DECLARATIONS OF INTEREST AND TRANSPARENCY STATEMENTS

C Johnstone declared an interest in Item 5 - Membership of Paisley East Local Partnership – by reason of his membership of Rainbow Turtle, one of the organisations applicants seeking to become a member of the Local Partnership.

1 MINUTE OF PREVIOUS MEETING

There was submitted the Minute of the meeting of this Local Partnership held on 29 November 2023.

DECIDED: That the Minute be approved.

2 PAISLEY EAST LOCAL PARTNERSHIP BUDGET MONITORING REPORT

There was submitted a report by the Chief Executive relative to the 2023/24 budget allocated to this Local Partnership which detailed the distribution of funds.

The report advised that of the £64,087.33 budget allocation for 2023/24 for this Local Partnership, which comprised funding from the General Fund and the Paisley Common Good Fund, there was currently an unallocated balance of £9.67. It was also highlighted that, £24,095.00 had been awarded to local youth groups, detailed in the appendix of the report, from the Celebrating Renfrewshire Fund.

DECIDED: That the report be noted.

³ LOCAL PARTNERSHIPS REVIEW AND LAUNCH OF 2024 DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMME

There was submitted a report by the Chief Executive relative to the Local Partnerships Review and launch of the 2024 Development Programme.

The report made reference to the model of community level governance adopted by the Council in 2019 through the launch of seven Local Partnerships. The local partnerships had developed and grown over the intervening period, promoting community empowerment through the identification of initial local priorities, local grant making and the nationally recognised youth participatory budgeting process, Celebrating Renfrewshire.

It was stated that the pandemic had impacted some of the planned developments in relation to the Local Partnerships, and a consultation and engagement exercise had been undertaken in late 2023 to learn from the work that has been undertaken to date and to identify options for building on this. The findings of the consultation exercise had been submitted to the meeting of the Council's Leadership Board held on 20 September 2023.

The report recognised that Local Partnerships had huge potential to strengthen community empowerment and capacity in Renfrewshire, and to harness this potential it was now proposed that the next phase of their development was progressed. With a focus on "Local Plans, Local Priorities and Local Voices", a range of development actions, detailed in section 4 of the report, were now proposed. Following the decision of the Council's Leadership Board, the development programme and related campaign had commenced in February 2024. The report highlighted that a key focus in 2024 would be the enhancement of communications regarding Local Partnerships activities, refreshing partnership membership and supporting a review of the current priorities for each Local Partnership. In addition, the report advised that Local Partnership Grant

Funding guidance had been refreshed in response to the consultation exercise feedback received and the guidance had been subsequently approved at the meeting of the Council's Leadership Board held on 21 February 2024.

DECIDED:

(a) That the campaign to relaunch the Local Partnerships, implemented from the end of February 2024, be noted;

(b) That the refreshed Local Partnership Guidance for 2024 be noted.

4 END OF TERM FOR COMMUNITY ORGANISATION REPRESENTATIVES

The Convener advised that the current term of the community organisation representatives as members of Paisley East Local Partnership had ended and thanked all for their contribution to the work of the local partnership.

5 MEMBERSHIP OF PAISLEY EAST LOCAL PARTNERSHIP

There was submitted a report by the Chief Executive relative to membership of Paisley East Local Partnership,

Reference was made to the decision taken at the meeting of the Council held on 27 September 2018, that membership of Local Partnerships be comprised of an equal number of elected members and Community Representatives. The standing members of the Local Partnership were those elected members which represented the Local Partnership area and a representative of active Community Councils in the area. In Paisley East Local Partnership area there were 13 elected members details of whom were provided. Following a review of Local Partnerships carried out during autumn/winter 2023/24, the community representative positions required to be refreshed. Consequently, there were 13 spaces available for Community Representatives. Active Community Councils were automatically allocated a Community Representative space. It was highlighted that three of the five Community Councils in the Paisley East Local Partnership area were currently active.

The report advised that as Hunterhill and Charleston Community Councils were currently inactive, two of the ten remaining places required to be filled by organisations representing the Hunterhill and Charleston areas respectively. The report also indicated that the Local Partnership could nominate interim Community representatives who represented the interests of these areas to fill the vacancies. In accordance with the terms of reference agreed for Local Partnerships, the appointment of the interim community representative position would be made on the basis that should a Community Council became active at a later date, the Community Council would assume the place held by the interim community representative. In addition the desirability of one of the available places being allocated for a young person or representatives of organisation for young people. Applications had been invited from both current community representatives and new applicants for the available vacant positions and criteria developed to support members decide on the appointment of community representatives. The criteria was outlined in the report together with details of applications received.

DECIDED:

(a) That having considered the summary of applications received in relation to the places for community representatives on the Local Partnership which required to be filled as set out at paragraph 3.7 the standing members of Paisley East Local Partnership agreed that the following individuals be appointed to fill the vacant community representative positions on the Local Partnership in accordance with the criteria set out in the application process and referenced at paragraph 3.6 of the report;

(b) That consideration of the application submitted by Just Dive in be continued pending submission of further information regarding the group's connections with the Paisley East local partnership area;

(c) That arrangements be made to identify appropriate community groups to represent the interests of the Charleston and Lochfield areas and young people; and

(d) That arrangements be made to identify appropriate community groups to fill the remaining membership vacancies.

A case in point is a Ukraine family who arrived in Renfrewshire with three children and rented a one bed flat and the family were overcrowded children had no places to sleep and we helped the family to apply for housing through housing associations where they were put on priority waiting list and within few months they were allocated a flat.

Section 2: About the activity you delivered.

2.1 What activities did you provide as part of the Local Partnerships?

The project involved the replacement of an existing steel shipping container at the miniature railway site. The container was used for storage of rolling stock and associated equipment and had been on site in excess of 25 years. At the time of the funding application the unit was no longer weatherproof and the material deterioration was considered beyond repair.

Thanks to the Local Partnership Grant the original container has been removed from the site and a replacement purchased and installed. The interior has been lined and insulated by the members of Paisley SME and is now in use as an equipment storage facility.

2.2 What do you think worked well about your activities?

The removal of the original container and the installation of its replacement were coordinated and supervised by the members of Paisley SME, while keeping the Council informed of progress and timing of vehicular movements within the park. Consequently, we were able to avoid any interruption to park activities, including the operation of the miniature railway during the summer months, and our new equipment storage facility was in place prior to our opening weekend at Easter 2024.

2.3 Is there anything that you would change?

The only disappointing aspect of the operation was that the new container was 'tagged' with graffiti only a few days after installation. However, given the open nature of the location, it is recognised that this is outwith the control of both Paisley SME and the Council.

Section 2: About the activity you delivered.

2.1 What activities did you provide as part of the Local Partnerships?

We ran a monthly programme of social events for our members across Renfrewshire, giving them the opportunity to meet new people, make new friends and build lasting, meaningful relationships.

Our events included monthly meetings to garner feedback and plan for future events, cinema trips, a monthly bowling league, seasonal parties, day trips, meals out, pub nights, quizzes, karaoke nights, bingo nights, park walks etc.

All our events are held in mainstream venues which ensures our members not only remain visible within their community, but they also feel actively involved in their communities.

We also run monthly workshops around confidence building, relationships, boundaries, and consent etc., which gives our members the essential life skills they need to navigate social interactions and empowers them take control of their own lives and to be responsible for their own decisions. Many of the skills they learn in these workshops can be taken into other areas of their lives.

2.2 What do you think worked well about your activities?

Adults with learning disabilities frequently encounter barriers to social interaction, which in turn leads to feelings of loneliness and exclusion. What works well with our activities is that our members feel supported, respected, and involved. We provide a supportive environment where they can connect with others of similar experience, and where they have the freedom to express themselves without fear of judgement or ridicule. Also, not only do we provide our members with access to a wider range of social activities, but we also challenge stereotypes and break down barriers. By using mainstream venues across Renfrewshire, we send a powerful message that adults with learning disabilities have as much right to participate in the same social spaces as everyone else. Due to the work we do and the services we offer, our members feel more connected, less socially isolated and more engaged with their local community, which in turn improves their overall mental health and wellbeing.

2.3 Is there anything that you would change?

One of the main issues we face is finding fully accessible venues in the Renfrewshire area. Many don't cater for the disabled community which makes our options limited. We need spaces that are fully accessible and near good transport links. This is something we would like to see more of.

The other issue we face is the cost of venue hire. We recently contacted the newly refurbished Paisely town hall to use for our annual member awards night, but the cost was prohibitive. This is the type of venue we should be able to use. We are a local charity catering for the local learning-disabled community, but we can't use community spaces as they are too expensive.

We would also like to see a change in the attitude of some other Renfrewshire social care organisation's, where we continue to face resistance when trying to present our service to their service users as they see us a "dating" agency. We are far from a dating agency! Our focus is on social inclusion, and it is a fundamental human right that adults with learning disabilities have access to information from which to make their own informed choices. If

the information they have access to is censored by a 3rd party, how can they possibly be aware of other opportunities?

We want as many of our members to attend our events as possible, so we make each event as accessible as we possibly can, in terms of geography, timings, and days of the week etc.

3.2 What impact has the Local Partnership programme had on members of your community?

The Local Partnership Programme has had a massive impact on our members. The funding we received has allowed us to provide a platform for adults with learning disabilities to form meaningful connections and relationships, and to help foster a sense of belonging and companionship which is often lacking in the lives of this section of the community. Through our monthly programme of events and workshops, we can see firsthand that the work we do leads to increased confidence, stronger social connections, and more engagement within the local community.

We ensure all our events are tailored to our members' needs, which means they can engage in social experiences that may otherwise be inaccessible to them. Not only do these events provide opportunities for fun and enjoyment, but they also promote social inclusion and reduce feelings of isolation, which has a positive impact on their health and wellbeing.

Our work in delivering workshops and training to our members allows us to offer guidance and support to people who often struggle with the complexities of relationships. We empower our members to make informed choices and to develop healthy connections. We fully understand adults with learning disabilities may face additional challenges in understanding social cues or communication, so our workshops are vital in helping support our members to understand relationships, appropriate behavior, boundaries, and consent etc.

We hold annual renewal meetings with each Renfrewshire member to find out what friendships they have developed, and if they are seeing these friends out with a Dates-n-Mates events. Do they feel more confident, less isolated, more socially connected? What additional processes can we put in place to help them reach these goals?

We also have a chat with each new applicant prior to processing their membership, to find out what their life is like now, and how they want this to change. We need to know what they are looking for from Dates-n-Mates to assess if we have achieved these goals after their first year.

We also run external evaluations every 2 to 3 years, where an independent 3rd party interviews members, support, volunteers, and external stakeholders, and reports back. In addition, we run regular internal evaluations, gauging how our members feel about our events, what we could do better, what we are doing well.

We also seek feedback from members at our monthly Coffee and Cake meetings. This allows us to ask the question, So What?? We are running events and members are attending, but So What? Unless this is having a positive impact on their life, then it means nothing. That's why member feedback is so important. Measuring our success is about assessing how our service positively affects someone's relationships, their confidence and their mental health and wellbeing.

We also seek feedback from staff and volunteers to assess from their perspective if what we are doing is working and how we can develop and change to better meet the needs of our members.

2.1 What activities did you provide as part of the Local Partnerships?

We delivered a successful Christmas 2023 campaign supporting 3,035 local children with gift packages and distributed £10,420 worth of gift cards to teenagers: 521 gift cards in total.

This Easter we distributed 4,705 eggs to local schools, nurseries, community groups as well as charities that tackle food insecurity.

In 2023 we distributed Halloween costumes too. This provided great feedback as more and more schools are having Halloween discos again or dressing up for the day. We know this helped more children to feel included, helping to reduce financial strain for many.

Birthday gifts constantly go out with some organisations having "birthday boxes" that we top up when needed.

2.2 What do you think worked well about your activities?

Partnership working is key for the toy bank. This ensures the referral process is transparent, fair and secure. Working together to build connections not only helps us, it allows us to network and know where to signpost community members for other support that we cannot offer.

Having support from libraries, organiations and businesses is a vital part of how we operate, and we cannot thank them enough for making donating as easy as possible for the public.

The toy bank simply could not run without our incredible volunteers. The local people that help us go above and beyond.

This year we need to focus on recruiting more volunteers. We will remain volunteer led and do not plan on having staff. We want to ensure our core costs are kept to a minimum, putting everything we can back out to support local families.

Scotland, The Carers Centre, and many more cover Renfrewshire wide and benefit more than one local partnership area.

71 organisations referred to us – multiple social work departments, local charities, NHS divisions such as health visitors and doctor practices, schools, nurseries and many more.

Renfrew schools and social work - over 400 children.

Johnstone and Linwood social work and schools - over 500 children.

Erskine, Bishopton and Inchinnan health visitors, charities schools -over 300 children

Paisley NWC, East and Glennifer schools and social work been combined due to a high crossover in post codes from social workers from the north and south team – over 1000 children.

The Villages – over 300 children.

The cost-of-living crisis has affected so many and most local charities have reported seeing a change in people accessing their services. The toy bank is no different and we have received feedback from referring partners about the financial strain, embarrassment, and stigma the toy bank helps to relieve. The toy bank is open to all, and we hope our referral system is as simple and fair as possible to continue to support our local community.

It has allowed parents and carers the knowledge that their child is receiving high quality safe toys the same as their peers. Sparking joy for our young people while helping them to learn and develop through play.

As well as distributing toys we also provide clothing items such as pyjamas and blankets, something that is being asked for more and more.

This funding has been central to our ability to deliver for the young people of the area and increase participation across all areas of society whilst promoting the physical and mental health advantages of cricket.

Section 2: About the activity you delivered.

2.1 What activities did you provide as part of the Local Partnerships?

Thanks to funding from Local Partnership Fund, RIG Arts provided a series of 18 weekly textiles workshops aimed at enhancing practical and creative skills among residents of Seedhill, with a particular focus on women and nonbinary individuals. These workshops covered a wide range of activities, including machine and hand sewing, repair techniques such as patching and darning, and decorative textiles methods like printing, dying, and embroidery. The project emphasised community-led and strengths-based approaches, fostering empowerment and inclusivity among participants.

Throughout the duration of the Adult Textiles Workshops, a total of 10 participants engaged with the program, with 7 individuals attending regularly. This consistent attendance, alongside participants' ongoing request for future workshops underscores the impact of the workshops and the project's ability to maintain participant interest and commitment over time.

2.2 What do you think worked well about your activities?

The Adult Textiles Workshops demonstrated several strengths both for the community participants and freelance artists.

The project effectively engaged residents of Seedhill, particularly women and nonbinary individuals, in a meaningful and inclusive manner. The workshops provided a safe and welcoming space for participants to connect, learn, and express themselves creatively.

Participants had the opportunity to acquire and enhance practical and creative skills in textile arts, including sewing, repair techniques, and decorative methods. The hands-on nature of the workshops enabled individuals to gain confidence in their abilities and explore their artistic potential.

The majority of participants attended the workshops regularly, indicating sustained interest and commitment. This consistent engagement speaks to the relevance and value of the activities offered, as well as the effectiveness of the project's outreach and communication efforts.

One participant's successful transition to ongoing paid work within the Community Art Space demonstrates the project's ability to create tangible opportunities for economic empowerment and career advancement within the community.

Participants reported a high level of enjoyment, with 100% expressing satisfaction with the workshops.

The project successfully maintained participant interest and commitment over time, as evidenced by the majority of attendees having previous experience with RIG Arts workshops, while still managing to engage a number of new participants' involvement, who were integrated well into the workshops and felt very welcomed.

The workshops provided valuable opportunities for engagement, particularly for individuals who had previously been interested in art but lacked the chance to participate.

The project had a significant positive impact on participants' mental health and wellbeing, with all survey respondents reporting improvements in these areas.

Participants learned a diverse range of skills, contributing to their personal and creative development. The workshops also facilitated the formation of meaningful connections and friendships among participants, fostering a sense of community and support.

Feedback from participants highlighted the skills and communication of the tutors as exceptional, indicating high-quality facilitation of the workshops.

Demographic information revealed the project's success in providing inclusive and accessible opportunities for engagement, particularly for marginalised demographics such as women, non-binary individuals, and those with disabilities.

Overall, the Adult Textiles Workshops effectively fulfilled their objectives of providing enjoyable, skill-building, and community-building experiences for participants, contributing positively to their wellbeing and creative development.

2.3 Is there anything that you would change?

While the Adult Textiles Workshops were very successful overall, RIG Arts are always assessing projects and policies for improvement in future delivery. These are some areas we have identified where improvements could be made for future projects.

Considering that 50% of participants identified as disabled, there may be a need to further assess and address accessibility issues to ensure that the workshops are fully inclusive.

Despite the positive outcomes, the workshops primarily attracted women and non-binary individuals aged over 56. Exploring strategies to attract a more diverse range of participants could enrich the workshop experience and better reflect the community.

While the workshops were well-received, the reduced funding resulted in fewer sessions than initially planned. Securing additional funding to extend the duration or increase the frequency of workshops could provide more opportunities for engagement.

While participants reported learning a variety of skills, there may be opportunities to expand the range of activities or offer more advanced workshops to cater to participants with varying skill levels and interests.

Overall, while the workshops were successful, addressing these areas for improvement could enhance the program's effectiveness and ensure that it continues to meet the diverse needs of participants in the community.

In addition to the areas mentioned, one aspect that could be enhanced is the collaboration with local organisations. There may be opportunities to further integrate their resources and expertise into the workshops. Establishing clearer pathways for participants to access ongoing support and resources from these organisations beyond the duration of the workshops could strengthen the sustainability and long-term impact of the project. By leveraging the expertise and resources of these partners more effectively, the workshops could become even more beneficial and impactful for participants, fostering a stronger sense of community and support.

Expanding the scope of future workshops to be more inclusive of individuals with disabilities by collaborating with local organisations like Finding Your Feet, with whom we've had successful collaborations in the past, could greatly enhance the accessibility and impact of the workshops.

To ensure the success of these future workshops, we are prioritising accessibility improvements to the Art Flat, making it wheelchair accessible and removing any physical barriers that may hinder participation. This will include modifications to the space such as ramps, widened doorways, and accessible restroom facilities, as well as continuing to ensure that workshop materials and activities are adaptable and inclusive of diverse abilities.

Additionally, partnering with Finding Your Feet and other disability-focused organisations could provide valuable insights and expertise in designing and implementing workshops that cater specifically to the needs and interests of individuals with disabilities. Collaborative planning sessions and consultations with disability advocates and community members could help ensure that the workshops are truly inclusive and responsive to the needs of all participants.

By addressing these areas, the workshops can become more accessible, inclusive, and impactful, aligning with the RIG Arts' commitment to enhancing the lives of disadvantaged individuals through cultural activities.

3.2 What impact has the Local Partnership programme had on members of your community? (Please describe the impact your project had on its participants)

Amongst other important impacts,

-There was a **re-engagement** between members of the host community and the ethnic communities, e.g the African hair extension plaiting sessions afforded participants of the host community to have conversations that led to the understanding of the ways of doing things and the appreciation of other ethnically diverse cultures within the community.

-The **intergenerational connection** was remarkable, for example- the drumming sessions saw the elderly from the host community enjoy the company of the different age groups who engaged in the drumming.

-Some **People rediscovered their potential**, while **others learned new skills**, and this would not have been ordinarily possible if the local partnership program did not afford this opportunity. During the bead-making workshop, we observed 2 of the volunteers were able to work effectively with the large number of participants who showed interest in learning how to make beads. Their people potential was quite inspiring as they displayed a commendable ability to engage and carry everyone along within a specified time while also accomplishing the task of getting participants to learn and make at least a bead each.

-There has been **less anxiety on how to navigate** their way through within the community because of participants attending the information sessions.

-We have registered a **growing interest in local community hubs** and events and actual **community engagement** from community members and this has brought about social connections.

Local organizations will need to understand the needs of ethnically diverse communities so they can work with and engage effectively with them.

Some venues we approached restricted what we could do or bring into their venues as opposed to the project plan. We were informed we could not bring in our food whereas it was the culturally appropriate food that we needed to also promote in our project and

share with host communities. They said we would have to use caterers from the venues who would have been registered as a community chef etc....but we could not afford this at the time. However, the project needed to be done because we had already signed up our resource persons and did not want to deny our community this opportunity. Hence, a change of venues that could accommodate the needs of our community.

However, As a result of this particular issue, Karibu Hub in conjunction with Inspiring Families Development Network Scotland, has gone as far as registering one of our volunteers to undergo the Community Cooking Train the Trainer 6 weeks Course organised by the Renfrewshire Health and Social Care Partnerships. which started in April month end. On completion, the volunteer will be included on their register as a community Chef and deliver 2 events per year for the HSPC.

This is a plus to KARIBU HUB because we will now have someone who is officially a registered community chef and at our future events, she will be allowed to handle community foods for us and also be able to train others.

All these would not have happened if we were not challenged by the issues of venue. So, the Local partnerships programme has contributed to this. Thank you.

TITLE: Applications for Local Partnership Funding To Paisley East Local Partnership 2024/25

1. Summary

- 1.1 Applications for grant funding from the seven Local Partnership areas were invited to be submitted during April and May 2024, to be considered at the Local Partnership meetings due to be held in May/June 2024.
- 1.2 The available allocation for Paisley East Local Partnership for 2024/25 is £64,647 made up of £52,247 from the General Fund and £12,400 from Paisley Common Good Fund.
- 1.3 From this total budget, a sum of £50 per community representative requires to be ringfenced for potential claim of expenses. These expenses are deducted from the available allocation for the Local Partnership. Paisley East Local Partnership has space for eleven community members, so the total ringfenced for expenses is £550. The total budget available for allocation by Paisley East Local Partnership is therefore £64,097.

1.4 The total value of applications for funding received is £93,727.13

1.5 The Youth Challenge Fund component of Paisley East Local Partnership Funding for 2024/25 is £24,095. This funding will be allocated by young people through a Participatory Budgeting exercise that will take place during May 2023 with decisions announced in June.

2. **Recommendations**

2.1 It is recommended that members of Paisley East Local Partnership consider the applications for Local Partnership grant funding, as set out below in Appendix 1 and 2.

3. Background

- 3.1 Applicants for funding in 2034/25 have been provided with guidance, as well as a description of the Local Priorities identified by Paisley East Local Partnership.
- 3.2 Local Partnership members are asked to consider the applications for funding summarised at Appendix 1 and 2 of this report, and to assess these against the Local Priorities agreed by Paisley East.
- 3.3 An initial assessment has been carried out by officers to support Local Partnership members in their decision-making. Where applications have made clear reference to the Local Priorities identified by the Local Partnership, this is identified in the first table at Appendix 1. Applications that make a partial or no reference to Paisley East Local Priorities are summarised in the second table for example, the project may tackle social isolation (and therefore meet the Local Priority around social isolation) but not deliver this directly in the Local Partnership area or make reference to how many people from the area would be engaged in the project.
- 3.4 The priorities of Paisley East Local Partnership are:

Exploring the impact of new housing developments

The Local Partnership want to explore how they influence planning decisions around new developments, and make sure that the infrastructure is in place to support these developments, for example, roads, schools, and nurseries. They want to explore how community benefits might be used to support this.

Supporting social connections

The Local Partnership want to support social connections to tackle isolation and promote mental health and wellbeing. They want to see groups in the local area working together, swapping skills, and sharing resources.

Community pride and safety

The Local Partnership want to see the care and maintenance of their spaces across their area, so they are clean, safe, and attractive spaces. They want to see these spaces used to promote good wellbeing across the area.

Tackling food poverty

The Local Partnership wants to tackle food poverty in the area to ensure that people are able to access supplies of food where they need it. As part of this, the Local Partnership wants to see a reduction in the amount of usable surplus food wasted and the sustainable use of resources to be key features of work to tackle food poverty.

We help to rehabilitate offenders, provide work experience and references for the unemployed, assist people with mental health difficulties to reintroduce themselves to a normal day, and work with pupils and students to gain valuable experience to move forward with their chosen studies and careers.

The need for this has been identified as we are the only facility of this type not only in the area but in the whole of Scotland. We were the first city farm in Scotland and are now the only one left. We work at developing our project every year depending on the requirements of the people coming to us, as this is varied and each case is unique. We could have an influx of young offenders completing their community service here one month, and could have a non-verbal autistic child here the next requiring care and support. Every day is different!

We will continue to be caring and supportive and treat everyone as an individual without judgement or discrimination and try to help every person walking through the front gates that is looking for it.
