1 Minute of Previous Meeting

The Minute of the meeting of Erskine, Inchinnan, Bishopton and Langbank Local Partnership held on 19 June 2019 was submitted and approved.

DECIDED: That the Minute be approved.

2b Celebrating Renfrewshire Youth Participatory Budgeting Exercise

There was submitted a report by the Chief Executive relative to the Celebrating Renfrewshire Youth Participatory Budgeting exercise.

The report intimated that the Youth Challenge Fund component, renamed Celebrating Renfrewshire: by young people for young people, of The Erskine, Inchinnan, Bishopton and Langbank Local Partnership budget had been allocated during September 2019 by a participatory budgeting exercise for young people aged 12 to 25 years. Young people co-produced the process of voting and 384 young people from Erskine, Inchinnan, Bishopton and Langbank areas voted.

The results of the Celebrating Renfrewshire Participatory Budgeting exercise for September 2019 was appended to the report.

Emma Feeney and Ross Gardiner from the Youth Steering Group, gave a presentation to members on the outcome of the youth participatory process. There followed a question and answer session.

DECIDED:

(a) That the outcome of the youth participatory budgeting exercise for this Local Partnership be noted; and

(b) That the presentation be noted.

3 Local Partnership Priorities

There was submitted a report by the Chief Executive relative to the priority areas for focus agreed at the meeting of the Erskine, Inchinnan, Bishopton and Langbank Local Area Partnership held on 4 April 2019.

The priorities agreed at that time were: -

- Health and wellbeing;
- Connectivity;
- Community identity;
- Planning and environment;
- Community empowerment; and
- Intergenerational work.

The Partnership considered the following in relation to these priorities: -

- Youth services;
- Services for older people;

- Social isolation;
- Community buses/health and wellbeing;
- Transport and the timing of transport;
- Environment/climate change/education;
- Recycling why we recycle and what happens to it;
- Officer attendance at Community Council meetings;
- Policing/Community policing and fostering relationships

Members worked in groups to review the local priorities for the area. After discussion, and following feedback from groups the following local priorities were identified; youth services; older people services, social isolation; transport and timings of transport; environment/climate change/education; recycling; officer attendance at Community Council meetings; and policing/community policing/co-operation and fostering relationships. The Tackling Poverty & Welfare Reform Manager grouped the reviewed local priorities under key themes of community transport; recycling; climate change; social isolation; and health. It was proposed that an appropriate Officer from the Renfrewshire Community Link Team attend a future meeting to provide information on the initiative A Local Information System for Scotland (ALISS). This was agreed.

Based on the key themes and discussion at the meeting, the Tackling Poverty and Welfare Reform Manger advised that the local priorities identified would be grouped under each of the key themes for discussion at future meetings of the Local Partnership.

DECIDED:

(a) That the Erskine, Inchinnan, Bishopton and Langbank Local Partnership priorities of youth services; older people services, social isolation; transport and timings of transport; environment/climate change/education; recycling; officer attendance at Community Council meetings; and policing/community policing/co-operation and fostering relationships be approved and grouped under the key themes of community transport; recycling; climate change; social isolation; and health for discussion at future meetings of the Partnership; and

(b) That it be approved that an appropriate Officer from the Renfrewshire Community Link Team attend a future meeting to provide information on the initiative A Local Information System for Scotland (ALISS).

2a Underpass Project - Update

There was submitted a presentation by members of Members of the Erskine Youth Council on the work undertaken on the Erskine Mural Project.

The Youth Group indicated that they were working with young people in Erskine who had an interest in giving back to their community, and with Tragic O'Hara an experienced mural painter and artist.

Through the mural, the Youth Council hoped to combat antisocial behavior such as vandalism and to demonstrate that young people could contribute to their comm unity in positive ways.

The Youth Council advised that four potential sites had been identified and the underpass chosen was Rashielea 3

The site was chosen for its central location. It was often used by young people, needed brightening up and the mural would create a more positive and welcoming environment.

The presentation provided information on the finalised mural designs and the next step which included hosting a 5-day community vote between 15 and 20 November through Erskine social media pages and a ballot box at Bargarran Community Centre; painting the mural on Saturday 23 and Sunday 24 November; and hosting a community event to celebrate the finished mural on Friday 29 November 2019.

Members of the Erskine Youth Council were then heard in answer to questions from members on various aspects of the presentation.

DECIDED: That the Presentation be noted.

4a Grant Funding Update

There was submitted a report by the Chief Executive advising that at the meeting of Erskine, Inchinnan, Bishopton and Langbank Local Partnership held on 19 June 2019, nine projects in total had been awarded funding with two awards subject to specific conditions and one project continued for further information.

Fusion Youth Ministries had applied for £5,300 to fund an outdoor ticketed event. The Partnership agreed at the meeting on 19 June to award the grant to underwrite the cost of the event with the award to be refunded if ticket sales covered event costs. The Tackling Poverty and Welfare Reform Manager advised that the relevant accounts were not available at this time and that a report would be submitted to a future meeting of the Partnership.

The Breastfeeding Network had applied for £6091 to fund breastfeeding support to local women. The application had been continued on the basis that further information would be sought from the group about the local impact of this project. The response from the group was contained within the report.

An infographic giving the flavour of some of the key projects funded and indicating how these related to local priorities for The Erskine, Inchinnan, Bishopton and Langbank Local Partnership was appended to the report.

The Tackling Poverty and Welfare Reform Manager was heard in answer to questions from members of the Partnership in relation to both applications.

DECIDED:

(a) That the grant of £6091 awarded to the Breastfeeding Network be ringfenced and that representatives from the Breastfeeding Network be invited to attend the next meeting of the Partnership; and

(b) That the report be otherwise noted.

4b Budget Monitoring Report

There was submitted a report by the Director of Finance & Resources relative to the Erskine, Inchinnan, Bishopton and Langbank Local Partnership budget for 2019/20.

The report advised that the Local Partnership provided funding through the General Grant Fund and the Celebrating Renfrewshire Youth Fund following a participatory budgeting exercise. An Appendix to the report detailed the funding allocated at the Erskine, Inchinnan, Bishopton and Langbank Local Partnership meeting held on 19 June 2019. This indicated that the Partnership had a remaining balance of £11,447.68 which included £6091 ringfenced for the Breastfeeding Network.

Councillor Campbell proposed that the residual balance of £5356.68 be reallocated to the Celebrating Renfrewshire Youth Fund to be distributed among youth organisations using the algorithm which had been used during the Participatory Budget exercise. In the event that no grant was allocated to the Breastfeeding network, the £6091 would also be reallocated to the Celebrating Renfrewshire Youth Fund. This was agreed.

DECIDED:

(a) That the residual balance of £5356.68 be reallocated to the Celebrating Renfrewshire Youth Fund to be distributed among youth organisations using the algorithm which had been used during the Participatory Budget exercise;

(b) That in the event that no grant was allocated to the Breastfeeding network, the £6091 would also be reallocated to the Celebrating Renfrewshire Youth Fund; and

(c) That the report be otherwise noted.

5 Local Partnership Review

There was submitted a report by the Chief Executive relative to a review of Local Partnerships.

The report intimated that following the establishment of the Local Partnerships in September 2018, it had been agreed that there would be a review of arrangements after one year of operation and it was anticipated that the review would begin in January 2020.

Since January 2019, Local Partnerships had agreed their membership, identified some initial local priorities and distributed their grant funding. In addition, the Youth Challenge Fund had been distributed across all seven Local Partnerships using a participatory budgeting approach.

The report proposed that the Local Partnership review cover the key areas used throughout the consultation and development of the Local Partnership model. This allowed for consistency and comparison with previous engagement and consultation exercises as well as fair consideration of the proposals implemented which included function; membership; boundaries; meetings; and grants.

It was important that a wide range of views could be heard as part of the review and the report suggested that the following methods be used in order to gather feedback: a review of all correspondence and feedback received since the establishment of the Local Partnerships; a further invitation for all Local Partnership members to input to the review on all topics in writing, with the opportunity to do this online, on paper or face-to- face; and an opportunity for wider community members to feedback online or on paper. Local Partnership members were asked to contribute their views on the scope of the review to make sure it covered all the necessary areas. In addition, members were asked to provide views on how the review should be carried out.

DECIDED: That members of the Local Partnership provide views, to Community Planning, on both the proposed scope and approach for the Local Partnership review, as outlined in section 3 of the report.

6 Future Meeting Dates

There was submitted a report by the Chief Executive relative to meetings of Erskine, Inchinnan, Bishopton and Langbank Local Partnership in 2020.

The report intimated that, when formed, it was agreed that Local Partnerships would meet three times per year. In 2019, Local Partnerships met four times, in recognition that there was additional business required to get Local Partnerships up and running.

The report proposed that meetings in 2020 be held around the months of April, August and November; that grant funding allocations for the 2020/21 financial year be made at the April meeting; that wider engagement events be held in early 2020; that an event be carried out in each Local Partnership area which would be open to the wider community to attend.

The Convener proposed that a further meeting be arranged for the end of January 2020.

Members agreed unanimously that the meeting proposed for January include a presentation on recycling, and that the Breastfeeding Network be invited to attend in relation to its grant application.

DECIDED:

(a) That meetings of Local Partnership be held around April, August and November and that members be advised of the date, time and venue for these meetings; and

(b) That a further meeting be arranged for late January 2020 to include a presentation on recycling, and that the Breastfeeding Network be invited to attend in relation to its grant application.

There were no declarations of interest intimated by members prior to commencement of the meeting.

Additional Item

The Chair indicated that there was one additional item which had not been included in the notice calling the meeting. The Chair, being of the opinion that the item which was dealt with at item 2 below was competent and relevant, authorised its consideration.

1 Application for Grant Funding - Breastfeeding Network

Under reference to item 4a of the Minute of the meeting of this Partnership held on 14 November 2019, there was submitted a report by the Chief Executive Renfrewshire Council relative to an application for Partnership funding by the Breastfeeding Network. The report contained a summary of the application and the background thereto, and detailed specific issues that the Local Partnership members had raised for further information. The report also indicated that should the Partnership be minded not to approve the grant to the Breastfeeding Network, the resource would be awarded to projects identified through the Celebrating Renfrewshire Youth Participatory Budgeting exercise as agreed at the meeting held on 14 November 2019 A list of the projects that had applied for funding through this fund was appended to the report. The Partnership resumed consideration of the request for grant funding by the Network for £6091 to fund breastfeeding support to local women.

M Woodward from the Breastfeeding Network, Renfrewshire Breast Buddies was invited to attend the meeting. She indicated that the Network had been volunteering in Renfrewshire for around 15 years and with the support of Renfrewshire Council and the Scottish Government since 2015 which had enabled further training of mothers who had breastfed to support other new families achieve their breastfeeding goals.

She advised that the last year the weekly drop in group in Johnstone had had mothers attend from Erskine, Bishopton, Langbank and Inchinnan.

ERSKINE - 3, INCHINNAN -1, BISHOPTON - 2 LANGBANK - 1

She indicated that the Network would like to offer a more localised group for these mothers by training more peer supporters and opening another drop-in group which would then give them more choice. By training these women they would achieve an accredited qualification from Open College Network London (OCN) which could help them to access further education. The training opportunity helped to reduce isolation in new mothers and helped them access new social networks, gaining confidence and learning new skills. Some mothers wanted to train with the Network as they had had a difficult experience themselves and wanted to help others avoid difficulties. Other mothers wanted to train because they themselves had received good support and want to give back to the community.

M Woodward indicated that the Network had held a popup breastfeeding support group in Erskine Sports Centre which had been very successful. Both new mothers and pregnant women attended.

M Woodward stated that the Network used Social Media, local Health visiting teams and word of mouth advertise their training and she was developing a poster and intended to organise an informal information session. M Woodward was then heard in answer to questions from members of the Partnership on the Breastfeeding Network. M Woodward then left the meeting and discussion took place on the merits of the application. Councillor Campbell proposed that in terms of future sustainability, that in the letter confirming grant, the Breastfeeding Network be encouraged to seek guidance from Renfrewshire Enterprise on alternative funding streams. This was agreed

Councillor Campbell seconded by D Woodrow moved that the application be granted on the basis that the Network provide feedback on the impact that the funding has locally. This was agreed.

DECIDED:

(a) That the award of a grant of £6091 from the Erskine, Inchinnan, Bishopton and Langbank Local Partnership to the Breastfeeding Network be approved subject to the Network providing feedback the funding has locally; and

(b) That it be agreed in terms of future sustainability, in the letter confirming grant, the Breastfeeding Network be encouraged to seek guidance from Renfrewshire Enterprise on alternative funding streams.

2 Police Scotland Update

B McNaught, Police Scotland provided an update on local issues affecting the Partnership area, he addressed concerns raised at the number of car thefts which had been carried out. He indicated that a number of incidents had taken place on one night and advised that a number of members of the public had come forward with personal CCTV footage which had assisted Police Scotland with its enquiries.

In terms of Community Policing, concern was expressed that the area had only one community police officer. Scottish Fire and Rescue had also been called out a number of times in relation to fires in wheelie bins. It was noted that this issue was not confined to Erskine but was occurring in other areas.

Discussion then took place with regard to vigilante groups in other local authority areas. Inspector McNaught strongly recommended against this course of action.

Reference was made to the speed watch system and Inspector McNaught indicated that this was more akin to a neighbourhood watch scheme and that individuals were trained on the use of the devices to check the speed of vehicles in the area.

Inspector McNaught indicated that Police Scotland was currently campaigning to recruit additional Special Constables.

DECIDED: That the information be noted.

3 Recycling

Under reference to item 6 of the Minute of the meeting of this Partnership held on 14 November 2019 There was submitted a report by the Chief Executive, Renfrewshire Council together with a presentation by the Sustainability, Place and Assets Manager relative to recycling.

The report advised that one of the local priorities identified by the Local Partnership was Planning and Environment where the Partnership wanted to be involved in, and influence, planning decisions, and were particularly interested in land ownership and use. The Partnership saw this as key to supporting a clean and green area which included street cleanliness issues at a local level, but also wider green issues such as low carbon.

It had been agreed that an officer from Renfrewshire Council would be invited to attend the meeting of the Local Partnership on 30 January 2020 to give a presentation on recycling.

K Anderson, Sustainability, Place and Assets Manager submitted a presentation on recycling.

The presentation provided information on Scotland's zero waste plan, the circular economy; the challenges in terms of waste composition for grey bins; objectives of service change; impacts of service change; achievements; the Clyde Valley Residual Waste Treatment Project; partner Councils; key facts; the Bargeddie Residual Waste Treatment plant; future legislation, in particular in relation to the Deposit Return Scheme; Extended Producer Responsibility for Packaging Waste Consultation; improving enforcement; and secondary legislation.

The Sustainability, Place and Assets Manager was then heard in answer to questions from members on the presentation.

DECIDED: That the report and presentation be noted.

TITLE: Applications for Local Partnership funding in Erskine, Inchinnan, Bishopton and Langbank - 2020/21

1. Summary

- 1.1 Applications for grant funding from the seven Local Partnership areas were invited in February 2020, to be considered at the Local Partnership meetings due to be held in March/April.
- 1.2 The Erskine, Inchinnan, Bishopton and Langbank Local Partnership meeting in April was cancelled due to the Coronavirus pandemic, to reflect both the 'lockdown' restrictions and the emergency planning arrangements in place put in place by Renfrewshire Council.
- 1.3 Renfrewshire Council resumed its policy board arrangements in August, and it was agreed by Renfrewshire Council's Emergencies Board that Local Partnerships would be resumed in September to allow for the allocation of Local Partnership funding for 2020/21.
- 1.4 The available allocation for Erskine, Inchinnan, Bishopton and Langbank Local Partnership is £43,989.
- **1.5** In addition, a sum of £50 per community representative requires to be ringfenced for potential claim of expenses. These expenses are deducted from the available allocation for the Local Partnership. As the Local Partnership has seven community members, this means £350 requires to be ringfenced. The sum available for allocation by the Local Partnership is therefore £43,639.

1.6 The Youth Challenge Fund component of Erskine, Inchinnan, Bishopton and Langbank Local Partnership Funding is £20,288. This funding will be allocated by young people through a Participatory Budgeting process currently underway.

2. **Recommendations**

2.1 It is recommended that members of Erskine, Inchinnan, Bishopton and Langbank Local Partnership consider the applications for Local Partnership grant funding, as set out below in Appendix 1 and 2.

3. Background

- 3.1 Applications for grant funding from the seven Local Partnership areas were invited in February 2020, to be considered at the Local Partnership meetings due to be held in June.
- 3.2 Applicants were also provided with refreshed guidance, as well as a description of the Local Priorities identified by the Erskine, Inchinnan, Bishopton and Langbank Local Partnership. A copy of this guidance has been provided at Appendix 3.
- 3.3 Following agreement by Renfrewshire Council's Emergencies Board that Local Partnerships would resume in September 2020, all applicants were contacted and provided the opportunity to amend their application or reflect any changes in circumstances that may have occurred since original applications were submitted.
- 3.4 Local Partnership members are asked to consider the applications for funding summarised at Appendix 1 and 2 of this report, and to assess these against the Local Priorities agreed by the Erskine, Inchinnan, Bishopton and Langbank local priorities.
- 3.5 Following feedback received by Local Partnership members in previous funding rounds, an initial assessment has been carried out by officers to support Local Partnership members in their decision-making. Where applications have made clear reference to the Local Priorities identified by the Local Partnership, this is identified in the first table at Appendix 1. Applications that make a partial or no reference to Erskine, Inchinnan, Bishopton and Langbank Local Priorities are summarised in the second table for example, the project may involve intergenerational working (and therefore meet the Local Priority around intergenerational working) but not deliver this directly in the Local Partnership area or make reference to how many people from the area would be engaged in the project.

3.6 The priorities of the Erskine, Inchinnan, Bishopton and Langbank Local Partnership are:

Health and Wellbeing

The Local Partnership want to make sure people are aware of and can access health services, to support both physical and mental health. This includes community-led health services too. The Partnership also think tackling social isolation is key to improving health across the area.

Connectivity

The Local Partnership want to see places across Erskine, Inchinnan, Bishopton and Langbank better connected to each other and to the wider area. They want to see provision of good quality public transport, but also safe, clean and green routes for walking and cycling.

Community Identity

The Local Partnership want to support the individual identity and history of each town and village. A key part of this should be local events which celebrate this identity and better communication of what's on across the area to support this.

Planning and Environment

The Local Partnership want to be involved in, and influence, planning decisions, and are particularly interested in land ownership and use. The Partnership see this as key to supporting a clean and green area, which also includes street cleanliness issues at a local level, but also wider green issues such as low carbon.

Community Empowerment

The Local Partnership want communities to be involved in, and influencing, decision making about the area. This includes making sure communities are well informed about local issues and looking at ways to get people involved such as participatory budgeting.

Key Theme – Intergenerational Work

The Local Partnership is particularly interested in building relationships between younger and older communities across the area and exploring how intergenerational work might support their Local Priorities.

Similarly, our participation in fund raising ventures such as local Gala Days were cut off as these were cancelled.

The sport's governing body has temporarily put back the season's opening until October but while this is helpful in reducing outgoings for e.g. training facilities for the moment we have as yet been unable to purchase essential items such as new strips until we are able to forecast how much money we will have.

Therefore, while the club, in appreciation of the similar circumstances facing other organisations, is not increasing the sum requested from the local Partnership(s), the sum requested has taken on an acute nature as any monies allocated will have to stretch somewhat further.

The club made front page headlines locally in recent times by being the first to discontinue the award of a case of beer to the Man of the Match in favour of giving a case of healthy drinks to replace lost body fluids.

The club paid a visit to local primary school, Bishopton, to promote ice hockey through fitness, healthy diet and a need to look after oneself to play sport and be successful. Timbers (Pirates mascot) also attended to entertain the kids. We are currently looking at how we can further increase these visits within this Local Partnership.

The club also has a long running relationship with Pro Life Fitness Centre and through their business relations, have been able to offer discounted membership rates to fans of the club, promoting a healthier lifestyle to many.

Connectivity/Community Empowerment

Bus links to and from the locale to Braehead are adequate and supporters for links with fans from other localities.

The Paisley Pirates registered office address is in Erskine, where the administration of the club takes place. The club's Head Coach and team captain live within the local partnership area, as do the management committee and other volunteers. The club is run entirely by a voluntary management committee, assisted by volunteers.

As well as weekly features in the Paisley Express during the season, we have our own website, Facebook with 2436 Followers and 2415 Likes, Twitter 2303 Followers, Instagram 618 Followers and various other digital outlets within Renfrewshire such as What's On Renfrewshire etc

Community Identity

The club regularly seeks opportunities to be involved in working with other local groups, and in 2013, Head Coach Ian Turley, and many of the players were invited along to help reopen Lamont City Farm, following a period of refurbishment and repair. This relationship has previously been extended with bucket collections taking place at home fixtures to support the local group.

The Pirates have supported Erskine Hospital with collections during games on Poppy Day.

The Head coach of the Pirates, who also resides in Erskine & has done all his life, has been selected as Great Britain's U16 assistant coach, after having shown particular excellence as a Scotland U17 Coach for 2 years.

This season has seen new supporters come from the new Dargavel Village, which we hope to build on. It is intended to organise a leaflet drop within the Partnership area, with particular emphasis on the new Dargavel community, before the start of the season, introducing residents to a diverse sport.

The project seeks to find artefacts and evidence of our early occupation of this area, and how it developed over a wider part of Renfrewshire. It will do this lead by a professional archaeologist, assisted by unpaid community volunteers of all ages, and schoolchildren, all working together. Thus intergenerational. Some of these schoolchildren will come from Cross-reach Erskine Campus, as well as Kibble in Paisley, and Help the Heroes, thus aiding mental health in the wider community.		

The project will dig a number of trenches. Two within the All Hallows church "footprint" but going much deeper than previously. The 2017 dig found artefacts back to the mid 1500's, but the site has a history going back to 600AD. It is artefacts and evidence form this period which are being sought. Other trenches will be dug over known foundations of demolished buildings like the manse, Ferrycroft, and Ladyacre looking for dating evidence to tie them to Roy's map of circa 1758. All trenches will be dug by the community volunteers and other participants, overseen by the professional archaeologist.

Schoolchildren will have the opportunity to participate in Archaeology Scotland's Hero award programme. On the 2017 project 388 awards were made, and it is hoped this participation level will be repeated.

The Project anticipates the following outcomes:

- A potential life enhancing experience for everyone participating. For some of the older school children (main stream and non-main stream) it could be life changing, with regards to career choice.
- A digital record of this project will be produced, and added to that already available of earlier projects on the IHIG website: www.myinchinnan.org.uk
- Booklets will be produced describing what was done, and what the artefacts found, tell us about the site, and the wider community.
- Schoolchildren will have participated in the Heritage Heroes and the Archaeology Skills

Passport scheme operated by Archaeology Scotland.

• The site is adjacent to the new cycleway from Inchinnan bridge to the business park, which lends itself to potentially being a catalyst to expanding tourism into the area.

6. Who Benefits From The Project?

Local community, residents and schoolchildren will benefit from this project as it will provide an opportunity for community members and schoolchildren (main stream and non-main stream) to gain experience in working with professional archaeologist and participate in a live archaeological dig. Community will also benefit from knowledge gained about their local area from the dig as the additions of new information will be available on the website, containing formal reports and booklet of the project.

7. Fit With Local Partnership Priorities

The project fits with four Local Partnership priorities. Local Priorities of "Community Identity" and "Intergenerational Work" will be met because the project will provide an opportunity for schoolchildren and community members of different ages to work together. Results of the project will provide additional information about the local area, thus strengthening the individual identity and history of the area. The purpose of the Grant is to assist the Local Partnership meet the objectives they have set out for this year. This project will enable all members of the community to access all the services they require and enjoy the benefits of facilities in the local partnership. Our main priority is the disabled community but ensuring that the area is suitable for them, we include other age groups such as the elderly, children learning to walk and even people with sports injuries and so many more. Renfrewshire Access Panel would like to ensure that everyone in the community is included to reduce isolation and loneliness. We would also like to ensure that the members of the local partnership are able to read and interpret plans for future meetings so that the best possible changes are made to any renovation or new build in the community ensuring all the current buildings and venues are used to their full potential.

The need for the project has been established by the concerns of the Local Area Partnership and we will assist in any way we can to ensure safe travel for everyone. We will assist with sourcing accessible play equipment for all children and auditing the parks, pavements and roads for any repairs. We also provide work experience for children from mainstream and additional needs schools as well as adults returning to work by providing volunteering opportunities for them. We have also identified that a lot of the disabled community have little or no access to technology which we can provide training for and we will provide this training for any member of the community.

We will provide access audits/surveys to ensure spaces are safe and meet the requirements for accessibility ensuring they are safe to walk/wheel on by working with Renfrewshire Council to ensure roads and pavements are repaired. We will also provide advice on the best accessible play equipment for unused green spaces to ensure disabled children can play safely and interact with other children. We will provide training and work experience for both children and adults on technology along other training courses we provide and offer volunteering opportunities for anyone in the community. We will continue to work with transport providers to ensure the best possible service can be obtained.

We would also like to offer training to the Local Area Partnership on reading and interpreting plans to ensure everyone is fully aware of the process and implications.

We have a small secure play area based within the farm which is decorated by colourful cartoon animals which is hugely popular, and many happy hours are spent by children and parents. We also now have the only animal facility in the local area, with the recent closure of both Barshaw Park Pet's Corner and Robertson Park Pet's corner (fortunately we were able to offer a new home to several animals from both facilities), therefore are finding that we have even more young visitors from the local partnerships attending the farm in the hope of seeing some familiar furry friends.

The farm has supplied manure to many of the local and surrounding community allotments courtesy of the community service team, we share regular information to anyone looking to have a small plot and happy to pass the details on for the area they live in.

The grant will help towards running costs to ensure the project can continue to provide a variety of services and continue to work with a number of local educational establishments within the community.

6. Who Benefits From The Project?

Local communities across Renfrewshire will benefit from this project. This includes:

- anyone suffering mental health issues, physical disabilities, someone who has been out of the community, anyone who is looking to get back into work or anyone who just wants to volunteer
- families through parent and toddler workshops
- Gleniffer high school pupils as they offer placements to pupils wishing to pursue a career in the animal sector.

Local Partnership Grant Funding

A guide to the grant funding available from Local Partnerships and how to apply



Local Partnerships are a way for communities, elected members and public organisations to work together at a local level.

There are seven Local Partnerships in Renfrewshire, and they replaced Local Area Committees in 2018.

Each Local Partnership has agreed a set of Local Priorities, and each Partnership has grant funding they can allocate to support these priorities.

The aims of Local Partnerships are to:

- Make connections and networks between community groups and the wider community
- Identify, set and share local community priorities
- Listen to, consult and represent local communities
- Distribute grants to support local priorities

Grants available from Local Partnerships

The Local Partnerships consider applications and award grant funding that reflects their local priorities. The Local Partnerships look after grant funding streams that were previously overseen by Local Area Committees:

- the General Grant Fund;
- two Common Good Funds (Paisley Common Good and Renfrew Common Good); and
- the Youth Challenge Fund

It is strongly advised that organisations read this guidance before writing and submitting their applications.

You will find further information about each of these three funding streams and how to apply for them over the next few pages.

The most important thing to remember when applying for grant funding is to make sure you can contribute to at least one of the local priorities for the area you are applying to. It will be important to take time to find out about these priorities before applying. They are available <u>here</u>.

The Application Process

Read the Local Partnership Grant Funding Guidance and the Priorities for the Local Partnership area you are applying to.

> Attend a drop in session if you would like to discuss the priorities, application process or alternative funding opportunities.

Fill in application, ensuring you address the relevant local priorities and submit to rcgrantapplications@renfrewshire.gov.uk, together with the relevant bank statement, accounts and constitution. The deadline for applications is 9th March 2020

> Your application will be considered by the Local Partnership in April or May. Local Partnership meetings are public, so you are welcome to come along to the April or May meetings. You will not be required to attend, or expected to speak at the meeting.

> > Following the meeting, you will be informed whether your application was successful or not. If you are successful, you will be asked to agree the conditions of grant and payment arrangements will be made.

The Application Form

The standard Voluntary and Community Organisations Grant Application Form is used to apply for Local Partnership funding. The form is available <u>here</u> (under related documents) or please contact the Community Planning team on 0141 6184168 if you would like a paper copy sent to you.

The form has guidance notes in the right-hand column to help you with what information to put in each box. The notes below provide further information about how to make the best use of the application.

Section 1

This section is for you to tell us about your organisation and what you do. In section 1.13 you are asked about which Local Partnership area you are applying to and where your project will be operating. In section 1.13a you should tick the Local Partnership area you are applying for funding in. In 1.13b you should write which Local Partnership area(s) the project you are applying for will operate in. All applications will be treated as an individual application by each Local Partnership. In this way, your activity needs to be viable as a project in each Local Partnership area it is applying to. If you are applying for funding from more than one Local Partnership area, you will either need to make sure your one application covers at least one priority from each of the Local Partnership area applied to, or submit separate applications tailored to the priorities of each Local Partnership area applied to. If you are submitting one application to cover more than one Local Partnership area, you will need to make it clear how much funding is being asked for from each Local Partnership. This is covered in section 2.

Section 2

This section is an opportunity to tell us about the project you would like funding for. It is very important that you use this section to explain how you will address the priorities identified by your Local Partnership. These sections will be made public through the summary reports at the Local Partnership meetings. You should provide a good description of your project in this section highlighting clearly which priorities it will address. This is information that the Local Partnership Meeting will use to decide on your application. If you are using one application to apply to more than one Local Partnership, you need to write the name of the Local Partnership applied to next to the amount requested from that Local Partnership in section 2.10.

Section 3

This section is to make sure that you have included all the necessary supporting paperwork. Your application cannot be considered until you submit all of the correct paperwork.

Section 4

If you are filling in a paper copy of the form to post, you can sign this section of the form. If you are doing the form online, a signature can be taken at a later date.

General Grant Fund

The General Grant Fund provides grants of up to £10,000. The grants are open to constituted local community, voluntary organisations and Community Planning Partners. The fund is intended to develop local activities and projects within Local Partnership areas. The total amount of General Grant funding available is slightly different in each of the seven Local Partnership areas, because funding is allocated to Local Partnerships based on their population. Activities are expected to reflect the different priorities and needs in each of the seven areas.

Eligibility Criteria

Who can and cannot apply?

- Any community or voluntary organisation with a constitution and a bank account can apply. Any organisation applying should be accountable to its members.
- Community Planning Partners can submit applications for funding, but Council services cannot. Community Planning partners should not submit applications for projects that are regarded as core functions.
- If your application is for an individual, it will not be considered.
- Your application should contribute towards at least one of the Local Partnership's key priorities. These were established by Partnerships at their March 2019 meetings and have been developed further since. Projects should be able to demonstrate real benefit to the local area by improving or complementing existing service provision.
- Organisations that work across Renfrewshire, or in a number of Local Partnership areas, can apply, but only for projects or activities which support an area's priorities, and are delivered in that area specifically.
- You cannot apply for costs of activities that have already happened.
- You cannot apply for your total running costs. You can apply to part fund running costs though.
- The General Grant Fund will very occasionally support applications to fund activities such as day trips and lunches, but only when they provide an additional community benefit (for example tackling loneliness and isolation).
- The General Grant Fund will not support projects that exist mainly to further religious or political beliefs.

- Your application must encourage equality of opportunity.
- You cannot apply to fund either a trip abroad or hospitality to other organisations.
- If you receive a grant from the General Grant Fund, it must usually be spent within this financial year.
- General Grant Fund awards are one-off and are not intended to provide ongoing funding for the same or similar activities on an annual basis.
- If you are successful in your application, you must accept and comply with the grant conditions. It is also expected that you report back on the impact the project has had once the funds are spent.
- You should plan how you will sustain your organisation, once funding from the General Grant Fund has been used.
- You cannot use the funding for events to raise funds for other charities
- You cannot use the funding to cover your Community Councils' running costs above those funded by its administration grant from the Council.
- You should provide evidence of partnership working, where applicable.

What types of activities or projects can and cannot be funded?

Activities or projects must contribute to at least one of the key priorities identified by the Local Partnership. The fund can support a variety of projects and activities. This can include supporting people back into employment; supporting young people; supporting community safety activity; supporting healthier lifestyles; tackling poverty in disadvantaged areas; and promoting equality within local areas.

These types of activities can cover an array of different projects. Examples include:

- Refurbishment of community facilities such as decorating or improving the layout of a room for community use.
- Enhancing or creating community gardens for recreational areas.
- Community events such as gala days.
- Projects that raise awareness of healthy eating and help people change eating habits.
- Projects that promote positive mental health issues.
- After school clubs that encourage development e.g. homework clubs,
- Leadership and team working skills for group members.

Common Good Funds

Common Good is funding generated from an investment portfolio where the annual income is used to support local projects. There are Common Good funds in both Renfrew and Paisley, which are distributed through the Local Partnership. In Paisley, the fund is split across the three Local Partnerships, based on the population of each area.

The general eligibility criteria for the common good funds are the same as for the General Grant Fund, although there is no specific maximum award. The main difference is that the Common Good Funds are charities and so any projects funded through the common good funds must meet their charitable objectives (the advancement of civic responsibility or community development) to benefit people in Renfrew or Paisley.

Former Youth Challenge Fund

The Youth Challenge Fund was allocated using participatory budgeting for the first time in 2019/20 and became known as "Celebrating Renfrewshire – By Young People, For Young People." This was the first year that young people decided directly which youth projects should be funded. It is expected that this fund will be allocated in the same way this year. This funding round will be launched separately.

Further Information

Drop in sessions will be held across the Local Partnership areas. These are not specifically to address any funding concerns, but may be useful if you would like to find out more about local priorities and give your input on Local Partnerships more generally.

Frequently Asked Questions

How will funding award decisions be made?

The members of the Local Partnership in each area will make a decision on each funding application, guided by an assessment of whether the application has met the local priorities. Remember to base your application on the local priorities of the Partnership area you are applying to. Priorities are linked <u>here</u>

How do I apply?

Fill in a standard grant application form on the Renfrewshire Council web site. You can do this electronically and email it in or send in a completed paper copy. You should make sure you have understood what the local priorities are for the area you are applying to before completing your application.

When is the deadline for applications?

The deadline will be 9th March 2020 for consideration at the April/ May meetings.

What happens to my application after it is submitted?

Your application and documents will be checked and then stored on the Council system. A summary of your application will be prepared to include in the papers for the relevant Local Partnership meeting. If there are any queries or clarifications needed about your application, you will be contacted before the Local Partnership papers are prepared.

When will I hear back?

You will hear back after the meeting of the Local Partnership has made a decision. The decisions will be made during the April/ May 2020 cycle of meetings. Local Partnership meetings are public, so you are welcome to come along to the meetings. You will not be required to attend or expected to speak at the meeting.

How much money can I apply for?

You can apply for a maximum of £10,000 from the General Grant Fund. If you are applying for Common Good funding, there is not specific maximum limit – but remember Common Good funding is only available in Paisley and Renfrew.

Who can apply?

Any community or voluntary organisation with a constitution and a bank account can apply. Any organisation applying should be accountable to its members. Council services will not be able to apply for funding. The wider community planning partners will be able to apply, if their project aligns with local priorities.

Can I apply to fund Christmas lights?

Unfortunately, Renfrewshire Council has very limited capacity for any further installation, storage and maintenance of Christmas lighting. If you wish to submit an application which

would require additional Council resources, you should discuss this with Council officers prior to submitting your application.

We work across Renfrewshire, can we apply?

You can apply to one or more Local Partnership. The project you are applying for, must be for the benefit of people who live in that area and the project must align with the local priorities for that area. You should focus on the areas where your project aligns most with the local priorities. You could also think about where your project is based or where most of the people using or otherwise involved in the project will be based. It might align with more than one Local Partnership area. If you do want to apply to more than one Local Partnership area, you will need to either submit separate applications or make it very clear which information applies to which Local Partnership.

What is happening to 'multi LAC' applications?

All applications will be treated as an individual application by each Local Partnership. In this way, your activity needs to be viable as a project in each Local Partnership area it is applying to. If you are applying for funding from more than one Local Partnership area, you will either need to make sure your one application covers at least one priority from each of the Local Partnership areas applied to, or submit separate applications tailored to the priorities of each Local Partnership area applied to. If you are submitting one application to cover more than one Local Partnership area, you will need to make it clear:

- How your project will specifically benefit people in each Local Partnership area applied to, and
- how much funding is being asked for from each Local Partnership.

Is it the same process as the old LAC funding applications?

There are some differences. Local Partnership grant applications must be based on the priorities for that Local Partnership area. The Youth Challenge fund decisions will be made by local young people and so follow a different process to take place later in the year.

Is the total amount of funding the same as the old LAC funding?

Yes, the total amount of funding is the same. It is still based on the population of each area, but now split between the seven Local Partnerships, rather than the five former LACs.

What happens if money is not allocated by the end of the financial year?

Where all available grant funding within a financial year is not fully committed, the balance can be carried forward only where a specific project for the forthcoming financial year has been identified and approved by the Local Partnership. This gives the Local Partnership the flexibility to set aside a proportion of its current year grant for use on a specific project the following year.

It is not intended that this year-end flexibility would be applied to carry forward a general underspend of available grant for which no specific purpose has been identified or approved.

What happens if organisations that are members of Local Partnerships apply for funding?

Organisations that are members of a Local Partnership can still apply to that Local Partnership, but they will not be allowed to speak to the application at the decision meeting and will not be allowed to vote on their own application.

If I am unsuccessful, where can I find other sources of funding?
