DECLARATIONS OF INTEREST

There were no declarations of interest intimated prior to the commencement of the meeting.

1 **WELCOME AND INTRODUCTIONS**

Councillor Adam-McGregor opened the meeting by extending a welcome to everyone present. She invited members, the Community Planning partner, and Renfrewshire Council officers to introduce themselves and to advise their role at meetings.

DECIDED: To note the welcome and introductions.

2 **APPOINTMENT OF VICE-CHAIR**

Councillor Adam-McGregor advised that, in terms of the Standing Orders for Local Partnerships, a community representative could be appointed as Vice-chair and called for nominations.

Councillor Adam-McGregor proposed that Susan McDonald (Active Communities) be appointed as Vice-chair. There being no other nominations, this appointment was agreed unanimously.

DECIDED: That Susan McDonald (Active Communities) be appointed Vice-chair.

3 **MINUTE OF PREVIOUS MEETING**

The Minute of the meeting of Paisley East, Ralston, Hawkhead and Lochfield, Hunterhill & Charleston Local Partnership held on 24 January 2019 was submitted and approved.

DECIDED: That the Minute be approved.

4 **CODE OF CONDUCT/REGISTER OF INTERESTS**

The Head of Corporate Governance provided information about the adoption of a Code of Conduct for Devolved Public Bodies that set out standards of behaviour that could be applied to members, given that their role would include the allocation of public funds. The Code of Conduct would require community representatives to register their interests and to declare those interests at meetings. In this way, business conducted by the Local Partnership, which was not part of the formal Board structure of Renfrewshire Council, would be open and transparent. It was noted that Councillors held a statutory duty to adhere to the Code of Conduct for Councillors and already had a Register of Interests in place.

Copies of the Code of Conduct and the Register of Interest forms were made available at the meeting and members were asked to return the form to the Head of Corporate Governance by no later than 7 May 2019.

DECIDED:

(a) That it be agreed that the Code of Conduct for Devolved Public Bodies be adopted for this Local Partnership; and

(b) That it be agreed that community representatives appointed as members of this Local Partnership sign up to the Register of Interests and the Register of Interest

forms be returned to the Head of Corporate Governance by no later than 7 May 2019.

5 KEY LOCAL PRIORITIES

A presentation was delivered by the Strategic Partnerships and Inequalities Manager, the Development Plans and Housing Strategy Team Leader and the Community Capacity Development Officer, Engage Renfrewshire, relative to identifying common matters that were important to people in the area and setting local priorities for improvement. It was envisaged that, once identified, these local priorities would be used to target resources and improvement actions.

The presentation, together with a Local Profile providing background information, detailed key facts about the population; children in low income families; access, health and crime deprivation; children and education; parks and play areas; health resources; care homes, extra care and sheltered housing specific to this Local Partnership area.

Based on the information provided, members worked in groups to identify and set local priorities for the area. After discussion, the following key themes and priorities were identified (in no order of importance):

- New housing being built in area - improving infrastructure, schools and roads around the new build;
- Social Connections – improving mental health, reducing misuse of drugs, preventing loneliness, improving community connections;
- Community Pride and Safety – improving green spaces, improving communal spaces, making spaces attractive and safe; and understanding Local Assets/Organisations and connecting them – working together to share resources.

Based on these key themes and discussion at the meeting, the Strategic Partnerships and Inequalities Manager advised that a draft copy of the key themes and local priorities identified would be circulated to members of the Local Partnership.

DECIDED:

- (a) That the key themes and local priorities identified for this Local Partnership be approved;
- (b) That a draft copy of the key themes and local priorities be circulated to members of the Local Partnership prior to the next meeting; and
- (c) That it be agreed that a copy of the draft priorities be made available in CD format.

6 LOCAL PARTNERSHIP - FUTURE ARRANGEMENTS

There was submitted a report by the Chief Executive relative to the name of this Local Partnership and arrangements to be put in place for future meetings. It was noted that community representatives could claim expenses of £50 per annum, from Local Partnership funds, for attendance at meetings.

DECIDED:

- (a) That it be agreed that the next meeting of the Local Partnership be held at 6.00

pm on 25 June 2019 in Paisley Marriage Suite;

(b) That further meetings of the Local Partnership be held in November 2019 and March/April 2020 with a wider community engagement event to take place during September/October 2019;

(c) That it be agreed that future meetings of the Local Partnership be held within the Paisley Marriage Suite;

(d) That suggestions for an alternative name for this Local Partnership be notified to communityplanning@renfrewshire.gov.uk by no later than 7 May 2019;

(e) That the arrangements for community representative expenses, as detailed in the report, be noted.

1. Summary

- 1.1 In response to the call for suggestions for alternative names and venues for meeting for the Local Partnership one suggestion was received, which was to name the Local Partnership as Paisley East.
- 1.2 The Youth Challenge element of Paisley East, Ralston, Hawkhead & Lochfield, Hunterhill and Charleston Local Partnership funding will be agreed through a Participatory Budgeting exercise for young people that will take place during August and September 2019. The outcome will be reported to the next meeting of the Local Partnership in November 2019.
- 1.3 A community conference event for Paisley East, Ralston, Hawkhead & Lochfield, Hunterhill and Charleston Local Partnership will take place during September/October 2019. The next meeting of the Local Partnership will take place in November 2019. The date and venue of the conference and the Local Partnership will be notified to Local Partnership members in June 2019.
- 1.4 At the last meeting of the Partnership it was agreed that community representatives appointed as Members would sign up to the Register of Interests and Members were requested that the Register of Interest forms be returned to the Head of Corporate Governance by no later than 7 May 2019.

2. Recommendations

- 2.1 It is recommended that, Paisley East, Ralston, Hawkhead & Lochfield, Hunterhill and Charleston Local Partnership:
- (a) Consider the proposal that the name of the Local Partnership be Paisley East Local Partnership.
 - (a) Note the arrangements for the Youth Participatory Budgeting exercise and informing local members of Paisley East, Ralston, Hawkhead & Lochfield, Hunterhill and Charleston conference and Local Partnership arrangements for autumn 2019.

3. Key Issues For Consideration

Name of Local Partnership

- 3.1 Members of Paisley East, Ralston, Hawkhead & Lochfield, Hunterhill and Charleston Local Partnership were invited at the meeting in March 2019 to submit by 7 May 2019 suggestions for the name of the Local Partnership and meeting venues going forward.

Schedule of Meetings

- 3.2 Paisley East, Ralston, Hawkhead & Lochfield, Hunterhill and Charleston Local Partnership agreed at its meeting in March 2019 that a conference event would be held in the area in order to engage with community groups, voluntary organisations and members of the public who are not represented formally on the Partnership, to take place during autumn 2019. The next meeting of the Local Partnership will take place in November 2019.

Youth Challenge Funding

- 3.3 Each Local Partnership receives a proportionate share of the Youth Challenge budget, which funds projects and activities benefiting young people up to age 25. The Youth Challenge element of the Paisley East, Ralston, Hawkhead & Lochfield, Hunterhill and Charleston Local Partnership budget will be allocated through a Youth Participatory budgeting exercise, where young people in the area vote for the applications that they want to see funded. This will be the same for all Local Partnership areas.
- 3.4 Participatory Budgeting means that the people who are intended to benefit from the projects vote on which projects are funded. Young people from each of the Local Partnership areas will be involved in developing the process for conducting the Participatory Budgetary exercise before a voting exercise is opened up to the wider community of young people in each Local Partnership area.

Code of Conduct/Register of Interest

- 3.4 A presentation was made at the March 2019 meeting of Paisley east, Ralston, Hawkhead & Lochfield, Hunterhill and Charleston. Local Partnership regarding members signing up to a Code of Conduct and Register of Interest. This presented information for consideration by each Local Partnership on the issue of members of the Local Partnership signing up to a Code of Conduct and completion of a Register of Interest. A letter was sent to all Local Partnership members following this meeting to seek their views on this issue in advance of the June 2019 meeting.

Applications For Local Partnership Grant Funding

1. Summary

- 1.1 Applications for grant funding from the seven Local Partnership areas were invited in April 2019, with a deadline for submission of 20 May 2019.
- 1.2 At the last meeting of the Paisley East & Whitehaugh, Ralston, Hawkhead & Lochfield, Hunterhill and Charleston Local Partnership on 27 March 2019, members agreed a draft set of priorities for the Local Partnership. The priorities identified for Paisley East & Whitehaugh, Ralston, Hawkhead & Lochfield, Hunterhill and Charleston were:
 - ❖ Exploring the impact of new housing developments
 - ❖ Supporting social connections
 - ❖ Community pride and safety
- 2.2 Applications for funding from Paisley East & Whitehaugh, Ralston, Hawkhead & Lochfield, Hunterhill and Charleston Local Partnership have been invited to reflect these priorities. A description of the priorities is set out at paragraph 4.1.
- 2.3 The available allocation for Paisley East & Whitehaugh, Ralston, Hawkhead & Lochfield, Hunterhill and Charleston Local Partnership is £63,347. The total value of applications received is £138,594.60. In addition a sum of £50 per community representative requires to be ringfenced for potential claim of expenses, as agreed at the March 2019 meeting.

- 2.4 The Youth Challenge Fund component of Paisley East & Whitehaugh, Ralston, Hawkhead & Lochfield, Hunterhill and Charleston Local Partnership Funding is £24,095. This funding will be allocated by young people through a Participatory Budgeting process to take place later in 2019.

3. Recommendations

- 3.1 It is recommended that members of Paisley East & Whitehaugh, Ralston, Hawkhead & Lochfield, Hunterhill and Charleston Local Partnership consider the applications for Local Partnership grant funding, as set out below in Appendix 1 and Appendix 2.

4. Background

- 4.1 The priorities of the Paisley East & Whitehaugh, Ralston, Hawkhead & Lochfield, Hunterhill and Charleston Local Partnership are:

Exploring the impact of new housing developments

The Local Partnership want to explore how they influence planning decisions around new developments, and make sure that the infrastructure is in place to support these developments, for example, roads, schools and nurseries. They want to explore how community benefits might be used to support this.

Supporting local connections

The Local partnership want to support social connections to tackle isolation and promote mental health and wellbeing. They want to see groups in the local area working together, swapping skills and sharing resources.

Community pride and safety

The Local partnership want to see the care and maintenance of their spaces across their area, so they are clean, safe and attractive spaces. They want to see these spaces used to promote good wellbeing across the area.

- 4.2 Guidance and Criteria for funding

To assist all interested groups and organisations with the application process, guidance was produced and promoted across a variety of communication channels. Potential applicants were also invited to attend drop in sessions to receive advice on making an application and to ask questions about the guidance. More than 70 groups participated in the drop-in sessions.

The guidance set out criteria against which applications should be made. For example, guidance was provided on applications made to more than one partnership, indicating that Local Partnerships would require applications to evidence how an application would meet identified local priorities, and would anticipate that funded activity was being delivered locally. The guidance also includes criteria relating to maximum levels of investment, applications from partner organisations and what funding should and should not be used to support amongst other issues.

Further support and information will be made available to those applicants who are not successful in gaining funding, and in particular to signpost applicants to other sources of funding. For reference, the guidance can be accessed [here](#).

Supporting Social Connections

The club provides a means for people to attend local events (16-18 games during the season, with attendances ranging from 200 to 420 people of all age ranges) and support 'their' local team and form new friendships and relationships with like minded people from the same and other communities. There is a natural progression for local residents (who wish to do so) to follow a path from coming to matches all the way through to becoming a local volunteer within their club and thus take an active part in an active community organisation.

The Pirates feature every year in the Barshaw Gala Day. Last year being the first for our mascot 'Timbers' which proved very popular with people of all ages and walks of life.

As well as weekly features in the Paisley Express during the season, we have our own website, 2184 Facebook Followers with 2179 Likes, 2180 Twitter Followers, 483 Instagram Followers and various other digital outlets within Renfrewshire such as Whats on Renfrewshire etc

By holding social events such as race nights, awards evenings and other similar events, the club further provides opportunities for people to come together and socialise.

Community Pride & Safety

In addition to engendering a sense of self worth and pride in the individual by encouraging a belief in the club, it further instils a wider sense of pride by means of its successes on and off the ice. While the club has registered continuous success on the ice in recent year by winning every national competition open to it, it achieved local pride by winning such awards as 'Team of the Year', 'Volunteer of the Year', and other more local awards, all of which encourage a collective pride in the club. It has significant publicity in the local press outlets, all of which encourage this same collective pride both at a local level and across Renfrewshire as a whole.

The club has in recent times supported an anti knife campaign run by the Paisley Daily Express. Players appeared in the newspaper with anti knife stickers which they then distributed to local supporters in a high profile campaign

By continuing to develop the club, and seeking to establish our own venue, we would further utilise empty land and provide a safe space for fans and members of the community to engage in all ice related activities.

In recognition of its contribution to Community Empowerment the club was invited to the Queen's Garden Party in Edinburgh. Further, the club secretary received the Lord Provost's Award for Sporting Achievement, and was recognised by the Tampa Bay (Florida) NHL club for its contribution to the sport as a local organisation. Finally, the Paisley Pirates 70th Birthday in 2016 was taken as the theme for the Annual Paisley Beer Festival.

Supplementary information for COMMON GOOD FUND - PAISLEY

Paisley Pirates have been a part of Paisley culture and heritage for over 70 years since the club's formation in 1946.

In more recent times, since becoming a non-commercial, voluntary organisation run by people within the local community, it has often brought a civic pride to the town, having won every major national ice hockey competition within which it has competed at least once in the last 6 years the most recent being in April 2019 when the club became national Playoff Champions for the very first time.

Off the ice, individual volunteers have won awards for their services at local level, such as the Volunteer of the Year Award and Coach of the Year Award, while the club was voted Team of the Year in a competition run by a local newspaper 3 years ago.

One of our volunteers also won a Provosts Award for Sporting Achievement.

A Canadian Tourist magazine which has a circulation of 250,000 has in the last two years featured Paisley as a town to visit due to its ice hockey connections, while in recent times the club's management group was invited to the Queen's Garden Party in recognition of their success, while they have formed links with the Tampa Bay NHL team in the United States.

Our club coach has in the past year also taken on responsibilities in connection with the Scotland Under-17's ice hockey team.

The club receives blanket coverage in the town's local media outlets, and features often on a local radio station programme. (Rock Radio)

The club has the support of Renfrewshire Council in seeking to establish a new ice facility in Renfrewshire, which will be run via community empowerment. The current arrangement required the club to pay Braehead Arena a commercial rent which is the most expensive in Scotland.

The club has taken part in local safety campaigns such as the Paisley Daily Express project which sought to take knives off local streets. Players were pictured with car stickers displaying the message and the stickers were thereafter distributed to supporters and other members of the local community.

Christmas Toy Appeal was embraced and supported by the Paisley Pirates over the past two Christmas appeals

Other community events which the club has participated in include Sma' Shot Day, and the 2016 Paisley Beer Festival took as its theme the 70th Anniversary of the formation of the club, which regularly features at local Gala Days in the town.

Members of the team and supporters regularly take part in the annual Paisley 10k event held in late summer

The club retains very strong connections with former players and supporters and during the current season alone a long time supporter from Hong Kong has flown in to see a match, while a former player from Canada has also come over to see his former club in action.

The club continues to receive enquiries from all over the world about former players and supporters with links to the club.

People in the local community don't know about Hunterhill care home's garden space so we'd like to promote and develop some of the space as a growing ground for keen gardeners that live close by. When the weather gets too cold to be in the garden, The Buddies of Hunterhill plan to arrange various social events in Hunterhill community centre as the care home isn't big enough to facilitate big community event, and the community centre is a very short walk from the care home. The care home has hosted tea parties and celebrations in the community centre in the past with help from the Mary Russell School. This has been identified by pupils and residents as something that should be developed again this winter based on feedback received during group activities taking place each week in the care home. Local events will help reduce loneliness and isolation among residents in the care home and those living in the community, and it equally helps to promote many life skills for the pupils involved. We will develop this part of the project by arranging various events that will take place monthly between October 2019 and May 2020. We'll invite local Nurseries, Primary and High Schools, sheltered housing tenants, other care homes and local organisations to help build stronger community connections between people. We think this part of the project will help maintain relationships with local people and it will act a platform to help Hunterhill Care Home develop itself as a community asset as the garden area will be promoted as a potential growing grown for all organisation that take part in the winter events. We hope that this time next year the garden will be full of new volunteers, scents and wildlife. We will develop new social connections in the Hunterhill area by encouraging volunteers to use the garden as a growing grown and we'll arrange events that aim to promote positive mental health. 	2.5	<p>The playground in particular is in need of significant attention. Earlier this year after two children fell and suffered injuries the trim trail in the main playground was deemed unsafe and is currently out of use and surrounded by fencing. Not only is this an eye sore for all (especially local residents) but as the main play equipment for the school this has been a significant loss to the children. The Parent Council are currently running a campaign to raise the funds to repair the trim trail and hope to have this operational for the start of the new school year after the summer. However the trim trail alone is not sufficient for the number of children attending the school (currently there are 413 children on the school roll) which will only increase with the new housing being built at Hawkhead Road. Current resources, which are already limited, will undoubtedly be placed under further pressure with increased numbers.</p> <p>Having consulted with other schools in the area we contacted Freshair Fitness about the possibility of installing outdoor fitness equipment to increase play opportunities for the children which would promote, through increased activity, both physical health and mental wellbeing.</p> <p>We have been quoted a special price of £6,000 (£5,000 plus VAT) for five pieces of equipment which includes the cost of delivery and installation. (see - https://www.freshairfitness.co.uk/free-sport-equipment-for-primary-schools)</p>
	2.6	<p>Such equipment has proved beneficial at other primary schools in Paisley and beyond and we have high hopes that the same will be true at Williamsburgh. The equipment can be used at intervals and lunchtime as well as for outdoor PE lessons (weather permitting).</p> <p>Our outdoor gym 'classroom' will increase the children's confidence, knowledge and skills in terms of their activity and wellbeing. Pupils will develop balance, co-ordination, build agility, cardiovascular and muscle strength. Their physical literacy will be improved as well as their social interaction. Their increased confidence in the use of adult style exercise equipment will be particularly important as early years intervention will help build a pattern of regular physical activity which they will hopefully continue into adulthood. The benefits may well be immeasurable in terms of establishing the link between physical health and mental wellbeing which will endure over the life course. This equipment is therefore important in raising the profile of PE and sport across the school and in embedding physical activity in the children's everyday lives. Finally the outdoor gym 'classroom' will be a sustainable facility which benefits pupils in the school now as well as those joining the school in future years. Paisley has an emerging traditional music scene with a new generation of young musicians now coming through. Through our inclusive approach to teaching, participants are able to attend classes and learn together, strengthening community involvement and benefit. The awareness of Gaelic culture and local heritage has increased significantly since the establishment of Fèis Phàislig in 2014 and has allowed those interested in traditional music and culture to participate, regardless of background or ability.

• Supporting social connections

The social aspect of our project will provide our participants with the opportunity to make new friendships in an enjoyable, safe environment and assist the establishment of a caring, community atmosphere. As well as participants benefitting socially, Fèis Phàislig also helps promote mental health and wellbeing through live performances and creating a focal point in the community which people feel they can be a part of and contribute towards.

Wherever possible, we will link in with other community organisations and partners to deliver our events, maximising opportunities for young people. Our work with Renfrewshire Council on events such as Sma Shot Day and The Spree provide a successful track record of collaboration within the community.

- **Community pride and safety**

Regular end-of-term showcase events, ceilidhs and concerts allow us to make use of local community spaces wherever possible. Participants will be provided with a platform for public performances with friends, family and the community invited to attend.
