1. Summary

- 1.1 This report provides a progress update on activities the Renfrewshire Community Safety Partnership has carried out in the Houston, Crosslee, Linwood, Riverside & Erskine area in quarter 3 (1 October – 31 December 2017). The statistical information has been provided by the Renfrewshire Community Safety Partnership, including relevant Council Services, Police Scotland and Scottish Fire & Rescue. The report includes information on:
 - Houston, Crosslee, Linwood, Riverside & Erskine community safety statistics;
 - Environmental enforcement and improvement activities;
 - Protecting vulnerable residents;
 - Building safer communities;
 - Diversionary activities;
 - A spotlight on gender based violence.

2. Recommendations

2.1 It is recommended that the Local Area Committee notes the content of this progress update report.

3. Focus on Houston, Crosslee, Linwood, Riverside & Erskine

3.1 The table below details the number of incidents reported in the Houston, Crosslee, Linwood, Riverside and Erskine Local Area during Quarter 3, 2017/18 (01 October to 31 December 2017). The Renfrewshire Community Safety Partnership continues to target resources into identified hotspot areas.

3.2 Although there were some slight increases in numbers of incidents reported in Ward 10 from the corresponding period last year it was noted that the number of Drug Crimes reduced by 42%. Within Wards 11 and 12 there were significant reductions noted in the number of Antisocial behaviour calls and vandalism incidents in the area

Renfrewshire Wardens' Antisocial Behaviour Calls

3.3 52 antisocial behaviour calls were received by the Renfrewshire Wardens' service for the Houston, Crosslee, Linwood, Riverside & Erskine LAC area during October to December 2017 which is a decrease compared to the 69 calls in the corresponding period in 2016. 790 patrols took place within the Houston, Crosslee, Linwood, Riverside & Erskine LAC area, many in response to these calls. The antisocial behaviour calls made to the Wardens help the Community Safety Partnership to respond to and direct resources across Renfrewshire. During October to December 2017, the number of calls to the Noise Team increased in all 3 wards, however, the number of Warning Notices issued reduced reflecting the nature of the calls being minor issues that did not require any enforcement action.

4 Environmental Enforcement and Improvements

Environment and Place, Team Up to Clean Up

4.1 The Team Up to Clean Up campaign continues to flourish and engagement with communities and schools has been encouraging. The Council has a growing community group contact list and engagement is developing well. The webpage is live, offering branded downloadable materials and community clean up packs, posters and leaflets to support activity. Community groups can publish their contact details, enabling those who would like to join events, or arrange their own, to obtain support and more information.

4.2 A Team Up to Clean Up Facebook page has been launched capturing a significant level of interest with over 200 members joining to date. The page is designed to be a resource for community groups to share good practice, promote events to like-minded individuals and facilitate discussion. The page has so far has prompted joined up working between two groups.

Dog Fouling

4.3 A new approach will be adopted for maximum impact in key hotspot areas identified through data analysis and evidence of need. Initially dog fouling will be counted then highlighted using a temporary chalk spray to demonstrate the extent of the issue and encourage local dialogue. This work will be carried out in partnership with the young people from Street Stuff. The spray and dog fouling will be removed within a maximum of 48 hours by Streetscene. Signage will then be introduced in the street along with temporary street art. Wardens will ensure the area is monitored and will adhere to a zero tolerance approach to dog fouling and litter within the area.

4.4 **Purple Flag re-accreditation**

Paisley has been successful in its application to retain Purple Flag status throughout 2018. This is a boost to local businesses who will benefit from Paisley First promotion of the town and its status throughout the year. A particular focus will be on encouraging students into the town more using their Purple Flag discount card.

5 Protecting Vulnerable Residents

Community Safety Partnership Youth Team

5.1 Over the last few months, the Community Safety Partnership Youth Team have been delivering a range of promotional and educational visits to Renfrewshire Schools engaging with pupils with the support of partner agencies. There have been talks on a variety of subjects including Guy Fawkes night, anti bullying and the dangers of drugs and alcohol.

Firereach

- 5.2 Following an increase in malicious fire raising across the Renfrewshire area a number of young people identified as being at risk of carrying out this type of behaviour have participated in a week long Firereach course. The course hosted by the Scottish Fire and Rescue Service worked with the young people to raise awareness of the dangers and impact that this behaviour has on communities. **Festive Safety Campaign**
- 5.3 Renfrewshire Community Safety Partnership delivered a Festive Safety Campaign during December 2017 and early January 2018 within Paisley town centre with a Safe Bus service being provided by the Renfrewshire Community Safety Partnership assisted by the Renfrewshire Alcohol and Drug Partnership.

I Am Me/Keep Safe

5.4 The new I Am Me school tour #MakeaDifference Scotland has been to 28 Primary Schools in Renfrewshire with 5,616 children participating this term. Of these 839 children's surveys have been returned highlighting positive results with the overwhelming majority of children enjoying the visits, learning more about bullying and feeling more empowered to report bullying to an appropriate adult.

- 5.5 Keep Safe is extending across Scotland, with a further 12 local authorities actively rolling out the initiative. A further 8 local authority areas are currently engaged with I Am Me to prepare for Keep Safe within their area. There are now 334 Keep Safe places across Scotland, including 129 in Renfrewshire.
- 5.6 I Am Me won Disability Charity of the Year at the Charity Champions Awards in November 2017. In addition, the Charity has been shortlisted for the Queen's Award for Voluntary Service 2018 which is the highest award given to volunteer groups across the UK.

6. Building Safer Communities - Erskine

- 6.1 An incentive scheme is being considered to encourage youths involved in anti-social behaviour to engage with existing voluntary groups. The Fire service regularly meet and speak with local youths and show presence in area. Joint partnership inputs led by the Fire Service were carried out in schools and to youth groups on safety in the run up to the firework season and a number of youths were invited to the Fire Reach Course.
- 6.2 An Environmental Visual Audit was carried out in several areas giving cause for concern in Erskine resulting in a number of recommendations which included trimming or removing the tree and surrounding shrubbery from rear of Bargarran shopping area where youths regularly hide which would allow a clear view of the area from the underpass increasing public safety. The removal of benches from the area next to Park Mains High School where youths are known to gather and cause antisocial behaviour which has not been possible due to cost and location however the Youth Council are exploring options on how to utilise this space in a more positive way. The creation of an Urban art project in the underpasses to address issues with graffiti is also being progressed. The building at the rear of St. Anne's Primary which was frequently use by youths has now been removed.

Autumn/Winter Events, 2017

6.3 During October to December 2017, Environment & Communities and in particular Amenity Services and the Community Safety Partnership (including wardens, CCTV and Street Stuff) have supported various events throughout Renfrewshire, including Winterfest, Paisley Halloween Festival, Paisley Fireworks Spectacular, Bonfire Night, Armistice Day and Remembrance Sunday events throughout Renfrewshire, Reclaim the Night March and Christmas Lights Switch On events in Paisley, Johnstone, Renfrew, Elderslie and Linwood.

7. Diversionary Activities

Street Stuff

7.1 The Street Stuff programme has been delivering activities across Renfrewshire with recorded attendances in the region of 24,000 this financial year to the end of December 2017. This includes the delivery of additional activities with the provision of a healthy meal during the October school week and festive period with

attendances averaging 100 per day – at a similar level to last year. A range of activities were delivered during the school holidays including; Football; Table Tennis; FIFA tournament; DJ and dance. Healthy meals were provided including a Christmas dinner with fun activity games, selection boxes and gifts for young people.

7.2 The table below shows Street Stuff activity and attendance in the Houston, Crosslee, Linwood, Riverside & Erskine LAC area from October to December 2017:

7.3 Funding from this LAC in 2017/18 has allowed Street Stuff to deliver extra sessions in local areas. In total Street Stuff has provided 10 sessions over 6 days per week in the autumn months in the Houston, Crosslee, Linwood, Riverside & Erskine LAC area. The Street Stuff buses are also out during the 6 evenings and are moved depending on need and the requirements of the young people.

7.4 Street Stuff won the Community Champion award at Renfrewshire Chamber of Commerce ROCCO Business Awards 2017. They also won the Community Engagement category at the Scottish Public Sector Awards in December 2017. These latest awards complete a hat trick of awards and a very successful and well deserved year of recognition for the programme.

8. Public Protection Spotlight – Gender Based Violence

- 8.1 The term 'gender based violence' was first defined by the United Nations in 1993. This international agreed definition is still used today and helped to create the Scottish Government's definition:
 - Gender-based violence is a function of gender inequality, and an abuse of male power and privilege. It takes the form of actions that result in physical, sexual and psychological harm or suffering to women and children, or affront to their human dignity, including threats of such acts, coercion or arbitrary deprivation of liberty, whether occurring in public or private life.
- 8.2 Violence against women has its roots in gender inequality (Statistically 1 in 4 women and children will experience some form of violence or abuse at some point in their life). However, this does not mean that all acts against a woman are gender based violence, or that all victims of gender based violence are female.

- 8.3 Renfrewshire's Gender Based Violence Strategy Group (GVB) is an inter-agency strategic partnership responsible for developing and implementing Renfrewshire's response to Equally Safe Scotland's National strategy to tackle all forms of violence against women and girls. The GBV strategy group have recently completed a Self-Evaluation exercise and have drafted the Renfrewshire Gender Based Violence Strategy for 2018 21, which will be launched later this year
- 8.4 In recent years, domestic violence media campaigns and reporting strategies have been giving victims of violence the confidence to report and providing mechanisms for third parties to also report incidences of violence. This has led to an upwards trend in reporting of domestic violence which corresponds to the national trend.
- 8.5 In Apr-Aug 2017, 933 residents in Renfrewshire were reported victims of domestic violence which is a 6.5% decrease compared with the corresponding period last year, although this total is similar to the 920 recorded victims in 2015, with domestic abuse remaining a key priority for Community Planning Partners.
- 8.6 Responding to incidents of domestic abuse involves several partner agencies including Police Scotland, Social Work, ASSIST (Advocacy, Support, Safety, Information, Services Together) and the Children's Reporter. Following an incident of domestic abuse to which the police have responded, onward referrals are routinely made to Children's Services in respect of child care concerns and to ASSIST in respect of concerns for the victim's well-being. 2730 referrals of domestic abuse with a child in the household were received by Children's Services during 2016/17. Children's Services make inquiries into these referrals and if necessary investigate concerns received. There are a range of specialist services available to support women and children who are subject to gender based violence, including Renfrewshire Women and Children First and Renfrewshire Reconnection (Renfrewshire Council), Renfrewshire Rising, Renfrewshire Women's Aid, ASSIST and Barnardos.
- 8.7 MARAC (Multi Agency Risk Assessment Conference) meetings are held on a 4 weekly basis to protect victims at the highest risk of harm. Since MARAC was established within Renfrewshire in November 2015 there have been 232 victims discussed and safety plans have been put in place to prevent further harm to them and their family.
- 8.8 The 16 Days of Action is an international annual awareness-raising campaign aimed at raising awareness and applying protective action to end violence against women and girls around the world. In 2017 the campaign ran from 25th November, the International Day for the Elimination of Violence against Women, to 10th December, Human Rights Day.
- 8.9 Renfrewshire Council worked with local and national community and volunteer groups to create a variety of events for our version of 16 Days of Action. The theme in Renfrewshire this year was 'March to the Beat of Your Own Drum' which sees women and supporting agencies join forces to educate and inform the public about gender-based violence. A key symbol associated with the campaign is a white ribbon.

On 28th November, The Reclaim the Night March was coordinated by Renfrewshire Rising, to raise awareness and call for the end of violence against women. The sale of white ribbons resulted in a donation of £117 being made to Renfrewshire Rising.

Heading: Review of community level governance arrangements

1. Summary

- 1.1 In 2017, a review of Local Area Committee arrangements was carried out. The aim of the review was to assess the Local Area Committees as a model of community level governance, and make recommendations for future models.
- 1.2 A number of proposals for a future model of community level governance have been developed, which are detailed in the consultation paper attached at Appendix A.
- 1.3 In December, Council agreed that a consultation could start on the proposals. The consultation is now open and will be live until 15th April 2018.
- 1.4 Following consultation, detailed proposals for a new model will be brought back to Council for approval. It should be noted that as formal committees of the Council, Council will be asked to make any relevant amendments to the Standing Orders and Scheme of Delegation.
- 1.5 Any new model developed would then be implemented over 2018/19 following relevant Council approvals. In the meantime, a number of

process improvements will be implemented to improve the efficiency of the Local Area Committee grants process for 2018/19.

2. **Recommendations**

- 2.1 Members are asked to:
 - Note the proposals which have been developed
 - Note the consultation period on these proposals is open until 15th April 2018

3. Background

- 3.1 In 2016, Council agreed changes to the governance arrangements for the Community Planning Partnership, and as part of this work it was agreed that a review of the Local Area Committees (LACs) would be carried out.
- 3.2 The aim of the review is to assess the Local Area Committees as a model of community level governance, and make recommendations for a future model. The review included the form and function of Local Area Committees, along with the Local Area Committee grant funding.
- 3.3 Process and key activities:
 - Benchmarking has been undertaken to assess the range of models across other Scottish local authorities.
 - Engagement activities have been undertaken throughout the review, including: presentations at Local Area Committee meetings, a survey, a series of focus groups and individual interviews with organisations. This has included a range of people regularly involved in Local Area Committee meetings, alongside organisations who have been both successful and unsuccessful in gaining grant funding from Local Area Committees, and a number of organisations from the wider third sector who are not currently engaged with LACs.
 - A Community Council Local Area Committee sub-group was also set up.
 - Analysis of grant funding applications and awards across all five Local Area Committees for the last three years
- 3.4 In December 2017, a paper was taken to Council outlining the key findings from the Local Area Committee review (and engagement

activities) and Council agreed that consultation could commence on the proposals detailed at Appendix A.

4. Consultation arrangements

- 4.1 The consultation duration is 12 weeks, starting from late January 2017 until the 15th April 2018.
- 4.2 The consultation will focus on engaging the wider community in addition to those who are engaged in the current local area committee system.
- 4.3 The consultation will involve a range of methodologies to seek views from a range of stakeholders. This will include traditional consultation questions which can be answered online or on paper, along with a range of open consultation events in community locations across Renfrewshire and specific consultation sessions facilitated by community led organisations.

5. Local Area Committee grants for 2018/19

- 5.1 Any proposals to amend the Local Area Committee grant processes would not be implemented until 2019/2020.
- 5.2 It was, however, agreed by Council in December 2017 that administrative and process improvements would be explored for the 2018/19 round of grant funding, in order to help the process run more smoothly and efficiently.

Implications of the Report

- 1. **Financial** It is possible that the administration of new arrangements could have financial implications for the Council. These will be developed and presented as part of any changed proposals presented to future Council meeting.
- 2. **HR & Organisational Development** There are no HR implications arising from this report. There may be organisational development implications for a future model, as it is possible that there will be training requirements for officers as part of the transition to any new model.

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Summary

We would like peoples' views on the proposals for changing community level governance arrangements (currently, these are known as Local Area Committees). The proposals cover five themes; function, membership, boundaries, meetings and grants. The proposals are summarised below.

Function

- To have new key aims, including; making connections between community groups and the wider community; identifying, setting and sharing goals for the local community; listening to, consulting and representing local communities; and distributing grants to support local activities.
- For the meetings to change from being 'committees' to being partnerships. The new partnerships could be named locally and would become part of the Community Planning Partnership, rather than a formal committee of the council.

Membership

- To extend voting rights to other community representatives, not just elected councillors.
- To have officer representatives at the meetings, from the Council, Police Scotland, Renfrewshire Health & Social Care Partnership and Engage Renfrewshire.
- To have more local people involved with the partnerships, either directly through events or through being fed back to by a local attendee.

Boundaries

• To move from 5 area meetings based on ward boundaries, to 7 area meetings, based on community council boundaries.

Meetings

• To make meetings more accessible and participative, by having a balance of items on the agenda, improving reports and presentations, ensuring meetings are in good and accessible venues and that they are the right length.

Grants

- To have local grants for smaller local projects and a separate fund for projects that will run across the partnership areas.
- To support areas to use participatory budgeting in allocating grants and start by allocating the Youth Challenge Fund in this way.

Introduction

In 2016, Renfrewshire Council agreed changes to the governance arrangements for the Community Planning Partnership, and as part of this work it was agreed that a review of community level governance would be carried out.

When we talk about Community Level Governance, we mean the formal structures by which local communities engage with the Council and other public services. Currently in Renfrewshire, this is done through a structure of committees called 'Local Area Committees' (or 'LACs') which were established as formal committees of the Council in 2007.

We have reviewed our current system of Local Area Committees to understand how well they work, as well as looking at other models across Scotland. In particular, the review has explored how Local Area Committees might best meet the requirements of the Community Empowerment (Scotland) Act, and provide an enhanced role for communities to engage with the wider Community Planning Partnership.

Following what we have learnt from the review, we have developed a series of proposals for a future model of community level governance. This consultation sets out the proposals we have developed, and seeks views on whether (a) people agree with the direction of these proposals and (b) how we should put these proposals into action.

Why we are consulting?

The proposals outlined in the consultation paper have been developed following engagement with a range of stakeholders, but we recognize that in order to develop a model that works, we need to talk to a wider range of people.

Fundamentally, community level governance is about what works for communities. For this reason, it is essential that we work together with communities to design and deliver a model that meets their needs. Our aim is to have a model of community governance that reflects the views and requirements of communities, and in turn, that this encourages people to be more involved.

The consultation will inform the paper which will go to Council and Community Planning Partnership with details of a new model to be agreed. If this model is approved, then it would be implemented in 2018/19 and this would be done in partnership with a range of community led organisations.

As a Council, our Local Area Committee system is a formal committee of the Council. As structures are currently part of our Standing Orders, changes to this system need to be approved by Council. We have also proposed moving our community level governance arrangements into the Community Planning Partnership structure, so if these proposals are taken forward they will also need to be agreed by the Community Planning Partnership.

How we will consult?

We have already done some engagement with people as part of our review of current arrangements. We will build on this engagement in our full consultation.

As is standard, a consultation paper will be produced with information about the proposals, and consultation questions as detailed in this document. It will be possible to respond to this online, via email or using a paper copy.

In addition, a series of consultation events will be held during the consultation period, which will be carried out in community locations across Renfrewshire.

Key stakeholders include elected members, community councils, current Local Area Committee attendees, community organisations with a local interest, community anchor organisations, and organisations supported or funded through the existing Local Area Committee structures.

In addition to those currently engaged in existing arrangements, the consultation will seek views of those who are not currently engaged, such as wider community members and organisations.

The consultation will run for 12 weeks from 22nd January to 15th April 2018, to allow sufficient opportunity to carry out a range of consultation events and for people to respond to consultation questions.

Some terms used

Community Empowerment

Community empowerment is about communities being supported to do things for themselves and people having their voices heard in the planning and delivery of services.

Community Planning Partnership

Community planning is about how public bodies work together and with local communities to design and deliver better services. Partners work together to improve local services, ensuring that they meet the needs of local people, especially for those people who need those services most.

Local Area Committee (LAC)

This is the current local governance arrangement. Local Area Committees are formal committees of the Council. Anyone can attend a LAC, but only elected councillors can vote on decisions, including funding decisions.

Participatory Budgeting

This is when community members directly decide how to spend part of a public budget.

Standing Orders are the written rules of a Council. Many of these rules are needed by law, but others are decided locally by the full Council.

The proposals

There are nine key proposals that are being consulted on, across five key areas; function, membership, boundaries, meetings and grants.

Function

Currently, the aims of Local Area Committees are to promote active citizenship, to advance community wellbeing by shaping services around residents' needs, to provide local scrutiny of public services and to allocate delegated funds to fund local projects.

Proposal one: Refresh the aims

Initial engagement indicated that current arrangements do not fully meet their current aims, and that many people feel the aims of community level governance are broader than their current function. While grant giving is an important part of the arrangements, we recognise there is significant potential value beyond grant-giving, and that current arrangements might not be fulfilling that potential.

Proposed key aims for new arrangements include:

• Make connections and networks between community groups and the wider community

Community level governance offers an opportunity to bring together elected members, public sector organisations, community councils and other community led organisations across an area. This has a clear purpose in terms of achieving social connections, networks and partnerships across a local area – and this should be a more explicit aim of the new arrangements.

• Identify, set and share local community priorities

Groups should then work with each other, their memberships and wider community to identify and share the priorities for the local area. This should be a focused set of priorities, which can be ambitious for the area but still achievable – rather than a 'wish list' for communities. In response, these priorities should be recognised by the Council and its partners, and should have a material impact on how public services are delivered.

• Listen to, consult and represent local communities

Community level governance should engage local stakeholders and communities around their views, needs and aspirations for a local community – which should be part of a two-way information flow between them and local public services. Public services should work with groups for formal consultation activity, but more broadly should seek local insight through these structures. Likewise, community issues could be raised through this structure.

• Distribute grants to support local activities

Grant assistance should remain an important function, to allow locally controlled allocation of resources to community groups. Further proposals relating to grant funding can be found at section nine.

Proposal two: Move from 'committees' to partnership

It is proposed that 'Local Area Committees' are not continued in their current form and are replaced with 'Local Partnerships' in order to reflect changes to function and remit. This emphasizes the core purpose of the groups as working together and partnership, rather than a committee style function. New partnerships would work together to identify an appropriate name that reflects the geographical area covered by their partnership.

Community level governance should be owned by the community, rather than a committee function of the local authority. For this reason, it is proposed that the new partnerships become part of the Community Planning Partnership structure, and no longer function as formal committees of the Council.

Membership

Currently, Local Area Committees are chaired by an elected member within the area, and supported by a lead officer from the Council at Head of Service level. While formal membership of Local Area Committees is reserved to the elected members within the relevant area, Local Area Committees are comprised of a number of constituted community and voluntary sector organisations, and are also attended by other community planning partners such as the Police, and Health and Social Care Partnership. They are open to all constituted community organisations within the relevant local area, and are held as public meetings.

Proposal three: Voting rights extended

Engagement indicated that some groups feel disempowered by the lack of voting rights, while others feel it is proper for decisions to be made by elected members with a clear democratic mandate.

It is proposed that membership of new arrangements is widened to include equal numbers of elected members and community representatives, which would include representatives from relevant Community Councils operating in the area.

It is further proposed that new arrangements should seek to achieve decision making by consensus, but in areas where a decision is required, voting should be extended across the formal membership of the group. It should be noted that where this decision relates to a function of the Council (i.e. the distribution of grant funding) this would be a recommendation which would require formal 'approval' from either a Council board or an officer with sufficient authority.

Proposal four: Other public services play a greater role

Where public services regularly attend Local Area Committees, their role is valued. However the presence and input of public sector partners is varied, and there are opportunities to maximize the role of the Council and its partners and use community level governance arrangements as an opportunity across the partnership to engage, consult and for two way information sharing with communities.

It is proposed that key partners have officer representatives in the new arrangements, and provide an active and open channel of communication between communities and their wider organisation. Based on our engagement, it is proposed that these key organisations are the Council, Police Scotland, Renfrewshire Health and Social Care Partnership and the third sector interface, Engage Renfrewshire. Other Community Planning Partners could be called in to participate in meetings where this was relevant.

Proposal five: Wider engagement with the community

If community level governance has an increased role in representing the voices and ambitions of communities, then it is increasingly important that governance arrangements are representative of their communities, and able to hear a range of voices from within their networks and the wider community.

It is proposed that formal members of the new arrangements will have a responsibility to engage their wider membership and/or network to inform their participation on the group and also to disseminate information on the groups behalf. Wider meetings should be considered in more of an 'event' style which encourage wider attendance and facilitate local connections and networks to be established. This could be achieved through wider publicity of meetings and activities, and include presence on social media and digital channels.

Boundaries

There is a current requirement to review Local Area Committee boundaries, following the establishment of an additional ward prior to the 2017 local elections. Since this time a temporary 'fix' has been in place to allow LACs to continue to function, but they now have an uneven spread of population and elected member representation and need to be revised.

Proposal six: Move from 5 area based on ward boundaries to 7 based on community council boundaries

We have looked at redefining community level governance boundaries using Community Council boundaries, as opposed to Ward boundaries as these are more representative of physical communities and settlements, and in many cases the ward boundaries run counter to natural communities.

Feedback from engagement indicated that equal populations between areas were the fairest, and whatever boundaries are in place should recognise the distinction between urban and rural issues.

The proposals that have been developed are also based on similarities within areas, rather than differences. For example, areas might have shared physical features, or similar types of regeneration activity planned.

The proposals also expand the number of areas to 7 from 5, recognizing the current Local Area Committee areas are very large and wide ranging in some places. It is recognised that this may represent an increase in resourcing for the areas.

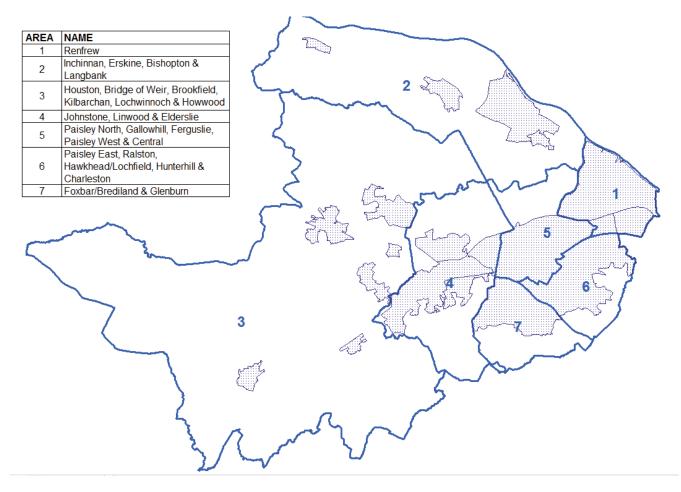
The 7 new areas are proposed to be:

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- 1. Renfrew
- 2. Inchinnan, Erskine, Bishopton and Langbank
- 3. Houston, Bridge of Weir, Brookfield, Kilbarchan, Lochwinnoch and Howwood
- 4. Johnstone, Linwood and Elderslie
- 5. Paisley North, Gallowhill, Ferguslie, Paisley West and Central
- 6. Paisley East, Ralston, Hawkhead/ Lochfield, Hunterhill and Charleston
- 7. Foxbar/ Brediland and Glenburn

The proposed new boundaries are shown on the map below.



A move away from ward boundaries means that elected member representation in the proposed arrangements would be more complex, with some elected members' wards spanning two areas.

Meetings

Business at Local Area Committees is comprised of predominantly officer reports and presentations from the Council and its partners around local performance, service changes and consultation. There is an open session on every agenda where communities can raise local issues. The first two meetings in the cycle (typically May and August) are usually predominantly focused on considering grant applications and awarding LAC funding.

Proposal seven: Meetings should become more accessible and participative

Feedback from early engagement indicated that while many value the professionalism and formality of Local Area Committee meetings, some consider them too formal and intimidating for people who are new or unfamiliar with the Council committee system.

Moving forward, it is proposed that meeting arrangements are adjusted to become more accessible and participative. There are a number of practical measures that have been suggested through early engagement, and as such it is proposed that the following are reviewed:

• balance of items on the agenda

- quantity and quality of formal reports and presentations
- venue choices and room layout
- length of meetings
- the accessibility of meetings for disabled people

Grants

Local Area Committees have a delegated budget, totalling £675,510 across the five areas. Any constituted community organisation in the relevant area can apply for a grant from the LAC for local projects and activities. Organisations serving citizens across several LAC areas can apply for funding from multiple LACs where appropriate. LAC funding is comprised of funding from relevant Common Good funds, Youth Challenge funding and General fund, and applications are considered under the appropriate fund.

Proposal eight: Local grants for local projects

It is proposed that grant funding is offered through Local Area Committees, aligned to local priorities and awarded for activities which are unique to that local area. These grants should remain easy for small local community organisations to apply for.

Currently, Local Area Committees allocate a significant level of their funding to applications that cover a number of different Local Area Committee areas. Early engagement indicated that this process can be long-winded and unpredictable for organisations applying, and some LAC members feel that applications are not always relevant to their local area. It is proposed that multi-area applications are moved to a central grants process administered by Council officers.

Engagement also indicated that more structure could be applied to the grants process to improve both the process, and the funding outcomes. It is proposed that a series of improvements are made to the

grant application process to make sure that decisions are well informed and the process runs smoothly and efficiently.

Proposal nine: Participatory budgeting

Participatory budgeting is a way for local people to have a direct say in how, and where, public funds are spent. The approach is recognized internationally and the Scottish Government is asking local councils to allocate more of their funding through participatory budgeting. By 2021, at least 1% of local government budgets in Scotland will need to be spent in this way. This method is being used more and more across Scotland as part of wider approaches to Community Empowerment.

It is proposed that local areas have the choice to deliver their grant funding through participatory budgeting, and that this would be supported by the Council.

It is also proposed that the Youth Challenge Fund should be distributed via Participatory Budgeting, where young people would decide on which projects should be funded for young people. This would

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allow young people the opportunity to influence and decide youth activities across the area but would also bring young people closer to civic participation and decision making.

1. Summary

1.1 The purpose of this report is to provide some detail on a number of projects that were funded by the Houston, Crosslee, Linwood, Riverside & Erskine LAC in 2016/17.

1.2 Providing regular feedback to LACs increases accountability and helps LACs identify clear community outcomes from grants awarded to community groups. It is also a condition of grant that groups account for their income and expenditure and set out the community benefits and other outcomes of their LAC grant awards.

2. Recommendations

2.1 The LAC is requested to note the report.

3. Background

3.1 A list of the groups that were awarded funding in 2016/17 together is appended to this report. The list highlights the status of each group relative to the provision of feedback to this LAC.

3.2 This report provides an overview of feedback submitted by a number of the successful grant applicants who were funded by the Houston, Crosslee, Linwood, Riverside & Erskine LAC in 2016/17.

3.3 Braehead Junior Ice Hockey Club

3.3.1 This LAC awarded £200 to Braehead Junior Ice Hockey Club, primarily for the cost of ice hire. Up to 75 young people benefitted from the club's ability to keep costs as low as possible to participants while promoting physical activity, discipline and training.

3.4 Houston Community Council

3.4.1 The Community Council was awarded two grants in 2016/17. The first of these was for £6,000 towards the cost of the purchase of plants, flowers and planters. The Community Council worked in partnership with the Bee Happy Houston voluntary group to deliver the project.

3.4.2 The second award to Houston Community Council amounted to £5,000 for the purchase and installation of Christmas lights and a small firework display to accompany the lights switch-on. The Community Council estimates that over 1,000 people attended the switch-on ceremony.

3.5 Lamont Farm

3.5.1 A regular recipient of LAC funding, Lamont Farm was awarded £1,000 by this LAC at its May 2016 meeting. The farm requires funding to help meet the cost of animal feed, bedding, hay and straw, farrier services, dentistry and insurance.

3.5.2 The Farm advises that over 1,000 people visit each year and that as many as 35 children volunteer at weekends. Lamont Farm also accepts work experience placements from local schools, colleges and universities.

3.6 Greensyde Carers – Gardening Project

3.6.1 The LAC awarded £100 towards the cost of floor beanbags, plants and shrubs and pots and decorative stones at the Milldale Centre. The project completed a rough hard landscaped area to allow all clients at Milldale to get out into the fresh air for relaxation. The garden also encourages people to tend the garden and encourage a sensory interaction with their surroundings. The group estimates that as many as 200 people benefitted from the project.

3.7 Houston Playpark Improvement Group

3.7.1 The Group was awarded £8,000 by this LAC in May 2016 towards the ongoing playpark improvement works. The development has been designed to be inclusive to people of all abilities, including a couple of sensory pieces and a basket style swing which can be used by all. The group anticipates that the final phase of the work will commence in March 2018.

3.8 Paisley Pirates

3.8.1 The entirety of the LAC's award of £500 was utilised by the Paisley Pirates to cover ice hire costs.

3.8.2 During the 2016/17 season the Pirates, a team consisting of and run by local volunteers, won the Scottish National League and were runners up in both the play-offs and the Scottish Cup. As a result of their success, Paisley was ranked 41 as one of the top ice hockey towns in Europe. The team estimates that 77 people have directly benefitted from the grant as well as several hundred spectators.

3.9 Renfrewshire Bowling Association Under 25s

3.9.1 The LAC grant of £150 helped to meet the cost of transport for 52 young people from all over Renfrewshire who represented the Renfrewshire Bowling Association at matches all over the country. The Under 25s team play in the Scottish Inter-County League & cups and include two under 25 internationalists and two under 17 internationalists.

3.10 The Breastfeeding Network

3.10.1 This LAC awarded £750 towards the cost of the ongoing Breast Buddies project aimed at promoting breastfeeding in Renfrewshire.

3.10.2 The group has advised that they have continued to provide breastfeeding support to families in Renfrewshire at their three weekly drop-in support groups at Ferguslie, Johnstone and Linwood. The group has also attended local community events including Lilias Day, Sma Shot Day and Barshaw Gala Day which has enabled them to engage with the local community, talking to parents and their wider families, normalising breastfeeding and providing evidence based information to local health professionals and new parents.

3.10.3 The group has continued to support their existing volunteers by providing ongoing learning, and two volunteers have now commenced nurse training. The group estimates that 82 local families directly benefitted from attendance at group sessions and 65 families attended the Teddy Bears' Picnic and Linwood's Birthday party events arranged by the Breastfeeding Network.

3.11 Dates-n-Mates Renfrewshire

3.11.1The applicant, C-change Scotland, has submitted an extensive feedback report relative to the award made by Renfrewshire LACs, including £1,000 awarded by this LAC.

3.11.2 Dates-n-mates Renfrewshire developed a pilot outreach model to identify adults with learning disabilities in specific areas of Renfrewshire and provide opportunities to connect and make friends and form meaningful relationships. Through outreach work the group advise that they are creating awareness of datesn-mates and engaging those most isolated, supporting them towards membership helping to reduce social isolation, build confidence and self-esteem, and improve the person's ability to be active citizens and improve their overall health and well-being.

3.11.3 Dates-n-mates advise that they have built positive relationships with a wide range of services and organisations including health and housing providers togther with other statutory and non-statutory services and projects. In particular, 19 local pharmacies and two GP Practices are actively supporting the outreach work as well as two local housing associations, advocacy services, the Carers Centre and West College Scotland.

3.11.4 In terms of project impact, Dates-n-mates has intimated that it sent out 55 evaluation forms to its members, 12 to attendees of its large events, 20 to family members and 24 to other stakeholders. The group also held a focus group consisting of eight members, two adult with learning disabilities that attended the large events, one parent and one support worker. From the evaluation all parents/carers agreed that members had met new people; furthermore all agreed that the project had increased members' confidence while 66% agreed dates-n-mates had increased members' independence. All members agreed since joining dates-n-mates they had met new people while 68% agreed they had met new friends.

3.11.5 Dates-n-Mates has also created volunteering opportunities for its members through its 'Champions Scheme' with five active volunteers supporting the project through different initiatives.

3.12 Active Communities - Parkour Club

3.12.1 The Lac awarded £2,000 towards the cost of this Active Communities Project. The group advises that the club has been at maximum capacity of 30 young people all year and has a waiting list for those wishing to join. Development pathways have also been provided for the young people through training, additional courses and volunteering and employment opportunities.

3.13 Erskine Music and Media Studio

3.13.1 The LAC awarded £1,000 towards the cost of delivering six training workshops presented by an industry professional photographer and film maker over a six week period. The workshops were attended by 15 members and volunteers. The grant also helped with the purchase with various pieces of filming and lighting equipment.

3.14 Houston United FC

3.14.1 The club was awarded £10,000 towards the cost of developing changing facilities at Ardgryffe Park, Houston. The club advises that the project was delayed as a result of leasing and insurance issues but these matters have now been resolved and it is hoped that the development to proceed in the near future.

3.15 RAMH - No Substitute for Life

3.15.1The LAC awarded £400 towards the cost of this multi area application. The funding helped to meet the cost of a memorial football tournament for local people, especially young men, who were most at risk of suicide. The event acted as a platform for local and national organisations who were trying to tackle the stigmas and taboos that prevented people, and particularly young men, from talking about mental health and suicide.

3.15.2 The main outcomes of the event were that it was led by the local community, ensuring local ownership and developing the resources of the community; that suicide prevention messages were clear throughout the event in order to reduce the stigma associated with the subject; and direct access to information about suicide prevention.

3.16 Renfrewshire Access Panel

3.16.1 This LAC awarded £1,226.20 to help meet the running costs for the offices of Renfrewshire Access Panel and help to enable the group to continue assisting Renfrewshire Council on various projects such as Living Streets; Joint Employability Project; and Changing Places Toilets.

3.16.2 The Panel has advised that throughout 2016/17 it continued its work to advance access provision and maintenance to buildings, environments and access to approaches for disabled people; to advance knowledge and perception with the aid of training and development; to advance knowledge and understanding of hate crime within Renfrewshire and assist with reporting to the appropriate authority; to advance the scope and procedures of the Panel by networking and building alliances; to provide advice on financial hardship and sickness for people with physical, mental and sensory impairments; and to develop the capacity and skills of the members of the socially and economically disadvantaged community of Renfrewshire, in such a way they are better able to identify, and help meet their needs and enable them to participate more fully in society.

3.17 The Boys' Brigade – Paisley & District Battalion

3.17.1The Battalion received a total award of £300 towards the costs of refurbishing the headquarters building. The building now has a DDA compliant toilet facility and the upgraded kitchen allows the Brigade to provide catering for training courses being hosted at the headquarters. The upgraded heating system makes the building more suitable for daily working, meetings and training courses.

3.18 Phoenix Flyers Dog Agility Club

3.18.1 The LAC grant of £1,000 allowed this group to purchase a large storage container and various pieces of lightweight dog agility training equipment which have been utilised at various community events in Renfrewshire. With National Certificates in Dog Training, the instructors not only mentor dog owners in agility training but also obedience, animal welfare and etiquette. In terms of a wider community benefit, the club has been able to arrange an increased number of beginner classes which will improve owner responsibility for their dogs.

3.19 Fitting-in – Renfrewshire Troopers

3.19.1 The LAC made a contribution of £1,156 towards this multi-area application which saw children and their carers undertake healthy eating and mindfulness courses and participate in trips to Hampden and Heads of Ayr. In addition, the wider benefit of the project was for kinship carers who were able to participate more fully within their communities. The group has been asked to take part in developing a piece of art : 'Recovery in Renfrewshire'.

3.20 St James' Orchestra

3.20.1 The orchestra used its multi-area grant to help meet the cost of accommodation for rehearsals and for full concerts throughout Renfrewshire.

3.21 Inchinnan Community Nursery

3.21.1 The nursery was awarded £550 to allow for the installation of a CCTV system to help protect the property. The system allows the nursery premises to be monitored outwith working hours and for visitors to be identified during working hours.

3.22 Bridge of Weir Festival

3.22.1 The Festival was awarded £2,000 towards the cost of the 2016 event with the grant being utilised for the hire of a vehicle for use with the sleigh, toilet hire, security, staging and entertainments.

3.23 Linwood Community Development Trust

3.23.1 Linwood Community Development Trust (LCDT) was awarded grants for three projects in 2016/17: £7,000 for a LCDT youth project; £10,000 for 'Lightening the Load' community shop project; and £10,000 for the Sustainable Linwood project.

3.23.2 In relation to the youth project, the grant helped LCDT employ a schools and LCDT link worker to support and enable the involvement of young people in planning initiatives ; increase enterprise activities in local schools ; and deliver educational experiences for young people. LCDT has advised that 100 young people took part in consultations and had direct input to the development of the Mossedge Community Village Project.

3.23.3 The Lightening the Load project helped to establish two pop-up shops, bringing fresh produce to the local community at an affordable price. LCDT advised that the increased number of customers and the evidence of additional need for the service resulted in the Trust receiving £50,000 funding for an additional two workers for a three-year period.

3.23.4 LCDT has intimated that the Sustainable Linwood project helped promote awareness of the Linwood environment and specifically identify two areas suitable for a community transfer. LCDT also advised that an application for a woodland children's nursery secured an additional £220,000 of government funding.

3.24 Future Feedback
