Prior to the commencement of the meeting, the Chair intimated that this meeting of the Local Partnership would be recorded and that the recording would be available to watch on the Council's YouTube channel.

Declarations of Interest

There were no declarations of interest intimated prior to the meeting.

1 MINUTE OF PREVIOUS MEETING

There was submitted the Minute of the meeting of this Local Partnership held on 8 November 2022.

DECIDED: That the Minute be approved.

2 YOU DECIDE RESULTS FOR RENFREW LOCAL PARTNERSHIP

G Hannah, Environment and Infrastructure, Renfrewshire Council, provided a verbal update relative to the results of the You Decide initiative, making specific reference to the successful projects in the Renfrew Local Partnership area.

The initiative, a participatory budgeting exercise which distributed £1.2 million of Community Investment Funding in Renfrewshire, enabled local communities to decide their priorities in terms of proposed environmental and physical infrastructure improvements to be undertaken in their local area. It was noted that following extensive community engagement a shortlist of potential projects in each local partnership area had been drafted with a public vote then being held to ascertain the preferences of the local community.

A summary of the activities being undertaken to progress the successful projects was provided together with details of arrangements for publication of the programme of works and the anticipated timescale for commencement of the projects.

DECIDED: That the information provided be noted.

3 START-UP STREET, RENFREW

R Cooper, Economic Development Manager, Chief Executive's Service, Renfrewshire Council, gave a presentation on the Business Start-Up Support project based in Dunlop Crescent in Renfrew.

The presentation featured the partnership with Business Gateway and outlined the start-up project, the support available and the concept; various projects within Renfrewshire were highlighted; further detail on the start-up project in Dunlop Crescent were intimated and detailed the start-up street model.

DECIDED: That the presentation be noted.

4 PARKS, PLAY AREAS AND GREENSPACES

J Kennedy, Senior Community Development Officer, Education Service, Renfrewshire Council, gave a presentation on the Green Spaces, Parks and Play Areas and Villages Investment Fund.

The presentation gave a brief outline of the Fund; outlined the fund criteria; detailed the funds allocated to Renfrew and highlighted the area to be funded; advised members of ALISS – A Local Information System for Scotland which enabled people and professionals to find and share information on resources, services, groups and support in their local communities and online; and highlighted the youthwork survey which was currently being undertaken.

DECIDED: That the content of the presentation and information provided on support available, be noted.

5 WINTER CONNECTIONS

S Graham, Chief Executive's Service, gave a presentation on the Winter Connections Programme, providing an update relative to the Programme and the activities available at the network of local community venues participating in the programme. Reference was made to the Winter Connections Fund which provided financial assistance to local groups to help cover the additional costs in making venues, activities and sessions available as part of the Programme developed. Details of host venues within the Renfrew Local Partnership area were provided and it was intimated that each venue host required to confirm their acceptance of the Winter Connections principles, namely that the activities should be free and open to all. It was noted that the Programme was also available in libraries. Reference was made to the funding and promotional activity undertaken and outlined support provided to host organisations. A flavour of the activities undertaken and advice available as part of the Winter Connection Programme was provided. It was noted that an evaluation of the Programme would be undertaken in due course.

DECIDED: That the presentation be noted.

6 GRANT AWARDS IN RENFREW AREA NOVEMBER 2022- JANUARY 2023

There was submitted a report by the Chief Executive relative to awards made in the Renfrew Local Partnership area to local community and voluntary groups since the last meeting of this Local Partnership held in November 2022. Details of awards made from various sources which included: Winter Connections, Community Health and Wellbeing Fund (Engage Renfrewshire), Culture, Heritage and Events Fund and Alcohol and Drugs Recovery Change Fund was provided.

DECIDED: That the grant awards made to community and voluntary groups in the Renfrew Local Partnership area since November 2022 from funding sources other than the Local Partnership be noted.

7 RENFREW LOCAL PARTNERSHIP BUDGET MONITORING REPORT 2022/23 ABD 2021/22 AWARDS FEEDBACK

There was submitted a report by the Chief Executive relative to the Renfrew Local Partnership budget for 2022/23.

The report advised that the Local Partnership provided funding to community groups to undertake projects through a range of grants in terms of the General Grant Fund, Paisley Common Good Fund and, following a participatory budgeting exercise, the Celebrating Renfrewshire Fund. Appendix 1 to the report detailed the funding allocated by Renfrew Local Partnership in 2022/23 and the feedback received from community groups awarded funding during 2021/22.

It was noted that following the last meeting of Renfrew Local Partnership, the funding awarded to Glenvale FC had been withdrawn and the application allocated to another Local Partnership for consideration. As a result, Renfrew YMCA would now receive £3,000 funding (previously £1,942).

Discussion took place on Afro Scots United and after Officers confirmed that this Group operated in Renfrew it was agreed that they be awarded £1,942.

DECIDED:

(a) That Renfrew YMCA be awarded £3,000 funding and Afro Scots be awarded £1,942; and

(b) That the budget monitoring and feedback report be noted.

8 RENFREW LOCAL PARTNERSHIP BUSINESS ARRANGEMENTS

There was submitted a report by the Chief Executive relative to the timeline and arrangements for the 2023/24 round of applications for Local Partnership funding.

The report advised that applications to the 2023/24 round of Local Partnership awards would be open for six weeks from Friday 24 February to Monday 10 April 2023. Updated guidance would be issued to applicants, with opportunities for applicants to attend support sessions to obtain advice and receive answer to queries about the process. The applications would be processed and be submitted to the May 2023 cycle of Local Partnership meetings for consideration and determination.

DECIDED: That the timeline for the 2023 round of applications for Local Partnership funding be noted.

9 FUTURE MEETING DATES

Members of the Local Partnership were advised that it was proposed that meetings of the Renfrew Local Partnership be held at 6pm on 12 May, 13 September and 6 December.

DECIDED: That arrangements be made to convene meetings of the Renfrew Local Partnership at 6pm on 12 May, 13 September and 6 December 2023.

1. Development of enhanced on-ice skills through regular practice/game situations.

What did you want to do with the money & what did you spend it on? (was this different to what you originally intended? If so, please explain).

Help with ice costs at Braehead

Continue providing a local focus for the sport given no other venue is available. Continue development of onice skills for Paisley Pirates & Junior Development, including off-ice skills for volunteers & adults with learning difficulties to carry out duties on game nights requiring numeracy & organisational skills. Publicise the existence of ice hockey in Renfrewshire through local media, maintaining a significant profile which promotes Paisley & Renfrewshire as an ice hockey landmark.

How many people benefitted from/accessed your project? (If you have received funding from more than one Local Partnership, please tell us how many your project reached in each Local Partnership area)

We have seen an increase in our fan base at our Paisley Pirates games & indeed our newly created junior team, from all over Renfrewshire. Our numbers have increased dramatically on the social media platforms too, again, from all over Renfrewshire & further afield, including many other countries outwith the UK.

Examples of our current social media numbers are; Facebook Followers - 3,359 Twitter Followers - 2,793 Instagram Followers - 1,249

How did your project benefit people in the community? (What outcomes did you achieve? Please describe the impact your project had on its participants)

One of our Junior Development players has made the u16 Great Britain team, who will compete in competition in Riga, Latvia, later on this month (April) along with our Head Coach Ian Turley, who is also one of the GB u16 Coaches.

We also have several of our u19 team who have made the Scotland teams this season.

The Pirates have had played in what has been described as the most competitive league seasons ever in the Scottish National League. Right up until the last game of the season, the Pirates still had a chance of winning the league, however, they finished 4th due to loosing their last league game – The difference from 1st place to 4th was only 6 points.

The Pirates also made it through to the Scottish Cup Semi Finals, loosing a chance in the final by 1 goal.

The Play Off Finals weekend is one of the most prestigious events in the SNL (Scottish National League) to which the Pirates are one of the 4 Finalists – This event takes place over the 8th & 9th April in Edinburgh.

The Paisley Pirates had also chosen to support the ULTIMATE WARRIORS by having their logo on our team home & away tops. The Ultimate Warriors are a Paisley based registered Charity supporting children and parents affected by Autism.

Whilst the Paisley Pirates & Lightning Pirates have the Renfrewshire Council logo on both teams short covers.

During the Festive Season, we make contributions to Food & Toy Banks

During the summer months we engage with the community at various Gala Days – Renfrew, Barshaw & Ferguslie – with our team mascot Shivering Timbers, who is always delighted to pose for photographs with children, adults & 'dare I say it' recycled teenagers. ©

New pop banners were designed and purchased, to be used not only at events, but also as a backdrop for our stand during information sessions and presentations to Service Users and Service Providers.

In addition, we purchased new point of sale materials to use on information stands, including plastic flyer holders, branded table cloth, branded pens etc.

We also used funds to pull together a full monthly programme of social activities in a number of venues across Renfrewshire, including pubs, restaurants, coffee shops, Crazy Golf, Cinema tips and lost more. This involved the design and print of event flyers, as well as postage and follow up contact with members to confirm attendance. It also helped towards volunteer and staff travel expenses to get to and from events.

In addition, some funds went towards resources to use during the delivery of our workshops, and also towards the rental of Community Spaces to deliver these workshops. Our last workshop was on "Boundaries and Personal Space", and was held in January in the Tananhill Center.

We also used some of the funds to further develop and expand our Friendship Matching and Chaperoned Dating programme, where members of similar likes and interests could meet up on a one to one basis with a volunteer or staff member. This helps build the foundations from which to develop a stronger friendship. Our Community Engagement worker would either identify which members they thought might make a connection, or members themselves would ask us to arrange matches. Again, travel costs for the staff member or volunteer who was facilitating the friendship match, was covered by the money supplied by the Local Partnership.

Some funds were also used to pay for entertainment costs at our annual Halloween and Christmas parties, as well as decorations for each event and again, travel costs for staff and volunteers.

How many people benefitted from/accessed your project?

(If you have received funding from more than one Local Partnership, please tell us how many your project reached in each Local Partnership area)

We currently have 45 active members, and 3 pending members. In addition, we have 9 paused members. Some of these are due to renew and others come along to all our "open" events – eg Halloween and Xmas parties etc

Renfrew – 10% of our membership

Paisley North West and Central – 50% of our membership

Paisley East – 35% of our membership

Gleniffer – 5%

How did your project benefit people in the community?

(What outcomes did you achieve? Please describe the impact your project had on its participants)

We provide a way for adults with learning disabilities to meet new people, make new friends and build lasting relationships, which in turn makes them feel more valued, more included and a more active member of their communities.

Our members became more familiar with how to use public transport and many are now able to navigate to our events in Renfrewshire without the need to be met off the bus or at the train station. And because we use the same venues, they become familiar to our members who consequently become more confident in using them not just when they are at a Dates-n-Mates event, but when they are out on their own. They also become more confident in being able to order from a menu without assistance, or order a drink from the bar. These may see like baby steps to many, but they can be huge leaps to our members.

Through our friendship matching programme, many of our members have made solid friendships with others, and now meet up independently of a Dates-n-Mates event to go to the pub, or a trip to the cinema.

The impact our service has on our members is tremendous. Through our monthly coffee and cake chats, we can see how some develop from socially awkward and quiet, to gradually building a confidence and an understanding that what they say will be listened to and is important. Others remain quiet and introverted, but they still come to all the events and love just feeling part of something, even if they don't take part.

I have attached a case study of 3 Renfrewshire members, just to give you a feel for the impact of the work we do.

How did your project benefit people in the community? (What outcomes did you achieve? Please describe the impact your project had on its participants)

Thousands of parents and carers were able to gift their children with without the children knowing where the presents had come from. This dignified response helps not only financially but mentally, taking off pressure for local families. The same approach applies to Halloween and Easter, again ensuring we can reach as many areas as possible. Our gift card appeal allows young people to have a choice, something we believe strongly in and want to always include teenagers who can often be a challenging age to buy for. Organising the appeals also takes a huge pressure off of many third sector organisations that can refer to the Toy Bank such as Pals of the Privies, Glenburn Stronger Communities, EBI Unites, The STAR Project, Homestart, Who Cares? Scotland, The SPACE Project, Family Nurse Partnership etc. With children learning through play, the toy bank helps to provide educational gifts supporting with learning and creativity.

The Toy Bank also offers a range of volunteer opportunities to the community allowing people to share their skills, time and knowledge. Working with local schools to support Duke of Edinburgh awards.

What priorities did you tell us your project would meet?

The priorities of the project were to bring residents of Renfrew back into local pubs, restaurants and venues to enjoy live music. We hoped this weekend of live music would help the local economy by encouraging audiences back into local businesses especially after the effects that the covid-19 pandemic has had on the hospitality industry. It was a great opportunity to development a sense of community and pride in the town.

What did you want to do with the money & what did you spend it on? (was this different to what you originally intended? If so, please explain).

We hired an event organiser who secured venues and appropriate acts in locations in Renfrew over the Paisley Fair weekend in 2022. Each act was paid their fee to perform and each venue made a contribution to the event, whether providing food and drink to the acts, organise PA equipment, paying towards the act's fee or covering travel expenses. We created posters to be displayed locally, a schedule of performers and where they will perform as well as creating a Facebook page specifically for the weekend of events. We promoted via social media and reached as many people as we could. We organized an open mic event also to give everyone with an interest in performing a platform to do so.

Acts included Scottish talent as well as homegrown performers.

How many people benefitted from/accessed your project? (If you have received funding from more than one Local Partnership, please tell us how many your project reached in each Local Partnership area)

Over the full weekend we estimated around 2500 people attended these events with many local businesses and venues.

How did your project benefit people in the community? (What outcomes did you achieve? Please describe the impact your project had on its participants)

We maximised economic impact by accessing local businesses and their staff who benefitted from an increase in footfall and spending in their businesses. Most of the venues were town centre based, helping to have more activity in the town and for the benefit of other local businesses. We also used some community spaces which also achieved the local priority of making most of public assets. Having this event helped to strengthen social connections by making the events varied and free, helping to reach those socially isolated. The feedback we received was all positive with many locals enjoying a weekend of free live music, encouraging participation and socialization within the community and an event to sit back, relax and enjoy.

What priorities did you tell us your project would meet? I believe the following was quoted "That the security of the site would be improved and the local outlook onto the security fence would be improved. The local community would benefit from an enhanced presence. The solar panel would provide an off grid electricity supply to the association grounds benefiting the people who use the members cabin to enjoy hot drinks etc.

What did you want to do with the money & what did you spend it on? (was this different to what you originally intended? If so, please explain). A local company The Paisley Fencing and Decking Company was contracted at a cost of £7500.00 to install 73, 4 metre fence posts and supporting rails long a 131 metre long fence line. This work commenced during October and was completed the same month. Over 20 local companies were contacted by telephone and email and only 2 responded. Initially the proposed fence was to be a weldmesh style fence, however due to the cost of materials tripling the original profile sheets were reused. This was discussed with Councilor John Shaw prior to the commencement of the work.

The solar equipment has been purchased. This includes 3×420 watt solar panels, inverter, solar control panel, $3 \times circuit$ breakers, solar cable and batteries. Due to illness and hospital operations this equipment has not been installed as yet. The cost of the solar equipment was £1500.00

How many people benefitted from/accessed your project?

(If you have received funding from more than one Local Partnership, please tell us how many your project reached in each Local Partnership area) The only funding received was from the Renfrew Local Partnership committee, many people have benefited from this grant the initial beneficial improvement is to the 28 members of the association. The local community also benefits by having a secure defining security fence. The solar panel installation will also benefit local members of the community who use the associations facilities on a weekly basis for therapeutic reasons.

How did your project benefit people in the community?

(What outcomes did you achieve? Please describe the impact your project had on its participants) By being awarded this grant the allotment association has benefited greatly. The site is secure and this has allowed the allotment association to bring in members of the community to use the associations facilities on a weekly basis for therapeutic reasons. What priorities did you tell us your project would meet?

We wanted to recruit board members and members to join Renfrew Development Trust to create a sub-committee "Friends of Robertson Park". Launch "Friends of Robertson Park" with branding and create the role of Development Officer, employed as a part time worker to develop membership, recruit volunteers, take previous consultation plans and update them where necessary. Create an action plan of improvements and identify the range of investment required to deliver on improvements and seek funding via grant applications and develop local fundraising initiatives. Develop a sustainability plan beyond 18 months to deliver on improvements.

What did you want to do with the money & what did you spend it on? (was this different to what you originally intended? If so, please explain).

We wanted to create a Friends of Robertson Park Group for Robertson Park. The park has suffered from fireraising and vandals and the toilets and pets corner have been closed. We wanted to regenerate the park and create a working group to do this.

We have employed a part time Development Officer to oversee the work and assist with projects. We hold monthly meetings in the McMaster Centre in the park to discuss our projects and ideas. We have a social media presence and monthly posts where the community can suggest improvements and work needed at the park. We have had stalls at the local markets and the Renfrew Gala Day to share our thoughts and ideas and look for community feedback. The group assisted with installing an outdoor gym in the park. Through further funding we are working on a Sensory Garden to brighten up and regenerate the area, install benches and picnic benches, a lighting area, a glockenspiel and a potting area. We hope to work with local schools to encourage children to plant flowers and learn how to care for plants. We are awaiting a Licence to Occupy from the Council which should be granted anytime soon and the council have also repaired and cleaned the pathways and raised beds at our request in preparation of our work. We have ordered our benches and the glockenspiel and look forward to having the area ready for families to enjoy. The raised beds have been prepared and are new ready for new plants to go in hopefully next week.

We are arranging a litter pick and general tidy up in the park soon too. We are also looking into interactive play equipment in the park. The money has been used to grow the working group through advertising and employ someone to make the groups ideas a reality, hence improving the area. The Friends of Robertson Park Working Group is really making a difference to the park and building relationships in the community which was only possible with the funding received from the Local Partnership.

Our project has reached around 7500 people. The park is used by many locals and visitors.

How did your project benefit people in the community? (What outcomes did you achieve? Please describe the impact your project had on its participants)

We have improved the park area in general and have a platform where the community can contact the group with any suggestions or questions. We have consulted with other 'Friends Of ' groups. We are working on a sensory garden to provide an area where people can learn about plants, relax whilst having a space where the community can enjoy spending time with other people in the outdoors. There are currently no picnic benches in the park so this addition in the sensory garden will be a great addition. The group can also offer companionship to other members of the group, give people a project to work on and be proud of whilst improving mental health and self-esteem. We hope to do more in the park in the future where we can improve the area and bring the community together through events and meetings.

1. Summary

- 1.1 Applications for grant funding from the seven Local Partnership areas were invited to be submitted during March and April 2023, to be considered at the Local Partnership meetings due to be held in May 2023.
- 1.2 The available allocation for Renfrew Local Partnership for 2023/24 is £115,753, made up of £40,453 from the General Fund and £75,300 from Renfrew Common Good Fund.
- 1.3 From this total budget, a sum of £50 per community representative requires to be ringfenced for potential claim of expenses. These expenses are deducted from the available allocation for the Local Partnership. Renfrew has space for seven community members, so the total ringfenced for expenses is £350. The total budget available for allocation by Renfrew Local Partnership is therefore £115,403.
- 1.4 The total value of applications made to Renfrew Local Partnership for funding is £115,665.82
- 1.5 The Youth Challenge Fund component of Renfrew Local Partnership Funding is £18,657. This funding will be allocated by young people through a Participatory Budgeting exercise called Celebrating Renfrewshire that will take place during April and May 2023, with decisions to be announced in June 2023.

2. **Recommendations**

2.1 It is recommended that members of Renfrew Local Partnership consider the applications for Local Partnership grant funding, as set out below in Appendix 1 and 2.

3. Background

- 3.1 Applicants for funding in 2023/24 have been provided with guidance, as well as a description of the Local Priorities identified by the Renfrew Local Partnership.
- 3.2 Local Partnership members are asked to consider the applications for funding summarised at Appendix 1 and 2 of this report, and to assess these against the Local Priorities agreed by the Renfrew local priorities.
- 3.3 An initial assessment has been carried out by officers to support Local Partnership members in their decision-making. Where applications have made clear reference to the Local Priorities identified by the Local Partnership, this is identified in the first table at Appendix 1. Applications that make a partial or no reference to Renfrew Local Priorities are summarised in the second table for example, the project may work with young people (and therefore meet the Local Priority around young people) but not deliver this directly in the Local Partnership area or make reference to how many young people from the area would be engaged in the project.
- 3.4 The priorities of the Renfrew Local Partnership are:

Bringing Renfrew Town Centre to life

The Local Partnership want to see more things to do in the town centre, particularly encouraging local events and seeing more happening in the evenings. They want to do this by making best use of community assets and spaces, including working with the town centre business community.

Moving around and connectivity

The Local Partnership want the economic investment in Renfrew to benefit the local community, particularly making it easier for people to get around the town, and to travel to and from Renfrew.

Making the most of public assets

The Local Partnership want to see the maximum use of public resources, such as parks and outdoor spaces, as well as maximising the use of buildings in the community.

Strengthening social connections

Improving social connections and tackling social isolation is a key these for the Local Partnership, and the Partnership recognise this affects all ages, including younger and older people. Community events and activities are important, as will be a focus on improving health and well-being locally.

Key Theme: Maximising economic impact

The Local partnership want to see a focus on boosting the economic outcomes for people in Renfrew and how this can support their Local Priorities.

Purpose of the project

Our purpose is to bring adults with learning disabilities together to build and strengthen social connections and to reduce social isolation to help improve the mental health and wellbeing of our members. We aim to get more people involved in their local communities, and to feel valued and active participants in these communities. We want to give our members the confidence to travel independently across Renfrewshire, and to become more visible in mainstream venues and therefore more confident and more accepted by the rest of society.

SCLD's report on relationships in 2020 noted that only 5% of adults with learning disabilities lived with a partner, as compared with 56% of the general population. And only 3% were married as against 47% of the general population. Traditionally adults with learning disabilities have been discouraged from forming friendships and relationships, and the subject of sex is totally taboo. Dates-n-Mates was developed to give our members the opportunity to have the same social experiences as the rest of the adult population.

What will the project do?

We run a monthly programme of events in mainstream venues across Renfrewshire to give our members the opportunity to meet new people, make friends and build lasting meaningful relationships. We also provide workshops around confidence building, self-esteem and sexual health, to equip our members with the knowledge they need to take control of their own lives and be responsible for their own actions. We offer a Friendship Matching Programme so members can meet on a more personal level to forge a stronger connection, based on similar interests.
