DECLARATIONS OF INTEREST

There were no declarations of interest intimated prior to commencement of the meeting.

1 **MINUTE OF PREVIOUS MEETING**

The minute of the previous meeting of Gleniffer Local Partnership held on 22 November 2022 was submitted and approved.

DECIDED: That the minute be approved.

2 **HOUSING-LED REGENERATION PROGRAMME, WAVERLEY ROAD**

J Murdoch and E McMahon delivered a presentation relative to the £100 million Housing-led Regeneration Programme that included Waverley Road, Paisley which was located within the Gleniffer Local Partnership area.

Properties at 18 - 32 Waverley Road would be retained and upgraded extensively whilst properties at 34 - 56 would be demolished with 40 new-build homes planned in the area. Details of the extensive work to be undertaken, the re-housing/re-homing of tenants until works were completed and the timescales for delivery of the programme were provided.

DECIDED: That the presentation be noted.

3 **RENFREWSHIRE PLAN FOR NET ZERO**

P Moss and R Smith delivered a presentation relative to Renfrewshire's Plan for Net Zero (the Plan) emissions to help combat the effects of climate change.

The presentation explained climate change as changes to average temperatures and weather conditions in a region over many years, highlighted known causes of detrimental changes and advised local impacts in the form of Paisley Stripes - collated from information obtained by Coats Observatory. Progress so far to reduce emissions throughout Scotland showed a 58.7% reduction, exceeding the 2020 target of 56%. Baseline information on emissions in Renfrewshire had been identified and the Plan set out actions to reduce emissions by 2030. All residents were encouraged to get involved as small individual actions, repeated on a large scale, could have a big impact on tackling climate change.

DECIDED: That the presentation be noted.

4 **LOCAL FUNDING AWARDS**

4a **COMMUNITY MENTAL HEALTH AND WELLBEING FUND - PHASE TWO**

Under reference to paragraph 4 of the Minute of the meeting held on 22 November 2022, I Cunningham, Engage Renfrewshire, provided an update relative to the Community Mental Health & Wellbeing Fund which had capacity to deliver £500,000 in grant aid, advising that 90 applications had been received, 59 awards had been granted, five of which were to organisations in the Gleniffer area. The first phase of funding had been over-subscribed and a second round was now open.

Local groups were encouraged to apply for funding towards projects that would help

alleviate the impact of the pandemic and the cost of living crisis. Application could be made online and Engage Renfrewshire would assist organisations on request

DECIDED: That the update be noted.

4b **YOUDECIDE**

G Hannah provided an update relative to YouDecide, an initiative to give local residents a say on projects that would enhance their local environment. The Gleniffer Local Partnership area had received £75,000 from the £1.2 million roads and infrastructure budget and residents had decided to spend this funding on two projects: one would deliver improvements to the surface of the car park at Gleniffer Braes and signage; and the other would deliver improvements to the path network and signage within the country park. Further updates on both projects would be provided at future meetings.

DECIDED: That the update be noted and the projects to enhance the local area be welcomed.

4c **WINTER CONNECTIONS**

Under reference to paragraph 3 of the Minute of the Gleniffer Local Partnership meeting held on 22 November 2022, A Armstrong-Walter delivered an update relative to Winter Connections, a programme of activities taking place throughout Renfrewshire to help alleviate the cost of living crisis and the effects of the pandemic by providing warm places for residents to connect, funded by the Scottish Government.

Positive feedback had shown that the programme operating in Renfrewshire had been more successful than similar programmes in other local authority areas as it was based on providing not just warm spaces but activities that appealed to local residents. To increase uptake in the Gleniffer area, local groups were encouraged to bring forward ideas/projects to continue this initiative and to seek assistance from Community Planning to apply for funding. The "Blether Bus" operating in Dundee was cited as an excellent project that could be pursued for Renfrewshire.

DECIDED: That the update be noted.

5 **COMMUNITY LEARNING & DEVELOPMENT**

Under reference to paragraph 5 of the Minute of the Gleniffer Local Partnership meeting held on 22 November 2022, L McLean provided an update relative to Community Learning & Development activities.

The Green Spaces, Parks & Play Areas and Villages Investment Fund had allocated £300,000 to the Gleniffer area. To date, Glenburn Skye Crescent Public Park had been awarded £50,000, Brediland Allotment - Ponds Upgrade had received £1,945 and Langcraigs Community Playground secured £8,475.

Voting to allocate funding towards youth-oriented projects from "Celebrating Renfrewshire" would commence again in June. To identify suitable activities for young people and to help develop projects tailored to the needs of young people in the area, Youth Services had developed a Youth Outreach Survey <http://https://arcg.is/1nzbS4> and were encouraging young people (15-25) to provide their views. Members were invited to share the link with their networks. It was noted that projects that would be of benefit to young people with autism could be brought forward for consideration.

DECIDED: That the update be noted.

6 BUDGET MONITORING REPORT

There was submitted a report by the Chief Executive relative to the Gleniffer Local Partnership budget including at Appendix 1, two applications for funding from Stronger Communities Glenburn and, at Appendix 2, details of funding awarded to date together with additional feedback since the last meeting on 22 November 2022.

A Armstrong-Walter advised that £8,000 had been ring-fenced by this Local Partnership pending submission of two applications from Stronger Communities Glenburn which met the criteria for an award and recommended that, as these applications met the local priorities, each application now be awarded £4,000. This was agreed.

It was proposed that £4,463.20 remaining in the 2022/23 budget be committed pending the submission of applications for suitable local projects that met local priorities, which could include those to improve the lives of children with autism. Applications would be brought forward as soon as possible and would be listed and accounted for separately from any applications for funding from the 2023/24 budget. This was agreed.

DECIDED:

- (a) That two applications from Stronger Communities Glenburn be awarded £4,000 each from ring-fenced funding;
- (b) That the budget monitoring report be noted;
- (c) That additional feedback from projects that had received funding in 2021/22 be noted; and
- (d) That the £4,463.20 remaining in the 2022/23 budget be committed towards applications to be brought forward as soon as possible and that these be listed and accounted for separately from applications for funding from the 2023/24 budget.

The next meeting will take place at 6.00 pm on 25 May 2023 at a venue to be confirmed as soon as possible.

1. Summary

We wanted to increase our membership by providing open days, a fun quiz, special dance exercise, tea/coffee and pay the rent. We would have spent more of the grant by this time but the grant money was only received in September – 3 months into our year.

We have increased our membership to 92 and increased the number of people who have difficulty walking, etc., so now our club consists of around 25% in this category.

The residents of the local sheltered complex who were brainwashed into thinking they were only safe in their homes due to COVID had not ventured out of their homes for over 2 years and now having joined our club they feel that they are now part of the community again. They fit well into our club and the difference in them now from 8 months ago is astonishing. They are happy and eager to take part in everything they can.

How did your project benefit people in the community?

(What outcomes did you achieve? Please describe the impact your project had on its participants)

One of our Junior Development players has made the u16 Great Britain team, who will compete in competition in Riga, Latvia, later on this month (April) along with our Head Coach Ian Turley, who is also one of the GB u16 Coaches.

We also have several of our u19 team who have made the Scotland teams this season.

The Pirates have had played in what has been described as the most competitive league seasons ever in the Scottish National League. Right up until the last game of the season, the Pirates still had a chance of winning the league, however, they finished 4th due to losing their last league game – The difference from 1st place to 4th was only 6 points.

The Pirates also made it through to the Scottish Cup Semi Finals, losing a chance in the final by 1 goal.

The Play Off Finals weekend is one of the most prestigious events in the SNL (Scottish National League) to which the Pirates are one of the 4 Finalists – This event takes place over the 8th & 9th April in Edinburgh.

The Paisley Pirates had also chosen to support the ULTIMATE WARRIORS by having their logo on our team home & away tops. The Ultimate Warriors are a Paisley based registered Charity supporting children and parents affected by Autism.

Whilst the Paisley Pirates & Lightning Pirates have the Renfrewshire Council logo on both teams short covers.

During the Festive Season, we make contributions to Food & Toy Banks

During the summer months we engage with the community at various Gala Days – Renfrew, Barshaw & Ferguslie – with our team mascot Shivering Timbers, who is always delighted to pose for photographs with children, adults & 'dare I say it' recycled teenagers. 😊

<p>What priorities did you tell us your project would meet?</p> <p>Our priority is to promote social engagement for adults with learning disabilities in and around the Renfrewshire area, to help reduce social isolation and loneliness and increase general health and wellbeing. We provide opportunities for people to meet new people, have fun and build strong friendship groups.</p> <p>Our aim has always been to use main stream venues to host our events – local cafes, pubs, restaurants and parks etc, so that our members become more visible within their communities and therefore more accepted, as well as becoming more familiar with these environments and therefore more confident.</p> <p>We want to build up people's support network so they have people they can rely on other than paid for carers or family members. We want our members to feel valued, included and active participants in their communities, rather than silent bystanders with no voice. Adults with learning disabilities have as much right as the next person to form meaningful relationships and feel a part of the communities in which they live.</p>	

What did you want to do with the money & what did you spend it on? (was this different to what you originally intended? If so, please explain).

We used the money to target adults with learning disabilities living in Paisley North West and Central, Paisley East, Gleniffer and Renfrew. Our Community Engagement worker engaged with local GPs, pharmacies, West College, Renfrewshire Carers Centre, community hubs, and local advocacy services.

We created new A5 flyers to send to these organisations, and invited them to contact us for more information. Our Engagement Worker then followed up with phone calls and face to face meetings, with the aim of boosting awareness for Dates-n-Mates within the local area.

New pop banners were designed and purchased, to be used not only at events, but also as a backdrop for our stand during information sessions and presentations to Service Users and Service Providers.

In addition, we purchased new point of sale materials to use on information stands, including plastic flyer holders, branded table cloth, branded pens etc.

We also used funds to pull together a full monthly programme of social activities in a number of venues across Renfrewshire, including pubs, restaurants, coffee shops, Crazy Golf, Cinema tips and lost more. This involved the design and print of event flyers, as well as postage and follow up contact with members to confirm attendance. It also helped towards volunteer and staff travel expenses to get to and from events.

In addition, some funds went towards resources to use during the delivery of our workshops, and also towards the rental of Community Spaces to deliver these workshops. Our last workshop was on "Boundaries and Personal Space", and was held in January in the Tananhill Center.

We also used some of the funds to further develop and expand our Friendship Matching and Chaperoned Dating programme, where members of similar likes and interests could meet up on a one to one basis with a volunteer or staff member. This helps build the foundations from which to develop a stronger friendship. Our Community Engagement worker would either identify which members they thought might make a connection, or members themselves would ask us to arrange matches. Again, travel costs for the staff member or volunteer who was facilitating the friendship match, was covered by the money supplied by the Local Partnership.

Some funds were also used to pay for entertainment costs at our annual Halloween and Christmas parties, as well as decorations for each event and again, travel costs for staff and volunteers.

Section 3 – Impact

How many people benefitted from/accessed your project?

(If you have received funding from more than one Local Partnership, please tell us how many your project reached in each Local Partnership area)

We currently have 45 active members, and 3 pending members. In addition, we have 9 paused members. Some of these are due to renew and others come along to all our “open” events – eg Halloween and Xmas parties etc

Renfrew – 10% of our membership

Paisley North West and Central – 50% of our membership

Paisley East – 35% of our membership

Gleniffer – 5%

How did your project benefit people in the community?

(What outcomes did you achieve? Please describe the impact your project had on its participants)

We provide a way for adults with learning disabilities to meet new people, make new friends and build lasting relationships, which in turn makes them feel more valued, more included and a more active member of their communities.

Our members became more familiar with how to use public transport and many are now able to navigate to our events in Renfrewshire without the need to be met off the bus or at the train station. And because we use the same venues, they become familiar to our members who consequently become more confident in using them not just when they are at a Dates-n-Mates event, but when they are out on their own. They also become more confident in being able to order from a menu without assistance, or order a drink from the bar. These may see like baby steps to many, but they can be huge leaps to our members.

Through our friendship matching programme, many of our members have made solid friendships with others, and now meet up independently of a Dates-n-Mates event to go to the pub, or a trip to the cinema.

The impact our service has on our members is tremendous. Through our monthly coffee and cake chats, we can see how some develop from socially awkward and quiet, to gradually building a confidence and an understanding that what they say will be listened to and is important. Others remain quiet and introverted, but they still come to all the events and love just feeling part of something, even if they don't take part.

This equipment has helped hundreds of people with disabilities and mobility issues hire free or low-cost equipment to get them out of their house or residential setting. Even post pandemic, we know many of our members are still hesitant to go out and lack confidence.

Our role has been to connect with our members and let them know we have existing and new equipment to enable them to be independent and make choices to improve their life and health options. We've had over 500 hires of this equipment over the course of the year and our membership has increased which is a positive as more people are utilising the service.

We surveyed members who hired equipment and the findings are noted below:

100% told us they would lose their independence if we were unable to provide our service

100% said they would require support to look after their care needs

64% wouldn't be able to care for their family

98% confirmed their condition would significantly worsen

97% would be less connected and lonely/isolated

It's clear from the above data that our members do benefit greatly from our service, which you have invested in and we and our members sincerely appreciate this. Enabling and connecting with people is essential and our role in this is to ensure that those with disabilities and mobilities are able to join other funded projects or just get out and do whatever they need by offering them choice. Our belief is that we should not forget about those who struggle with disabilities or mobility issues.

We told you that if we were awarded funding, we would use the money to reduce loneliness and isolation within the care home, we also aimed to use the money to get our residents out and about and the money was used for taking residents to pantomimes and other events.

What did you want to do with the money & what did you spend it on? (was this different to what you originally intended? If so, please explain).

The money we were awarded was used in more than one way – we used it to help reduce loneliness and isolation in and around the care home by holding events that all residents and their families were able to come along too. For example, we held many in house activities where animal therapy was hired to come in and the residents got to spend time with the animals, these activities were usually held in a lounge out-with the residents usual sitting area meaning that the residents from all 3 units were getting the opportunity to mix together out of their usual setting. The money also went towards being able to have in various entertainment companies from singers to celebrate birthdays where all residents would come together and spent time in the company of others, with their family members or friends also present and able to enjoy the show. We were also able to hire a company to come into the home and put on a pantomime for the residents who were less able to go out to pantomimes. The money was also used to purchase pantomime tickets for the king's theatre and the pavilion and also some more local companies like PaCE and the three sisters' theatre group – the residents enjoyed getting out into the community to see a show and spent their

time chatting with people from the community – this would not have been possible without the funding we were awarded. We have also been able to have multiple intergenerational activities take place where the residents and kids from the local community came together and spent time doing arts and crafts or baking all materials which were bought from the funding given to us. We were also able to hold a huge community event at Christmas where we put on a Christmas party for the residents and their families and friends, we had singers, dancers, a buffet and a raffle with a special visit from Santa – all the residents had a great time and this was all possible due to the funding that was made available to us.

All 36 of our residents have benefited from the funding we received in more ways than one, we have been able to rejoin the community and spend time out of the care home at shows or out at local groups such as football memories, we have been able to have production companies in to put on pantomimes and various shows for the residents who are no longer able to leave the care home due to mobility. We have also been able to invite friends and family members into the home to home to join us at these shows.

We were able to pay for various animal therapy sessions to come into the home with animals such as snakes, ducks, rabbits, dogs, guinea pigs, alpacas and such and we were able to invite kids from the community along to also enjoy these sessions – the residents benefited from both the kids visiting as an intergenerational visit and the animals, some of the kids had never seen some of the animals that have visited the home on occasion so this was a wonderful experience that we as a care home were able to provide for both the kids from the local area and the residents. We estimate we have reached over 1500 people in Renfrewshire in the past year. This includes schools across all of Renfrewshire, meetings, competitions, street stalls, stalls at the University and the podcast among others. We have enhanced our social media presence on Facebook, Twitter (@rainbowturtleUK) and Instagram (rainbowturtleUK).

Our new part-time Education Officer has been in post for over a year now. She is now up to speed and has been very active. The pandemic is still affecting access to schools and the cost-of-living crisis has reduced schools ability to pay for any supplies, but has not dimmed their enthusiasm.

We tackled loneliness and isolation by providing an outlet for volunteers to be involved in a community project, especially the shop.

As part of Renfrewshire's Fair Trade status we provided a community asset with the Rainbow Turtle shop and the Education Officer is a free asset to all schools and community organisations across Renfrewshire.

Scotland is a Fair Trade Nation and Rainbow Turtle provides a Renfrewshire identity as part of the National movement and is held up as beacon of fair trade activity in Scotland and is something for all of Renfrewshire to be proud of. We represented Renfrewshire at the celebration of Scotland being a Fair Trade nation for 10 years in Glasgow and will doing the same at the Scottish Parliament later in May 23.

We provide lots of work for and with young people and working in the shop is very intergenerational. We work with all young people but have also specifically given opportunities with people different abilities. Young people volunteering in the shop has been very positive for all volunteers.

We ran several interviews on our podcast <https://www.rainbowturtle.org.uk/our-podcasts/>

We have held stalls and educational events at the University. These have gone down well and increased our reach into the student population. We had a stall and educational activity at One Ren Many Nations event in June 22.

Work within the charity and linked to the Rainbow Turtle shop involved the volunteers and getting them out the house and linking with other volunteers, old and young, and members of the public.

We have linked with the Gatehouse coffee roasters in Paisley to promote a premium Fair Trade coffee. This has been very successful and helped promote local business as well Fair Trade.

We celebrated 20 Years of rainbow Turtle in Renfrewshire with events in the shop and a well—attended ceilidh in Methodist halls.

We arranged a very popular Fair trade Bake-off open to all Renfrewshire schools in FairTrade Fortnight

We attended Christmas fair at the UWS campus and educated about Fair Trade with students from Renfrewshire and across the world.

We ran a Fair trade coffee-tasting morning in the Life Church in Moss St. we had presentations from around the world. Again very well attended and very well received.

The Education Officer has been out to lots of Renfrewshire schools and the number of interested schools is rising as the effects of covid lockdowns are receding.

We have spent money this year on improving lighting (changing to low power LED fittings) and major upgrades to toilets especially the disabled toilets.

We wanted to develop a drop in aimed at capacity building hard to reach minority ethnic (in particular African) communities in and around Renfrewshire which encounter multiple barriers, such as communication and those of a cultural nature, which prevent them from becoming resilient communities..

The project will provide **40 weekly** drop-in sessions for **8-10** individuals around volunteering job search and application support, volunteering opportunities, general and mental health support and information on entitlements, The project was aimed at improving awareness via providing access to literature and media through the development of information packs on hot topic subjects to share with **600 - 800** people. The proposed information packs would also be written using simple English and translated into several common languages that are prevalent

within the community, making them accessible to a wide range of audiences. The project was also supposed to deliver **6** workshops targeting **5** participants per workshop around areas that our client base feel they need more help with in order to become more resilient and independent. These areas could include budgeting, recycling, how to buy online (using comparison websites and freebies) cooking (how to make healthy meals utilizing leftovers), confidence building, CV writing and developing interview skills. The project will also organise one massive cultural celebration event bringing the whole community together to allow community integration.

What did you spend it on? (was this different to what you originally intended? If so, please explain).

Unfortunately, because we managed to get a fraction of the funding that we applied for which was spent on direct project costs, Project co-ordination, management and marketing. We managed just 3 months' worth of activities and we had to cut out some of the intended activities completely. We managed to do four workshops on becoming part of school parent education board **12 participants**, we had a needs assessment workshop that was attended by **16 participants**, we had a workshop on how to plan a community event which was attended by **14 participants**, and we had a Modern Apprenticeship session for parents which was attended by **21 participants**. We managed to support 3 individuals to gain volunteering opportunities. We also reached **100** people through information dissemination.

1. Summary

- 1.1 Applications for grant funding from the seven Local Partnership areas were invited to be submitted during March and April 2023, to be considered at the Local Partnership meetings due to be held in May 2023.
- 1.2 The total funding allocation for Gleniffer Local Partnership for 2023/24 is £53,264. This is made up of £53,264 from the General Fund and £10,200 from Paisley Common Good Fund.
- 1.3 From this total budget, a sum of £50 per community representative requires to be ringfenced for potential claim of expenses. These expenses are deducted from the available allocation for the Local Partnership. Gleniffer Local Partnership has space for seven community members, so the total ringfenced for expenses is £350. **The total budget available for allocation by Gleniffer Local Partnership is therefore £52,914.**
- 1.4 The total value of applications to the Gleniffer Local Partnership meeting on 25 May 2023 is £98,839.88.
- 1.5 The Youth Challenge Fund component of Gleniffer Local Partnership Funding for 2023/24 is £19,861. This funding will be allocated by young people through a Participatory Budgeting exercise that will take place during April and May 2023, with decisions to be announced in June 2023.

2. **Recommendations**

- 2.1 It is recommended that members of Gleniffer Local Partnership consider the applications for Local Partnership grant funding, as set out below in Appendix 1 and 2.

3. **Background**

- 3.1 Applicants for funding in 2023/24 have been provided with guidance, as well as a description of the Local Priorities identified by Gleniffer Local Partnership.
- 3.2 Local Partnership members are asked to consider the applications for funding summarised at Appendix 1 and 2 of this report, and to assess these against the Local Priorities agreed by the Gleniffer Local Partnership.
- 3.3 An initial assessment has been carried out by officers to support Local Partnership members in their decision-making. Where applications have made clear reference to the Local Priorities identified by the Local Partnership, this is identified in the first table at Appendix 1. Applications that make a partial or no reference to Gleniffer Local Priorities are summarised in the second table – for example, the project supports tackling loneliness and isolation (and therefore meets the Local Priority around loneliness and isolation) but does not deliver this directly in the Local Partnership area or make reference to how many people from the area would be engaged in the project.
- 3.4 The priorities of Gleniffer Local Partnership are:

Community assets

The Local Partnership want to see busy local community centres, full of activities. They also want to boost community involvement, getting more people involved in local groups and volunteering.

What's on in Foxbar, Brediland and Glenburn

The Local Partnership want to develop ways to share information about what is going on locally across the area, including developing community noticeboards and networks.

Public safety and road safety

The Local Partnership want to promote public safety across the area. This includes road safety and managing the speed of traffic in the area.

Isolation and loneliness

The Local Partnership want to tackle isolation and loneliness across the area. They think a key barrier for some people is transport and being able to access activities.

Play facilities

The Local Partnership want to see development of parks and play areas for children and young people.
