Recording of Meeting

Prior to the commencement of the meeting, the Chair intimated that this meeting of the Local Partnership would be recorded and that the recording would be available on the Council's website.

Declarations of Interest

There were no declarations of interest intimated prior to commencement of the meeting.

1. Minute of Previous Meeting

There was submitted the Minute of the meeting of the Local Partnership held on 15 June 2021.

DECIDED: That the Minute be approved.

2. **#YOUDECIDE**

G Hannah delivered a presentation relative to #YouDecide, a participatory budgeting exercise that gave communities a key role in deciding their priorities for environmental and physical infrastructure improvements to be undertaken throughout Renfrewshire over the next three years via a Community Investment Fund of £1.2m.

The presentation explained the #YouDecide concept and highlighted the marketing and promotional work already undertaken as a first phase to encourage communities, groups and individuals to submit their ideas for environmental improvements. A video was shown, featuring local groups and individuals, which explained how to get involved and inspired the submission of ideas. As a result of engagement initiatives, over 2700 proposals/ideals had been submitted, with over 330 ideas/proposals for improvements for the Paisley North, West & Central area.

The second phase of #YouDecide was underway and would conclude at the end of January 2022 with a shortlist of projects that were suitable and feasible having undergone technical assessment against set criteria. During the third and final phase of #YouDecide communities would be invited to vote on which shortlisted project they wished to see proceed. It was anticipated that the winning projects would be announced in early March 2022.

<u>DECIDED</u>: That the presentation be noted.

3. COMMUNITIES MENTAL HEALTH & WELLBEING FUND

There was submitted a presentation by I Cunningham, Engage Renfrewshire, relative to the national Communities Mental Health & Wellbeing Fund (the Fund). The Fund aimed to promote and develop good mental health and wellbeing and to protect against the impact of distress and mental ill health in adults.

Engage Renfrewshire announced that Renfrewshire had secured an award of £509,542 from the Fund and small "grass roots" community groups and organisations with a strong community focus could apply for funding towards projects that tackled issues such as: suicide prevention; social isolation; loneliness prevention and early intervention; and/or addressed any mental health inequalities exacerbated by the pandemic and the needs of a range of "at risk" groups locally.

I Cunningham advised that applications were now live on Engage Renfrewshire's website and the deadline for applications was 7 January 2022. It was noted that the funds required to be allocated by end of March 2022. Multiple applications would be accepted provided that there were submitted for different projects.

DECIDED:

4. PAISLEY NORTH WEST AND CENTRAL LOCAL PRIORITIES WORKSHOP

There was submitted a report by the Chief Executive relative to Paisley North West and Central local priorities.

The report advised that the Local Partnership had previously agreed a set of local priorities for the area on which it wished to see progress made. Details of the four priorities were outlined in an appendix to the report. The Partnership Planning and Development Manager invited the Partnership to discuss specific points under each of the priorities in a workshop format.

Issues raised included providing information to local groups, Community Councils etc. when redundant council assets became available; difficulties experienced by local charitable organisations in accessing a secure, sustainable funding base and premises to enable them to carry out the aims of their constitutions; community wealth building; the possibility of groups which were delivering successful projects supporting and mentoring newer groups; accessing the Community Health & Wellbeing fund; and an outdoor sports facility for the racecourse area at St James' Park.

Following discussion, the Partnership Planning and Development Manager undertook to submit a report to the next meeting of the Partnership formalising the ideas and comments submitted.

DECIDED:

- (a) That the Partnership Planning and Development Manager undertook to submit a report to the next meeting of the Partnership formalising the ideas and comments submitted; and
- (b) That the report be otherwise noted.

5. PAISLEY NORTH, CENTRAL AND WEST LOCAL PARTNERSHIP BUDGET MONITORING REPORT

There was submitted a report by the Chief Executive relative to the status of the budget allocated to this Partnership for disbursement to local voluntary groups and

organisations from the General Fund and Celebrating Renfrewshire. A table setting out the funds allocated by Paisley North, West and Central Local Partnership at its meeting on 15 June was appended to the report, together with details of funds allocated through the 2021 Celebrating Renfrewshire exercise to projects focussed on young people aged 12-25.

Applications for Local Partnership Funding To Paisley North West and Central Local Partnership 2022/23

1. Summary

- 1.1 Applications for grant funding from the seven Local Partnership areas were invited to be submitted during March and April 2022, to be considered at the Local Partnership meetings due to be held in June 2022.
- 1.2 The available allocation for Paisley North West and Central Local Partnership for 2022/23 is £56,202 made up of £45,822 from the General Fund and £10,380 from Paisley Common Good Fund.
- 1.3 From this total budget, a sum of £50 per community representative requires to be ringfenced for potential claim of expenses. These expenses are deducted from the available allocation for the Local Partnership. Paisley North West and Central Local Partnership has space for ten community members, so the total ringfenced for expenses is £500. The total budget available for allocation by Paisley North, West and Central Local Partnership is therefore £55,702.
- 1.4 The Youth Challenge Fund component of Paisley North West and Central Local Partnership Funding for 2022/23 is £21,133. This funding will be allocated by young people through a Participatory Budgeting exercise that will take place during autumn 2022.

2. Recommendations

2.1 It is recommended that members of Paisley North West and Central Local Partnership consider the applications for Local Partnership grant funding, as set out below in Appendix 1 and 2.

3. Background

- 3.1 Applicants for funding in 2022/23 have been provided with guidance, as well as a description of the Local Priorities identified by Paisley North West and Central Local Partnership.
- 3.2 Local Partnership members are asked to consider the applications for funding summarised at Appendix 1 and 2 of this report, and to assess these against the Local Priorities agreed by Paisley North West and Central.
- 3.3 An initial assessment has been carried out by officers to support Local Partnership members in their decision-making. Where applications have made clear reference to the Local Priorities identified by the Local Partnership, this is identified in the first table at Appendix 1. Applications that make a partial or no reference to Paisley North West and Central Local Priorities are summarised in the second table for example, the project may tackle social isolation (and therefore meet the Local Priority around social isolation) but not deliver this directly in the Local Partnership area or make reference to how many people from the area would be engaged in the project.
- 3.4 The priorities of Paisley North West and Central Local Partnership are:

Community Empowerment

The Local Partnership want more people to get involved in their community. They want to activate new community groups, and explore the sustainability of the local groups that already exist. This includes succession planning for groups and exploring the availability and sustainability of funding for groups in the area.

Tackling social isolation to promote health

The Local Partnership want to help connect people to each other and see this as key to promoting health and wellbeing in the area. They think a key barrier is people being able to physically get to Paisley town centre to access services and groups.

Green spaces

The Local Partnership want to see the development and maintenance of high-quality green spaces in the area, and the use of these spaces to promote physical and mental health. They particularly want address safety and lighting in order to safely access these spaces at night.

Community safety

The Local Partnership want to help people to feel safe in their community. This includes being able to move around the area safely, by tackling issues with pavements and pathways, dog fouling and litter. They also think it is important that there are activities available for young people to avoid them becoming involved in anti-social behaviour and crime.

Purpose of the project

An autumn programme of FREE Creative Learning workshops to develop the creativity and skills of community participants. To encourage people to be more open minded, inquisitive, to harness imagination, identify & solve problems, & develop creative approaches to learning. To engage people in new social activity that boosts that their mental health and well-being and aids positive engagement with other people. The Workshops will be delivered by professional artists in a dedicated gallery setting in the Paisley Centre.

We have been running a successful series workshop since Feb/Mar, Jul/Aug & Oct/Nov 2021 and again in Feb/Mar 2022. These four-hour FREE workshops have been running at least twice weekly and have been fully booked by mainly local participants. They cover painting, drawing, print making, pottery, film, photography, animation, and mixed media. Participants were given FREE art materials to overcome any financial barriers to participation. We advertise the events via Facebook, twitter and Eventbrite. They have filled a vital gap for many people.

What will the project do?

The programme would be a series of twice weekly daytime workshops in Autumn 2022, 24 workshops in total. They would take place in The Art Department, a new large-scale exhibition venue at the former Alders Store in the Paisley Centre. Workshops would focus on a particular theme, skill, medium or practice. Groups of up to 30 participants will work together to produce a piece 'work'. Each workshop will be delivered by an experienced artist who is versed in a particular practice. The primary objective is for people to improve social connections

sustainability of Outspoken Arts as a successful creative company. It will boost employment for local people and enable leverage of additional funding for activity in the area.

We want to deepen our thinking about the potential of up-scalability of the apprenticeship model work experience we deliver for long-term unemployed people, particularly in light of the past 2 years. During lockdown, we learned that with good digital access, equipment and skills, we can reach many more people than in person working practices allow. Our aim now is to develop those practices further and 'upscale' our digital reach so that we can move forward and deliver services to many more people with long term conditions or barriers to work.

What will the project do?

Physical and mental wellbeing have been hit hard by the isolation of the pandemic. For some people, it is their day to day lived experience to be locked down due to physical or mental health issues which can also lead to destructive coping mechanisms in the long term. Involvement in projects with Fablevision has improved lives: the feeling of self worth and being part of a community, of learning and progressing towards taking charge of our own future is priceless and cannot be restricted by lockdown or, indeed, a mobility or other health issue.

With a lack of counselling available for secondary school pupils in the area, we are looking to expand our counselling service to help 13-17 year olds with one-on-one free counselling.

Unfortunately our Child Play counsellors and adult counsellors are unable to see these children as in counselling 13-17 year olds are seen as a separate category which is 'adolescent'. We have regretfully had to inform a number of parents after making an enquiry about this and several of them have commented on the lack of support for the age range in the area.

What will the project do?

Whilst running our adult counselling service as a donation-led service and our Child Play Therapy service for 5-12 year olds which is free, we noticed a gap for 13-17 year olds where we have received dozens of enquiries.

Counselling for 13-17 year olds cannot be covered by a child counsellor or adult counsellor as the cut-off is 12 years old and 18 years old respectively. We therefore informed them we are unable to assist and there are very few options elsewhere.

We are looking to send two counsellors on 'adolescent counselling' training.

This will be one of the only services in the area that will facilitate secondary school children for counselling and ensure them a safe space outside of school where they can speak to a trained counsellor.

Due to the specific demand for children this age we have received in the last few months, we believe this will be a worthwhile project. We are liaising with Counselling & Psychotherapy in Scotland (COSCA) in terms of the specific counselling courses which would be best but we are looking to put two counsellors through the training.

Time to Tackle is a community programme set up to improve the physical, emotional and mental wellbeing of children and young people, challenge stigmas around mental health, raise awareness of mental health issues and combat loneliness. The programme has won awards nationally and is at the forefront of the fight against poor mental health and suicide. We offer participants free football and the opportunity to share experiences, listen and learn from each other as well as the experience of our qualified coaches and youth workers.

What will the project do?

There is huge need for any work which supports the mental health of young people. Indeed, suicide is the number one killer of young males and there are known links between death by suicide and deprivation, it is estimated that you are 3 times more likely to die by suicide if you live in an area of deprivation. COVID-19 has made the situation even worse, and we are requesting funding to sustain the impact of our Time to Tackle project, supporting young people in deprived areas of Paisley.

We would like to develop a drop in aimed at capacity building hard to reach minority ethnic (in particular African) communities in and around Renfrewshire which encounter multiple barriers, such as communication and those of a cultural nature, which prevent them from becoming resilient communities.

The project will provide weekly 40 weekly drop-in sessions for 8-10 individuals around volunteering job search and application support, volunteering opportunities, general and mental health support and information on entitlements, The project will also aim to improve awareness via providing access to literature and media through the development of information packs on hot topic subjects to share with 600 - 800 people. The proposed information packs would also be written using simple English and translated into several common languages that are prevalent within the community, making them accessible to a wide range of audiences. The project would also deliver 6 workshops targeting 5 participants per workshop around areas that our client base feel they need more help within order to become more resilient and independent. These areas could include budgeting, recycling, how to buy online (using comparison websites and freebies) cooking (how to make healthy meals utilising leftovers), confidence building, CV writing and developing interview skills. The project will also organise one massive cultural celebration event bringing the whole community together to allow community integration.

What will the project do?

The project has been developed as a result of a combination of factors such as an increasing number of diverse groups in and around the Renfrewshire area; gaps in service provision for hard-to-reach communities; consultations held with target communities in order to assess their needs; anecdotal evidence; evidence from research; and government and local council community development priorities. This information as it relates to our experience of service delivery at a local level in Renfrewshire indicates that regular activities and intervention.

The project will support them through the provision of information as well as through developing skills that will allow communities to fight poverty and cushion the effects of welfare reforms.

MIYO is a highly successful 12-month tenancy sustainment programme which aims to help the most vulnerable tenants in Renfrewshire (those effected by homelessness/housing insecurity); turn their house into a home in which they love to live. They receive weekly workshops, a starter pack containing basic materials (e.g., paint brushes, masking tape, pencils), as well as a budget of £100, to carry out their home improvement ideas.

Purpose of the project:

We are relocating our studios to Craigielea House, a Victorian town house in Ferguslie Park formerly used as council offices, initially as a yearlong pilot project. Our aim during this pilot years, using creative arts and crafts workshops and activities, is to work with the local community (engaging isolated individuals as well as existing groups such as The Darkwood Crew, Pals of the Privies) to research and develop a future for Craigielea House as a long-term centre of excellence for visual arts and creative community activity.

What will the project do?

In 2020 Laura was invited by Collective Architecture Create to contribute to The Making of Ferguslie Park. This

major consultation exercise set out the local community's vision for the future of the Ferguslie Park neighbourhood over the next five to ten years. The resulting plan builds upon Ferguslie Parks strong community spirit to imagine a neighbourhood that is vibrant and flourishing. During this consultation the community identified as a priority the establishment of a social space

for arts, craft and community events.

Using the house as a base from which to meet local communities, we will use our pilot year to develop possible responses to the needs or wishes they identify. We will provide; series of arts and craft workshops, several social public forums and open studio events - allowing our conversations around these possible responses to develop organically. The local community are at the heart of Sculpture House Collective's vision for the future. Communal creative activity brings many benefits to individual and social health and wellbeing.

Purpose of the project

The club building has suffered from significant dampness due to loose and broken rendering allowing water saturation. New windows installed last year have helped, but problems of cold and damp cannot be cured until the render is replaced, as it is almost entirely blown across the whole building. This will make the building watertight to prevent further damage to the structure and contents and improve thermal efficiency thereby helping to cut heating costs and energy usage.

What will the project do?

Dampness has been an issue for several years, but resources had been focussed on piecemeal roof repairs. A damaging woodworm outbreak in 2019 highlighted the need to eliminate other sources of dampness. After several pieces of render fell off, we obtained quotations for its repair, which brought to light the fact that the condition of the render was a major source of the dampness and the whole building required re-rendering. Renewal of the windows was also urgently needed and was done last year, resulting in further damage to the loose render.

The entire building (or as much as can be afforded if grant is partial) would be rerendered.
