Declarations of Interest

There were no declarations of interest intimated prior to the commencement of the meeting.

Prior to the start of the meeting Councillor Don thanked Rays of Hope for hosting the meeting.

1 Welcome and Introductions

Councillor Don welcomed those present to the meeting and invited members and officers to introduce themselves.

2 Membership of Houston, Bridge of Weir, Brookfield, Kilbarchan, Howwood, Lochwinnoch and Elderslie Local Partnership

Under reference to item 1 of the Minute of the meeting of this Local Partnership held on 29 January 2019, there was submitted a report by the Chief Executive relative to the appointment of community representative to vacant positions within the Local Partnership.

The report intimated that at the meeting held on 29 January 2019 the Local Partnership appointed five community representatives which left three vacant positions. Since then, three organisations and one individual had expressed an interest in providing a community representative and the report provided details in relation to the three organisations. The individual request had not been included for consideration as this did not meet the criteria for membership.

It was noted that Jennifer O'Brien (Local Energy Action Plan (LEAP) Project) was now unable to take up the position of community representative on the Local Partnership.

Councillor Don proposed (i) that James Fletcher (Brookfield Bowling Club); Neil Thomson (Brighter Bridge of Weir); and Gary Noonan (Houston and Killellan Kirk (Church of Scotland)) be appointed to the Local Partnership; (ii) that it be noted that Jennifer O'Brien (Local Energy Action Plan (LEAP) Project) was now unable to take up the position of community representative on the Local Partnership; and (iii) that this vacant community representative position be reserved for a youth organisation. This was agreed unanimously.

DECIDED:

- (a) That James Fletcher (Brookfield Bowling Club); Neil Thomson (Brighter Bridge of Weir); and Gary Noonan (Houston and Killellan Kirk (Church of Scotland)) be appointed to the Local Partnership;
- (b) That it be noted that Jennifer O'Brien (Local Energy Action Plan (LEAP) Project) was now unable to take up the position of community representative on the Local Partnership; and

(c) That this vacant community representative position be reserved for a youth organisation.

3 Appointment of Vice-chair

Councillor Don advised that, in terms of the Standing Orders for Local Partnerships, each Local Partnership would appoint its own Vice-chair, who should be a community representative and called for nominations.

Councillor Andy Doig, seconded by Councillor Audrey Doig, moved that David Blair (Renfrewshire District Scouts) be appointed as Vice-chair of the Local Partnership. There being no other nominations, this appointment was agreed unanimously.

<u>DECIDED</u>: That David Blair be appointed as Vice-chair of the Local Partnership.

Councillor Cameron entered the meeting prior to consideration of the following item of business.

4 Minute

There was submitted the Minute of the meeting of this Local Partnership held on 29 January 2019.

<u>DECIDED</u>: That the Minute be approved.

5 Code of Conduct/Register of Interests

The Head of Corporate Governance provided information about the adoption of a Code of Conduct for Devolved Public Bodies that set out standards of behaviour that could be applied to members, given that their role would include the allocation of public funds.

The Code of Conduct would require community representatives to register their interests and to declare those interests at meetings. In this way, business conducted by the Local Partnership, which was not part of the formal Board structure of Renfrewshire Council, would be open and transparent.

It was noted that Councillors were required to adhere to the Code of Conduct for Councillors and already had a Register of Interests in place.

Copies of the Code of Conduct and the Register of Interests form were made available at the meeting.

DECIDED:

- (a) That it be agreed that the Code of Conduct for Devolved Public Bodies be adopted for this Local Partnership; and
- (b) That it be agreed that community representatives appointed as members of this Local Partnership sign up to the Register of Interests.

Sederunt

Councillor Andy Doig and Councillor Audrey Doig left the meeting prior to consideration of the following item of business.

6 Key Local Priorities

A presentation was delivered by the Strategic Partnerships and Inequalities Manager, the Partnerships Planning and Development Manager, the Development Plans and Housing Strategy Team Leader and the Chief Executive, Engage Renfrewshire, relative to identifying common matters that were important to people in the area and setting local priorities for improvement. It was envisaged that, once identified, these local priorities would be used to target resources and improvement actions.

The presentation, together with a Local Profile providing background information, detailed key facts about the population; children in low income families; access, health and crime deprivation; children and education; parks and play areas; health resources; care homes, extra care and sheltered housing specific to this Local Partnership area.

Based on the information provided, members worked in groups to identify and set local priorities for the area. After discussion, the following local priorities were identified by the groups, activities for youth; activities for elderly; community facilities to engage villages; lack of public services; crime; local transport; school parking; engagement with local businesses; community involvement; speeding; connectivity between villages; unadopted roads; housing; environment; litter; appearance of villages; cycle paths and green paths; local people to influence policy decisions; sustainability; poverty; food banks; and how the community policing model worked well in villages

Following this feedback from groups the Strategic Partnerships and Inequalities Manager and the Partnerships Planning and Development Manager grouped these local priorities under headings of transport as an enabler; social isolation; lighting; public services and spaces; community halls; roads; crime and anti-social behaviour; working with businesses; village activities and a programme of events; litter, fly tipping and visual appearance of villages; greener connectivity; and housing.

The Lead Officer then identified key themes of connectivity and transport; environmental improvement and parks; access to services, facilities and assets which would include things to do; and village identity which would include supporting local groups and things to do.

Based on these key themes and discussion at the meeting, the Strategic Partnerships and Inequalities Manager advised that the local priorities identified would be grouped under each of the key themes and that this information would be circulated to members of the Local Partnership.

DECIDED:

(a) That the key themes of connectivity and transport; environmental improvement and parks; access to services, facilities and assets which would include things to do; and village identity which would include supporting local groups and things to do be approved; and

(b) That the Strategic Partnerships and Inequalities Manager group the local priorities identified under each of the key themes and circulate the information to members of the Local Partnership.

7 Local Partnership - Future Arrangements

There was submitted a report by the Chief Executive relative to arrangements for meetings and the name of the Local Partnership.

The report intimated that Local Partnerships would meet a minimum of three times per year. In addition, a community event would be organised to enable engagement with community groups, voluntary organisations and members of the public who were not members of the Local Partnership.

The report requested that members consider the name of the Local Partnership and whether they would prefer a single venue for all meetings or to alternate between different venues within the Local Partnership area. Suggestions for accessible local venues were to be submitted to communityplanning@renfrewshire.gov.uk by 7 May 2019.

It was noted that as per the previous Local Area Committee arrangements, community representatives on the Local Partnership were entitled to expenses of £50 per annum to attend meetings. This resource would be drawn from the Local Partnership grant funding allocation.

DECIDED:

- (a) That the next meeting of the Local Partnership be held at 6.00 pm on 20 June 2019 in Cargill Hall, Bridge of Weir;
- (b) That further meetings of the Local Partnership be held in November 2019 and March/April 2020 with a wider community engagement event being held during September/October 2019;
- (c) That the name of the Local Partnership be amended to The Villages Local Partnership, subject to any further suggestions being received;
- (d) That members identify accessible venues in the area and indicate a preference for a single venue for all meetings or alternating between different venues in the area and advise communityplanning@renfewshire.gov.uk by no later than 7 May 2019; and
- (e) That the arrangements for community representative expenses, as detailed in the report, be noted.

1. Summary

1.1 The purpose of this paper is to invite members of Houston, Bridge of Weir, Brookfield, Kilbarchan, Howwood, Lochwinnoch and Elderslie Local Partnership to agree the appointment of a community representative to the remaining vacant position within the Local Partnership.

3. Background

- 3.1 Houston, Bridge of Weir, Brookfield, Kilbarchan, Howwood, Lochwinnoch and Elderslie Local Partnership agreed at its meeting on 21 March 2019 that James Fletcher (Brookfield Bowling Club), Neil Thomson (Brighter Bridge of Weir) and Gary Noonan (Houston and Killellan Kirk) be appointed to the Local Partnership. Jennifer O'Brien (LEAP) is now unable to take up a community representative position and it was agreed that the vacant position be reserved for a youth organisation.
- 3.2 Subsequent to the meeting held on 21 March 2019, an application has been received from Stirling Mcgee, a member of the Scottish Youth Parliament representing Renfrewshire Youth Voice. A summary of this application is set out at section 3.3 below.

- 3.3 Criteria have been developed to support members to come to a decision on the appointment of community representatives. These were set out as part of the application and are as follows:
 - Size of the community the group represents.
 - Mechanisms in place to communicate with the local community.
 - Whether a group represents or support a community of interest and how connected the group is to other community groups in the area.

TITLE:

Local Partnership – Business Arrangements

1. Summary

- 1.1 The Local Partnership meeting held on 26 March 2019 decided that the name of the Partnership be amended to The Villages Local Partnership, subject to further suggestions being received. A further three suggestions for the name of the Local Partnership have been received and are set out for consideration at section 3.1.
- 1.2 A number of suggestions were received for venues for future meetings of the Local Partnership. These are set out for consideration at section 3.2.
- 1.3 The Youth Challenge element of the Local Partnership funding will be agreed through a Participatory Budgeting exercise for young people that will take place during August and September 2019. The outcome will be reported to the next meeting of the Local Partnership in November 2019.
- 1.4 A community conference event for the Local Partnership area will take place during September/October 2019. The next meeting of the Local Partnership will take place in November 2019. The date and venue of the conference and the Local Partnership will be notified to Local Partnership members in June 2019.

2. Recommendations

- 2.1 It is recommended that the Local Partnership:
 - (a) Consider the name of the Local Partnership and venues for future meetings.

- (b) Note the arrangements for the Youth Participatory Budgeting exercise and informing local members of conference and Local Partnership arrangements for autumn 2019.
- (c) Note that members of the Local Partnership agreed at the meeting held on 21 March 2019 to complete a Register of Interests.

3. **Key Issues For Consideration**

Name of Local Partnership

3.1 It was decided at the Local Partnership meeting held on 21 March that the name going forward be The Villages Local Partnership, subject to further suggestions. Three further suggestions for names have been received for consideration. The full list of proposed names for the Local Partnership is:

Renfrewshire West Villages
Renfrewshire Villages

Venue of Meetings

3.2 Following the previous Local Partnership meeting, a number of suggestions for venues and comments were received for consideration. These are:

Suggested Venues and Comments

Rays of Hope, Elderslie

Old Library in Kilbarchan

Elderslie Village Hall as a single venue – meets an ask that the venue be accessible by public transport in recognition of the needs of non-drivers and people with disabilities

Tweedie Hall, Linwood – most logical and accessible place

Johnstone Town Hall (proposed twice) – convenient for all, provides good facilities and has no problems with parking. Transport between villages is difficult, but most villages have an evening bus service to Johnstone.

McKillop Town Hall, Lochwinnoch – large enough to take a Local Partnership meeting, but difficult to get a suitable booking and transport between various villages is difficult.

Schedule of Meetings

- 3.3 The Local Partnership agreed at its meeting in March 2019 that a conference event would be held in the area in order to engage with community groups, voluntary organisations and members of the public who are not represented formally on the Partnership, to take place during autumn 2019. The next meeting of the Local Partnership will take place in November 2019.
- 3.4 The 2019 conferences will focus on:
 - Local priorities for each Local Partnership area and how partners can work together to deliver these.
 - Activity taking place during 2019 in each Local Partnership area. This will
 include information about projects receiving Local Partnership funding in
 2019 and a look back at the impact of projects supported by the previous
 Local Area Committees.
 - Exploring how groups and organisations working within an area can work together to progress their own projects and support those of others. This will include opportunities to support organisations that applied for Local Partnership grants, but were not warded funding.
 - Informing Local Partnerships about the nature and extent of community activity within each area to build knowledge and understanding of current operation and future projects.

Youth Challenge Funding

- 3.5 Each Local Partnership receives a proportionate share of the Youth Challenge budget, which funds projects and activities benefiting young people up to age 25. The Youth Challenge element of the Local Partnership budget will be allocated through a Youth Participatory budgeting exercise, where young people in the area vote for the applications that they want to see funded. This will be the same for all Local Partnership areas.
- 3.6 Participatory Budgeting means that the people who are intended to benefit from the projects vote on which projects are funded. Young people from each of the Local Partnership areas will be involved in developing the process for conducting the Participatory Budgetary exercise before a voting exercise is opened up to the wider community of young people in each Local Partnership area.

Code of Conduct/Register of Interest

3.7 A presentation was made at the March 2019 meeting of the Local Partnership regarding members signing up to a Code of Conduct and Register of Interest. This presented information for consideration by each Local Partnership on the issue of members of the Local Partnership signing up to a Code of Conduct and completion of a Register of Interest. It was decided at the meeting that the Code of Conduct for Devolved Public Bodies be adopted for the Partnership. It was also agreed that community representatives appointed as members of the Local Partnership sign up to the Register of Interests.

TITLE:

Applications For Local Partnership Grant Funding

1. Summary

- 1.1 Applications for grant funding from the seven Local Partnership areas were invited in April 2019, with a deadline for submission of 20 May 2019.
- 1.2 At the last meeting of Houston, Bridge of Weir, Brookfield, Kilbarchan, Howwood, Lochwinnoch and Elderslie Local Partnership on 21 March 2019, members agreed a draft set of priorities for the Local Partnership. The priorities identified for The Villages were:
 - Connectivity and transport
 - Environment and parks
 - Access to services, facilities and assets
 - Village identity and character
- 2.2 Applications for funding from Houston, Bridge of Weir, Brookfield, Kilbarchan, Howwood, Lochwinnoch and Elderslie Local Partnership have been invited to reflect these priorities. A description of the priorities is set out at paragraph 4.1.
- 2.3 The available allocation for Houston, Bridge of Weir, Brookfield, Kilbarchan, Howwood, Lochwinnoch and Elderslie Local Partnership is £51,191. The total value of applications received is £178,928.82. In addition a sum of £50 per community representative requires to be ringfenced for potential claim of expenses, as agreed at the March 2019 meeting.
- 2.4 The Youth Challenge Fund component of Houston, Bridge of Weir, Brookfield, Kilbarchan, Howwood, Lochwinnoch and Elderslie Local Partnership Funding is

- £23,609. This funding will be allocated by young people through a Participatory Budgeting process to take place later in 2019.
- 2.5 Three gala days within this area take place before the Local Partnership would be able to meet to consider funding applications. Delegated authority has been given on a one-off basis for 2019 only to Renfrewshire Council's Director of Communities, Planning and Housing to consider applications by gala day committees that are specifically impacted by the scheduling of Local Partnership meetings. The name date and value of application for each gala day is as follows:

3. Recommendations

3.1 It is recommended that members of Houston, Bridge of Weir, Brookfield, Kilbarchan, Howwood, Lochwinnoch and Elderslie Local Partnership consider the applications for Local Partnership grant funding, as set out below in Appendix 1 and Appendix 2.

4. Background

4.1 The priorities of Houston, Bridge of Weir, Brookfield, Kilbarchan, Howwood, Lochwinnoch and Elderslie Local Partnership are:

Connectivity and transport

The Local Partnership want to see villages which are well-connected to each other, when people can connect with other too. Transport is a clear focus in this area, including both public transport and green routes.

Environment and parks

The Local Partnership want well-maintained villages, with high quality public public parks and a focus on street scene, including fly tipping, dog fouling and litter.

Roads and transport

The Local Partnership want to address a range of issues related to roads and transport, including congestion, speed, parking and public transport connections.

Access to services, facilities and assets

The Local Partnership want to improve access to what's going on in the community, including community activities, and making the most of their community buildings and facilities.

Village identity and character

The Local Partnership want to maintain the identity and character of the villages in the area. Key to this is developing and sustaining local community groups, and the delivery of local events.

4.2 Guidance and Criteria for funding

To assist all interested groups and organisations with the application process, guidance was produced and promoted across a variety of communication channels. Potential applicants were also invited to attend drop in sessions to receive advice on making an application and to ask questions about the guidance. More than 70 groups participated in the drop-in sessions.

The guidance set out criteria against which applications should be made. For example, guidance was provided on applications made to more than one partnership, indicating that Local Partnerships would require applications to evidence how an application would meet identified local priorities, and would anticipate that funded activity was being delivered locally. The guidance also includes criteria relating to maximum levels of investment, applications from partner organisations and what funding should and should not be used to support amongst other issues.

Further support and information will be made available to those applicants who are not successful in gaining funding, and in particular to signpost applicants to other sources of funding. For reference, the guidance can be accessed here.

In 1992 they were resurrected at the Lagoon Leisure Centre & from then until 2006, when Renfrewshire Leisure Ltd withdrew ice facilities there. While Pirates were successful in relocating to Braehead Arena, the cost there is prohibitive, currently standing at almost £200 per hour with an 8% increase pending. The various other activities such as junior development fell due to the high cost. Due to the paucity of ice facilities Pirates have on occasions gone as far as Dundee & Dumfries to secure ice.

Because of rising demand for a skills based approach the club has appointed a second volunteer coach for the senior team & intends to appoint commensurate numbers of volunteer coaches in respect of the planned reintroduction of junior ice hockey for players under the age of 20.

The farm has many social connections to help promote mental health, wellbeing and to help lessen isolation. Animals are a great source of therapy and have a great ability to bring many different people together some people prefer being round the animals as a gentle way of reintroducing them into the community. Some of the connections we have are RAMH, spark of genius, community service, West college Scotland's adults with addition needs and kibble we believe everyone should have the chance to be involved in their community. These connections help provide placements for anyone suffering mental health issues, physical disabilities, someone who has been out of the community, anyone who is looking to get back into work or anyone who just wants to volunteer, its a placement where everyone is included in every aspect of the farm with no judgement. We offer work experience placements to many different high schools throughout Renfrewshire and beyond, we have had many successful work experience placements with students from Gryffe high school. The work experienced placements are invaluable to pupils wishing to pursue a career in the animal sector as not many places allow under 16's to work so closely with such a variety of animals, in recent years our volunteers

have went on to become fully qualified veterinary nurses.

The farm is working with a local artist by providing a disused area of the farm to build a free and legal graffiti wall, this was established to encourage more youths to use the wall rather than putting graffiti around their local areas. The hope is this wall will help to reduce the vandalism in many areas by providing something different for everyone to try. The local artist will hold regular demonstrations and the idea is proving to be popular amongst the local and surrounding communities being supported by local newspapers the paisley express and the gazette.

We regularly litter pick the pathways clearing the glass, dog mess and litter to ensure safety to the public using these paths and for any wildlife. We have had extra cctv installed after the farm itself was vandalised using graffiti this has helped reduce vandalism in the immediate area.

		We regularly attend local events with our animals including Lilias day in Kilbarchan. Lamont Farm has been a part of the Erskine Community for 42 years and was the first city farm in Scotland and is now one of the only two remaining. The grant will help towards running costs to ensure the project can continue to provide a variety of services and continue to work with a number of local educational establishments within the community. Paisley has an emerging traditional music scene with a new generation of young musicians now coming through. Through our inclusive approach to teaching, participants are able to attend classes and learn together, strengthening community involvement and benefit. The awareness of Gaelic culture and local heritage has increased significantly since the establishment of Fèis Phàislig in 2014 and has allowed those interested in traditional music and culture to participate, regardless of background or ability.

Access to services, facilities and assets

Regular showcase events, ceilidhs and concerts allow us to deliver events across the local partnership area. Performances and events will assist the establishment of a caring, community atmosphere and as well as participants benefitting socially, families and others within the community will come together. Our touring Ceilidh Trail group will perform across all of the areas within the local partnership, making use of community buildings and venues and working with other local organisations.

Village identity and character

With a focus on local and national heritage, identity and character within the villages will play a key role within our delivery. Our School Visits scheme will help to increase pupils awareness of Gaelic language, traditional music and Scottish culture. Performances and events delivered with the local partnership area will also add to the local cultural calendar.
