1 Minute of Previous Meeting

2 Friends of Robertson Park

A discussion took place on the progress of setting up Friends of Robertson Park.

Councillor Shaw advised that Renfrew Development trust was producing a report on how to move forward with the project and was currently taking legal advice and recruiting a sub-committee.

Roberta Roberton (Renfrew Development Trust) advised that they were linking in with other stakeholders and they were due to meet with Engage Renfrewshire to take the project forward.

It was noted that the project had £37,000 of £53,000 set aside to fund the project and after further discussion the Partnership agreed to approve that the Lead Officer be given delegated authority to approve an application by Renfrewshire Development Trust for the outstanding amount of £16,000 to allow the Friends of Robertson Park project to commence.

3 Applications for Local Partnership Funding to Renfrew Local Partnership 2021/22

There was submitted a report by the Chief Executive relative to applications for funding from Renfrew Local Partnership in 201/22.

The report intimated that the available allocation for the Local Partnership was $\pounds 111.953.68$, made up of $\pounds 40,453$ from the General Fund, $\pounds 67,360$ from the Common Good Fund and $\pounds 4,140.68$ underspend carried forward from the 2020/21 General Fund budget. The carry forward of underspend was agreed due to the exceptional circumstances of the Covid pandemic which impacted on the ability of community organisations to undertake activities due to restrictions in place over the period. The normal arrangement whereby underspends could not be carried forward into the next financial year would be reinstated for 2021/22. The sum of $\pounds 50$ per community representative required to be ringfenced for potential claims for administrative expenses, which left a balance of $\pounds 111,603.68$ for allocation.

The report advised that the Youth Challenge Fund component of the Local Partnership's funding, now known as Celebrating Renfrewshire, was £18,657.

4. Renfrew Local Partnership Budget Monitoring Report and 20/21 Funding Application Feedback

There was submitted a budget monitoring report and funding application feedback by the Chief Executive relative to Renfrew Local Partnership 2020/21.

The report intimated that the Local Partnership provided funding to community groups to undertake projects. This funding was allocated from the general grant fund, the Renfrew Common Good Fund and the youth challenge fund through the Celebrating Renfrewshire participatory budgeting exercise.

The funds allocated by Renfrew Local Partnership in 2020/21 and the current budget position were detailed in the appendix to the report.

The feedback received from 12 of the organisations who received funding from Renfrew Local Partnership in 2020/21 was detailed in the report. It was noted that some organisations had returned funding due to the impact of COVID-19 on the capability of groups to successfully deliver projects and, in recognition of this situation, it had been agreed that the Local Partnership underspends in 2020/21 would be carried forward and added to the budget for 2021/22. Normal arrangements would apply for 2021/22 requiring all funding to be spent by the end of the financial year with no provision for carry-over to the following year.

DECIDED: That the budget monitoring report and feedback from recipients of funding in 2020/21 be noted.



Communities Mental Health and Wellbeing Fund

£15 million National Communities Mental Health and Wellbeing Fund - £509,542 for Renfrewshire

To provide significant investment into community support for adults, building on the children and young people's community wellbeing supports currently being rolled out across Scotland

Fund will be locally focused – work with local partners and strong connections with community groups - Engage Renfrewshire is the point of contact for enquiries, applications, delivery of grant monies and collection of monitoring

This year's funding to is be fully allocated by the end of the financial year (31st March 2022), but anticipating further funding 2022/23 (subject to confirmation)

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Fund Aims and Criteria

Promote and develop good mental health and wellbeing - protect against the impact of distress and mental ill health within the adult population

Tackle issues within the Scottish Governments Transition & Recovery Plan such as; suicide prevention, social isolation and tackling loneliness

Address the mental health inequalities exacerbated by the pandemic and the needs of 'at risk' groups – women, BAME, disability, socio-economic, bereavement, older people, LGBTI, geographic, refugees, trauma,...

Focus on supporting projects with a strong community focus - delivered by groups and clubs, voluntary or community organisations, registered charities, and not-for-profit company or Community Interest Companies.

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Applications...

Appropriate 'light touch' application process to enable access to the fundsome guidance will follow but flexible to local processes

Amount of funding – expectations of some smaller grants (i.e. £10K and under) and flexibility to provide some larger grants (i.e. around £50k)

Potential for smaller amounts to Non-constituted groups

Monitoring, 'light touch' local suggestion of evidence gathering of programme's impact via experiences of participants, i.e. groups provide a story of change for participants, could be via photos, video, poetry, tbc

TITLE: Renfrew Local Partnership Budget Monitoring Report

1. Summary

- 1.1 Renfrew Local Partnership provides funding to community groups to undertake projects. This funding is allocated from the General Grant Fund, the Renfrew Common Good Fund and, through a Participating Budgeting exercise known as Celebrating Renfrewshire, the Youth Challenge Fund.
- 1.2 A table setting out the funds awarded for 2021/22 by Renfrew Local Partnership at its meeting on 19 May 2021 is attached as Appendix 1 to this report. All funds awarded at this meeting have now been paid to grant recipients.
- 1.3 The Celebrating Renfrewshire youth participatory budgeting process is still underway, with results due to be announced at an announcement event organised by the youth steering group on the 12th November 2021. Local Partnership members will be updated with details of successful projects following the results announcement.
- 1.4 Following the awards made to community groups in May 2021 and the decision at that meeting to ringfence a further £16,000 funding from the 2021/22 Common Good Fund for the Robertson Park Project, The General Fund has a balance remaining for allocation of £12,805.36 and the Renfrew Common Good Fund has a remaining balance of £18,960 available for allocation. No carry forward to 2022/23 will be available for the General Fund. Additional applications for funding for 2021/22 received after the May 2021 meeting are presented separately on the agenda.

2. **Recommendation**

TITLE: Applications for Local Partnership Funding To Renfrew Local Partnership 2021/22

1. Summary

- 1.1 Applications for grant funding from the seven Local Partnership areas were invited to be submitted during March and April 2021, to be considered at the Local Partnership meetings due to be held in May and June2021.
- 1.2 Following the allocation of Renfrew Local Partnership funding in May 2021, the total amount remaining available for allocation is £47,765.36.
- The Youth Challenge Fund component of Renfrew Local Partnership Funding is £18,657. The outcome of allocation of this funding will be announced on 12 November 2021.
- 1.4 Two additional applications have been received following the May 2021 meeting. These are attached for consideration.

2. **Recommendations**

2.1 It is recommended that members of Renfrew Local Partnership consider the applications for Local Partnership grant funding, as set out below in Appendix 1 and Appendix 2

3. Background

3.1 Applicants for funding in 2021/22 have been provided with guidance, as well as a description of the Local Priorities identified by the Renfrew Local Partnership. A copy of this guidance has been provided at Appendix 3.

- 3.2 Local Partnership members are asked to consider the applications for funding summarised at Appendix 1 and 2 of this report, and to assess these against the Local Priorities agreed by the Renfrew local priorities.
- 3.3 An initial assessment has been carried out by officers to support Local Partnership members in their decision-making. Where applications have made clear reference to the Local Priorities identified by the Local Partnership, this is identified in the first table at Appendix 1. Applications that make a partial or no reference to Renfrew Local Priorities are summarised in the second table for example, the project may work with young people (and therefore meet the Local Priority around young people) but not deliver this directly in the Local Partnership area or make reference to how many young people from the area would be engaged in the project.
- 3.4 The priorities of the Renfrew Local Partnership are:

Bringing Renfrew Town Centre to life

The Local Partnership want to see more things to do in the town centre, particularly encouraging local events and seeing more happening in the evenings. They want to do this by making best use of community assets and spaces, including working with the town centre business community.

Moving around and connectivity

The Local Partnership want the economic investment in Renfrew to benefit the local community, particularly making it easier for people to get around the town, and to travel to and from Renfrew.

Making the most of public assets

The Local Partnership want to see the maximum use of public resources, such as parks and outdoor spaces, as well as maximising the use of buildings in the community.

Strengthening social connections

Improving social connections and tackling social isolation is a key these for the Local Partnership, and the Partnership recognise this affects all ages, including younger and older people. Community events and activities are important, as will be a focus on improving health and well-being locally.

Key Theme: Maximising economic impact

The Local partnership want to see a focus on boosting the economic outcomes for people in Renfrew and how this can support their Local Priorities.

Pool hire of Victory Baths for Water polo training and development	£4,000

Description of Project:

Victory Baths has had Water Polo played in it since 1935 in various incarnations.

In its current status the REN96 water polo require assistance in funding to retain the Sunday session which has become critical to all aspects of the development of the teams.

This Sunday session allows the training of our under 19 team who are competing at the highest level in Scotland, representing in the national squads and about to embark on the NAGS (national age group championship of England) also known as the British Cup.

Utilizing the shallow end of the pool allows for fantastic learning and development of our young 10 and under players. This provides a superb platform for young players to enter the sport.

Having such a long history, with many teams being taught and trained at Victory baths we are able to offer some pool time on a Sunday to retired players aged 40 plus to train and play as masters. The initial thought was to help the older players back into the sport and training but resulted in a mentor ship between the junior and master teams.

The grant will solely be used to cover the cost of pool hire.

Although part of a larger swimming club, the water polo receives no financial assistance and so everything is self funded through players and coaches.

The rising cost of pool hire and some players not returning post COVID has resulted in a cash flow shortfall which will result in the Victory baths Sunday session being cut.

Who benefits from the Project?

Steven Burgoyne and Craig Hutchison both former players of Renfrew and Scotland, could see the potential of working with a swim team to develop a water polo section and create not only a team but a pathway for young people to develop new skills in a team sport environment.

Both living in Renfrew and having trained in the Victory baths since 1980 it was their

mutual desire to start a team and give back what they learned as players.

Maintaining the Sunday session at Victory Baths will help all groups of players as follows:

Under 19s: Train to elite level looking to win Scottish Cup / Scottish league / British Cup and place players in national and GB squads.

Under 10s: Working with Victory baths swimming lessons, Renfew baths Swim club and REN96 swim team we look to recruit new players at an early age and develop their skills into the next junior team.

Masters: Regular training and will allow for increasing fitness as they prepare for the Scottish masters cup and Barcelona masters cup in September 2022
