Applications for Local Partnership Funding To Paisley East Local Partnership 2024/25

1. Summary

- 1.1 Applications for grant funding from the seven Local Partnership areas were invited to be submitted during April and May 2024, to be considered at the Local Partnership meetings due to be held in May/June 2024.
- 1.2 The available allocation for Paisley East Local Partnership for 2024/25 is £64,647 made up of £52,247 from the General Fund and £12,400 from Paisley Common Good Fund.
- 1.3 From this total budget, a sum of £50 per community representative requires to be ringfenced for potential claim of expenses. These expenses are deducted from the available allocation for the Local Partnership. Paisley East Local Partnership has space for eleven community members, so the total ringfenced for expenses is £550. The total budget available for allocation by Paisley East Local Partnership is therefore £64,097.
- 1.4 The total value of applications for funding received is £93,727.13
- 1.5 The Youth Challenge Fund component of Paisley East Local Partnership Funding for 2024/25 is £24,095. This funding will be allocated by young people through a Participatory Budgeting exercise that will take place during May 2023 with decisions announced in June.

2. Recommendations

2.1 It is recommended that members of Paisley East Local Partnership consider the applications for Local Partnership grant funding, as set out below in Appendix 1 and 2.

3. Background

- 3.1 Applicants for funding in 2034/25 have been provided with guidance, as well as a description of the Local Priorities identified by Paisley East Local Partnership.
- 3.2 Local Partnership members are asked to consider the applications for funding summarised at Appendix 1 and 2 of this report, and to assess these against the Local Priorities agreed by Paisley East.
- 3.3 An initial assessment has been carried out by officers to support Local Partnership members in their decision-making. Where applications have made clear reference to the Local Priorities identified by the Local Partnership, this is identified in the first table at Appendix 1. Applications that make a partial or no reference to Paisley East Local Priorities are summarised in the second table for example, the project may tackle social isolation (and therefore meet the Local Priority around social isolation) but not deliver this directly in the Local Partnership area or make reference to how many people from the area would be engaged in the project.
- 3.4 The priorities of Paisley East Local Partnership are:

Exploring the impact of new housing developments

The Local Partnership want to explore how they influence planning decisions around new developments, and make sure that the infrastructure is in place to support these developments, for example, roads, schools, and nurseries. They want to explore how community benefits might be used to support this.

Supporting social connections

The Local Partnership want to support social connections to tackle isolation and promote mental health and wellbeing. They want to see groups in the local area working together, swapping skills, and sharing resources.

Community pride and safety

The Local Partnership want to see the care and maintenance of their spaces across their area, so they are clean, safe, and attractive spaces. They want to see these spaces used to promote good wellbeing across the area.

Tackling food poverty

The Local Partnership wants to tackle food poverty in the area to ensure that people are able to access supplies of food where they need it. As part of this, the Local Partnership wants to see a reduction in the amount of usable surplus food wasted and the sustainable use of resources to be key features of work to tackle food poverty.

GRANT APPLICATIONS RECEIVED BY PRIORITY THEME

Paisley East Local Partnership grant application forms – amount available £64,097 (£52,247 from the 2024/25 General Fund and £12,400 from Paisley Common Good Fund minus £550 expenses). The total value of applications received is £93,727.13.

Purpose of the project

The purpose of this project is to build further on the work that we do on a day to day basis. We work with adults and children alike, educating them on animal care and animal husbandry, and work with people from all backgrounds without discrimination. We help to rehabilitate offenders, provide work experience and references for the unemployed, assist people with mental health difficulties to reintroduce themselves to a normal day, and work with pupils and students to gain valuable experience to move forward with their chosen studies and careers.

The need for this has been identified as we are the only facility of this type not only in the area but in the whole of Scotland. We were the first city farm in Scotland and are now the only one left. We work at developing our project every year depending on the requirements of the people coming to us, as this is varied and each case is unique. We could have an influx of young offenders completing their community service here one month, and could have a non-verbal autistic child here the next requiring care and support. Every day is different!

What will the project do?

Our project has been a huge success in all areas in previous years, it is difficult to measure its success as each individual will have success in a different way, and they will gain this with a different support from our volunteers. We will continue to be caring and supportive and treat everyone as an individual without judgement or discrimination and try to help every person walking through the front gates that is looking for it.

The project meets the Paisley North West and Central local priority of tackling social isolation: Both through visiting our farm and through our outreach work we tackle social isolation, many people come here with few social skills or are socially anxious but it is a safe and supportive environment here no matter what the reasons are for this anxiety. We are also looking to further our outreach to bring our skills and our animals to people who are unable to come to us here, by possibly taking some of our younger volunteers and some of our smaller animals to people who could benefit from these interactions

At present we are working with a young person from Renfrew who is autistic and suffers from extreme anxiety. At only 14 she is out of school due to being unable to cope with the large numbers of people, however she it thriving up at the Farm. She attends 5 days a week, is here on time and completes full days, also through the educational programme that we are continuing to develop she has completed a workbook to obtain her Nat 2 English.,

Intergenerational Work: Here at Lamont Farm we are all working towards a common goal, and that means that our junior and adult volunteers are often working together towards achieving this goal. It gives our junior volunteers a wide range of adults that they consider safe to approach when in need, and when our adults are working with our juniors they get to experience a lot more of the 'fun' side of working and they joy that comes with this. It's a great experience for all ages!,

Health and Wellbeing: The Farm is a bit advocate in the battle of supporting mental health awareness, currently we support a variety of ages suffering from mental health difficulties, all of whom have discovered safety and calmness in volunteering or visiting the farm. It's a well known fact that animals can be of huge benefit to anyone suffering from depression, stress or anxiety and our animals have helped so many people with this., Community Identity: Lamont Farm has been a part of the Erskine Community for 47 years, and is a massive part of it, and this year more than any has shown that the community is very much behind the farm staying a part of this community., Access to Services, facilities and assets: We'll be honest, we're not in the Houston Area, but we are less than a 10 minute drive away, but more to the point we take a lot of young people from the Houston Area to complete work experience, be a part of our kids clubs and more.

I myself grew up in Houston and I grew up attending Lamont Farm every weekend. For animal lovers and those wishing to follow a career with animals, there is nowhere else local that can give this experience and without this many would not be able to follow these chosen paths, Focus on young people: As discussed at last year's meeting (and we would be happy to attend again) we have a massive focus on young people.
