1 Minute

There was submitted the Minute of the meeting of this Local Partnership held on 17 September 2020.

In relation to item 2 – Applications for The Villages Local Partnership Funding in 2020/21, recommendations (b) and (c), the Chair advised that she had received the following confirmation from the Council's Head of Finance 'In light of the circumstances surrounding the global pandemic and the ongoing revisions to the Scottish Government's COVID route map, approval is given to carry forward, to financial year 2021/22 from the General Grant Fund 20/21 programme, any grants awarded for projects which were unable to be delivered in the financial year to 31 March 2021. Any balances arising from grant awards returned due to the inability to deliver the projects as expected or any residual balances currently unable to be awarded in this case be ring-fenced, for festive events specifically. The award of any residual sums must be considered as early as practicable in financial year 2021/22 to support communities over the period of recovery from COVID.'

The Strategic Partnership & Inequalities Manager intimated that she would contact all organisations awarded grant funding from the Local Partnership in 2020/21 to establish if the awards had been used for an alternative purpose so that this could be reported to the next meeting of the Local Partnership.

Councillor Steel joined the meeting during consideration of the following item of business.

2 The Villages Local Partnership Budget Monitoring Report

There was submitted a budget monitoring report by the Chief Executive for The Villages Local Partnership 2020/21.

The report intimated that the Local Partnership provided funding to community groups to undertake projects. This funding was allocated from the general grant fund and the youth challenge fund through the Celebrating Renfrewshire participatory budgeting exercise.

The report provided detail of the funds allocated by the Local Partnership at its meeting held on 17 September 2020 and also those requests received and approved to use the award for an alternative purpose from the original application.

The outcome of the Celebrating Renfrewshire exercise for the Local Partnership was appended to the report. It was noted that this exercise had been carried out in virtual format in 2020 as a result of the coronavirus pandemic with 249 young people voting in the Villages area, casting three votes each for different projects, resulting in 747 votes in total. Engagement was taking place with young people to allocate the remaining sum to relevant projects.

<u>**DECIDED**</u>: That the budget monitoring report and allocation of the Celebrating Renfrewshire funding be noted.

Councillors McCulloch and Sheridan left the meeting during consideration of the following item of business.

3 COVID-19: Impact on Communities

The Strategic Partnership & Inequalities Manager gave a presentation to members which provided an update on the Community Impact Assessment work done to date; shared data from the Public Services Panel relevant to this Local Partnership; and requested Local Partnership discussion on members experiences on how COVID had impacted their community.

The presentation highlighted the key points arising from data and research undertaken in relation to COVID-19 cases; employment and support for business; neighbourhood

hubs; the distribution of 1,250 digital devices/connectivity through the Connecting Scotland Programme; and health and wellbeing.

The presentation also detailed responses on the questions: what has affected you most during the coronavirus pandemic?; which of the following things are major worries for you?; how is your household managing financially?; is there help that you feel you currently need but you are not receiving?; compared with how you felt on a typical day before the start of March, how would you say you felt? and compared responses received from residents from the Villages area and those received from residents from other areas of Renfrewshire. The results from the Public Services Panel consultation on the effects of the pandemic were also provided.

The Chief Executive, Engage Renfrewshire provided details on the programme of listening events held over winter 2020/21 facilitated by Engage Renfrewshire and the key points to date.

Discussion followed in the course of which the Strategic Partnership & Inequalities Manager was heard in answer to a number of issues raised by members on the presentation. As part of these discussions, it was proposed that if the information was available to the Council, that the Strategic Partnership & Inequalities Manager provide information to a future meeting of the Local Partnership in relation to fuel poverty in the Local Partnership area; that the Strategic Partnership & Inequalities Manager provide a link to the Community Impact Assessment to members of the Local Partnership; that the Strategic Partnership & Inequalities Manager make contact with members of the Local Partnership to establish if they were aware of any groups that required assistance to allow them to meet remotely and virtually; that in terms of applications for grant funding, applicants be requested to demonstrate either that members of groups were based in the Local Partnership area, that they would be able to spend any award in the local area, or directly contribute to the local area in some way. This weas agreed unanimously.

That Chair reminded members of the agreed priorities for the Local Partnership and requested that members advise the Strategic Partnership & Inequalities Manager of any other local priorities members wished to be included prior to consideration of applications for grant funding, which would be considered at the next meeting of the Local Partnership.

She further intimated that, if required, a further meeting of the Local Partnership could be held prior to the meeting which would decide on applications for grant funding to discuss and agree further priorities, if this could not be done by emailing members for agreement.

It was further proposed that the future of village bus provision and what could be done to stop the loss of villages services be considered at a future meeting of the Local Partnership.

DECIDED:

- (b) That, if the information was available to the Council, the Strategic Partnership & Inequalities Manager provide information to a future meeting of the Local Partnership in relation to fuel poverty in the Local Partnership area;

Applications for Local Partnership Funding to the Villages Local Partnership 2021/22

1. Summary

- 1.1 Applications for grant funding from the seven Local Partnership areas were invited to be submitted during March and April 2021, to be considered at the Local Partnership meetings due to be held in May and June 2021.
- 1.2 The available allocation for The Villages Local Partnership for 2021/22 is £56,644 made up of £51,191 from the General Fund and £5,453 underspend carried forward from the 2020/21 General Fund budget. The carry forward of underspend was agreed due to the exceptional circumstances of the Covid pandemic during 2020/21, which impacted on the ability of community organisations to undertake activities due to restrictions in place over the period. The normal arrangement whereby underspends cannot be carried forward into the next financial year will be reinstated for 2021/22.
- 1.3 From this total budget, a sum of £50 per community representative requires to be ringfenced for potential claim of expenses. These expenses are deducted from the available allocation for the Local Partnership. The Villages Local Partnership has space for fifteen community members, so the total ringfenced for expenses is £750. The total budget available for allocation by The Villages Local Partnership is therefore £55,894.
- 1.4 The Youth Challenge Fund component of The Villages Local Partnership Funding for 2021/22 is £23,609. In addition, an underspend in the 2020/21 Celebrating Renfrewshire budget of £14,223 will be carried forward into 2021/22, making a total Celebrating Renfrewshire budget for 2021/22 of £37,832. This funding will be

- allocated by young people through a Participatory Budgeting exercise that will take place during autumn 2021.
- 1.5 It has been agreed that officers will prepare a document for circulation at the Local Partnership, which will apply the principles of the grant allocations applied by the Villages Local Partnership in 2020/21 to the applications received in 2021/22. This is intended to provide a structure for discussion for the Local Partnership.

2. Recommendations

2.1 It is recommended that members of The Villages Local Partnership consider the applications for Local Partnership grant funding, as set out below in Appendix 1 and 2.

3. Background

- 3.1 Applicants for funding in 2021/22 have been provided with guidance, as well as a description of the Local Priorities identified by The Villages Local Partnership.
- 3.2 Local Partnership members are asked to consider the applications for funding summarised at Appendix 1 and 2 of this report, and to assess these against the Local Priorities agreed by The Villages Local Partnership.
- 3.3 An initial assessment has been carried out by officers to support Local Partnership members in their decision-making. Where applications have made clear reference to the Local Priorities identified by the Local Partnership, this is identified in the first table at Appendix 1. Applications that make a partial or no reference to The Villages Local Priorities are summarised in the second table for example, the project may promote access to services, facilities and assets (and therefore meet the Local Priority around access to services, facilities and assets) but not deliver this directly in the Local Partnership area or make reference to how many people from the area would be engaged in the project.
- 3.4 The priorities of The Villages Local Partnership are:

Connectivity and transport

The Local Partnership want to see villages which are well-connected to each other, where people can connect with each other too. Transport is a clear focus in this area, including both public transport and green routes.

Environment and Parks

The Local Partnership want well-maintained villages, with high quality public parks and a focus on street scene, including fly tipping, dog fouling and litter.

Access to services, facilities and assets

The Local Partnership want to improve access to what's going on in the community, including community activities, and making the most of their community buildings and facilities.

Village identity and character

The Local Partnership want to maintain the identity and character of the villages in the area. Key to this is developing and sustaining local community groups, and the delivery of local events.

About the organisation:

I Am Me Scotland is a charity with 860 members, 21 volunteers, 3 full time and 1 part time employees. It was formed in 2015.

Keep Safe is a national initiative in partnership with Police Scotland. Its purpose is to change attitudes and behaviours so that disabled and vulnerable people can feel safe in their communities. The aim is to work with communities to create a network of Keep Safe places for anyone who may feel lost, scared or vulnerable when out in the community.

There are over 130 Keep Safe places currently across Renfrewshire.

Keep Safe was developed with disabled people to help make it accessible and all Keep Safe places are checked and approved by Police Scotland to ensure suitability.

Grant funding award history:

In 2020/21 the group was awarded £3,850.28 from the Paisley East Local Partnership to create an Easy Read resources for Keep Safe to help make the initiative more accessible for people with learning disabilities. The funds were used to develop A Keep Safe Easy Read Animation & An Easy Read Keep Safe Lesson. 210 people have accessed the lesson so far. These will be made available to all local disability groups as we head out of lockdown.

"These are a life-line for those who can't wear masks due to medical reasons. My dad has a heart condition and COPD and not having this lanyard would have prevented him from going out. His lanyard arrived within a day or two and he has not been challenged once, giving him the confidence to get back out and about. Thank you I Am Me".

Description of Project:

The estimated timescales for the three-part renovation of Lochwinnoch's park is September -November 2021.

Lochwinnoch Community Development Trust aim to:

- 1.remove the old, worn, rusting play equipment, uneven gravel-strewn flooring and rusted, inaccessible fencing in the playpark area with sustainable rubber wetpour, age-appropriate equipment for 1-10 year olds, and a fence which separates the children from the dangerous cycle track right by the path. Kompan will conduct removal of flooring, fencing and all playpark equipment apart from the zip slide/basket swing; replaced by sustainable rubber wetpour and new equipment. New fence will be supplied & installed by local contractor. Currently the discussions are ongoing around resurfacing area.
- 2. Establish an intergenerational seating area and meeting point for the community. Lochwinnoch CDT will apply for a temporary lease to operate on the area behind the Annexe, in order to concrete foundations for benches by local craftsman Woodcraft Furniture.
- 3. Install an exercise-powered shelter and equipment for local teenagers by existing BMX track.

The play equipment is visibly ageing, fraying and worn; Covid made it clear there were no spaces in the village for safe outdoor socialising (for any ages).

A Facebook group was set up, attracting over 400 members, and ideas and suggestions for possible park improvements were collected there. Following this, an online survey was conducted (publicised through social media and the local community newsletter) and over 200 responses were collated. A further 39 young people (11-19) took part in a survey aimed just at them. Our steering committee has used these responses to create the three-part plan we are now working on, including approaching two play design companies and local suppliers and craftspeople for quotes.

Who benefits from the Project?

The project will improve Lochwinnoch's park, creating more space and resources for the whole community.

This will provide a much-improved facility for both residents and visitors to Lochwinnoch. Increased use of outdoor spaces by the community promoting health and wellbeing. An increase in civic pride and esteem. The park is often the first thing visitors to the village see and could be a significant attraction in its own right.

The Renfrewshire Toy Bank provides new toy and gifts for children of all ages within Renfrewshire all year round. Only giving out new gifts takes away any stigma as well as helping struggling families. This incorporates but not limited to, Christmas, birthdays, Halloween and Easter. We work in partnership with various charities, local authority organisations, NHS groups and other local projects to cover all of Renfrewshire helping as any children as possible while keeping the service fair and confidential.

We provide new toys and gifts for local children (aged 0-18, living in Renfrewshire) through a referral process. Within the Villages we work with social work, health visitors, local schools and nurseries. Who cares? Scotland as well as other legitimate organisations working with children and families. This keeps the service fair, as well as keeping vulnerable people's private information safe in line with data protection and GDPR. This also means that the above organisations work together to reduce duplication. Within the area we also have valuable volunteers that we could not operate without. Houston Village Paper Shop also hosts a drop off point for us which is always ones of our busiest locations for donations demonstrating how the local community get behind us.

Toys and gifts that go out are always new and we work with trading standards to ensure a high level of checks are done to provide safe and age appropriate toys for local children. We believe the toy bank is a valuable resource to assist struggling parents and Carers to be able to gift the same as other local families.

We previously operated as "The Renfrewshire Christmas Toy Bank". With the expansion from the Renfrewshire Christmas toy bank to the Renfrewshire Toy Bank, we operate all year around with our latest appeal being Easter. This gave over 4000 children Easter Eggs, again helping struggling families while tackling food poverty and assisting in inclusion.

Who benefits from the Project?

Struggling families with children/young people aged 0-18 year who are living in Renfrewshire & who may otherwise go without for Christmas, birthdays, Halloween and Easter benefits from this project.

The toys are provided through a referral service to keep the project fair and keep vulnerable people's information safe.

As toys/gifts are of a high standard, it takes away any stigma and give children's pride in their possessions. This also relives struggling families from another financial burden. We often find that social workers, teachers and charity workers etc constantly 'put their hands in their own pockets' and the toy bank also helps alleviate this too.

It has been proven that children open up and learn through play, we make a point in ensuring that babies and toddlers have items that will grow with them and their development. This ethos is carried through to all ages. About the organisation:

Renfrewshire Toy Bank is a constituted group that has been in operation since 2018.

Now that we have expanded from the Renfrewshire Christmas toy bank to the Renfrewshire Toy Bank, we operate all year around with our latest appeal being Easter. This gave over 4000 children Easter Eggs, again helping struggling families while tackling food poverty and assisting in inclusion.

We aim to provide new toys and gifts for 0-18 year olds living within Renfrewshire who may otherwise go without for Christmas, birthdays, Halloween and Easter. This is done through a referral service to keep the project fair and keep vulnerable people's information safe.

We work with social work (all Renfrewshire divisions), Families First, the SPACE Project, schools, local charities such as Who Cares? Scotland, the STAR Project, EBI Unites and many more (please see supporting documents). Working this way allows us to cover the whole of Renfrewshire while being able to include all age groups.

We have 15 volunteers and over 20 members.

Grant funding award history:

Last year the group applied for support with their Christmas campaign, however, then to expand to operate all year. The funding helped as it allowed the group to pay for a year of storage as well as other items listed below:

- Storage for a year £1,859
- Gift cards £2,360
- Toys and gifts £859
- Easter £1,650

Teens are always hard to buy for so often we purchase gift cards. They have all been distributed.

The following benefited from the project:

Christmas - 2,510 completed referrals with over 40 organisations referred to the group

Easter - 3,594 big eggs, 1,465 small creme egg type as well as over 1,500 small toys and arts and crafts items were distributed to 45 schools, 26 nurseries and 14 charities and other organisation received eggs from the group

All schools were offered online resources, especially during Fair Trade Fortnight Schools were closed for most of the year which meant normal business in terms of direct education work with pupils had to be postponed. However, contact with teachers

continued, with a Teacher's Blog being set up, so mainly online. A number of events were planned over the year, but by necessity these have been rescheduled.

The Education Officer built up a wide variety of materials and resources, primarily online activities which can be rolled out when circumstances change. Hence, schools will be in a much better position to embed Fair Trade into the curriculum as normal services resume. Home learning materials were developed for parents and guardians who were educating young people in the home. A wide variety of sessions, activities and digital learning opportunities were offered.

Updating the website and offering information and resources as well as drawing together links to relevant sites, was a key element of the work.

These resources were accessed by parents, teachers, partner organisations and interested members of the public who found them useful, engaging and informative.

We plan to refloor the 2 rooms, update the toilets and also add more equipment to the already existing weights and machines there.

Each room was damaged by damp. As you can imagine with the place not being in use during lock down. We have already had a quote for the floors (£11,838.00).

The gym will serve and be available to everyone in Renfrewshire. At only £40 a year for membership, it is a huge saving compared to other gyms. Breaking it down its only £3.34 a month. Compared to the lowest cost gym in Renfrewshire being £19.99 a month.

In the modern era of exercise, health, and wellness, functional fitness is the new craze. Many of the bigger gyms have seen a large drop in memberships to smaller, community based fitness facilities.

The community is a place where the vulnerable feel comfortable to fail as often as they succeed.

- 1. Feeling the Benefits Will Motivate people feel better when they exercise. Mental health is especially important. People are able to come together through exercises. The strength-training study found that experiencing the connection between exercise and well-being keeps you coming back. Getting support from peers and trainers will get you through the early stage when the first signs of better health may not be consistent or obvious.
- 2. Committing to a Fitness Routine Improves Your Health Habits
 In the strength-training study people who keep up their work-outs had better eating habits and were generally more active than other's who had stopped.

Having a community gym means that you can exercise with friends and family. It also means low cost membership.

About the organisation:

Our application is for Lochwinnoch Food Committee, a subgroup within LEAP; The group aims to tackle food poverty, isolation and climate change while building resilience locally, promoting community engagement and improving wellbeing.

Since forming in March 2020, Lochwinnoch Food Committee has benefitted 650 individuals between it's three project areas. Numbers continue to rise in applications to:

- Community Larder A food bank run by volunteers providing dignified access to food
- Lochwinnoch Cares A volunteer group delivering food, medicine and essential items to vulnerable and isolating households
- Diggin' It A project supporting households to grow their own vegetables and host community events

The Lochwinnoch Food Committee has 2 part-time employees and 65 volunteers.

Grant funding award history:

The Local Energy Action Plan used 20/21 Local Partnership funding to cover LEAP Car Club running costs, Staff Costs, Vehicle Running Costs and Marketing costs. Unfortunately, due to Covid-19, there have been severe travel restrictions in place throughout the entirety of the project length (Nov 2020 - March 2021) so, as you would expect, this has had a dramatically negative effect on the number of people who used our cars over the period. As such we were not able to reach the number of people we had originally hoped to. Over the project period seven car club members, plus passengers, made 59 trips for a duration of 112 hours over a distance of 1068 miles. Users saved money; only paying to drive when they needed to, not having to pay for their own car or for insurance, maintenance, cleaning, road tax or fuel. This allowed for greater accessibility and a valuable transport option.

Access to Car Club cars also allowed users to either give up their own car or not purchase a second household car.

Utilisation of our electric and hybrid cars will also helped improve air quality and cut carbon emissions in the village, whilst promoting connectivity, use of public transport and active travel.

About the organisation:

We are a group of 18 volunteers who work together to improve and look after Howwood Park. We were established in 2019.

Our aim is to help ensure Howwood Park is a well-maintained and safe public site which enhances the quality of life for local people by improving their physical and mental health and acts as a focus for bringing people together.

We look after the park including some general maintenance works such as sweeping up leaves, cutting back overgrown vegetation, litter picking and similar. We work with tools owned by the volunteers, but these are limited, which limits the work we can carry out. If we had the appropriate tools, we would be able to do more and do it better. This is how the need for the tools was identified.

We also hold events at Howwood Park, including a Christmas and Easter Event (last year this was a Tinsel Walk at Christmas, and an Easter Scavenger Hunt at Easter). These are well attended, which identifies the need for selection boxes and easter eggs for these events.

We have 18 volunteers and 3 members.

Grant funding award history:

We broadly spent the money on what we originally intended to spend it on. We could not buy everything, because we applied for £1938.69 but were not awarded the full amount. From our original list, we bought the football pitch lining machine, selection boxes for our Christmas event (a Tinsel Walk), Easter eggs for our Easter event (Easter Scavenger Hunt), charity collection buckets, a first aid kit and a cover for our PA system.

In addition, we bought Public Liability Insurance, walkie talkies, a megaphone, an accident book, a Christmas tree (including stand and lights), decorations (Christmas and Halloween).

We did not need to buy a PA system (which was on our original list) as someone donated one, and we did not need to buy corner flags as a local football team gave us some. The funding allowed us to hold 4 'events' over the last year, and these were attended by approximately the following;

- St Andrews Day Event 100
- Halloween Scavenger Hunt 80 kids and 80 adults
- Tinsel Walk 60 kids and 50 adults
- Easter Scavenger Hunt 100 kids and 20 adults.
- Fitness Classes These have only just started due to lockdown. We had 5 the first week, and 8 the second week, and we hope to increase this weekly up to around 20 per week.

The club building (located in Elderslie) suffers from significant dampness due to the loose and broken render on its walls allowing saturation of the brickwork, and leaks around old and damaged window frames. The windows are also thermally inefficient and allow heat to escape, so the building is both cold and damp. It is necessary to replace the render and windows in order to:

- a) make the building watertight to prevent further deterioration in its structure;
- b) eliminate sources of damp which have caused serious damage to the contents of the building;
- c) improve thermal efficiency to save energy, reduce heating costs and allow the building to be maintained at a suitable temperature.

Dampness has been an issue for several years and the club has hitherto focussed our resources on repairing the roof. A woodworm outbreak in our layouts during 2019 highlighted the need to eliminate other sources of dampness. After several pieces of render fell off we obtained quotations for its repair, which brought to light the fact that the condition of the render was a major source of the dampness and the whole building required re-rendering. This also identified that replacement of the windows would best be done at the same time in order to prevent further damage.

The twelve large windows in the main hall will be replaced with modern energy-efficient double-glazed units. The existing damaged roughcast render will be removed and replaced with new render. The existing security grilles protecting the hall windows will then be reinstated.

All work will be carrier out by a building contractor who will be responsible for scaffolding etc. The work requires to be carried out during the drier months of summer.

Existing dampness within the hall caused by water seeping through the brickwork and leaks around windows will be eliminated.

Elimination of the damp conditions will make a recurrence of the recent woodworm problem less likely.

Increased thermal efficiency will allow the central heating to more adequately heat the structure, making it drier and more comfortable for older members. (As a separate project, the boiler has recently been replaced to further improve energy efficiency). These repairs will put the club in a position to regain lost membership and replace damaged layouts once the Covid-19 situation eases.

Who benefits from the Project?

35 volunteers and 30 club members would benefit from the project.

Membership of the club is open to anyone interested in model railways - our members who come from all over.

Renfrewshire and range from children to senior citizens, both male and female. Many of

our members are elderly and in some cases live alone, and the club is an important source of companionship. For our younger members the club provides an opportunity to pick up practical skills and knowledge from more experienced older modellers, and to work on much larger models than they would be able to do at home. In past years, handlers could shelter together within the storage area (when equipment was being used). That is no longer possible and is unlikely to be possible again in the near future. If the club is to survive and keep members- which in turn benefits the community as well as individuals, a permanent structure is required. Estimates are being sought at present but costs are likely to be over £3000. This would only be for a 3 sided, open fronted structure, with metal support and perspex sides. It must be large enough to allow for 2mtrs distance between around 10 handlers at any one time. Groups of handlers are split to train at different times so the full membership is seldom there at the same time. There has been difficulty in obtaining estimates because of Covid. This will ease shortly as the Scottish Government relaxes the rules and workers are returning from furlough.

The anticipated project outcomes are to:

- keep existing members and attract new members.
- give members the confidence to return to activities post COVID.
- provide shelter from bad weather will allow the club to train throughout the windy and wet winter as well as the less cold but often wet summer.

In addition to the shelter being used in bad weather on regular training days, it would be a great asset when the club holds its Kennel club shows, allowing officials and competitors to socialise in a COVID-safe manner.

COVID has had an immense impact on our ability to socialise within the dog agility community as well as with the wider public. Based on restrictions implemented during lockdown, we have not trained together as a club locally nor have we been able to attend or host events in the community. Although restrictions are slowly being lifted, we don't anticipate that things will be "normal" until 2022 and plan to host a COVID-safe fun dog agility show instead of our annual kennel club show.

We wish to add another dimension to what we already do. Presently we teach young people how to play, create music and perform on stage then finally record their music. The final part in this journey which is just as important as recording songs is to produce music a music video for the song. The grant will be used to is to buy the equipment which is required to facilitate a new Creative Technologies and Multimedia Department.

In today's music, video is the biggest promoter of new music. Without it, it is nearly impossible to get your music listened to. To give young musicians and bands (not just the big or adult bands) a chance to be a real part of the music scene Since Covid this has been even more important as online and livestream has become more popular. The visual part of music is key.

We have a new state of the art sound recording and editing studio. We have high end equipment to do all of what we intend to do apart from professional video equipment.

The development of the new project was in direct response to the growing number of musically talented young people who never have an opportunity to further their music through video and online platforms. The aim of the project is to help young gifted artists by providing them with an opportunity to not only grow as an artist but to take their talent to another level.

We have had a demand over the years from young people to learn more about the multimedia side of the music industry as it is a major part of the marketing and raising awareness of a band or artist's work. In response we wish to expand our services to include technical subject as well as music tuition. Our newly completed recording suite is an ideal area to deliver the new subjects.

We are working towards providing young people with information and knowledge, such as how to start their own record label or music video production company. We work in partnership with professionals in the music industry who provide workshops and mentoring for young people.

With the pandemic causing live concerts and album releases to be cancelled, audiences are finding new ways to consume music from their favourite artists. And chief among them is the music video, which accounts for 95 percent of the most popular YouTube videos.

Today, social media platforms like Facebook, Twitter, Instagram, Tik Tok and YouTube have made it possible for fans to directly interact with their favourite music videos by liking, commenting, and sharing—building entire communities of music fans in the process.

This new Department will offer RSL qualifications from Debut to Grade 8. These grades will enable students to gain a globally-recognised qualification which will reflect their skills and understanding in Creative Technologies and Media. This syllabus will give participants a complete range of skills essential to today's next generation of musicians and media professionals in order to reflect the jobs of the 21st Century.

The new Department will provide a comprehensive and concise step by step introduction covering all aspects of sound and video production – what it all is, and how to use it.

Participants will work together as a group and produce sound recordings and videos together so that by the end of the course you will collectively have completed a film for a band or a promotional video. This is a practical way of learning how all the equipment works together with the end result being a piece of work ready to go online. The workshops are informal and involve interacting with others and the course leader as well as practicing on the equipment available. Each session includes all necessary theory needed to give you a good understanding of the equipment. Students then cement this knowledge by using this equipment themselves during the practical part of the session. At the end of the course participants are able to analyse their production as well as understand how to use video equipment and have a basic knowledge in video production.

Who benefits from the Project?

This project will assist us to improve the services and provisions we currently offer. Overall it will increase access, opportunity and participation in music by young people across Renfrewshire. It puts in place a structure that will support up and coming musicians, technicians and volunteers, enabling them to recognise and hone their talents and for that to blossom and eventually to find their place working in the music industry.

More young people will have the skills to volunteer their services to help other voluntary organisations.

The aims of the project is that students will be more employable, better equipped to apply for jobs, be more confident and have more experience to apply for a college course.

We now have a much better projector but the gobos (discs) are a different size and we need to purchase replacements for the Remembrance Day Poppies and the Arts Festival. These gobos are bespoke & made to order.

We have attached a breakdown for the tree lights and also costings for gobos for your information.

We are unsure just now what the Covid regulations will be regarding gatherings in December. So, at the moment we are waiting to see if it will just be the displays that go ahead and we would like to focus very much on that.

We normally fund raise ourselves but because there were no shops open (closed for Covid) and no opening event (we have donation buckets) we are entirely dependent on this funding for this year. We think (possibly) there may be an application for Lottery funding with several organisations combining, but that will be for next year.

Support to pay for the rental of an alternative venue to the Mackillop Hall on 2 mornings per week during term time.

The group have been informed that the Mackillop hall will be closed for renovation works beginning in May 2020.

We need to secure alternative accommodation for the group so that it can continue to operate and support young children and their parents/carers with a place to come together, play and develop. We have explored other options but are limited by geography, as it needs to remain in the village and be a warm clean space. Lochbarr Leisure have quoted us £50/session rental, this is the lowest fee they can charge to heating and staff costs. This would mean an increase in our rental costs from £26/week to £100/week which is not sustainable for our group.

The funding will cover the additional rental costs so we can continue to support our members with regular play sessions within the village.

- Rent for the Mackillop hall £13 x 54 sessions = £702

About the organisation:

Lochwinnoch Toddlers Group has been a voluntary group operating for over 40 years. It was constituted as an unincorporated group in 1993 and has 8 volunteers and 15 members.

The aims of the Group are to provide in the interests of social welfare a good environment for babies and toddlers up to the age of 5 by providing parents/carers of such children with the means of alleviation of stress by mutual support where such support is not available from within the community. to provide play facilities and experiences for the children in which parents/carers can participate as will improve the physical and intellectual development of the children and strengthen the relationship between parent/carer and their child. To encourage other charitable activities through which parents/carers may help their children.

Grant funding award history:

Due to Covid we were unable to meet as a group so we asked the council if we could use the grant to support at home and outdoor activities for our members instead. We used the funding to purchase craft materials, to support a range of activities from arts and crafts packs, cooking packs, Santa visit to gardens and an outdoor trail of painted characters. We purchased a gazebo and outdoor tables and chairs, catering and supplies and sanitising equipment, and outdoor storage to enable us to deliver outdoor activities as restrictions lifted.

The PPE equipment enabled us to deliver out activities safely and the printing and stationery funds enabled us to promote our activities locally.

We had asked for £75 for posting activities to members out with the village, they did not remain engaged so we asked the council if we could reallocate this to buying a first aid pack, and additional costs for gazebo, table and chairs and outdoor storage.

We have provided a programme of activities to help families with young children have something to look forward to over this challenging period and to feel part of a community. Overall 522 Children and 348 adults participated in Toddler activities.

We helped families to celebrate Halloween, Remembrance Day, Christmas, Burn's Night, Chinese New Year, Pancake Tuesday, Valentine's Day, Mother's Day and Easter through craft and cooking activities.

We helped our young people and their carers explore nature and their village surroundings through our Fairy Villages, Pumpkin Patch, Christmas Character Trail and Bug Garden projects. We created Lockdown Diaries to help parents capture memories of their children through this time to share with grandparents/family members they may have not been able to see. As restrictions have lifted we have offered outside play opportunities for the children and an invaluable opportunity for parents/carers to meet and interact with other parents.

We developed a Whatsapp group and regularly updated our Facebook page to share information about available activities and also share pictures of what the children had made to keep a sense of the toddler group community and ease loneliness/isolation some parent/carers and children may be experiencing.

The funding has allowed us to deliver the programme of activities without having to charge higher fees to our members, especially at a time when many have faced increased hardship. It also gave us the confidence to be more ambitious with our activities.

A recent survey of our members indicated that they were 100% happy with the service being provided.

Essential Exterior Repairs to Scout Building £10,000		
Description of Project:		
The project is to complete essential exterior repairs to the Scout Building. The Scout building has been part of our village for 100 years, and is used by many local community groups. We have found substantial woodworm in the framing of the building when it was recently exposed during internal alterations and unfortunately due to Covid, we have been unable to fundraise. With the building and Scouting being such an integral part of village life for many generations of young people, it is vital that it is repaired urgently to safeguard Scouting in the village for the next 100 years.		
The work would involve the supply and erection of suitable staging for working at height, removal of all external wooden cladding, replacing all framing which is found to be defective. Fit new treated batons and Proctor TF200 Breathable thermal building membrane and fire resistant Kingspan insulation and clad the building with Plastisol type wall cladding. This will not only eradicate the woodworm, it will reduce the charities running costs in the longer term and aesthetically improve the look of the building.		
The anticipated outcome would be to have a safe building that is fit for purpose and more energy efficient to allow Scouting to continue on the village for the next 100 years. Whilst also allowing the group to continue supporting other small community groups in the village.		
The work was identified as urgent when framing was exposed during internal alteration work which was completed during the previous year.

In 20/21 we received Local Partnership funding to ensure the sustainability of our mobility scooter and wheelchair service in Renfrewshire.

All of our 450 members will benefit (if they have not already done so) via this project.

We received this money from yourselves, in our bank account on 25 November 2020. There was a subsequent lockdown, however we did work from home. Our service was not the same as usual, but, we diversified to meet the needs of those who needed us to support them.

During lockdown we decided to phone everyone to see if they needed any support or help which they did - and, we delivered.

The project benefited the people in the community as outlined below:

- Could call us anytime, or send us an email to let us know what help and assistance they needed - we didn't just stick to our hours - we were pretty much open longer hours than normal.
- We were able to develop a new website and will shortly be able to offer bookings online and let people know what we are doing and keep them up to date etc.
- Visit their relatives, loved ones in hospital
- Access scooters
- Access scooter maintenance and advice
- Be able to access a counselling service via Croners could be for any problem whatsoever including mental health, wellbeing, financial, legal etc.
- Pick up prescriptions
- Ability to go out for exercise and just be able to get out of the house generally
- Get their food picked up and delivered
- Get their hospital packages picked up and delivered

We were told by the majority of our members that we are a lifeline service as they would simply not have been able to get out of their house at all - even a wee chat on the phone made such a difference.

The purpose of the project is to implement the delayed second year proposals of our three year Choir Development Strategy whose aims are;

- improve access to singing opportunities, encourage singing development in Lochwinnoch/surrounding areas for all age groups,
- improve and develop the proficiency and singing quality in junior and senior choirs,
- Encourage and develop community engagement and cohesion, help combat loneliness and isolation, break down barriers, taboos, negative perceptions related to singing
- promote singing and music, encourage people of all ages, ethnic and social groups to join junior and senior choirs and enjoy the benefits of active participation
- increase the sustainability of the choir by improving the quality of the singing, upping chorists' confidence, developing informal performed for selected groups etc dementia groups, hospice residents, old peoples groups etc
- develop and include audience sing-alongs in Christmas and Arts Festival concerts
- Build on 23% audience increase at last Christmas concert

The programme will continue to raise the general awareness of the health and social benefit of singing. Covid has emphasized the importance of such benefits. It will provide local opportunities for singing development via workshops. This will include 8 intermediate standard workshops. It will engage young people on school in one special lunchtime workshop/ event per term (3 in total). We will run workshops in local venues following on from our classes for beginners or returning singers (4 group sessions for 10 singers at a time)

Lochwinnoch exhibits a strong community focus which manifests itself in a wide variety of clubs, societies, and activities. The choir is one such activity but we do not believe that the talent for singing/music is being fully exploited. Feedback from local choirs, groups, bands indicated a significant interested in the three year strategy. Community participation and benefits would be realised.

The Choir itself would benefit from basic to more advanced singing lessons to improve performance and singing generally.

Who benefits from the Project?

Junior and senior choir participants, audiences and the community will benefit from the project. We would expect to see a continued general improvement in the standard of singing in the choir. We would anticipate an increase in both senior and junior choir members. An increase in numbers at choir concerts and other musical events in the village is anticipated.

Lochwinnoch Choral Society is an unincorporated club based in Lochwinnoch. It was established in 1996. The club consists of 2 part-time employees, 10 volunteers and 36 members.

The aim of the club is to enjoy making music, advance, improve and maintain public education in the appreciation of music making including through the presentation of public concerts and recitals.

Grant funding award history:

In 20/21 we received the Local Partnership funding to implement year two of our three year Choir development strategy which included encouraging singing development in Lochwinnoch and surrounding areas for all age groups; encouraging and developing community engagement and cohesion; help combat loneliness and isolation; improve and develop the proficiency and quality of singing in senior and junior choirs; increase the sustainability of local singing by increasing choir membership and quality of performance thence the financial stability of the choral society.

Due to Covid 19 we had to cancel choir practices, our planned spring and Christmas concerts. We continued to pay our conductor his retainer and paid our planist and junior choir master a sum to encourage his continuing loyalty. We ran on-line singing lessons for choir members and any village residents who wished to participate. Choir subscriptions

were cancelled in December as we had no idea when rehearsals might re-commence. They will re-start when normal rehearsals and concerts resume.

We had 15 regular Participants in the online singing lessons. They were not always the same 15 so more than 15 participants benefitted. Participants enjoyed the `social/participatory` benefits of online singing lessons and the incentive to continue practising during lockdown. We also believe the participants choral skills will have improved and be evidenced once normal rehearsals re-commence.

Therefore, many are going without that one hot meal, that they rely on in school. This also includes families who struggle to feed themselves without the added pressure of adding another meal during the holiday. We also have many working families who are struggling to put a meal on the table. Unfortunately, they are unable to access free school meals at any time.

What we would like to do is give each family a food pack and also an activity pack for the kids. We will make up the packs and deliver them to each family within the Renfrewshire area. Each pack will consist of enough food to cover lunch and breakfast for the morning.

Activities will include outdoor play equipment and arts and crafts. This will get the children away from computers and phones if they have them. Get them back outside and get them active again. It will also bring the family together as a whole.

For a few years now we have been providing a service to families within Renfrewshire. Many of them accessed our food bank last year in which we spoke to them about their needs.

On speaking to families, it became apparent there wasn't much out there for working families. These families are forgot about. The families are struggling just as much as people on benefits.

Who benefits from the Project?

We anticipate that the children and parents will form a further bond with each other. This will stop isolation for both the parents and children, by encouraging them to interact through play. It will also encourage the children to get more active.

Also giving the food parcel will take away the added pressure of trying to find spare money to feed the family during the day.

Description of Project:

Lamont farm was founded by a group of individuals with a strong desire to establish a local education and community facility. We were the first City Farm in Scotland and the farm is very popular with families, nurseries and disabled groups as well as local schools. Around 10,000 people visit Lamont Farm annually. We aim to educate people from all walks of life in animal care, welfare and husbandry.

The project aims to educate and provide hands on animal care and welfare facilities to the local community and surrounding areas. Lamont Farm offers a wide variety of services to various groups and organisations within the local area and further afield, work experience placements are provided to jobcentres, high schools, community service, kibble project and many more.

The farm provides hands on experience for over 40 children who wish to pursue a career in animal care and veterinary practice, educational workshops are ran throughout the year for primary schools, nurseries and visitors.

The farm has many social connections to help promote mental health, wellbeing and to help lessen isolation. Animals are a great source of therapy and have a great ability to bring many different people together some people prefer being round the animals as a gentle way of reintroducing them into the community. Some of the connections we have are RAMH, spark of genius, community service, West college Scotland's adults with addition needs and kibble we believe everyone should have the chance to be involved in their community. These connections help provide placements for anyone suffering mental health issues, physical disabilities, someone who has been out of the community, anyone who is looking to get back into work or anyone who just wants to volunteer, its a placement where everyone is included in every aspect of the farm with no judgement. We offer work experience placements to many different high schools throughout Renfrewshire and beyond, we have had many successful work experience placements with students from Gryffe high school. The work experienced placements are invaluable to pupils wishing to pursue a career in the animal sector as not many places allow under 16's to work so closely with such a variety of animals, in recent years our volunteers have went on to become fully qualified veterinary nurses. One of our current adult volunteers from Houston has said that the farm has been able to help her during the Covid Pandemic by providing a safe place for her to volunteer and continue with what she loves, animals, throughout a challenging time for everyone.

The farm is working with a local artist by providing a disused area of the farm to build a free and legal graffiti wall, this was established to encourage more youths to use the wall rather than putting graffiti around their local areas. The hope is this wall will help to reduce the vandalism in many areas by providing something different for everyone to try. The local artist will hold regular demonstrations and the idea is proving to be popular

amongst the local and surrounding communities being supported by local newspapers the paisley express and the gazette.

We regularly litter pick the pathways clearing the glass, dog mess and litter to ensure safety to the public using these paths and for any wildlife. We have had extra cctv installed after the farm itself was vandalised using graffiti this has helped reduce vandalism in the immediate area.

We regularly attend local events with our animals including Lilias day in Kilbarchan. Lamont Farm has been a part of the local community for 43 years and was the first city farm in Scotland. As both of the pet's corners at Barshaw Park and Robertson Park have had to close (we were fortunately able to offer several of the animals a new home from both of these facilities) we are now the only venue of this type left.

Who benefits from the Project?

Children and young people as well as people who have or would like to have a work experience at the farm will benefit from this project.

The funding will help the group:

- To continue to provide services to local educational establishments and to continue to increase the number of placements offered through these.
- To continue to provide an outreach service to the local community to allow an experience that many people can enjoy.

It aims to educate children and adults on all aspects of animal husbandry and animal welfare and to provide a local establishment in the community for families to visit for a hands-on experience with a wide variety of animals.

The farm has 20 volunteers and 30members.

Grant funding award history:

In 20/21 Lamont farm was awarded £11,340.11 from Local Partnerships for our running costs, and with the impact of Covid (we were closed from March-July and closed again towards the end of November (we are still closed) this funding has been vital to us. We have tried to keep going with projects via the internet, eg zoom chats with local kids and a class visit remotely through google teams. It is hard to say how many people have benefited from the project, when we reopened in July we had up to 1000 visitors through the gate in 1 day from areas all over.

This year in particular we were a huge benefit to the community. Even when we have been closed we have encouraged the public to come and visit out animals in the fields where they could do so safely and within the regulations. The farm's fields have been a way of getting both adults and children alike out of the house and helping to reduce stress and depression caused by covid. When we reopened we welcomed everyone back and quite literally had a queue of up to 50-60 people waiting at a time to get in with another 40 already in the farm. We were able to do animal handling with the under 12s giving them an activity that they could take part in without a fear of infection.

The project aims to fund co-production of animation video over 6-8 weeks and then develop Black history month lesson plans for primary school children.

Over 6-8 weeks Pachedu will work in partnership with IAMME and a professional company to co-produce a 2-3 minute animation video. The resources will help in the planning of lessons for Black History month which are meant to be delivered in primary schools during Black History Month. Kids from Pachedu's School of African Culture will help in writing the script and also doing voice overs.

Through discussions, young people have indicated experiencing a lot of stigma and stereotypes about Africa and African people that makes them disconnect and feel ashamed of their African heritage hence the need to want to get involved with this project. The national curriculum also does little to address this as there is a glaring lack of material that focus on Black History.

The project also fits into national and local priorities.

The Scottish Government's National Performance Framework cites that equality and human rights are core to making real progress towards all the national performance outcomes and are specifically highlighted in the outcome 'we respect, protect and fulfil human rights and live free from discrimination.'

One of the outcomes particularly talks about respecting, protecting and fulfilling human rights and living free from discrimination

Race equality framework for Scotland 2016 to 2030 sets out the Scottish Government approach to promoting race equality and tackling racism and inequality between 2016 and 2030. It is important to embed equality and human rights in public services.

The local community planning partnership themes include empowerment, community safety and promoting inclusion.

IAMME have been developing resources on hate crime hence the discussion which came up with this joint project.

Who benefits from the Project?

The project hopes to tackle discrimination and celebrate diversity in primary school children in Renfrewshire schools. These will focus on celebrating Difference – activities and games to encourage children to think about the things people have in common and the importance of difference. Local Partnership Grant Funding

A guide to the grant funding available from Local Partnerships and how to apply



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Local Partnerships are a way for communities, elected members and public organisations to work together at a local level.

There are seven Local Partnerships in Renfrewshire, and they replaced Local Area Committees in 2018.

Each Local Partnership has agreed a set of Local Priorities, and each Partnership has grant funding they can allocate to support these priorities.

The aims of Local Partnerships are to:

- Make connections and networks between community groups and the wider community
- Identify, set and share local community priorities
- Listen to, consult and represent local communities
- Distribute grants to support local priorities

Grants available from Local Partnerships

The Local Partnerships consider applications and award grant funding that reflects their local priorities. The Local Partnerships look after grant funding streams that were previously overseen by Local Area Committees:

- the General Grant Fund;
- two Common Good Funds (Paisley Common Good and Renfrew Common Good); and
- the Youth Challenge Fund

It is strongly advised that organisations read this guidance before writing and submitting their applications.

You will find further information about each of these three funding streams and how to apply for them over the next few pages.

The most important thing to remember when applying for grant funding is to make sure you can contribute to at least one of the local priorities for the area you are applying to. It will be important to take time to find out about these priorities before applying. They are available here.

Your application will be considered by the Local Partnership in May/June 2021. Local Partnership meetings are public, so you are welcome to come along but you will not be required to attend, or expected to speak at the meeting. This year the meetings will be held online.

Following the meeting, you will be informed whether your application was successful or not. If you are successful, you will be asked to agree the conditions of grant and payment arrangements will be made.

The Application Form

The standard Voluntary and Community Organisations Grant Application Form is used to apply for Local Partnership funding. The form is available here (under related documents) or please contact the Community Planning team if you would like a paper copy sent to you.

In 1.13b you should write which Local Partnership area(s) the project you are applying for will operate in.
- All applications will be treated as an individual application by each Local Partnership. In this way, your activity needs to be viable as a project in each Local Partnership area it is applying to. If you are applying for funding from more than one Local Partnership area, you will either need to make sure your one application covers at least one priority from each of the Local Partnership areas applied to, or submit separate applications tailored to the priorities of each Local Partnership area applied to. If you are submitting one application to cover more than one Local Partnership area, you will need to make it clear how much funding is being asked for from each Local Partnership. This is covered in section 2.
- You should only apply for the amount of money that you require to run your project and be able to explain in your application how the full amount of funding applied for will be used.
- If you are applying for a project that primarily benefits young people aged 12-25, you should apply to the Celebrating Renfrewshire exercise in autumn 2021 that decides allocation of the Youth Challenge funding.

It is very important that you use this section to explain how you will address the priorities identified by your Local Partnership. These sections of the application will be made public through the summary reports at the Local Partnership meetings. If you are using one application to apply to more than one Local Partnership, you need to write the name of the Local Partnership applied to next to the amount requested from that Local Partnership in section 2.10.

Section 3

• This section is to make sure that you have included all the necessary supporting paperwork. Your application cannot be considered until you submit all of the correct paperwork.

Section 4

• If you are filling in a paper copy of the form to post, you can sign this section of the form. If you are doing the form online, a signature can be taken at a later date.

General Grant Fund

The grants are open to constituted local community, voluntary organisations and Community Planning Partners. The fund is intended to develop local activities and projects within Local Partnership areas. The maximum award available from the General Grant Fund is £10,000, although it should be noted that an award of £10,000 would represent a significant proportion of any Local Partnership's budget. The total amount of General Grant funding available is slightly different in each of the seven Local Partnership areas, because funding is allocated to Local Partnerships based on their population. Activities are expected to reflect the different priorities and needs in each of the seven areas.

Eligibility Criteria

Who can and cannot apply?

- Any community or voluntary organisation with a constitution and a bank account can apply. Any organisation applying should be accountable to its members.
- Community Planning Partners can submit applications for funding, but Council services cannot. Community Planning Partners should not submit applications for projects that are regarded as core functions.
- If your application is for an individual, it will not be considered.
- Your application should contribute towards at least one of the Local Partnership's key priorities. These were established by Partnerships at their March 2019 meetings and have been developed further since. Projects should be able to demonstrate real benefit to the local area by improving or complementing existing service provision.
- Organisations that work across Renfrewshire, or in a number of Local Partnership areas, can apply, but only for projects or activities which support an area's priorities, and are delivered in that area specifically.
- You cannot apply for costs of activities that have already happened.
- You cannot apply for your total running costs. You can apply to part fund running costs though.
- The General Grant Fund will very occasionally support applications to fund activities such as day trips and lunches, but only when they provide an additional community benefit (for example tackling loneliness and isolation).
- The General Grant Fund will not support projects that exist mainly to further religious or political beliefs.

- Your application must encourage equality of opportunity.
- You cannot apply to fund either a trip abroad or hospitality to other organisations.
- If you receive a grant from the General Grant Fund, it must usually be spent within this financial year.
- General Grant Fund awards are one-off and are not intended to provide ongoing funding for the same or similar activities on an annual basis.
- If you are successful in your application, you must accept and comply with the grant conditions. It is also expected that you report back on the impact the project has had once the funds are spent.
- You should plan how you will sustain your organisation, once funding from the General Grant Fund has been used.
- You cannot use the funding for events to raise funds for other charities
- You cannot use the funding to cover your Community Councils' running costs above those funded by its administration grant from the Council.
- You should provide evidence of partnership working, where applicable.

What types of activities or projects can and cannot be funded?

Activities or projects must contribute to at least one of the key priorities identified by the Local Partnership. The fund can support a variety of projects and activities. This can include supporting people back into employment; supporting young people; supporting community safety activity; supporting healthier lifestyles; tackling poverty in disadvantaged areas; and promoting equality within local areas.

These types of activities can cover an array of different projects. Examples include:

- Refurbishment of community facilities such as decorating or improving the layout of a room for community use.
- Enhancing or creating community gardens for recreational areas.
- Community events such as gala days.
- Projects that raise awareness of healthy eating and help people change eating habits.
- Projects that promote positive mental health issues.
- After school clubs that encourage development e.g. homework clubs,
- Leadership and team working skills for group members.

Common Good Funds

Common Good is funding generated from an investment portfolio where the annual income is used to support local projects. There are Common Good funds in both Renfrew and Paisley, which are distributed through the Local Partnership. In Paisley, the fund is split across the three Local Partnerships, based on the population of each area.

The general eligibility criteria for the common good funds are the same as for the General Grant Fund, although there is no specific maximum award. The main difference is that the Common Good Funds are charities and so any projects funded through the common good funds must meet their charitable objectives (the advancement of civic responsibility or community development) to benefit people in Renfrew or Paisley.

Former Youth Challenge Fund

The Youth Challenge Fund has been allocated using participatory budgeting since 2019 and is now known as "Celebrating Renfrewshire – By Young People, For Young People." This fund will be allocated in the same way this year. This funding round will be launched separately in autumn 2021.

Frequently Asked Questions

How will funding award decisions be made?

The members of the Local Partnership in each area will make a decision on each funding application, guided by an assessment of whether the application has met the local priorities. Remember to base your application on the local priorities of the Partnership area you are applying to. Priorities are linked here.

How do I apply?

Fill in a standard grant application form, which you will find on the Renfrewshire Council website. You can do this electronically and email it in or send in a completed paper copy. You should make sure you have understood what the local priorities are for the area you are applying to before completing your application.

When is the deadline for applications?

The deadline will be 18th April 2021 for consideration at the April/May meetings.

What happens to my application after it is submitted?

Your application and documents will be checked and then stored on the Council system. A summary of your application will be prepared to include in the papers for the relevant Local Partnership meeting. If there are any queries or clarifications needed about your application, you will be contacted before the Local Partnership papers are prepared.

When will I hear back?

You will hear back after the meeting of the Local Partnership has made a decision. The decisions will be made at the Local Partnership meetings in May/June 2021. Local Partnership meetings are public, so you are welcome to come along to the meetings. You will not be required to attend or expected to speak at the meeting.

How much money can I apply for?

You can apply for a maximum of £10,000 from the General Grant Fund. If you are applying for Common Good funding, there is not specific maximum limit – but remember Common Good funding is only available in Paisley and Renfrew.

Who can apply?

Any community or voluntary organisation with a constitution and a bank account can apply. Any organisation applying should be accountable to its members. Council services will not be able to apply for funding. The wider community planning partners will be able to apply, if their project aligns with local priorities.

Can I apply to fund Christmas lights?

Unfortunately, Renfrewshire Council has very limited capacity for any further installation, storage and maintenance of Christmas lighting. If you wish to submit an application which

would require additional Council resources, you should discuss this with Council officers prior to submitting your application.

We work across Renfrewshire, can we apply?

You can apply to one or more Local Partnership. The project you are applying for, must be for the benefit of people who live in that area and the project must align with the local priorities for that area. You should focus on the areas where your project aligns most with the local priorities. You could also think about where your project is based or where most of the people using or otherwise involved in the project will be based. It might align with more than one Local Partnership area. If you do want to apply to more than one Local Partnership area, you will need to either submit separate applications or make it very clear which information applies to which Local Partnership.

What is happening to 'multi LAC' applications?

All applications will be treated as an individual application by each Local Partnership. In this way, your activity needs to be viable as a project in each Local Partnership area it is applying to. If you are applying for funding from more than one Local Partnership area, you will either need to make sure your one application covers at least one priority from each of the Local Partnership areas applied to, or submit separate applications tailored to the priorities of each Local Partnership area applied to. If you are submitting one application to cover more than one Local Partnership area, you will need to make it clear:

- How your project will specifically benefit people in each Local Partnership area applied to, and
- how much funding is being asked for from each Local Partnership.

Is it the same process as the old LAC funding applications?

There are some differences. Local Partnership grant applications must be based on the priorities for that Local Partnership area. The Youth Challenge fund decisions will be made by local young people and so follow a different process to take place later in the year.

Is the total amount of funding the same as the old LAC funding?

Yes, the total amount of funding is the same. It is still based on the population of each area, but now split between the seven Local Partnerships, rather than the five former LACs.

What happens if money is not allocated by the end of the financial year?

Where all available grant funding within a financial year is not fully committed, the balance can be carried forward only where a specific project for the forthcoming financial year has been identified and approved by the Local Partnership. This gives the Local Partnership the flexibility to set aside a proportion of its current year grant for use on a specific project the following year.

It is not intended that this year-end flexibility would be applied to carry forward a general underspend of available grant for which no specific purpose has been identified or approved.

What happens if organisations that are members of Local Partnerships apply for funding?

Organisations that are members of a Local Partnership can still apply to that Local Partnership, but they will not be allowed to speak to the application at the decision meeting and will not be allowed to vote on their own application.

If I am unsuccessful, where can I find other sources of funding?

There are other sources of funding for community groups and people who can help you in accessing it or building your capacity more broadly.

The Villages Local Partnership Budget Monitoring Report and 20/21 Funding Application Feedback

1. Summary

- 1.1 The Villages Local Partnership provides funding to community groups to undertake projects. This funding is allocated from the General Grant Fund and, through a Participating Budgeting exercise known as Celebrating Renfrewshire, the Youth Challenge Fund.
- 1.2 A table setting out the funds allocated by The Villages Local Partnership in 2020/21 and current budget position is attached as an appendix to this report.
- 1.3 Feedback from projects receiving funding in 20/21 on the outcome of projects is also attached. Due to the impact of Covid 19 on the capability of groups to successfully deliver projects, some groups have returned funding to the Local Partnership. In recognition of this situation it has been agreed that Local Partnership underspends in 2020/21 will be carried forward and added to the budget for 2021/22. For 2021/22, the normal arrangements will apply, requiring all funding to be spent by the end of the financial year with no provision for carry over to the following year.

2. Recommendation

2.1 It is recommended that the budget monitoring report and feedback from recipients of funding in 2020/21 be noted.

3. Feedback From 2020/21 Grant Recipients

3.1 Feedback on the use of The Villages Local Partnership funding allocated in 2020/21 was received from sixteen organisations.

1.Lamont Farm

Funding from The Villages and other Local Partnerships enabled Lamont Farm to provide a service when able to open to the public during 2020 and to enable the public to visit animals safely in the fields when other services were unavailable. Projects were also carried out via the internet, for example Zoom sessions with local children. Animal handling for children under-12 was also delivered safely.

Lamont Farm was opened July-November 2020. Over 1,000 people attended in a single day in during July.

Even during periods when the farm could not fully open, access to the Farm's fields for the public has provided a way of reducing stress and depression.

2. Paisley and District Boys Brigade Battalion Administration.

The Boys Brigade received funding from Renfrew and other Local Partnerships to run events and for Battalion Headquarters running costs. Funding enabled staff to maintain the Headquarters building and prepare it to be ready to open and function fully once lockdown restrictions eased.

3. Kilbarchan Improvements Project

The purpose of the project is to enhance the facilities at our Community Hub and enable the supporters to use the outside facilities, weather permitting. The task which is ongoing has been helped by members of the community who have given of their time voluntarily to do the heavy work entailed in the project. In effect what was once a derelict area has been turned into a pleasant area, still needing work done on it.

Money was spent on garden materials, a locked storage facility, an outside tap and the payment of another part time employee, as with our estimate on our original application form. During the pandemic we have not been able to operate. However when things get back to normal we hope to continue to operate our venture with the same number of participants as before when we had 5000 attending our classes in a calendar year.

All of our annual objectives were realised. We realise that this is continuing story and sincerely hope to be able to continue in the coming years. The area has been transformed from a wilderness to a desired area, but one which needs continuous work.

4.Lochwinnoch Arts Festival

The grant enabled us to deliver art in many forms during the pandemic. in addition, we were able to support our local art community who had no income or very little due to the arts being closed down. We were able to spend it on the areas we applied for. Sound and media, publicity and advertising.

We had over 3000 people watching our online events in December and January . We also had over 70 families take part in the Winter Window Wonderland decorations. An unknown number walked round the village to look at the decorated windows.

We were able to keep people connected and participating in the arts during the pandemic. The local artists and film makers were able to stay creative and continue to perform, We were able to get different groups to work together in a virtual form

5.Local Energy Action Plan (LEAP)

We hoped that the investment would help us to get residents in the village to develop a more positive attitude towards sustainable transport choices, by not only boosting people's first hand use but also by increasing their knowledge and exposure to sustainable transport choices and, as a result, enhancing connectivity.

As per our application form the money covered, LEAP Car Club running costs, Staff Costs, Vehicle Running Costs and Marketing costs. Unfortunately, due to Covid-19, there have been severe travel restrictions in place throughout the entirety of the project length (Nov 2020 - March 2021) so, as you would expect, this has had a dramatically negative effect on the number of people who used our cars over the period. As such we were not able to reach the number of people we had originally hoped to.

Users saved money; only paying to drive when they needed to, not having to pay for their own car or for insurance, maintenance, cleaning, road tax or fuel. This allowed for greater accessibility and a valuable transport option.

6.Renfrewshire Christmas Toy Bank

The funding had been applied for support with our Christmas campaign however then to expand to operate all year. The funding allowed us to do this by paying for a year of storage as well as other items listed below.

We now run at Easter, Halloween and Christmas as well as supporting all year round with birthday gifts.

Teens are always hard to buy for so often we purchase gift cards. They have all been distributed.

The funding purchased: Storage for a year £1,859 Gift cards £2,360 Toys and gifts £859 Easter £1,650

We had put in for Halloween as well however did not get from all partnerships meaning we could not make the funding go as far as to Halloween.

Christmas - 2,510 completed referrals Over 40 organisations reffed to us Easter - 3,594 big eggs, 1,465 small creme egg type as well as over 1,500 small toys and arts and crafts items.

45 schools

26 nurseries

14 charities and other organisation received eggs from us

Birthday boxes

All social work departments, health visitors, star project, ebi unites, the space project as well as some schools and nurseries have a stock of gifts that they can take from. This means items have already been quarantined at their end. They then fill out a record sheet and we top up their supply when needed.

Other organisation refer to us due to space or working from home.

We were able to provide safe, new toys and gifts of a high quality taking away and stigma. Our referral process also set up parents and carers with other services that we cannot offer - helping us all work together to keep services fair.

The toy bank also relives financial strain or helps stop families getting into debt.

Easter helped with food poverty as well as helping with an Easter egg hunt and another organisations Easter activities for the children that they support.

Businesses act as drop off points. This was a bit stop and start due to Covid however we try to use as many local small businesses as possible which also tends to bring them some new customers helping the local economy.

7. Shopmobility Paisley and District

Local Partnership funding was spent as intended on materials, equipment and volunteer expenses to ensure the provision of a mobility scooter and wheelchair service in Renfrewshire.

During lockdown open hours for the project were longer than normal. A new website was developed and support given to enable people to visit relatives in hospital, access scooters (including advice and maintenance), access counselling services, pick up prescriptions, get out of their home and access food.

8.C-Change Dates-n-Mates

The money was a contribution towards direct running costs and was used as a contribution towards the salary of our Community Engagement and Events Worker.

Our outcomes were focused on ensuring adults with learning disabilities:

- have opportunities and support to make and sustain natural friendships and close personal relationships with increased levels of wellbeing and happiness;
- develop the skills and abilities to make decisions about, develop and sustain close personal relationships and friendships;

- are better able to participate in the social, economic and cultural life of Renfrewshire
- have a wide range of rewarding volunteering opportunities which also increase their engagement with the local community.
- Improved social connection between people with learning disabilities and the wider community through a number of events organised in local amenities in Renfrewshire.

The money was spent on direct staffing costs as originally planned, but our service delivery was different due to Covid-19. We had to cease all in person events and move our events online.

9.Renfrewshire Walking Network

The funding was to promote the Walking Network through printed booklets and promotional material. These are placed in library's Community Facilities and Doctors surgeries. There was also money for training of new leaders and equipping them with Waterproofs and First Aid kits.

As we work with elderly and vulnerable groups all walks were cancelled due to Covid in March 2020. It is only in the last month that we are gradually restarting the Community Health Walks. This as delayed spending the grant on booklets and promotional material along with training and equipment. It is our intention to spend the grant as intended as things get back to normal.

10.Meikleriggs Cricket Foundation

Our project sought funding to enable cricket coaching to be available to the community. The funding enabled us to provide a qualified cricket coach, when COVID restrictions allowed. Sessions encouraged people of all ages and abilities to take part outdoors in an activity which enhanced their physical and mental health and wellbeing.

We reached a total of 100 people - mainly for the Paisley partnerships.

The community were able to attend structured and Covid friendly sessions to take part in physical activity. This was vital at a time when gyms etc were closed.

11.Ferguslie Cricket Club

We sought funding to enable us to purchase a new cricket roller, which was purchased. All our junior and senior players will benefit circa 75 members. In addition, all visiting teams will also benefit through better cricket pitches prepared for all our teams and visiting opposition. In addition better pitches will enhance our ability to host representative games thus attracting visitors to Paisley.

12.Houston Community Council

The award funded a children's motif competition, window wanderland and fireworks display. Due to Covid restrictions with the switch on event not going ahead in 2020 we decided to buy a projector in lieu of hiring and also did gobos for the kids competition to design a motif at the two primary schools that in previous years were manufactured and installed in the centre of the village. This means we have a projector

now and it was such a success we shall use this each year for the kids motif competition thus saving monies.

The whole Community benefited from the project at Christmas especially during this challenging year.

The projector projected the kids competition motifs and a Merry Xmas message to the community on the church hall wall in the centre of the village. Most people in the community would have seen the this during the month that it was on and also the kids at both schools were again involved in designing a motif and two winners selected from the schools. The children visited the Church hall to see the projector / motifs being switched on and we had good response again this year on our facebook page for the overall event.

13.Lochwinnoch Choral Society

The award enabled Lochwinnoch Choral Society to implement year two of our three year Choir development strategy which included encouraging singing development in Lochwinnoch and surrounding areas for all age groups; encouraging and developing community engagement and cohesion; help combat loneliness and isolation; improve and develop the proficiency and quality of singing in senior and junior choirs; increase the sustainability of local singing by increasing choir membership and quality of performance thence the financial stability of the choral society.

Spend of the award was different as due to Covid 19 we had to cancel choir practices, our planned spring and Christmas concerts. We continued to pay our conductor his retainer and paid our pianist and junior choir master a sum to encourage his continuing loyalty. We ran on-line singing lessons for choir members and any village residents who wished to participate. Choir subscriptions were cancelled in December as we had no idea when rehearsals might re-commence. They will re-start when normal rehearsals and concerts resume.

We had 15 regular Participants in the online singing lessons. They were not always the same 15 so more than 15 participants benefited. Participants enjoyed the `social/participatory` benefits of online singing lessons and the incentive to continue practising during lockdown. We also believe the participants choral skills will have improved and be evidenced once normal rehearsals re-commence. Currently it is not possible to evidence the impact of lessons on choir members capabilities. However, the personal and social benefits of participation will undoubtedly have had and continue to have personal and community benefits.

14.Lochwinnoch Toddlers Group

Lochwinnoch Toddlers Group sought support to pay for the rental of an alternative venue to the McKillop Hall on two mornings per week during term time.

Due to Covid we were unable to meet as a group so we asked the council if we could use the grant to support at home and outdoor activities for our members instead. We used the funding to purchase craft materials, to support a range of activities from arts and crafts packs, cooking packs, Santa visit to gardens and an outdoor trail of

painted characters. We purchased a gazebo and outdoor tables and chairs, catering and supplies and sanitising equipment, and outdoor storage to enable us to deliver outdoor activities as restrictions lifted.

The PPE equipment enabled us to deliver our activities safely and the printing and stationery funds enabled us to promote our activities locally.

We had asked for £75 for posting activities to members out with the village, they did not remain engaged so we asked the council if we could reallocate this to buying a first aid pack, and additional costs for gazebo, table and chairs and outdoor storage.

15.1st Bridge of Weir Scout Group

The award was requested to be able to increase the number of young people who can access the group as the main hall is too small to accommodate larger sections and we had waiting lists. We did this by creating a second smaller hall by removing internal walls between two existing storage rooms and create a room which was well insulated and user friendly to help with inclusivity and a space which can also be used during the day by other local community groups.

The work was completed as planned and evidence photographs have been emailed in. We have over 100 young people from our village and local surrounding area attend our scout group as well as 16 volunteer leaders. Due to covid the young people have yet to get the benefit of the hall but hopefully we will all be able to get back together in the hall soon.

The whole village will benefit from the completed work. Local community groups use our hall during the day and all the young people who attend our Scout Group benefit from increased self confidence, a healthier lifestyle and greater positive mental health. The young people have a greater appreciation of their local environment through the badge work that we complete which helps guide them on the right path in life.

16.Friends of Howwood Park

The funding was requested to enable purchase of equipment etc to allow us to run events and activities at Howwood Park. We broadly spent the money on what we originally intended to spend it on. We could not buy everything, because we applied for £1938.69 but were not awarded the full amount.

We have had 4 'events' over the last year, and these were attended by approximately the following;

St Andrews Day Event - 100

Halloween Scavenger Hunt - 80 kids and 80 adults

Tinsel Walk - 60 kids and 50 adults

Easter Scavenger Hunt - 100 kids and 20 adults.

Fitness Classes - These have only just started due to lockdown. We had 5 the first week, and 8 the second week, and we hope to increase this weekly up to around 20 per week.

The Community benefited through:

Increased Community Cohesion - The classes and events bring people in the village together.

Increased Health and Fitness - The classes and events get people outdoors in the fresh air in natural surroundings, taking part in physical activities, be it participating in outdoor fitness classes, playing football, or searching for Easter Eggs!
