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DECLARATIONS OF INTEREST

There were no declarations of interest intimated prior to the commencement of the meeting.

1 MINUTE OF PREVIOUS MEETING

There was submitted and approved the Minute of the previous meeting held on 25 June 2019.

DECIDED: That the Minute be approved.

2 CELEBRATING RENFREWSHIRE YOUTH PARTICIPATORY BUDGETING EXERCISE

There was submitted a report by the Chief Executive relative to the Celebrating Renfrewshire Youth Participatory Budgeting Exercise.

The report indicated that the Youth Challenge Fund component of the Renfrew Local Partnership Budget had been renamed "Celebrating Renfrewshire: By young people for young people". E Finnie of the Youth Steering Group provided a presentation in connection with the pilot participatory budgeting exercise undertaken which had resulted in 720 young people aged between 12-25 voting to allocate the available budget for Renfrew Local Partnership in respect of the Celebrating Renfrewshire Fund, £18,657, between eight projects. Details of the process were provided. It was highlighted that the project had been co-produced by young people and supported by Renfrewshire Council, Renfrewshire Youth Voice, Active Schools and Young Scot to distribute Youth Challenge Funding and would inform the development of future participatory budgeting within Renfrewshire. A document summarising the results of the Celebrating Renfrewshire Budgeting process was appended to the report.

<u>DECIDED</u>: That the outcome of the youth participatory budgeting exercise for the Renfrew Local Partnership and the information provided in the presentation be noted.

3 NEW RENFREW YMCA

S Gillan advised that the YMCA building would be closing at the end of December for refurbishment and renovation with a multi-sensory space being developed. It was noted that the centre was likely to be closed for four to six months, depending on the progression of building work, however, they had managed to secure space in other locations to ensure their service would not be disrupted.

She asked that this information be shared with other organisations.

DECIDED: That the verbal update be noted.

4 LOCAL PARTNERSHIP PRIORITIES

There was submitted a report by the Chief Executive relative to the draft priority areas for focus agreed at the meeting of Renfrew Local Partnership held on 28 March 2019.

The report advised that five draft priorities had been identified by the Local Partnership for Renfrew: (i) Bringing Renfrew Town Centre to life; (ii) Moving around and connectivity; (iii) Making the most of public assets; (iv) Strengthening social connections; and (v) Maximising economic impact had been identified by the Local Partnership for the Renfrew area and subsequently developed into priority statements detailed within the report. It was noted that these draft local priorities and statements would help develop the future agenda and workplan of the Local Partnership. Potential discussion points were provided for consideration to facilitate discussion in relation to how the priorities could shape the workplan and determine future agenda items and potential partner invitees to meetings of the Local Partnership.

During discussion in connection with the priority of strengthening social connections it was proposed that a future meeting be devoted to this key area of focus.

Discussion also took place on making the most of public assets. It was proposed that Robertson Park be allocated as a sub-section of this key area of focus. Councillor Shaw proposed that in order to drive the vision of Robertson Park forward, officers look at the feasibility of establishing a "Friends of Robertson Park" Group in order to attract funding to the area. This was agreed.

Councillor Shaw further proposed that officers look at the feasibility of finding a community led group to drive forward a mural project at the underpass between Fulbar Avenue and Craigielea Road, Renfrew. The project would look at the involvement of youth groups and St James' and Kirklandneuk Primary Schools designing and painting a mural on the underpass with consideration being given to a professional artist being identified to assist with the project. This was agreed.

K Miller advised that Engage would be happy to help set up and support any groups.

DECIDED:

- (a) That the priorities which would shape the Local Partnership's work plan moving forward be agreed;
- (b) That it be agreed that a future meeting of the Local Partnership be devoted to the priority of strengthening social connections;
- (c) That it be agreed that Robertson Park be allocated as a sub-section of making the most of public assets;
- (d) That it be agreed that officers look at the feasibility of establishing a "Friends of Robertson Park" Group in order to attract funding to the area; and
- (e) That it be agreed that officers look at the feasibility of finding a community led group to drive forward a mural project at the underpass between Fulbar Avenue and Craigielea Road, Renfrew. The project to look at the involvement of youth groups and St James' and Kirklandneuk Primary Schools designing and painting a mural on the underpass with consideration being given to a professional artist being identified to assist with the project.

5(a) GRANT FUNDING UPDATE

There was submitted a report by the Chief Executive relative to a grant funding update.

The report indicated that at the meeting of the Renfrew Local Partnership held on 25 June 2019, the sum of £3,142 was awarded to the Paisley Pirates Ice Hockey Club. Following the meeting, a request was made by Paisley Pirates Ice Hockey club to increase the award to enable the club to reach the minimum amount of funding required to compete in the ice hockey league.

As a result of the request, the Chair of Renfrew Local Partnership emailed all members with a proposal to increase the amount of the award to £5,500 which was agreed unanimously.

Three applications were tabled at the meeting. It was noted that the amount requested on the application for Renfrew Community Council should have been £3,652 and not £3,562.

It was recommended that the undernoted awards be approved:

Renfrewshire Christmas Toy Bank - £1,500 Renfrew Community Council - £3,652 Back to School Bank, Paisley - £1,500

It was proposed that £27,000 be ringfenced from the 2019/20 Renfrew Common Good Fund budget allocation for projects within Robertson Park in the 2020/21 financial year. This was agreed.

It was further proposed that £10,000 be ringfenced from the 2019/20 Renfrew Common Good Fund budget allocation for a mural project within Renfrew. This was agreed.

It was noted that the above grant awards and ringfenced amounts would fully allocate the Renfrew Local Partnership funding available in 2019/20.

DECIDED:

- (a) That the increase to the award of Renfrew Local Partnership Funding to Paisley Pirates Ice Hockey Club from the original ward of £3,142 to £5,500 be noted;
- (b) That it be agreed to award the three grant applications as noted above and the Lead Officer to allocate the grant money between the Common Good Fund and the General Grant Fund:
- (c) That it be agreed that £27,000 be ringfenced from the 2019/20 Renfrew Common Good Fund budget allocation for projects within Robertson Park in the 2020/21 financial year;
- (d) That it be agreed that £10,000 be ringfenced from the 2019/20 Renfrew Common Good Fund budget allocation for a mural project within Renfrew; and
- (e) That it be noted that the grant awards and ringfenced amounts agreed as above had fully allocated the Renfrew Local Partnership funding available in 2019/20.

5(b) RENFREW TOWN CENTRE FUNDING UPDATE

The Head of Regeneration gave a presentation relative to an update on the Renfrew Town Centre Fund.

He advised the Partnership of the funding available and the projects that had been identified within Renfrew.

DECIDED: That the presentation be noted.

5(c) BUDGET MONITORING REPORT

There was submitted a report by the Director of Finance & Resources relative to the Renfrew Local Partnership budget for 2019/20.

The report advised that the Local Partnership provided funding through a range of grants in terms of the General Grant Fund, Paisley Common Good Fund and the Celebrating Renfrewshire Youth Fund following a participatory budgeting exercise. An Appendix to the report detailed the funding allocated at the Renfrew Local Partnership meeting held on 25 June 2019.

<u>DECIDED</u>: That the report be noted.

6 LOCAL PARTNERSHIP REVIEW

There was submitted a report by the Chief Executive relative to the review of Local Partnerships.

The report indicated that when the Local Partnerships had been established in September 2018 it had been agreed that there would be a review of arrangements following a year of operation. The inaugural meetings of the Local Partnerships had taken place during January 2019 and it was proposed that the review begin in January 2020. A summary of the tasks completed to date by the Local Partnerships was provided. The report sought views on the proposed scope and approach of the review.

Members of the Local Partnership were invited to provide their views on the scope and approach for the Local Partnership review prior to the next meeting of the Partnership.

<u>DECIDED</u>: That Members of the Local Partnership submit their views on the scope and approach for the Local Partnership review prior to the next meeting of the Partnership.

7 FUTURE MEETING DATES

There was submitted a report by the Chief Executive relative to arrangements for meetings of Renfrew Local Partnership during 2020.

The report referred to the previous decision taken that Local Partnerships meet at least three times a year and proposed that meetings be held in April, August and November 2020. It was further proposed that grant funding allocations be made at the April meeting. Potential meeting date in April, August and November were detailed in the report.

It was highlighted that the wider engagement event, to provide the opportunity for wider local engagement with the work of the Local Partnerships, help build networks and connections and provide a chance to engage around the local priorities, which had originally been scheduled to be held during Autumn 2019 had been delayed due to the focus on delivering the Youth Participatory Budgeting approach and would now be carried out in early 2020.

DECIDED:

- (a) That members of the Local Partnership agree the timetable of future meetings; and
- (b) That members of the Local Partnership submit feedback on the proposed approach for the engagement events and, where appropriate, express an interest in the development of these events.

TITLE:

Applications for Local Partnership funding in Renfrew - 2020/21

1. Summary

- 1.1 Applications for grant funding from the seven Local Partnership areas were invited in February 2020, to be considered at the Local Partnership meetings due to be held in June.
- 1.2 The Renfrew Local Partnership meeting in June was cancelled due to the Coronavirus pandemic, to reflect both the 'lockdown' restrictions and the emergency planning arrangements in place put in place by Renfrewshire Council.
- 1.3 Renfrewshire Council resumed its policy board arrangements in August, and it was agreed by Renfrewshire Council's Emergencies Board that Local Partnerships would be resumed in September to allow for the allocation of Local Partnership funding for 2020/21.
- 1.4 The available allocation for Renfrew Local Partnership is £107,813, made up of £40,453 from the General Fund and £67,360 from the Common Good Fund.
- 1.5 In addition, a sum of £50 per community representative requires to be ringfenced for potential claim of expenses. These expenses are deducted from the available allocation for the Local Partnership. Renfrew has space for seven community members, so the total ringfenced for expenses is £350. The total budget available for allocation by Renfrew Local Partnership is therefore £107,463
- 1.6 The Youth Challenge Fund component of Renfrew Local Partnership Funding is £18,657. This funding will be allocated by young people through a Participatory Budgeting process currently underway.

2. Recommendations

2.1 It is recommended that members of Renfrew Local Partnership consider the applications for Local Partnership grant funding, as set out below in Appendix 1 and 2.

3. Background

- 3.1 Applications for grant funding from the seven Local Partnership areas were invited in February 2020, to be considered at the Local Partnership meetings due to be held in June.
- 3.2 Applicants were also provided with refreshed guidance, as well as a description of the Local Priorities identified by the Renfrew Local Partnership. A copy of this guidance has been provided at Appendix 3.
- 3.3 Following agreement by Renfrewshire Council's Emergencies Board that Local Partnerships would resume in September 2020, all applicants were contacted and provided the opportunity to amend their application or reflect any changes in circumstances that may have occurred since original applications were submitted.
- 3.4 Local Partnership members are asked to consider the applications for funding summarised at Appendix 1 and 2 of this report, and to assess these against the Local Priorities agreed by the Renfrew local priorities.
- 3.5 Following feedback received by Local Partnership members in previous funding rounds, an initial assessment has been carried out by officers to support Local Partnership members in their decision-making. Where applications have made clear reference to the Local Priorities identified by the Local Partnership, this is identified in the first table at Appendix 1. Applications that make a partial or no reference to Renfrew Local Priorities are summarised in the second table for example, the project may work with young people (and therefore meet the Local Priority around young people) but not deliver this directly in the Local Partnership area or make reference to how many young people from the area would be engaged in the project.
- 3.6 The priorities of the Renfrew Local Partnership are:

Bringing Renfrew town Centre to life

The Local Partnership want to see more things to do in the town centre, particularly encouraging local events and seeing more happening in the evenings. They want to do

this by making best use of community assets and spaces, including working with the town centre business community.

Moving around and connectivity

The Local Partnership want the economic investment in Renfrew to benefit the local community, particularly making it easier for people to get around the town, and to travel to and from Renfrew.

Making the most of public assets

The Local Partnership want to see the maximum use of public resources, such as parks and outdoor spaces, as well as maximising the use of buildings in the community.

Strengthening social connections

Improving social connections and tackling social isolation is a key these for the Local Partnership, and the Partnership recognise this affects all ages, including younger and older people. Community events and activities are important, as will be a focus on improving health and well-being locally.

Key Theme: Maximising economic impact

The Local partnership want to see a focus on boosting the economic outcomes for people in Renfrew and how this can support their Local Priorities.

This project is intended to address the physical and mental wellbeing of members, by using exercise when in the pool and the social environment, combined with exercise through dancing.

August 2020 Update

IF THERE IS ANY CHANGE IN THE PRICES THEN I KNOW THE CLUB WOULD MANAGE TO COVER THE COST.

6. Who Benefits From The Project?

The over 50s who access the club will benefit through increased mental wellbeing. It is anticipated that 80 people will access the dance and 52 the bus outing. The events are intended to get members out of their houses in a social setting to avoid them becoming lonely at home.

7. Fit With Local Partnership Priorities

This project contributes to strengthening social connections, by tackling social isolation in the over 50s. The club and the project are intended to improve health and wellbeing through their events and activities.

Get togethers encourage the older and slightly younger members to get together and extend the hand of friendship to everyone over the age of 50, with 30 years of success.

5. Description Of Project

To provide part funding of ice hire, permitting on ice activities for young persons to take place at Braehead Arena, the only facility available within a 30mile radius of Paisley. Seek assistance to meet approximately 8% of that total cost within a ring fence for ice costs. All other expenditure will be met from within its own resources.

NB Renfrewshire Council approved a motion to assist the club in developing an ice facility within the Paisley area, allowing all ice user clubs to thrive, which would preclude the need to apply for grant assistance (Braehead Arena - the most expensive facility in Scotland)

Encourage more people to watch/play ice hockey to promote healthier lifestyles

August 2020 Update

Following the postponement of the Spring round of Partnership meetings to allocate funds, the club took advice from agencies such as Engage Renfrewshire and Renfrewshire Council to apply to alternative sources for stop gap funding during the COVID 19 pandemic. However, the club was advised by agencies such as Resilience Funding, following completion of the subsequent application, that the club did not meet the criteria for support, while others such as the Glasgow Airport Flightpath Fund that they had similarly postponed consideration of applications, such as that which we had submitted, until a later date, meaning that the club had effectively been cut off from means of temporary support during the pandemic. Similarly, our participation in fund raising ventures such as local Gala Days were cut off as these were cancelled. The sport's governing body has temporarily put back the season's opening until October but while this is helpful in reducing outgoings for eg training facilities for the moment we have as yet been unable to purchase essential items such as new strips until we are able to forecast how much money we will have. Therefore, while the club, in appreciation of the similar circumstances facing other organisations, is not increasing the sum requested from the local Partnership(s), the sum requested has taken on an acute nature as any monies allocated will have to stretch somewhat further.

The club train and play their games in Renfrew, staging approximately 16-18 local events each year in the form September to April each year. Visiting supporters thus come to the area prior to matches and go into shops, visit the Town Centre, etc. The club participates in Renfrew Gala Day,

demonstrating its desire to be regarded as part of the local community.

The club's mascot, a seven foot tall cartoon figure known as Timbers is on display at the Gala Day walking around the site, having his picture taken with small children and other adults, and generally makes a positive contribution to the day's proceedings.

Moving Around & Connectivity/Strengthening Local Connections

As indicated, visiting supporters have the opportunity to visit the local town. On a local basis, residents of Renfrew can attend ice hockey on their doorstep and identify with 'their' local team, as well as form friendships and relationships with other supporters from neighbouring communities, such as the fairly new Ferry Village community. The club has helped make it possible to move around the locality in safety by promoting campaigns such as the Paisley Daily Express project which sought to remove knives from the streets. Players from the club were featured holding car stickers displaying that message, which were thereafter distributed to supporters and members of the local community. As well as weekly features in the Paisley Express during the season, we have our own website, 2436 Facebook Followers with 2415 Likes, 2303 Twitter Followers, 618 Instagram Followers and various other digital outlets within Renfrewshire such as What's on Renfrewshire etc

Maximising Economic Impact

With approximately 16-18 home matches per year, (typically attracting 200 to 420 people per game) the club helps generate more visitors to the local area (eg Braehead and Renfrew Town Centre), thus increasing footfall on those occasions. The creation of our Junior Development programme will ultimately lead to visiting teams attending the local area to fulfil fixtures, and further boost the economy of the local area.

Grant funding would mean participation remains affordable to all, providing sufficient ice time to allow players to progress their skills, partake in twice weekly physical activity and have a positive, healthy focus. The project aims to continue to offer junior ice hockey training to all who wish to participate, at an affordable cost which makes the club available to anyone who wishes to join the "Learn to Play" initiative. They learn the skills and drills of the game in an atmosphere of fun combined with the discipline a team sport offers. The project allows young people to keep fit and active , through training and games, combating obesity, building confidence and self esteem.

An unexpected and sharp rise in ice hire and security costs brought the hourly charge to £299.60, placing an even greater financial burden on the players' parents. Raising fees further again could result in a drop in numbers, meaning raising fees again in a negative spiral. This latest increase threatens the future of the club and further grant funding, along with already instituted higher fees and continued fundraising, will help secure the future of Renfrewshire's only grass-roots, junior ice hockey club. Ice hockey is a dynamic sport, promoting health and well-being, self-esteem, positivity, focus and firm friendships.

Although youngsters from all parts of Renfrewshire are involved, the majority are from Renfrew, Paisley and Erskine.

There are opportunities to play ice hockey, competitively and recreationally, from age 7 to 70+ and many of the original intake at the Lagoon in 1992 are still regularly playing/coaching and will continue to do so well into older age, keeping fit in body and mind. At present there are players in training who are playing with the Scotland and GB squads and many youngsters sitting on team benches throughout Scotland, including local SNL team Paisley Pirates. We have female players in Scotland Ladies, progressing their skills and training with others from around the country. One of our players is making quite a name for herself in goals in the England Ladies squad!

August 2020 Update

The latest communication from Braehead Arena is that the ice facility will reopen for use by hockey teams/clubs in November and that the season will run until April/May. I would therefore appreciate our application remaining in the mix. Should we be granted funding and circumstances force changes to the plans which would result in Braehead Junior Ice Hockey Club being unable to continue, any monies will be, of course, returned to the council without delay.

5. Description Of Project

We have commenced work to our premises totalling over 100k, transforming our building into a multi-sensory centre and creation of a community kitchen. We are seeking funding to employ a Youth Development Worker and associated costs to develop our In It Together focus using our new innovative space and equipment to maximise its use within Renfrew Town Centre. To develop mentor projects, after school sessions, school partnerships and securing funding to ensure the sustainability of the work. We will be using the new space and equipment as a catalyst to empower young people to participate fully in their local community.

Over the last 8 and a half years we have been working with the local community to develop ideas with and for them. Evidence from local research has highlighted that current mainstream provision of youth work in the area struggles to support young people with additional support needs. While not actively excluded, current services don't have the capacity to cope with the complex needs and challenging behaviour. Aiming to reduce social exclusion through the development of new relationships and the need for young people to be asked to leave a club, which instils feelings of rejection and anxiety.

The Youth development worker will develop 3 new projects per year using the multi-sensory equipment working with over 15 children per session, as detailed in the section below.

- Parents through developing a parents support project that meets monthly encouraging parents to share stories and strategies to help each other
- Children though developing school partnerships allowing children to use the multi-sensory space during the school day.
- Young people and community members with ASN and those without are encouraged to increase socialisation and develop positive peer relationships.
- Young people with additional support needs have access to an environment that allows them to feel confident and stress free.

Double The Fun! Is the only Twins Group in Renfrewshire. It reduces social isolation by providing a unique opportunity to spend time with other twin parents, and the chance to vent in a safe place with parents who understand the unique pressures they face.

The group is free and has been running every month since June 2018. This project increase the capacity of the group to accommodate more parents and their twins, as there is currently a waiting list for the group.

Double The Fun! was an initiative proposed by one of the mums supported who spoke of the stigma, isolation and lack of support being felt by parents of twins in Renfrewshire. This was after the loss of a Lochwinnoch Twins Group, which meant the closes group was now in East Kilbride. Other groups are usually created with 1:1 child parent ratios in mind. With the unusually large number of twins in Renfrewshire we opened up the group to the public and it has been hugely popular since.

5. Description Of Project

The Playbus Pilot evidenced how the Playbus improves health and well-being, literacy and numeracy skills and social interaction between children, teachers, parents and the community. The play-programme will allow for more children of Renfrew to benefit from the findings from the Playbus pilot which was carried out Nov/Dec 2019. More schools will engage with their own funding once more children are shown to have benefited from the experience.

The need has been identified by schools, nurseries and clubs by running a pilot. Head Teachers, teachers, parents and children have provided evidence to show improvement in their children's mental wellbeing with the use of the Playbus through the pilot study. The pilot found that 100% of parents attending with their children at after school clubs stated that they enjoyed the sessions and agreed that the Playbus was good for their children's mental and physical wellbeing. The pilot reported that 100% of parents who attended the out-reach toddler session said they would access this service again within the community. The toddler group helped parents build relationships with each other and offer each other support as well as building a relationship between families and school. The greatest evidence from Todholm's pilot is regular use of the playbus is helping children reach their full potential.

Playbus will deliver three programmes in Renfrew. These will be with:

- St James' Primary School
- Newmains Primary School
- Arkleston Primary School

These schools have all given their intent to work with the project.

The more schools that benefit from the project, the more groups will engage with their own funding. This allows the work to be sustainable in the community. A six-week arrangement will be made with the hosts of the play programmes. The centres will be given a topic to work with and report back on. The centre will be asked to work their parent and toddler community as well as the families of Renfrew.

The programme topics are:

- 1. Measuring the impact on health and wellbeing in the community.
- 2. Measuring the impact on communication in young people.
- 3. Measuring the impact on social skills of young people and their families.
- 4. Measuring the impact of community play in young people.
- 5. Measuring the impact on pre-school groups when connected with the community in early years.
- 6. Measuring the impact on social isolation with community play.

At the conclusion of the programme, Playbus will offer the Playbus into the community as a Community Play-Day with Playbus. This could be a Gala or a local event.

The expected outcomes for the children of Renfrew are increased self-confidence; increased activity levels; increased self-assurance; improved mental well-being; and improved social skills.

To provide the significant benefits of the PACE youth theatre and holiday activity experiences to young people with a genuine interest in drama and the performing arts, but who find themselves in financially challenging circumstances which would prevent them from joining or taking part in activities, or who cannot travel to Paisley town centre to take part.

The proposal is to deliver 8 projects within 6 of the local partnership areas throughout the summer school holidays. There will be 8 separate performances created across Renfrewshire, all of which will be rehearsed and performed in local community centres. Our aim is to generate vibrant and creative activity in community halls and hubs and to improve access to participation in each area.

One experienced theatre director from PACE would lead on the project, supported by two trainee practitioners. The team would work within each area (suggested level ages 8-11) for 4 days (5 hour session per day) to devise a unique, community inspired performance. Rehearsals will take place in local community centres which will hopefully alleviate travel barriers for young people wishing to take part. We would also like to be able to offer every participant a packed lunch for each day of the project.

5. Description Of Project

dates-n-mates Renfrewshire is the local branch of Scotland's national dating and friendship agency run by and for adults with learning disabilities. We specifically address social isolation and loneliness by providing local opportunities for members to connect, make friends and build meaningful relationships, thus improving health and wellbeing. Our monthly calendar of social events in and around Renfrew offers a safe, inclusive environment for people to meet and socialise. Members practice bus journeys and improve their social skills. Over time their self-confidence and independence increase and members start going out more outside dates-n-mates.

With 26,000 adults with learning disabilities in Scotland (including 692 in Renfrewshire), the Scottish Government's Learning Disability Strategy 'The Keys to Life' states that improving quality of life for people with learning disabilities is a priority. They are more prone to abuse and less likely to have opportunities to form relationships. The Scottish Government strategy 'A Connected Scotland', recognises 'people with learning disabilities – and their families – are at risk of experiencing social isolation throughout their lives.' Learning Disability Alliance Scotland's 2018 survey showed 80% of adults with learning disabilities feel lonely either sometimes (11%) or a lot (69%).

We will offer a programme of 6-8 social events per month in safe and inclusive local venues such as tribute nights in the Glynhill, meals out, walks in Robertson Park etc as well as in venues in other areas of Renfrewshire. In order to increase communication and relationship skills of members we will also offer regular informal workshops like 'What to Say After Hello' and 'Successful Dating'. Volunteers (both members and from the wider community) play a vital role in supporting dates-n-mates. Our 'Champions' scheme rewards member volunteers to share their views/ideas, help at events and act as 'Friendly Faces'.

We maintain up-to-date and accurate records about members, their participation in events/training and details of relationship/other support provided. Annual meetings with members help us monitor individuals' progress, increase in confidence, feeling happier, etc. We frequently gather feedback from members, volunteers and other stakeholders. Bi-monthly Coffee & Cake Committees provide a forum for members to express their views, opinions and ideas around dnm's activities. We also monitor stakeholder engagement over social media. Annual targets and milestones are set against each outcome. Progress is monitored and reported bi-monthly to the Board of C-Change Scotland.

August 2020 Update

In normal circumstances our monthly programme of social activities usually run in venues across this ward, including community facilities like Robertson Park and accessible pubs and restaurants such as the Glynhill and those at Braehead Soar. We issue a monthly programme of events and our staff and volunteers support members to interact with one another. We also provide informal

training such as 'What to say after Hello' and 'Successful Dating' and can even chaperone couples on dates. Members learn local journeys and support one another to get to/from events. Regular 'Open' events create opportunities for non-members, ie those who may be ineligible for membership, and the wider community to join in.

We hope that as current restrictions ease, we will be able to resume these face-to-face activities. However, since the imposition of the lockdown, dates-n-mates has developed a regular programme of online social activities and events to help our members and other members of the wider community retain the social contacts which are vital to the maintenance of good mental health.

These online activities give members the chance to talk to others, have some fun and helps them to improve their digital skills.

Our members now desire to get back to 'normal' but there is an increasing anxiety regarding the 'new normal' and what it will be. dates-n-mates is now therefore planning for coming out of lockdown in a way that allows these vulnerable people to stay safe but have the social interaction they so desperately need and want.

We wish to adapt the previous funding application to include this new way of supporting members.

We have developed and piloted a 'friendship matching' process, matching people with others who have similar likes and interests to enable them to meet up in smaller groups very locally, rather than joining larger groups (our normal process).

This new matching process will include researching database packages for profiling that will allow us to identify members with similar interests. From there we will facilitate online introductions by video to allow people to get to know each other and minimise any initial awkwardness when meeting in person. And, should Stage 4 of the Scottish Government release from lockdown process be further delayed (ie. permitting events and larger groups), it will allow members to have safe, local social interaction sooner than would otherwise be the case.

With this in mind, we want to implement a friendship matching service for our members in Renfrewshire to be piloted in August with wider roll-out from September. Our aim is to ensure that adults with learning disabilities in this ward have the opportunity to develop a very local friendship circle to support them at least until the current pandemic is over – and hopefully longer.

We will seek to recruit and train 2-4 local volunteer chaperones to assist members with the initial 'getting to know you' phase of each small, local friendship circle and to help with safeguarding these vulnerable adults.

With this in mind, we would still ask for £2,500 as a contribution towards the costs of running dates-n-mates Renfrew this year.

5. Description Of Project

Following a pilot scheme, completed in 2019 the scheme will become permanent in 2020.

The project purpose is to provide a counselling service for children across Renfrewshire aged 5 -15 yrs to complement the already counselling services available at The Wynd.

Between 1st March – 30th May 2019, 13 children have been supported as a result of this Play Therapy Pilot project. This pilot scheme established that Issues behind initial referrals have been due to, social isolation, bullying, social anxiety, bereavement, anger-management and social anxiety specifically due to a diagnosis of Autism. The pilot was funded by "Go for It" which established the need for this type of counselling.

The Wynd centre has been running a nationally recognised Counselling service since The Centre was established in 1984 and there is already bespoke premises for this purpose. Additional funding is required to modify the premises and purchase equipment for this specific age group and engage part time staff responsible to the Counselling Manager. This area of activity will complete the total range of counselling services provided by nationally qualified Counsellors.

Anticipated outcomes are to improve the Strength and Difficulties Scores (SDQs) and to increase the available spaces in order to reduce the current waiting list.

6. Who Benefits From The Project?

Children and young people aged 5-15 years who require counselling will benefit from this project.

Renfrewshire Connected Champions Project will take place between 21th May 2020 and 27th March 2021.

The Connectedness Champions Project will raise awareness of social isolation and how to build connections in the community. Because loneliness is so personal, it's often seen as a private feeling, but we have learned that it is something that can be addressed.

Between October 2017 and March 2018 ACUMEN and RAMH carried out research on social connectedness within Renfrewshire. The highest loneliness scores came from those who identified mental health problems as being a barrier to social connectedness.

The research identified the importance of providing information on local services, including formal and informal peer support to build people's confidence in accessing services. The report went on to note that one of the key aspirations for individuals was to form relationships which were epitomised by 'greater intimacy' (more meaningful). This led to the creation of Renfrewshire Connectedness Champions Project.

It's clear that loneliness affects children, young people and families in Scotland. In the past loneliness was sometimes seen as a problem for older people

Within the identified Local Partnerships we will deliver Generations Working Together Workshops with pupils, this allows them to discuss issues affecting them and take part in specialist-run workshops it is extremely important for young people to feel they have a voice and are included and empowered to look at social isolation the perceived stigma around loneliness and promote the concept of a supportive, non-judgemental community.

RCCP will deliver the same themed workshops working with teachers.

If we are to begin to tackle the issue of loneliness in children, young people and families in the community, then there is a role for each and every one of us.

We want pupils to speak about their feelings, to feel they have a voice and are included and empowered to look at social isolation the perceived stigma around loneliness and promote the concept of a supportive, non-judgemental community.

Pupils who will be part of the workshops delivered by RAMH in Renfrew; Paisley North West &

5. Description Of Project

Renfrew Association of Growers and Gardeners (RAGG) would like to develop a programme of activities and a calendar of events within the community garden during the school holidays Ranging from- cooking classes, arts and crafts, woman's gardening group, men's gardening group and a youth gardening group.

The RAGG development Officer will develop and facilitate group activities with support from volunteers. We aim for our activities to be open to the whole community but we also want to provide specific gender and age appropriate groups, such as the woman's gardening group and youth group. We aim for the Cooking classes and the Arts & Craft classes to be mixed and open to all.

The need has been identified by a trial run last year where we held some group activities in the garden without 'marketing' it. Numbers were constant and feedback was to have a more structured and advertised calendar of groups and activities that local people and groups could "sign- up for." Feedback sheets identified that activities did not necessarily need to be garden/planting orientated but bringing in more social activities such as the arts and crafts would be good. The kids/ young persons group identified that they wanted to be more structured and take ownership of their group which we supported. They fundraised and raised £90 towards activities for their group which included a day outing to Kelburn Castle. This is something we would like to continue to do. Parents From the kids club became volunteers at the garden.

The Development worker will work alongside the Community gardener, garden committee and volunteers to develop a calendar of activities. It was recognised that there was insufficient numbers to make a pipe band available to service the local British Legion and veteran community event, eg Remembrance Sunday. REEM operates a Drop-In Centre, recognized within the community as an impartial access point. A place people feel comfortable approaching for advice and advocacy. We see a wide range of people from different cultures with their own unique barriers, situations and needs. The centre is already helping a lot of people and the demand of the project has been overwhelming. There is a need to keep the centre 5 days a week due to demand. Funding is needed to cover basic running costs.

When various ethnic minorities leave their home countries they are faced with new customs and ways of doing things. They struggle to cope with life changing events without the support of family and friends and with no one to speak to within their new community. They do not interact for several reasons, including trust issues, language difficulties or religious belief.

The project was initiated by a group of people who themselves went through a similar phase and are aware of the need.

There are scheduled information clinics, in addition to staying open 5 days a week for people who need to be listened to one-on one. The centre serves as a first point of contact for people from immigrant communities. It is used by a variety of people including families, students, workers, asylum seekers and refugees; some of whom have little grasp of English while others need a translator to communicate at all. We provide some much needed training; including ESOL, job matters, & awareness on other issues, helping with housing, tackling racism, giving advice with Brexit and tackling isolation.

We follow up with volunteers progression into training and work. Many users continue to feedback with updates when they go ahead to get jobs, get accommodation or increase their participation in the community in any other ways.

6. Who Benefits From The Project?

The ethnic minority service users will have a chance to engage within the wider community in Paisley and Renfrew. The project will help local BME communities and volunteers feel less isolated and more able to participate in the wider society and want to be part of it. Volunteers will receive training to allow them to develop their skills which will enhance their employability skills.

We have spoken to members of the now defunct Paisley Attic Folk Club who have offered support in shaping the event to ensure it has a 'Danny' feel to it. (This is something we want to re-establish)

There will be a series of events running for a week which will be an eclectic mix of music performances, workshops and open stages.

At festivals, Danny frequently established what he called Geezabreak clubs, to encourage emerging performers. This theme will be included in the programme to celebrate Danny's ethos of finding new talent. There will be a mixture of arts events including Music, Art, Dance, Drama and Food in a number of venues throughout Paisley and Renfrew.

Lamont Farm offers a wide variety of services to various groups and organisations within the local area and further afield, work experience placements are provided to jobcentres, high schools, community service, kibble project and many more.

The farm provides hands on experience for over 40 children who wish to pursue a career in animal care and veterinary practice, educational workshops are ran throughout the year for primary schools, nurseries and visitors.

August 2020 Update

There are no amendments to what our project hopes to achieve, or to how we will run it. However with the effects of Covid-19 it is more critical than ever that we receive funding from all possible sources.

Due to the nature of our project and the contact with the public we had to make the difficult decision to close mid-March, even before an official lockdown was announced, to minimise any risk to either the public or to our volunteers. We had to cease all activities with our Kids Clubs (junior volunteers) and reduce any volunteering from adults to a bare minimum of one volunteer plus a member of management each day, with these adults working at a social distance throughout the time.

We were closed for 15 weeks, losing an average donation of £150 per week or more, as the spring and summer months generally are our busiest months, especially at the weekends. Even now, although we have been able to reopen, we have had to keep two days closure to allow for a deep clean, to ensure the maximum safety of all volunteers and visitors. Normally the donations would have increased during these times due to school and nursery summer holidays, but we feel that safety is of the utmost importance.

Also there have been increased costs incurred, as disinfecting has been increased and PPE for volunteers has been purchased.

Now that we have reopened we are receiving very positive feedback in that we are providing a safe place and activity for people far and wide to assist them firstly venturing away from home and also to increasing the possibilities of children being able to have contact with animals and other children without having to fear contracting Covid-19. We are providing an affordable day out for families (no entry fee) to allow anyone who may be struggling through or after furlough or after redundancy due to Coronavirus.

People of all ages from Renfrewshire can access Lamont Farm. It offers volunteering and work experience opportunities to organisations such as Schools, RAMH, Spark of Genius, Kibble School and west College's adults with additional support needs.

The project was initiated by a group of people who themselves went through a similar phase and are aware of the need.

REEM will arrange activities and events aimed at promoting Black History Month among ethnic minorities and the wider community in Renfrewshire organizing workshops in Renfrewshire schools promoting Black History Month and also organising activities that will lead up to the event in November.

The ethnic minorities will have a chance to engage within the wider community. The project will help people feel less isolated and more able to participate in the wider society and want to be part of it. Many volunteers progress into training and work.

6. Who Benefits From The Project?

Local BME communities, the wider Paisley and Renfrew communities and schools will particularly benefit through sharing culture and raising awareness of Black History Month. The Community Planning Partnership's Diversity and Equality Alliance Renfrewshire (DEAR) Group has picked Black History Month as one of the key equality anchor events for 2020.

7. Fit With Local Partnership Priorities

This project will contribute to strengthening social connections through bringing people together. It should also make the most of public assets through the event and associated workshops.

5. Description Of Project

Oakshaw Trinity Friendly Hour – Transport will take place between 6th October 2020 and 4th May 2021.

The purpose of the project is to provide transport to and from the Friendly Hour for members. We provide an afternoon of friendship and fellowship that allows the members to meet and develop their friendships. Entertainment and social activities are provided on a weekly basis from October to May.

Entertainment includes children from a Nursery, 2 Primary and 1 Secondary Schools, as well as entertainment provided by Adults. We also have the Community Police and Musical Exercises Members also have a much-appreciated cup of tea or coffee and goodies.

The programme includes a Christmas Lunch and an Annual Outing.

The Committee identified many members would be unable to attend our weekly meeting without provision of transport. Many of our members live alone and the Friendly Hour is the only time they may see other people. It gives them the opportunity of mixing socially, allowing them to chat and at the same time give them some entertainment avoiding an afternoon of loneliness and isolation. Our average age is over 85 and many are quite infirm. There is a greater need for these people to be transported to a happy and lively environment for a few hours on a weekly basis.

By providing transport we are reaching out to people in the communities who may not be able to get out — in some cases this is the only outing of the week. We are able to bring them into a group where they get friendship and fellowship. We must remember that many people experience loneliness and isolation and many don't have the opportunity for conversation. They welcome the joy of sharing a story or a sing-a-long and hearing news from the communities.

6. Who Benefits From The Project?

The project will benefit men and women over the age of 60 from Gleniffer, Renfrew, Paisley North West and Central and Paisley East local partnerships.

7. Fit With Local Partnership Priorities

The project meets local priority of strengthening social connections as it will provide an opportunity for group member's to have transportation to and from the Friendly Hour meeting where they are able to mix socially, chat and at the same time experience some entertainment. In this group many form friendships and fellowships. It may also contribute to

connectivity.

8. Breakdown of Costs

The total cost of the project is £1,500. The group has also applied for funding to Gleniffer, Paisley North West and Central and Paisley East local partnerships.

The group has applied for funding to all 7 Local Partnerships. They are applying for £3,985 in total across 7 Local Partnerships with £570 from each.

5. Description Of Project

We are the only agility club within Renfrewshire that has a permit to host kennel club shows and thus represent the West of Scotland within the greater dog agility community. The Kennel Club have introduced new standards for agility equipment to benefit canine health and safety. It is essential that we have equipment that meets these standards to host kennel club shows, maintain a safe training environment and provide affordable training to current and prospective members.

Last year, the Kennel club announced a new standard for several pieces of equipment to be introduced this year and next year, including jumps and the dog walk. For the health and wellbeing of the dogs, heights for the jumps and dog walk have been lowered. We require new equipment to meet these standards while keeping our fees affordable.

New equipment will allow us to host Kennel Club shows and train more safely. We will obtain quotes from agility suppliers for equipment that meets the new Kennel Club regulations. In addition, we will recruit local trade people to adjust our current equipment, thereby helping to keep our fees affordable and supporting local business.

An anticipated outcome for the project is that we can hold Kennel Club shows in September, thereby representing Renfrewshire within the greater dog agility community.

6. Who Benefits From The Project?

The project will benefit dog agility community in Renfrewshire & Greater Glasgow.

7. Fit With Local Partnership Priorities

A fit with the Renfrew Local Partnership priorities is not clear.

1. Summary

- 1.1 Renfrew YMCA has previously secured building funds to develop a multi-sensory centre for use by all age groups in Renfrew.
- 1.2 After the closing date for applications for Local Partnership funding in March 2020, Renfrew YMCA were informed by contractors that an additional £13,325 of work on roof beams of the building is necessary to maintain its structural safety.
- 1.3 Due to the unforeseen nature of the additional costs, the Chair of Renfrew Local Partnership has agreed that the request for additional funding from Renfrew Common Good be presented to the Local Partnership for consideration. The application summary is presented below.

2.1 IT is recommended that Renfrew Local Partnership consider the additional application for Renfrew Common Good funding by Renfrew YMCA.

5. Description Of Project

Renfrew YMCA secured funding to undertake renovation work to our building in Canal Lane, we are developing the space into a multi-sensory centre to support children and young people with and without additional support needs, and we are also installing a community kitchen. The completed work will allow the YMCA to be open to all community members and be a community hub. When undertaking the work we have came up against completely unseen costings, once the celling was taken down we have found that our beams holding the roof up are structurally unsafe.

We had secured all funds required for the build, renovation and decoration of the YMCA as well as a contingency for issues that may occur but there was no way to know that we had imagined there would need to be over £13,000 extra work to the roof, adding new beams and the building costs relating to this. We need to make the building structurally safe in order to open the building again.

Renfrew will have Renfrewshires only multi sensory centre that has state of the art sensory equipment that can be used by all ages

Young people with additional support needs will be further integrated into the YMCA

Development of a community kitchen

6. Who Benefits From The Project?

- Parents through developing a parents support project that meets monthly encouraging parents to share stories and strategies to help each other
- Children though developing school partnerships allowing children to use the multi-sensory space during the school day.
- Young people and community members with ASN and those without are encouraged to increase socialisation and develop positive peer relationships.
- Young people with additional support needs have access to an environment that allows them to feel confident and stress free.

7. Fit With Local Partnership Priorities

This building work will meet the priority areas: Bringing Renfrew Town Centre to life, Making the most of public assets, Strengthening social connections. We are a town centre organisation this building work will allow us to develop more events and activities every day of the week. We will be developing needs led projects for the community taking isolation for all ages. Our building is a key asset to so many people of Renfrew and we are needing to get opened back up again to start supporting the community.

Renfrew School Outdoor Recreational Equipment

1. Summary

- 1.1 Renfrew has four primary schools and two secondary schools. Encouraging the physical activity of young people at school contributes to good physical and mental health and fits with the Renfrew Local Partnership priorities of Strengthening Social Connections and Making The Most of Public Assets.
- 1.2 A practical way of making the most of our public assets in Renfrew and encouraging the strengthening of social connections in young people is to invest in improving outdoor recreation equipment at school sites for use by school pupils and the wider community.
- 1.3 Renfrew Local Partnership has previously ringfenced funds for the development of Robertson Park and an Underpass lighting and mural project as a proactive way of addressing Renfrew Local Partnership priorities. It is now proposed that Renfrew Local Partnership ringfence funding and make this available to the fund-raising bodies for each school, e.g. a Parent Council, to enhance outdoor recreational equipment within the playground/yard of each of the six schools.
- 1.4 The sum proposed to be made available for use within each school would be £3,500 (total £21,000).

2. Recommendations

2.1 It is recommended that Renfrew Local Partnership ringfence a sum of £21,000 (£3,500 per school) and make this available for use within the six schools in Renfrew to purchase and install outdoor recreational equipment.

St James Primary School

Newmains Primary School

Renfrew High School

Trinity High School

3.2 Renfrew Local Partnership has agreed the following priorities related to this proposal:

Making The Most Of Public Assets

The Local Partnership wants to see the maximum use of public resources, such as parks and outdoor spaces, as well as maximising the use of buildings in the community.

Strengthening Social Connections

Improving social connections and tackling social isolation is a key theme for the Local Partnership, and the Partnership recognise this affects all ages, including younger and older people. Community events and activities are important, as will be a focus on improving health and wellbeing locally.
