**Applications for Local Partnership Funding to The Villages
Local Partnership 2022/23**

1. Summary

- 1.1 Applications for grant funding from the seven Local Partnership areas were invited to be submitted during March and April 2022, to be considered at the Local Partnership meetings due to be held in June 2022.
- 1.2 The available allocation for The Villages Local Partnership for 2022/23 is £51,191.
- 1.3 From this total budget, a sum of £50 per community representative requires to be ringfenced for potential claim of expenses. These expenses are deducted from the available allocation for the Local Partnership. The Villages Local Partnership has space for fifteen community members, so the total ringfenced for expenses is £750.
- 1.4 In 2021/22, Local Partnership members agreed to allocate £3,000 of funding for applications from seniors' groups. As this funding was ringfenced for a specific purpose but not awarded, this has been carried forward into the 2022/23 financial year. **The total budget available for allocation by The Villages Local Partnership is therefore £53,441.**
- 1.5 The Youth Challenge Fund component of The Villages Local Partnership Funding for 2022/23 is £23,609. This funding will be allocated by young people through a Participatory Budgeting exercise that will take place during autumn 2022.

2. Recommendations

- 2.1 It is recommended that members of The Villages Local Partnership consider the applications for Local Partnership grant funding, as set out below in Appendix 1 and 2.

3. **Background**

- 3.1 Applicants for funding in 2022/23 have been provided with guidance, as well as a description of the Local Priorities identified by The Villages Local Partnership.
- 3.2 Local Partnership members are asked to consider the applications for funding summarised at Appendix 1 and 2 of this report, and to assess these against the Local Priorities agreed by the The Villages Local Partnership.
- 3.3 An initial assessment has been carried out by officers to support Local Partnership members in their decision-making. Where applications have made clear reference to the Local Priorities identified by the Local Partnership, this is identified in the first table at Appendix 1. Applications that make a partial or no reference to The Villages Local Priorities are summarised in the second table – for example, the project supports connectivity and transport (and therefore meets the Local Priority around connectivity and transport) but does not deliver this directly in the Local Partnership area or make reference to how many people from the area would be engaged in the project.
- 3.4 The priorities of The Villages Local Partnership are:

Connectivity and transport

The Local Partnership want to see villages which are well-connected to each other, where people can connect with each other too. Transport is a clear focus in this area, including both public transport and green routes.

Environment and Parks

The Local Partnership want well-maintained villages, with high quality public parks and a focus on street scene, including fly tipping, dog fouling and litter.

Access to services, facilities and assets

The Local Partnership want to improve access to what's going on in the community, including community activities, and making the most of their community buildings and facilities.

Village identity and character

The Local Partnership want to maintain the identity and character of the villages in the area. Key to this is developing and sustaining local community groups, and the delivery of local events.

<p>Purpose of the project "The purpose of the project is to purchase kitchen appliances for the pavilion located in Howwood Park, which we are in the process of obtaining as an asset transfer from Renfrewshire Council, as agreed at their committee in January 2021.</p> <p>The pavilion is currently being renovated. We wish to install appliances in the kitchen to allow us to sell teas, coffees, and light refreshments to fund the running costs of the building. We are also seeking funding to pay for insurance, our webpage domain, and selection boxes and easter eggs for events."</p>	
<p>What will the project do? "We carried out a survey via social media and by paper questionnaires, and everyone who responded was in favour of the pavilion being renovated and re-opened for community use, and for teas, coffees and light refreshments to be on sale.</p> <p>We know there is a need for Christmas and Easter events at Howwood Park, as we have had these over the last 2 years, and they have been well attended. We want to build upon the singing development work already carried out over the last two years in Lochwinnoch and surrounding areas to target young people in particular, giving them an opportunity to enjoy communal singing. We would also like to take singing out to a number of vulnerable groups in the area.

Purpose of the project To provide an opportunity for young music students to participate in singing with a choir of varying ages and abilities. To continue to develop the singing prowess of the members of this 40-year-old choir through engagement with students who are being coached to degree level. To enhance the relationship of the villages within Renfrewshire by encouraging its residents to attend events and to hear live music of a variety of styles. To further encourage the engagement with local charities by offering a musical experience for their patients/clients	
What will the project do? Experience has taught us that the participation of young student singers, both in rehearsals and in performances, has allowed the choir members to improve their own musical skills by learning from the students themselves. However, this learning experience is a two way process as the students themselves gain further skills as they engage with choir members of all ages and musical experience. It has also been identified that we can provide solo performance opportunities for the students, giving them further experience as they grow in confidence Should we be successful in our application we would provide honoraria for 2 singing students, 1 bass and 1 tenor, or 2 bass, for a term September 2022 until May 2023. We will offer 25 tickets per concert to charities within the local areas e.g. St Vincent's Hospice, Accord Hospice, local care homes for the elderly. We will purchase some new music which will challenge both the students and the choir members.
