Connections, Community Health and Wellbeing Fund (Engage Renfrewshire), Culture, Heritage and Events Fund and Alcohol and Drugs Recovery Change Fund was provided.

<u>DECIDED</u>: That the grant awards made to community and voluntary groups in the Paisley North, West and Central Local Partnership area since November 2022 from funding sources other than the Local Partnership be noted.

8 PAISLEY NORTH WEST AND CENTRAL LOCAL PARTNERSHIP BUSINESS ARRANGEMENTS

There was submitted a report by the Chief Executive relative to the timeline and arrangements for the 2023/24 round of applications for Local Partnership funding.

The report advised that applications to the 2023/24 round of Local Partnership awards would be open from Monday 6 March to Monday 10 April 2023. Updated guidance would be issued to applicants, with opportunities for applicants to attend support sessions to obtain advice and receive answer to queries about the process. The applications would be processed and be submitted to the May 2023 cycle of Local Partnership meetings for consideration and determination.

<u>DECIDED</u>: That the timeline for the 2023 round of applications for Local Partnership funding be noted.

9 BUDGET MONITORING REPORT 2022/23 AND 2021/22 AWARDS FEEDBACK

There was submitted a report by the Chief Executive relative to the Paisley North, West and Central Local Partnership budget for 2022/23.

The report advised that the Local Partnership provided funding to community groups to undertake projects through a range of grants in terms of the General Grant Fund, Paisley Common Good Fund and, following a participatory budgeting exercise, the Celebrating Renfrewshire Fund. Appendix 1 to the report detailed the funding allocated by the Local Partnership in 2022/23 together with the current budget position, while Appendix 2 detailed feedback received from community groups awarded funding during 2021/22.

DECIDED: That the budget monitoring and feedback report be noted.

Isolation and Loneliness

This equipment has helped hundreds of people with disabilities and mobility issues hire free or low-cost equipment to get them out of their house or residential setting. Even post pandemic, we know many of our members are still hesitant to go out and lack confidence.

Our role has been to connect with our members and let them know we have existing and new equipment to enable them to be independent and make choices to improve their life and health options. We've had over 500 hires of this equipment over the course of the year and our membership has increased which is a positive as more people are utilising the service.

We surveyed members who hired equipment and the findings are noted below:

100% told us they would lose their independence if we were unable to provide our service

100% said they would require support to look after their care needs

64% wouldn't be able to care for their family

98% confirmed their condition would significantly worsen

97% would be less connected and lonely/isolated

It's clear from the above data that our members do benefit greatly from our service, which you have invested in and we and our members sincerely appreciate this. Enabling and connecting with people is essential and our role in this is to ensure that those with disabilities and mobilities are able to join other funded projects or just get out and do whatever they need by offering them choice. Our belief is that we should not forget about those who struggle with disabilities or mobility issues.

We have seen an increase in our fan base at our Paisley Pirates games & indeed our newly created junior team, from all over Renfrewshire. Our numbers have increased dramatically on the social media platforms too, again, from all over Renfrewshire & further afield, including many other countries outwith the UK.

Examples of our current social media numbers are; Facebook Followers - 3,359 Twitter Followers - 2,793 Instagram Followers - 1,249

How did your project benefit people in the community?

(What outcomes did you achieve? Please describe the impact your project had on its participants)

One of our Junior Development players has made the u16 Great Britain team, who will compete in competition in Riga, Latvia, later on this month (April) along with our Head Coach Ian Turley, who is also one of the GB u16 Coaches.

We also have several of our u19 team who have made the Scotland teams this season.

The Pirates have had played in what has been described as the most competitive league seasons ever in the Scottish National League. Right up until the last game of the season, the Pirates still had a chance of winning the league, however, they finished 4th due to loosing their last league game – The difference from 1st place to 4th was only 6 points.

The Pirates also made it through to the Scottish Cup Semi Finals, loosing a chance in the final by 1 goal.

The Play Off Finals weekend is one of the most prestigious events in the SNL (Scottish National League) to which the Pirates are one of the 4 Finalists – This event takes place over the 8th & 9th April in Edinburgh.

The Paisley Pirates had also chosen to support the ULTIMATE WARRIORS by having their logo on our team home & away tops. The Ultimate Warriors are a Paisley based registered Charity supporting children and parents affected by Autism.

Whilst the Paisley Pirates & Lightning Pirates have the Renfrewshire Council logo on both teams short covers.

During the Festive Season, we make contributions to Food & Toy Banks

During the summer months we engage with the community at various Gala Days – Renfrew, Barshaw & Ferguslie – with our team mascot Shivering Timbers, who is always delighted to pose for photographs with children, adults & 'dare I say it' recycled teenagers. ©

The project benefited not just people who had previously accessed services through REEM, but also new people most referred through housing associations, Health visitors and the local council Individuals living alone benefited a lot through weekly visits to their doorstep as well as phone calls that helped to reduce isolation and related consequences

21 children have been regulars in activities organised under the project, while 30 parents were active in online meetings about parenting and home schooling.

The children continue to participate in outdoor activities and crafting activities

What did you want to do with the money & what did you spend it on? (was this different to what you originally intended? If so, please explain).

We used the money to target adults with learning disabilities living in Paisley North West and Central, Paisley East, Gleniffer and Renfrew. Our Community Engagement worker engaged with local GPs, pharmacies, West College, Renfrewshire Carers Centre, community hubs, and local advocacy services.

We created new A5 flyers to send to these organisations, and invited them to contact us for more information. Our Engagement Worker then followed up with phone calls and face to face meetings, with the aim of boosting awareness for Dates-n-Mates within the local area.

New pop banners were designed and purchased, to be used not only at events, but also as a backdrop for our stand during information sessions and presentations to Service Users and Service Providers.

In addition, we purchased new point of sale materials to use on information stands, including plastic flyer holders, branded table cloth, branded pens etc.

We also used funds to pull together a full monthly programme of social activities in a number of venues across Renfrewshire, including pubs, restaurants, coffee shops, Crazy Golf, Cinema tips and lost more. This involved the design and print of event flyers, as well as postage and follow up contact with members to confirm attendance. It also helped towards volunteer and staff travel expenses to get to and from events.

In addition, some funds went towards resources to use during the delivery of our workshops, and also towards the rental of Community Spaces to deliver these workshops. Our last workshop was on "Boundaries and Personal Space", and was held in January in the Tananhill Center.

We also used some of the funds to further develop and expand our Friendship Matching and Chaperoned Dating programme, where members of similar likes and interests could meet up on a one to one basis with a volunteer or staff member. This helps build the foundations from which to develop a stronger friendship. Our Community Engagement worker would either identify which members they thought might make a connection, or members themselves would ask us to arrange matches. Again, travel costs for the staff member or volunteer who was facilitating the friendship match, was covered by the money supplied by the Local Partnership.

Some funds were also used to pay for entertainment costs at our annual Halloween and Christmas parties, as well as decorations for each event and again, travel costs for staff and volunteers.

We provide a way for adults with learning disabilities to meet new people, make new friends and
build lasting relationships, which in turn makes them feel more valued, more included and a more
active member of their communities.

Our members became more familiar with how to use public transport and many are now able to
navigate to our events in Renfrewshire without the need to be met off the bus or at the train station
And because we use the same venues, they become familiar to our members who consequently
become more confident in using them not just when they are at a Dates-n-Mates event, but when
they are out on their own. They also become more confident in being able to order from a menu
without assistance, or order a drink from the bar. These may see like baby steps to many, but they
can be huge leaps to our members.

Through our friendship matching programme, many of our members have made solid friendships with others, and now meet up independently of a Dates-n-Mates event to go to the pub, or a trip to the cinema.

The impact our service has on our members is tremendous. Through our monthly coffee and cake chats, we can see how some develop from socially awkward and quiet, to gradually building a confidence and an understanding that what they say will be listened to and is important. Others remain quiet and introverted, but they still come to all the events and love just feeling part of something, even if they don't take part.

I have attached a case study of 3 Renfrewshire members, just to give you a feel for the impact of the work we do.

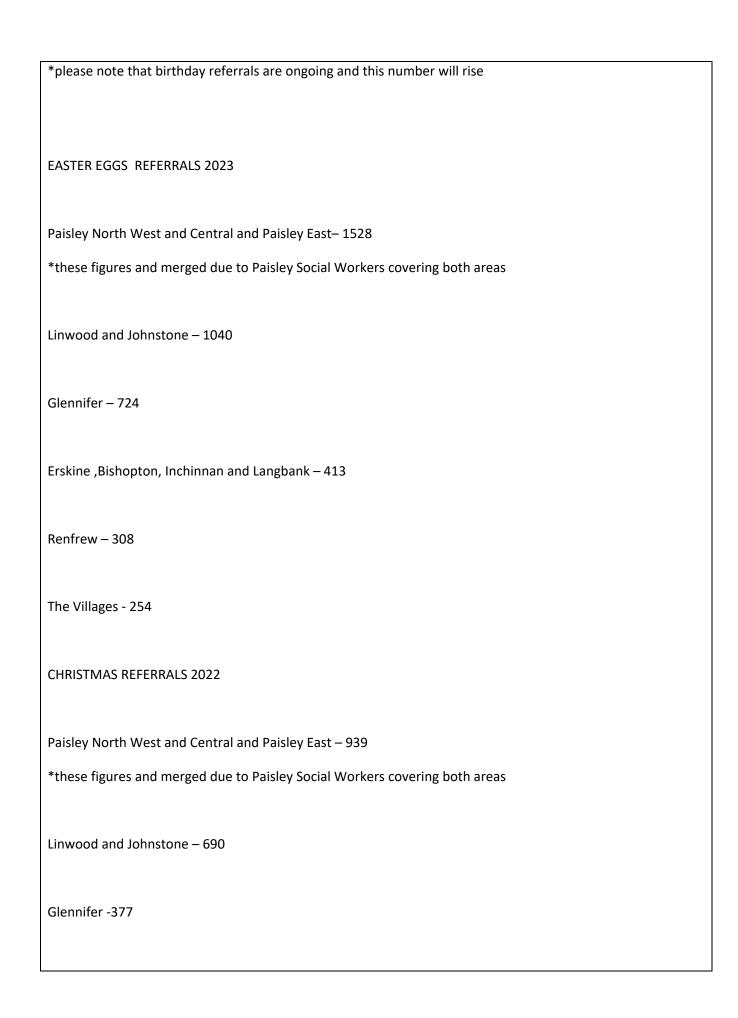

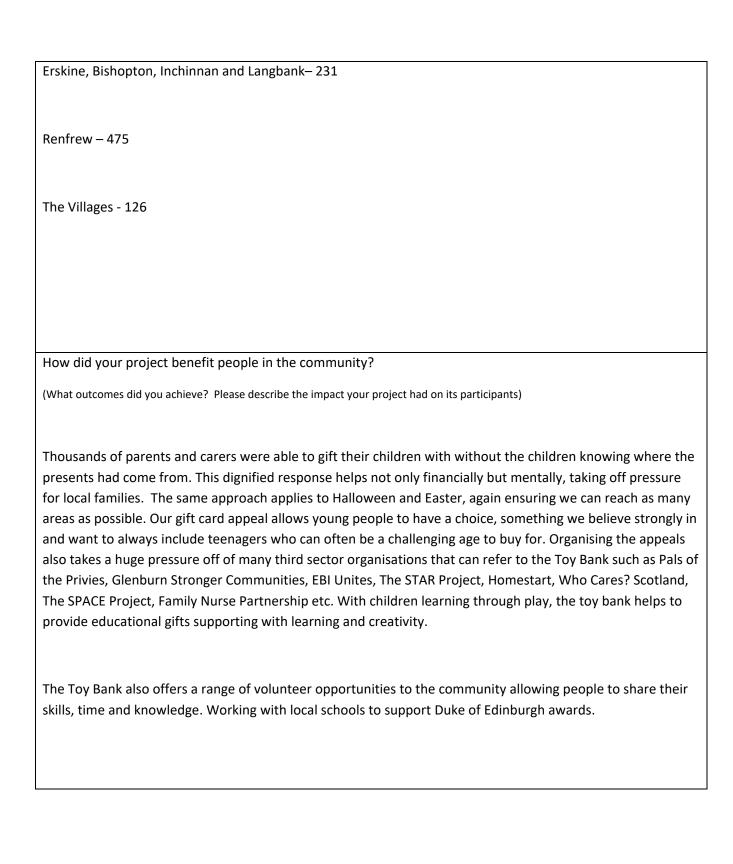

The funding was to be spent on materials for 20 new raised beds - £1280 and running costs - insurance, admin, stationery, printing, payroll, accountancy - £720. A total of £2000. The funds were fully spent. The Covid-19 outbreak and rising inflation has had a significant impact on our delivery of services. It was not possible to establish raised beds built with the support of Renfrewshire Unpaid Work Team.

Within Paisley North, raised beds for growing potatoes and other vegetables accessed by 250 children, young people and disabled adults; 5 volunteers developed skills in various tasks associated with the project including mentoring and administration; 100 Spuds for Buddies cotton bags produced by Unpaid Work team for promoting potatoes and other vegetables will be distributed to 100 new participants.

How did your project benefit people in the community? (What outcomes did you achieve? Please describe the impact your project had on its participants) In Spring of 2023, 20 new wooden planters were provided to create additional food growing spaces within St. James Primary, Mossval Primary and Rainbow Nursery Shortroods. We supported the planting of 900 seed potatoes with peat-free compost within local nurseries, primary schools, after school care and day care provision across Paisley North. This raised awareness of healthy eating and improve gardening skills in the Paisley North area. Potatoes will be grown, harvested and taken by children for use in healthy eating cookery activities or for their family meals.

We estimate we have reached over 1500 people in Renfrewshire in the past year. This includes schools across all of Renfrewshire, meetings, competitions, street stalls, stalls at the University and the podcast among others. We have enhanced our social media presence on Facebook, Twitter (@rainbowturtleUK) and Instagram (rainbowturtleUK).

Our new part-time Education Officer has been in post for over a year now. She is now up to speed and has been very active. The pandemic is still affecting access to schools and the cost-of-living crisis has reduced schools ability to pay for any supplies, but has not dimmed their enthusiasm.

We tackled loneliness and isolation by providing an outlet for volunteers to be involved in a community project, especially the shop.

As part of Renfrewshire's Fair Trade status we provided a community asset with the Rainbow Turtle shop and the Education Officer is a free asset to all schools and community organisations across Renfrewshire.

Scotland is a Fair Trade Nation and Rainbow Turtle provides a Renfrewshire identity as part of the National movement and is held up as beacon of fair trade activity in Scotland and is something for all of Renfrewshire to be proud of. We represented Renfrewshire at the celebration of Scotland being a Fair Trade nation for 10 years in Glasgow and will doing the same at the Scottish Parliament later in May 23.

We provide lots of work for and with young people and working in the shop is very intergenerational. We work with all young people but have also specifically given opportunities with people different abilities. Young people volunteering in the shop has been very positive for all volunteers.

We ran several interviews on our podcast https://www.rainbowturtle.org.uk/our-podcasts/

We have held stalls and educational events at the University. These have gone down well and increased our reach into the student population. We had a stall and educational activity at One Ren Many Nations event in June 22.

Work within the charity and linked to the Rainbow Turtle shop involved the volunteers and getting them out the house and linking with other volunteers, old and young, and members of the public.

We have linked with the Gatehouse coffee roasters in Paisley to promote a premium Fair Trade coffee. This has been very successful and helped promote local business as well Fair Trade.

We celebrated 20 Years of rainbow Turtle in Renfrewshire with events in the shop and a well—attended ceilidh in Methodist halls.

We arranged a very popular Fair trade Bake-off open to all Renfrewshire schools in FairTrade Fortnight

We attended Christmas fair at the UWS campus and educated about Fair Trade with students from Renfrewshire and across the world.

We ran a Fair trade coffee-tasting morning in the Life Church in Moss St. we had presentations from around the world. Again very well attended and very well received.

The Education Officer has been out to lots of Renfrewshire schools and the number of interested schools is rising as the effects of covid lockdowns are receding.

Over the year 2022 – 2023 we provided face-to-face services for 250 individuals.

Because of the nature of many of our activities (e.g. weekly drop-in language café launched Sep

2022) and sensitivities around service users identities, it is not possible to gather statistics on all

participants addresses – e.g. displaced persons living in hotel accommodation.

3.2 How did your project benefit people in the community?

(What outcomes did you achieve? Please describe the impact your project had on its participants)

We were able to deliver all of our objectives outlines in sections 2.3 and 2.4.

This includes our women's sewing and creative skills workshops, with an average attendance of

30 participants. Two of our younger volunteers achieved Saltire Awards. We obtained charitable

status (SCIO) in April 2023.

Our LAP funding was used to buy budget sewing machines to allow refugees to practise their sewing

at home, a skill for life, and pass the skills and benefits on to their whole family. This was reinforced

by our participation in the Climate Fringe Festival 2022, and thanks to our Renfrewshire Community

Climate Funding we had in-house Make do & Mend sessions, bringing damaged or poorly fitting

clothing to workshops for skills training. A further grant from Stop Climate Chaos Scotland gave us

the opportunity to buy equipment to film and edit several quick fix sewing tutorials, again

encouraging the repair of clothing that may otherwise be discarded.

We provided free outreach workshops in Williamsburgh Primary school for the parents of their pupils

from the refugee community, identified by teachers as being isolated and needing support in integration

and learning English.

We identified the following main priorities for our Troopers (Amputees) after Covid and within our local community within Paisley.

- → Improved physical wellbeing
- → Reduced social isolation
- → Improved access to local community services
- → Increased opportunities to meet with Peers
- → Improved mental wellbeing

What did you want to do with the money & what did you spend it on? (was this different to what you originally intended? If so, please explain).

Unfortunately there were delays at OneRen in implementing a similar "Glasgow Life" scheme and the person assisting us with the implementation of similar options was unable to secure a swimming instructor and moved onto a different role.

We continued supporting Troopers to attend swimming and Gym around different accessible areas of Glasgow in peer groups. After discussions/consultations with the local Troopers, we identified the need for a shared interest group to meet priorities outlined and the Troopers chose to start a FYF bowling group in Paisley. The group is local and is growing in size and popularity and with donations and sponsorship supporters we were able to purchase bowling green wheelchairs. Troopers attending have fun mixing with their peers and are building up skills to play other FYF club areas.

We also sourced use of the Renfrewshire Soopir Bus (once volunteers were assessed and trained in how to use the tail lift). This has been a wonderful opportunity and has allowed introduction to other Renfrewshire

organisations and hear what is on locally. The bus offers us local access with a significant saving on taxi/transport costs.

We also used the fund to add specialist coaches and support to our "Ampu-Teas" programme to offer additional options for improved physical wellbeing; - Pilates, Yoga, chair fitness and Falls Prevention fitness sessions. Over the last year we initially went from a social group once a fortnight to one a week and we now offer peer socialisation and interaction 3 times a week with the help of volunteers. Morrisons awarded a fund which enabled us to purchase new furniture and equipment to make our venue seating more Trooper and mobility friendly for activity and group provision.

We have provided a suite of beneficial activities, varied in choice to maximise engagement of Troopers. The programme covers all the priorities we have outlined and remains core to our service delivery planning. We encourage feedback at all times in different methods to maintain our ability to be Trooper led and offer effective management of funds and services. We have now sourced a qualified swimming instructor and are revisiting original plans for 23/24.

- 1. Within our Paisley HUB We provided fitness opportunities with attendance of 630 Troopers!
- 2. We successfully engaged 306 Troopers for social /well-being groups/activities at Paisley Amp-Tteas.
- 3. In addition we have a local bowling group in place with specialist equipment and we have had an attendance of 72 over the past 8 weeks.
- 4. We purchased an specialist adaptable sliding dartboard from Disability Darts Scotland which can move to the relevant height for playing depending on mobility (wheelchair/standing/ supported) this is encouraging teams and challenges with other Ampu-Teas club areas.
- 5. We have also streamed and recorded some sessions with instructors/ therapists which we can use on line for other Troopers further afield to benefit from also. (Yoga- Pilates- Love Yourself Wildly Perfect Just As You Are, Flippin Pain)
- 6. A few groups/activities and achievements:- Ladies Brunch, Men's MoT health sessions (sponsored), Neuro-linguistic programming (NLP) work shop around anxiety and positivity
 - We identified that the cost of living was a major factor on mental health especially with the
 addition of energy increases. We responded with 'Ease of Contact' path for support from the
 Well-being team. Visits from Scotland Social Security and hacks and tips around food and bill
 budgeting for Troopers and their family. We set up a food pantry and chill and charge facility
 for Troopers to come relax, charge their technology, watch TV and collect groceries if needed
 (supplied by Morrisons)
 - An introduction of Crafting/Skill workshops on a weekly basis

How did your project benefit people in the community?

Our support framework provides the opportunity for clear statistics and the need for specific Well-being support is apparent; 58% of all our Well-being Support plans opened are for the following top 3 reasons: General Well-being (27%), Mental health (25%) and Housing (6%).

All troopers are different and like different activities and hobbies. By offering a diversity of support for physical/ mental health and well-being, we have increased opportunities and ways to support Troopers on

their personal recovery journeys. We are proud as we have met all outcomes outlined and also progressed beyond.

The funding has allowed us to steadily increase our engagement numbers, encouraging Troopers to leave their home and socialise, make new friends, feel less isolated, develop new skills and gain extra coping methods. Ultimately having some fun.

"I've been a double above knee amputee for almost 3 years now. In the time since then I have discovered a new found confidence given to me by other amputees through Finding Your Feet. I have attended gym sessions, been fishing again and attended Ampu-teas" – Tony

What did you want to do with the money?

We wanted to use the awards to go towards administration and recruitment costs/flyers for growing the numbers of boys in each of the companies, with an ambitious target of 25% increase in numbers with a full funding award. We received full funding of £500 and £1,000 from Renfrew and Paisley East, and £794 (from £2,000 request) and £1,012.15 (from a £2,500 request) from Johnstone and Paisley North and West.

What did you spend it on? (was this different to what you originally intended? If so, please explain).

We spent some of the money on recruitment documentation and on social media support to try to attract new boys. We also used it to subsidise all of the companies with respect to fees which they pay nationally to the Boys' Brigade for their boy numbers and support by way of free supplies such as badges and uniforms. This programme was more successful in some areas and less successful in others.

How many people benefitted from/accessed your project?

We don't have data to accurately identify exactly how many people were impacted here. Post pandemic, we hope that we simply got people to hear about the Boys' Brigade whether on-line or by hearing about us at a school or church. In terms of numbers:

Renfrew – we had 63 boys, we now have 58. There is always natural attrition as older boys leave so this result was disappointing. Part of the reason here in uncertainty regarding the future of the church.

Johnstone – we had 57 boys, we now have 58, so a little success here.

Paisley East – we had 26 boys, we now have 28 boys, so again some success here.

Paisley North, West and Central – we had 104 boys, we now have 120, so this has been a great success.

How did your project benefit people in the community?

As above, we hope that we simply got people to hear about the Boys' Brigade whether on-line or by hearing about us at a school or church. It's very difficult to attract boys to a church organization in today's world so anything to get our message out there is deemed a success.

We wanted to develop a drop in aimed at capacity building hard to reach minority ethnic (in particular African) communities in and around Renfrewshire which encounter multiple barriers, such as communication and those of a cultural nature, which prevent them from becoming resilient communities...

The project will provide 40 weekly drop-in sessions for 8-10 individuals around volunteering job search and application support, volunteering opportunities, general and mental health support and information on entitlements, The project was aimed at improving awareness via providing access to literature and media through the development of information packs on hot topic subjects to share with 600 - 800 people. The proposed information packs would also be written using simple English and translated into several common languages that are prevalent within the community, making them accessible to a wide range of audiences. The project was also supposed to deliver 6 workshops targeting 5 participants per workshop around areas that our client base feel they need more help with in order to become more resilient and independent. These areas could include budgeting, recycling, how to buy online (using comparison websites and freebies) cooking

(how to make healthy meals utilizing leftovers), confidence building, CV writing and developing interview skills. The project will also organise one massive cultural celebration event bringing the whole community together to allow community integration.

What did you spend it on? (was this different to what you originally intended? If so, please explain).

Unfortunately, because we managed to get a fraction of the funding that we applied for which was spent on direct project costs, Project co-ordination, management and marketing. We managed just 3 months' worth of activities and we had to cut out some of the intended activities completely. We managed to do four workshops on becoming part of school parent education board 12 participants, we had a needs assessment workshop that was attended by 16 participants, we had a workshop on how to plan a community event which was attended by 14 participants, and we had a Modern Apprenticeship session for parents which was attended by 21 participants. We managed to support 3 individuals to gain volunteering opportunities. We also reached 100 people through information dissemination.

We will do this by encouraging communities to be more:

• Connected: The delivery of our interactive sessions resulted in diverse communities with the same barriers coming together to share their barriers, concerns on general health and wellbeing whilst also understanding the need to

improve themselves. One participant said, "It is refreshing to know that I am not the only one facing challenges around navigating a new system and culture and Pamoja has helped me build new support systems."

1. Summary

- 1.1 Applications for grant funding from the seven Local Partnership areas were invited to be submitted during March and April 2023, to be considered at the Local Partnership meetings due to be held in May 2023.
- 1.2 The available allocation for Paisley North West and Central Local Partnership for 2023/24 is £56,722 made up of £45,822 from the General Fund and £10,900 from Paisley Common Good Fund.
- 1.3 From this total budget, a sum of £50 per community representative requires to be ringfenced for potential claim of expenses. These expenses are deducted from the available allocation for the Local Partnership. Paisley North West and Central Local Partnership has space for ten community members, so the total ringfenced for expenses is £500. The total budget available for allocation by Paisley North, West and Central Local Partnership is therefore £56,222.
- 1.4 The total value of applications for 2023/24 made to Paisley North West and Central Local Partnership is £184,849.33.
- 1.5 The Youth Challenge Fund component of Paisley North West and Central Local Partnership Funding for 2023/24 is £21,133. This funding will be allocated by young people through a Participatory Budgeting exercise that will take place during April and May 2023, with decisions being made in June 2023.

2. Recommendations

2.1 It is recommended that members of Paisley North West and Central Local Partnership consider the applications for Local Partnership grant funding, as set out below in Appendix 1 and 2.

3. Background

- 3.1 Applicants for funding in 2023/24 have been provided with guidance, as well as a description of the Local Priorities identified by Paisley North West and Central Local Partnership.
- 3.2 Local Partnership members are asked to consider the applications for funding summarised at Appendix 1 and 2 of this report, and to assess these against the Local Priorities agreed by Paisley North West and Central.
- 3.3 An initial assessment has been carried out by officers to support Local Partnership members in their decision-making. Where applications have made clear reference to the Local Priorities identified by the Local Partnership, this is identified in the first table at Appendix 1. Applications that make a partial or no reference to Paisley North West and Central Local Priorities are summarised in the second table for example, the project may tackle social isolation (and therefore meet the Local Priority around social isolation) but not deliver this directly in the Local Partnership area or make reference to how many people from the area would be engaged in the project.
- 3.4 The priorities of Paisley North West and Central Local Partnership are:

Community Empowerment

The Local Partnership want more people to get involved in their community. They want to activate new community groups, and explore the sustainability of the local groups that already exist. This includes succession planning for groups and exploring the availability and sustainability of funding for groups in the area.

Tackling social isolation to promote health

The Local Partnership want to help connect people to each other and see this as key to promoting health and wellbeing in the area. They think a key barrier is people being able to physically get to Paisley town centre to access services and groups.

Green spaces

The Local Partnership want to see the development and maintenance of high-quality green spaces in the area, and the use of these spaces to promote physical and mental health.

They particularly want address safety and lighting in order to safely access these spaces at night.

Community safety

The Local Partnership want to help people to feel safe in their community. This includes being able to move around the area safely, by tackling issues with pavements and pathways, dog fouling and litter. They also think it is important that there are activities available for young people to avoid them becoming involved in anti-social behaviour and crime.

Additionally, we will provide opportunities for exhibition and display of art. We are open to young people aged 5-24, adults 25-65 and older people from within Renfrewshire and beyond. We also offer classes to vulnerable groups, those in health and care settings and community networks.

What will the project do?

Demand for our work has increased since locating into the Paisley Centre. The Art Department now runs activities 7 days per week and at least 3 evenings per week. We share a space with PACE Theatre Company and between both organisations have created a dynamic arts space that has revivified the high street at time when the economy has been badly affected. We have worked closely with Renfrewshire Carers, Corseford, Community Networks, and Art in Hospitals to provide classes for vulnerable people and older people in day care.

We will offer classes 3 times per week, Wednesdays, Thursdays, and Saturdays, 11am-3pm for 30 weeks. These will be free of charge and all art materials and tuition provided. We can host up to 30 learner/participants per class. We will advertise classes these on site via posters and leaflets, online via Eventbrite, Facebook, twitter and our website.

Purpose of the project

The purpose of the project is to combat social isolation and loneliness, supporting older people by providing a warm space to enjoy music making, singing and make friends, with lunch provided, whilst also linking with families with young children. According to Age UK '100,000 older people in Scotland feel lonely all or most of the time.' Our project aims to tackle this isolation and promote the benefits of intergenerational learning. Research shows connections between generations are essential for mental health and stability of a community.

What will the project do?

It was identified and developed through a pilot programme during the winter, carried out with parents/carers with young children aged 0-5 years looking for a music activity providing a warm space and lunch due to the cost of living and older people who had previously been isolated due to Covid and now struggling with the cost of living. Older participants reported a greater sense of wellbeing and community, whilst younger families reported how the classes increased confidence, engagement and bonding with their children and the older adults.

We will deliver 30 fun 2-hour weekly intergenerational music sessions with a professional music tutor for 20 people including older adults and families with preschool children. Participants will learn together, enjoying an afternoon of music, which will be inclusive of different abilities, and include singing, ukulele, percussion instruments, parachute games and djembe drums, as well as companionship and conversation with others over lunch. We aim to make the cafe a happy, confidence building, collaborative space and warm space for all ages.

Our purpose is to bring adults with learning disabilities together to build and strengthen social connections and to reduce social isolation to help improve the mental health and wellbeing of our members. We aim to get more people involved in their local communities, and to feel valued and active participants in these communities. We want to give our members the confidence to travel independently across Renfrewshire, and to become more visible in mainstream venues and therefore more confident and more accepted by the rest of society.

SCLD's report on relationships in 2020 noted that only 5% of adults with learning disabilities lived with a partner, as compared with 56% of the general population. And only 3% were married as against 47% of the general population. Traditionally adults with learning disabilities have been discouraged from forming friendships and relationships, and the subject of sex is totally taboo. Dates-n-Mates was developed to give our members the opportunity to have the same social experiences as the rest of the adult population.

What will the project do?

We run a monthly programme of events in mainstream venues across Renfrewshire to give our members the opportunity to meet new people, make friends and build lasting meaningful relationships. We also provide workshops around confidence building, self-esteem and sexual health, to equip our members with the knowledge they need to take control of their own lives and be responsible for their own actions. We offer a Friendship Matching Programme so members can meet on a more personal level to forge a stronger connection, based on similar interests.

# **Proposed Heritage Trail Project**

This report highlights the important complimentary role of Paisley's Heritage Trail to Renfrewshire Council's Heritage Strategy. It identifies the extent of its reach, its contribution to partnered tourism, and highlights the need for major restoration works. It points to Council sources of capital funding for the necessary works.

### **Background**

Paisley's Heritage Trail extends from School Wynd to Oakshawhead and includes five linking access trails. It is home to several listed buildings, including Oakshaw Trinity Church, the Observatory, Gaelic Chapel, and the John Neilson Institute. Therefore, it is an important part of Paisley's Heritage Strategy, as witnessed by the hundreds of overseas visitors each year, many choosing an accompanied tour. The completion of the Museum and Observatory restoration and development projects will also heighten its historic importance and offers opportunities for a future partnership approach.

### **Restoration & Development**

The past few years have seen a gradual deterioration in its condition. This ranges from un-painted, damaged, and missing historic street furniture to the absence of regular weed suppression and graffiti. An opportunity also exists to enhance the trail with improved signage, historically significant plaques along the route, and live historical enactments. Anti-social behaviour could be reduced by an additional strategically sited CCTV camera, and a locked gate at Oakshawhead, giving access only to the electricity sub-station.

### **Funding**

The Community Council acknowledges this is a major project requiring significant capital expenditure. The greatest cost-benefit is likely to accrue from an early working partnership with Heritage Strategy managers and partner organisations. There may also be existing underspent Town Centre capital funding for this urgently required work. One other established source of revenue, yet to exploited for ongoing maintenance, is the use by film companies seeking an historical location.

#### Recommendation

The Community Council recommends an early comprehensive programme of restoration and development. The full potential for this neglected, and significant part, of Paisley's heritage will be best achieved by an early co-ordinated commitment from relevant Renfrewshire Council officials and partner organisations.
