Prior to the commencement of the meeting, the Chair intimated that this meeting of the Local Partnership would be recorded and that the recording would be available to watch on the Council's website.

APOLOGIES

DECLARATIONS OF INTEREST

There were no declarations of interest intimated prior to the meeting.

1 MINUTE OF PREVIOUS MEETING

There was submitted the Minute of the meeting of this Local Partnership held on 16 June 2021.

DECIDED: That the Minute be approved.

2 ROAR SOCIAL INCLUSION PROJECT

The Chief Executive ROAR Connections for Life provided a verbal update relative to the project being undertaken by ROAR Connections for Life /Renfrewshire Health & Social Care Partnership within the local Partnership area in respect of loneliness and social isolation.

It was highlighted that the Local Partnership had previously agreed that Social Connections was a key priority for the Partnership. During the update members were provided with definitions of loneliness and isolation, made aware of the impact of these experiences and advised of the principal reasons for establishment of the project at this time. The role and priorities of the Project Worker posts were outlined in detail. A summary of activities undertaken and planned were provided.

The opportunity was taken to introduce the two new Connectedness Project workers, Lesley Drummond and Gillian Thomson, to members of the Local Partnership and to disseminate their contact details.

DECIDED: That the update be noted.

3 YOU DECIDE

G Hannah, Infrastructure, Transportation & Change Manager (Renfrewshire Council) gave a presentation relative to the Community Investment Fund, a participatory budgeting initiative, via which £1.2 million of Roads Capital Investment Programme funding had been made available, over a 3-year period, for local residents to suggest and then determine.

The You Decide initiative, would act as the process by which local communities would determine which potential projects would be prioritised and progressed. The process provided local communities with a key-role in the decision-making process and the Council with a better understanding of community priorities.

A summary of the scope of the Fund was provided, together with details of the next stages of the process and the anticipated timescales involved.

The presentation outlined the community engagement undertaken to date. It was highlighted that key community sites had been used, including supermarkets, libraries, leisure centres to undertake the Roadshows to ensure inclusiveness. Details of the marketing strategy undertaken in respect of the engagement process were also provided. It was noted that the creation of a specific Council webpage had also

provided an opportunity to submit ideas for projects. The Local Partnership was informed that to date 96 project ideas had been received across the Paisley East area and examples of the nature of projects proposed was provided.

DECIDED: That the presentation be noted.

4 COMMUNITIES HEALTH AND WELLBEING FUND

S Miller (Engage Renfrewshire) made a short presentation relative to the Communities, Health and Wellbeing Fund.

The Local Partnership was advised that nationally £15 million had been made available to provide significant investment into community support for adults, building on the children and young people's community wellbeing supports currently being rolled out across Scotland via the Communities, Mental Health and Wellbeing Fund. The Fund would be locally focused, work with local partners and strong connections with community groups. The allocation for Renfrewshire was £509,542. A summary of the Fund aims and the criteria for funding was provided. Engage Renfrewshire was the point of contact for enquiries, applications, delivery of grant monies and monitoring. It was planned that the 2021/22 funding would be fully allocated by the end of the financial year. It was highlighted during the presentation that an appropriate 'light touch' application process would be adopted to facilitate access to the fund, that proposed grant awards would range between £10,000 and under and larger grants, of around £50,000. In addition, it was noted that there was potential for the award of smaller amounts to non-constituted groups. The local application processes would be open by 30th November 2021.

DECIDED: That the content of the presentation be noted.

5 HAWKHEAD ROAD TRAFFIC

The Convener proposed that consideration of this matter be continued to the next meeting of the Local Partnership. This was agreed.

DECIDED: That consideration of the matter be continued to the next meeting of the Local Partnership.

6 BUDGET MONITORING REPORT

There was submitted a report by the Chief Executive relative to the funding allocated by the Paisley East Local Partnership to local community groups to undertake projects during 2021/22.

The report advised that the 2021/22 budget allocated from the General Fund, the Paisley Common Good Fund and monies carried forward from 2020/21 of £68,142.95 for this Local Partnership had been awarded to local groups. An appendix to the report detailed the distribution of funds made at the meeting of the Local Partnership held on 16 June 2021.

In addition, it was highlighted that funding of £24,095 had been available for projects to benefit young people through the Celebrating Renfrewshire Fund. The results of awards made through the Celebrating Renfrewshire participatory budgeting process from the Paisley East budget would be circulated to members of the Local Partnership when available.

DECIDED: That the report be noted.

7 **PRE-BUDGET ALLOCATION WORKSHOP MEETING**

There was submitted a report by the Chief Executive relative to the proposed adoption of an agreed process to assist the future allocation of Local Partnership budget.

The report indicated that during discussion regarding the allocation of grant funding at the meeting of this Local Partnership held on 16 June 2021, it had been proposed that, in future, a process be agreed for allocating the Local Partnership budget prior to the meeting. This proposed course of action, which involved convening a pre-budget allocation workshop, would enable members of the Local Partnership to explore options for taking budget decisions and have clear agreement on a structured process for discussion. In addition, it would enable members to agree the criteria that they wished to apply to the decision-making process and identify options for dealing with any excess in the value of applications in excess of the available funds. It was noted that in the case of other Local Partnerships, the convening of a pre-budget allocation workshop facilitated looking at options to set a maximum award to organisations and an appropriate percentage figure to apply to any approach to pro rata applications. As part of the process, Council officers also contacted applicants and discussed what impact these financial options would have on the proposed project, thereby providing the Local Partnership with better information to make decisions. It was highlighted that Paisley East Local Partnership would have flexibility to choose its own options to discuss.

DECIDED:

(a) That it be agreed that a budget workshop meeting be held, prior to the main 2022/23 grant allocation Local Partnership meeting to consider, discuss and agree a process to guide discussion at the Local Partnership meeting; and

(b) That the date and time of the budget workshop meeting be communicated to members of Paisley East Local Partnership following the receipt and processing of applications for 2022/23 funding.

Paisley East Local Partnership Budget Monitoring Report

1. Summary

- 1.1 Paisley East Local Partnership provides funding to community groups to undertake projects. This funding is allocated from the General Grant Fund and, through a Participating Budgeting exercise known as Celebrating Renfrewshire, the Youth Challenge Fund.
- 1.2 A table setting out the funds allocated by Paisley East Local Partnership in 2021/22 and current budget position is attached as an appendix to this report.
- 1.3 The Celebrating Renfrewshire Fund for Paisley East Local Partnership allocated £21,595 of its budget of £24,095 to nine projects. The remaining unallocated budget of £2,500 will be carried forward to 2022/23. Work is ongoing with five projects to complete the draw down of Celebrating Renfrewshire awards made in 2021/22.

Applications for Local Partnership Funding To Paisley East Local Partnership 2022/23

1. Summary

- 1.1 Applications for grant funding from the seven Local Partnership areas were invited to be submitted during March and April 2022, to be considered at the Local Partnership meetings due to be held in June 2022.
- 1.2 The available allocation for Paisley East Local Partnership for 2022/23 is £64,527 made up of £52,247 from the General Fund, £11,820 from Paisley Common Good Fund and £460 brought forward from the 2021/22 General Fund budget.
- 1.3 From this total budget, a sum of £50 per community representative requires to be ringfenced for potential claim of expenses. These expenses are deducted from the available allocation for the Local Partnership. Paisley East Local Partnership has space for eleven community members, so the total ringfenced for expenses is £550. **The total budget available for allocation by Paisley East Local Partnership is therefore £63,977.**
- 1.4 The total value of applications for funding received is £101,924.65.
- 1.5 The Youth Challenge Fund component of Paisley East Local Partnership Funding for 2022/23 is £24,095, with an additional £2,500 brought forward from 2021/22. The total available spend for Celebrating Renfrewshire in Paisley East for 2022/23 is therefore £26,595. This funding will be allocated by young people through a Participatory Budgeting exercise that will take place during autumn 2022.

2. Recommendations

2.1 It is recommended that members of Paisley East Local Partnership consider the applications for Local Partnership grant funding, as set out below in Appendix 1 and 2.

3. Background

3.1 Applicants for funding in 2022/23 have been provided with guidance, as well as a description of the Local Priorities identified by Paisley East Local Partnership.

3.2 Local Partnership members are asked to consider the applications for funding summarised at Appendix 1 and 2 of this report, and to assess these against the Local Priorities agreed by Paisley East.

3.3 An initial assessment has been carried out by officers to support Local Partnership members in their decision-making. Where applications have made clear reference to the Local Priorities identified by the Local Partnership, this is identified in the first table at Appendix 1. Applications that make a partial or no reference to Paisley East Local Priorities are summarised in the second table – for example, the project may tackle social isolation (and therefore meet the Local Priority around social isolation) but not deliver this directly in the Local Partnership area or make reference to how many people from the area would be engaged in the project.

3.4 The priorities of Paisley East Local Partnership are:

Exploring the impact of new housing developments

The Local Partnership want to explore how they influence planning decisions around new developments, and make sure that the infrastructure is in place to support these developments, for example, roads, schools and nurseries. They want to explore how community benefits might be used to support this.

Supporting social connections

The Local Partnership want to support social connections to tackle isolation and promote mental health and wellbeing. They want to see groups in the local area working together, swapping skills and sharing resources.

Community pride and safety

The Local Partnership want to see the care and maintenance of their spaces across their area, so they are clean, safe and attractive spaces. They want to see these spaces used to promote good wellbeing across the area.

Tackling food poverty

The Local Partnership wants to tackle food poverty in the area to ensure that people are able to access supplies of food where they need it. As part of this, the Local Partnership wants to see a reduction in the amount of usable surplus food wasted and the sustainable use of resources to be key features of work to tackle food poverty.

This year we have recruited an overseas coach from South Africa with First Class experience to lead our coaching programme.

What will the project do?

The club still believes that we and the wider community is in the process of recovering from the pandemic and we feel that sport in general is pivotal to this. The club is already a community orientated organisation is well placed to act as a community hub. In the post pandemic atmosphere, cricket offers a safe, outdoor and sociable way for people to participate in sport and there is plenty of opportunity for those who don't play, to use the club as place to meet and enjoy the social aspects and atmosphere of club life.

Exploring the impact of new housing developments - With the many new housing developments in Paisley East, there are a lot of new families moving to the area. Offering our junior and senior training free of charge will allow those new to community to have somewhere to meet and experience community life in the Paisley area. We also intend to approach the housebuilders building in the Hawkhead Road area with a viewing discussing how we could tie up with them to offer open days/taster sessions.

Food Poverty - The club would look to arrange provision of healthy lunches for all children who participate in a free summer camp. The club has also noted is that this year we can contribute to this priority indirectly. With the current cost of living crisis driving up household bills and food prices, our provision of free activities is a great way of allowing people to offset these increased costs in some way and would also break down the cost

barrier as a reason for not taking part in cricket.

Supporting Social Connections - Team sport is a driver of both physical and mental health, especially in younger age groups. Participation in our programmes can give children, young people and adults the opportunity to begin playing a new sport and the opportunity to feel part of something bigger. Extending to the wider community, developing sporting connections will give families a place to meet and interact, and the social aspects of the club helps to give a feeling of belonging amongst isolated individuals throughout the community.

We are a major contributor to the wellbeing of the area; our social membership increased as many people benefited from using the ground for recreation during the pandemic and joined us as members after experiencing club life. We have spent £2500 improving the nets & training facilities. This will give members and the local community the opportunity to take advantage of the best cricket facilities in Renfrewshire. By connecting with the wider community the club expects to become a source of community pride beyond that of just the membership.

Dampness has been an issue for several years, but resources had been focussed on piecemeal roof repairs. A damaging woodworm outbreak in 2019 highlighted the need to eliminate other sources of dampness. After several pieces of render fell off, we obtained quotations for its repair, which brought to light the fact that the condition of the render was a major source of the dampness and the whole building required re-rendering. Renewal of the windows was also urgently needed and was done last year, resulting in further damage to the loose render.

Purpose of the project

With a lack of counselling available for secondary school pupils in the area, we are looking to expand our counselling service to help 13-17 year olds with one-on-one free counselling.

Unfortunately our Child Play counsellors and adult counsellors are unable to see these children as in counselling 13-17 year olds are seen as a separate category which is 'adolescent'. We have regrettably had to inform a number of parents after making an enquiry about this and several of them have commented on the lack of support for the age range in the area.

What will the project do?

Whilst running our adult counselling service as a donation-led service and our Child Play Therapy service for 5-12 year olds which is free, we noticed a gap for 13-17 year olds where we have received dozens of enquiries.

Counselling for 13-17 year olds cannot be covered by a child counsellor or adult counsellor as the cut-off is 12 years old and 18 years old respectively. We therefore informed them we are unable to assist and there are very few options elsewhere.

We are looking to send two counsellors on 'adolescent counselling' training.

This will be one of the only services in the area that will facilitate secondary school

children for counselling and ensure them a safe space outside of school where they can speak to a trained counsellor.

Due to the specific demand for children this age we have received in the last few months, we believe this will be a worthwhile project. We are liaising with Counselling & Psychotherapy in Scotland (COSCA) in terms of the specific counselling courses which would be best but we are looking to put two counsellors through the training.

We are based in the centre of Paisley, and this will benefit teenagers who are needing counsellor from all areas in the town. To begin with we are looking to train two counsellors who are already fully trained in adult counselling and child play therapy. Schools are struggling to cope with the rise of pupils suffering mental health issues and the number of outside bodies which specialise in the area is small so we are looking to not only help the child but build relationships with institutions to grow the number of children we can help.
