Declarations of Interest

Councillor Steel declared a non financial interest in item 2 of the agenda as he had signed the Corseford Tenants' and Residents' Association nomination form for membership of the Local Partnership and indicated that it was his intention to vacate the Chair and remain in the meeting but not take part in the discussion or voting thereon.

1 Welcome and Introductions

Councillor Steel welcomed those present to the meeting.

In terms of Local Partnership Standing Order 3.7 Councillor Steel proposed that Carol Gemmell, Linstone Housing Association be permitted to act as a substitute for Adele Fraser for this meeting only. This was agreed unanimously.

<u>DECIDED</u>: That Carol Gemmell be permitted to act as a substitute for Adel Fraser of Linstone Housing Association for this meeting only.

Declaration of Interest

Councillor Steel having previously declared an interest in the following item of business, stood down from the Chair and took no part in the decision and voting thereon.

Chair

Councillor Audrey Doig took the Chair.

2 Membership of Johnstone and Linwood Local Partnership

Under reference to item 1 of the Minute of meeting of the Partnership held on 29 January 2019, there was submitted a report by the Chief Executive relative to the appointment of a community representative to the Local Partnership'

The report intimated that there was one membership place available on the Johnstone & Linwood Local Partnership that had been left open for youth representation. No applications from a youth group had been forthcoming, however, four applications from non-youth representatives had been received from:

Susan McDonald, Active Communities; Michael Young, St Benedict's High School Parent Council; George MacDonald, Corseford Tenants and Residents Association; and Wilma Dean, Friends of Shanks Park.

Councillor Audrey Doig, seconded by Councillor Rodden, moved that the remaining place be kept available for a youth representative until June 2019 and that if a youth representative was not appointed by that time, it would be filled by one of the four nominated representatives.

Tom Wallace seconded by Mary McElhinney moved as an amendment that the available space be filled by one of the four nominated representatives at his meeting. On a vote being taken, 8 members voted for the motion and 6 members voted for the amendment. The motion was accordingly declared carried.

A vote was then held to identify the nominated representative who would fill the vacant position should it remain unfilled by a youth representative by June 2019. On a vote being taken between the four nominated representatives detailed in the report, 4 members voted for Susan McDonald; 4 members voted for Michael Young; 6 members voted for George MacDonald and 1 member voted for Wilma Dean

DECIDED:

- (a) That the remaining place be kept available for a youth representative until June 2019; and
- (b) That if a youth representative was not appointed by that time, the remaining place would be filled by George MacDonald, Corseford Tenants.

Chair

Councillor Steel resumed the Chair.

3 Appointment of Vice-chair

Councillor Steel asked for nominations for Vice-chair of the Local Partnership. Iain McMillan, seconded by Thomas Wallace moved that Mary McElhinney be appointed as Vice-chair of the Johnstone and Linwood Local Partnership. This was agreed unanimously

<u>**DECIDED**</u>: That Mary McElhinney be appointed as Vice-chair of Johnstone and Linwood Local Partnership.

4 Minute

There was submitted the Minute of the meeting of the Partnership held on 29 January 2019.

DECIDED: That the minute be approved.

5 Code of Conduct/ Register of Interests

The Head of Corporate Governance provided information about the adoption of a Code of Conduct for Devolved Public Bodies that set out standards of behaviour that could be applied to members, given that their role would include the allocation of public funds.

The Code of Conduct would require community representatives to register their interests and to declare those interests at meetings. In this way, business conducted by the Local Partnership, which was not part of the formal Board structure of Renfrewshire Council, would be open and transparent.

It was noted that Councillors were required to adhere to the Code of Conduct for Councillors and already had a Register of Interests in place.

Copies of the Code of Conduct and the Register of Interests form were made available at the meeting.

DECIDED:

- (a) That it be agreed that the Code of Conduct for Devolved Public Bodies be adopted for this Local Partnership; and
- (b) That it be agreed that community representatives appointed as members of this Local Partnership sign up to the Register of Interests.

6 Key Local Priorities

A presentation was delivered by the Strategic Partnerships and Inequalities Manager, the Partnerships Planning and Development Manager, the Development Plans and Housing Strategy Team Leader and the Chief Executive, Engage Renfrewshire, relative to identifying common matters that were important to people in the area and setting local priorities for improvement. It was envisaged that, once identified, these local priorities would be used to target resources and improvement actions.

The presentation, together with a Local Profile providing background information, detailed key facts about the population; children in low income families; access, health and crime deprivation; children and education; parks and play areas; health resources; care homes, extra care and sheltered housing specific to this Local Partnership area.

Based on the information provided members were asked to work in groups to set priorities for the Local Partnership area. Following group discussions the following were identified as the priorities which should be set for Johnstone & Linwood Local Partnership:- Roads public transport, disabled parking, parking and congestion (how to improve public transport between Johnstone and Linwood, how to improve congestion in both areas); Pride and look/feel of both areas (litter, cleanliness, new Christmas lights, improving local parks to utilise family space, flower beds at Ludovic and Houston Squares, improve derelict buildings with mural's and maximise heritage); Activities in both areas (use of spaces, activities, information sharing, social media, where happens, how people know, connects); Community Safety – (promote community safety, reporting crime, safer streets, street lighting, community policing, CCTV, links with both communities); and Information for youth services (what activities are in both areas, community hubs, what additional activities could be provided and intergenerational activities).

<u>**DECIDED**</u>: That Roads/public transport; Pride and look of both areas be improved; Activities in both areas and information sharing; Community Safety and Information for youth activities and intergenerational activities in both areas be approved as the local priorities for Johnstone and Linwood Local Partnership.

7 Local Partnership - Future Arrangements

There was submitted a report by the Chief Executive relative to arrangements for meetings and the name of the Local Partnership.

The report intimated that Local Partnerships would meet a minimum of three times per year. In addition, a community event would be organised to enable engagement with community groups, voluntary organisations and members of the public who were not members of the Local Partnership.

The report requested that members consider the name of the Local Partnership and

whether they would prefer a single venue for all meetings or to alternate between different venues within the Local Partnership area. Suggestions for accessible local venues were to be submitted to communityplanning@renfrewshire.gov.uk by 7 May 2019.

It was noted that as per the previous Local Area Committee arrangements, community representatives on the Local Partnership were entitled to expenses of £50 per annum to attend meetings. This resource would be drawn from the Local Partnership grant funding allocation.

DECIDED:

- (a) That it be agreed that the Local Partnership meet in June 2019, November 2019 and March/April 2020;
- (b) That it be agreed to alternate the venues between various locations in Johnstone and Linwood and that the meetings start at 6.00 pm;
- (c) That the Local Partnership name remain as Johnstone & Linwood Local Partnership;
- (d) That Community Representatives be entitled to £50 per annum expenses for attendance at meetings; and
- (e) The next Johnstone and Linwood Local Partnership meeting be held at 6.00 pm on Tuesday 4 June 2019 at Johnstone Castle Community Centre.

Membership of Johnstone and Linwood Local Partnership

1. Summary

1.1 The purpose of this paper is to invite standing members of Johnstone and Linwood Local Partnership to agree the appointment of a community representatives to the one remaining vacant position within the Local Partnership and consider a change in representation.

2. Recommendations

- 2.1 It is recommended that standing members of Johnstone and Linwood Local Partnership:
- (a) Note and consider the intention of Jackie Armour representing Active Communities project Kairos to step down.
- (b) Note and consider the application by Gavin Stewart representing Renfrewshire Youth Voice to take up the remaining space on Johnstone and Linwood Local partnership as a representative of young people.

3. **Background**

- 3.1 The first meeting of the Johnstone and Linwood Local Partnership held on 29 January 2019 agreed community representatives to fill eight of the nine remaining spaces. The intention was that the remaining space would be taken up by a young person's representative if possible.
- 3.2 At the meeting of the Local Partnership held on 26 March 2019, applications were considered for the one remaining space. The meeting agreed that the space would continue to be reserved for the representative of a young person's organisation until the meeting on 4 June 2019. If no representative from a young person's organisation had come forward in time for consideration at the meeting on 4 June, the remaining space would be filled by George MacDonald, Corseford Tenants and Residents Association.

- 3.3 Subsequent to the 26 March 2019 meeting, an application has been received from Gavin Stewart, a member of the Scottish Youth Parliament representing Renfrewshire Youth Voice. A summary of this application is attached at section 3.6, along with the application for Active Communities.
- 3.4 members of the Local partnership are asked to note that Council Officers have received notification from Jackie Armour, appointed community representative from Kairos, that she intends to stand down as she is no longer actively volunteering with the organisation. In order that they remain represented, Kairos have formally requested that their allotted place be taken by their parent organisation Active Communities.
- 3.5 Criteria have been developed to support members to come to a decision on the appointment of community representatives. These were set out as part of the application and are as follows:
 - Size of the community the group represents.
 - Mechanisms in place to communicate with the local community.
 - Whether a group represents or support a community of interest and how connected the group is to other community groups in the area.

Local Partnership – Business Arrangements

1. Summary

- 1.1 The Local partnership meeting held on 26 March 2019 decided that the name remain as Johnstone and Linwood Local Partnership and that meetings take place at various locations in Johnstone and Linwood.
- 1.2 The Youth Challenge element of Johnstone and Linwood Local Partnership funding will be agreed through a Participatory Budgeting exercise for young people that will take place during August and September 2019. The outcome will be reported to the next meeting of the Local Partnership in November 2019.
- 1.3 A community conference event for Johnstone and Linwood will take place during September/October 2019. The next meeting of the Local Partnership will take place in November 2019. The date and venue of the conference and the Local Partnership will be notified to Local Partnership members in June 2019.

2. Recommendations

- 2.1 It is recommended that Johnstone and Linwood Local Partnership:
 - (a) Note that the agreed name of the partnership is Johnstone and Linwood Local Partnership.
 - (b) Note the arrangements for the Youth Participatory Budgeting exercise and informing local members of Johnstone and Linwood conference and Local Partnership arrangements for autumn 2019.

(c) Note that members of Johnstone and Linwood Local Partnership agreed to complete a Register of Interests.

3. **Key Issues For Consideration**

Name of Local Partnership

3.1 Members of Johnstone and Linwood Local Partnership discussed and agreed at the meeting on 26 March 2019 that the name of the Local Partnership remain the same going forward.

Schedule of Meetings

3.2 Johnstone and Linwood Local Partnership agreed at its meeting in March 2019 that a conference event would be help in the area in order to engage with community groups, voluntary organisations and members of the public who are not represented formally on the Partnership, to take place during autumn 2019. The next meeting of the Local Partnership will take place in November 2019.

Youth Challenge Funding

- 3.3 Each Local Partnership receives a proportionate share of the Youth Challenge budget, which funds projects and activities benefiting young people up to age 25. The Youth Challenge element of the Johnstone and Linwood Local Partnership budget will be allocated through a Youth Participatory budgeting exercise, where young people in the area vote for the applications that they want to see funded. This will be the same for all Local Partnership areas.
- 3.4 Participatory Budgeting means that the people who are intended to benefit from the projects vote on which projects are funded. Young people from each of the Local Partnership areas will be involved in developing the process for conducting the Participatory Budgetary exercise before a voting exercise is opened up to the wider community of young people in each Local Partnership area.

Code of Conduct/Register of Interest

3.4 A presentation was made at the March 2019 meeting of Johnstone and Linwood Local Partnership regarding members signing up to a Code of Conduct and Register of Interest. This presented information for consideration by each Local Partnership on the issue of members of the Local Partnership signing up to a Code of Conduct and completion of a Register of Interest. It was decided at the meeting that the Code of Conduct for Devolved Public Bodies be adopted for Johnstone and Linwood Local Partnership. It was also agreed that community representatives appointed as members of the Local Partnership sign up to the Register of Interests.

TITLE:

Applications For Local Partnership Grant Funding

1. Summary

- 1.1 Applications for grant funding from the seven Local Partnership areas were invited in April 2019, with a deadline for submission of 20 May 2019.
- 1.2 At the last meeting of the Johnstone and Linwood Local Partnership on 26 March 2019, members agreed a draft set of priorities for the Local Partnership. The priorities identified for Johnstone and Linwood were:
 - Taking pride in the look and feel of our towns
 - What's on in Johnstone and Linwood
 - Roads and transport
 - Community safety
 - Focus on young people (Key theme)
- 2.2 Applications for funding from Johnstone and Linwood Local Partnership have been invited to reflect these priorities. A description of the priorities is set out at paragraph 4.1.
- 2.3 The available allocation for Johnstone and Linwood Local Partnership is £47,044. The total value of applications received is £121,040. This means that the available allocation is oversubscribed by £73,996. In addition a sum of £50 per community representative requires to be ringfenced for potential claim of expenses, as agreed at the March 2019 meeting.

2.4 The Youth Challenge Fund component of Johnstone and Linwood Local Partnership Funding is £21,697. This funding will be allocated by young people through a Participatory Budgeting process to take place later in 2019.

3. Recommendations

3.1 It is recommended that members of Johnstone and Linwood Local Partnership consider the applications for Local Partnership grant funding, as set out below in Appendix 1 and Appendix 2.

4. Background

4.1 The priorities of the Johnstone and Linwood Local Partnership are:

Taking pride in the look and feel of our towns

The Local Partnership want people in Johnstone and Linwood to take pride in the look and feel of their towns and their heritage, with vibrant and well-used town squares, fewer derelict buildings, and making sure the streets are clean.

What's on in Johnstone and Linwood

The Local partnership want to explore how people know what's going on across Johnstone and Linwood. They also want to see community spaces and community events which are safe and affordable, particularly in community halls and hubs.

Roads and transport

The Local Partnership want to address a range of issues related to roads and transport, including congestion, speed, parking and public transport connections.

Community safety

The Local Partnership want to see safe spaces, both safe from crime but also safe physical environments. They also want to look at how they can, along with other community leaders, promote the reporting of crime and anti-social behaviour.

Focus on young people (Key theme)

The Local Partnership are particularly keen to see a focus on how young people can be engaged and involved in work around the Local Priorities

The construction of a new activity hall and outdoor learning centre has opened up a wet weather facility complete with showers and toilets, to support groups taking part in our activities and outdoor learning. New facilities are needed for our growing voluntary campstaff team and active support unit, this project will provide training opportunities and outdoor learning skills for new community groups, from the local partnership within Renfrewshire council

The club seeks only to ask for assistance re ice rental, which accounts for approximately 70% of the total costs likely to be incurred, and seeks assistance to meet 30% of that total cost within a ring fence for ice rental costs. All other expenditure will be met from within its own resources.		

Paisley Pirates were first formed in 1946 & from then until the 1960's played at East Lane. In 1992 they were resurrected at the Lagoon Leisure Centre & from then until 2006, when Renfrewshire Leisure Ltd withdrew ice facilities there. While Pirates were successful in relocating to Braehead Arena, the cost there is prohibitive, currently standing at almost £200 per hour with an 8% increase pending. The various other activities such as junior development fell due to the high cost. Due to the paucity of ice facilities Pirates have on occasions gone as far as Dundee & Dumfries to secure ice. Community Safety

The club took a leading role in the promotion of an Anti Knife campaign led by the Paisley Daily Express. The team was featured in the newspaper holding campaign stickers which were then distributed to supporters and local people for display on their cars.

The club provides an alternative to anti-social behaviour and crime in the local area, by providing affordable entertainment in a safe environment at a time where there may be fewer alternatives on activities to participate within.

Focus on Young People

We hope to run an Under-18's team next season in addition to the Pirates team. In the longer term, if funds and ice time are available, it is hoped to run more junior teams from the age of 5 upwards.

Some of the connections we have are RAMH, spark of genius, community service, West college Scotland's adults with addition needs and kibble we believe everyone should have the chance to be involved in their community. These connections help provide placements for anyone suffering mental health issues, physical disabilities, someone who has been out of the community, anyone who is looking to get back into work or anyone who just wants to volunteer, its a placement where everyone is included in every aspect of the farm with no judgement. We offer work experience placements and curriculum of exellence to many different high schools throughout Renfrewshire and beyond including Johnstone high school, the placements are invaluable to pupils wishing to pursue a career in the animal sector as not many places allow under 16's to work so closely with such a variety of animals, in recent years our volunteers have went on to become fully qualified veterinary nurses. . We are on an active bus route with buses coming from many different areas which helps make it easy to visit from many parts of Renfrewshire and the surrounding areas.

The farm runs regular education and fun workshops to bring the local and surrounding communities together to learn different aspects of animal care, our parent and toddler workshops are hugely popular bringing parent and toddlers from many areas Johnstone included. These workshops offer great fun for all participants as there are no other parent and toddler events which involve animals in any local area. We have great connections with the local nurseries and primary school groups including a recent successful visit from auchenlodment primary school providing them with a tour and handling session where the children had great fun meeting the animals we are the only small community farm in the resounding area and is easily accessed by bus.

We have a small secure play area based within the farm which is decorated by colourful cartoon animals which is hugely popular and many happy hours are spent by children and parents.
