RECORDING OF MEETING

Prior to the commencement of the meeting, the Chair intimated that this meeting of the Local Partnership would be recorded and that the recording would be available to watch on the Council's website.

APOLOGIES

Councillor Audrey Doig, Adele Fraser (Linstone HA), Councillor John Hood, Margaret Lavery (Quarrelton TARA), George MacDonald (Corseford Tenants and Residents Association), James McLeod (Linwood Community Council), Councillor Emma Rodden, Councillor James Sheridan and Thomas Wallace (Johnstone Community Council).

DECLARATIONS OF INTEREST

There were no declarations of interest intimated prior to the commencement of the meeting.

1 MINUTE

There was submitted the Minute of the meeting of this Local Partnership held on 22 June 2021.

Councillor Dowling and Iain McMillan highlighted that there attendance at the meeting was not recorded in the minute.

Councillor Mackay highlighted that while declaring an interest in relation to item 4 – Applications for Local Partnership Funding to Johnstone and Linwood Local Partnership 2020/21 - FR1118 he stated he would not take part in the discussion or voting on any application of funding, not just his own, and this was not recorded in the minute.

Iain McMillan highlighted that his organisation name had not been updated and that his reason for declaring an interest in item 4 – Applications for Local Partnership Funding to Johnstone and Linwood Local Partnership 2020/21 - FR1144 he stated that he was a member of the organisation, not related to a member as recorded in the minute.

DECIDED: That the Minute be approved subject to the amendments noted above.

2 ELIGIBILITY OF APPLICATIONS AND OPTIONS TO APPLY CRITERIA

There was submitted a report by the Chief Executive relative to the eligibility of applications for Local Partnership funding and options around the application of the criteria to assist decision making.

At the meeting on 22 June 2021 the Partnership agreed that the information contained in the report would become a standing item on the agenda for future meetings. The report provided a link to guidance for applicants to help them provide the information required for the Partnership to make funding decisions including alignment with local priorities and the local community benefits. It also set out examples of the flexibility that Local Partnerships have in terms of the methodology they use to determine grant applications such as funding caps and the ability to limit grant awards to groups which are based in the local area.

Discussion took place around the Partnership's policy of refusing grant applications for Renfrewshire wide applications and whether this policy could result in a group which is not based in the local area but still serves local residents being refused funding. It was highlighted that despite the policy it would still be possible for funding to be approved in such cases under exceptional circumstances.

DECIDED: That the report be noted.

3 YOU DECIDE

G Heaney delivered a presentation relative to #YouDecide, a participatory budgeting exercise that gave communities a key role in deciding their priorities for environmental and physical infrastructure improvements to be undertaken throughout Renfrewshire over the next three years via a Community Investment Fund of £1.2m.

The presentation explained the #YouDecide concept and highlighted the marketing and promotional work already undertaken as a first phase to encourage communities, groups and individuals to submit their ideas for environmental improvements. A video was shown, featuring local groups and individuals, explained how to get involved and inspired the submission of ideas. As a result of engagement initiatives, over 2700 proposals/ideals had been submitted, with 104 ideas/proposals for improvements for the Erskine, Inchinnan, Bishopton & Langbank area.

The second phase of #YouDecide was underway and would conclude at the end of January 2022 with a shortlist of projects that were suitable and feasible having undergone technical assessment against set criteria. During the third and final phase of #YouDecide communities would be invited to vote on which shortlisted project they wished to see proceed. It was anticipated that the winning projects would be announced in early March 2022.

DECIDED: That the presentation be noted.

4 COMMUNITIES MENTAL HEALTH AND WELLBEING FUND

There was submitted a presentation by K McIntyre, Engage Renfrewshire, relative to the national Communities Mental Health & Wellbeing Fund (the Fund). The Fund aimed to promote and develop good mental health and wellbeing and to protect against the impact of distress and mental ill health in adults.

Engage Renfrewshire announced that Renfrewshire had secured an award of £509,542 from the Fund and small “grass roots” community groups and organisations with a strong community focus could now apply for funding towards projects that tackled issues such as: suicide prevention; social isolation; loneliness prevention and early intervention; and/or addressed any mental health inequalities exacerbated by the pandemic and the needs of a range of “at risk” groups locally.

K McIntyre advised that the fund had opened on 15 November 2021, and organisations could apply more than once if they were running a variety of different projects, and partnership applications would be encouraged. The deadline for applications was 7 January 2022. It was noted that the funds required to be allocated by end of March 2022.

DECIDED:

(a) That information held by Engage Renfrewshire relating to the number of groups which had applied for emergency funding and the amount of money dispersed to these be circulated by email to the members of the Partnership;

(b) That the presentation be noted;

- (c) That as Engage Renfrewshire was the contact point for enquiries, applications, delivery of funds and monitoring compliance, members should contact them to suggest suitable projects; and
- (d) That the presentation be circulated to all members off the Local Partnership.

5 **CLIMATE EMERGENCY**

The Partnership received a presentation from P Moss, Strategy, Policy & Insight Manager and R Smith, Climate Emergency Lead Officer, to provide an update on the climate emergency.

The presentation set out the action being taken in Renfrewshire to help tackle climate change, key messages from the United Nations Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change, the importance of ensuring that the changes being made to tackle climate change did not further contribute to inequalities and the progress which had been made to tackle climate change in Scotland to date.

Iain McMillan, Thorn Athletic Sports Academy, requested that the presentation be given at a meeting of the club's Executive Committee. It was suggested that the other Local Partnerships be encouraged to invite the presenters to a future meeting.

DECIDED:

- (a) That the content of the report be noted; and
- (b) That the chairs of the other Local Partnerships would be offered the chance to receive the presentation at a future meeting.

6 **JOHNSTONE AND LINWOOD LOCAL PARTNERSHIP BUDGET MONITORING REPORT**

There was submitted a report by the Chief Executive relative to the grant funds which the Partnership was responsible for distributing.

The report noted that the balance of the General Grant Fund had been dispersed and all monies had been paid out to successful applicants as detailed in Appendix 1 to the report. A verbal update was provided detailing the grants awarded from the Celebrating Renfrewshire Youth Challenge Fund through a participatory budgeting exercise on 12 November 2021. The balance of the fund was awarded as follows:

DECIDED: That the content of the report be noted.

7 CURRENT ACTIVITIES IN COMMUNITIES

Members of the Partnership were given the opportunity to provide an update on activities in the local area which had started or resumed since the pandemic.

Iain McMillan, Thorn Athletic Community Sports Academy, gave an update on the activities on offer at the club which had increased its membership to over 500 players across all age groups and had recently added a walking football team. A £50,000 grant had also been received to improve drainage on the pitch and to erect a fence around the perimeter, both of which would help improve the quality of the surface and allow it to be used more by local teams. The hall had also seen bookings increase and was available to hire for a wide range of activities including fitness classes and social functions.

Cheryl Thomas, Active Communities, agreed to circulate the list of activities which was being offered by the group and noted that while Covid-19 restrictions remained in place there were a limit on the number of users permitted and venues which could be used.

DECIDED: That the updates provided be noted.

8 WORKSHOP ON LOCAL PRIORITIES

This item was continued to a future meeting of the Partnership to allow for wider participation.

Discussion took place around the low attendance at recent partnership meetings, whether other Local Partnerships were experiencing similar issues and if holding meetings virtually was one of the reasons behind this. It was suggested that, should regulations permit, a venue large enough to accommodate all members of the Partnership be sought to allow the next meeting to take place in person.

DECIDED:

- (a) That this item be continued to a future meeting of the Partnership; and
- (b) That, should regulations permit, a venue large enough to accommodate all members of the Partnership be sought to allow the next meeting to take place in person.

TITLE:

Eligibility Of Applications For Local Partnership Funding And Options For Application Of Criteria To Assist Decision Making

1. Summary

- 1.1 Johnstone and Linwood Local Partnership received a report at the meeting held on 22 June 2021 regarding eligibility of applications for Local Partnership funding and options for the application of criteria to assist decision making. It was agreed at this meeting that this information be included as a standing item on Johnstone and Linwood Local Partnership papers
- 1.2 A guidance page is available on the Renfrewshire Council website to applicants to Local Partnerships regarding eligibility (see link below). The guidance seeks to ensure that applicants provide the information that Local Partnerships need to make funding decisions, including alignment with local priorities and how the local community benefits.

- 1.3 The key criteria for assessing funding applicants is fit with the agreed local priorities of each area. Local Partnerships also have flexibility to determine for themselves a methodology for determining grant allocations. Examples of this include a cap on the maximum funding awarded, the award of funding requests in full up to a specified amount and requiring feedback on any previous awards made.
- 1.4 This presentation is intended to provide information to the membership about fit with local priorities and link to the Johnstone and Linwood area. Prior to the meeting, members will also receive separately a proposal from the Chair outlining an indicative allocation of funding, as a starting point for discussion at the meeting.

2. Recommendation

2.1 It is recommended that members of Johnstone and Linwood Local Partnership:

Note the standing item regarding eligibility criteria.

3. **Background**

3.1 Johnstone and Linwood Local Partnership has a set of local priorities for action. Community and voluntary groups are invited to apply for Local Partnership funding for projects that align to the local priorities. At the Local Partnership meeting on 2 February 2021, members raised issues regarding the following aspects of funding allocation:

- Large organisations submitting Local Partnership applications, when national funding or raising their own funds might be an option.
- Groups applying for general running costs.
- The sustainability of groups seeking funding.
- Application of criteria in relation to the purposes of the fund.
- Whether Local Partnerships could be prescriptive in relation to groups applying for funding.
- Potential conflict of interest if community planning partners apply for funding.
- Public perception in granting awards to faith-based groups.
- Scrutiny undertaken in relation to grant applications
- Flexibility for Local Partnerships to limit awards solely to projects in the local area and any potential practical difficulties.

3.2 The guidance to applicants provides a response to many of the issues raised above. Any community or voluntary group with a constitution and bank account is eligible to apply, with the merits of the application considered by the Local Partnership. All applications should be specific to the Local Partnership area and clearly state the benefit to the community. Information is provided to applicants on sources of advice to apply for other sources of funding, including national funding.

3.3 Groups may apply for a portion of their running costs, but not their full running costs. The guidance also states that groups should consider any award as a “one-off” and that Local Partnership funds are not intended to provide ongoing funding. Applicants are advised to consider the sustainability of their project beyond the one-year funding term.

3.4 Applicants are advised to make clear how their project aligns to the priorities of each Local Partnership. Information on these priorities is also made available to applicants. This provides Local Partnership members with criteria against which to assess applications.

3.5 As Renfrewshire Council grants, applications are open to groups meeting the eligibility criteria. All applications from eligible groups are presented for consideration by the relevant Local Partnership. While Local Partnerships do not have the authority to be prescriptive about who applies for funding, they can

commission projects to be delivered by named groups. Any such proposals require to be agreed by the Local Partnership members.

- 3.6 Community planning partners, with the exception of Renfrewshire Council, are eligible to apply for Local Partnership funding, but not for core activities. As with any applicant, community planning partners present at the meeting would require to declare an interest in any application and take no part in the discussion.
- 3.7 The guidance states that applications must encourage equality of opportunities. Faith-based groups may apply for activities open to the wider community, but not for purposes related to the faith itself.
- 3.8 Applicants are required to submit documentation in relation to their bank account and constitution when making an application for Local Partnership funding. Information on applications is presented in summary form in Local Partnership papers. Successful applicants are requested to provide feedback on projects at the end of the financial year.
- 3.9 Local Partnerships have the flexibility to use additional criteria such as locality in determining awards of Local Partnership funding. However, Local Partnership funding is the main source of funding available to community groups in Renfrewshire and members may wish to consider the potential impact on Renfrewshire-wide projects if funding was to be restricted to those operating from the local area. The requirement for groups applying to more than one Local Partnership area to make separate applications setting out the benefit to the local area was introduced to provide as much locally-relevant information as possible.

Applications for Local Partnership Funding To Johnstone and Linwood Local Partnership 2022/23

1. Summary

- 1.1 Applications for grant funding from the seven Local Partnership areas were invited to be submitted during March and April 2022, for consideration at the Local Partnership meetings due to be held in June 2022.
- 1.2 The total allocation for Johnstone and Linwood Local Partnership for 2022/23 is £48,865, which consists of £47,044 from the General Fund and £1,821 brought forward from 2021/22.
- 1.3 From this total budget, a sum of £50 per community representative requires to be ringfenced for potential claim of expenses. These expenses are deducted from the available allocation for the Local Partnership. Johnstone and Linwood Local Partnership has space for fourteen community members, so the total ringfenced for expenses is £700. **The total budget available for allocation by Johnstone and Linwood Local Partnership is therefore £48,165.**
- 1.4 The total value of applications to Johnstone and Linwood Local Partnership is £132,414.04.
- 1.5 The Youth Challenge Fund component of Johnstone and Linwood Local Partnership Funding for 2022/23, known as Celebrating Renfrewshire, is £21,697 Celebrating Renfrewshire funding will be allocated by young people aged 12-25 in the Johnstone and Linwood Local Partnership area through a Participatory Budgeting exercise that will take place during autumn 2022.

2. Recommendations

2.1 It is recommended that members of Johnstone and Linwood Local Partnership consider the applications for Local Partnership grant funding, as set out below in Appendix 1 and 2.

3. Background

3.1 Applicants for funding in 2022/23 have been provided with guidance on the groups and type of activity that are eligible to be funded through Local Partnerships. Groups have also been provided with a description of the Local Priorities identified by Johnstone and Linwood Local Partnership.

3.2 Local Partnership members are asked to consider the applications for funding summarised at Appendix 1 and 2 of this report, and to assess these against the Local Priorities agreed by Johnstone and Linwood local priorities.

3.3 An initial assessment has been carried out by officers to support Local Partnership members in their decision-making. Where applications have made clear reference to the Local Priorities identified by the Local Partnership, this is identified in the first table at Appendix 1. Applications that make a partial or no reference to Johnstone and Linwood Local Priorities are summarised in the second table (for example, a project that meets the criteria of benefiting young people, But isn't based in the Johnstone and Linwood area and doesn't state how many people in the area will benefit).

3.4 The priorities of Johnstone and Linwood Local Partnership are:

Key theme: Focus on young people

The Local Partnership are particularly keen to see a focus on how young people can be engaged and involved in work around the Local Priorities.

Taking pride in the look and feel of our towns

The Local Partnership want people in Johnstone and Linwood to take pride in the look and feel of their towns and their heritage, with vibrant and well-used town squares, fewer derelict buildings, and making sure the streets are clean.

What's on in Johnstone and Linwood

The Local Partnership want to explore how people know what's going on across Johnstone and Linwood. They also want to see community spaces and community events which are safe and affordable, particularly in community halls and hubs.

Roads and transport

The Local Partnership want to address a range of issues related to roads and transport, including congestion, speed, parking and public transport connections.

Community safety

The Local Partnership want to see safe spaces, both safe from crime but also safe physical environments. They also want to look at how they can, along with other community leaders, promote the reporting of crime and anti-social behaviour.

What will the project do? Dampness has been an issue for several years, but resources had been focussed on piecemeal roof repairs. Purpose of the project:	

To provide breastfeeding peer support and evidence-based information to families in Johnstone and Linwood. This is especially important in area of multiple deprivation which addresses health inequalities, promotes inclusion, tackles loneliness and isolation, improves maternal health and wellbeing. This then improves the confidence of young mums, enabling them to go on and do further training. We want to maintain the excellent service we already provide by supporting our existing volunteers in the area.

What will the project do?

Across Renfrewshire breastfeeding rates remain low, with only around 18% of babies being exclusively breastfed at 6-8 weeks in the most deprived areas. Evidence shows that trained peer support helps mums to meet their own breastfeeding goals, enabling them to breastfeed for longer. This positive impact on their own mental health improves bonding and attachment helping to alleviate postnatal depression and feelings of isolation. By having the opportunity to access skilled support and evidence-based information they feel part of a supportive welcome.

We have a weekly virtual breastfeeding group on Zoom and will have a new weekly group in Station 7 in partnership with Active Communities. We plan to hold 2 Pop Up events to reach out and support those families in different areas in community venues that are accessible to families. This will help reduce isolation and introduce mums that might not normally come to the group to local BfN volunteers so they might feel more confident. The project would also deliver 6 workshops targeting 5 participants per workshop around areas that our client base feel they need more help within order to become more resilient and independent. These areas could include budgeting, recycling, how to buy online (using comparison websites and freebies) cooking (how to make healthy meals utilising leftovers), confidence building, CV writing and developing interview skills. The project will also organise one massive cultural celebration event bringing the whole community together to allow community integration.</p>	
<p>What will the project do?</p> <p>The project has been developed as a result of a combination of factors such as an increasing number of diverse groups in and around the Renfrewshire area; gaps in service provision for hard-to-reach communities; consultations held with target communities in order to assess their needs; anecdotal evidence; evidence from research; and government and local council community development priorities. Participants will be able to improve in self-confidence and add to their skills set. The areas of support have been identified as areas of need from previous project work done with target groups.
