### **DECLARATIONS OF INTEREST**

There were no declarations of interest intimated prior to the commencement of the meeting.

#### 1 ELECTION OF CONVENER

It was noted that in terms of the Licensing (Scotland) Act 2005 the Forum must elect one of its members to be Convener. M Dymond, seconded by T Mills proposed that Mr J McSorley be appointed as Convener. This was agreed unanimously. Mr McSorley assumed the chair at this point.

<u>**DECIDED**</u>: That Mr McSorley be appointed as Convener of the Renfrewshire Licensing Forum.

#### 2 MINUTE OF PREVIOUS MEETING

There was submitted the Minute of the previous meeting of the Renfrewshire Licensing Forum, held on 13 February 2023.

**DECIDED**: That the Minute be approved.

### 3 MATTERS ARISING

Under reference to Item 5 of the Minute of the previous meeting of the Renfrewshire Licensing Forum held on 13 February 2023 relative to the Licensing Policy Update, the Convener advised that the statement on behalf of the Licensing Forum had been submitted to the Licensing Board.

<u>**DECIDED**</u>: That it be noted that the statement on behalf of the Forum in respect of the Licensing Policy Update had been submitted to the Licensing Board.

#### 4 POLICE SCOTLAND UPDATE

Sergeant Moore-McGrath advised the Forum that she would cease to be the Licensing Sergeant at the end of this week and that Sergeant Ian Robertson would resume this role.

Police Scotland provided a verbal update on local licensing issues which had arisen since the previous meeting in February 2023 and outlined various statistics which were being provided as part of their annual update to the National Policy Unit.

Police Scotland had attended 460 licensed premises in the Renfrewshire area within the last year in relation to incidents and had undertaken 1110 pro-active and/or reactive inspections of licensed premises. Police Scotland had carried out various campaigns including anti-disorder and anti-social behaviour inspections and the "Talk-to" campaign which would run from June to September 2023. In addition, Sergeant Moore-McGrarth indicated that Pub-watch had resumed. She advised that the increase in post-covid events throughout Renfrewshire had placed demands on Police Scotland.

Sergeant Moore-McGrath was then heard in answer to questions from members on the update.

The Convener and D Edmonds advised the Forum about the Renfrewshire Health and Social Care Partnership roll out of Naloxone within Renfrewshire.

**DECIDED**: That the verbal update be noted.

### 5 LICENSING STANDARDS OFFICER UPDATE

The Fair Trading Officer provided a verbal update relative to licensing activity undertaken since the previous meeting in February 2023. Two premises had been visited in connection with operating plans, three premises were no longer licensed and the premises licence annual fee remained outstanding for four premises.

The Fair Trading Officer outlined the proposed implementation of a duty rota of Licensing Standards/Trading Standards Officers who would respond to enforcement emails and was then heard in answer to questions from members on the update.

**<u>DECIDED</u>**: That the verbal update be noted.

## 6 CONSULTATION - RENFREWSHIRE LICENSING BOARD'S STATEMENT OF LICENSING POLICY 2023-2027

The Convener provided a verbal update relative to the Renfrewshire Licensing Board's Statement of Licensing Policy 2023-2027 consultation.

The Convener proposed that further discussion of the Policy be continued to a future meeting of the Forum and that a collective response to the consultation would be submitted to the Licensing Board on behalf of the Forum. This was agreed unanimously.

Subject: Briefing Paper: Alcohol-Specific Deaths 2022
From: Renfrewshire Alcohol and Drug Partnership

Date: Tuesday, 29<sup>th</sup> August 2023

#### 1. Purpose

The purpose of this briefing paper is to advise on the number of alcohol-specific deaths which occurred in Scotland and Renfrewshire in 2022. The <u>National Records of Scotland</u> published these figures on Tuesday, 29<sup>th</sup> August 2023.

#### 2. Scotland

According to figures published by National Records of Scotland on 29<sup>th</sup> August 2023, 1276 people died in Scotland from causes solely attributed to alcohol. This figure represents an increase of 2% (31 deaths) compared to 2021 and an increase of 25% (256 deaths) on 2019. This means that 3 people a day or 24 people per week lose their lives because of alcohol in Scotland.

- In 2022, the average age at death for females was 58.7 years and for males it was 60.0 years.
- Male deaths continue to account for around two thirds of alcohol specific deaths. However, female deaths increased by 31 to 440 deaths in 2022 while males remain the same.
- There are 4.3 times as many deaths from these causes in the most deprived areas as in the least deprived areas but the equality gap has been narrowing.
- Scotland continues to have the highest alcohol-specific death rate of the UK
  constituent countries in 2021, the latest year for which comparable data exists. Data
  for the rest of the UK is yet to be released for 2022.

#### 3. Renfrewshire

There were 42 alcohol-specific deaths in Renfrewshire in 2022. This is a decrease of 21% (11 deaths) compared to 2021. This is in contrast to Scotland which has seen a slight increase.




Figure 1: Renfrewshire Alcohol-specific alcohol related deaths 2013-2022

- Across all 32 local authorities in Scotland Renfrewshire has the 8<sup>th</sup> highest rate of deaths per 100,000 population (2018-2022).
- Across NHS Greater Glasgow and Clyde (NHSGGC), there were 326 alcohol-specific deaths, an increase of 2% compared with the previous year.

# Families urge First Minister not to backtrack on alcohol marketing pledge

Family members and friends affected by a loved one's drinking have published an open letter to Humza Yousaf, First Minister, urging him not to backtrack on the Scottish Government's longstanding pledge to tackle alcohol marketing due to alcohol industry concerns – ignoring the concerns of those most affected.

Having seen and heard the alcohol industry's vocal response to the Scottish Government's proposals to restrict marketing, the signatories stated:

"...we also have a voice and we need to be heard. We do not have the power or influence of the alcohol industry, we do not have an army of lobbyists or a multi-million pound PR machine to amplify our voices. Our daily lives are shaped by chaos, exhaustion, disappointment, grief and loss. We do not have the time, energy or resources to compete with the industry. But you have let our voice be drowned out by those with money, power and influence."

## Ireland To Introduce Mandatory Health Warnings on Alcohol Products

become the first country in the world to introduce mandatory health warnings on alcohol products.

Under the regulations, alcohol product labels in Ireland will include important information, such as calorie content and grams of alcohol. These labels will also prominently display warnings about the risks associated with alcohol consumption during pregnancy, as well as the dangers of liver disease and cancers caused by alcohol.

Stephen Donnelly, Irish Minister for Health, who signed off on the new policy, said "I welcome that we are the first country in the world to take this step and introduce comprehensive health labelling of alcohol products. I look forward to other countries following our example."

### **Updated CRESH Webmap**

The Centre for Research on Environment, Society and Health (CRESH) has **previously investigated** the links between alcohol environments and health, finding that availability of alcohol in Scotland is related to behaviours, harms and health inequalities.

CRESH have now updated their digital webmap to include data for 2020, in addition to 2012 and 2016. The webmap allows users to visualise the availability of alcohol in Scotland down to the neighbourhood level. The data is available across a range of geographies including Scottish Government Data Zones, health board, local authorities and parliamentary constituencies. Users can also view availability over a variety of time periods and look at where alcohol is sold by type of licensed premises.

# 106 Community Leaders Call on World Health Organization to Stop Closed-Door Meetings with Alcohol Lobbyists

Alcohol Focus Scotland is part of a group of 106 community and public health leaders from 60 countries and six continents calling on the World Health Organization (WHO) to stop its closed-door meetings with alcohol lobbyists, which allow companies that profit from alcoholic products to have unprecedented access to leaders who are responsible for advancing global health.

Alcohol companies and their lobby groups work relentlessly to undermine policies to prevent and reduce harm. The letter also highlights how they also work to undermine the health and safety of communities at the local level. For example, in many African countries, multinational alcohol companies are deploying unethical practices to drive alcohol use, including using "beer promotion girls" and aggressive marketing that exposes children to alcohol promotions.



# New campaign shares letters to loved ones lost to alcohol and drugs

'Everyone knows someone' is the message behind See Beyond - See the Lives - Scotland, a new campaign from the University of Stirling, Scottish Families Affected by Alcohol and Drugs, Scottish Health Action on Alcohol Problems (SHAAP), and The Salvation Army.

The website shares hard-hitting stories and videos from family and friends, in the form of a letter to their loved one who has died. The messaging is deliberately stark and designed to "challenge and provoke". They hope the stories and images will shatter myths surrounding drug and alcohol use and deaths and encourage the public to show compassion for those experiencing problems with substance use and the people left behind when a loved one dies.

# Factors associated with public awareness of the relationship between alcohol use and breast cancer risk

A new study published in BMC Public Health found that awareness of the risk of alcohol use associated with breast cancer was low, with just 1 in 5 (21%) of respondents correctly identifying the relationship. In a blog post published by the Institute of Alcohol Studies (IAS), the lead author explains the importance of increasing public awareness of the breast cancer risk associated with alcohol use.



# Online sale and delivery of alcohol – A growing risk to our community

The Foundation for Alcohol Research and Education (FARE) in Australia has published a new report which distils evidence about harms from the online sale and delivery of alcohol and outlines 13 evidence-based policy recommendations.

Alcohol harm is exacerbated by the online sale and delivery of alcohol, which has vastly increased availability and accessibility, creating unique risks to community health and safety. FARE CEO Caterina Giorgi said that "every phone is a bottle shop", making it difficult for those trying to avoid or cut back on alcohol consumption to escape the constant marketing and sales tactics.

# Effective alcohol policies are associated with reduced consumption among demographic groups who drink heavily

A new study concludes that how much people drank on average was significantly related to the extent to which there were effective alcohol control policies in place.

Published in Alcohol: Clinical and Experimental Research, researchers looked at whether drinking patterns are associated with alcohol control policy. The extent of effective alcohol control policies in place was measured using the International Alcohol Control (IAC) Policy

It looked across 10 countries, including England and Scotland, using self-report surveys of consumption.

Individuals whose reading indicates liver damage are provided with a letter to take to their GP requesting follow-up tests and appropriate management via NHS pathways.

# Public Health Scotland evaluation supports continuation of MUP


Scotland's national public health body Public Health Scotland (PHS) has reported that they are "confident that MUP is an effective mechanism to reduce alcohol-related harm in Scotland" and they "support the continuation of MUP beyond April 2024."

On Tuesday 27<sup>th</sup> June, Public Health Scotland published its final report on the independent evaluation of the impact of minimum unit pricing (MUP) for alcohol in Scotland, which showed that MUP has had a positive impact on health outcomes, including addressing alcohol-related health inequalities. The evaluation also showed there was no clear evidence of substantial negative impacts on the alcoholic drinks industry in Scotland.

MUP led to a 3% reduction in alcohol consumption at a population level. It has reduced deaths directly caused by alcohol consumption by an estimated 13.4% and hospital admissions by 4.1%, with the largest reductions seen in men and those living in the 40% most deprived areas.

Welcoming the findings of the evaluation, Alison Douglas, chief executive of Alcohol Focus Scotland, said "Now we know that minimum unit pricing is truly life-saving, the policy must be continued, and the price increased. To scrap it now or leave it at a level that will quickly lose its effect would condemn hundreds of people to unnecessary suffering."

# New cancer strategy includes vision that "alcohol is no longer a major cause of cancer"

The plan includes the need to target specific cancer risk factors such as tobacco, obesity and alcohol. Alcohol causes 6.5% of deaths in Scotland and 28% of those are due to cancer. While alcohol as a risk factor remains a key challenge, particularly in relation to liver disease and liver cancer, the new strategy recommends following the WHO best buys of making alcohol less available, less affordable and less attractive.

### A Human Rights Bill for Scotland

The Scottish Government is gathering views to help inform how it will take forward the Human Rights Bill. The Bill will incorporate a range of economic, social and cultural rights (such as the right to health) into Scots law for the first time. Although Scotland is already bound by international human rights treaties, embedding these rights into Scottish law will further emphasise the importance of all people being treated with dignity, and ensure that human rights play a central role in strategies, policies and decision-making. The new human rights law will also mean public bodies and others have duties to uphold our rights. Alcohol Focus Scotland believes that this has the potential to transform lives in Scotland – including people seeking support in relation to alcohol and their families.

# Response to Call for Evidence on the Review of National Outcomes

The Scottish Government recently undertook a review of the **National Outcomes**. These outcomes underpin Scotland's wellbeing framework helping it to achieve its purpose by setting an overall vision for life in Scotland.

Alcohol Focus Scotland contributed to the response submitted by the **NCD Alliance Scotland**. We suggested changes to the National Outcomes and associated indicators on health, children and young people, communities and the economy. We have called for reference to the commercial determinants of health and the prevention of noncommunicable diseases (NCDs), with a focus on alcohol, tobacco and related products, and high fat, salt, and sugar (HFSS) foods.

### Reducing alcohol use through alcohol control policies in the general population and population subgroups: a systematic review and meta-analysis

New research published in eClinicalMedicine, part of the Lancet Discovery Science, demonstrates the effectiveness of alcohol control policies in reducing alcohol consumption.

The systematic review found that alcohol taxation and minimum unit prices (MUP) are the most effective policies in reducing alcohol consumption. For example, doubling alcohol taxes or introducing an MUP of 50p per UK unit reduces alcohol consumption by 10% on average.

The researchers concluded that high levels of alcohol consumption and related health consequences can be effectively tackled through implementing evidence-informed alcohol control policies, while more research is needed to uncover difference across population subgroups, which is important for policies that promote health equity.

# Alcohol consumption and risks of more than 200 diseases in Chinese men

New research published in Nature Medicine found a link between alcohol and 33 diseases not previously listed by **World Health Organization** as alcohol-related.

The researchers looked at the associations of alcohol consumption with 207 diseases,

# Unpacking assertions made by the alcohol industry and how they make them: An analysis of submissions into Australia's National Alcohol Strategy

A new study on industry influence in Australian policymaking calls for systematic scrutiny of submissions made into government policy processes to ensure policymakers are aware of misinformation and poor-quality evidence when policy decisions are being made.

Published in the Drug and Alcohol Review, the study analysed alcohol industry submissions into the consultation on Australia's National Alcohol Strategy to determine the content and the ways in which evidence was used and misused. The study found that the alcohol industry consistently made five common assertions: 'Drinking alcohol in moderation has health benefits'; 'Alcohol isn't the cause of violence'; 'Targeted initiatives, not population level alcohol policies, are needed'; 'Strong alcohol advertising regulations are not necessary'; and 'Minimum unit price and pricing and taxation policies more broadly are not needed'. The industry also frequently misused and misrepresented evidence.

# Figures reveal 40% drop in alcohol treatment in Scotland over 10 years

Analysis of figures recently published by the Scottish Government shows there has been a 40% reduction in the number of people accessing alcohol services in the last decade. This decline has occurred alongside an increase in alcohol harms and deaths, pointing to difficulties in accessing treatment, rather than a decreased need for treatment.

Alcohol Focus Scotland has warned that if we don't act now to prevent and treat alcohol problems, Scotland could be turning the clock back 30 years to when death rates soared to record levels.

Laura Mahon, Deputy Chief Executive of Alcohol Focus Scotland, said: "The drop in the level of treatment in Scotland over the last ten years is shocking and deeply concerning.

"[This] coincides with a period when budgets for Alcohol & Drug Partnerships were cut. At the time, many of us feared that those cuts would affect service provision and it now appears that is the case. The fact that this drop in support is only now coming to light is also of real concern. The Scottish Government urgently needs to invest in alcohol treatment – as they have in drug services – and to monitor provision to ensure these vital services are maintained."

Early access to person-centred treatment is essential to help people avoid developing more severe problems or even losing their life to alcohol. These figures highlight the need for urgent investment in this vital area.

that investment in specialist services is prioritised to ensure that they are supported earlier and to relieve future demand on our NHS. This must be accompanied by preventative action on low prices and aggressive marketing which encourage and normalise high levels of alcohol consumption."

# New survey finds public support for alcohol control policies across all political backgrounds

According to recent polling from the Alcohol Health Alliance, seven in ten people want government policy to be protected from the influence of the alcohol industry and its representatives. Additionally, over half of people surveyed welcome improved marketing regulations, with six in ten believing that alcohol display and promotion in shops and supermarkets should only be visible to people intending to browse or purchase alcohol.

Professor Sir Ian Gilmore, Chair of the Alcohol Health Alliance, said: "The results of the YouGov survey clearly show that people in the UK want to see politicians doing more to protect their health and that of their families and their communities.

"People want the opportunity to lead healthy lives and make healthy choices but current legislation, or lack of, makes this difficult when important health information is being withheld from labels and children are being bombarded by alcohol adverts.

### **EASL Policy Statement for Reducing Alcohol Harms 2023**

The European Association for the Study of the Liver (EASL) have released a policy statement on reducing alcohol harms.

EASL argue that evidence-based interventions that reduce population-level alcohol consumption are both effective and cost-effective at reducing deaths from alcohol-related liver disease and reducing other negative health, social, and economic impacts of alcohol consumption. They recommend policies including minimum unit pricing, banning alcohol marketing, and restricting the availability of alcohol.

In the policy statement, they note that many states have failed to implement proven and effective measures, usually due to lobbying and interference by the alcohol industry. EASL highlight that the irreconcilable conflict of interest between the alcohol industry and health must be acknowledged and confronted.

# Not all home drinking is equal: A latent class analysis of drinking patterns and alcohol consumption levels following initial COVID-19 restrictions in Australia, New Zealand and the United Kingdoms

New research published in the Drug and Alcohol Review, concludes that drinking contexts, sex, and age influenced alcohol consumption during the early stages of the COVID-19 pandemic.

Although research generally shows that people consume more alcohol at home, the study findings suggest that "home" as a drinking context has subgroups that need to be taken into account.

People who reported drinking in home and social settings were more likely to report increased alcohol consumption. Similarly, people who reported drinking alone also

reported consuming less alcohol than males in all groups. This disparity was more pronounced within older age groups.

The authors argue that their findings demonstrate the influence of the social environment on home drinking behaviours and highlight a need for improved policy targeting risky drinking in home settings. Further research should explore whether COVID-19-induced shifts in alcohol use persist as restrictions are lifted.

# Instagram sober journeys: How relapse narratives and viewing orders influence audience response on social media

New research published in Computers in Human Behaviour examined the potential of using social media to share recovery stories and positively influence attitudes and support for policies to reduce alcohol harms.

Self-disclosures of recovery journeys on social media have increased in recent years. The study examined the effects of relapse narratives and the order in which people viewed someone's story. Viewers were more likely to interact with and identify with people's stories if they were viewed in chronological order, and if the stories included a relapse narrative. In turn, this prompted positive attitudes and support for policies to reduce alcohol harm.

1,276 people lost their lives because of alcohol in 2022 according to National Records of Scotland.

Each of these deaths was preventable and we need to do more to reduce the harm caused by alcohol to individuals, their families and communities.

tighter restrictions on alcohol marketing and promotion in Scotland and provides 16 recommendations for the Scotlish Government to consider.

Young people involved in the work supported the phasing out of alcohol sponsorship from sports teams and sporting events, and the introduction of restrictions in local shops and supermarkets to make alcohol less visible to young people. They also want a reduction in the volume of online and television alcohol advertising that young people see. Participants also suggested "toning down" the content of alcohol advertisements, to make them less appealing to children and young people. Many young people also highlighted that newer drinks have packaging and flavours that attract the attention of children and young people.

The young people involved in this project said they hoped introducing new restrictions on alcohol marketing would lead to "healthier and happier people".

### Scottish Parliament Committees Call for Views on Finance and Pre-Budget Scrutiny

Alcohol Focus Scotland has responded to two Scotlish Parliament Committee's calls for views on the sustainability of Scotland's finances and pre-budget scrutiny.

We highlight the significant economic burden of alcohol use in Scotland, particularly to our health service, and propose the introduction of an alcohol harm prevention levy to help combat the unprecedented financial challenges Scotland is facing. The Scottish Government should use its fiscal powers to raise revenue from the sale of alcohol, making the 'polluter pay', to help offset the significant costs to the public sector of dealing with the consequences of alcohol harm and fund public services, including improved recovery-oriented services. This should go hand in hand with the implementation of cost-effective preventative policies, such as minimum unit pricing and alcohol marketing.

### "I don't want to introduce it into new places in my life": The marketing and consumption of no and low alcohol drinks

A recent publication in the International Journal of Drug Policy highlights the ways in which the expanding NoLo market may present challenges and opportunities in relation to public health.

The study looked at the promotion of NoLo products and the tendency to focus on addition marketing, encouraging people to drink NoLo products in addition to their typical weekly drinking patterns, such as at the gym. NoLo consumption is also depicted as a short-term measure, accompanied by the expectation that "real" alcohol can be consumed in traditional drinking spaces and contexts.

In this study there was no evidence of NoLos being consumed on top of existing alcohol consumption, despite this finding being reported elsewhere. Participants reported being more likely to drink NoLos in place of alcohol and incorporate them into their existing drinking routines.

# The effectiveness of alcohol label information for increasing knowledge and awareness: a rapid evidence review

New research published in the BMC Public Health suggests that alcohol labelling is an effective intervention that should be added to the broader suite of policy options.

The researchers looked at the effectiveness of bottle labels for improving understanding of

in drinking alcohol, enabling them to make informed decisions around consumption, and perhaps provide a route to changing behaviour. The literature review suggests that the specific format of the label matters, prompting careful consideration of the design and placement of labels.

Thus, effective alcohol labelling is an intervention that policymakers should consider. The authors also note that public support for labelling is high.
