Declarations of Interest

There were no declarations of interest intimated prior to the commencement of the meeting.

Welcome and Opening Remarks

Councillor Steel welcomed those present to the meeting and paid tribute Mr Albert McBain of Johnstone Elderly Forum, who had recently passed away.

1 Minute of Previous Meeting

There was submitted the Minute of the meeting of this Local Partnership held on 4 June 2019.

<u>DECIDED</u>: That the Minute be approved.

2 Membership of Johnstone and Linwood Local Partnership

There was submitted a report by the Chief Executive relative to the Membership of Johnstone & Linwood Local Partnership.

The report advised that, as previously agreed, a representative from Active Communities would now take up the membership place previously held by Jackie Armour, KAIROS. Lorraine Wark had now been appointed as the Active Communities representative.

Due to the resignation of Laura Graham, Linwood Scouts from the Local Partnership, there was now a vacancy and applications for a new Community Representative would be sought for consideration at the next meeting of the Local Partnership.

A vacancy now also existed for the position of Vice-chair. The Chair proposed that James McLeod, Linwood Community Council be appointed as Vice-chair. There being no other nominations, this appointment was agreed unanimously.

DECIDED:

- (a) That the appointment of Lorraine Wark, Active Communities to the Local Partnership be noted;
- (b) That applications for a new Community Representative be sought for consideration at the next meeting of the Local Partnership in April 2020; and
- (c) That James McLeod be appointed as the new Vice-chair of the Local Partnership.

Sederunt

M Johnstone entered the meeting during consideration of the following item of business.

Declaration of Interest

I McMillan declared a non-financial interest in respect of item 3 of the agenda – Celebrating Renfrewshire Youth Participatory Budgeting Exercise - as he was a representative on the Linwood, Johnstone and Gryffe Community Sports Hub, however, as the item was for noting only, he remained in the meeting.

3 Celebrating Renfrewshire Youth Participatory Budgeting Exercise

There was submitted a report by the Chief Executive relative to the Celebrating Renfrewshire Youth Participatory Budgeting exercise.

The report intimated that the Youth Challenge Fund component, renamed Celebrating Renfrewshire: by young people for young people, of the Johnstone & Linwood Local Partnership budget had been allocated during September 2019 through a participatory budgeting exercise for young people aged 12 to 25 years. Young people co-produced the process of voting and 594 young people from the Johnstone & Linwood areas voted.

The results of the Celebrating Renfrewshire Participatory Budgeting exercise for September 2019 was appended to the report.

Emma Feeney, a member of the Youth Steering Group, gave a presentation to members on the outcome of the youth participatory budgeting process. There followed a question and answer session.

DECIDED:

- (a) That the outcome of the youth participatory budgeting exercise for this Local Partnership be noted; and
- (b) That the presentation be noted.

4 Johnstone and Linwood Local Partnership Priorities

There was submitted a report by the Chief Executive relative to the local priorities agreed at the meeting of this Local Partnership held on 26 March 2019.

The report intimated that the local priorities should help develop the agenda and workplan for the Local Partnership moving forward and recommended that members discuss the local priorities and agree how they wished to progress their agenda.

It had been anticipated that the Local Partnership might want to refine their local priorities as the Local Partnership developed and this was the opportunity to review and refine the local priorities prior to the allocation of grant funding in 2020/21.

Members worked in groups to review the local priorities for the area. After discussion, and following feedback from groups, the Local Partnership priorities remained as Taking pride in the look and feel of our towns; What's on in Johnstone and Linwood; Roads and Transport; Community Safety; and Focus on young people. The Partnerships Planning and Development Manager then summarised the emerging key themes within those priorities that the Local Partnership wished to concentrate on.

The Local Partnership requested information on how to access funding for historic buildings; highlighted anti-social behaviour issues that impacted on local businesses; looked at how the two towns could be better connected, giving easier access to facilities; highlighted issues with the A737 and public transport costs between the towns; and emphasised the importance of available activities for young and older people. To take these priorities forward, it was proposed that representatives from the Council's Planning Service and Transport Scotland be invited to a future meeting of the Local Partnership. This was agreed.

It was further proposed that Engage Renfrewshire provide information to members on how groups could be assisted to access information on funding available to them. This was also agreed.

Members also highlighted the importance of linking the local priorities to the 2020 funding applications.

DECIDED:

- (a) That it be agreed that the local priorities for Johnstone & Linwood Local Partnership remain the same as previously agreed;
- (b) That officers from the Council's Planning Service and Transport Scotland be invited to a future meeting of the Local Partnership to provide further information and address issues relating to key priorities; and
- (c) That Engage Renfrewshire provide information to members on how groups could be assisted to access information on funding available to them.

Declaration of Interest

I McMillan declared a non-financial interest in respect of item 5(a) of the agenda – Johnstone & Linwood Grant Funding Update - as he was a representative on the Linwood, Johnstone and Gryffe Community Sports Hub. I McMillan remained in the meeting, however, took no part on the discussion.

5(a) Johnstone and Linwood Grant Funding Update

There was submitted a report by the Chief Executive advising that, at the meeting of the Johnstone & Linwood Local Partnership held on 4 June 2019, £45,126 had been awarded to 10 local projects.

An infographic highlighting some of the key projects funded and indicating how those projects related to local priorities for the Johnstone & Linwood Local Partnership was appended to the report.

The report advised that Corseford Tenants' and Residents' Association were not able to progress their Christmas Lights project and, therefore, did not take up the £2,000 grant awarded to them. The Chair further advised that Johnstone Community Council had returned £649.23 of the grant awarded to them to fund a gala day. Therefore, there remained funds of £2,567.23 for disbursement by the Local Partnership.

The Chair proposed that the remaining funds of £2,567.23 be awarded to Linwood, Johnstone and Gryffe Community Sports Hub, as the next eligible group within the Celebrating Renfrewshire participatory budgeting exercise to receive a grant award. This was agreed.

In response to a member's question, J McLeod provided an update on the current position on the Linwood Christmas lights event, advising that, although there had been difficulties, every effort was being made to ensure that the event would take place.

DECIDED:

- (a) That the report be noted; and
- (b) That the remaining grant fund balance of £2,567.23 be awarded to Linwood, Johnstone and Gryffe Community Sports Hub.

5(b) Budget Monitoring Report

There was submitted a budget monitoring report by the Director of Finance & Resources relative to Johnstone & Linwood Local Partnership 2019/20.

<u>DECIDED</u>: That the budget monitoring report be noted.

6 Review of Local Partnerships

There was submitted a report by the Chief Executive relative to a review of Local Partnerships.

The report intimated that, following the establishment of the Local Partnerships in September 2018, it had been agreed that there would be a review of arrangements after one year of operation and it was anticipated that the review would begin in January 2020.

Since January 2019, Local Partnerships had agreed their membership, identified some initial local priorities and distributed their grant funding. In addition, the Youth Challenge Fund had been distributed across all seven Local Partnerships using a participatory budgeting approach.

The report proposed that the Local Partnership review cover the key areas used throughout the consultation and development of the Local Partnership model. This allowed for consistency and comparison with previous engagement and consultation exercises as well as fair consideration of the proposals implemented which included function; membership; boundaries; meetings; and grants.

It was important that a wide range of views could be heard as part of the review and the report suggested that the following methods be used in order to gather feedback: a review of all correspondence and feedback received since the establishment of the Local Partnerships; a further invitation for all Local Partnership members to input to the review on all topics, with the opportunity to do this online, on paper or face-to-face; and an opportunity for wider community members to feedback online or on paper.

Local Partnership members were asked to contribute their views on the scope of the review to make sure it covered all the necessary areas. In addition, members were asked to provide views on how the review should be carried out.

<u>**DECIDED**</u>: That members of the Local Partnership provide views, to Community Planning, on both the proposed scope and approach for the Local Partnership review, as outlined in section 3 of the report.

7 Johnstone and Linwood Local Partnership Future Meeting Dates

There was submitted a report by the Chief Executive relative to meetings of Johnstone & Linwood Local Partnership in 2020.

The report intimated that, when formed, it was agreed that Local Partnerships would meet three times per year. In 2019, Local Partnerships met four times, in recognition that there was additional business required to get Local Partnerships up and running.

The report proposed that meetings in 2020 be held around the months of April, August and November; that grant funding allocations for the 2020/21 financial year be made at the April meeting; that wider engagement events be held in early 2020; and that an event be carried out in each Local Partnership area which would be open to the wider community to attend.

DECIDED:

- (a) That meetings of Johnstone & Linwood Local Partnership be held around April, August and November and that members be advised of the date, time and venue for these meetings; and
- (b) That members of Johnstone & Linwood Local Partnership provide feedback to Community Planning on the proposed approach for the engagement events in early 2020 and, where appropriate, express an interest in the development of these events.

TITLE:

Applications for Local Partnership funding in Johnstone and Linwood - 2020/21

1. Summary

- 1.1 Applications for grant funding from the seven Local Partnership areas were invited in February 2020, to be considered at the Local Partnership meetings due to be held in June.
- 1.2 The Johnstone and Linwood Local Partnership meeting in June was cancelled due to the Coronavirus pandemic, to reflect both the 'lockdown' restrictions and the emergency planning arrangements in place put in place by Renfrewshire Council.
- 1.3 Renfrewshire Council resumed its policy board arrangements in August, and it was agreed by Renfrewshire Council's Emergencies Board that Local Partnerships would be resumed in September to allow for the allocation of Local Partnership funding for 2020/21.
- 1.4 The available allocation for Johnstone and Linwood Local Partnership is £47,044.
- 1.5 In addition, a sum of £50 per community representative requires to be ringfenced for potential claim of expenses, which totals £700 for Johnstone and Linwood. These expenses are deducted from the available allocation for the Local Partnership. The amount available for allocation by Johnstone and Linwood Local Partnership is therefore £46,344.
- 1.6 The Youth Challenge Fund component of Johnstone and Linwood Local Partnership Funding is £21,697. This funding will be allocated by young people through a Participatory Budgeting process currently underway.

2. Recommendations

2.1 It is recommended that members of Johnstone and Linwood Local Partnership consider the applications for Local Partnership grant funding, as set out below in Appendix 1 and 2.

3. Background

- 3.1 Applications for grant funding from the seven Local Partnership areas were invited in February 2020, to be considered at the Local Partnership meetings due to be held in June.
- 3.2 Applicants were also provided with refreshed guidance, as well as a description of the Local Priorities identified by the Johnstone and Linwood Local Partnership. A copy of this guidance has been provided at Appendix 3.
- 3.3 Following agreement by Renfrewshire Council's Emergencies Board that Local Partnerships would resume in September 2020, all applicants were contacted and provided the opportunity to amend their application or reflect any changes in circumstances that may have occurred since original applications were submitted.
- 3.4 Local Partnership members are asked to consider the applications for funding summarised at Appendix 1 and 2 of this report, and to assess these against the Local Priorities agreed by the Johnstone and Linwood local priorities.
- 3.5 Following feedback received by Local Partnership members in previous funding rounds, an initial assessment has been carried out by officers to support Local Partnership members in their decision-making. Where applications have made clear reference to the Local Priorities identified by the Local Partnership, this is identified in the first table at Appendix 1. Applications that make a partial or no reference to Johnstone and Linwood Local Priorities are summarised in the second table for example, the project may work with young people (and therefore meet the Local Priority around young people) but not deliver this directly in the Local Partnership area or make reference to how many young people from the area would be engaged in the project.
- 3.6 The priorities of the Johnstone and Linwood Local Partnership are:

Taking pride in the look and feel of our towns

The Local Partnership want people in Johnstone and Linwood to take pride in the look and feel of their towns and their heritage, with vibrant and well-used town squares, fewer derelict buildings, and making sure the streets are clean.

What's on in Johnstone and Linwood

The Local partnership want to explore how people know what's going on across Johnstone and Linwood. They also want to see community spaces and community events which are safe and affordable, particularly in community halls and hubs.

Roads and transport

The Local Partnership want to address a range of issues related to roads and transport, including congestion, speed, parking and public transport connections.

Community safety

The Local Partnership want to see safe spaces, both safe from crime but also safe physical environments. They also want to look at how they can, along with other community leaders, promote the reporting of crime and anti-social behaviour.

Focus on young people (Key theme)

The Local Partnership are particularly keen to see a focus on how young people can be engaged and involved in work around the Local Priorities

5. Description of Project

The purpose of the project is to raise awareness of recycling and create a sustainable environment. The project entails a group of service users working a tutor to repurpose and recreate new items from old so that items do not end up in landfill. The tutor has been briefed in regard to the ethos of the service and that the end products must be usable.

The project will raise awareness of waste and what can be done to re-use discarded items.

The group will be for a maximum of 8 people who have an interest in sustainability, working alongside an art tutor. The project will run from 3 February 2020 to 30 March 2021.

The project will produce items of art work that can be displayed at an art event in May 2020 with approximately 150 people in attendance. The work completed will educate people regarding material that can be saved and repurposed rather than wasted, to make the environment better.

6. Who Benefits from The Project?

Greensyde Carers benefits vulnerable adults. The group undertaking the project will be a maximum of 8 people.

7. Fit with Local Partnership Priorities

The projects helps support the theme of Taking Pride in The Look and Feel of Our Towns. The project was identified through previous community clean ups.

The idea of the project came from service users in Milldale Day Opportunities who take great pride in their surroundings. Local people have taken note of the work undertaken and this project is a natural development of what the group is trying to do. To change attitudes and make a positive impact on the local environment.

9. About the Organisation

Greensyde Carers is a charity that was established in 1996. There are 10 volunteers and 200 members.

Xmas/New Year is a particularly lonely time for seniors. The function is organised to bring members together to enjoy each other's' company. The main theme of the function is to provide a Xmas meal and entertainment.

The research identified the importance of providing information on local services, including formal and informal peer support to build people's confidence in accessing services. The report went on to note that one of the key aspirations for individuals was to form relationships which were epitomised by 'greater intimacy' (more meaningful). This led to the creation of Renfrewshire Connectedness Champions Project.

It's clear that loneliness affects children, young people and families in Scotland. In the past loneliness was sometimes seen as a problem for older people

Within the identified Local Partnerships, we will deliver Generations Working Together Workshops

with pupils, this allows them to discuss issues affecting them and take part in specialist-run workshops it is extremely important for young people to feel they have a voice and are included and empowered to look at social isolation the perceived stigma around loneliness and promote the concept of a supportive, non-judgemental community.

RCCP will deliver the same themed workshops working with teachers.

If we are to begin to tackle the issue of loneliness in children, young people and families in the community, then there is a role for each and every one of us.

We want pupils to speak about their feelings, to feel they have a voice and are included and empowered to look at social isolation the perceived stigma around loneliness and promote the concept of a supportive, non-judgemental community.

We would expect it to be feasible to present an alternative outdoor concert, perhaps with a small group of players to meet the required social distancing requirements, with additional use of video/audio for on-line viewing.

To allow us to do this, instead of deckchair hire and music specialist, we would redirect funding to barriers and signage, plus video production, and would be seeking grant funding to the same value as our original bid.

There may be an opportunity to tie in with local Christmas/seasonal activities and events in Johnstone, and we would seek to be proactive in maximising this.

To ensure the survival of the Sea Cadets and the hall. The aim is to increase the morning and afternoon usage of the hall 7 days per week. So far, the hall has been managed exclusively by the Sea cadets. However, sea cadet funds are limited which has held back development of the hall. The running cost of the centre is significant to us and is in the main funded by fund raising events - bag packing, donations, sponsored events and cadets' subscriptions etc. Receipt of this grant will take the pressure from staff and cadets and allow more time to be devoted to cadets' development.

Cadets gain experience in a range of activities not only related to sea- and water-going skills but also related to leadership, teamwork and self-confidence. Sea cadets aim to provide our young people with opportunities they might otherwise not have. They also learn about their impact on the community and the importance of giving back through local fundraising activities and participation. Young people work through Unit-based skills and training. Cadets do archery, meteorology, engineering, first aid, cookery, swimming, football etc in the unit and at district/national level. They gain nationally recognised RYA Qualifications. Many go on to be instructors and use these qualifications for career enhancement.

6. Who Benefits from The Project?

Young people and adults involved in the cadets, plus the wider local community through increased access to the Hall.

The project contributes to the 'Young People' priority – but this will not be delivered within the Johnstone and Linwood Partnership area.

This was after the loss of a Lochwinnoch Twins Group, which meant the closes group was now in East Kilbride. Other groups are usually created with 1:1 child parent ratios in mind. With the unusually large number of twins in Renfrewshire we opened up the group to the public and it has been hugely popular since.

Following a pilot scheme, completed in 2019 the scheme will become permanent in 2020.

The project purpose is to provide a counselling service for children across Renfrewshire aged 5 -15 yrs. to complement the already counselling services available at The Wynd.

Between 1st March – 30th May 2019, 13 children have been supported as a result of this Play Therapy Pilot project. This pilot scheme established that Issues behind initial referrals have been due to, social isolation, bullying, social anxiety, bereavement, anger-management and social anxiety specifically due to a diagnosis of Autism. The pilot was funded by "Go for It" which established the need for this type of counselling.

The Wynd centre has been running a nationally recognised Counselling service since The Centre was established in 1984 and there is already bespoke premises for this purpose. Additional funding is required to modify the premises and purchase equipment for this specific age group and engage part time staff responsible to the Counselling Manager. This area of activity will complete the total range of counselling services provided by nationally qualified Counsellors.

Anticipated outcomes are to improve the Strength and Difficulties Scores (SDQs) and to increase the available spaces in order to reduce the current waiting list.

August 2020 Update: There is no change to the description of the project, but the amount applied for has been amended from £6,000 to £12,000 to reflect lost letting income during lockdown.

Children and young people aged 5-15 years who require counselling will benefit from this project.

5. Description Of Project

To educate and provide hands on animal care and welfare facilities to the local community and surrounding areas. Lamont Farm offers a wide variety of services to various groups and organisations within the local area and further afield, work experience placements are provided to jobcentres, high schools, community service, kibble project and many more.

The farm provides hands on experience for over 40 children who wish to pursue a career in animal care and veterinary practice, educational workshops are ran throughout the year for primary schools, nurseries and visitors.

There are no amendments to what our project hopes to achieve, or to how we will run it. However, with the effects of Covid-19 it is more critical than ever that we receive funding from all possible sources.

Due to the nature of our project and the contact with the public we had to make the difficult decision to close mid-March, even before an official lockdown was announced, to minimise any risk to either the public or to our volunteers. We had to cease all activities with our Kids Clubs (junior volunteers) and reduce any volunteering from adults to a bare minimum of one volunteer plus a member of management each day, with these adults working at a social distance throughout the time.

We were closed for 15 weeks, losing an average donation of £150 per week or more, as the spring and summer months generally are our busiest months, especially at the weekends. Even now, although we have been able to reopen, we have had to keep two days closure to allow for a deep clean, to ensure the maximum safety of all volunteers and visitors. Normally the donations would have increased during these times due to school and nursery summer holidays, but we feel that safety is of the utmost importance.

Also there have been increased costs incurred, as disinfecting has been increased and PPE for volunteers has been purchased.

Now that we have reopened, we are receiving very positive feedback in that we are providing a safe place and activity for people far and wide to assist them firstly venturing away from home and also to increasing the possibilities of children being able to have contact with animals and other children without having to fear contracting Covid-19. We are providing an affordable day out for families (no entry fee) to allow anyone who may be struggling through or after furlough or after redundancy due to Coronavirus.

6. Who Benefits from The Project?

People of all ages from Renfrewshire can access Lamont Farm. It offers volunteering and work experience opportunities to organisations such as Schools, RAMH, Spark of Genius, Kibble School

and west College's adults with additional support needs.

Nurseries, schools and families in Paisley North can also visit the farm for a social outing and access educational workshops.

Tackling social isolation to promote health: The project offers volunteering opportunities for a range of people across Renfrewshire, working with organisations like RAMH, Spark of Genius, Kibble School and west College's adults with additional support needs.

5. Description Of Project

We are the only agility club within Renfrewshire that has permit to host kennel club shows and thus represent the West of Scotland within the greater dog agility community. The Kennel Club have introduced new standards for agility equipment to benefit canine health and safety. It is essential that we have equipment that meets these standards to host kennel club shows, maintain a safe training environment and provide affordable training to current and prospective members.

Last year, the Kennel club announced a new standard for several pieces of equipment to be introduced this year and next year, including jumps and the dog walk. For the health and wellbeing of the dogs, heights for the jumps and dog walk have been lowered. We require new equipment to meet these standards while keeping our fees affordable.

New equipment will allow us to host Kennel Club shows and train more safely. We will obtain quotes from agility suppliers for equipment that meets the new Kennel Club regulations. In addition, we will recruit local trade people to adjust our current equipment, thereby helping to keep our fees affordable and supporting local business.

An anticipated outcome for the project is that we can hold Kennel Club shows in September, thereby representing Renfrewshire within the greater dog agility community.

6. Who Benefits From The Project?

The project will benefit dog agility community in Renfrewshire & Greater Glasgow.

7. Fit With Local Partnership Priorities

The project does directly not meet any local priorities of the Johnstone and Linwood partnership.

Local Partnership Grant Funding

A guide to the grant funding available from Local Partnerships and how to apply



Local Partnerships are a way for communities, elected members and public organisations to work together at a local level.

There are seven Local Partnerships in Renfrewshire, and they replaced Local Area Committees in 2018.

Each Local Partnership has agreed a set of Local Priorities, and each Partnership has grant funding they can allocate to support these priorities.

The aims of Local Partnerships are to:

- Make connections and networks between community groups and the wider community
- Identify, set and share local community priorities
- Listen to, consult and represent local communities
- Distribute grants to support local priorities

Grants available from Local Partnerships

The Local Partnerships consider applications and award grant funding that reflects their local priorities. The Local Partnerships look after grant funding streams that were previously overseen by Local Area Committees:

- the General Grant Fund;
- two Common Good Funds (Paisley Common Good and Renfrew Common Good); and
- the Youth Challenge Fund

It is strongly advised that organisations read this guidance before writing and submitting their applications.

You will find further information about each of these three funding streams and how to apply for them over the next few pages.

The most important thing to remember when applying for grant funding is to make sure you can contribute to at least one of the local priorities for the area you are applying to. It will be important to take time to find out about these priorities before applying. They are available here.

The Application Process

Read the Local Partnership Grant Funding Guidance and the Priorities for the Local Partnership area you are applying to.

Attend a drop in session if you would like to discuss the priorities, application process or alternative funding opportunities.

Fill in application, ensuring you address the relevant local priorities and submit to rcgrantapplications@renfrewshire.gov.uk, together with the relevant bank statement, accounts and constitution. The deadline for applications is 9th March 2020

Your application will be considered by the Local Partnership in April or May. Local Partnership meetings are public, so you are welcome to come along to the April or May meetings. You will not be required to attend, or expected to speak at the meeting.

Following the meeting, you will be informed whether your application was successful or not. If you are successful, you will be asked to agree the conditions of grant and payment arrangements will be made.

The Application Form

The standard Voluntary and Community Organisations Grant Application Form is used to apply for Local Partnership funding. The form is available here (under related documents) or please contact the Community Planning team on 0141 6184168 if you would like a paper copy sent to you.

The form has guidance notes in the right-hand column to help you with what information to put in each box. The notes below provide further information about how to make the best use of the application.

Section 1

This section is for you to tell us about your organisation and what you do. In section 1.13 you are asked about which Local Partnership area you are applying to and where your project will be operating. In section 1.13a you should tick the Local Partnership area you are applying for funding in. In 1.13b you should write which Local Partnership area(s) the project you are applying for will operate in. All applications will be treated as an individual application by each Local Partnership. In this way, your activity needs to be viable as a project in each Local Partnership area it is applying to. If you are applying for funding from more than one Local Partnership area, you will either need to make sure your one application covers at least one priority from each of the Local Partnership areas applied to, or submit separate applications tailored to the priorities of each Local Partnership area applied to. If you are submitting one application to cover more than one Local Partnership area, you will need to make it clear how much funding is being asked for from each Local Partnership. This is covered in section 2.

Section 2

This section is an opportunity to tell us about the project you would like funding for. It is very important that you use this section to explain how you will address the priorities identified by your Local Partnership. These sections will be made public through the summary reports at the Local Partnership meetings. You should provide a good description of your project in this section highlighting clearly which priorities it will address. This is information that the Local Partnership Meeting will use to decide on your application. If you are using one application to apply to more than one Local Partnership, you need to write the name of the Local Partnership applied to next to the amount requested from that Local Partnership in section 2.10.

Section 3

This section is to make sure that you have included all the necessary supporting paperwork. Your application cannot be considered until you submit all of the correct paperwork.

Section 4

If you are filling in a paper copy of the form to post, you can sign this section of the form. If you are doing the form online, a signature can be taken at a later date.

General Grant Fund

The General Grant Fund provides grants of up to £10,000. The grants are open to constituted local community, voluntary organisations and Community Planning Partners. The fund is intended to develop local activities and projects within Local Partnership areas. The total amount of General Grant funding available is slightly different in each of the seven Local Partnership areas, because funding is allocated to Local Partnerships based on their population. Activities are expected to reflect the different priorities and needs in each of the seven areas.

Eligibility Criteria

Who can and cannot apply?

- Any community or voluntary organisation with a constitution and a bank account can apply. Any organisation applying should be accountable to its members.
- Community Planning Partners can submit applications for funding, but Council services cannot. Community Planning partners should not submit applications for projects that are regarded as core functions.
- If your application is for an individual, it will not be considered.
- Your application should contribute towards at least one of the Local Partnership's key priorities. These were established by Partnerships at their March 2019 meetings and have been developed further since. Projects should be able to demonstrate real benefit to the local area by improving or complementing existing service provision.
- Organisations that work across Renfrewshire, or in a number of Local Partnership areas, can apply, but only for projects or activities which support an area's priorities, and are delivered in that area specifically.
- You cannot apply for costs of activities that have already happened.
- You cannot apply for your total running costs. You can apply to part fund running costs though.
- The General Grant Fund will very occasionally support applications to fund activities such as day trips and lunches, but only when they provide an additional community benefit (for example tackling loneliness and isolation).
- The General Grant Fund will not support projects that exist mainly to further religious or political beliefs.

- Your application must encourage equality of opportunity.
- You cannot apply to fund either a trip abroad or hospitality to other organisations.
- If you receive a grant from the General Grant Fund, it must usually be spent within this financial year.
- General Grant Fund awards are one-off and are not intended to provide ongoing funding for the same or similar activities on an annual basis.
- If you are successful in your application, you must accept and comply with the grant conditions. It is also expected that you report back on the impact the project has had once the funds are spent.
- You should plan how you will sustain your organisation, once funding from the General Grant Fund has been used.
- You cannot use the funding for events to raise funds for other charities
- You cannot use the funding to cover your Community Councils' running costs above those funded by its administration grant from the Council.
- You should provide evidence of partnership working, where applicable.

What types of activities or projects can and cannot be funded?

Activities or projects must contribute to at least one of the key priorities identified by the Local Partnership. The fund can support a variety of projects and activities. This can include supporting people back into employment; supporting young people; supporting community safety activity; supporting healthier lifestyles; tackling poverty in disadvantaged areas; and promoting equality within local areas.

These types of activities can cover an array of different projects. Examples include:

- Refurbishment of community facilities such as decorating or improving the layout of a room for community use.
- Enhancing or creating community gardens for recreational areas.
- Community events such as gala days.
- Projects that raise awareness of healthy eating and help people change eating habits.
- Projects that promote positive mental health issues.
- After school clubs that encourage development e.g. homework clubs,
- Leadership and team working skills for group members.

Common Good Funds

Common Good is funding generated from an investment portfolio where the annual income is used to support local projects. There are Common Good funds in both Renfrew and Paisley, which are distributed through the Local Partnership. In Paisley, the fund is split across the three Local Partnerships, based on the population of each area.

The general eligibility criteria for the common good funds are the same as for the General Grant Fund, although there is no specific maximum award. The main difference is that the Common Good Funds are charities and so any projects funded through the common good funds must meet their charitable objectives (the advancement of civic responsibility or community development) to benefit people in Renfrew or Paisley.

Former Youth Challenge Fund

The Youth Challenge Fund was allocated using participatory budgeting for the first time in 2019/20 and became known as "Celebrating Renfrewshire – By Young People, For Young People." This was the first year that young people decided directly which youth projects should be funded. It is expected that this fund will be allocated in the same way this year. This funding round will be launched separately.

Frequently Asked Questions

How will funding award decisions be made?

The members of the Local Partnership in each area will make a decision on each funding application, guided by an assessment of whether the application has met the local priorities. Remember to base your application on the local priorities of the Partnership area you are applying to. Priorities are linked here

How do I apply?

Fill in a standard grant application form on the Renfrewshire Council web site. You can do this electronically and email it in or send in a completed paper copy. You should make sure you have understood what the local priorities are for the area you are applying to before completing your application.

When is the deadline for applications?

The deadline will be 9th March 2020 for consideration at the April/ May meetings.

What happens to my application after it is submitted?

Your application and documents will be checked and then stored on the Council system. A summary of your application will be prepared to include in the papers for the relevant Local Partnership meeting. If there are any queries or clarifications needed about your application, you will be contacted before the Local Partnership papers are prepared.

When will I hear back?

You will hear back after the meeting of the Local Partnership has made a decision. The decisions will be made during the April/ May 2020 cycle of meetings. Local Partnership meetings are public, so you are welcome to come along to the meetings. You will not be required to attend or expected to speak at the meeting.

How much money can I apply for?

You can apply for a maximum of £10,000 from the General Grant Fund. If you are applying for Common Good funding, there is not specific maximum limit – but remember Common Good funding is only available in Paisley and Renfrew.

Who can apply?

Any community or voluntary organisation with a constitution and a bank account can apply. Any organisation applying should be accountable to its members. Council services will not be able to apply for funding. The wider community planning partners will be able to apply, if their project aligns with local priorities.

Can I apply to fund Christmas lights?

Unfortunately, Renfrewshire Council has very limited capacity for any further installation, storage and maintenance of Christmas lighting. If you wish to submit an application which would require

additional Council resources, you should discuss this with Council officers prior to submitting your application.

We work across Renfrewshire, can we apply?

You can apply to one or more Local Partnership. The project you are applying for, must be for the benefit of people who live in that area and the project must align with the local priorities for that area. You should focus on the areas where your project aligns most with the local priorities. You could also think about where your project is based or where most of the people using or otherwise involved in the project will be based. It might align with more than one Local Partnership area. If you do want to apply to more than one Local Partnership area, you will need to either submit separate applications or make it very clear which information applies to which Local Partnership.

What is happening to 'multi LAC' applications?

All applications will be treated as an individual application by each Local Partnership. In this way, your activity needs to be viable as a project in each Local Partnership area it is applying to. If you are applying for funding from more than one Local Partnership area, you will either need to make sure your one application covers at least one priority from each of the Local Partnership areas applied to, or submit separate applications tailored to the priorities of each Local Partnership area applied to. If you are submitting one application to cover more than one Local Partnership area, you will need to make it clear:

- How your project will specifically benefit people in each Local Partnership area applied to,
 and
- how much funding is being asked for from each Local Partnership.

Is it the same process as the old LAC funding applications?

There are some differences. Local Partnership grant applications must be based on the priorities for that Local Partnership area. The Youth Challenge fund decisions will be made by local young people and so follow a different process to take place later in the year.

Is the total amount of funding the same as the old LAC funding?

Yes, the total amount of funding is the same. It is still based on the population of each area, but now split between the seven Local Partnerships, rather than the five former LACs.

What happens if money is not allocated by the end of the financial year?

Where all available grant funding within a financial year is not fully committed, the balance can be carried forward only where a specific project for the forthcoming financial year has been identified and approved by the Local Partnership. This gives the Local Partnership the flexibility to set aside a proportion of its current year grant for use on a specific project the following year.

It is not intended that this year-end flexibility would be applied to carry forward a general underspend of available grant for which no specific purpose has been identified or approved.

What happens if organisations that are members of Local Partnerships apply for funding?

Organisations that are members of a Local Partnership can still apply to that Local Partnership, but they will not be allowed to speak to the application at the decision meeting and will not be allowed to vote on their own application.

If I am unsuccessful, where can I find other sources of funding?
