Applications for Local Partnership Funding To Villages Local Partnership 2023/24

1. Summary

- 1.1 Applications for grant funding from the seven Local Partnership areas were invited to be submitted during March and April 2023, to be considered at the Local Partnership meetings due to be held in May 2023.
- 1.2 The available allocation for Villages Local Partnership for 2023/24 is £51,191.00. There is carry forward of £3,832.00 from the 2022/23 allocation, which was ringfenced and carried forward to contribute to activities in the Villages aligned to the 'Winter Connections' programme for 2023/24. This has therefore not been reflected in the available balance.
- 1.3 From this total budget, a sum of £50 per community representative requires to be ringfenced for potential claim of expenses. These expenses are deducted from the available allocation for the Local Partnership. Villages Local Partnership has space for fifteen community members, so the total ringfenced for expenses is £750. The total budget available for allocation by Villages Local Partnership is therefore £50,441.00
- 1.4 The total value of applications for funding received is £80,602.61
- 1.5 The Youth Challenge Fund component of Villages Local Partnership Funding for 2023/24 is £23,907 which includes a carry forward of £298 from 2022/23 allocation. This funding will be allocated by young people through a Participatory Budgeting exercise that will take place during May 2023 with decisions announced in June.

2. Recommendations

2.1 It is recommended that members of Villages Local Partnership consider the applications for Local Partnership grant funding, as set out below in Appendix 1 and 2.

3. Background

- 3.1 Applicants for funding in 2032/24 have been provided with guidance, as well as a description of the Local Priorities identified by Villages Local Partnership.
- 3.2 Local Partnership members are asked to consider the applications for funding summarised at Appendix 1 and 2 of this report, and to assess these against the Local Priorities agreed by Villages.
- 3.3 An initial assessment has been carried out by officers to support Local Partnership members in their decision-making. Where applications have made clear reference to the Local Priorities identified by the Local Partnership, this is identified in the first table at Appendix 1. Applications that make a partial or no reference to Villages Local Priorities are summarised in the second table for example, the project may tackle social isolation (and therefore meet the Local Priority around social isolation) but not deliver this directly in the Local Partnership area or make reference to how many people from the area would be engaged in the project.
- 3.4 The priorities of Villages Local Partnership are:

Connectivity and transport

The Local Partnership want to see villages which are well-connected to each other when people can connect with each other too. Transport is a clear focus in this area, including both public transport and green routes.

Environment and Parks

The Local Partnership want well-maintained villages, with high quality public parks and a focus on street scene, including fly tipping, dog fouling and litter.

Access to services, facilities, and assets

The Local Partnership want to improve access to what's going on in the community, including community activities, and making the most of their community buildings and facilities.

Village identity and character

The Local Partnership want to maintain the identity and character of the villages in the area. Key to this is developing and sustaining local community groups, and the delivery of local events.

Purpose of the project

To build on previous projects to broaden the base of those who can benefit from singing publicly, particularly amongst young people.

Research has shown that public singing, develops personal confidence and self-esteem especially in young people. Responses from local young people and their parents who have sung in front of their peers and at public concerts has mirrored this. Covid lockdowns have left a lasting legacy of insecurity and low confidence which this project hopes to help address.

What will the project do?

There will be 3 main elements to the project: -

- i) Continue to build a junior choir
- ii) Provide a short series of workshops for individuals who wish to progress to solo singing
- iii) Provide a one-off mass sing-along at a local event to promote the notion that 'anyone can sing'

All elements will be provided by a local singing teacher/performer.

Lochwinnoch Arts Festival has been delivering and supporting the creative arts in our rural small village for over 20 years. Our festival incorporated live music, literary events, comedy collaborative art ventures outdoor art projects and many more art experiences for the community. We have now a thriving community Film section for adults and families in collaboration with Region Screen Scotland and Renfrewshire Screen Development Network. We not only bring quality artists to the village but showcase our many local artists.

We monitor the feedback on all our social media platforms as to the success of our events. Many of our local artists give us feedback and suggestions for projects and events. We collaborate with many of the local arts groups and individuals on their views. We are carrying out an online consultation of our local artists and musicians in April 2023.

What will the project do?

From October 2023 we have over 10 events scheduled to run across the year. In addition, we have developed excellent productive relationships with local for example the Renfrewshire Spree and the National mod coming to Paisley in October. this enables us to bring diverse and exciting events to our community.

The Festival is an ongoing schedule of events which supports wellbeing. The schedule includes a concentration of events over a fortnight in September. The festival aims are:

- To bring people together and engage them in varied activities designed to improve a sense of wellbeing
- To help signpost people to support services
- To connect people to community groups
- To connect people to activities which would benefit them long term
- To connect people to each other to help build support structures, on the ground, within the community

During the pandemic we began supporting vulnerable community members through our food projects and community services. This ongoing work shows us that mental health is an ongoing struggle in our community (and across the country). The post-covid society and cost of living crisis affects those on low incomes worst. The first Feel Good event in 2021 begun to help those experiencing isolation to connect with others through community activities. Since then, the project has evolved into an inclusive and wide-reaching project.

What will the project do?

We will offer a programme of events that caters for all: We've looked at the ways in which people improve their sense of wellbeing: Through creative and nature-based activities and therapeutic classes as well as through sharing food, recreational activities and social opportunities. We will offer these events free or subsidised to ensure accessibility; And we'll invest in local people, groups and venues to help deliver this. In Nov 2021, we were given an LTO on this one-acre space in the heart of Lochwinnoch, which was previously derelict. We currently have an active CAT application for a 10-year lease. This has already become a social hub where hundreds of villagers meet and connect; Activities here include a Community Larder run by our partner LEAP and a children's' outdoor holiday club. We've created a professional garden design allowing for community markets; creation of a picnic/BBQ area; space for events, workshops & classes, in the next phase of development.

We've carried out extensive consultation which is outlined in our project plan: https://docs.google.com/document/d/1qPBbAleCkJoYuQHORcVjMtnxJ36ai6nuPy-LamrLeLw/edit?usp=sharing

The site is already a busy hub, which sees hundreds of people pass through it each week. Wild care and the Larder currently operate without running water or toilet facilities, however. This is quite inconvenient and presents problems with hygiene and convenience. The children who attend Wild care currently use a toilet tent and have asked that we make better provision.

What will the project do?

The portion of funding we are applying for will go towards groundworks to bring in water supply and sewage to the site. We have already successfully completed the approval process with Scottish Water, and we also have planning consent. Our application is made in principle moving forward only if the lease is granted via the CAT application, and permissions are given by RC Assets Team. This funding would plug a gap which would allow us to establish a toilet block and connect the Larder cabins to water supply and establish an outdoor tap.

Our project directly supports the priorities of Environment & Parks, and Access to Facilities, Services & Assets. A challenge for people in rural communities is the distance between them and support services - this work would ensure that the Community Larder can continue safely providing a vital service, on the ground, in the community. It will also support Wild care to provide outdoor childcare for primary and nursery aged children.
