DECLARATIONS OF INTEREST

There were no declarations of interest intimated prior to the commencement of the meeting.

1 WELCOME AND INTRODUCTIONS

Councillor Shaw opened the meeting by extending a welcome to everyone present. He invited members, the Community Planning partners, and Renfrewshire Council officers to introduce themselves and to advise their role at meetings.

DECIDED: To note the welcome and introductions.

2 **APPOINTMENT OF VICE-CHAIR**

Councillor Shaw advised that, in terms of the Standing Orders for Local Partnerships, a community representative could be appointed as Vice-chair and called for nominations.

Councillor Hughes proposed that Samantha Gillan (Renfrew YMCA) be appointed as Vice-chair. There being no other nominations, this appointment was agreed unanimously.

DECIDED: That Samantha Gillan be appointed Vice-chair.

3 MINUTE OF PREVIOUS MEETING

The Minute of the meeting of Renfrew Local Partnership held on 6 February 2019 was submitted and approved.

DECIDED: That the Minute be approved.

4 CODE OF CONDUCT

The Head of Corporate Governance provided information about the adoption of a Code of Conduct for Devolved Public Bodies that set out standards of behaviour that could be applied to members, given that their role would include the allocation of public funds. The Code of Conduct would require community representatives to register their interests and to declare those interests at meetings. In this way, business conducted by the Local Partnership, which was not part of the formal Board structure of Renfrewshire Council, would be open and transparent. It was noted that Councillors held a statutory duty to adhere to the Code of Conduct for Councillors and already had a Register of Interests in place.

It was proposed that Members do not complete the formal Register of Interest but ensure that if they have an interest (whether financial or non-financial) in any item of business at future local partnership meetings then they declare the interest accordingly. This was agreed unanimously.

DECIDED: That it be agreed that Members to not complete the formal Register of Interest but ensure that if they have an interest (whether financial or non-financial) in any item of business at future local partnership meetings then they declare the interest accordingly.

6 KEY LOCAL PRIORITIES

A presentation was delivered by the Strategic Partnerships and Inequalities Manager, the Development Plans and Housing Strategy Team Leader and the Community Capacity Development Officer, Engage Renfrewshire, relative to identifying common matters that were important to people in the area and setting local priorities for improvement. It was envisaged that, once identified, these local priorities would be used to target resources and improvement actions.

The presentation, together with a Local Profile providing background information, detailed key facts about the population; children in low income families; access, health and crime deprivation; children and education; parks and play areas; health resources; care homes, extra care and sheltered housing specific to this Local Partnership area.

Based on the information provided, members worked in groups to identify and set local priorities for the area. After discussion, the following key themes and priorities were identified (in no order of importance):

-Renfrew Town Centre - improvements to economy, communal spaces and town centre events;

Making Use of Public Resources - improving community buildings, making use of green space;

-Connectivity – improving roads infrastructure, public transport, cycle routes and any form of active travel

-Health & Wellbeing - social isolation (inter-generational), improve drug and alcohol misuse; and access economic opportunities.

Based on these key themes and discussion at the meeting, the Strategic Partnerships and Inequalities Manager advised that a draft copy of the key themes and local priorities would be circulated to members of the Local Partnership.

DECIDED:

(a) That the key themes and local priorities identified for this Local Partnership be approved; and

(b) That a draft copy of the key themes and local priorities be circulated to members of the Local Partnership prior to the next meeting.

7 LOCAL PARTNERSHIP - FUTURE ARRANGEMENTS

There was submitted a report by the Chief Executive relative to the name of this Local Partnership and arrangements to be put in place for future meetings. It was noted that community representatives could claim expenses of £50 per annum, from Local Partnership funds, for attendance at meetings.

DECIDED:

(a) That further meetings of the Local Partnership be held in November 2019 and March/April 2020 with a wider community engagement event to take place during September/October 2019;

(b) That it be agreed that future meetings of the Local Partnership be held within Renfrew Town Hall;

(c) That it be agreed that the next meeting of the Local Partnership be held at 6.00 pm on 25 June 2019 in Renfrew Town Hall and the name of the Partnership remain as Renfrew Local Partnership;

(d) That the arrangements for community representative expenses, as detailed in the report, be noted.

TITLE: RENFREW LOCAL PARTNERSHIP – BUSINESS ARRANGEMENTS

1. Summary

- 1.1 The Local Partnership meeting held on 28 March 2019 decided that the name remain as Renfrew Local Partnership and that meetings take place in Renfrew Town Hall.
- 1.2 The Youth Challenge element of Renfrew Local Partnership funding will be agreed through a Participatory Budgeting exercise for young people that will take place during August and September 2019. The outcome will be reported to the next meeting of the Local Partnership in November 2019.
- 1.3 A community conference event for Renfrew will take place during September/October 2019. The next meeting of the Local Partnership will take place in November 2019. The date and venue of the conference and the Local Partnership will be notified to members in June 2019.
- 1.4 Renfrew Local Partnership agreed that members do not complete the formal Register of Interest. Where members have an interest in any item of business at future meetings, they will declare this accordingly.

2. **Recommendations**

- 2.1 It is recommended that Renfrew Local Partnership:
 - (a) Note that the agreed name of the partnership is Renfrew Local Partnership.
 - (b) Note the arrangements for the Youth Participatory Budgeting exercise and informing local members of Renfrew conference and Local Partnership arrangements for autumn 2019.

3. Key Issues For Consideration

Name of Local Partnership

3.1 Members of Renfrew Local Partnership discussed and agreed at the meeting on 26 March 2019 that the name of the Local Partnership remain the same going forward.

Schedule of Meetings

3.2 Renfrew Local Partnership agreed at its meeting in March 2019 that a conference event would be held in the area in order to engage with community groups, voluntary organisations and members of the public who are not represented formally on the Partnership, to take place during autumn 2019. The next meeting of the Local Partnership will take place in November 2019.

Youth Challenge Funding

- 3.3 Each Local Partnership receives a proportionate share of the Youth Challenge budget, which funds projects and activities benefiting young people up to age 25. The Youth Challenge element of the Renfrew Local Partnership budget will be allocated through a Youth Participatory budgeting exercise, where young people in the area vote for the applications that they want to see funded. This will be the same for all Local Partnership areas.
- 3.4 Participatory Budgeting means that the people who are intended to benefit from the projects vote on which projects are funded. Young people from each of the Local Partnership areas will be involved in developing the process for conducting the Participatory Budgetary exercise before a voting exercise is opened up to the wider community of young people in each Local Partnership area.

Code of Conduct/Register of Interest

3.4 A presentation was made at the March 2019 meeting of Renfrew Local Partnership regarding members signing up to a Code of Conduct and Register of Interest. This presented information for consideration by each Local Partnership on the issue of members of the Local Partnership signing up to a Code of Conduct and completion of a Register of Interest. It was decided at the meeting that Renfrew Local Partnership members would not be required to complete the formal Register of Interest, but would declare interests where these arise at future meetings.

Applications For Local Partnership Grant Funding

1. Summary

- 1.1 Applications for grant funding from the seven Local Partnership areas were invited in April 2019, with a deadline for submission of 20 May 2019.
- 1.2 At the last meeting of the Renfrew Local Partnership on 26 March 2019, members agreed a draft set of priorities for the Local Partnership. The priorities identified for Renfrew were:
 - Bringing Renfrew Town Centre to life
 - Moving around and connectivity
 - Making the most of public assets
 - Strengthening social connections
 - Maximising economic impact Key Theme
- 2.2 Applications for funding from Renfrew Local Partnership have been invited to reflect these priorities. A description of the priorities is set out at paragraph 4.1.
- 2.3 The available allocation for Renfrew Local Partnership is £107,813. This is made up of £40,453 General Grant Fund and £67,360 Renfrew Common Good Fund. The total value of applications received is £131,308.52. In addition a sum of £50 per community representative requires to be ringfenced for potential claim of expenses, as agreed at the March 2019 meeting.
- 2.4 The Youth Challenge Fund component of Renfrew Local Partnership Funding is £18,657. This funding will be allocated by young people through a Participatory Budgeting process to take place later in 2019.

3. Recommendations

3.1 It is recommended that members of Renfrew Local Partnership consider the applications for Local Partnership grant funding, as set out below in Appendix 1 and Appendix 2.

4. Background

4.1 The priorities of the Renfrew Local Partnership are:

Bringing Renfrew Town Centre to life

The Local partnership want to see more things to do in the town centre, particularly encouraging local events and seeing more happening in the evenings. They want to do this by making best use of community assets and spaces, including working with the town centre business community.

Moving around and connectivity

The Local Partnership wants the economic investment in Renfrew to benefit the local community, particularly making it easier for people to get around the town, and to travel to and from Renfrew.

Making the most of public assets

The Local partnership want to see the maximum use of public resources, such as parks and outdoor spaces, as well as maximising the use of buildings in the community.

Strengthening social connections

Improving social connections and tackling social isolation is a key theme for the Local Partnership, and the Partnership recognise this affects all ages, including younger and older people. Community events and activities are important, as will be a focus on improving health and wellbeing locally.

Key Theme – Maximising Economic Impact

The Local Partnership want to see a focus on boosting the economic outcomes for people in Renfrew and how this can support their Local Priorities.

4.2 Guidance and Criteria for funding

To assist all interested groups and organisations with the application process, guidance was produced and promoted across a variety of communication channels.

Potential applicants were also invited to attend drop in sessions to receive advice on making an application and to ask questions about the guidance. More than 70 groups participated in the drop-in sessions.

The guidance set out criteria against which applications should be made. For example, guidance was provided on applications made to more than one partnership, indicating that Local Partnerships would require applications to evidence how an application would meet identified local priorities, and would anticipate that funded activity was being delivered locally. The guidance also includes criteria relating to maximum levels of investment, applications from partner organisations and what funding should and should not be used to support amongst other issues.

Further support and information will be made available to those applicants who are not successful in gaining funding, and in particular to signpost applicants to other sources of funding. For reference, the guidance can be accessed <u>here</u>.

Bringing Renfrew Town Centre to Life

The club train and play their games in Renfrew, staging approximately 16-18 local events each year in the form September to April each year. Visiting supporters thus come to the area prior to matches and go into shops, visit the Town Centre, etc. The club is participating in this year's Renfrew Gala Day, demonstrating its desire to be regarded as part of the local community.

The club's mascot, a seven foot tall cartoon figure known as Timbers, will be on display at the Gala Day walking around the site, having his picture taken with small children and other adults, and generally making a positive contribution to the day's proceedings.

Moving Around & Connectivity/Strengthening Local Connections

As indicated, visiting supporters have the opportunity to visit the local town. On a local basis, residents of Renfrew can attend ice hockey on their doorstep and identify with 'their' local team, as well as form friendships and relationships with other supporters from neighbouring communities.

The club has helped make it possible to move around the locality in safety by promoting campaigns such as the Paisley Daily Express project which sought to remove knives from the streets. Players from the club were featured holding car stickers displaying that message, which were thereafter distributed to supporters and members of the local community.

As well as weekly features in the Paisley Express during the season, we have our own website, 2184 Facebook Followers with 2179 Likes, 2180 Twitter Followers, 483 Instagram Followers and various other digital outlets within Renfrewshire such as Whats on Renfrewshire etc

Maximising Economic Impact

With approximately 16-18 home matches per year, (typically attracting 200 to 420 people per game) the club helps generate more visitors to the local area (eg Braehead and Renfrew Town Centre), thus increasing footfall on those occasions.

The creation of our Junior Development programme would ultimately lead to visiting teams attending the local area to fulfil fixtures, and further boost the economy of the local area.

As above, people are living longer due to medical advances and there are much higher levels of dementia than there was a decade ago. There is a real need support a wide range of activity in the care home to help individuals transition from living at home to living in the care home and, equally, we want families, friends and staff to get involved in any process we can faciliate because feedback and evaluations have shown time and time again that there is more interaction at group activities or planned events where a person feels relaxed doing something they love, whether that is singing, dancing, drawing or petting animals, and for a split second they're no longer a person with dementia but they're simply just mum or dad. Renfrew Care Home Activity Group realises that there is a need to increase activity levels in the local community because many older people are on our doorsteps although very much isolated and lonely. We will develop this project with the local community in mind and we will encourage participation in the project with our younger partners from Arkleston Primary to ensure the younger generation are educated and have experience of some of the issues people living with dementia face, which in turn will help to improve the overall intergenerational connections across the
community too. We know that there is a real need to strengthening the care home social connections and there is a growing demand for Namaste services for people who are nearing the end of their life, both of which have been recognised through feedback from residents, staff and relatives of residents who live, visitor or work there.
We will transform the existing Namaste room making it more inclusive to all residents who will benefit from this type of care service. We'll do this by purchasing two new speicalised reclining chairs designed to get older people in and out with ease and care. The room itself is quite feminine at the moment although we will decorated in a way that is calming, natural and homely. We will introduce sensory equipment to enhance the ambiance of the room too. This room will be used by the residents who are unable to attend social activities because they are with limited mobility and nearing end of life. The Namaste room will act as a place that a person can be taken to indulge in various one to one activities, such as gentle massage and aromatherapy. The other part of this application focuses on "Arts in Care" involving the other residents who are more able and living well with various forms of dementia. For this part of the application we will introduce a programme of activity that will take place in the care home however it will be open for the wider community to participate in. We will book singing groups, tap fit and exercise classes that will run fortnightly along with monthly art classes and pet therapy sessions, all of which are dementia focused activities.

	The Suite will be a digital multimedia facility boasting a professional IT suite and recording facilities allowing young people the opportunity to develop professional skills in music and sound technology, recording and video editing. Through our inclusive approach to teaching, participants are able to attend classes and learn together, strengthening community involvement and benefit. The awareness of Gaelic culture and local heritage has increased significantly since the establishment of Fèis Phàislig in 2014 and has allowed those interested in traditional music and culture to participate, regardless of background or ability.

• Bringing Renfrew Town Centre to life

Regular showcase events, ceilidhs and concerts allow us to make use of local community spaces wherever possible. Our projects will assist the establishment of a caring, community atmosphere and as well as participants benefitting socially, families and others within the community will come together for showcase concerts and public events.

• Making the most of public assets

Our touring Ceilidh Trail group will focus on visiting other groups and venues within Renfrew to deliver performances to those who may otherwise not have access to traditional music and Gaelic.

• Strengthening social connections

The social aspect of our 2019-20 programme will provide participants with the opportunity to make new friendships in an enjoyable and safe environment, working alongside professional artists and creative adults. This will create social benefit within the local partnership area and encourage health and wellbeing through live music and dance.
