## 1 Membership

The Chair intimated that, at its meeting on 26 January 2021, Tony Lawler had been appointed to the Chair of Foxbar & Brediland Community Council and would now take his place as a member of Gleniffer Local Partnership.

## 2 Minute of Previous Meeting

The Minute of the Gleniffer Local Partnership meeting held on 16 September 2020 was submitted and approved.

## 3 Matters Arising

#### **APPLICATIONS FOR LOCAL PARTNERSHIP FUNDING 2020/21**

Under reference to paragraph 2 of the Minute of the Gleniffer Local Partnership meeting held on 16 September 2020, Councillor McGurk proposed that, in light of the circumstances surrounding the Covid-19 pandemic and the ongoing revisions to the Scottish Government's Covid-19 route map, the Local Partnership carry forward to financial year 2021/22 from the General Fund 2020/21 programme: (a) any grants awarded for projects which were unable to be delivered in the financial year to 31 March 2021; (b) balances arising from grant awards returned due to the inability to deliver the project as previously expected; and (c) the residual programme balance currently unable to be awarded; and that the award of any residual sums be considered as early as practicable in financial year 2021/22 to support communities over the period of recovery from Covid-19. This was agreed.

Provost Cameron proposed that a workshop be held as soon as practicable and before the next meeting where members could examine options and methods for allocating grant funding that were fair, equitable and focussed on the Partnership's priorities in light of the Covid-19 pandemic. This was agreed.

#### **DECIDED**:

(a) That, in light of the circumstances surrounding the Covid-19 pandemic and the ongoing revisions to the Scottish Government's Covid-19 route map, the Local Partnership carry forward to financial year 2021/22 from the General Fund 2020/21 programme: (i) any grants awarded for projects which were unable to be delivered in the

financial year to 31 March 2021; (ii) balances arising from grant awards returned due to the inability to deliver the project as previously expected; and (iii) the residual programme balance currently unable to be awarded;

- (b) That the award of any residual sums be considered as early as practicable in financial year 2021/22 to support communities over the period of recovery from Covid-19; and
- (c) That a workshop be held as soon as practicable and before the next meeting to allow members to examine options and methods for allocating grant funding that were fair, equitable and focussed on the Partnership's priorities in light of the Covide-19 pandemic.

## 4 Budget Monitoring and Celebrating Renfrewshire Report

There was submitted a report by the Chief Executive relative to the funding provided to community groups from the Gleniffer Local Partnership general grant fund during 2020/21 and the outcome of the Celebrating Renfrewshire participatory budgeting exercise which disbursed the Youth Challenge Fund. An appendix to the report detailed the outcome of the Celebrating Renfrewshire budgeting exercise as it related to this Local Partnership area.

The report highlighted that £49,192.75 in total had been disbursed to 38 community groups from the general grant fund and £13,886 in total had been disbursed to seven community youth groups through Celebrating Renfrewshire. There remained £3,021.25 to be disbursed during 2020/21.

The Strategic Partnership & Inequalities Manager advised that the remaining funds could be carried forward into 2021/22 if necessary and proposed that in light of delays caused by the Covid-19 pandemic lockdown, Community Planning contact all award recipients to ascertain the status of each project, the amount of expenditure to date and any revised timescale for delivery; and that the outcome of this exercise be reported to the next meeting. This was agreed.

It was also proposed that, as an emergency measure and in view of the outstanding contribution to supporting residents throughout the Local Partnership area during the pandemic, Stronger Communities Glenburn be invited to apply for an award of up to £3,021.25 as soon as possible; the application to detail activities and costs associated with supporting the community throughout the pandemic and that the application be considered as soon as possible after submission. This was agreed.

#### **DECISION**:

- (a) That it be noted that the outstanding balance of £3,021.25 could be carried forward for disbursement in 2021/22 if necessary;
- (b) That Community Planning contact all award recipients to ascertain the status of each project, the amount of expenditure to date and any revised timescale for delivery; and that the outcome of this exercise be reported to the next meeting; and
- (b) That Stronger Communities Glenburn be invited to apply for an award of up to £3,021.25 as soon as possible; the application to detail activities and costs associated with supporting the community throughout the pandemic and that the application be considered as soon as possible after submission.

## 5 Covid19 - Impact on Communities

There was submitted a presentation by the Strategic Partnership & Inequalities Manager relative to the impact of Covid-19 on local communities. The presentation highlighted Community Impact Assessment work carried out to date, shared information from the Public Services Panel relevant to this Local Partnership and sought to discuss members' own experience of how Covid-19 had impacted on their community.

The presentation set out a range of research data key points, including: that to date within Renfrewshire there had been 7,381 positive cases and 512 deaths; there had been an 80% increase in universal credit claims from March to October 2020; at its peak in August 2020, 28,300 people in Renfrewshire were registered as furloughed – 8,800 people at the end of October 2020; and grant support in excess of £28.5 million had been paid to over 2,500 businesses.

The interim findings of a Public Services Panel survey designed to assess the impact of Covid-19 on communities in Renfrewshire indicated that 80 responses had been received from this Local Partnership area. Analysis of responses to each question was detailed in graph format for ease of interpretation.

The presentation stimulated discussion, and the Strategic Partnership & Inequalities Manager was heard in response to questions from members.

## TITLE: Application for Local Partnership grant funding

### 1. Summary

- 1.1 At the meeting of the Gleniffer Local Partnership on 10<sup>th</sup> February 2021, it was proposed that, as an emergency measure and in view of the outstanding contribution to supporting residents throughout the Local Partnership area during the pandemic, Stronger Communities Glenburn be invited to apply for an award of up to £3,021.25 as soon as possible. It was agreed that the application should be considered as soon as possible after submission.
- 1.2 Following the meeting, officers invited an application from Stronger Communities Glenburn, and this was submitted on 1<sup>st</sup> March. An urgent meeting has been convened to allow the Local Partnership members to consider the application at the earliest opportunity.
- 1.3 The remaining balance of the Local Partnership funding is £3,021.25, and therefore the Local Partnership can award up to this amount.
- 1.4 A summary of the application is attached to the paper at Appendix A.

#### 2. Recommendation

2.1 It is recommended that the Local Partnership consider the grant application submitted by Stronger Communities Glenburn and attached at Appendix A.

#### 5. Description Of Project

We plan to use the funding to continue to provide food packs for families in Foxbar and Glenburn alongside craft packs for children and young people of all ages which encourage them to play outside.

The funding would allow us to purchase additional food to our donations so we can provide fresh food such as bread and milk in parcels, as well as craft materials. We estimate that these packs cost approximately £10 per person. We deliver food parcels directly to people.

Due to the nature of the project, provision of packs will be scaled to fit the available funding, and prioritised based on need.

## 6. Who Benefits From The Project?

We have been providing support through the pandemic, particularly with working families who are struggling and people who aren't entitled to other supports. We have been operating a temporary food bank during the pandemic with support from donations from Morrisons.

We have worked with over 500 families in the area, and this covers both the Foxbar and Glenburn areas within the Gleniffer LP area.

Most of these children are entitled to free school meals, therefore many are going without that one hot meal, that they rely on in school. This also includes families who struggle to feed themselves without the added pressure of adding another meal during the holiday. Some of these families are working and struggle just as much as people on benefits. The need was identified through talking to people within our clubs.

### 7. Fit With Local Partnership Priorities

The Gleniffer Local Partnership recognised the work of Stronger Communities Glenburn in responding to the COVID-19 pandemic, and have specifically invited an application to address local COVID response.

Projects such as this can encourage people to contact and engage with local community groups such as Stronger Communities Glenburn, tackling isolation and loneliness which is currently exacerbated by the COVID-19 pandemic.

#### 8. Breakdown of Costs

Stronger Communities Glenburn will be able to scale provision based on the size of the award.
