### **Summary**

1.1 The Local Government in Scotland Act 2003 and supporting regulations require local authorities to have regard to the following codes of practice issued by the Chartered Institute of Public Finance and Accountancy (CIPFA):

- The Prudential Code for Capital Finance in Local Authorities ("the Prudential Code");
- Treasury Management in the Public Services: Code of Practice and Cross-Sectoral Guidance Notes ("the Treasury Management Code").
- 1.2 The Council set its prudential indicators for 2019/20 on 28th February 2019 and the purpose of this report is to consider the indicators as they stand at 11th October 2019, approximately halfway through the financial year, and revise them as appropriate.
- 1.3 The Treasury Management Code requires the Council to determine an annual TM Strategy and as a minimum, formally report on their treasury activities and arrangements mid-year and after the year-end. This report covers
  - an economic update for the first six months of 2019-2020;
  - a review of the Treasury Management Strategy Statement 2019-2020,
  - a review of the Council's investment and borrowing in 2019-2020; and
  - a review of compliance with treasury management indicators for 2019-2020

#### Recommendations

- 2.1 It is recommended that members
  - consider this report and approve the changes to the prudential indicators as detailed in the report.
  - note the treasury management activity for the period to 11<sup>th</sup> October 2019.

### **Background**

- 3.1 The key objectives of the Prudential Code are to ensure, within a clear framework, that:
  - Capital investment plans are affordable, prudent and sustainable;
  - Treasury management decisions are taken in accordance with good professional practice and in full understanding of the risks involved;
  - That these risks will be managed to an acceptable level to the organisation;
  - Capital investment plans are being made in light of the overall organisational strategy and resources, ensuring that decisions are being made with sufficient regard to the long run financial implications and potential risks to the authority.
- 3.2 To demonstrate that local authorities have fulfilled these objectives, the Prudential Code sets out the indicators that must be used and the factors that must be taken into account. The Code does not include suggested indicative limits or ratios. These are for the Council to set itself.
- 3.3 The prudential indicators required by the Code are designed to support and record local decision making. The system is specifically designed to support such local decision making in a manner that is publicly accountable. They are not designed to be comparative performance indicators.

### 4 <u>Capital Expenditure Indicators</u>

- 4.1 The Council has a duty to determine and keep under review the maximum amount which it can afford to allocate to capital expenditure.
- 4.2 The Council is required to make estimates of the capital expenditure it plans to incur for the forthcoming financial year and at least the following two years. Separate estimates should be made for Housing and Non Housing services. The Capital Investment Programmes for Housing and Non Housing Capital Investment Programme were approved by Council on the 28<sup>th</sup> February 2019, the resulting indicators were updated to reflect the approved programme incorporating the decisions taken by the council at the budget meeting.
- 4.3 Council approved the following as an indicator for capital expenditure:-

- 4.4 Total capital expenditure to 11<sup>th</sup> October 2019 is £39.111m, of which £23.544m relates to Non Housing and £15.567m relates to Housing.
- 4.5 A review of the updated capital spending plan for 2019/20 suggests that the indicators need to be revised as follows for the current year. Indicators for 2020/21 and 2021/22 will be reviewed in February 2020 alongside the budget proposals.

- 4.6 The net decrease of £6.419m in the planned Non Housing capital expenditure during 2019/20 is mainly attributable to the net effect of the following factors:
  - (i) The carry forward of programmed expenditure from 2018/19 totalling £7.596m.
  - (ii) The addition of £3.889m funding for projects approved during 2019/20.
  - (iii) The change in the cash flow profile of a number of programmes resulting in a net adjustment of £17.904m from 2019/20 into 2020/21 and future years as reported to relevant policy boards.
  - (iv) Reflection of anticipated under-spend on completing programmes.
- 4.7 The increase of £2.649m in the planned Housing capital expenditure during 2019/20 arises from the net effect of:-
  - (i) Expenditure brought forward from 2020/21 into 2019/20 as a result of an acceleration of planned programmes totalling £2.649m.

#### 5 CAPITAL FINANCING REQUIREMENT INDICATOR

- 5.1 Capital Financing Requirement: The Council has available to it a number of ways of financing traditionally procured capital investment. The term "financing" does not refer to the payment of cash, but the resources that are applied to ensure that any underlying amount arising from capital payments is dealt with absolutely, whether at the point of spend or over the longer term. A number of financing options involve resourcing the investment at the time that it is incurred. These are:
  - Application of useable capital receipts
  - · A direct charge to revenue for capital expenditure
  - · The application of capital grants
  - Up-front contributions from project partners
- 5.2 Capital expenditure which is not financed up front by one of the above methods will increase the Capital Financing Requirement of the Council.
- 5.3 Members approved the following as the indicator for the Capital Financing Requirement at the end of each of the next three years at the Council meeting on 28<sup>th</sup> February 2019:

- 5.5 The decrease of £11 million in the probable Capital Financing Requirement at 31st March 2020 in Non Housing services arises from a change in the estimated total financing requirement for City Deal expenditure by 31<sup>st</sup> March 2020 reprofiled into 2020/21 and also a revision of the debt smoothing strategy through accelerated loan fund repayments made in 2018-19.
- 5.6 The decrease of £4 million in the probable Capital Financing Requirement at 31<sup>st</sup> March 2020 in Housing services is a result of a revision of the debt smoothing strategy through accelerated loan fund repayments in 2018-19.

### 6 **EXTERNAL DEBT INDICATORS**

- 6.1 External debt is referred to as the sum of external borrowing and other long term liabilities (e.g. covenants). The prudential indicators for external debt are set and revised taking into account their affordability. It is through this means that the objective of ensuring that external debt is kept within sustainable prudent limits is addressed year on year.
- 6.2 External debt indicators are set at two levels: an *operational boundary* and an *authorised limit*. Both of these need to be consistent with the Council's plans for capital expenditure and financing and with its treasury management policy statement and practices.
- 6.3 Operational Boundary: This is the focus of day-to-day treasury management activity within the Council, and is an estimate of the most likely scenario in terms of cash flow. Risk analysis and risk management strategies have been taken into account; as have plans for capital expenditure, estimates of the Capital Financial Requirement and estimates of cashflow requirements for all purposes. It is possible that this boundary could be breached occasionally and this should not be regarded as significant. However, a sustained or regular trend would require investigation and action.
- 6.4 The Council has set for the current financial year and following two years an Operational Boundary for its total external debt, identifying separately borrowing from other long term liabilities.

The probable outturn for the current financial year is anticipated at £377 million, a decrease in the Operational Boundary of £15 million. This is mainly as a result of a combination of a lower borrowing requirement in 2019-20 and revised debt smoothing position as outlined in paragraphs 5.5 and 5.6 in relation to the Capital Financing Requirement. There have been no breaches during the period from 1st April to 11th October which have required action. The 2020/21 and 2021/22 operational boundary will be reviewed in February 2020 alongside the budget proposals.

- 6.6 Authorised Limit: This is based on the same assumptions as the Operational Boundary, with sufficient "headroom" to allow for unusual/exceptional cash movements. Headroom of approximately 5% has been added to the Operational Boundary to arrive at an authorised limit which is sufficient to allow for cash flow management without breaching the limit.
- 6.7 The Council has set for the forthcoming financial year and following two years an Authorised Limit for its total external debt, but identifying separately borrowing from other long term liabilities.

6.8 The revised anticipated authorised limit for this financial year is projected at £392 million, a decrease of £16 million to the estimate and in line with the operational boundary reduction as outlined in 6.5. The authorised limit will be reviewed on an annual basis and any changes will require approval by Council.

In December 2018 the CIPFA/LASAAC Local Authority Accounting Board confirmed that from 1<sup>st</sup> April 2020 the CIPFA Code of Practice on Local Authority Accounting would be adopting the accounting standard IFRS 16 Leases. The practical effect of adopting IFRS 16 will be to require any contract the Council has signed which provides the right to rent or lease exclusive use of an asset, such as property or vehicles, to be recognised as an asset on the Council's balance sheet with a corresponding debt liability recognised at the present value of the future lease payments. This liability will be treated as additional borrowing, therefore, increasing the Capital Financing Requirement and other associated Prudential Indicators such as Operational Boundary, Authorised Limit and Revenue to Financing Cost ratios. A full review of all contracts that could be impacted by this is currently under way and will be factored into future Prudential Indicators once the full effect is known.

### 7 LOAN FUND ADVANCES

- 7.1 Loans fund accounting arrangements are governed by the provisions set in the Local Authority (Capital Finance and Accounting) (Scotland) Regulations 2016.
- 7.2 Repayment of loans fund advances are required to be made in line with the Scottish Government's statutory Guidance on Loans Fund Accounting.
- 7.3 The aim of prudent repayment is to ensure that the Council's net capital expenditure is financed over a period of years in which that expenditure is expected to provide a benefit and that the repayment each year is reasonably commensurate with the period and pattern of benefits. Housing and Non-Housing advances and associated annual repayments are identified separately.
- 7.4 Members approved the 2019/20 policy on loan fund repayments on the 28th February 2019. Statutory guidance requires the policy to be approved each year and the 2020/21 policy will be reviewed in February 2020 alongside the budget proposals.
- 7.5 The Council's current policy is as follows:

For pre-existing loans advances made up to 31st March 2016 and for forward capital expenditure plans made after 1 April 2016, the policy for the repayment of loan advances will be the Statutory Method (option 1), with loan fund advances being repaid by the annuity method.

The repayment of loan fund advances will therefore be equal to the annual amount determined in accordance with Schedule 3 of the Local Government (Scotland) Act 1975. The Council is permitted to use this option for a transition period only until 31st March 2021 at which time it must change its policy to use alternative approaches based on depreciation, asset life periods or a funding/income profile.

### 8 INDICATORS FOR AFFORDABILITY

- 8.1 A key measure of affordability is the incremental impact of investment decisions on the council tax or house rents. Estimates of the ratio of financing costs to net revenue stream provide an indication of how much of the Council's revenue is committed to the repayment of debt.
- 8.2 As reported to Council on 28th February 2019 the ratios for the next 3 years are shown in the table below:

### 9 Treasury Management Mid Year Review 2019/20

- 9.1 The following paragraphs outline a review of the economy over the first half of 2019-2020.
- 9.2 UK Consumer Price Inflation (CPIH) was 1.7% year/year in September 2019 unchanged from August 2019. This is below the Bank of England's target of 2%. The most recent labour market data for the three months to August 2019 show that the number of people in work decreased, the number of unemployed people increased and the number of people aged from 16 to 64 not working and not seeking or available to work increased across the period. The unemployment rate was 3.9%, lower than a year earlier (4.0%), but higher than the previous quarter (3.8%). The employment rate was 75.9%, higher than a year earlier (75.6%) but lower than the previous quarter (76.1%). Nominal wages increased by 3.8% for both total pay (including bonuses) and regular pay (excluding bonuses). Real wages excluding bonuses was estimated to be 2.0% and including bonuses was 1.9%.


- 9.3 The Quarterly National Accounts for Q2 GDP confirmed the UK economy contracted by 0.2% following the 0.5% gain in Q1 which was distorted by stockpiling ahead of Brexit. Only the services sector registered an increase in growth of 0.1%, with both production and construction falling and the former registering its largest drop since Q4 2012. Business investment fell by 0.4% (revised from -0.5% in the first estimate) as Brexit uncertainties impacted on business planning and decision-making.
- 9.4 Tensions continued between the US and China with no trade agreement in sight and both countries imposing further tariffs on each other's goods. The US Federal Reserve cut its target Federal Funds rates by 0.25% in September to a range of 1.75% 2%, a pre-emptive move to maintain economic growth amid escalating concerns over the trade war and a weaker economic environment leading to more pronounced global slowdown.
- 9.5 **Financial markets**: After rallying early in 2019, financial markets have been adopting a more risk-off approach in the following period as equities saw greater volatility and bonds rallied (prices up, yields down) in a flight to quality and anticipation of more monetary stimulus from central banks. The Dow Jones, FTSE 100 and FTSE 250 are broadly back at the same levels seen in March/April.
- 9.6 Gilt yields remained volatile over the period on the back of ongoing economic and political uncertainty. From a yield of 0.63% at the end of June, the 5-year benchmark gilt yield fell to 0.32% by the end of September. There were falls in the 10-year and 20-year gilts over the same period, with the former dropping from 0.83% to 0.55% and the latter falling from 1.35% to 0.88%. Recent activity in the bond markets and PWLB interest rates highlight that weaker economic growth remains a global risk.
- 9.7 HM Treasury implemented a significant change of policy for PWLB loans on 9
  October 2019. The margin applied to PWLB loan rates was increased by 1%
  from 80 basis points to 180 basis points. An increase of this scale will require the
  Council to consider carefully how this increase in rate will affect investment and
  borrowing decisions. HM Treasury is keen to ensure borrowing across local
  government is controlled and recently they have observed a clear correlation
  between the historically low PWLB rates and the high levels of borrowing
  undertaken in recent months. HM Treasury increased the overall statutory PWLB
  limit for local authority borrowing by £10bn to £95bn and they were fearful that at
  the current rate of borrowing, this could be exhausted in a few months. In order
  to control the demand for funds they have increased rates.
- 9.8 PWLB borrowing remains available to the Council with most rates at or below 3% and this is still low in absolute or historical terms. However, these levels are expensive when compared to the alternatives and other market rates. Short-term "local to local" funding is available at around Bank Rate, 0.75%, or lower, and long-term market alternatives are likely to be substantially cheaper than current PWLB rates. Given these savings, and the prospects of a potential improvement in PWLB margin over the short to medium term, the Council will examine

alternative sources of long-term funding if the need to borrow arises later in the financial year, however this is not currently anticipated.

9.9 **Credit background**: There were minimal credit rating changes during the period. Moody's upgraded The Co-operative Bank's long-term rating to B3 and Fitch upgraded Clydesdale Bank and Virgin Money to A-.

### 10 Outlook for the remainder of 2019/20

- 10.1 The global economy is entering a period of slower growth in response to political issues, primarily the trade policy stance of the US. The UK economy has displayed a marked slowdown in growth due to both Brexit uncertainty and the downturn in global activity. In response, global and UK interest rate expectations have eased dramatically.
- There appears no near-term resolution to the trade dispute between China and the US. Central bank actions and geopolitical risks will continue to produce significant volatility in financial markets, including bond markets.
- 10.3 Our treasury advisors, Arlingclose, expect Bank Rate to remain at 0.75% for the foreseeable future but there remains substantial risks to this forecast, dependant on Brexit outcomes and the evolution of the global economy. Arlingclose also expects gilt yields to remain low for the foreseeable future and judge the risks to be weighted to the downside and that volatility will continue to offer longer-term borrowing opportunities.



# 11 Review of the Treasury Management Strategy Statement 2019-2020 (incorporating annual investment strategy) as at 11th October 2019

- 11.1 The Treasury Management Strategy Statement for 2019-2020 was approved by Council on 28 February 2019. The Council's annual investment strategy, which is incorporated in the Treasury Management Strategy Statement, sets out the Council's investment priorities as follows:
  - · the security of capital and
  - the liquidity of its investments.
- The Council also aims to achieve the optimum returns on its investments commensurate with the proper levels of security and liquidity. Investments and borrowing during the first six months of the year have been in line with the strategy and there have been no changes to the policies set out in the Treasury Management Strategy Statement 2019-2020. The details in this report update the position in light of the updated economic position and budgetary changes already approved.

# 12 Review of borrowing and investments over the period 1 April 2019 to 11th October 2019

- 12.1 The Council's net borrowing position as at 11th October 2019 is shown in Appendix 1.
- During the period 1 April 2019 to 11th October 2019 the Council's total external borrowings have decreased by £1.9 million to £222.72 million, due to the scheduled repayments of PWLB debt.
- 12.3 During the period 1 April 2019 to 11th October 2019, temporary investments have increased from £153.69 million to £171.2 million. The increase in investments is after financing the £1.9 million of debt repayment and reflects:
  - the re-profiling of elements of the current capital programme;
  - the "front-loading" (that is, more income being received in the early part of the year) of revenue support grant income and non-domestic rates pool receipts.
- 12.4 The Director of Finance and Resources confirms that, during the period 1 April 2019 to 11th October 2019, the approved limits set out within the annual investment strategy sections of the Treasury Management Strategy Statement 2019-2020 were complied with. The Council only invested with institutions listed in the Council's approved lending list. Similarly, only permitted investment vehicles were used, mainly call accounts, fixed term deposits and money market funds.
- 12.5 In accordance with CIPFA's Treasury Management in the Public Services Code of Practice, it is the Council's priority to ensure security of capital and liquidity, and to obtain an appropriate level of return which is consistent with the Council's risk appetite.

The table below shows the average interest rate achieved by the Council on its temporary investments during the period 1 April 2019 to 11th October 2019. The table also shows for comparison the benchmark comparator, which is the average 7-day LIBID rate (uncompounded). (The 7-day LIBID rate is the London Interbank Bid Rate, being the rate at which a bank is willing to borrow from other banks, for borrowings of a maturity of seven days.)

### 12.7 **Debt rescheduling**

Debt rescheduling opportunities have been limited in the current economic climate and may be impacted by the increased margin applied by the PWLB as outlined at 9.7 above. It is not anticipated that this is likely to change over the short to medium term. However, in conjunction with the Council's treasury advisors, the service will remain alert to any opportunities which may arise.

#### 13 Review of compliance with treasury management indicators for 2019-2020

- During the period 1 April 2019 to 11th October 2019 the Council complied with the approved treasury management indicators as set out in the Treasury Management Strategy Statement 2019-2020. These indicators relate to:
  - interest rate exposures: the upper limit on the proportion of investments which are exposed to fixed interest rates and the upper limit on the proportion of investments which are exposed to variable interest rates;
  - the maturity structure of borrowing: the lower and upper limits on the proportion of investments which fall into each maturity band.
- In addition to the treasury management indicators referred to at 13.1, there are two prudential indicators (as set out in the Prudential Framework for Capital Finance 2016-2018 and Treasury Management Strategy Statement 2019-2020, approved by Council on 28 February 2019) which are of particular relevance to the Council's treasury management strategy:
  - operational boundary for external debt;
  - authorised limit for external debt.
- During the period 1 April 2019 to 11th October 2019 the Council operated within the operational boundary for external debt, and within the authorised limit for external debt. These indicators, along with the Council's actual external debt, are shown in Appendix 2.

**Heading:** Statutory Review of Polling Places and Polling Districts

### 1. Summary

- 1.1 In terms of the Representation of the People Act, 1983, as amended, local authorities are required to divide their area into polling districts for the purposes of parliamentary and other elections and to designate polling places for these polling districts and keep them under review.
- 1.2 The Electoral Registration and Administration Act 2013, further amended the Representation of the People Act 1983 by introducing a statutory duty for all polling districts and polling places to be reviewed by the end of January 2015 and at least every 5 years thereafter.
- 1.3 The current polling arrangements following the previous statutory review were approved by Council on 27 February 2014, for use in all elections thereafter in the period to the next review. However, the Boundary Commission's Fifth Electoral Review resulted in the creation of an additional Council Ward and consequent significant changes to the Council's Ward boundaries. A revised Polling Plan was therefore adopted by the Council on 15 December 2016.
- 1.4 In conducting the review, authorities must:
- (a) seek to ensure that all electors in the constituency have such reasonable facilities for voting as are practicable in the circumstances; and
- (b) seek to ensure that so far as is reasonable and practical, the polling places they are responsible for are accessible to all electors, including those who are disabled, and when considering the designation of a polling place, must have regard to the accessibility needs of persons with disabilities.

- 1.5 In that regard, a notice was published on 1 March 2019 giving details of the timetable for and scope of the review, and the consultation process and inviting comments on the current arrangements. In addition, notice was given to key groups, including councillors, Council departments, community councils, Renfrewshire Valuation Board, the local Disability Liaison Group and Capability Scotland for their interest.
- 1.6 A note of the comments received from the first phase of the consultation and the consideration which was given to them are attached as Appendix 6 to this report. Appendix 6 also set out alternative arrangements for two polling places that had become unavailable since the last review in 2015. These comments, together with the Returning Officer's response thereto, were considered at the meeting of Renfrewshire Council held on 26 September 2019. Council agreed the terms of a draft Polling Plan for further public consultation. A copy of that draft Plan is attached as appendix 7.
- 1.7 The draft Polling Plan was issued for consultation on 10 October 2019. A note of the comments received during this phase of the consultation process, and the consideration which has been given to them in preparing the new draft Polling Plan, are attached as Appendix 1.
- 1.8 Appendix 2 identifies local housing developments that might impact on polling arrangements over the five year period of the Plan.
- 1.9 Following the Scottish Local Government Boundary Review in 2015 there were a number of changes made to the previous polling plan to reflect new ward boundaries. This resulted in the creation of a number of new polling districts. As part of this review Council agreed at its meeting held on 26 September 2019 to rationalise the number of polling districts and to renumber as appropriate certain polling districts to make the numbering more consistent across the wards in which they fall. Appendix 3 sets out the details of these revisals.
- 1.10 The draft Polling Plan is attached as appendix 4, and maps of the Polling Districts are attached as appendix 5, for final approval.
- 1.11 It is a requirement that the Returning Officer shall comment on the proposals. The draft polling scheme presented here has been the subject of consultation with the Returning Officer who has endorsed the proposals.
- 1.12 At the meeting of Council held on 27 June 2019 a revised timetable for the review process was agreed and this is set out in paragraph 3.5 of this report.

#### Recommendations

- 2.1 Council is recommended:
- (a) to note the consideration given to the comments set out in Appendix 1 received as part of the second phase of the public consultation; and

(b) to approve the polling districts, polling places and polling stations as set out in the Appendices to this report for use in all elections and referenda from 31 January 2020 until the next review.

### 2. Background

- 3.1 The Representation of the People Act 1983 as amended by the Electoral Registration and Administration Act 2013, introduced a duty for all polling districts and polling places to be reviewed by the end of January 2015 and at least five yearly thereafter.
- 3.2 Here in Renfrewshire, the polling districts and polling places were last reviewed and approved by Council in December 2016.
- 3.3 Although the review is conducted on the basis of UK Parliamentary constituencies the proposed polling district boundaries and polling places shown in the appendices to this report also align with the Scottish Parliamentary constituency boundaries and accommodate council ward boundaries, thus avoiding the necessity for differing polling schemes for different types of election.
- 3.4 It should be noted that the Scottish Parliamentary constituency boundaries for Paisley, Renfrewshire North and West, and Renfrewshire South include parts of East Renfrewshire and Inverclyde Councils' areas. These Councils will review the polling districts and polling places for these areas as part of their own authorities' statutory reviews.
- 3.5 As a result of the European Election being held in May 2019, the timetable for the conduct of the review in Renfrewshire was revised as follows:

- 3.6 In accordance with the timetable, public notice was given in the week commencing 1 March of the Council's intention to undertake the review and inviting preliminary comments on the existing polling arrangements.
- 3.7 Public notice was given by advertisement in local libraries, the Council's website, and Council offices, and maps and documents showing the current polling arrangements were made available for public inspection.

- 3.8 In addition, individual notice was given to councillors, community councils, the local Disability Liaison Group and Capability Scotland, for their interest.
- 3.9 An inspection of polling places is carried out by officers during each election with regard to location, suitability of access and availability.
- 3.10 All polling places were found to be fully accessible by persons with disabilities either through existing permanent arrangements in place or enhanced by temporary ramping or additional signage where possible.
- 3.11 Arising from the preliminary consultation exercise, various comments were received. These comments, and the consideration which had been given to them, was reported to the meeting of Renfrewshire Council held on 26 September 2019. In addition, two polling places used under the previous Polling Plan were no longer available for use as polling places, namely the Church of the New Jerusalem (SP07) and the 7th Paisley Scout Hall (SP12). This is detailed in Appendix 6 to the report.
- 3.12 A second phase of consultation commenced on 10 October 2019 and concluded on 15 November 2019. Further comments were received and these are attached as Appendix 1 to this report together with the Returning Officer's response.
- 3.13 Appendix 1 to the report suggests one change to a polling place, Lylesland Church replacing Lochfield Primary School as the polling place for SP16. At its meeting held on 26 September 2019 Council noted a number of proposals for alternative polling places to Bridge of Weir, St Fillan's, Wallace and Barsail Primary Schools. Accordingly, agreeing the polling districts, polling places and polling stations as set out in the Appendices to this report would mean that five local primary schools would no longer be used as polling places.
- 3.14 Following the Scottish Local Government Boundary Review in 2015 an interim review of the polling plan was carried out. This resulted in a number of changes to the previous polling plan to reflect new ward boundaries involving the creation of a number of new polling districts. Council agreed at its meeting held on 26 September 2019 to rationalise the number of polling districts and to renumber as appropriate certain polling districts to make the numbering more consistent across the wards in which they fall. As an example, Ward 1 contains six polling districts; NN01 to NN05 and NN24. It is suggested that NN24 be renumbered as "NN06". This will then require renumbering of later polling districts. Polling districts SP02 and SP03 both lie in Ward 3 and were subdivided by the change in ward boundaries leaving both considerably smaller than previously. The voters in both polling districts fall in the same Westminster and Scottish Parliamentary constituencies and vote in the same polling place. Accordingly, both have been combined in to one larger polling district. Appendix 3 sets out the details of the proposed renumbering and rationalisation. It also details the changes recommended as a result of the final public consultation on the proposed Polling Plan.
- 3.15 As part of the interim review in 2016 a decision was taken to restrict the number of changes to voter arrangements to the minimum possible i.e. the vast majority of voters remained allocated to the same the polling places as previously even where they were now allocated to new wards. However, this did result in a small number of

anomalous voting arrangements. In particular, in Ward 5 voters in SP28 (the residents of Finglass Avenue, Glenshiel Avenue, Glenshira Avenue, Glengavin Way, Glenarklet Drive, Glencora Drive and Strathcarron Road) were allocated to vote at Lochfield Primary School which lies in Ward 6. These voters have now been allocated to Todholm Primary School. Accordingly, SP28 has been amalgamated with polling district SP17.

- 3.16 Since the last statutory review, there has been significant housing development in the Renfrewshire Council Area. Appendix 2 identifies local housing developments that might impact on polling arrangements. It is anticipated that most of these potential increases in the number of voters can be accommodated within existing polling arrangements. However, the development at Dargavel Village has resulted in a significant increase in the number of voters in polling district NN18, with significant further development of the site due to continue throughout the five year period of this Polling Plan. At the meeting of Renfrewshire Council held on 26 September, it was agreed that a new polling district "NN17" be created thereby removing the residents of Dargavel Village from NN18. It is suggested that the voters in the new polling district be allocated to Bishopton Community Centre until such time as the new primary school is built in Dargavel Village, at which time this will become the polling place.
- 3.17 In terms of the statutory review, the Returning Officer is required to comment on the proposals. Although the location of the proposed polling districts and polling places are the responsibility of the local authority, the number and location of the polling stations within the polling places is the responsibility of the Returning Officer. It is recommended by the Electoral Commission that the review process be undertaken in a joint manner in recognition of the fact that the Returning Officer is a distinct role independent from the local authority while the responsibility for conducting the review rests with the local authority. Accordingly, the proposals presented here represent the joint view of the officers and the Returning Officer.
- 3.18 Following approval of the proposals, further public notice will be given of the conclusion of the review and the final proposals adopted.
- 3.19 In conclusion therefore it is recommended that the polling districts, polling places and polling stations included in Appendices 4 and 5 to this report be approved for adoption and the comments received to date, and their disposal, be noted.
- 3.20 It should also be noted that, in seeking final approval of the polling arrangements it is proposed that the approval extends to the adoption of these arrangements for any election or referendum called from 31 January 2020 until the next review and, in accordance with normal practice, the Chief Executive has delegated to alter or amend any polling place if an approved place becomes unavailable or unviable, e.g. through fire or flood or otherwise.

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#### APPENDIX 1

Fordbank Parent	Fordbank	The Parent Council recognises that the
Council	Primary School (SS05)	school is the only polling place for the residents of Corseford. However, the school has been used as a polling place a number of times in recent years while neighbouring denominational schools have been kept open. This also causes financial hardship for local families particularly those on low incomes. Fordbank is also a behavioural support base, accommodating children with Additional Support Needs (ASN). The Parent Council suggests that the school closure has a particular detrimental on these pupils and contradicts Scottish Government commitments to improving mental health.
		The Parent Council intimates that the school closure will also impact on the wellbeing of their children in terms of 'Getting it Right for Every Child' (GIRFEC). Local children who live in poverty often rely on free school meals to remain healthy and some will lose an element of their statutory Physical Education hours, impacting on their ability to be active.
		The Parent Council has suggested (a) that Spateston Bowling Club instead be used as the polling place for SS05 or (b) as an alternative, St Anthony's Primary School be used on an alternating basis with Fordbank Primary School.

### **Evaluation**

Fordbank Primary School accommodates one polling station.

The use of a temporary building such as a portacabin, other alternative venues in the West Johnstone area and the possibility of keeping the school open during polling were all addressed in the report to Council on 26 September 2019 following the first phase of consultation. Spateston Bowling Club was not included in previous considerations.

In terms of the Representation of the People Act 1983 a polling place for any polling district shall be an area in that district, except where special circumstances make it desirable to designate an area wholly or partly outside the polling district.

Taking this into account, whilst the single polling station could be accommodated within the Spateston Bowling Club, such a relocation would result in increased travelling distance for the majority of the voters who use it, namely those who reside in the Corseford area of Johnstone and would not be within a reasonable walking distance. Accordingly, and while sympathising with the Parent Council's concerns, this does not meet the test that special circumstances exist.

With regards to the suggestion that the Polling Place be alternated between St Anthony's Primary School and Fordbank Primary School, St Anthony's Primary School lies within another polling district and is further away from the majority of voters than Spateston Bowling Club. In any event, such an arrangement would be likely to create voter confusion.

### Recommendation

That Fordbank Primary School continue to be used as a polling place for Polling District SS05.

Respondent(s) Polling Place	Suggestion/Comment
Councillor James MacLaren  New Polling District - Dargavel	Councillor James MacLaren initially conveyed the views of Bishopton Community Council which had expressed concern about the new Dargavel Primary School being used as a polling place. The Community Council agreed that the Bishopton Community Centre was a far more suitable venue for this. Community Council members felt that the two buildings were quite close to each other and the closure of the school at election times put unnecessary pressure on working parents.  Taking into account existing capacity issues at Bishopton Community Centre, Councillor MacLaren has further suggested the use of the Cornerstone Centre as an alternative polling place to the new primary school.

### **Evaluation**

The development at Dargavel Village has resulted in a significant increase in the number of voters in polling district NN18. At the meeting of Renfrewshire Council held on 26 September 2019 it was therefore agreed that a new polling district "NN17" be created thereby removing the residents of Dargavel Village from NN18.

While it is suggested that the voters in the new polling district (NN17) be allocated to Bishopton Community Centre this will only be until such time as the new primary school is built in Dargavel Village.

Given the number of properties to be built in Dargavel Village in the period to the next statutory review, the voters in the new NN17 and existing NN18 will not be capable of being accommodated at Bishopton Community Centre. The number of polling stations located at the Community Centre has increased from six to seven for the forthcoming UK Parliamentary General Election and all seven of these stations are either close to, or exceed, the recommended maximum of 800 voters to a ballot box.

Accordingly, even excluding further development at Dargavel, Bishopton Community Centre is already at capacity and will exceed it when conducting any election at which 16 & 17 year olds can vote (such as the Scottish Parliament elections in 2021).

Information provided from Communities, Housing and Planning indicates that that the total number of homes completed and occupied at Dargavel Village, as at 12 August 2019, was 1,190. The total number of anticipated homes to be built at the site over the entire period of its development is 4,000.

The Cornerstone Centre is a converted building, located within Polling District NN18, with lower and upper halls, either of which could accommodate at least two polling stations. The upper hall is accessed by a lift. Given its location, using the Centre as a polling station would require both Bishopton Village and Dargavel Village to be split between the Cornerstone Centre and the Community Centre.

To assist the Returning Officer in delivering a successful election it is important that as many barriers as possible to voting have been removed. Distance from home to a polling station is one such barrier. Furthermore, in terms of the Representation of the People Act 1983 a polling place for any polling district shall be an area in that district, except where special circumstances make it desirable to designate an area wholly or partly outside the polling district. The relocation of NN17 this does not meet the test that special circumstances exist.

The new Dargavel Primary School will be the one public building within the emerging community at Dargavel and will be within walking distance of all areas of the new development.

The ability of the school to remain open during polling is a matter which will be considered once construction of that building has been completed.

### Recommendation

That the decision of Council at its meeting held on 26 September 2019 to create a new polling district "NN17" at Dargavel Village be noted, and that voters in that district be allocated to Dargavel Primary School once it is available for use.

### **Evaluation**

Issues relating to the use of Williamsburgh Primary School were included in the report considered by Council on 26 September 2019.

Williamsburgh Primary School accommodates eight polling stations, more than any other polling place in Renfrewshire and with a combined population of voters and attainers of 6,675 as of May 2019.

The largest single non-educational establishment in the polling area is the Lagoon Leisure Centre. While the Lagoon Leisure Centre would meet the requirements for use as a Polling Place, it is used extensively on polling days for elections. The main sports arena accommodates the counting of ballot papers, unused ballot papers are counted in the sports hall and postal votes are dealt with in one of the fitness suites. Accordingly, it is not recommended for use as a polling place.

St Andrew's Academy is not within easy walking distance of Williamsburgh Primary School. Given that electoral events are traditionally held in May and to avoid disruption during exam times, the P.E. area in the Academy is effectively isolated from the rest of the school and two polling stations are located in the small P.E. classroom. There is no facility to accommodate an additional eight additional polling stations without closing the school on polling days. This could lead to significant disruption during examination periods.

Similarly, there would be no facility within Paisley Grammar School to accommodate eight polling stations without disruption to the wider school, particularly during examination periods.

Both Williamsburgh and St John Ogilvie Primary Schools were used as polling places for the area until a fire closed St John Ogilvy Primary School on the eve of the 2009 European Election. At that time the school accommodated 2,000 voters. The voters at that time were diverted to Williamsburgh Primary School and it became apparent that Williamsburgh Primary School could accommodate all eight polling stations, thereby removing the need for both primary schools to close during polling.

The suggestions to arrange school trips and other activities when the school is being used for electoral purposes or for school holidays to be shortened by one day when elections have taken place that year are educational matters and outwith the remit of the Returning Officer.

### **Recommendation**

That Williamsburgh Primary School continues to be used as polling place.

#### **Evaluation**

Lochfield Primary School currently accommodates four polling stations and the school requires to be closed when used as a polling place. In terms of the revised polling district numbers agreed by Council at its meeting held on 26 September 2019, polling district SP28 will be allocated to Todholm Primary School thereby reducing the number of voters allocated to Lochfield Primary.

Hunterhill Community Centre is not within an acceptable walking distance of the SP16 Polling District. However, Lylesland Church is within easy walking distance of the current polling place at Lochfield Primary School.

The church has been inspected and found to have sufficient space to accommodate four polling stations. The church hall has adequate disabled access, ample parking provision and good kitchen facilities for staff. The response from Ms McDougall was received at the very conclusion of the consultation process. While the church has agreed in principle to accommodate future elections, this needs to be ratified by a full session meeting of church members.

### **Recommendation**

That, Lylesland Church be used as a polling place for current Polling District SP16 subject to the agreement of the next church session meeting, failing which, Lochfield Primary School should remain as the polling place.

David Macdonald National Parents	All – general comments regarding the use of schools as polling places.	Mr Macdonald acknowledged the work carried out by Renfrewshire Council Democratic Services to alleviate the impact on school pupils, their parents and carers whose schools are utilised for local and national elections as polling stations.

He recognised that a balance required to be struck between the democratic process and the availability of local buildings for polling places, as well as the significant impact of parents/carers requiring to establish childcare arrangements on polling days coupled with the disruption to school life both from parental and educational perspectives.

Mr Macdonald has requested that Renfrewshire Council consider a policy of amending school 'in service' days to reflect the established calendar of polling days (i.e. the first Thursday in May) which routinely are always used for local and national elections.

Mr Macdonald suggests that arrangements to align 'in service' days with polling days has been established by Glasgow City Council. He advises that this has made a difference in limiting the impact on children's education and the impact on child care for families and carers across our communities, whilst ensuring that polling places remain accessible and local for democratic processes.

### **Evaluation**

Mr Macdonald's recognition of the Council's efforts to reduce the number of schools used as polling stations is welcomed.

The suggestion that school in service days be aligned with polling days is well made but falls outwith the remit of the Returning Officer.

### Recommendation

That Mr Macdonald's comments be noted.

Communities, Housing & Planning Services were consulted to identify planned developments which might impact on polling arrangements.

New dwellings may not necessarily result in a significant increase in electors as the majority of new dwelling sales go to people already resident in Renfrewshire. These changes should also be viewed in the context of the National Records of Scotland population projections which suggest an overall population growth for Renfrewshire of 2.1% over the next ten years.

Against this backdrop, 11 wards have been identified which may experience high levels of new house building over the five year period of this review.

These wards, the number of new dwellings, and the estimated increases in electors are as follows:

Cargill Hall currently accommodates three polling stations.

In terms of available space, the Cargill Hall could easily accommodate at least one additional polling station and further polling stations by utilising the Lesser Hall. In terms of location, moving all voters to the Cargill Hall will mean that voters in the North of the village who currently vote at the Primary School will have further to travel.

#### **Recommendation**

That Bridge of Weir Primary School be no longer used as a polling place and that, instead, a fourth polling station (NN16) be located at the Cargill Hall.

#### **Evaluation**

St Fillan's Primary School is one of the largest polling places in Renfrewshire area, accommodating six polling stations and requiring the use of the gym and four classrooms. The school is closed to accommodate electoral events.

Both the Carrick Centre and Houston and Killellan Kirk Halls have been inspected and assessed. Both venues could potentially accommodate the required number of polling stations and both had suitable disabled access, parking facilities and adequate space for signage.

While the Carrick Centre would be able to accommodate six polling stations, this would involve utilising at least three rooms in the centre and could create issues for some voters in respect of understanding the layout and where to vote. The Houston and Killellan Kirk Halls could easily accommodate the six stations between the two main spaces in the building.

#### **Recommendation**

That the six polling stations located at St Fillan's Primary School be relocated to the Houston and Killellan Kirk Halls.

Wallace Primary School accommodates five polling stations, four in the gym hall and one in a classroom. The school is closed for elections.

Elderslie Village Hall is managed by Renfrewshire Leisure Limited. The Hall has been inspected and assessed. It is suitable in terms of accommodation size, disabled access and car parking.

A similar proposal to change the polling place from Wallace Primary School to Elderslie Village Hall was considered by Council as part of the last review in 2014. At that time the view of the Council was that Wallace Primary School had been used for a number of years as a polling place and was more centrally located within the Polling District and accordingly no change was made.

#### **Recommendation**

#### **Evaluation**

Barsail Primary School accommodates three polling stations. The school closes for elections.

A number of the locations suggested by the Parent Council have been considered and are not suitable for use as a polling place for NN21 as they are located outwith the Polling District. They are not within easy walking or travelling distance for voters reliant on public transport. These are: Erskine Library, Erskine Sport Centre, Park Mains High School Sports Hall, Salvation Army Hall, Bargarran Community

Centre, Masonic Hall, Inchinnan, Erskine Bowling Club and the Old Farmhouse Community Centre and Innchinan Bowling Club.

While St Bernadette's Church Hall is also located outwith NN21, it has been inspected and assessed as it lies close to the edge of the Polling District and could be considered to be within reasonable travelling distance. However, is not large enough to accommodate the three stations located at Barsail Primary School. Further, the Church Hall is located next to St Anne's Primary School which is the polling place for NN22. Two polling places in such close proximity could cause voter confusion.

Erskine Baptist Church has been inspected and assessed. The Baptist Church has adequate space to accommodate three polling stations, has suitable disabled access and has a number of parking spaces. While the Church is not central to the NN21 Polling District, it is within walking distance of Barsail Primary School, the current polling place.

#### Recommendation

That Polling District NN21 be relocated from Barsail Primary School to Erskine Baptist Church.

#### **Evaluation**

Bargarran Primary School has been used as a polling place for a number of years. The Primary School accommodated five polling stations and was closed on election days. More recently, the school has been rebuilt and now forms part of a collocated campus that it shares with St John Bosco Primary School.

Prior to the 2019 European Election the new Bargarran Primary School was inspected and assessed to confirm if the premises remained suitable for use as a polling place and in particular whether it provided the required disabled access and was large enough to accommodate the required five polling stations. Having done so it was confirmed that the school remained a suitable location.

Consideration was then given as to whether both schools would require to close in order that the building could be used as a polling place. Children's Services position is that, where a school is used as a polling place, consideration should be given as to whether a school can be used in such a way as to allow the school in question to remain open and cause the least possible disruption to the pupils and their parents. Accordingly, other schools in Renfrewshire are used as polling places while remaining open to pupils. These arrangements have operated successfully for a number of years.

Having assessed the school, it was noted that strict segregation could be maintained between the voting area located in the school dining hall and the rest of the school. This allowed the possibility of keeping the school open to pupils on polling day.

The matter was discussed with Children's Services. Having consulted the Acting Director of Children's Services and the Head of Schools, they wished to follow the model adopted at other schools and keep both Bargarran and St John Bosco open to pupils.

Accordingly, both schools were kept open to pupils on 23 May.

An inspection and assessment has been made of Bargarran Community Centre to assess its possible use as an alternative polling place. While the Community Centre is located in close proximity to the current polling place at Bargarran Primary School, the main hall would not accommodate the required five polling stations. At least one of the five polling stations would require to be located elsewhere in the building. A further issue is that the central access to the main hall is shared with the GP surgery and given that Polling Agents and tellers are allowed in the polling place, they would be in that area. As there is no way to segregate the communal entrance through the use of screens patients attending the surgery would have to pass these campaigners. Accordingly, it is not recommended that the Community Centre be used as a polling place.

## **Recommendation**

That Bargarran Primary School continues to be used as a polling place and in such a way that the both primary schools remain open to pupils during polling.

#### **Evaluation**

Williamsburgh Primary School accommodates eight polling stations, more than any other polling place in Renfrewshire and with a combined population of voters and attainers of 6,675 as of May 2019.

The largest single non-educational establishment in the polling area is the Lagoon Leisure Centre. While the Lagoon Leisure Centre would meet the requirements for use as a Polling Place, it is used extensively on polling days for elections. The

main sports arena accommodates the counting of ballot papers, unused ballot papers are counted in the sports hall and postal votes are dealt with in one of the fitness suites. Accordingly, it could not be used as a polling place.

While there are a number of smaller halls in the area covered by the Williamsburgh Primary School, other than the Lagoon or one of the other schools in the area, there is no other location which could accommodate the eight polling stations currently located there. For example, while Sherwood Greenlaw Church could be used as a polling place, this venue would only accommodate two polling stations. Other premises would require to be identified and evaluated. This would however mean that the eight polling stations at Williamsburgh would be divided between various locations in the area. This is likely to lead to voter confusion.

Ms Dowds asked why other schools in the area could not be used. St. John Ogilvie Primary School was used as a polling place in the past in addition to Williamsburgh. Whilst there is no reason why St. John Ogilvie Primary School could not be used as an alternative in terms of infrastructure requirements, the ongoing use of Williamsburgh Primary School provides continuity and reduces the risk of voter confusion.

## Recommendation

That Williamsburgh Primary School continue to be used as polling place.

#### **Evaluation**

Johnstone High Parish Church accommodates two polling stations. The Church Hall was agreed as a polling place when the former Johnstone Town Hall was demolished and the current Town Hall building was constructed.

Having been inspected and evaluated, three different areas were identified within the new Town Hall which could accommodate the two polling stations:- the marriage suite; the main hall; and the combined meeting rooms 1 and 2. All these locations are on the ground floor of the new Town Hall building. While car parking tends to be very much in demand in the Town Hall area, additional spaces could be marked off for blue badge holders at the front of the Town Hall.

#### **Evaluation**

Fordbank Primary School accommodates one polling station.

A temporary building such as a portacabin is not generally recommended for use as a polling place. It creates substantial risks as to electoral process; it may not be possible to source a temporary structure at short notice for snap elections, and it would require the use of portable generators to provide adequate heat and light for voters and staff.

In terms of alternative venues, the Johnstone Community Sports Hub building is within reasonable walking distance of Fordbank School but is outwith the Corseford area. Whilst the polling station could be accommodated easily within the sports hub, such a relocation would result in increased travelling distance for the majority of the voters who use it.

Having been inspected, the layout of the school is such that it was not considered possible to allow the school to remain open during voting.

#### Recommendation

That Fordbank Primary School continue to be used as a polling place for Polling District SS05.

# 1. Summary

- 1.1 This report provides a summary of the Scottish Household Survey (SHS) results for Renfrewshire, as agreed at the Council meeting on 26 September 2019.
- 1.2 The Scottish Household Survey is a continuous survey based on a sample of 10,500 responses from private residences across Scotland. The survey represents a core element of the Scottish Government's approach to population surveys and the gathering of population data in Scotland, and contributes to range of national datasets including the National Performance Framework. In terms of local authority level data, it is also used as a source of data for the Local Government Benchmarking Framework.
- 1.3 The survey gathers information on a range of information including travel and transport, education, demographic data, household composition, housing condition, views on public services and neighbourhood and community topics.
- 1.4 The 2018 annual report on the survey was published by the Scottish Government in September 2019, highlighting a number of findings regarding satisfaction with public services such as schools, healthcare and public transport. In October 2019, the Scottish Government published local authority level data from the Scottish Household Survey.

- 1.5 In 2018, 240 responses were recorded in Renfrewshire as part of the overall sample. This in relative terms is a very small sample size compared to some of the Council's existing survey mechanisms such as the Public Services Panel, where the response levels have typically been in the region of 1000 respondents.
- 1.6 This report seeks to provide a summary of the headline results for Renfrewshire, focusing on those areas raised at the Council meeting in September 2019 around satisfaction with public services including health, transport and education services.
- 1.6 Given both the limited sample size and the breadth of data which is available across the whole survey, it is recommended that a further, more detailed briefing is offered to elected members as part of the ongoing member development programme in order to facilitate the provision of a more comprehensive analysis.

#### 2. Recommendations

#### 2.1 Council is asked to:

- note the content of this report as requested at the Council meeting on 26 September; and
- note that detailed briefings on the Scottish Household Survey at a national and Renfrewshire level, will be offered to all elected members as part of the ongoing development programme for members.

#### 3. Background

3.1 The Scottish Household Survey (SHS) is a continuous survey based on a random sample of the population in private residencies in Scotland. It is Scotland's largest random pre-selected survey and is at the centre of Scotland's evidence-based approach to policy-making.

#### The Scottish Household Survey is:

- a face-to-face survey of a sample of people in private residences in Scotland
- interviewer-administered in people's homes
- voluntary
- Scotland-wide; it covers all 32 local authorities
- three surveys in one: Transport and Travel in Scotland Survey, the Scottish House Condition Survey as well as the Scottish Household Survey
- long-running since 1999
- wide-ranging in topics covered, including evidence on the physical condition of Scotland's homes
- a provider of robust evidence on the composition, characteristics, attitudes and behaviour of private households and individuals
- 9,700 adults took part in the SHS 2018, of those 240 were from Renfrewshire. While this can give a good indication of public opinion on the various topics covered in the survey, the results may vary from the opinions of the wider population due to the relatively small sample size.
- 3.3 The data from the SHS is used across a range of different organisations to gain insight across the key themes, informing decisions and policy development. SHS data is used by the Improvement Service for the Local Government Benchmarking Framework to understand and improve local needs and circumstances and is also a key contributor to the Scottish Government's National Performance Framework.
- 3.4 The SHS is a very detailed survey which covers a vast range of themes as well as the composition, characteristics and attitudes of households. The themes surveyed include housing, neighbourhoods and communities, economic activity, finance, internet, physical activity and sport, local services, environment, volunteering, culture and heritage and childcare.
- 3.5 There is a complex methodology used to ensure the findings are robust and reflect the wider population of Scotland but are also not overly burdensome on the participants, for example, not all households are asked the same questions at the same frequency. The survey also provides a base from which to commission more detailed follow-up surveys of sub-samples of the households in the survey.
- 3.6 The data from the SHS can be examined in many different ways, and when viewed at a local level in order to provide context and comparisons, this can result in quite a complex and lengthy output of data to digest. It is recommended that further data and analysis on the SHS findings is provided to elected members through the member development programme.
- 3.7 Some headline findings for Scotland in 2018 across the themes:
  - Nine out of ten households reported that they were very or fairly satisfied with their housing

- One in five adults reported that they had experienced loneliness with the last week
- 55% of households reported they managed well financially
- Home internet access reached an all time high of 87% of households
- 80% of adults had taken part in physical activity or sport in the previous four weeks
- 52% of adults were satisfied with the three local services (local health, schools and public transport)
- Four out of five adults felt they can't influence decisions affecting their local area
- Two thirds of adults viewed climate change as an immediate and urgent problem
- 48% of adults volunteered (formal and informal) in the last 12 months
- 90% of adults were culturally engaged in 2018
- 72% of households with children aged two to five years old said that they did not find it difficult to afford childcare
- 3.8 For the purposes of this report, the focus is on the key results in Renfrewshire as discussed at the Council meeting in September 2019 satisfaction with public services, in particular schools, healthcare and public transport.
- 3.9 More detailed data on these areas can be found in section 4 below and in Appendix 1. An infographic showing other notable areas of interest for Renfrewshire is provided in Appendix 2.

#### 4. Local Services and performance - Scotland

- 4.1 The survey asks a range of questions about satisfaction with local services, with a focus on local health services, schools and public transport. Combined satisfaction with all three is 52%, down from a peak of 66% in 2011, mainly due to a decrease in satisfaction with local schools.
- 4.2 Adults living in urban areas were more satisfied with the quality of the three public services than those in rural areas, which is mainly due to greater satisfaction with public transport in urban areas.
- 4.3 Eight out of ten respondents across Scotland were satisfied with local health services, regardless of whether they used the service or not.

## 5. Local services and performance - Renfrewshire

- 5.1 Percentage of people very or fairly satisfied with the quality of public services delivered (local health services, local schools and public transport).
- 5.1.1 Satisfaction was higher in Renfrewshire was than it was in Scotland for local health services and local schools. Satisfaction with local transport was in line with the Scottish findings, however Renfrewshire has previously demonstrated higher level of satisfaction than the Scottish average. The percentage satisfied with all three services was also higher in Renfrewshire than Scotland in 2018.
- 5.1.2 Although Renfrewshire demonstrated higher levels of satisfaction with local services than Scotland, satisfaction has declined in 3 out of 4 measures. Local schools are the only area that have seen an improvement on the 2017 survey responses. In Scotland satisfaction with local health services and public transport has declined, satisfaction with local school has increased and the percentage satisfied with all three has stayed the same.

Chart 1: Percentage of people very or fairly satisfied with the quality of public services, by year





Chart 2: Percentage of people very or fairly satisfied with the quality of public services, Scotland 2018

# 5.2 Percentage agreeing with various statements about local authority services and performance.

- 5.2.1 In 2018, the proportion of Renfrewshire respondents who agreed with various statements about local authority services and performance was, for the most part, in line with the Scottish results.
- 5.2.2 The only statement that differed significantly from the Scottish findings was 'good at communicating performance' which has been rated higher in Renfrewshire for the past nine years.

5.2.3 Due to the small sample size at a local level it isn't possible to segment this information for Renfrewshire further by locality, age etc.

# 5.3 Percentage of people who agree with the statement 'I can influence decisions affecting my local area.

- 5.3.1 The proportion of respondents who agreed with the statement 'I can influence decisions affecting my local area' has been roughly the same for Renfrewshire and Scotland for the last five years sitting at around 20%.
- 5.3.2 Within Renfrewshire's Community Plan, there is an indicator to measure perceptions of influence locally which is measured via Renfrewshire's Public Services Panel (and therefore a larger sample size). This was last measured for 2016/17 and at 24% was higher than the Scottish average.

#### 6. Other satisfaction measures

- 6.1 Renfrewshire Council services monitor and benchmark service satisfaction against a range of indicators, such as those contained in Local Government Benchmarking Framework. Analysis of the Council's performance against these indicators is submitted to and scrutinised by the Audit Risk and Scrutiny Board on an annual basis.
- 6.2 The last update report considered by the board on 18 March 2019, noted a broadly positive position for the Council with 51 out of 70 available indicators improving or maintaining performance in 2017/18. The report noted that the Council is also performing at a level above the national trend for several customer satisfaction indicators in some areas, with increases in customer satisfaction relating to libraries, museums and street cleaning.

- 6.3 At a local level, Renfrewshire's schools collate satisfaction data which broadly indicates a high level of satisfaction. For example, as part of the recent Attainment Challenge inspection a survey of parents was carried out, with parental satisfaction with local schools rated at 91%.
- Officers are currently refreshing Renfrewshire's Public Services Panel, which involves in the region of 2000 local people. The panel members are asked to rate their satisfaction with services and with their community. At times the number of respondents in the Scottish Household Survey may only be in the region of 200-300, whereas each panel survey typically receives about 1000 responses, therefore providing a more robust sample. The panel has been retendered, is being refreshed and a survey will be distributed before the end of the financial year.



The proposal is that Councillor Audrey Doig replaces Councillor Steel on the joint committee.
