Applications for Local Partnership Funding to The Villages Local Partnership 2022/23

1. Summary

- 1.1 Applications for grant funding from the seven Local Partnership areas were invited to be submitted during March and April 2022, to be considered at the Local Partnership meetings due to be held in June 2022.
- 1.2 The available allocation for The Villages Local Partnership for 2022/23 is £51,191.
- 1.3 From this total budget, a sum of £50 per community representative requires to be ringfenced for potential claim of expenses. These expenses are deducted from the available allocation for the Local Partnership. The Villages Local Partnership has space for fifteen community members, so the total ringfenced for expenses is £750.
- 1.4 In 2021/22, Local Partnership members agreed to allocate £3,000 of funding for applications from seniors' groups. As this funding was ringfenced for a specific purpose but not awarded, this has been carried forward into the 2022/23 financial year. **The total budget available for allocation by The Villages Local Partnership is therefore** £53,441.
- 1.5 The Youth Challenge Fund component of The Villages Local Partnership Funding for 2022/23 is £23,609. This funding will be allocated by young people through a Participatory Budgeting exercise that will take place during autumn 2022.

2. Recommendations

2.1 It is recommended that members of The Villages Local Partnership consider the applications for Local Partnership grant funding, as set out below in Appendix 1 and 2.

3. **Background**

- 3.1 Applicants for funding in 2022/23 have been provided with guidance, as well as a description of the Local Priorities identified by The Villages Local Partnership.
- 3.2 Local Partnership members are asked to consider the applications for funding summarised at Appendix 1 and 2 of this report, and to assess these against the Local Priorities agreed by the The Villages Local Partnership.
- 3.3 An initial assessment has been carried out by officers to support Local Partnership members in their decision-making. Where applications have made clear reference to the Local Priorities identified by the Local Partnership, this is identified in the first table at Appendix 1. Applications that make a partial or no reference to The Villages Local Priorities are summarised in the second table for example, the project supports connectivity and transport (and therefore meets the Local Priority around connectivity and transport) but does not deliver this directly in the Local Partnership area or make reference to how many people from the area would be engaged in the project.
- 3.4 The priorities of The Villages Local Partnership are:

Connectivity and transport

The Local Partnership want to see villages which are well-connected to each other, where people can connect with each other too. Transport is a clear focus in this area, including both public transport and green routes.

Environment and Parks

The Local Partnership want well-maintained villages, with high quality public parks and a focus on street scene, including fly tipping, dog fouling and litter.

Access to services, facilities and assets

The Local Partnership want to improve access to what's going on in the community, including community activities, and making the most of their community buildings and facilities.

Village identity and character

The Local Partnership want to maintain the identity and character of the villages in the area. Key to this is developing and sustaining local community groups, and the delivery of local events.

We'll offer training and team building for Volunteers. They will be able to choose from a range of training options including Food Hygiene, First Aid, Anti-Racism, Environmental, Community Development, Mental Health Supporter, plus more. Once each Volunteer has been with us six months and completed any two training sessions, they will receive a branded hoodie with their names on it. The new cabin is currently unsuitable for public access; The windows require attention and are not watertight and there is no shelving or counter space. The next step for our development of the project as a whole, is to fit this space out appropriately.

We also need a way to review member usage and understand how people are accessing the project; We currently only have the capability to record basic information. To fully assess data and outcomes, we need a system which illustrates frequency of use against other demographics per user.

We will engage carpenters to shop-fit the cabin, making the best use of the space available. This will involve building bespoke shelving and counter space and storage. We will build outdoor shelves under a wooden canopy for fresh produce which will be fit for all weather. We will also incorporate a counter area where Volunteers can carry out their work.

We will purchase technology which will support a new membership system and feedback to us the data we need. This will be a card based system that will protect members privacy and dignity.

We would like to develop a drop in aimed at capacity building hard to reach minority ethnic (in particular African) communities in and around Renfrewshire which encounter multiple barriers, such as communication and those of a cultural nature, which prevent them from becoming resilient communities.

The project will provide weekly 40 weekly drop-in sessions for 8-10 individuals around volunteering job search and application support, volunteering opportunities, general and mental health support and information on entitlements, The project will also aim to improve awareness via providing access to literature and media through the development of information packs on hot topic subjects to share with 600 - 800 people. The proposed information packs would also be written using simple English and translated into several common languages that are prevalent within the community, making them accessible to a wide range of audiences. The project would also deliver 6 workshops targeting 5 participants per workshop around areas that our client base feel they need more help within order to become more resilient and independent. These areas could include budgeting, recycling, how to buy online (using comparison websites and freebies) cooking (how to make healthy meals utilising leftovers), confidence building, CV writing and developing interview skills. The project will also organise one massive cultural celebration event bringing the whole community together to allow community integration.

What will the project do?

The project has been developed as a result of a combination of factors such as an increasing number of diverse groups in and around the Renfrewshire area; gaps in service provision for hard-to-reach communities; consultations held with target communities in order to assess their needs; anecdotal evidence; evidence from research; and government and local council community development priorities. This information as it relates to our experience of service delivery at a local level in Renfrewshire indicates that regular activities and intervention.

The project will support them through the provision of information as well as through developing skills that will allow communities to fight poverty and cushion the effects of welfare reforms.
